Introduction

This guide describes the operation process of the **Eocortex** software suite designed for intelligent analysis, processing, archiving and display of video data, and one point to manage cameras in a video surveillance system based on IP cameras.

The guide may contain screenshots of previous versions or other products of **Eocortex** software. In this case it is supposed that the functionality described in these screenshots have not changed in the current version of **Eocortex**.

After the release and publication of the next version of **Eocortex** software the manual can be supplemented with changes. To receive up-to-date documentation, please check the publication date of the **Eocortex** on site.

What's new

Novelties in Version 4.1:

Video analytics

- Added the new [Emergency Vehicle Detection](#) module, which allows detecting ambulances, fire trucks and police cars in real time.
- The [Uniform Detector](#) module has been improved. Now it has become possible to check the presence of workwears for employees.
- The [Face Recognition Complete](#) module has been improved. The accuracy of sex and age recognition has increased, and it is now possible to set the minimum threshold of facial similarity to a photo from the database more precisely.
- The [Unique Visitors Counting](#) module has been improved. The accuracy of counting and the speed of generating reports over a large time interval have increased.

Video processing

- It is now possible to perform [Decoding on GPU](#) for streams received from cameras. This will help to reduce the load on CPU when using analytics modules.
- Added support for the [H.264+](#), [H.265+](#), [WiseStream](#), [Zipstream](#) and [Smart Stream](#) codecs, the use of which would allow to reduce the load on the network and reduce the size of the archive without loss of video quality.

Vizualization

- The [Maps](#) section has been redesigned and improved. The following have been added: improved navigation and search on the map, transition to related plans, flexible camera field of view customization, configuration of video displaying inside the field of view, and event status markers.
- The [Plans](#) section has been redesigned and improved. The following have been added: transition to the map, an extended list of supported image formats for uploading as a plan, adjustable camera field of view and video displaying inside it, and flexible group addition of sensors.

Eocortex Client

- It is became possible to display events of the camera's embedded analytics on the timeline in the [Synchronous archive](#) and [Fragments mode](#).
- Added the ability to overlay a [watermark](#) with user data when exporting an archive, saving and printing a frame in the **Eocortex Client** application.

Eocortex Web-client

- Now it is possible to view the [Event log](#) in the **Eocortex Web-client** application.

Archive and Event Log

- The **Long-term database** service has been developed, which allows storing events of desired types without being limited by the archive storage time.

Automation

- It is possible now to create unique [custom notifications and webhooks](#) to send detailed and customized information to external users and automated systems.

Integrations

- [Integration with POS terminals](#) has been enhanced. Added step-by-step viewing of video recorded during the checkout process, as well as setting the positioning of this video on the timeline.
- Improved integration with **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS. It is now possible not only to receive events from the ACS, but also to send commands to it to control doors.

Previous Versions

Novelties in Version 4.0:

Video Analytics

- New video analytics module is available: **Object Classification and Counting**. The **Object Classification and Counting** counts objects that are crossing specified lines or contained in predefined areas of arbitrary shape, distinguishing them by categories.
- The **Face Recognition (Complete)** module has been improved: CPU and GPU resources consumption has been reduced without loss of recognition accuracy, which allows to host more cameras with the module on one server.
- [Using multiple video analytics modules on the same camera](#) at the same time has become more comfortable. Now, when several modules are enabled simultaneously, it is possible to select the data of which module should be displayed on the screen in the **Eocortex Client** application and **Eocortex Web Client**.

Eocortex Client

- The **Eocortex Client** application now has the ability of [displaying watermarks](#) on live and archived video.
- Now it is possible, when viewing the archive in [Fragments mode](#), view fragments specifically for analytics, motion and alarm events. It is also possible to group selected fragments to export them as a seamless video.
- Responsiveness of the user interface in the **Eocortex Client** application has been improved.

Eocortex Web-client

- The **Eocortex Web-client** application now has the ability to [display H.264 video streams](#).
- The **Eocortex Web-client** application now can automatically [adapt to any screen resolution of the device](#).

Eocortex Configurator

- Now, it is possible to [create automation tasks for folders](#) that will be inherited by cameras in these folders.

Server applications

- Internal databases of system events and all analytics were ported from Firebird to [PostgreSQL](#). With this, the report formation time was reduced when the speed of accessing the events and the modules' data was increased.

- Support is discontinued for **Windows 7** and **Windows Server 2008** operating systems, as well as 32-bit versions of [other operating systems](#).

Automation

- Now it became possible to set up [playing audio on a camera speaker](#) automatically as a response to a selected event or as a user task.

Security

- [Active Directory pass-through authorization](#) option has been added.

API

- New **archive_events** and **archive_event_types** request types for retrieving archive events have been added to the HTTP API.

Novelties in Version 3.6:

Video Analytics

- The neural networks package used in previous versions has been renamed to **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard**. A new, more effective neural networks package has been developed: **Eocortex Neural Networks Special**. [Any of these packages can be used](#), depending on the capabilities of the hardware.
- Objects detection accuracy has been improved for the **Tracking, Search for Objects, Uniform Detector, Face Mask Detector, Face Recognition (Complete)** modules.
- Now the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** and **License Plate Recognition (Light)** modules have the ability to count the number of vehicles and their persistence in the parking area.
- Support for 32-bit versions of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** and **License Plate Recognition (Light)** modules has been discontinued.
- Now only one of the License Plate Recognition modules can be installed on the same server: either **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** or **License Plate Recognition (Light)**.

Eocortex Client

- Now in the **Eocortex Client** application, any camera can be viewed separately using the **Overview monitor** feature.
- Now in the **Eocortex Client** application, for each monitor the [Start view](#) can be set.
- Now in the **Eocortex Client** application, [positioning on plans](#) can be performed with left mouse button.
- Now the Events log of the **Eocortex Client** application displays [authorization events](#) of web clients and mobile applications.
- The **Eocortex Client** application now has the ability to [display time for cameras](#) either in the time zone of the client computer or in the time zone of the cameras themselves.
- The possibility of [frame-by-frame playback](#) has been added to the **Simultaneous archive viewing mode**.

Eocortex Configurator

- Now in the system settings, [a group of cameras based on the selected one](#) can be created.
- The **Eocortex Configurator** application now has a search feature for camera brand and model in the related drop-down menus, as well as for servers on the **Cameras** and **Servers** tabs.

Server applications

- The ability to keep selected important archive fragments without time limit has been added with the [Episode archive](#) feature.

Integration

- [Integration with ZKBioSecurity access control system](#) has been implemented.
- [Integration with POS terminals](#) has been improved. The ability to [receive and display Receipt total amount](#) has been implemented. In addition, the **Received a check from a POS-terminal** event type has been added.

API

- The query to launch automatic views switching in the **Eocortex Client** application has been added to the HTTP API.

Novelties in Version 3.5:

Video Analytics

- The **Hard Hat detector** module has been renamed to the **Uniform Detector** module. Now can to detect of people not wearing uniform. [Depending on the settings](#), to can determine: the color of the uniform, the absence of vests, the absence of hard hats. It is also possible to [add zones and lines](#) for which alarms will be generated.
- The **Tracking** module has been improved: added the ability [to filter alarm events](#) by object categories, as well as by certain types of transport. In addition, in the **Eocortex Client** application can to enable the [display of object frames](#) depending on the object category.
- The [face database](#) **Eocortex** now has the ability to sort records.
- Now for the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module, the search for faces [in the database](#) by photo is available.
- Now group operations are available [in the faces database](#) intended for the simultaneous work with several records.
- Now the [Face Recognition report](#) can be saved in PDF format.
- Added the **Report regarding groups of face database**.
- Now can to enable the display of face frames in the **Eocortex Client** application.
- Now the **Tracking, Search for Objects** and **Uniform Detector** modules running on the same camera share the processor and video card resources.
- Now in the **Eocortex Web-client** for the **Face Recognition** and **People Counting** modules [the liveview video analytics](#) is available.
- Now the **Fire and Smoke Detector** module uses a neural network. This has improved the detection.

Eocortex Client

- The **Eocortex Client** application now has a [archive fragments playback](#) mode.
- Added a [cell pinning](#) on the alarm monitor grid.

Server applications

- Now can to receive [up to four video streams](#) from cameras.
- Now all **Eocortex** functionality for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** license types, including **Eocortex System Monitoring**, is available on Linux.

Mobile applications

- Now, for mobile applications, it is possible to view the placement of cameras on online maps.
- Now mobile assistant Eva can play the archive at the requested point in time.

Eocortex Union

- The **Eocortex Union** has been created, provides convenient access from the same point to several **Eocortex** video surveillance systems at the same time. The **Eocortex Union** includes client applications, configuration and system state monitoring tools.

Integration

- Integration with POS terminals has been implemented. Now **Eocortex** video surveillance systems can receive information about cash transactions from POS terminals in real time, display this information on the screen, store it in an archive and use it in automation scripts.
- Implemented integration **Biostar 2** security platform by **Suprema**. Now **Eocortex** video surveillance systems can receive events from **Biostar 2** in real time, store them in the archive and use them in automation scenarios.

Novelties in Version 3.4:

Video Analytics

- The support of the inherited **Face Recognition (Basic)** module has been discontinued.
- The **Interactive Search** module has been renamed to **Search for Objects**. Now it is possible to Search for Objects by the following categories: people, vehicles, weapons, bags, animals; the search for separate types of vehicles is also available. The search speed has been increased, and it is now possible to launch the module on a video analytics server.
- The **Face Recognition (Complete)** module has been enhanced: the accuracy of Face Detection and recognition has been improved; [the recognition of turned and masked faces](#) has been added; the events that allow to set [scenarios](#) based on the presence or absence of a mask on the face and on the face turned away from the camera have been added; now, when adding new faces to [the database](#), it has become possible to learn that there are duplicates present; it is now possible to add persons who do not meet the requirements for samples of persons to [the database](#). At the first launch of the improved module, the face database will be automatically updated; it will take some time.
- Testing of **Eocortex** video analysis modules [has become even easier](#).
- In the **People Counting** module, it is now possible to set [individual counter reset parameters](#) for each camera.
- [New settings](#) for each Sabotage Detector have been added to the **Sabotage Detector**; the number of false triggering events has been reduced the sensitivity of several detectors has been increased.
- It is now possible to set [individual face and license plate databases](#) for different cameras.
- A black body calibrator setting for the **Temperature for recognized faces** video analytics built into a thermal camera has been added.

Server applications

- It is now possible to indicate [two addresses](#) for a server in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.
- Now, it is possible to [generate RTSP links](#) directly in the **Eocortex Configurator** application in order to connect to the **Eocortex** server via RTSP.
- It is now possible to receive H.265 video streams via ONVIF.
- Several improvements have been introduced to the ONVIF server: the **HTTP Digest** authorization (in addition to the existing **WS UsernameToken**); in response to a query for video and audio configuration, the information regarding the unavailability of Multicast has been added; responses to certain queries have been adjusted to comply with the applicable standard.
- A number of improvements have been made to the RTSP server: now an unknown command does not stop the video broadcasting, and the software with the ability to switch between TCP and UDP can correctly switch from UDP to TCP by default, without specifying the protocol in the settings.
- It is now possible to distribute the [reencoding of video streams for mobile applications](#) among various servers.

Security

- It is now possible to sign saved frames and video clips to be exported with an [electronic signature](#).

- In **Eocortex** it is now possible to [limit the number of connections](#) to the video surveillance system under the same account.

Eocortex Client

- It is now possible to [connect](#) to the **Eocortex** server, to the **Eocortex** server via P2P, and to **Eocortex Cloud** using the **Eocortex Client** application.
- Now can be configure on the alarm monitor [to open the video with a delay](#) to see the situation at the time of the alarm.
- The consumption of hardware resources when operating in full screen mode has been reduced in the **Eocortex Client** application.
- 9 new grids have been added (2 of them with vertical alignment).

Integration

- The queries allowing to enable, disable and set up the **Face Recognition (Complete), Unique Visitor Counting, License Plate Recognition (Complete), Counting People in Queue, People Counting** video analysis modules have been added to REST API.
- Now, all the main license plate database interaction operations are available in REST API: obtaining, adding, editing and deleting data regarding vehicles and groups.
- The **Face recognized** and the **Large number of people in the queue** events, as well as the conditions for actions at occurrence of these events have been added to REST API.
- In HTTP API, the information regarding the coordinates of the detected objects has been added for those events that include frames of the objects. Also, in the Face Detection and recognition events, a field with the trajectory identifier has been added. In addition, a binary time field has been added to the above events.
- The **Send Push notifications to mobile devices** action has been added to REST API.

Deployment

- The size of the distribution kit has been significantly reduced by excluding PDF documentation from the installation packages. Now, in case there is no internet connection on the application deployment site, it is required to download the PDF documentation from the site in advance.
- The option of [silent install under Linux](#) has been added.

Novelties in Version 3.3:

- To facilitate setup of the systems with **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses, the possibility to [set up user rights immediately upon creating a view](#) has been introduced.
- The [integration with Paxton Net2 systems](#) has been performed.
- The [synchronization of face database with external systems](#), allowing to upload data from the files located in a folder on the disc to the Eocortex face database has been implemented.
- The volume of data transmitted thru the network by the **Eocortex System Monitoring** subsystem has been reduced.
- The possibility to [reduce the frequency of data exchange between the primary and secondary servers of the system](#) has been added.
- The following new [access rights](#) have been added: Access to maps, Camera cell control, Access to face and license plate databases, Accept alarms without obligatory comments, Blurring disabled.
- The following archive export capabilities have been added: Adding a Watermark, Encrypting the Archive Using a Password.
- The [Frame Area Blurring module](#) intended for blurring the specified areas of a real-time video has been introduced.

- The time of operation of the server without the floating license key has been increased in order to reduce the risks of video surveillance system failure in case of network issues.
- Obtaining video encoded with H.265 (w/o B frames) [using direct queries to the server via RTSP](#) has been implemented.
- Now, the separate events and archive bookmarks are displayed on the timeline when viewing the archive of several cameras simultaneously.
- The [constant camera redundancy](#) is now available.
- The following improvements have been introduced to the Face Recognition modules: delays and discrepancies when displaying the recognized faces have been remedied, the requirements imposed on the images of the faces to be added to the database have been relaxed.
- The NVIDIA GeForce RTX™ 30 video cards based on the Ampere architecture are now supported by the modules that use neural networks.
- The **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module has been updated: new license plate templates have been added for some countries; new settings and recognition methods have been added; now the module can be used on a Linux based server.
- The **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module has been updated: the recognition of license plates of five more countries has been added; new license plate templates for several countries have been added.
- The **Counting People in Queue** module has been improved: the counting accuracy has been increased; the consumption of resources when using the GPU has been reduced.
- The view selection menu of the **Eocortex Client** application has been modified.
- Now, the [Face Recognition \(Complete\)](#) and [Unique Visitor Counting](#) modules can recognize emotions.
- The [video analytics built in the cameras](#) is now supported.
- Now, a server can be assigned as a video analytics server.

Novelties in Version 3.2:

- Now it is possible to use most video analysis modules and Sentinel (HASP) license protection on Linux-based servers.
- A capability of setting counting zones and, subsequently, determining the number of people in the zones in real time has been added to the **People Counting** module.
- **Tracking** video analysis module has been upgraded.
- **Search for Objects** video analysis module has been upgraded.
- [A capability of sending temperature data registered by a thermal camera to the Face Recognition module](#) has been added.
- In the **Eocortex Configurator** application, the **Video analytics** page with the summarized info regarding the use of the video analysis modules in the system has been added. Also, the settings of the automated reports for some of the video analysis modules have been moved to this page.
- Now it is possible [to place cameras, sensors, and relays on the geographical online maps](#) provided by **Google Maps** and **OpenStreetMap**.
- [Decoding of B-frames](#) encoded in H.264 and H.265 is provided.
- Now, [the switching of channels to a backup server](#) is ensured not only when there is no access to the main server but also when all the archive drives of the main server fail.
- [The intervals of prerecording and additional recording](#) available for setting up have been increased to 10 seconds.
- Now, moving a camera to another server is done without losing the archive.

- The capability of [P2P connection using the Eocortex Client application to the Eocortex server](#) has been added.
- Smart assistant that allows to interact with the application using voice and text commands has been added to the Android app.
- Face Recognition technologies used in the **Face Recognition (Light)** module have successfully passed FRVT conducted by NIST. The test results are available here: <https://pages.nist.gov/frvt/html/frvt11.html>.

Novelties in Version 3.1:

- [Server and Client views](#) have replaced screen grids in the Client Application.
- [Floating licensing](#) is now available in **Eocortex**.
- **Eocortex Web-client** is now fully in HTML5 (in the previous version, Adobe Flash Player was used in the full screen mode).
- [Replication of the remote database](#) allowing to perform recognition even in the temporary absence of a connection with the remote face and license plate databases has been implemented for the Face Recognition and License Plate Recognition modules.
- The trial version ordering tool has been incorporated into the setup interface of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module. The trial version allows to test the module during 60 days.
- Now, the ONVIF server of **Eocortex** can use not only **Base Notification** but also **Pull-Point Notification** for transferring events.
- **Enterprise** license added.
- Now, the server and client software for all types of licenses is [installed from a single distribution kit](#).
- The [Work time logging \(Complete\) report](#) has been developed for the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module.
- The **Sabotage Detector** module's operation has been improved.
- It is now possible to connect RTSP devices using the following type of a connection string: **rtsp://login:password@address**.

Novelties in Version 3.0:

- [Server application for Linux](#).
- Possibility to [execute tasks on commands of the users of client applications](#).
- Possibility to [send HTTP requests](#) to external web applications and to devices with web control.
- When sending a message created on the basis of the **Face recognized** event [to the messengers](#), the image of a face from the archive at the moment of recognition and the reference image from the database will be attached to the message.
- Now the [Face Recognition \(Complete\)](#) and the [Unique Visitor Counting](#) video analysis modules use all the video cards installed on the server.

Novelties in Version 2.8:

- New video analysis module added: [Face Recognition \(Complete\)](#).
- New video analysis module added: [Unique Visitor Counting](#).
- New video analysis module added: [Face Recognition \(Light\)](#).
- Video analysis module removed: **Face Recognition module (Expert)**.

- In the [License Plate Recognition \(Light\)](#) video analysis module, the list of countries whose license plate numbers are supported has been extended, as well as new patterns of license plates for several supported countries have been added.
- To ensure the protection of data being transmitted between cameras and the **Eocortex** server and between the server and the **Eocortex Client** and **Eocortex Configurator** applications, the capability of using [SSL/TLS security certificates](#) has been added.
- [The integration with the Honeywell's Pro-Watch® comprehensive security platform](#) has been implemented. Due to this integration, it is now possible to receive and display **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** events and set up various responses to them.

Features

Analytics

Usage of neural networks

Part of the **Eocortex** video analysis modules uses neural networks.

Neural networks are presented as an additional installation package.

Starting from version 3.6 of **Eocortex**, two different packages can be used:

- The **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package
- The **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package



Eocortex Neural Networks Standard and **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** packages support simultaneous use of multiple video cards for analyzing video streams. However, correct work of the analytics is possible only when using video cards that are identical to each other by their technical properties.

Video analytics server

Video analytics server is a server exclusively dedicated to launching video analysis modules that process video data sent from other servers. Having said that, the video analytics server does not perform archiving of the video data being analyzed nor its broadcasting to client workplaces; these actions are performed on the general servers of a video surveillance system. Thus, the Video analytics server allows to remove the load associated with video analysis from the rest of the servers.

Details

The Video analytics server supports all the video analysis modules apart from the following:

- Loud Sound Detection
- FishEye Dewarping

If the Video Analytics Server is operating under Linux, it will also be affected by the corresponding restrictions on the video analytics modules.

To assign a server as a video analytics server, it is required to install a special license on it. At that, other licensing capabilities will become unavailable on this server.

Consequently, if the server was used as a video surveillance server before, it is required to transfer all of its cameras to another video surveillance server before using it as a video analytics server.

The server can be assigned as a Video Analytics server for a camera in the [camera connection settings](#) of the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Features and limitations

The Video analytics server must be of the same version as the video surveillance servers whose video it processes.

A single video surveillance server may have connections with several video analytics servers, and a single video analytics server can process video streams from several video surveillance servers.

If a video analytics server has been assigned for a camera, a motion detection will also be performed on the video analytics server; all the features that use the results of the operation of the motion detector, however, will continue running on the main server.

If a video analytics server has been assigned for a camera, all the video analytics enabled on the camera, with the exception of the unsupported modules, will be processed on the video analytics server.

The video analytics server does not perform recording of the archive, events or any other data related to video processing, apart from the logs that monitor operability. All the events and the archive are recorded on the main server.

To ensure proper operation of the license plate recognition modules and the modules that use neural networks, the corresponding components are required to be installed on the video analytics server. However, it is not necessary to install such components on the video surveillance server.

For the license plate recognition module to work, it is required to install the corresponding license protection key on the video analytics server.

The video analytics server cannot be set as main, backup or replication server for the cameras.

The video analytics server cannot operate under Windows 7 operating system.

The main server cannot use a video analytics server if it runs under Windows 7.

It is not recommended to use the video analytics server as a main server in a multiserver system since it may lead to malfunctions of such system due to the fact that the video analytics server is under high load of the video analysis modules.

The operation of the archive on the main server when recording by the signal of a motion detector running on the video analytics server is described below.

- When recording to the archive by the signal of a motion detector, the results of data processing on the video analytics server will be used.
- In case the connection with the video analytics server is lost, the continuous recording to the archive will be enabled. The recording to the archive will stop as soon as the connection with the video analytics server is restored.
- The continuous recording to the archive will also start if the video analytics server has not sent any events of movement or lack thereof in the course of 30 seconds.

If the connection with the video analytics server is lost, the video from the camera will not be analyzed. The software motion detection will not work either.

Testing of video analysis modules

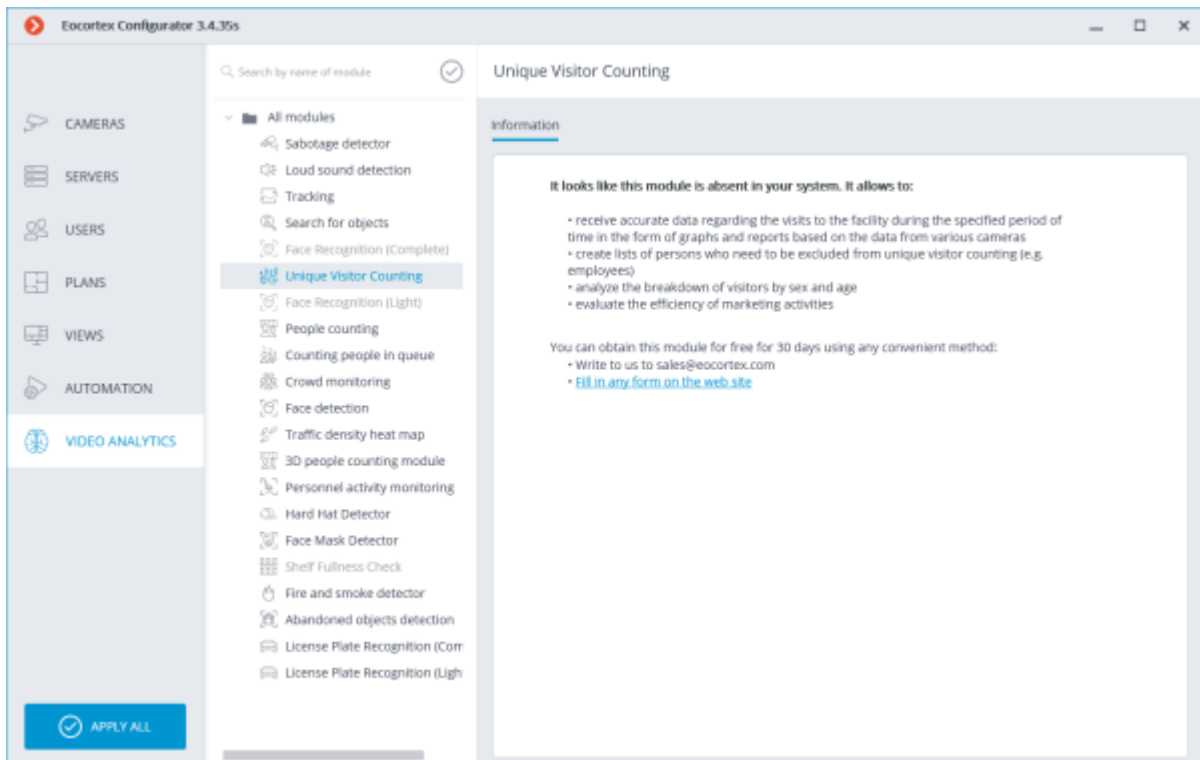
Eocortex provides a simple way of obtaining trial licenses for any video analysis modules used in the current version of the software.

To obtain a trial license, please do the following:

Step 1: Launch the [_Eocortex Configurator](#) application.

Step 2: Open the  [Video analytics](#) page.

Step 3: Select the module highlighted grey (this color is used to mark the modules that are not used in the system).



Step 4: Call the number indicated on the **Information** tab or follow the link and fill in any form.
The **Automatic reports** tab is not available for the trial modules.

Trial license for the License Plate Recognition (Complete) module

The trial license ordering tool that allows trying out the module to the full extent is embedded into the configuration interface of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module's settings in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.



This tool permits to order one of the following **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** licenses that allow to perform recognition of the license plates during 60 days on 4 cameras assigned to the server:

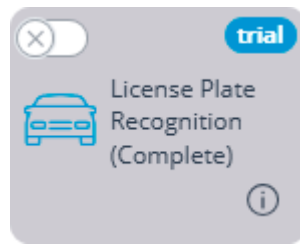
- Type of license: **Highway (25 fps)**
- Type of license: **Parking (6 fps)**

These temporary licenses will not work on virtual machines.

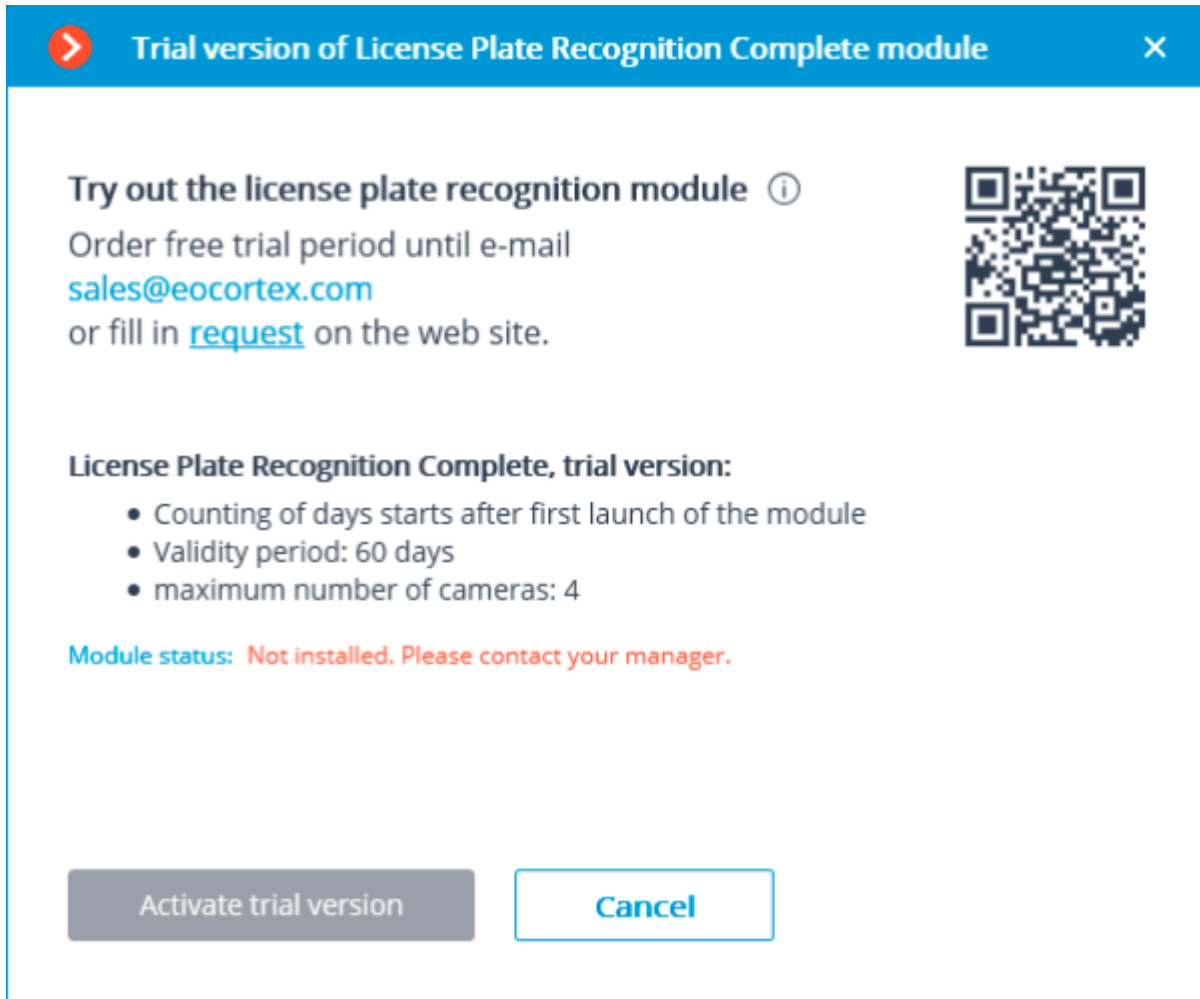
Requesting and installing a temporary license

Before ordering and using a temporary license, it is required to [install the License Plate Recognition \(Complete\) module](#) on your server.

To order a trial license, launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the  **Cameras** tab, then select a camera in the list on the left side of the page, switch to the **Analytics** tab and press the  button located in the upper right corner of the module's card.



The trial license ordering and Tracking window will open.



You need to request the issuance of a trial license, using one of the following ways:

Contact your personal manager at **Eocortex**;

Call the telephone number shown in the window;

Fill in the form made available in the link shown in the window (by clicking the word **request**);

Scan the QR code shown in the window and complete the form on the web site using your mobile device (the QR code leads to the license request form).

Upon receiving a notification from the manager of **Eocortex** that the update of the **Eocortex** server license has been completed (i.e. when the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** trial license has been added to the server license), it is required to update the license on the server. To do that, it is required to click on the **Update license** link in the trial license ordering and Tracking window. The **License installation** wizard will open. In this window, you will be offered to perform an automatic update of the license on your server. Depending on the existing license, you will be offered to automatically update your software or USB key (see [License update](#)).

As soon as the **Eocortex** license on the server is updated and the server is restarted, it will be possible to activate the trial license of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module. To

perform the activation, it is required to click on the **Activate trial version** button in the trial license ordering and Tracking window.

To activate, it is necessary to specify the type of the module for which the license will be activated: **Parking** or **Highway**. After that, press **Select**.

As soon as the trial license is successfully activated, the trial license ordering and Tracking window will show the license data.

Instead of the **trial** button, the number of days left before the end of the trial period will be displayed.

End of the temporary license validity period

Starting from the ninth day before the end of the trial license validity period, every time the client application is launched, the notification regarding the upcoming stop of the module's operation will appear.

Additionally, the day counter in the **Eocortex Configurator** application will change its color to attract the attention of the system administrator.

When the trial license validity period ends, the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module will stop functioning, and the notification regarding the absence of a license key required for starting the module will appear in the client application. However, the **Eocortex** license for using the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module will be retained, and it will be possible to use it in the future provided that the permanent license for the module is purchased.

Also, the **trial** button will disappear from the module's card upon expiration of the trial version validity period.

Errors during activation and use of the trial license

Below is the list of errors displayed in the **Module status:** line of the trial license ordering and Tracking window.

It is required to request and update the license of your server. Please contact your manager. This status is displayed in case of an absence of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module license on the server.

Not installed. Please download the module from the web site and install it. This status appears when there is no **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module installed on the server.

No connection with server. Please wait until the server restarts. This status is shown in the process of restarting the server after updating the **Eocortex** license.

Error when receiving info from server. The appearance of this status is unlikely. For example, it can appear if the server was rolled back from version 3.1 to an earlier version, while the trial license ordering and Tracking window was still open.

Frequently asked questions

Q: I installed version 3.1, but the **trial** button never appeared.

A: There are several possible causes of the **trial** button not appearing:

Server version is earlier than 3.1;

Camera is bound to a different server;

Eocortex Configurator has no direct access to the server to which the camera is attached;

The trial license has already been used on the given server;

A permanent license is already installed on the given server.

Q: What will happen if another temporary license for the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module is installed in **Eocortex Configurator**?

A: Such license will be displayed as well as the trial license. I.e., a day counter will be displayed in **Eocortex Configurator**, and 9 days before the license expiration date a corresponding notification will appear in the client application.

At the same time, if in the earlier version of **Eocortex** a trial license has already been activated on this server, it will not be possible to activate a new trial license.

Q: Is it possible to activate a separate trial license on each server of a multi-server system, or it is only allowed to activate a trial license on one of the servers of such system?

A: It is possible to activate a trial license on each server of a multi-server system.

Q: The following error message appears when attempting to activate a trial license: **Failure to activate trial license. Possible cause: installation on virtual machine.** What to do in this case?

A: Probably, an old version of the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module is installed on the server. It is required to install version 3.1 or later of the module.

Different databases of faces and license plates for different cameras

Eocortex permits to create a database of faces or license plates for a specific camera or a group of cameras. It allows to add cameras of different users to the system and to work with various databases.

The support of several databases is available for the following modules:

- **Face Recognition (Complete).**
- **License Plate Recognition (Complete).**

The setup of different databases for different cameras is available only via **REST API**.

Setup


It is required to specify the same unique identifier of a database to use the same unique database on several cameras.

The identifier of the database is the DbId string that can only be set via REST API.

To perform the setup, it is required to do the following:

Step 1: Enable the module on the camera in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Step 2: Send a request with the same value of the **DbId** parameter to modify the settings of the corresponding recognition module via REST API for all cameras on which it is required to use the same unique database.

Step 3: In the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the  **Users** tab and press the **Users of Eocortex applications** button, then set up the rights in such a way as to grant each user the access only to those cameras that have the same database identifier.

When editing a database from the **Eocortex Client** application, it is imperative that all the cameras of the connected client have the same database; otherwise, one of the databases will be selected randomly.

Limitations and unique features

The **Database identifier** field has been added to the settings of each module to enable the user to set a unique database.

To use this feature, it is required to specify the **Database identifier** via REST API.

The blank value of the identifier is indicative of the fact that all the cameras are interacting with the same database.

The quantity of the unique databases is not limited.

The number of cameras that can be connected to the selected database is not limited.

Filename creation rules

For the face database: <DatabaseID_>FRDATABASECOMPLETE.FDB.

E.g.:

FRDATABASECOMPLETE.FDB: common face database Complete.

USER12713_FRDATABASECOMPLETE.FDB: unique face database Complete.

For license plate databases: <DatabaseID_>PRDATABASE.FDB.

E.g.:

PRDATABASE.FDB: common license plate database.

USER12713_PRDATABASE.FDB: unique license plate database.

The similar rules apply for the replicated databases.

The filename (**Database ID**) must be no more than 32 symbols long, contain Latin letters, numbers and the underscore (_). If this rule is not followed, the unique database will not be set.

The **Database ID** is case-insensitive, the same database will be created for **myperfectdb** and **MyPeRfeCtDb**.

Work time logging (Complete) report

Work time logging (Complete) report is formed by areas (zones). An area is a territory where it is required to monitor the presence of persons. The people's faces must be recognized at the entrance to and the exit from the area by the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module. Several cameras may be used for a single area both at the entrance and at the exit.

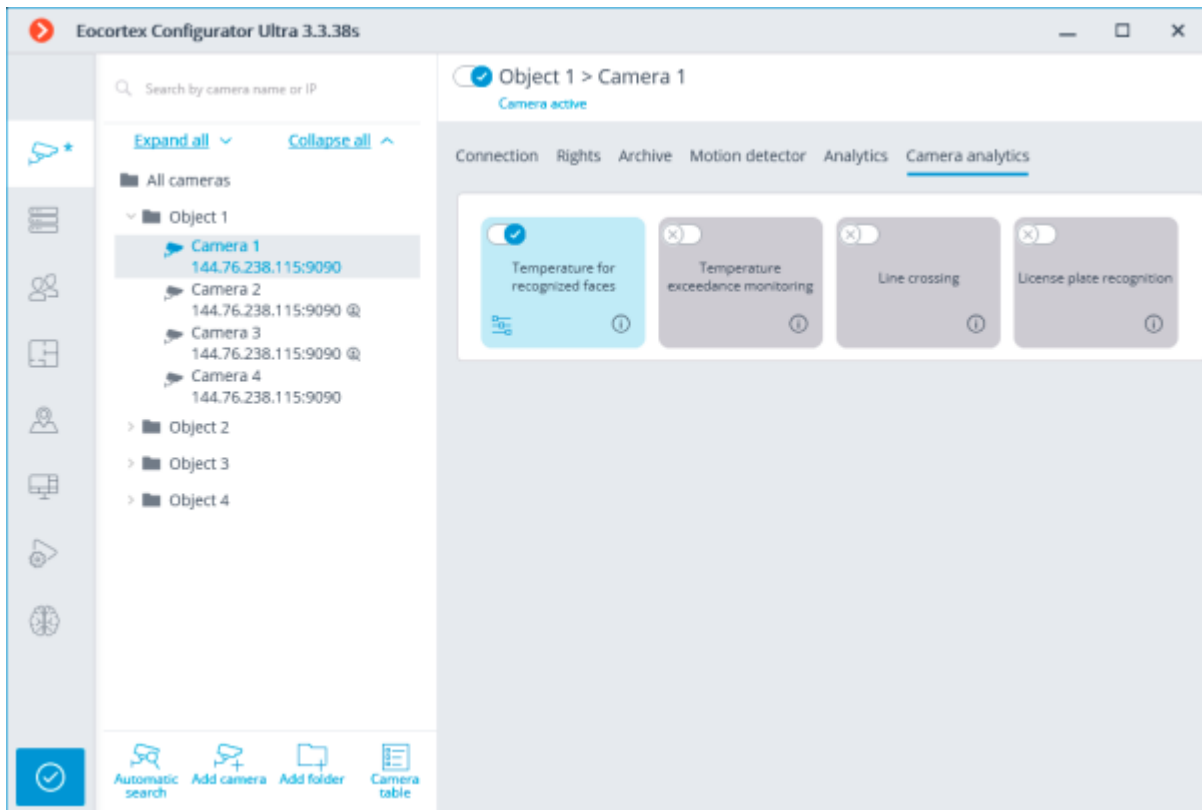

Integration of thermal cameras and Face Recognition

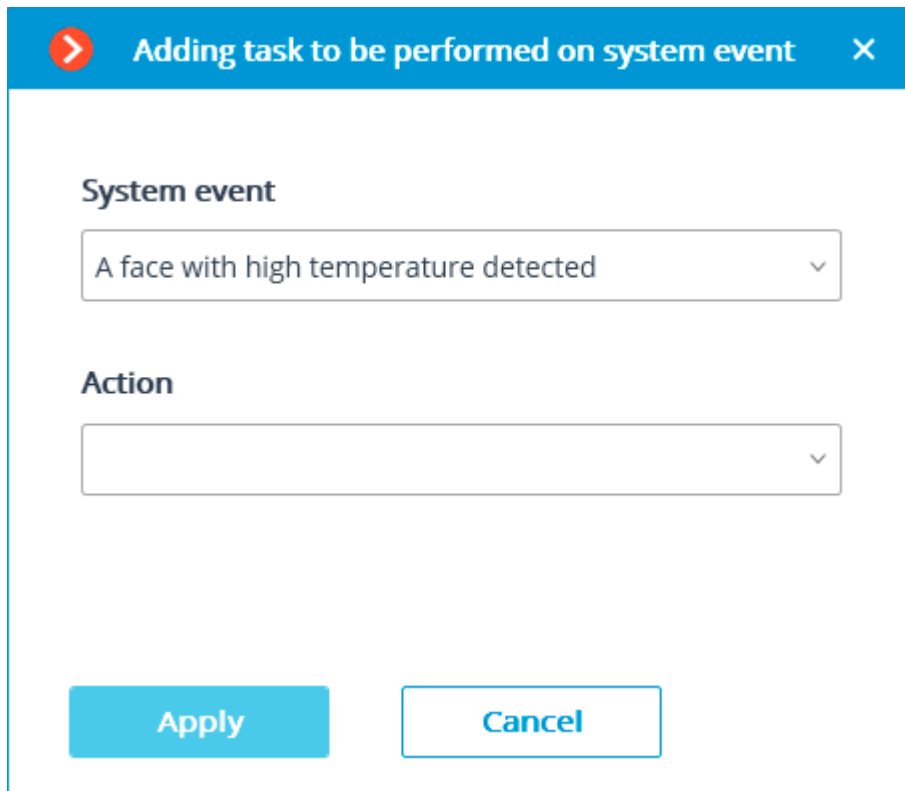
For some camera models that combine the features of a thermal camera and a normal surveillance one, it is possible to send the thermal camera data to the Face Recognition module.

This capability is for a limited number of camera models only and can be used exclusively in the 64-bit Windows version of **Eocortex**.

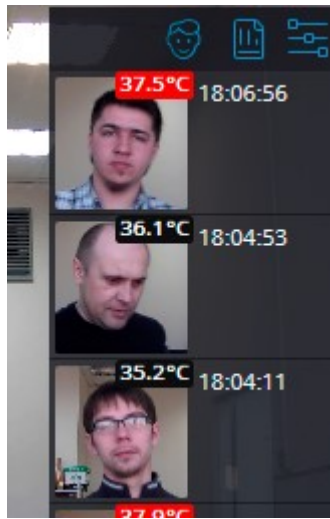
To enable this capability, go to the **Camera analytics** tab in the camera settings of the **Eocortex Configurator** application, activate **Temperature for recognized faces**, open the settings window by pressing  and set the alarm temperature that will generate the alarm events. It is also required to enable and set up any Face Recognition module on the camera.



That done, it will be possible to set up a task upon the event of **Face with high temperature detected**.



In the **Eocortex Client** application, the temperature of the person will be displayed in the real-time video on the Face Recognition panel.



In case a person running a fever is detected, a corresponding event will be registered in the event log. The corresponding frame from the archive will be displayed upon selecting this event; the recognized face will be highlighted by a rectangular frame.

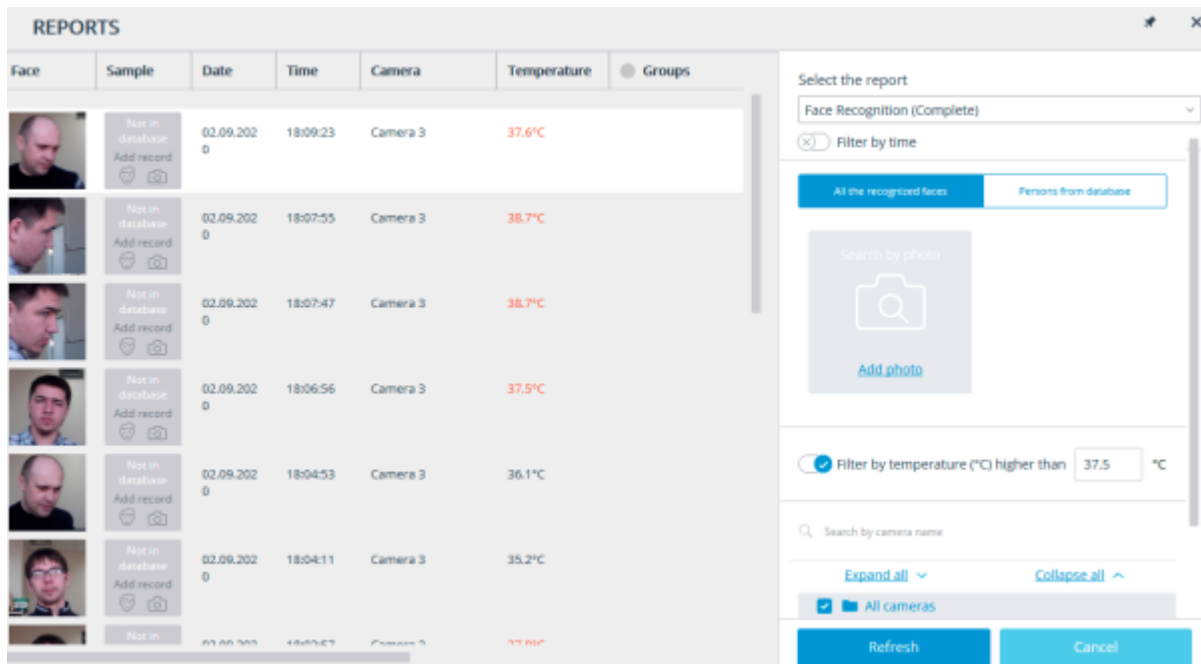

The temperature of the person will be registered in the report regarding the recognized faces. Persons running a fever will be marked by orange rectangular frames, those with normal temperature will be marked by grey frames.

It is also possible to filter the list to display the persons with high temperature.



Replication of remote databases of faces and license plate numbers

For the Face Recognition and license plate recognition modules, the replication of the remote database allowing to perform recognition even in the temporary absence of a connection with the remote databases has been implemented.

The replication works as follows:

When a remote database (hereinafter face or license plate database is meant) is used on the server where the recognition is performed (to which the recognition cameras are bound), a local copy (replica) of the remote database is created. Further, a synchronization of the local copy with the remote database is performed. In the event of losing connection with the remote database, its local copy will be used.

All the modifications made to the database (adding, editing and removing entries) is performed exclusively upon availability of a connection with the remote database. When the connection is lost, the recognition will be performed on the basis of the entries present in the local copy of the database.

The remote database is copied (replicated) to the server in the following cases:

- Immediately after the changes to the database are made by the camera bound to the server or by the client computer connected to the server;
- Immediately after the connection of the server with the remote database is established (in case the connection was lost before that or the server has just been launched);
- Once every minute (if the connection has not been interrupted, and no changes have been made from the computer).

The replication was introduced in Version 3.1. In addition, the structure of the database has changed, as compared with the versions 3.0 and earlier. Due to that fact, in order to work properly with the remote database, it is required to update the version on all the video surveillance system servers, including the one where the remote database is located.

If for some reason it becomes necessary to roll back to Version 3.0 or earlier, it is required to contact [Eocortex technical support team](#).

Eocortex Client

Alarms

In **Eocortex**, the term **Alarm** refers to an event requiring attention.

Description

In the **Eocortex Client** application, an alarm is triggered on a camera only when the **Guard mode** is enabled on that camera.

The **Guard mode** can be enabled from the context menu of the camera cell either manually or automatically, using a schedule. The Guard mode schedule can be set in the [current workplace settings](#).

The alarm on the camera is triggered in the following cases (in such cases, the **Guard mode** on the camera must be enabled):

- From the context menu of the [cell](#);
- When the [on-screen button](#) is pressed (in this case, the alarm will be triggered on cameras specified in the settings of the current workplace);
- When the motion detector is triggered;
- When the **Alarm generation** action is performed (it can be configured in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, in the **Automation** section).

Alarms are [displayed on screen](#) as follows:

- If an alarm is triggered on a camera that is displayed on the screen in real time, the alarm icon in the upper right corner of the camera cell will flash.
- If an alarm is triggered on a camera that is not displayed on the screen, or is reproducing the archived video at the time of the alarm, a large alarm icon will blink in the lower right corner of the screen.

Every alarm must be accepted. To accept the alarm, it is required to click on the cell of the alarm camera. An alarm not accepted within 60 seconds is considered missed.

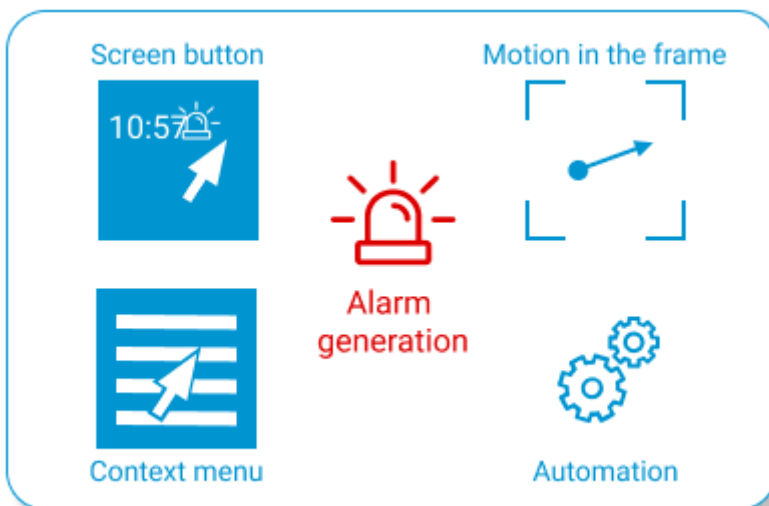
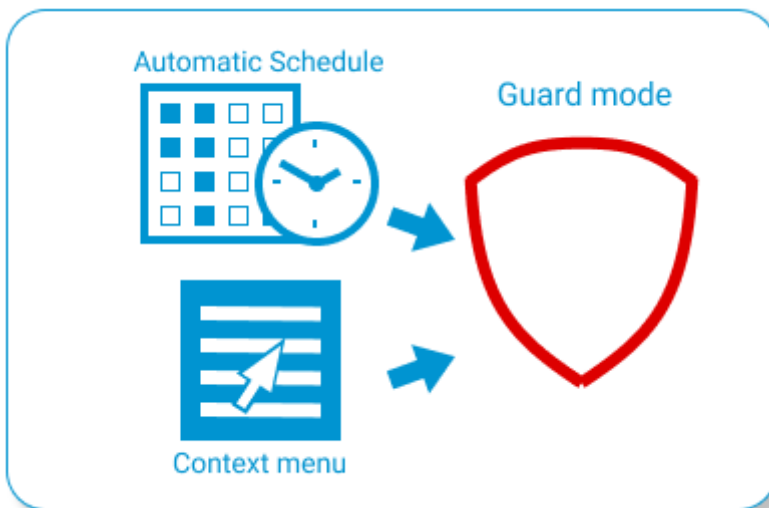
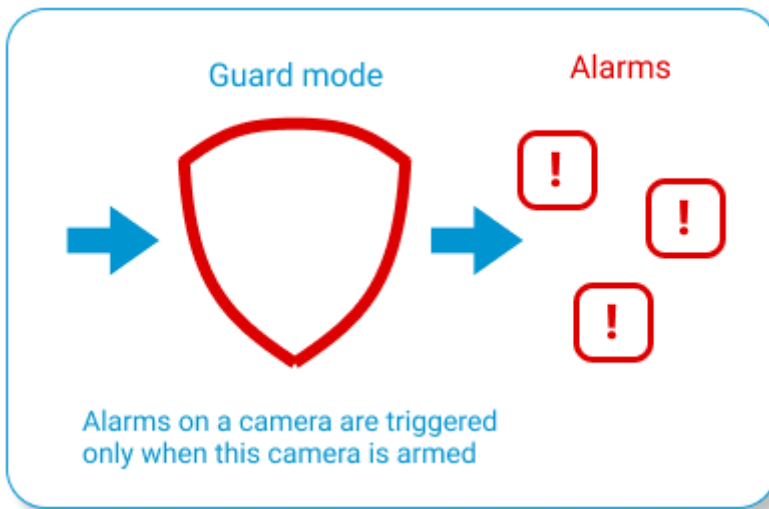
All alarms are stored in the **Event Log**. When viewing the **Event Log**, it is possible to filter alarms by various criteria, including whether they have been accepted or missed. In this case, it is possible to go to the archive from the **Event Log** to see the situation that caused the alarm.

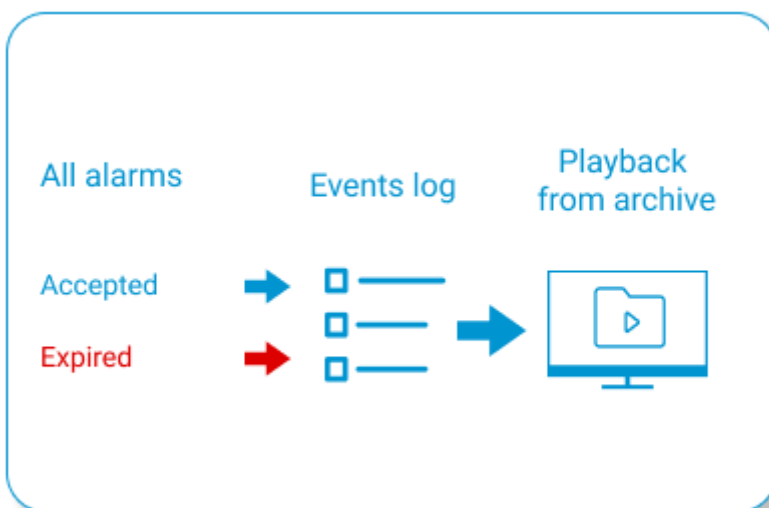
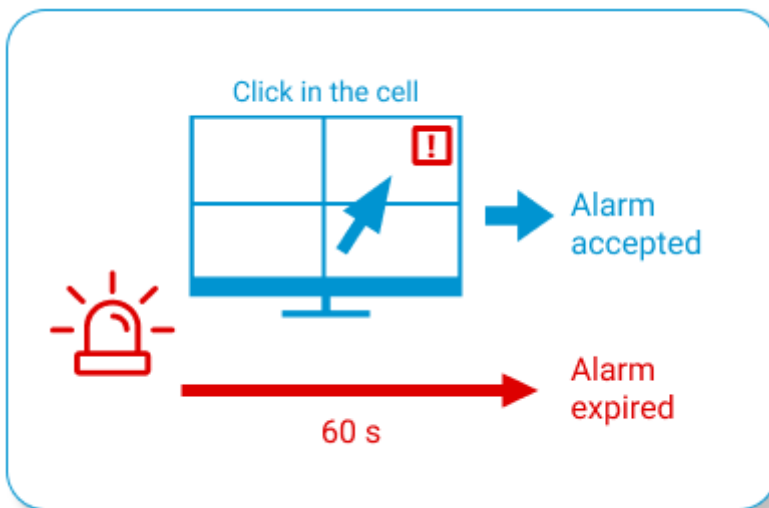
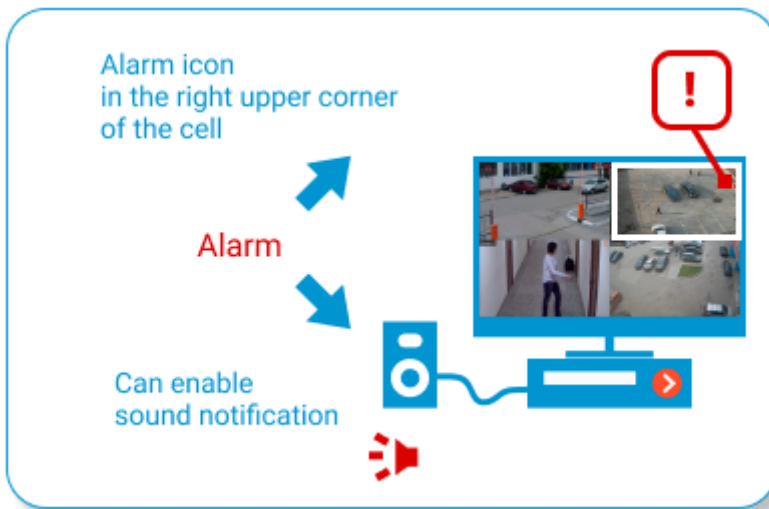
Some of the cells on the screen can be used as alarm cells. In such a case, the cameras that are not on the screen at the time of alarm will be displayed in alarm cells. If all the alarm cells are occupied, the cameras will remain hidden and a large alarm icon will flash in the lower right corner of the screen. A cell is considered free if no cameras are displayed in it, or when a camera with an already received or missed alarm is displayed.

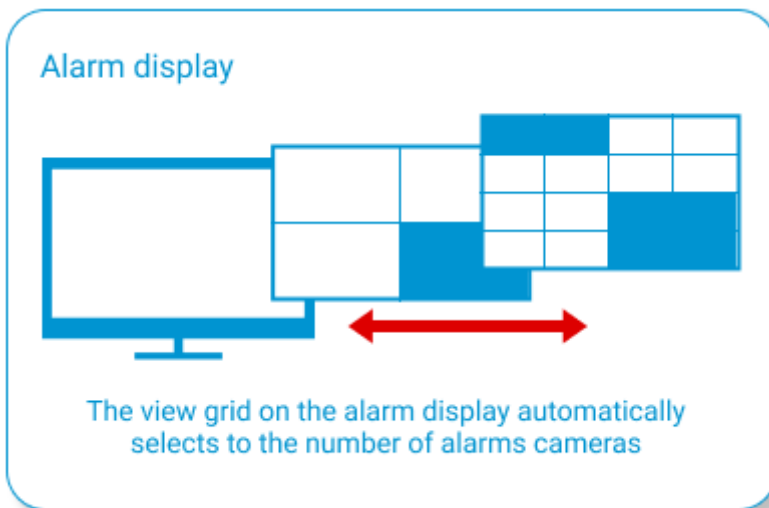
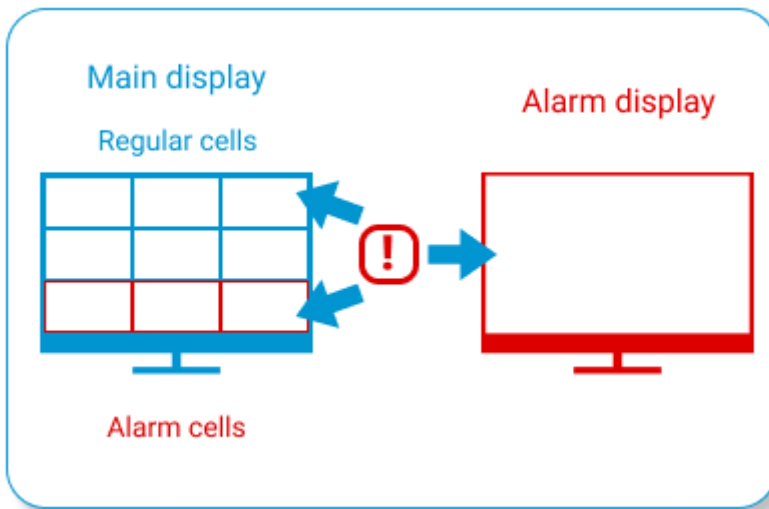
One of the monitors can be used as an alarm monitor. In this case, the cameras that are absent in the normal cells of the main monitors at the time of the alarm will be displayed on the alarm monitor. The screen grid on the alarm monitor is automatically selected so that all the alarm cameras are displayed on the screen. The cells with alarms already received or missed are considered free. Can also [pin a cell to grid](#) on the alarm monitor.

If the workplace has audio playback devices, it is possible to configure audio alerts for alarms.


User tasks

The users of **Eocortex** client applications can start any actions implemented in the video surveillance system, as well as the sequences of such actions, by themselves. To enable that, the user tasks are added to the **Eocortex Configurator** application, following which these tasks can be launched in Android, iOS and Windows client applications.

To prevent an erroneous launch of the tasks, the launch confirmation option has been introduced: the tasks where this option is enabled will only be launched after an additional confirmation by the user.

It is possible to forbid launching user tasks in the user rights settings: all the tasks on all cameras or individual tasks on the specified cameras can be forbidden. By default, all users have permission to launch user tasks.

Launching tasks in the client applications is performed in a similar manner, differing only in details.

If user tasks are set up on a camera, and the user has the rights to execute these tasks, then, in the client application, in the observation mode, during the activation of such camera, the  or  button will be displayed in the cell, depending on the quantity of tasks that can be launched on the camera (one or more).

If only one task is set up on the camera, it will be executed upon pressing the button.

If there are several tasks set up on the camera, a list of those tasks will open upon pressing the button, and the task will be executed only as it is selected in the list.

If the launch confirmation has been set in the configuration of the task, a dialog will open before the launch. In this dialog, it will be possible to confirm or cancel the launch.

After launching the task, the corresponding notification will appear on the screen.

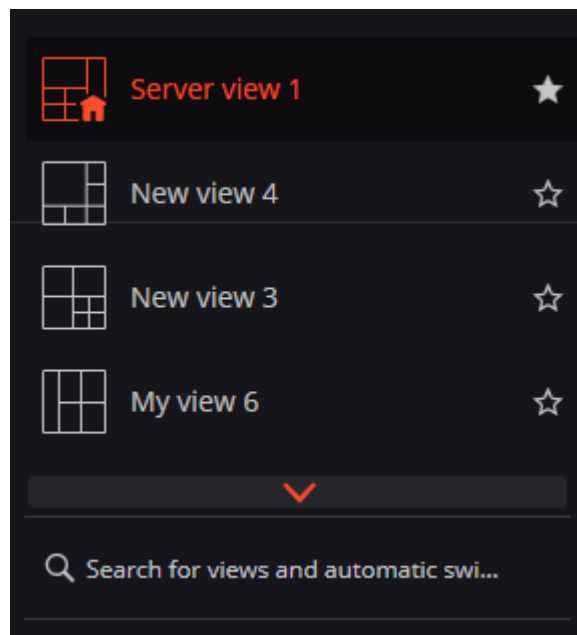
Server and Client views

To display the images from the cameras on the screen in the client applications, **Eocortex** uses **Views** – grids with the images from the cameras shown in the cells. There are two types of views: Server and Client ones.

- **Server View** is a view created by a video surveillance system administrator in **Eocortex Configurator**. The server views are available in the **Eocortex Client** application as well as in the mobile client applications working under Android and iOS. In a multi-server system, the server views are available when connecting to any server of the system via the client application. At that, the server view is added to the client application at the moment of launching it. Thus, if you create or modify a server view, the changes will appear only after the restart of the application.
- **Client View** is a view created by a user in the client application. The client views are available only on a particular device or computer on which they were created, and only for the particular user who created them. Upon the termination of a session of working with the client application, all the client views that contain no cameras are deleted.

The server views that contain no cameras will not be added to the client application when it is launched.

In the client application, a server view can be distinguished from a client view by the presence of an icon in the form of a house in the lower right corner of the schematic representation of this view of the server application.



Until version 3.0 inclusively, it was possible to use server views only for displaying cameras. That said, it was possible to select a screen grid in the client application and place cameras in its cells as required.

Electronic signature

The electronic signature permits to confirm the authenticity of the exported file, as well as its ownership.

The availability of an electronic signature is one of the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

Preparation of electronic signature

The exported files are electronically signed using X509 certificates. Only the certificates that use the RSA asymmetric algorithm are supported.

The signatory's root certificate can be either a self-signed root certificate or a certificate purchased from a certification authority.

The end certificates must be generated on the basis of the signatory's main certificate, one for each user. These certificates must be installed on a computer. Their installation is carried out either by means of the operating system or using specialized software.

The signatory's root certificate must be included in the trusted list of the relying party.

Certificate generation

File signing certificates can be generated using the free **OpenSSL** utility.

It is necessary to select the version of the **OpenSSL v1.1.1s Light** distribution kit that matches the bitness of the operating system used.

The steps below are a sequence of commands that should be executed on the **Command line**.

Step 1. Add the **OpenSSL** folder to the **PATH** environment variable.

For Win64 OpenSSL v1.1.1s Light use:

```
path=%path%C:\Program Files\OpenSSL-Win64\bin\;
```

For Win32 OpenSSL v1.1.1s Light use:

```
path=%path%C:\Program Files\OpenSSL-Win32\bin\;
```

Step 2. Create a directory that will contain the generated certificates. On the command line, navigate to the created directory.

Step 3. Create the root certificate private key file:

```
openssl genrsa -out *rootCertKeyName*.key 2048
```

Step 4. Create the root certificate:

```
openssl req -x509 -new -key *rootCertKeyName*.key -days 10000 -out *rootCertName*.crt
```

The command will prompt for the certificate details.

Step 5. Create the service private key:

```
openssl genrsa -out *serviceCertKeyName*.key 2048
```

Step 6. Create the Certificate Signing Request (CSR):

```
openssl req -new -key *serviceCertKeyName*.key -out *serviceCertRequestName*.csr
```

The command will prompt for the certificate details.

An important point is to fill in information about the **Common Name (e.g. server FQDN or YOUR name)** with the IP address of the service.

Step 7. Create the service certificate by signing the CSR with the root certificate:

```
openssl x509 -req -in *serviceCertRequestName*.csr -CA *rootCertName.crt -CAkey *rootCertKeyName*.key -CAcreateserial -out *serviceCertName*.crt -days 5000
```

Step 8. Export the certificate and private key into a single file:

```
openssl pkcs12 -export -out *serviceCertFileName*.pfx -inkey *serviceCertKeyName*.key -in *serviceCertName*.crt -certfile *rootCertName*.crt
```

Steps 5 - 8 should be repeated for each user who needs to generate a certificate. To do this, you need to replace the ***serviceCertName*** string in the commands with the **username** written in Latin letters without spaces.

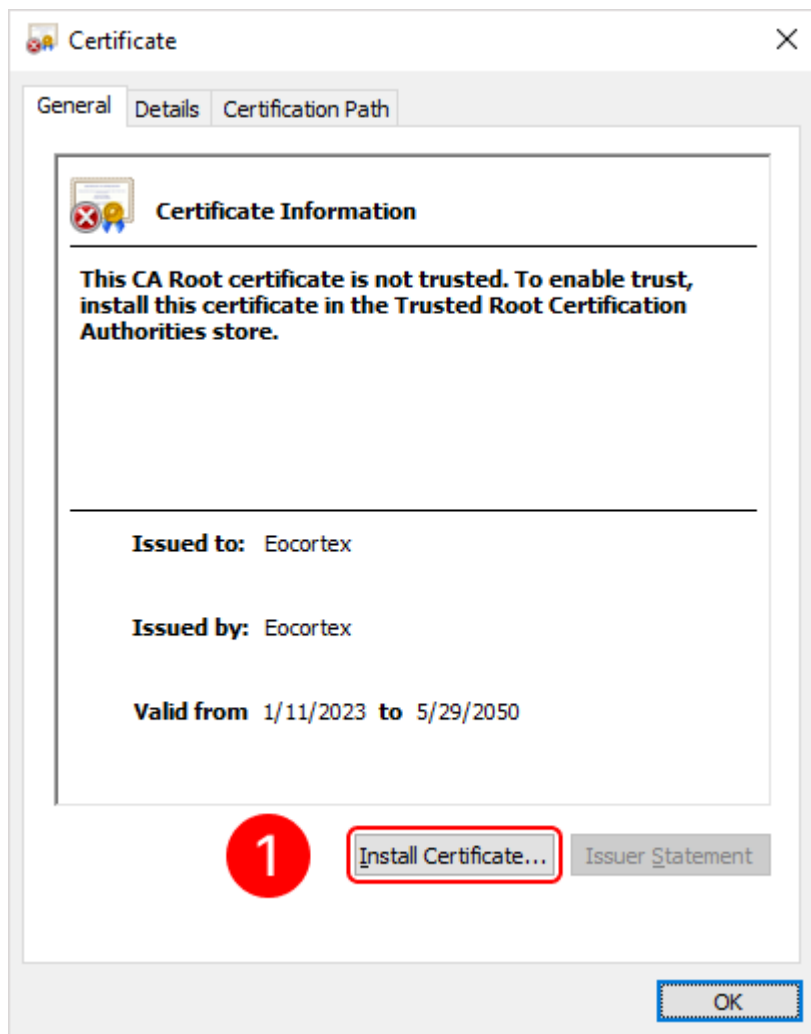

Signing a saved frame

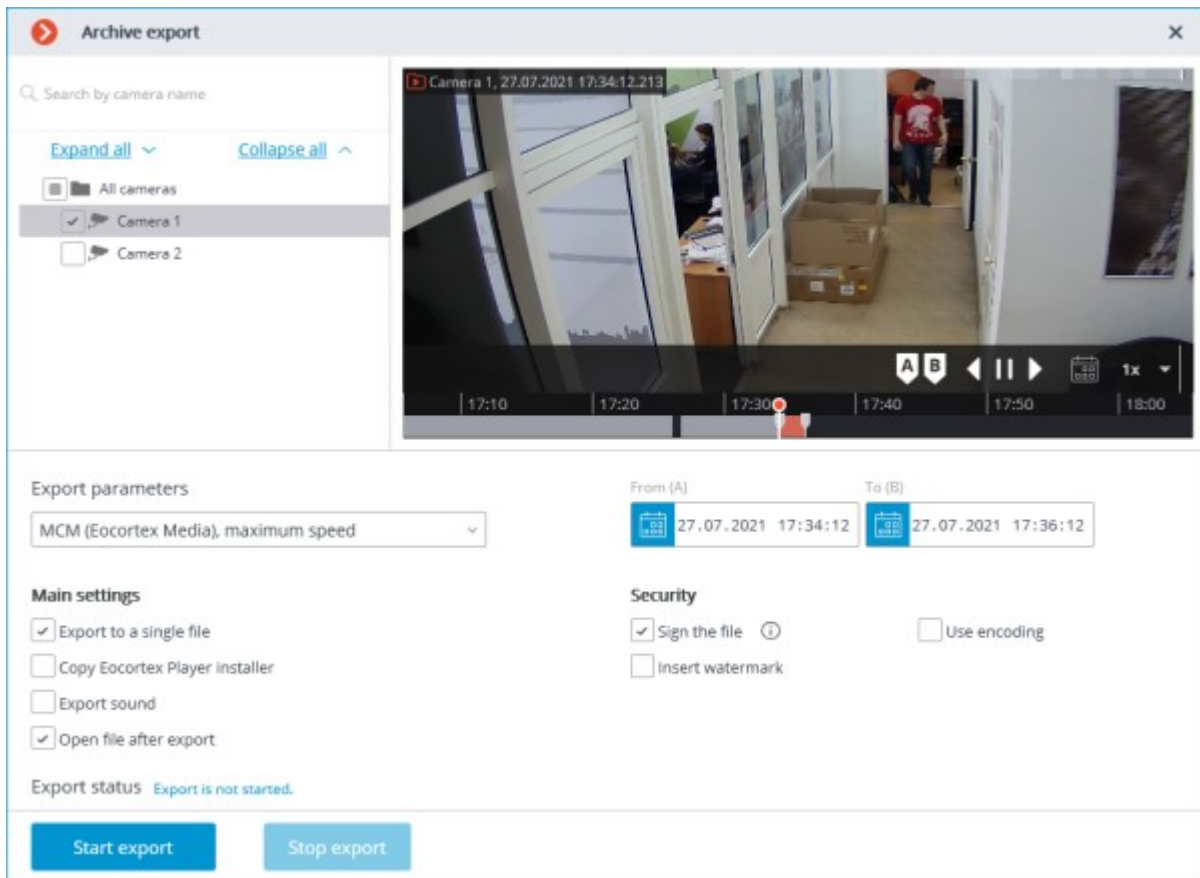


Pressing the **Save** button opens the dialog screen with the option of selecting the storage location for the frame to be saved.

If an electronic signature has not been set, the dialog screen with the option of selecting the storage location for the frame to be saved will open immediately instead of the **Save frame** window.

Signing video clips to be exported

Enable the option **Sign the file** in the [Archive export](#) window in order to sign the archive to be exported.

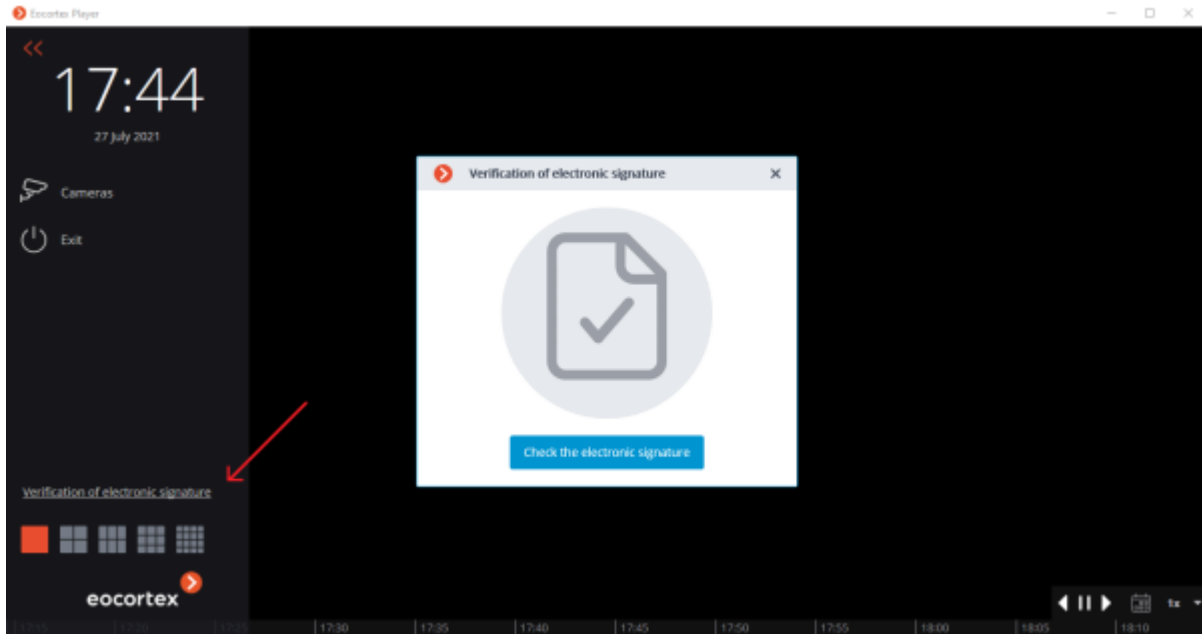


If an electronic signature has not been set, the **Sign the file** item will not be available.

The electronic signature file is saved alongside the exported file. The signature file name consists of the exported file name and the **msig** extension.

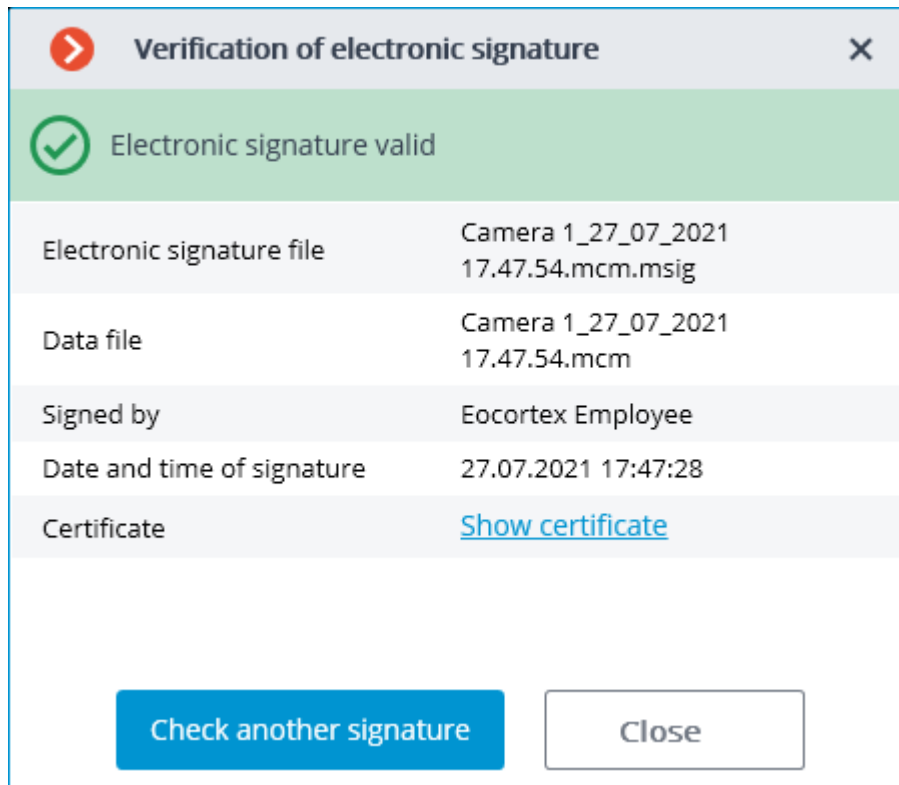
Verification

The **Eocortex Player** application is used to check the signed files. To check the electronic signature of a file, open the file with the msig extension, or open it with the **Check electronic signature** button in the window of the application.

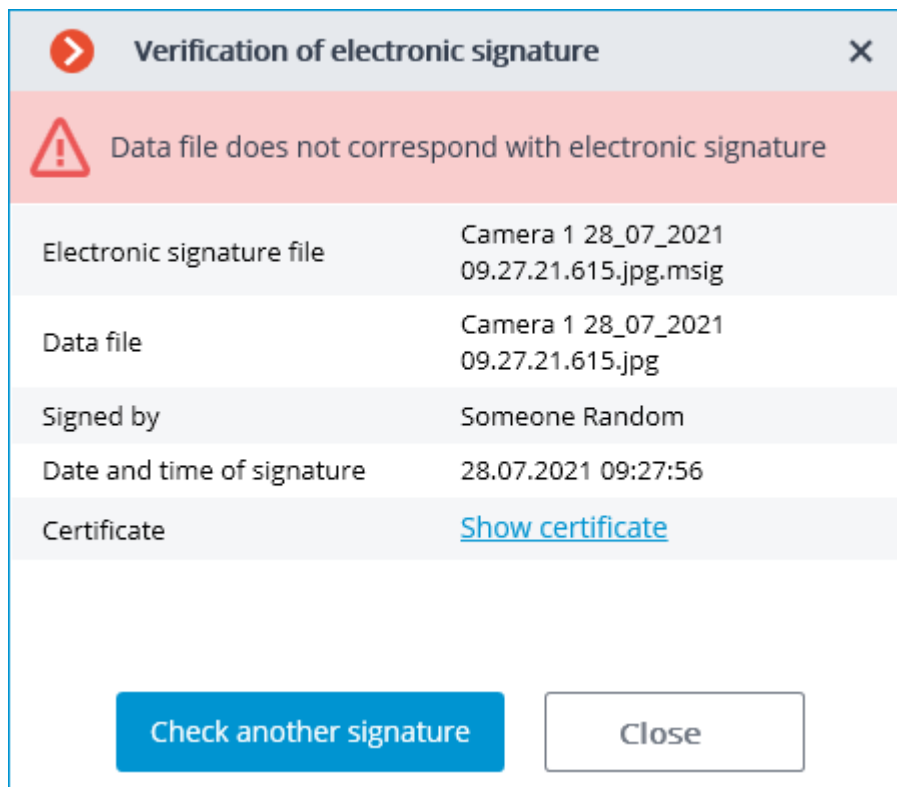


Eocortex Player will try to find and check the exported file automatically. If an error occurs during the process, you will be prompted to select the file manually.

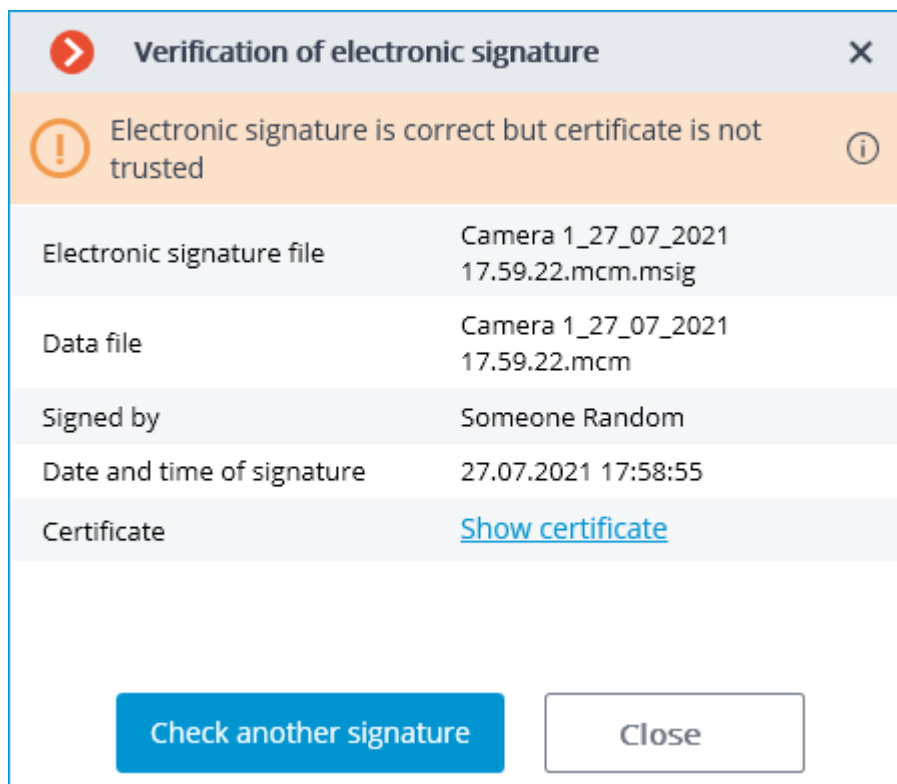
The following window will appear in case of a successful verification:



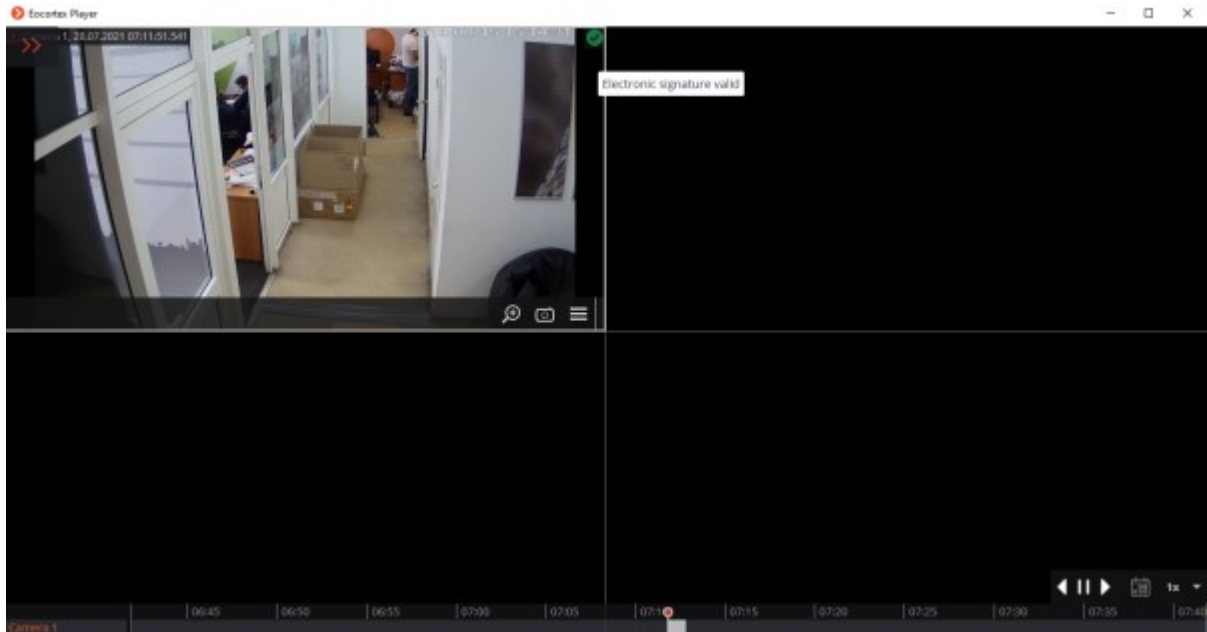
If the file has been modified, the following window will appear:



If the certificate is not a trusted one but the file has not been modified, the following window is displayed:



Additionally, the status of the electronic signature can be viewed in MCM format in the cells of the **Eocortex Player**. To do this, it is required to move the cursor over the status icon. The verification takes place automatically if the corresponding signature file was found.



Click on the status icon to view the details.

Watermark on video

Eocortex has the ability to overlay a watermark on live and archived video. This will help to identify the source of video content leakage occurred when viewing and exporting video, as well as saving and printing a frame in the **Eocortex Client** application. When the watermark is enabled, the information about the user who has downloaded the video or frame will be displayed on the video and frame.

Description

Watermark option allows overlaying the camera image with information about the user who is accessing the camera. The watermark can be applied both when viewing the video in the **Eocortex Client** application and when exporting archive fragments and saving or printing individual frames.

Overlay and display settings can be configured by the surveillance system administrator in the **Eocortex Configurator** application. By default, both the overlay and display options are disabled.

The watermark applies to an image as text composed as follows:

Date and time of the device where the **Eocortex Client** application is running

Name of computer

Username of **Eocortex** user

Watermark can be composed of all attributes at once, or only some of them.

For the applied watermark it is possible to set the color and transparency, as well as to choose the method of text arrangement on the image as one of the following options:

One watermark on the diagonal

Multiple watermarks on the diagonal

One watermark on the horizontal

Multiple watermarks on the horizontal

Individual watermark overlay settings can be set for each camera.

The overlay settings are consistent for the camera, so the watermark will have the same appearance and structure both when viewing the video in the **Eocortex Client** application and when exporting the video or frames. So, even when exporting an archive for a group of cameras at once, each camera will have its own watermark according to the specified settings.

If the **Date and time** attribute is enabled, its behavior will be different when viewing video and frames in the **Eocortex Client** application and exporting. So, when viewing video in the application, this attribute displays the current computer time, while in the exported video and on the saved frame it will display the time when the export process started.

Watermark overlay settings are set for the camera, so the watermark will have the same appearance and structure for all users who are defined to see it. At the same time, different groups of users can be provided with different watermark display settings in the **Eocortex Client** application by selecting one of the following display options:

Only on live view

Only on archive view

Always

If the **Only on live view** option is selected, the watermark will not be applied to exported archive fragments and frames saved or printed from the archive.

Watermark is compatible with the option of [overlaying an image from a file](#).

Configuring the watermark in Eocortex Configurator

Configuration of the watermark displaying for a camera is available only to users, who have rights to configure that camera.

Configuring an individual camera

To set up the watermark displaying for a single camera, do the following:

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Go to the  **Cameras** section.

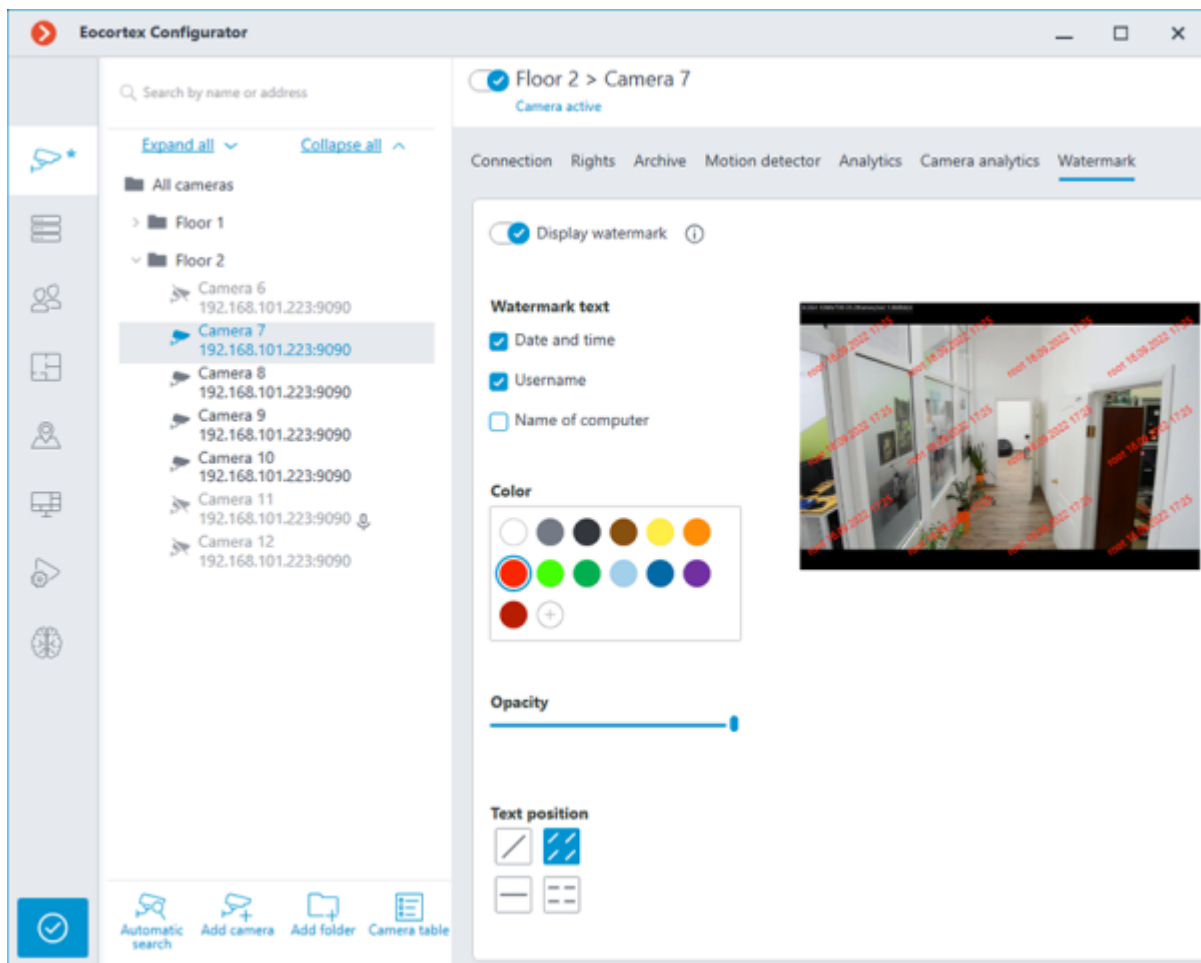
Select a camera in the list.

Switch to the **Watermark** on the right part of the window.

Enable the  **Display watermark** feature.

By default, this option is disabled.

Configure [the watermark displaying](#).



Enable displaying of the watermark in the [user rights settings](#).

Configuring a group of cameras

To set up the watermark displaying for a group of cameras, do the following:

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

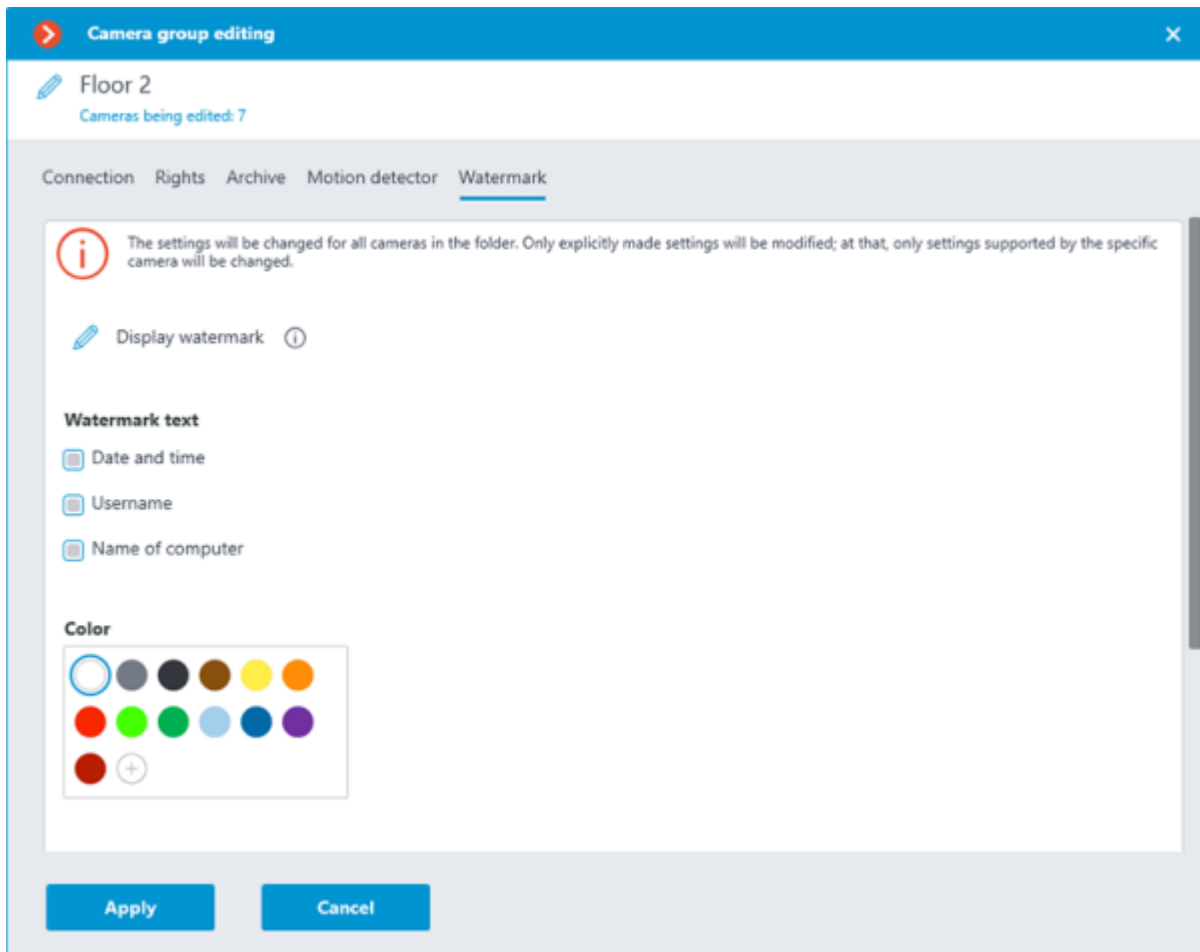
Go to the  **Cameras** section.

Select a group of cameras in the list.

Click the **Change camera group settings** button on the right part of the window;

In the window that opens, switch to the **Watermark** tab;

Configure [the watermark displaying](#).



The watermarked video preview is not available when setting up a camera group.

To change the settings for all cameras in the selected group, click **Apply**.

Enable displaying of the watermark in the [user rights settings](#).

Configuring the watermark properties

Below is a description of the available settings:


Watermark text: In this group of settings, it is possible to select the parameters that will be displayed in the watermark:




- **Date and time**
- **Username** running **Eocortex Client**.
- **Name of computer**, on which **Eocortex Client** is running.

Color: the color of the watermark text. If the desired color is not presented in the preset palette, it can be added by pressing the  button.

Opacity: The leftmost position of the slider corresponds to the minimum opacity value — 10%; the rightmost position of the slider corresponds to 100%.

Text position: location and orientation of the watermark. The following options are available:

- : Single watermark diagonally from left to right, bottom to top;

- : Multiple watermarks diagonally from left to right, bottom to top;
- : Single watermark horizontally, in the center of the cell;
- : Multiple horizontal watermarks.

When selecting options with multiple watermarks, the number of marks is determined by the size of the cell.

Configuring user rights

By default, displaying of the watermark is disabled for all user groups.

In **Eocortex** systems running with **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses, the watermark is not visible in the **Eocortex Client** application and is not overlaid on exported content for users with **Senior administrator** access rights.

To enable displaying/hiding of the watermark for a user group, follow these steps:

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Go to the  **Users** section.

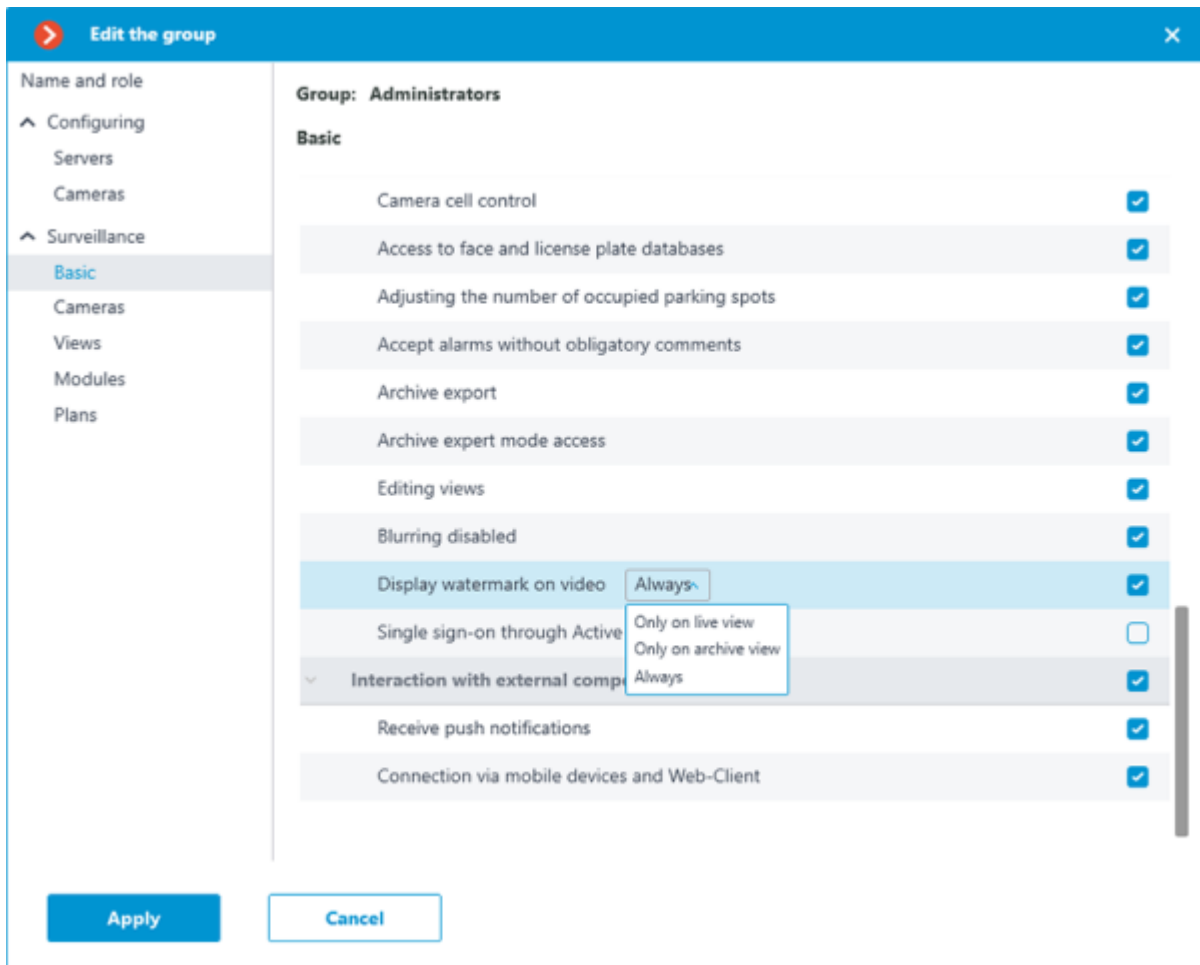
Select the **Users of Eocortex applications** subsection.

Select a group of users and click the **Edit** button.

In the window that opens, switch to the **Basic** tab.

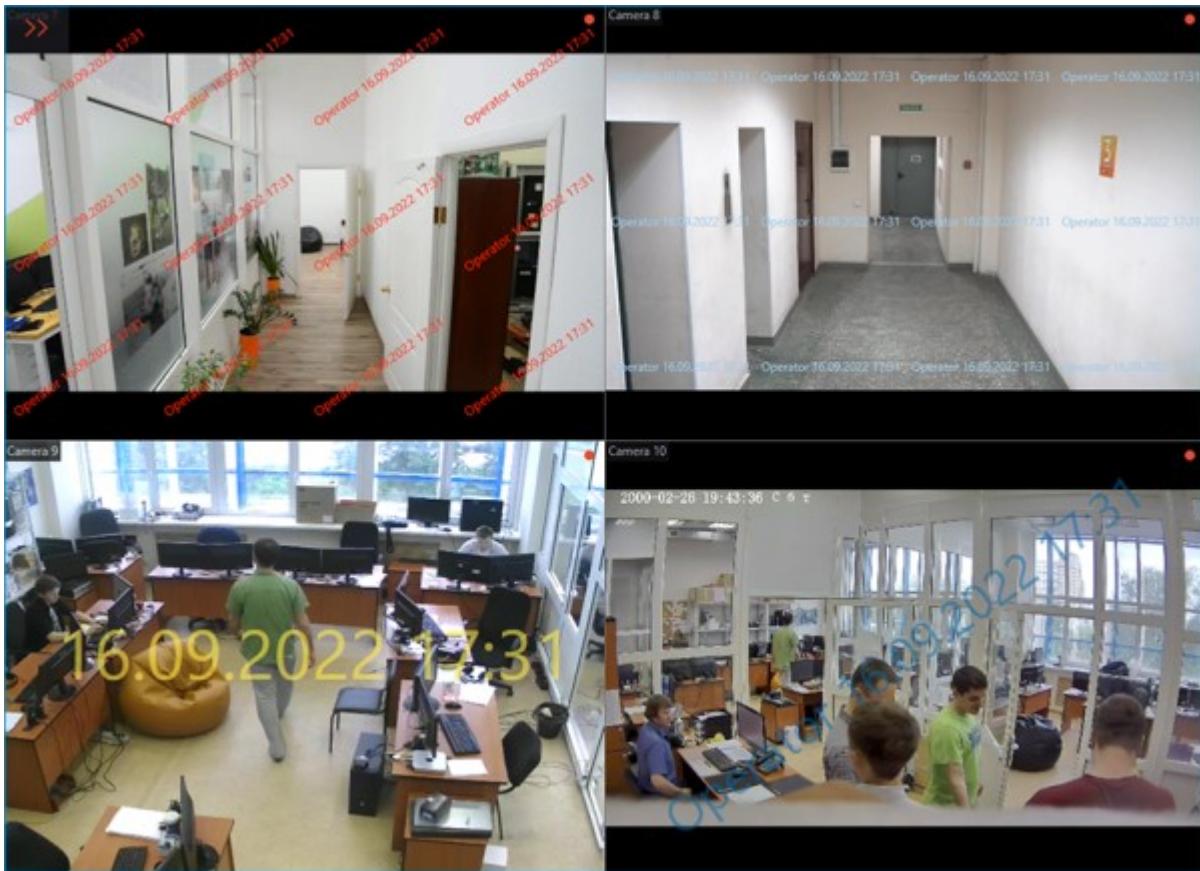
Enable the **Display watermark on video** permission and set the desired displaying mode.

If the option **Only on live view** is selected, the watermark will not be applied to the exported archive fragments and frames.



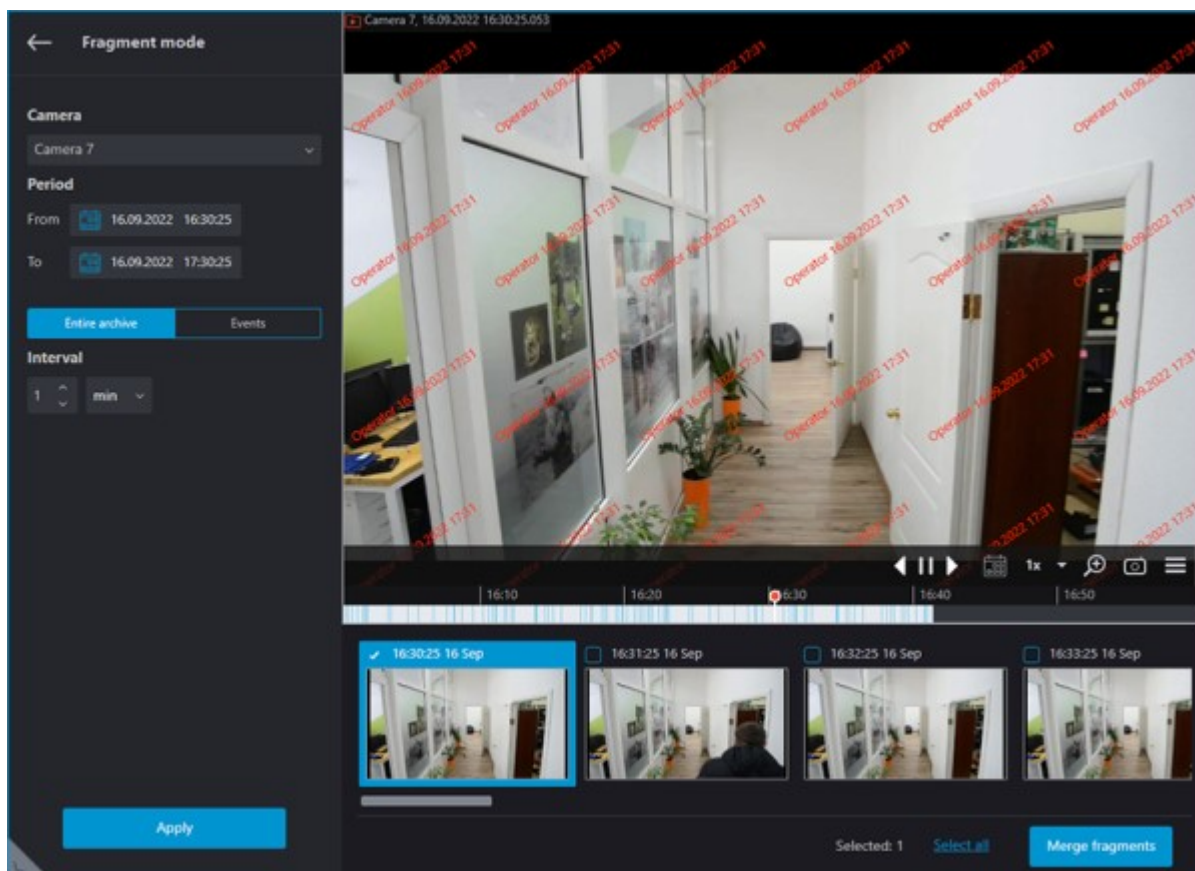
Using in the Eocortex Client application

If the camera is set to display a watermark and the user has been given the **Display watermark on video** permission, the **Eocortex Client** application will display the watermark in the cell with the video stream from that camera both during live viewing and archive playback.



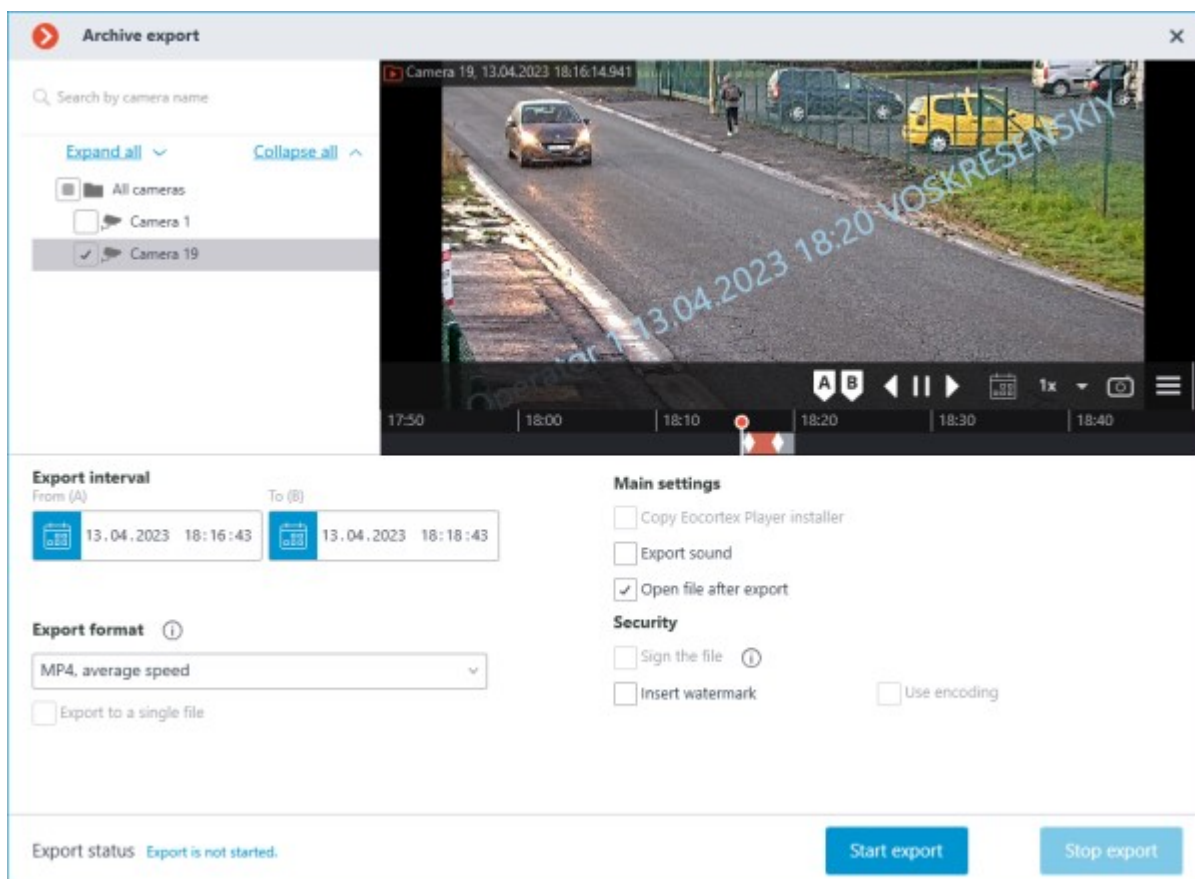
In **Eocortex** systems running with **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses, the watermark is not visible in the **Eocortex Client** application and is not overlaid on exported content for users with **Senior administrator** access rights.

The watermark is not visible in the preview section of the Fragments mode.



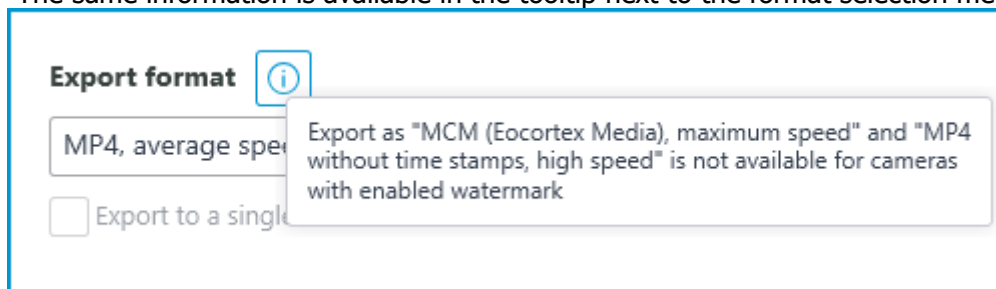
When saving or printing a frame, the watermark that is currently displayed in the camera cell will be applied to an image with all lines and columns unchanged.

To watermark the exported video, go to the **Archive export** window and click **Start export**. When selecting a camera from the list of cameras, the watermark configured for that camera will be displayed on the preview.

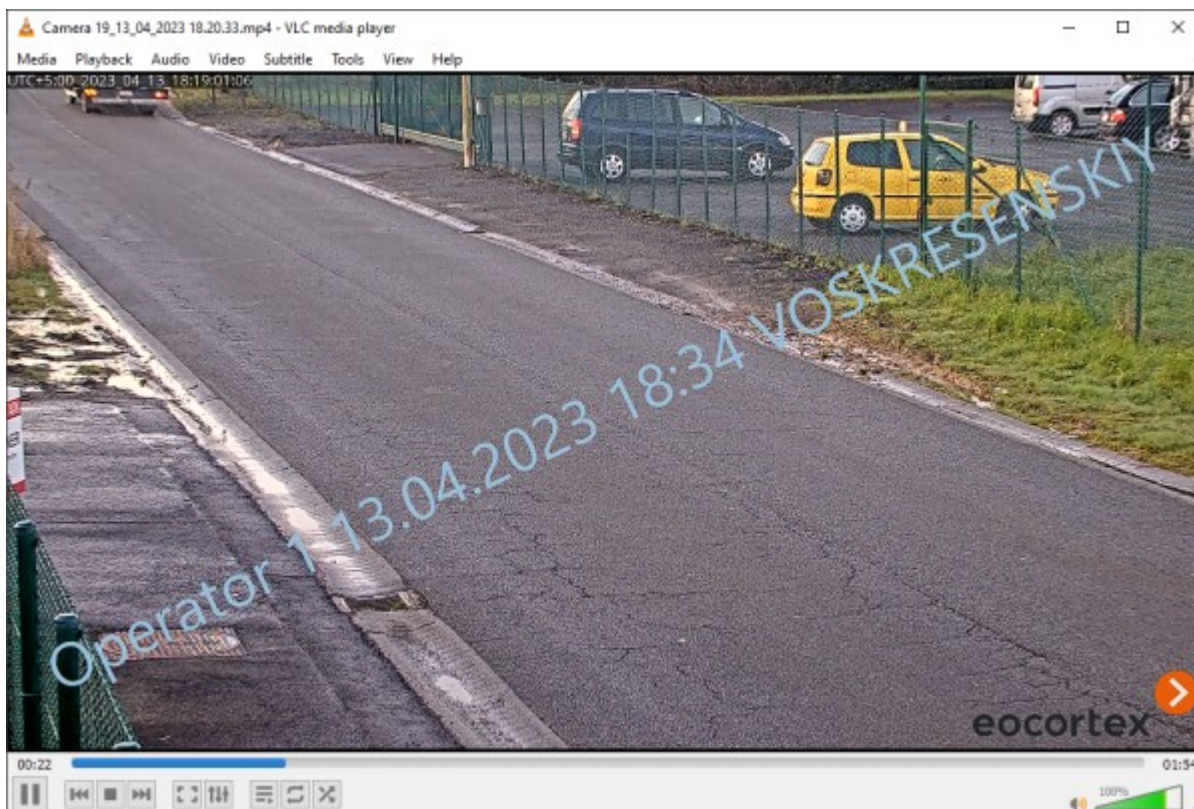


For cameras with applied watermark, exporting the archive in the formats **MCM** and **MP4 without time stamps, high speed** is not available. If at least one camera with enabled watermark is selected when exporting an archive for a group of cameras, exporting to the specified formats will be blocked for the entire group.

The same information is available in the tooltip next to the format selection menu.



In addition to the text watermark, when exporting videos it is possible to [overlay an image from a file](#) to the lower right corner of the frame. These options are compatible with each other and can be used simultaneously. The image from the file will overlay the watermark text.



Requirements and recommendations

In **Eocortex** systems running with **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses, the watermark is not visible in the **Eocortex Client** application and is not overlaid on exported content for users with **Senior administrator** access rights.

The watermark is not visible in the preview section of the Fragments mode.

For cameras with a watermark overlay, exporting the archive via HTTP API and mobile application is not available.

For cameras with applied watermark, exporting the archive in the formats **MCM** and **MP4 without time stamps, high speed** is not available. If at least one camera with enabled watermark is selected when exporting an archive for a group of cameras, exporting to the specified formats will be blocked for the entire group.

If the **Username** in the watermark will be too lengthy, its display will be scaled to fit on the screen.

If the option **Only on live view** is selected, the watermark will not be applied to the exported archive fragments and frames.

The watermark will not be applied to frames saved with the **Save frame** action, which can be created on the **Automation** tab of the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Displaying camera time zones

Time of a camera can be displayed in the **Eocortex** applications in two modes:

in the time zone of the client workstation;

in the time zone of the camera.

Description

Setting the time zones of the cameras and selecting the time display mode on the cameras are available for **Eocortex** applications version 3.6 and higher. Earlier versions of **Eocortex** applications do not support these features.

By default, configuration of the time zones is not active. When this feature is enabled, it is enabled centrally for the entire system.

If the camera time zone setting is not active, then in client applications, the time on the cameras will always be displayed in the time zone of the computer or device where the application is running.

If the camera time zone setting is active:

By default, the camera has the same time zone as the server it is linked to.

By default, the server has the same time zone as the operating system it is installed.

The server may be assigned a different time zone than the operating system's time zone.

The camera may be assigned a different time zone than the server's time zone.

In the client application, it is possible to select which time zone will be displayed for the camera: the time zone of the client workstation/device or the camera's own time zone.

By default, client applications display time on the camera in the time zone of the client computer/device.

Setting the time zones of servers and cameras is carried out in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

The selection of time display mode on the camera is carried out in client applications.

Setting in Eocortex Configurator

To activate the camera time zone display feature:

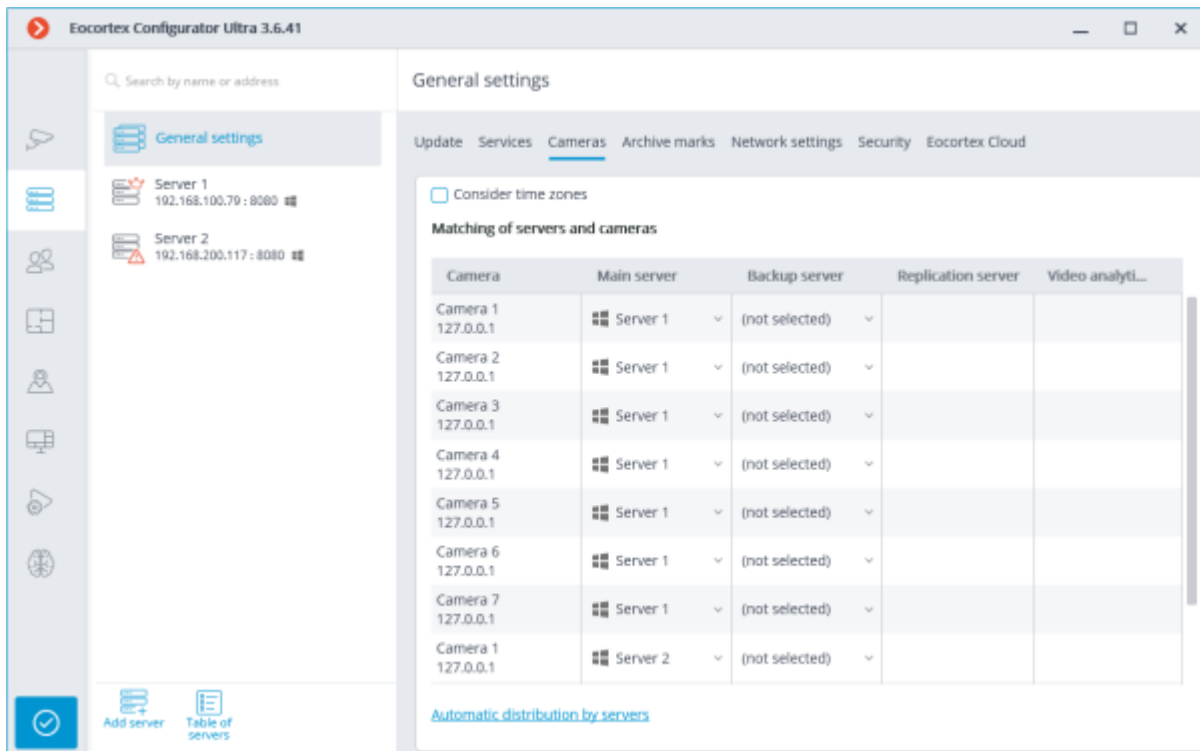
Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Open the  **Servers** section.

In the list of servers, select the  **General settings**.

Switch to the **Cameras** on the page that opens.

Activate the **Consider time zones** feature.



To set up the time zone of the server:

Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Open the  **Servers** section.

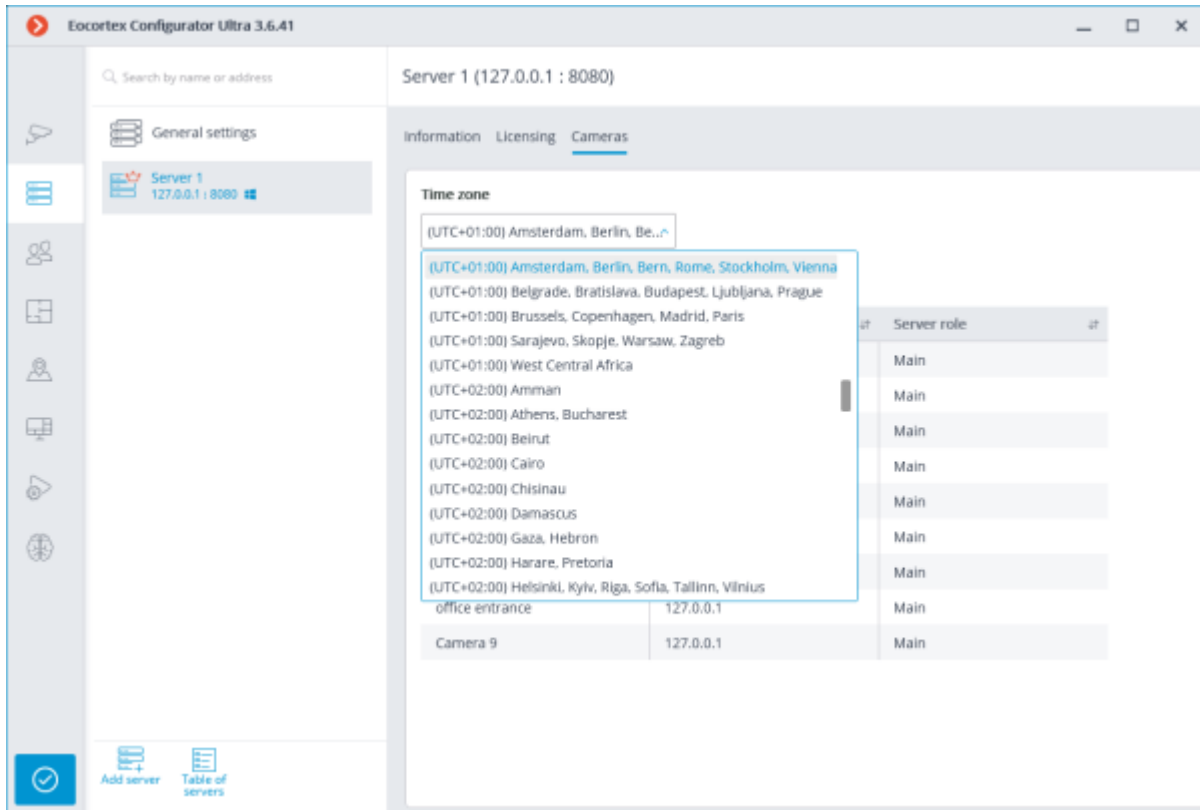
Select the server in the list.

Switch to the **Cameras** on the page that opens.

In the drop-down menu, select the needed time zone.

Along with the change of the server time zone, the time zone of the cameras linked to it will also change.

The list of available time zones depends on the operating system on which the **Eocortex Configurator** application is running.



To set up the time zone of the camera to be different from the time zone of the server the camera is linked to:

Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Open the  **Cameras** section.

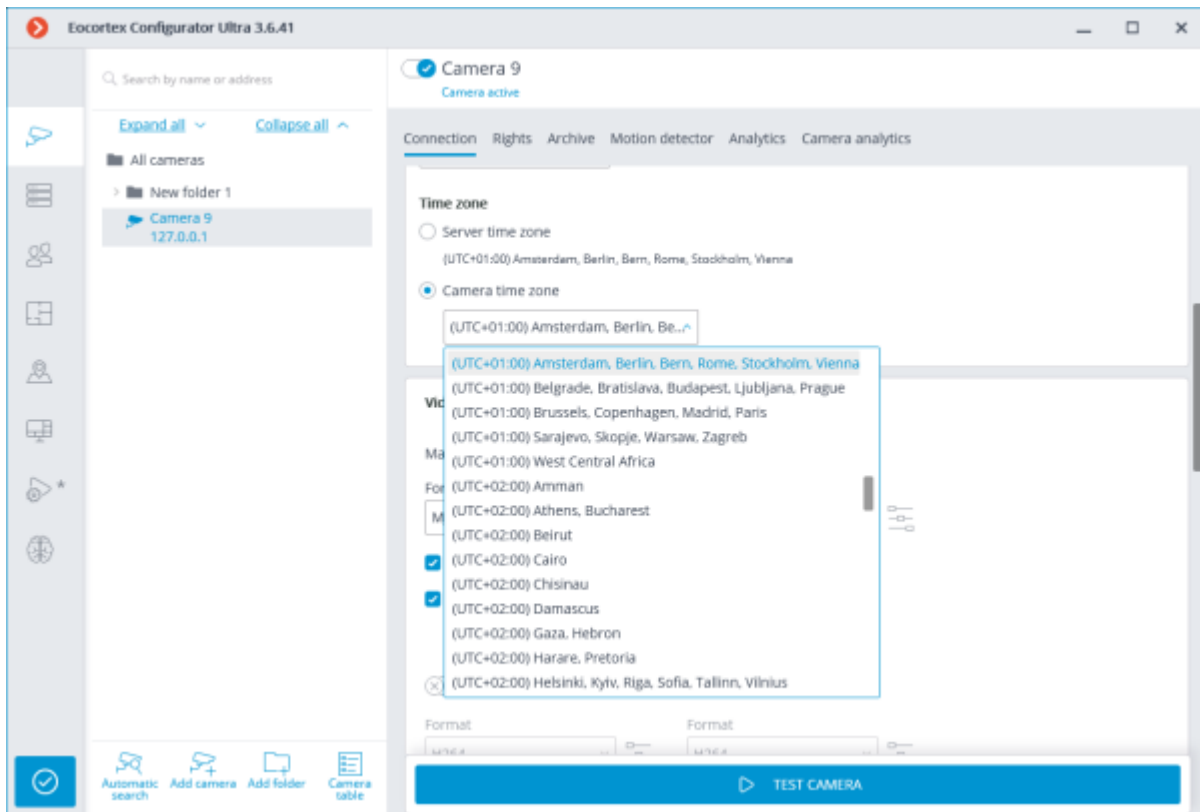
Select the camera in the list.

Select the **Connection** tab on the page that opens.

In the **Time zone** group of settings, set the time zone:

Server time zone: the time zone of the server the camera is linked to will be used.

Camera time zone: the selected time zone will be used, regardless of what time zone has the server the camera is linked to.



If the time zone settings must be changed for the group of cameras:

Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Open the  **Cameras** section.

Select the group of cameras in the list.

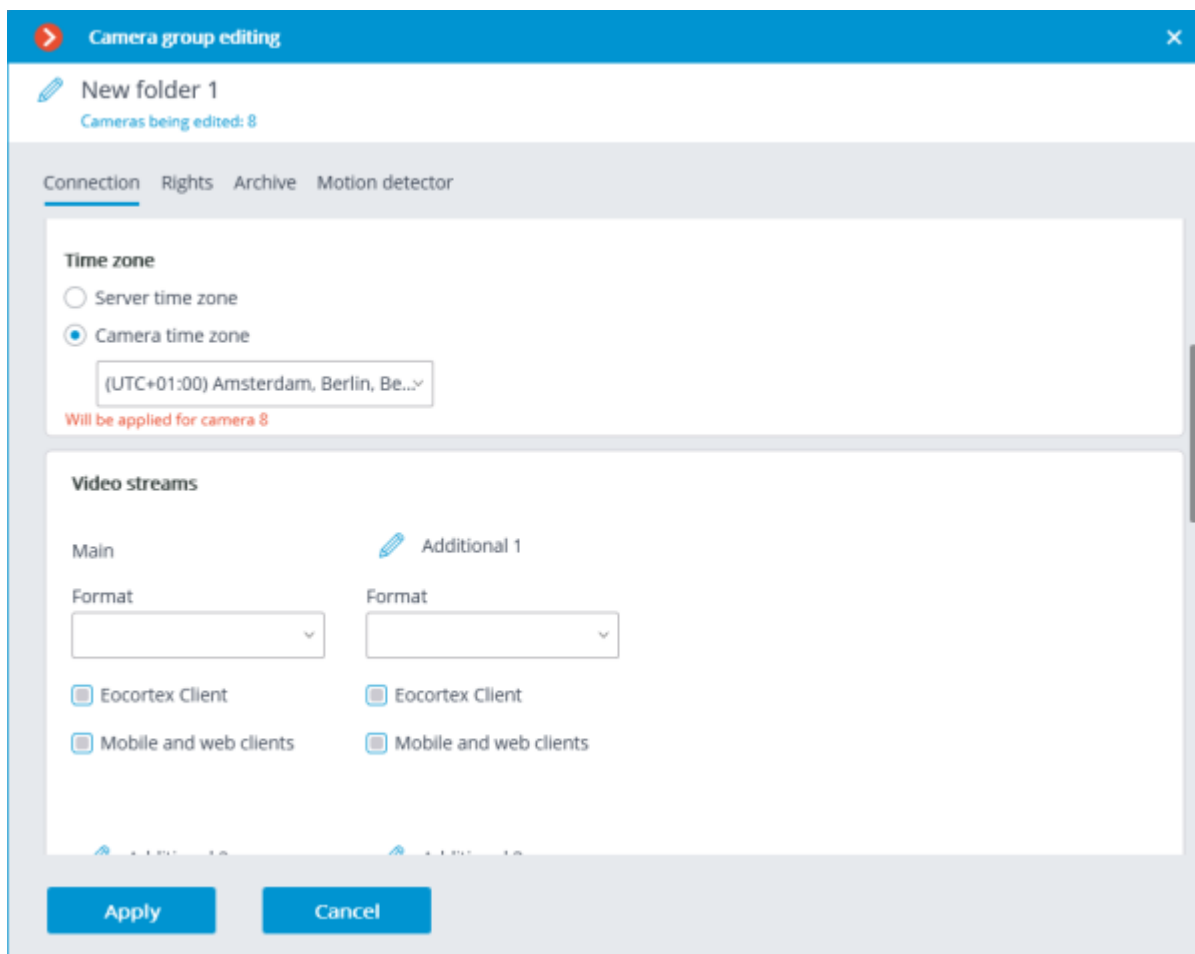
Click the **Change camera group settings** button on the page that opens.

In the **Time zone** group of settings, set the time zone:

Server time zone: the time zone of the server the camera is linked to will be used.

Camera time zone: the selected time zone will be used, regardless of what time zone has the server the camera is linked to.

If the **Server time zone** option is selected for the group of cameras and the Main server has not been changed for this group in the group settings window, each camera will use the time zone of the server it is linked to.



In case of the multiserver system, the main server must have the version of **Eocortex** 3.6 or higher to be installed. Otherwise, the entire system will not be able to use the time zone settings.

Recommendations for upgrading servers in a multiserver system to **Eocortex** version 3.6 from lower versions:

1. Update the main server.
2. Update the subordinate servers.

The time zone on the subordinate server will be set when:

- the update process will be completed;
- connection with the main server will be restored.

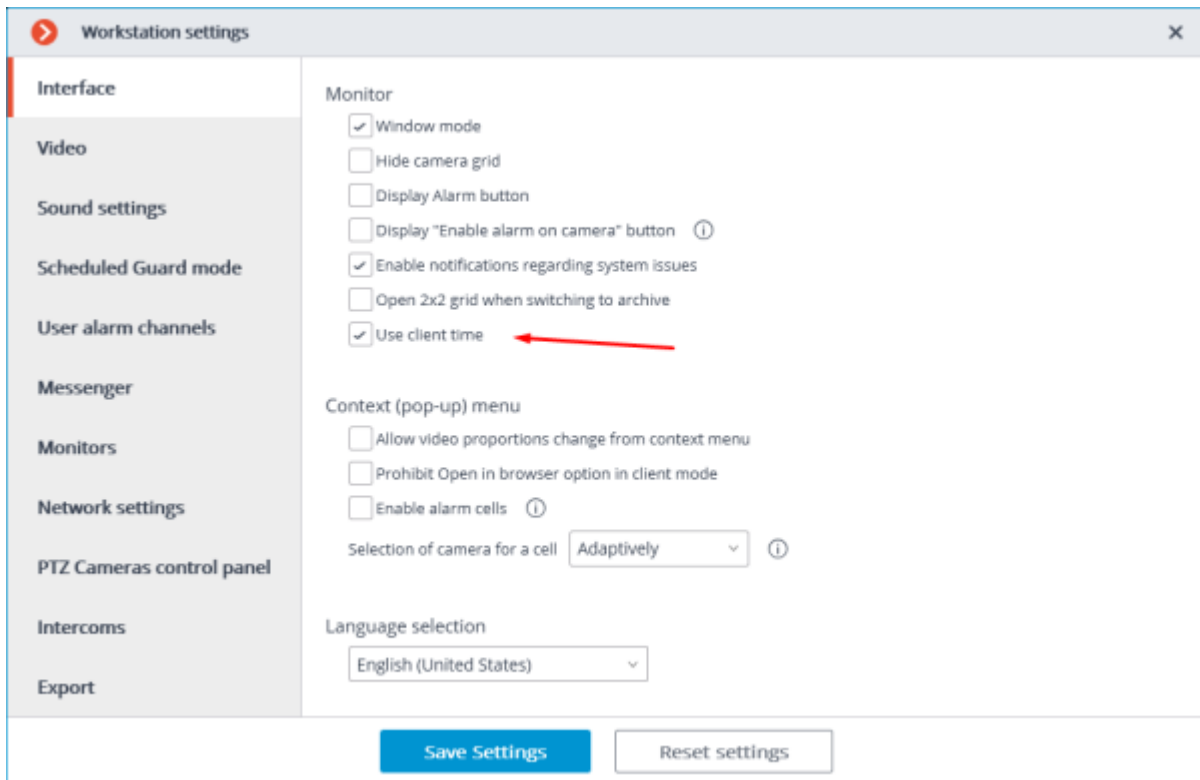
Setting in Eocortex Client

If the **Consider time zones** option is enabled in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, the **Eocortex Client** application will work in the time zones configured on the cameras/servers.

To work in the time zone of the computer running the **Eocortex Client** application, the user need

to select the  **Settings** section, open the  **Workplace settings** subsection and on the **Interface** tab enable the **Use client time** option.

By default, this option is disabled.

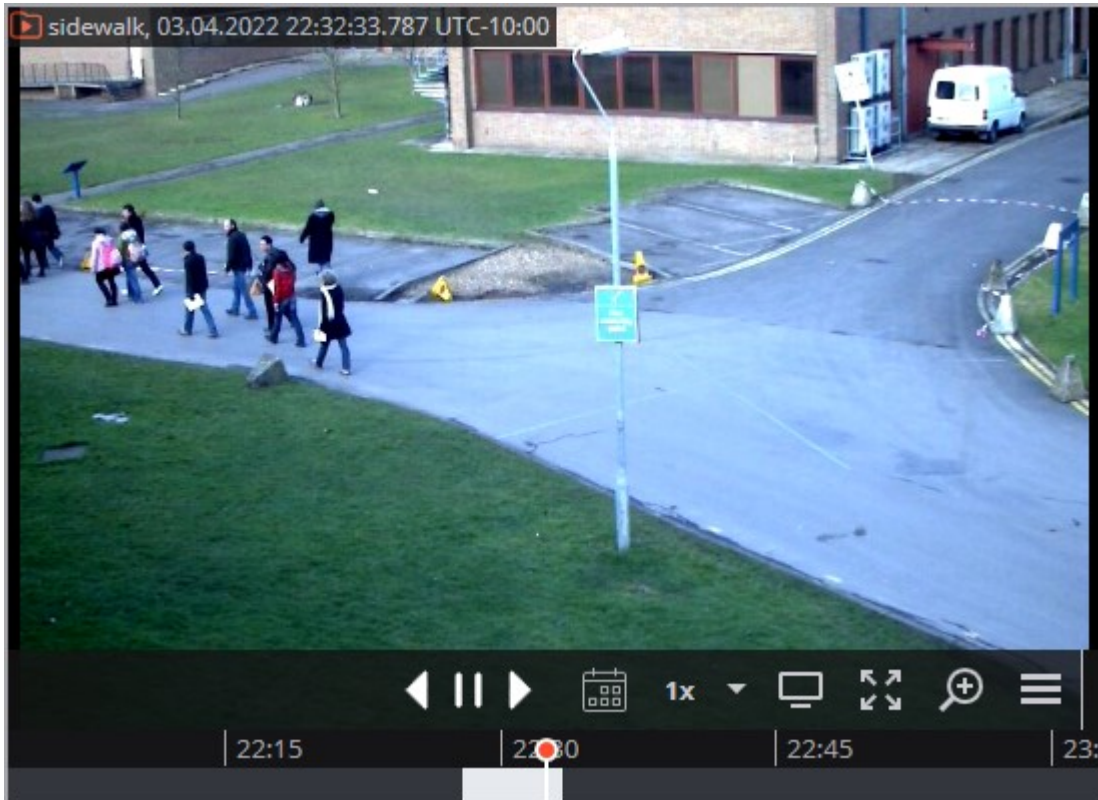


Using time zones

Viewing the single camera archive

When [viewing the single camera archive](#), the archive cell displays the time zone that is configured on the selected camera.

The actual offset displayed in the cell may differ from the offset in the list of time zones in the **Eocortex Configurator** application settings, if the daylight saving is applicable for the selected time zone.

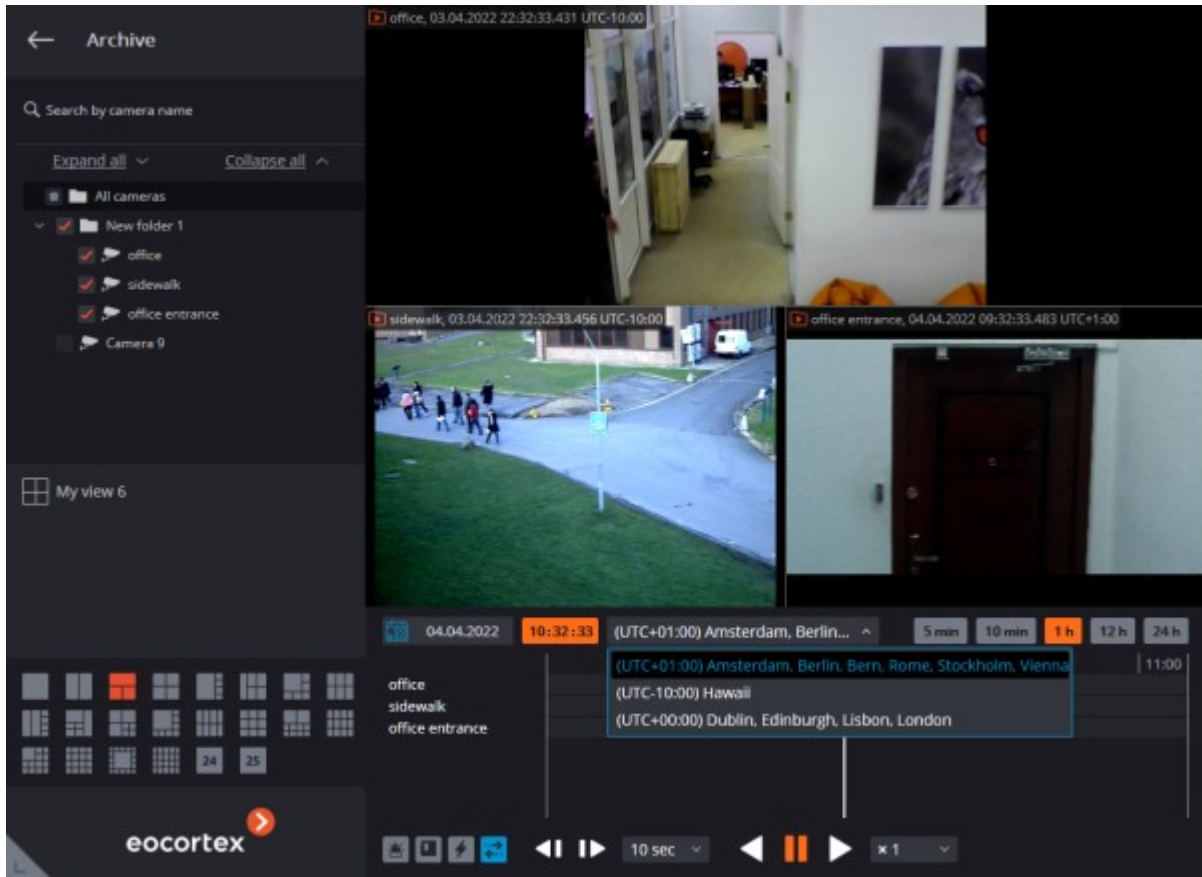


Simultaneous viewing of archive of multiple cameras

When several cameras are selected for [simultaneous viewing of the archive](#), the time is displayed for the selected time zone.

The list of available time zones consists of those time zones that are configured on cameras and servers, as well as the time zone of the computer running the **Eocortex Client** application.

By default, the time zone of the computer running the **Eocortex Client** application will be selected.



When a new time zone is selected, the time on the timeline will change according to the selected time zone. For example, if the user changes the time zone from UTC+05:00 to UTC+03:00, then the values on the timeline would decrease by 2 hours.

During video playback in synchronous view, the time and the time zone at the top of the camera cells are not displayed.

Events log

Search for archive events in the Event log can be configured considering the time zone.

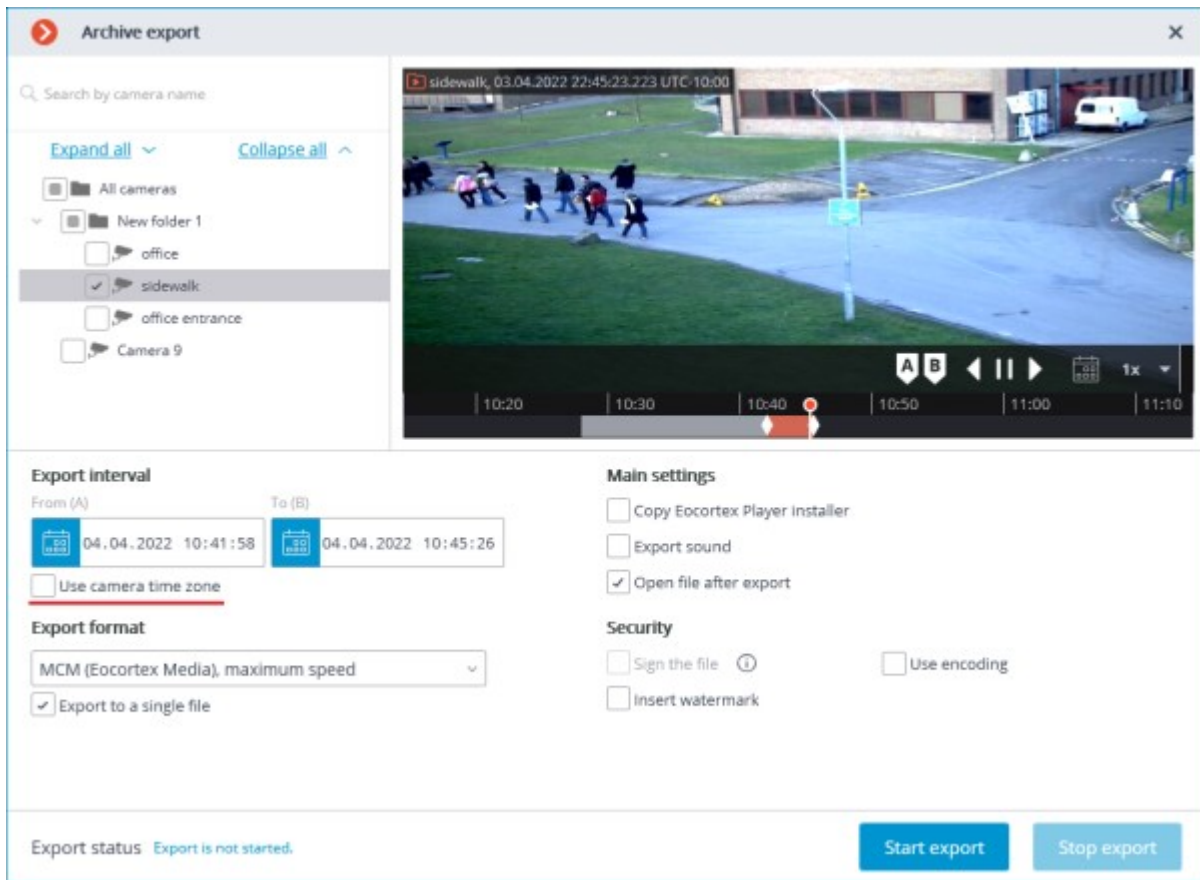

Archive export

By default, the archive is exported in the time zone of the computer running the **Eocortex Client** application.

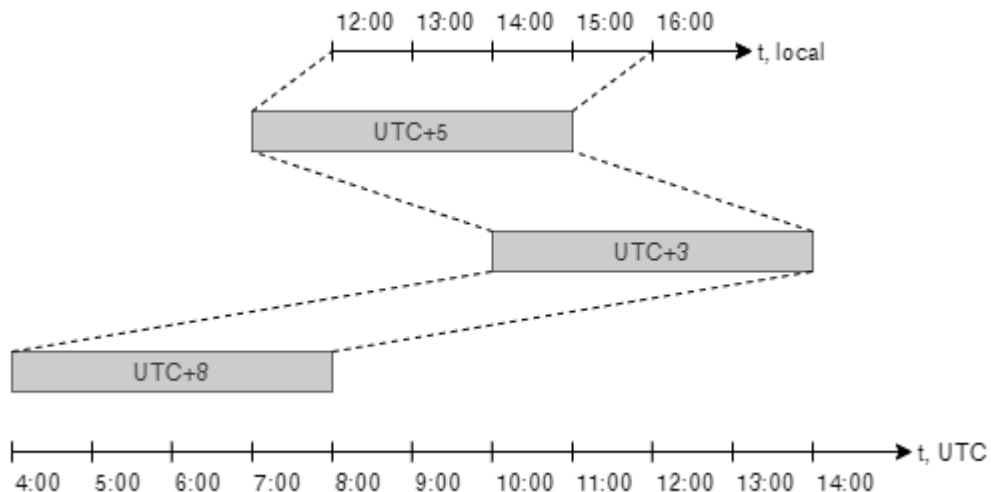
To export the archive considering the time zone of camera, the **Use camera time zone** option need to be activated.

In this mode, the archive fragments for each of the selected cameras will be exported at an individual time interval, based on the specific time zones selected for each of them. The time value specified as the beginning and end of the exported fragment will correspond to the same intervals of the time zones of each of the cameras.



For example, the **Eocortex Client** application is running on a computer with the UTC+4:00 time zone. It is required to export the archive from 12:00 to 16:00 for three cameras located in the following time zones: UTC+5, UTC+3 and UTC+8.

If the archive fragment has been exported considering the time zones, then when viewing the export result for several cameras with different time zones, in the **Eocortex Player** application, archive fragments will be displayed on the timeline with the shift equal to the difference between the time zone of each camera and the local time zone of the workstation.

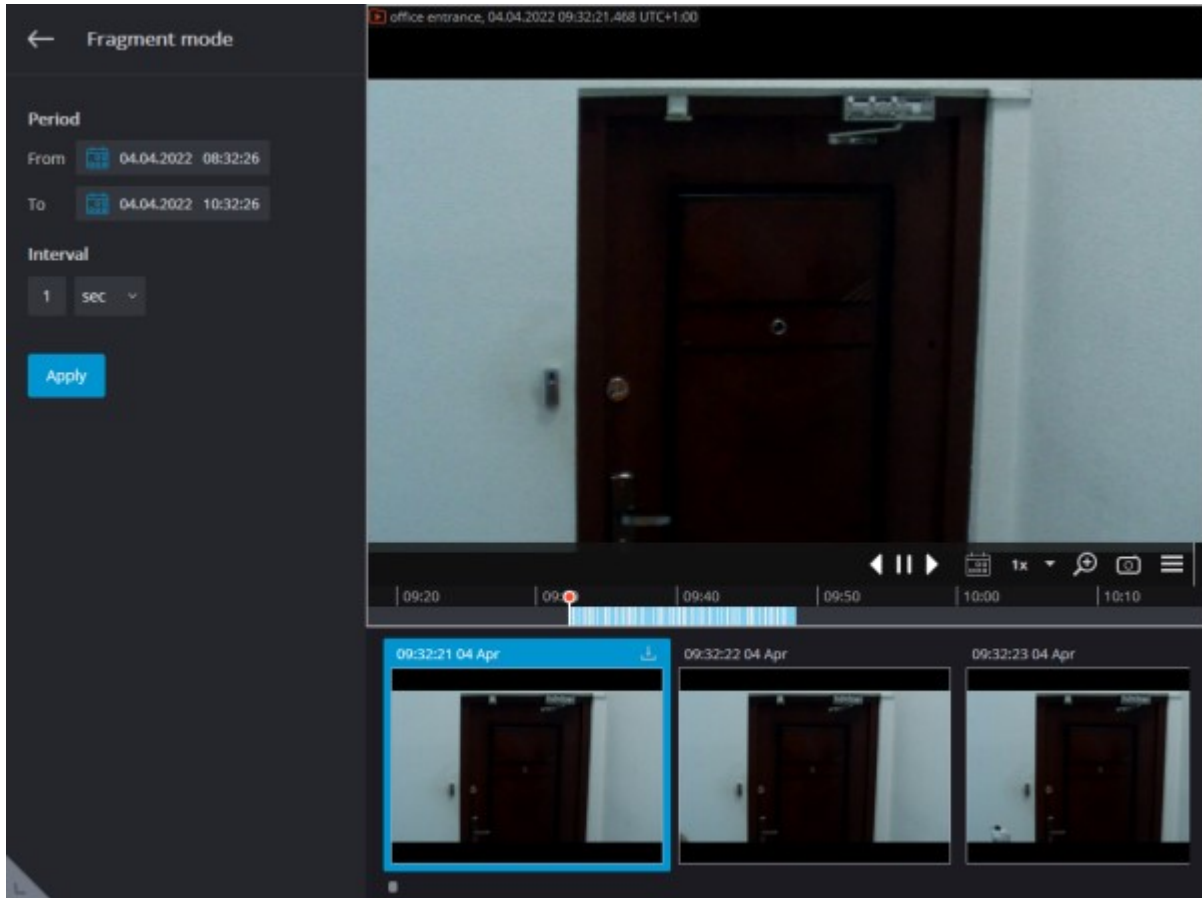


It is recommended to export archive fragments recorded with the same time zone selected.

The time for archive fragments exported in AVI and MP4 format will be displayed considering the time zones in which they were recorded, regardless of whether the feature is enabled or not.

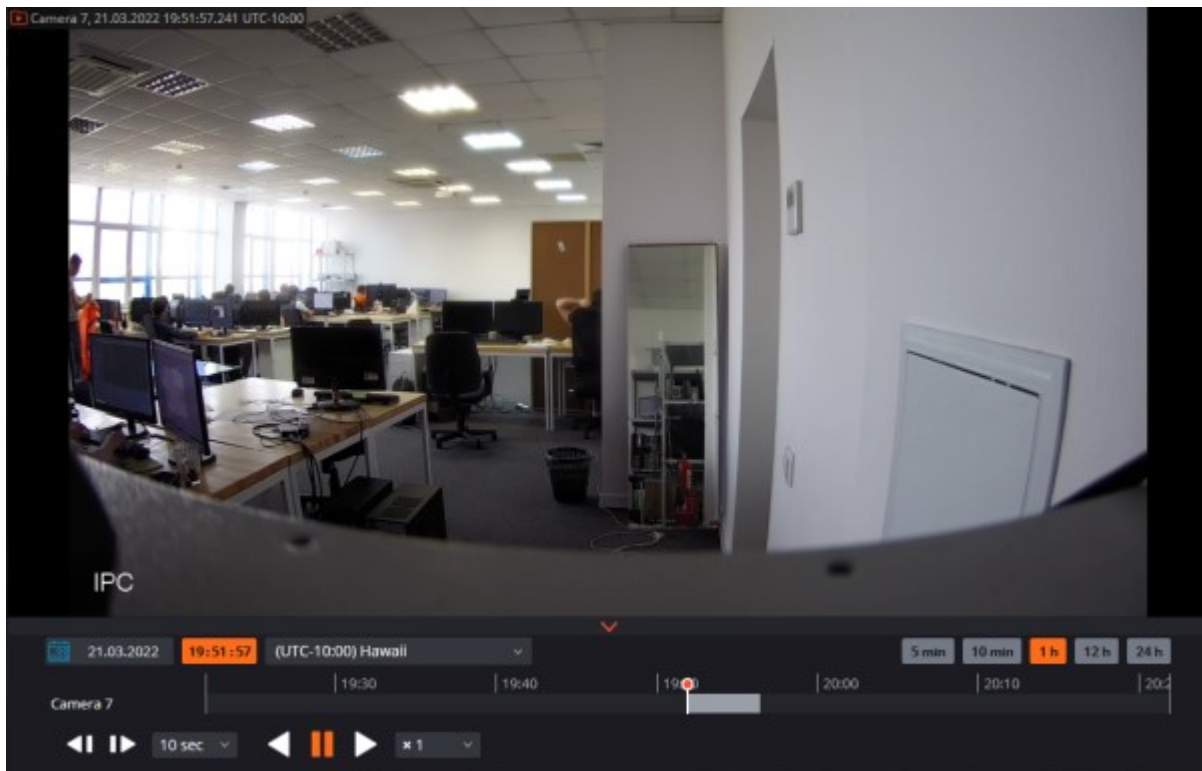
Fragment mode

When using the [fragment mode](#), the time zone of the selected camera is used to display and set up all times.



Eocortex Player

In the **Eocortex Player** application, the time zone can be selected from the drop-down menu.



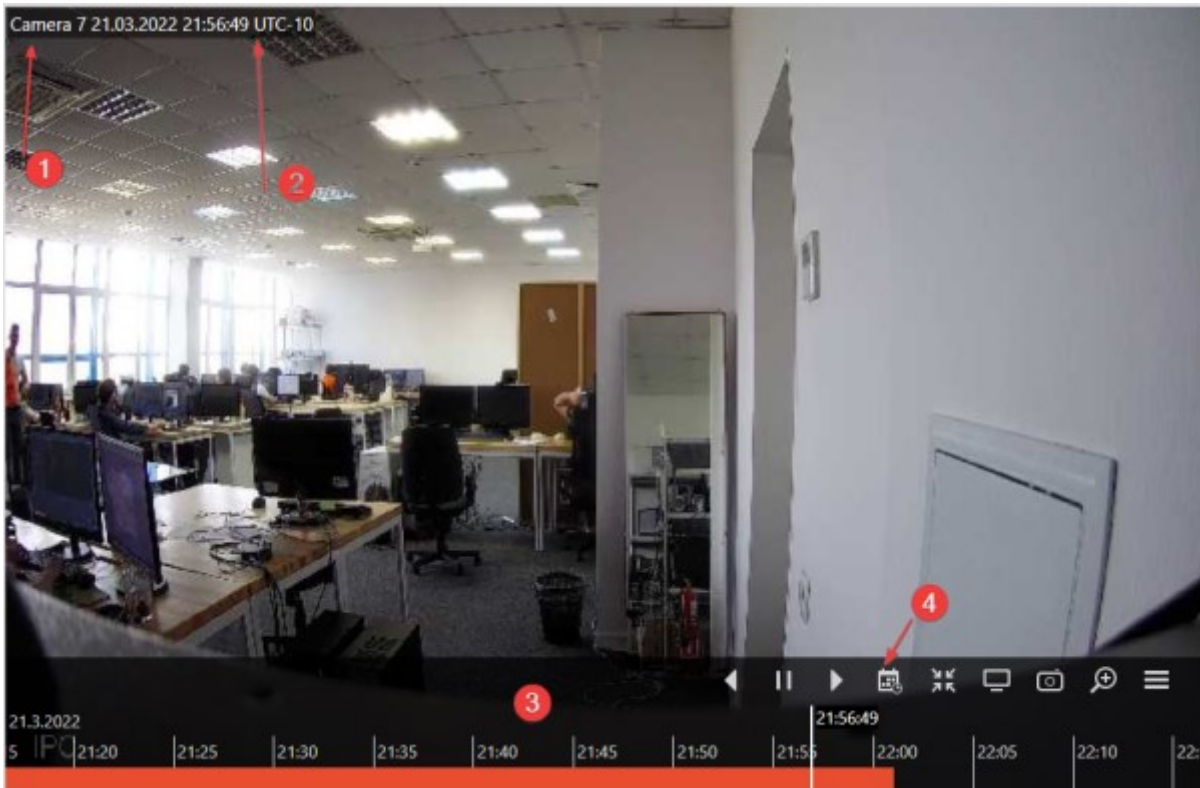
For selection will be available those time zones that were configured on the exported cameras.

If several MCM files or an MCM file with multiple cameras exported using camera time zones in the **Eocortex Player** application is open, the time zone of the first exported camera will be selected by default.

If the file that open has been exported without considering the time zones, the time zone of the computer on which the **Eocortex Player** application is running will be selected by default.

Eocortex Web-client

In the **Eocortex Web-client**, when viewing an archive, the video is displayed in the configured camera time zone.



Camera name;

Time zone;

Timeline of the archive;

Calendar for selecting a timestamp.

If the **Consider time zones** option is enabled on the **Eocortex** server, then:

- the camera cell displays the actual time with the shift of the time zone, considering daylight saving time, relevant at the time the page was opened;
- the timeline and calendar for time selection are displayed in the time zone of the camera.

If the **Consider time zones** option is disabled on the **Eocortex** server, then:

- camera time zone is not displayed;
- the timeline and calendar for time selection are displayed in the local time of the computer/device.

Analytics events with timestamps, such as events in the panel of recognized faces, are displayed in the local time of the computer/device; when the user goes to the archive for the selected event, the time in the archive will be displayed in the camera time zone.

Server features

Multiserver system

To ensure scalability and fault tolerance of multiserver video surveillance systems, as well as to minimize service data exchange over the network and reduce collisions associated with server synchronization, **Eocortex** uses a master server architecture. A description of this architecture can be found below.

The master server architecture was first introduced in **Eocortex** version 2.2. Previously, all servers in a multi-server system had equal rights which could lead to significant performance degradation and collisions.

In a multiserver system, only one server is the master server. The rest of the servers in the multiserver system are called slave servers and interact with the master server to update settings. Since the settings are synchronized by the slave servers making queries to the master server and not vice versa, the master server must be accessible to all servers in a multiserver system.

All servers in a multiserver system must have Eocortex installed of the same version by major and minor version numbers.

The version number of the **Eocortex** has three parts: **M.N.R**; **M**: major version, **N**: minor version, **R**: release number.

Main server

The main server stores and allows to edit the following data:

General system settings: data regarding servers, cameras, users etc.;

Data regarding licenses of each server;

Information about the most recent connection of each slave server to the main server;

Site plans.

The information about the most recent connections of the slave server to the master is used, in particular, for diagnostics: if the slave server has not connected to the master within the last 2 minutes, then its status will be changed accordingly.

Also, the functions of the main server include checking the authorization of each incoming queries from system users, including those from external applications.

Slave server

The slave server stores and allows you to modify its own single-server configuration, which contains the settings of this server and cameras bound to it, as well as a number of other parameters, including the location (address: port) of the main server. Also, the slave server stores a copy of the general settings obtained from the master server, in case the main server fails.

Every few seconds the slave server connects to the master server for synchronization purposes. The interval between connections is determined automatically and ranges from 5 to 15 seconds. In

addition, the connection to the master server occurs immediately after changes are made to the settings of the slave server.

The following tasks are performed within the scope of synchronization (moreover, some of the tasks are not performed during each synchronization session, but only when certain events occur or certain conditions are met):

The main server receives the information regarding the operability of the slave server;

The slave server performs time synchronization with the main server;

The main server receives information regarding the modification of settings and about licenses of the main server;

The slave server receives from the main server the information regarding the necessity to launch or stop the backup or channel replication processes coming from other servers;

The slave server downloads a copy of the general settings from the main server.

In addition to synchronization requests, the slave server redirects requests from client applications to the master server, if necessary.

Fail safety

To ensure that the main server does not become a common point of failure, a mechanism of transferring a copy of the general system settings to each slave server has been implemented. Below is the list of events and conditions for the general settings to be automatically downloaded by the slave servers:

Once every 12 hours;

Upon the launch of the slave server;

When the number of servers in the system has changed;

When the number of channels in the system has changed;

When the system users have changed;

Upon the change of binding of cameras to the servers;

When the bindings of replication or backup bindings have changed.

Thus, in the event of a failure of the main server, any of the remaining servers in the system can be designated as the main server.

Adding other servers and multiserver systems

The following terms are introduced for the purposes of this document:

Current system is a multiserver system or a system consisting of a single server connected to the **Ecocortex Configurator** application at the given moment.

External system is a multiserver system or a system consisting of a single server that is being connected to the current system.

To connect an external system, it is required to connect only one of the external system servers to the current system - after connecting, the **Ecocortex Configurator** application will send information to the other servers of the external system that the main server of the current system becomes their main server. In other words, when a server of another system joins the current system, all servers on that external system will join the current system.

In the process of connecting an external system, the **Ecocortex Configurator** application must have access to all servers of this system in order to inform them of the new address of the main server.

In case the **Ecocortex Configurator** application does not have access to any server of the external system at the time of connecting, such server will attempt to automatically

receive information about the change of address of the main server from the server that was the main server in the external system.

If the operation of obtaining a new address of the main server by an unavailable server automatically did not lead to the connection of this server to the current system (for example, if the main server of the external system was unavailable), it is necessary to make direct connection to this server using the **Eocortex Configurator** application, subsequently changing the address of the main server on the server (specifying the address of the main server of the current system).

The following happens when an external system is connected:

All the servers of the external system will be added to the current system.

On the former main server of the external system, all the general settings of the external system will be deleted, including users and the associated permissions. Further, to connect to the former servers of the external system, the authorization system of the current system will be used.

All the cameras and folders of the external system will be added to the current one. In this case, the camera settings and the distribution of cameras among servers will be preserved.

All site plans, archive bookmark categories, screen profiles and profile switching lists will be added to the current system from the external one.

If the **Eocortex Configurator** application is connected to the servers of the external system at the time of connecting, then, depending on whether the username and password of the current and external systems for this session match or not, the client application will either automatically restart or remain idle until the user restarts it under the correct username and password.

Disconnections of servers

The following terms are introduced for the purposes of this document:

Current system is a multiserver system or a system with a single server to which the **Eocortex Configurator** application is connected at the moment of disconnection.

Disconnected system is a system with a single server that is disconnected from the current system.

The master server cannot be disconnected from a multiserver system. If such need arises, it is required to designate another server in the system as the master one before disconnecting.

The following happens when a server is disconnected from the system:

The disconnected server is removed from the general settings of the current system. This means that all the cameras for which the disconnected server was the primary one, as well as all replication and backup bindings associated with the disconnected server will be removed from the general settings and site plans.

The disconnected server becomes the main server of the single-server system.

General settings for the single server system are created on the disconnected server. At the same time, all cameras for which this server was the main one at the time of disconnection are preserved. However, all replication and backup bindings are removed from the settings, as well as all cameras for which this server has been designated as a replication or backup server. If the server was a replication one before disconnection, after disconnection it becomes a basic server.

The disconnected system retains all users of the current system with their assigned permissions.

The disconnected system retains all site plans, archive bookmark categories, screen profiles, and profile switch lists. At the same time, all cameras that remain in the current system will be removed from the site plans.

The archive of replicated and backup cameras will remain on the disconnected server and it will be possible to view it using the **Local monitoring and backup archive** utility. This archive will be deleted as the disk space is filled with the current archive from the cameras remaining on the disconnected server. In this case, if the disconnected server is re-connected to the current system, the archive of replicated and backup cameras will become available for viewing in the **Eocortex Client** application.

If the **Eocortex Client** application is connected to the servers at the time of disconnection, it will continue to operate and will be automatically restarted only if the system is modified in such a way that the parameters of the current display, user rights, settings of currently displayed channels and a number of other settings are affected.

As a result, two systems with the same set of users and their rights, as well as site plans, categories of archived bookmarks, screen profiles and profile switching lists will be available after the server's disconnection.

Interaction of client applications with servers

Eocortex client applications include **Eocortex Client**, **Eocortex Web-client** and mobile client applications.

To work in a multiserver system, the users of client applications do not need to know the address of the main server and connect specifically to it - it will be sufficient to connect to any of the servers in the system. In this case, if the user connects to a slave server that does not have access to the master server, the client application will only have access to those cameras that are bound to that server.

Floating licensing

The **Floating licensing** implemented in **Eocortex** allows using a single license key on several **Eocortex** servers.

This capability is not present in all types of licenses.

In the terminology of **Eocortex**, the keys with the floating license are called network keys to distinguish them from the traditional keys that are now called local keys.

The total number of cameras, modules and other licensed features are shown in the floating license. The administrator of a video surveillance system can distribute the cameras among servers at his/her discretion. However, it is not required to distribute the licenses among servers because the system core does it automatically. Whereby, upon binding the cameras to another server, the corresponding licenses will be moved accordingly.

Only one license can be activated on a single server, irrespective of whether this license is local or floating.

The network key must be installed on a computer where the **Eocortex** server is installed.

The network keys can only be used on the **Eocortex** servers of versions 3.1 and later. It is not possible to use the network keys on the earlier versions of the software, even as local keys.

In order to ensure access to a network key, it is required to allow the outgoing TCP and UDP traffic for the 1947 port both on the server where the key is installed and on the servers that use this key.

A single network key can be used in several **Eocortex** video surveillance systems. In such a case, the parameters of the key will not be shown correctly in the **Eocortex Configurator** application of each system because the systems have no information regarding the usage of licenses by other systems.

A network key is to be installed on any **Eocortex** server of the same local network or VPN where the servers using that key are located.

Several network and local keys can be installed in the same **Eocortex** video surveillance system. However, the number of local keys is limited by the quantity of **Eocortex** servers, but the number of network keys is unlimited.

The floating licenses can be used on any Sentinel (HASP) keys, be it software or USB ones.

Two addresses for the same server

In **Eocortex**, it is possible to use two addresses for connecting for the same server:

- **Local address:** the main address of the server. It is possible to use this address for connecting to a server within the local network.
- **Additional address:** the address that is set optionally. This address will be used in a situation when it is not possible to connect to the server using a local address.

Setup

In order to use the additional address, it is required to enable the option **Use additional (public) address** on the **Information** tab located on the  **Servers** page.

The connection to the server is always carried out using the local address first. If the connection to the local address fails, the connection to the additional address shall be made.

One exception is the connections to the server for the purpose of broadcasting live video. In such a case, if the connection to the local address is unsuccessful, a connection to the additional address will be made. Then, in case of a successful connection, a timer starts, which checks the availability of the local address every 10 minutes. When access to the local address is restored, a connection to this address occurs.

This algorithm is used not only for client connections to the server but also for connecting servers that broadcast real-time video in proxy mode.

Client P2P connection to server

The P2P (Peer-to-peer) technology allows to connect to the **Eocortex** server using the **Eocortex Client** application running on a remote computer from anywhere in the world, provided that both of them have internet access. At that, the **Eocortex** server does not have to have a public static IP address or to be in the same VPN with the client computer. Thus, when it is required to connect to the

Eocortex servers via internet, is becomes significantly easier to set up the networks and the need to rent public static IP addresses or VPN servers is eliminated.

Before connecting to the **Eocortex** server via the **Eocortex Client** application using the P2P technology, it is required to do the following:

1. Create an account in **Eocortex Cloud**.
2. Connect **Eocortex** servers to **Eocortex Cloud**.
3. Connect to **Eocortex Cloud** via **Eocortex Client**.

Creating an account in **Eocortex Cloud**

To create an account in **Eocortex Cloud**, it is required to follow the link <https://cloud.eocortex.com/account/register>

After creating an account, a message will be sent to the indicated address. To confirm, go to the link in the message or press **Activate**.

Connecting servers to **Eocortex Cloud**

After creating the account in **Eocortex Cloud**, it is required to connect a video surveillance system to it. To do that, go to the general server settings in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, then go to the **Eocortex Cloud** tab, enter the **Eocortex Cloud** account data (email and password) and, finally, press the **Connect** button.

The **Eocortex Cloud** connection setup is only available to the users with full rights (in case of the **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses these are the users who are included in the group with the **Senior administrators** rights).

After the successful connection, the status will change to **System connected**.

The settings will come into effect only after they are [applied](#).

Client P2P connection

After having connected the video surveillance system to **Eocortex Cloud**, it becomes possible to connect to it using P2P. For that end, a new type of connection was added to the authorization window of the **Eocortex Client** application called **Connection to Eocortex Cloud**. To connect, it is required to enter the email and password of the **Eocortex Cloud** account.

Description of **Eocortex Client** in case of its connection to server via P2P:

When making a connection via P2P using **Eocortex Cloud**, the user of **Eocortex Client** will enjoy full rights for the access to the video surveillance system.

On the other hand, the **Eocortex Configurator** application does not support the P2P access; thus, the user who has connected to the system vis P2P, will not be able to launch **Eocortex Configurator** from the client application.

Besides, when connecting via P2P, the **Eocortex Configurator** application will not be able to perform an automatic upgrade to the server's version.

When connected to a multi-server system via P2P, it is possible to view the cameras only from those servers that are connected to **Eocortex Cloud** have internet access.

At the same time, if the main server has access to the internet, it is possible to gain the P2P access to the cameras of the servers without internet access but which are in the same local network or VPN with the main server by enabling a proxy access thru the main server.

If the **Eocortex** server is disconnected from the system that is already connected to **Eocortex Cloud**, that server will be disconnected from **Eocortex Cloud** and its **Eocortex Cloud** connection settings will be deleted.

When combining two systems connected to **Eocortex Cloud**, the system being connected will be disconnected from the initial **Eocortex Cloud** account and connected to the account of the system to which it is being connected.

Since in case of a P2P connection the data, in most instances, will be transmitted via internet, a secure connection will be employed.

Failure to connect to system via P2P

First, it is required to make sure that the system is connected to **Eocortex Cloud**. To do so, go to the **Eocortex Cloud** account and check the list of the connected servers. If the list is empty, it may be possible that the main server has no internet access and cannot connect to **Eocortex Cloud**.

If there are servers in the list but the main server has the **Disconnected** status, it is required to make sure that the server is in a working order.

In case the main server has the **Connected** status, but it is impossible to connect to the system, it is likely that the server or the client are in the network that does not support P2P connections.

Below are the options of the network organization that do not support P2P connections:

Server and client are on the computer that is in the network after the router with *Symmetric NAT*.

Server and client are on the computer that is in the network after two or more routers with different NATs.

Questions and answers

Q: How many video surveillance systems can be connected to a single **Eocortex Cloud** account?

A: Only one video surveillance system can be connected to a single **Eocortex Cloud** account.

Q: Are there any limitations as regards the number of system servers connected to **Eocortex Cloud**?

A: There are no such limitations.

Q: Is the load on the client and the server different depending on the type of connection (standard or P2P)?

A: On the client, the load is the same in both cases. The server, on the contrary, may consume somewhat more CPU resources when connected via P2P. The load depends on the volume of traffic sent by the server via P2P. The maximum increase of the load via P2P can reach 50% of the standard connection load. For example, if the server used 20% of the CPU capacity to transmit data to the client applications under the standard connection, this load can increase to 30% when all the clients are connected via P2P.

Q: Are there any traffic limitations in case of a P2P connection?

A: Yes. First, the maximum throughput of a single channel with the camera stream is around 40 Mbps. Second, since in the majority of cases the connection is via internet, the speed depends on a provider's internet plan.

Decoding B frames of H.264 and H.265 video streams

In H.264 and H.265 codecs, the following types of frames are used for video stream compression:

- **I-frames** (reference frames, key frames) contain all the fragments of the image being encoded.
- **P-frames** (differentially dependent frames) contain new fragments of the image being encoded or the changes in relation to the key frame.

- **B-frames** (bidirectionally dependent) encode the difference between the neighboring frames by making reference to the encoded fragments in the key and differentially dependent frames.

The video stream compressed using the B-frames have higher rate of compression in comparison with the video streams that were compressed using I and P-frames only. Thus, the video stream compressed using the B-frames requires less channel width for transmission via the network (from the camera to the server and from the server to the client application). It also occupies less drive space when stored in the archive. The volume of storage saving may reach 40% as compared with the video where only I and P-frames are used.

The practically achievable compression value depends on many parameters, such as the number of details in a frame, the intensity of movement, the resolution, the frame rate and other characteristics, including those related to the codec's developer. At that, in most cases, the compression rate increases with the increase of the resolution and the frame rate.

At the same time, more computing power is needed for encoding the B-frames in comparison with encoding I and P-frames only.

Moreover, the use of the B-frames results in the increased delay in real-time video. It happens because the encoding and decoding of the B-frames requires buffering.

The capability of encoding the B-frames is usually indicated in the documentation of a camera. For example, the **IBP** or **IBBP** support may be stated. In such a case, the H.264/H.265 video codec must, as a rule, support the profile not lower than the **Main Profile**.

It is possible to ascertain if **Eocortex** supports the reception of a video stream with B-frames from a certain camera by contacting **Eocortex** technical support team.

The debugging information can provide data regarding the presence of the B-frames in a video stream. To obtain this data, it is required to enable the output of the debugging information in the **Eocortex Client** application. The indication of **(B)** will imply that the B-frames are present in the video stream.

Decoding on GPU

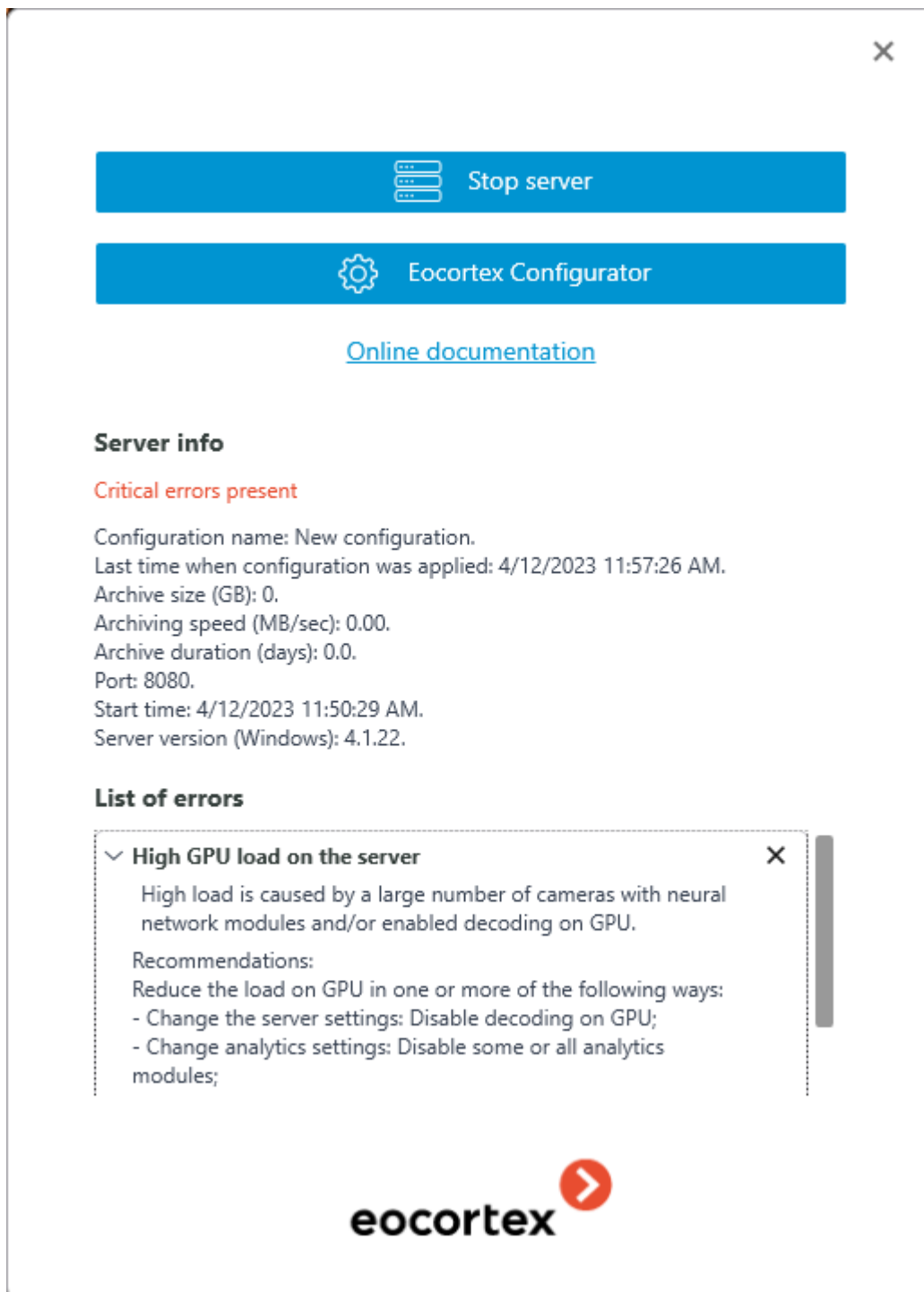
Decoding on GPU allows to reduce the load on CPU caused by processing camera streams, especially when using video analytics modules. It also allows decoding more cameras on a single server. In addition, the cost of the server can be reduced by purchasing a less powerful CPU.



By default, this option is disabled. When enabling it on a server without GPU, decoding will continue on CPU.

At high GPU load a corresponding warning will be displayed in the **Eocortex Client** and **Macroscop Status Info** applications.

Below is an example of such warning in **Macroscop Status Info** with recommendations on how to solve the case of overloading.



The warning appears when the total load on GPU exceeds 85%. If the load becomes less than the threshold value, the warning will disappear.

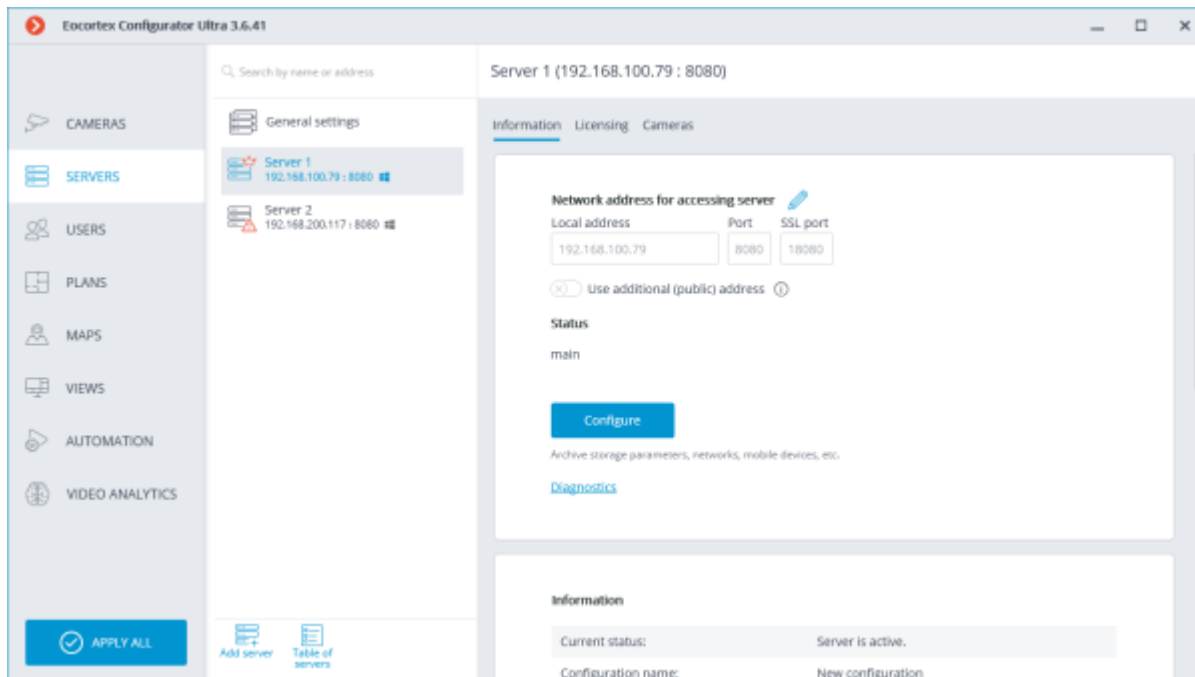
The load on GPU can be reduced in one or more of the following ways:

- Change server settings: disable decoding on GPU;
- Change video analytics settings: disable some or all video analytics modules;
- Re-assign a part of the cameras to another server.

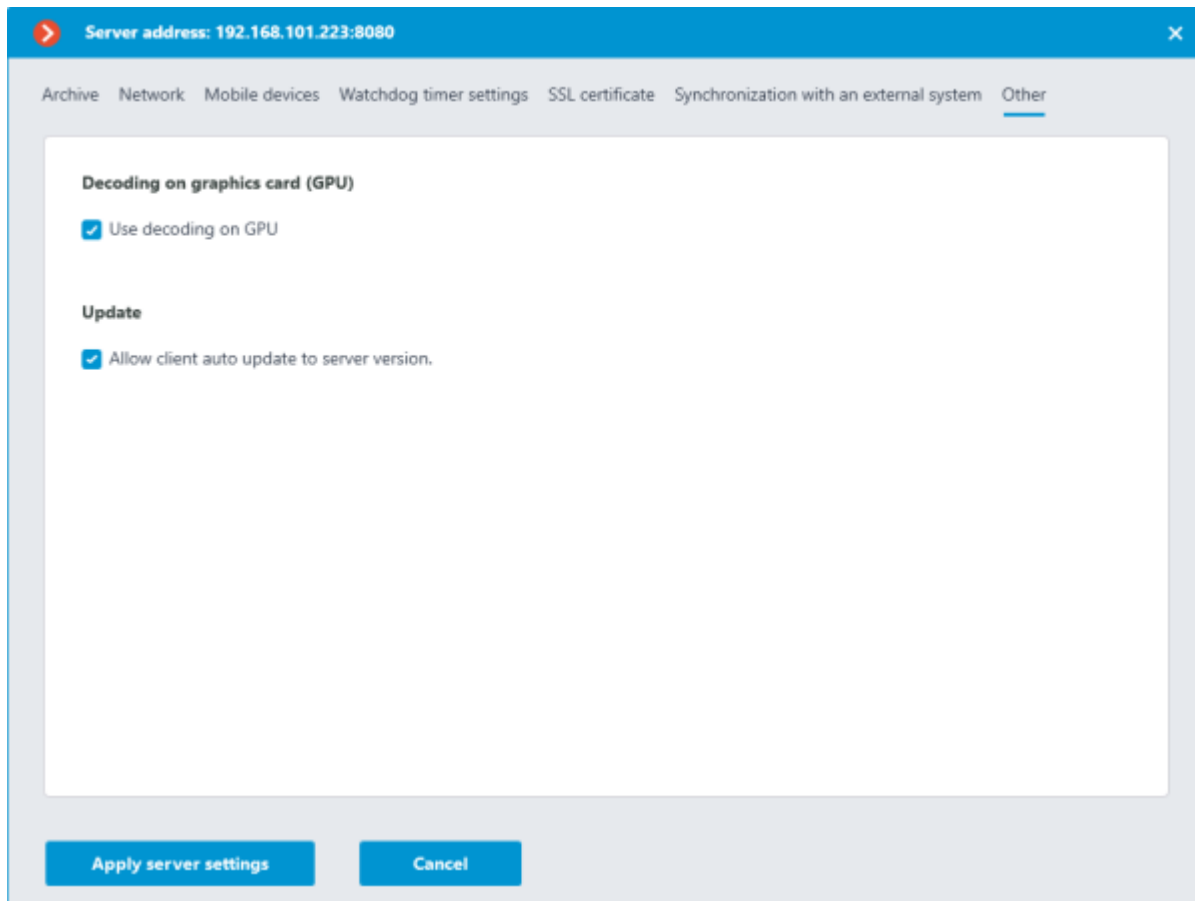
Option settings

Decoding on GPU can be configured in the advanced server settings window.

To open the additional server settings window, select the server on the **Servers** page of **Eocortex Configurator** application and then either select **Configure** in the context menu or click **Configure** on the **Information** tab of the server settings tab.



On the **Other** tab, enable the **Use decoding on GPU** option.



Requirements and recommendations

Only NVIDIA graphics cards are supported.

Only the following codecs are supported: H.264, H.265.

A list of video cards and the codecs they support can be found [in the manufacturer's official table](#).



It is not recommended to use GPU decoding for MJPEG codec due to low efficiency.



It is not recommended to use GPU decoding for enhanced versions of codecs like H.264+ or Wisestream. High GOV value may cause issues with initializing the decoder.

Load balancing

Depending on the GPU load, this option performs a transfer of the processing of part of the cameras to the CPU and vice versa.

- Balancing performs automatically every 10 seconds.
- When the server starts, all cameras are decoded on CPU. Decoding on GPU will start only after 30-40 seconds of server activity.
- If the camera has multiple streams, all streams will be transferred to the selected processing unit during load balancing.
- The load balancing does not count cameras that are disabled or deleted in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.
- If the load on the decoding unit of GPU does not exceed 75%, the cameras will be transferred in parts to GPU until the optimal load is reached.
- If the load on the decoding unit of GPU exceeds 85%, the cameras will be transferred in parts back to CPU.
- Load balancing is supposed to ensure optimal average load on the decoding unit of GPU in the range of 75% to 85% and video memory utilization up to 80-90%.

Generation of RTSP links to cameras in Eocortex Configurator application

The generation of RTSP links allows to facilitate the process of setting up the receipt of the video stream from a camera via the RTSP server of **Eocortex**.

Before, the RTSP links had to be created manually. The detailed process is described in the SDK and API documentation.

Generating a link for a specific camera

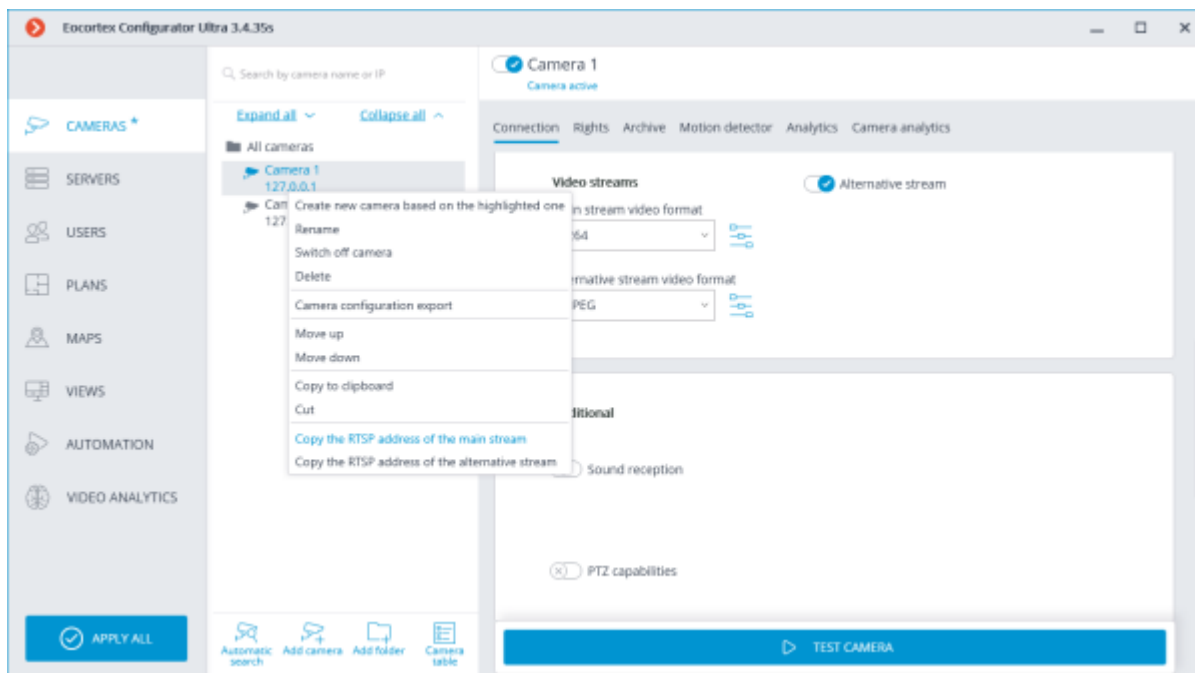
To obtain a RTSP link, it is required to perform the following steps:

Step 1: Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Step 2: Open the  **Cameras** page.

Step 3: Select a camera and open the context menu with the right mouse button.

Step 4: Select the item that allows to copy the RTSP address of the main or alternative stream.



A separate link is generated for each of the streams – main and alternative. At that, the parameter **streamtype=alternative** is used for the alternative video stream.

Generating links for a list of cameras

To obtain the RTSP links, do the following:

Step 1: Launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Step 2: Open the  **Cameras** page.

Step 3: Press the **Cameras table button**.

Step 4: Press the **Export** button.

Step 5: Save the file in the CSV format.

The link does not contain user's login or password – they need to be entered manually in the system where the link is copied.

The RTSP links are not generated if the XPS format has been selected for export.

The RTSP links are also generated for those cameras that have been disabled in the configuration.

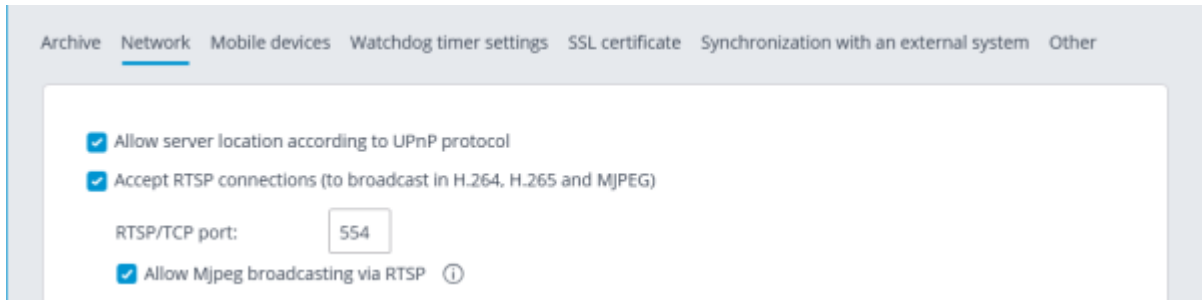
For many systems, the login and password can be pasted directly into the link after the protocol and before the address as follows:

rtsp://login:pass@address/rtsp?channelid=0eea2046-7d4c-4a25-9df8-e0aedae99bed.

Some applications allow to indicate login and password in the separate entry fields or request them.

The RTSP broadcasting may be disabled on the **Eocortex** server; that is why it is required to enable the possibility of RTSP connections to the server before the generation of links.

By default, the IP cameras use port 554 for RTSP broadcasting. However, the port can be modified in the [network settings of the server](#).

Example use of a RTSP link


To connect to the **Eocortex** server via RTSP from the same server as well as from another server, including the cloud one, it is required to do the following:

Step 1: Copy the RTSP link from the server from which the video stream is received via RTSP.

Step 2: Using the **Eocortex Configurator** application, connect to the server that will receive the video stream.

Step 3: Add a RTSP camera and insert the RTSP link into the address field. Enter the **Eocortex** login and user name in the corresponding fields.

The RTSP link is inserted in other applications in the similar fashion, e.g., Windows Media, VLC, MPlayer, RealPlayer, Media Player Classic video players.

Limitation of client connections

Eocortex permits to limit the number of connections to the video surveillance system under the same account.

This option is initially disabled.

Setup of group rights

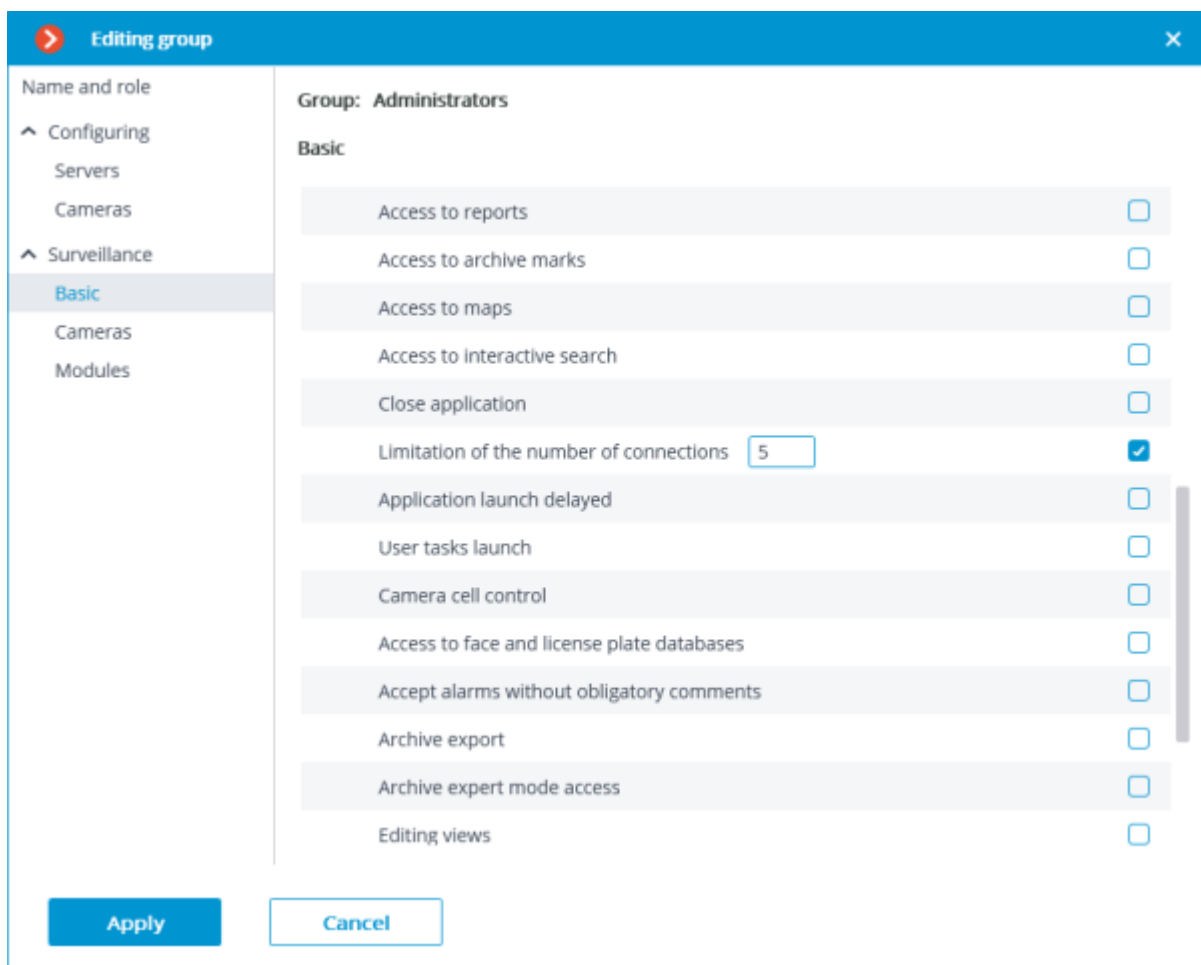
To limit the number of client connections to a user group, it is required to configure the group rights as follows:

Step 1: Open the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the tab  **Users** and press the button **Users of Eocortex applications**.

Step 2: Select a group and press **Edit**.

Step 3: Go to the tab **Basic**.

Step 4: Enable the **Limitation of the number of connections** right and indicate the maximum number of connections for the group members.



The value of the number of connections for users of the group must be at least 1 and no more than 1000. When the right is enabled for the first time, the value is equal to 1.

Step 5: Apply settings.

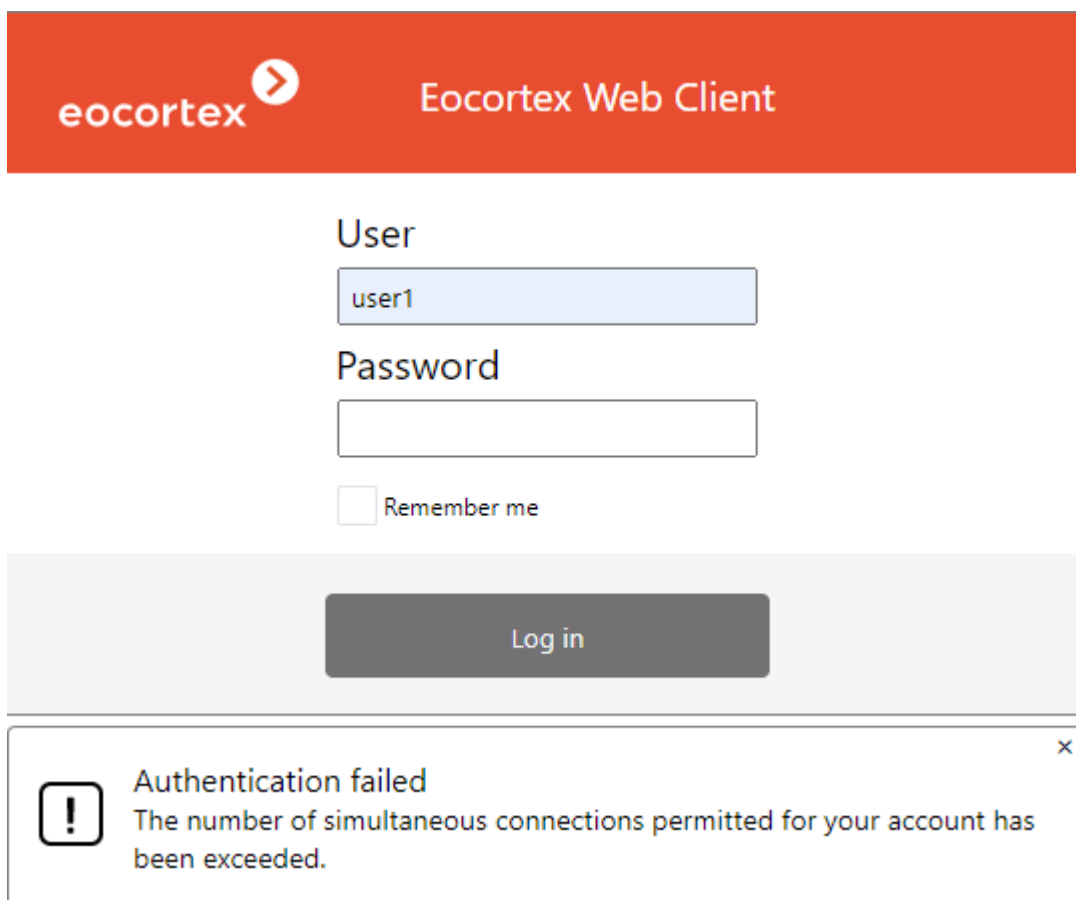
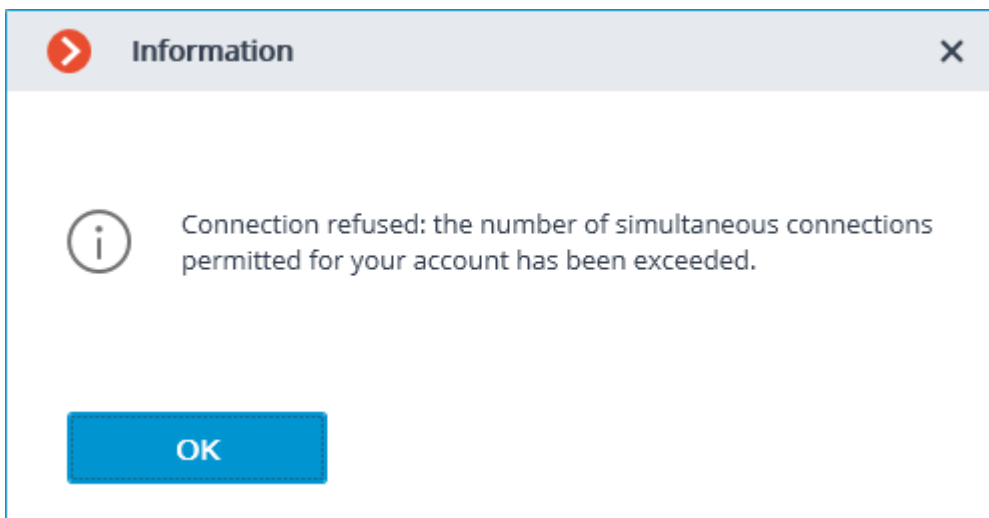
New settings will become effective as soon as they are applied.

The stated limitation applies to each user of the group.

The limitation on the number of client connections also applies to Active Directory users, whereby:

- If an Active Directory user is added to the group as a user, the restriction will apply to him, as well as to the regular users of **Eocortex**.
- If an Active Directory group is added as a user, the restriction will be applied separately to each user of this group.

If the limit has already been reached, an attempt to connect via the client application will result in a message that the number of client connections has been exceeded.



Management of client connections

Client Connection Limitation is the maximum number of unique client connections made under the same user account.

The connections are counted for each account, not as a total for a group of users.

A unique connection identifier is used to track the connections. Each connection to the system is unique in the **Eocortex Client** application. In the **Eocortex Web-client** application, a unique identifier is bound to the address of the client connection to the server.

If the browser is running in the **Incognito** mode, each tab will have its own identifier.

If **Eocortex Web-client** is launched from another browser, it will have a different identifier.

After enabling the right and applying the settings, client connections exceeding the limit will be disconnected randomly.

After reducing the number of connections and applying the settings, current connections that exceed the new limit are not terminated.

A client connection is considered completed if it has not sent requests to the server within 6 minutes.

Thus, when the connection limit is reached, after the completion of one client application, at least 6 minutes must pass to allow a new connection using the same credentials.

Requirements, limitations, features

For this feature to work correctly, it is necessary to ensure that each **Eocortex** server has access to the main server of the system. The reason is that it is the main server that is responsible for counting the client connections throughout the system.

When the connection to the main server is lost, the member server will only count its own connections and restrict connections based on this data. Thus, if the main server is unavailable, the number of client connections for the system as a whole may be exceeded.

After the connection is restored, the main server updates its data using the information from the member server. If after updating the total number of connections by one user has exceeded the limit, the client applications will remain connected. However, new connections by the same user will not be possible.

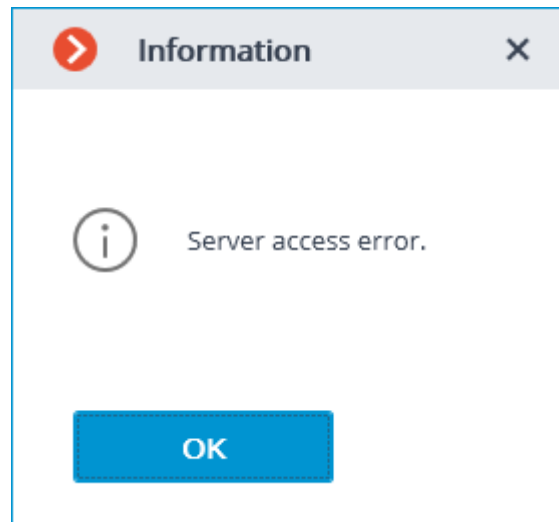
The limitation will not work correctly if the system has servers running Windows 7, since the connections for such servers will be counted locally.

If the main server is using Windows 7, all servers in the system will count the connections locally.

Since **Eocortex** version **4.0**, support for **Windows 7** and **Windows Server 2008** operating systems, as well as **32-bit versions** of other operating systems, is no longer available. This should be considered when installing or upgrading **Eocortex** to version **4.0** or higher.

If the system has servers with **Eocortex** version 3.3 or lower, the client connections to such servers will not be taken into account when limiting the overall number of connections.

When connecting to the **Eocortex** server of version 3.4 and higher with **Eocortex Client** application of version 3.3 or lower, such connections will be counted. In this case, if the connection limit is exceeded, the following error window will appear in the client application:



Using PostgreSQL

This feature is available for all **Eocortex** licenses and requires no additional licensing. Starting from version 3.4 of **Eocortex**, certain components use PostgreSQL database management system of version 11 or later.

Requirements and recommendations

The minimum required DBMS version when working with **Eocortex** 3.6 or lower is PostgreSQL 11.

The minimum required DBMS version when working with **Eocortex** 4.0 or higher is PostgreSQL 12.

If the system version 3.4-3.6 uses or has previously used the **Search for Objects** module, then after updating to version 4.0 the first time **Eocortex** starts, the module database will be moved to the **EocortexArchive\db** directory common to all databases. Module's operation will be suspended while the database is being moved.

If the system previously used Face or License Plate Recognition modules, then after updating to version 4.0 the first time **Eocortex** starts, databases of these modules will migrate from Firebird to PostgreSQL. The modules will be suspended during the migration.

Before installing the required version of PostgreSQL, it is recommended to uninstall other DBMS versions to avoid conflicts.

It is recommended to install PostgreSQL automatically during the installation of **Eocortex** components.

It is recommended to use local disks for storing the database. The use of network drives for this purpose is prohibited.

In large systems it is not recommended to use the same disk for parallel recording of the video archive and the database, as it may adversely affect the performance of the database.

The proper operation of **Eocortex** is not guaranteed when transferring database privileges to manually created DBMS users.

Events are generated at the first authorization and after 6 minutes of no connection with the client.

If at the moment of authorization, the user is blocked in the system or the number of allowed connections is exceeded, then the event is not generated.

If an authorization attempt is made by a mobile application with version 3.3 or lower to the **Eocortex** server with version 3.6 or higher, then the event is not generated.

Audio playback on the camera

In **Eocortex** it is possible to play the audio file on the camera speaker by scenario or as a user task. This feature makes it possible to ensure safety and inform people, e.g., in case of smoke or fire on the site.

Playback of the audio recording on the camera is performed by transmitting a pre-selected audio file from the **Eocortex** server to the camera.

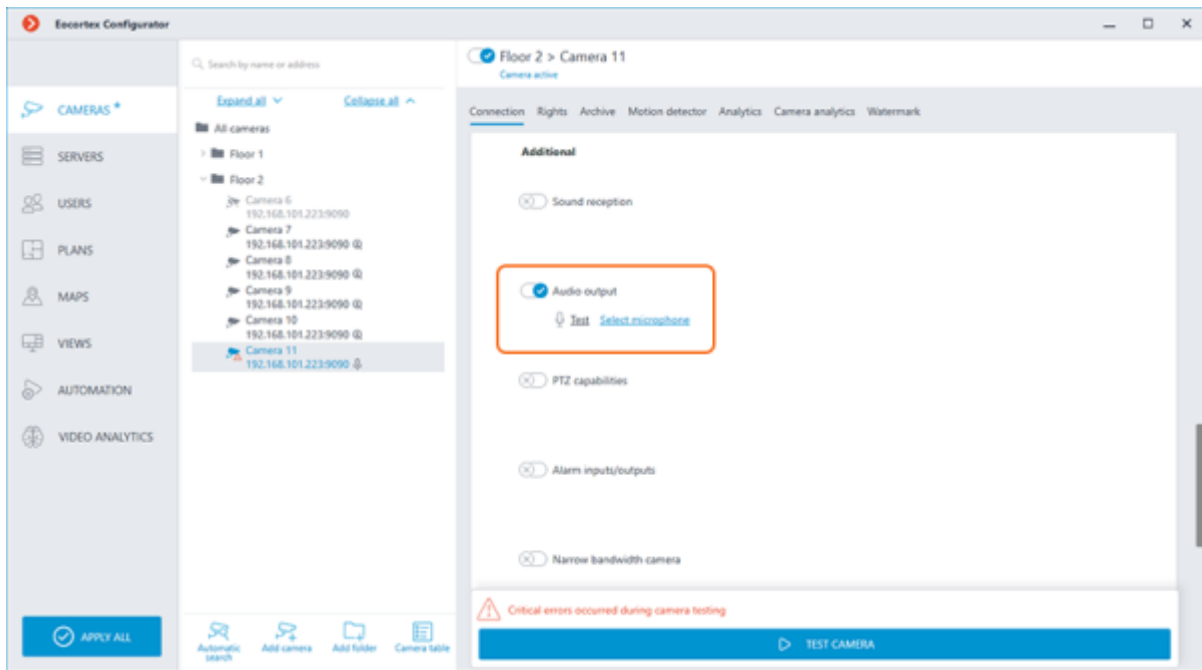
Setting in Eocortex Configurator

Audio playback is only available on cameras that have a built-in speaker or that allows to connect an external one.

Do the following to set up audio playback on the camera:

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

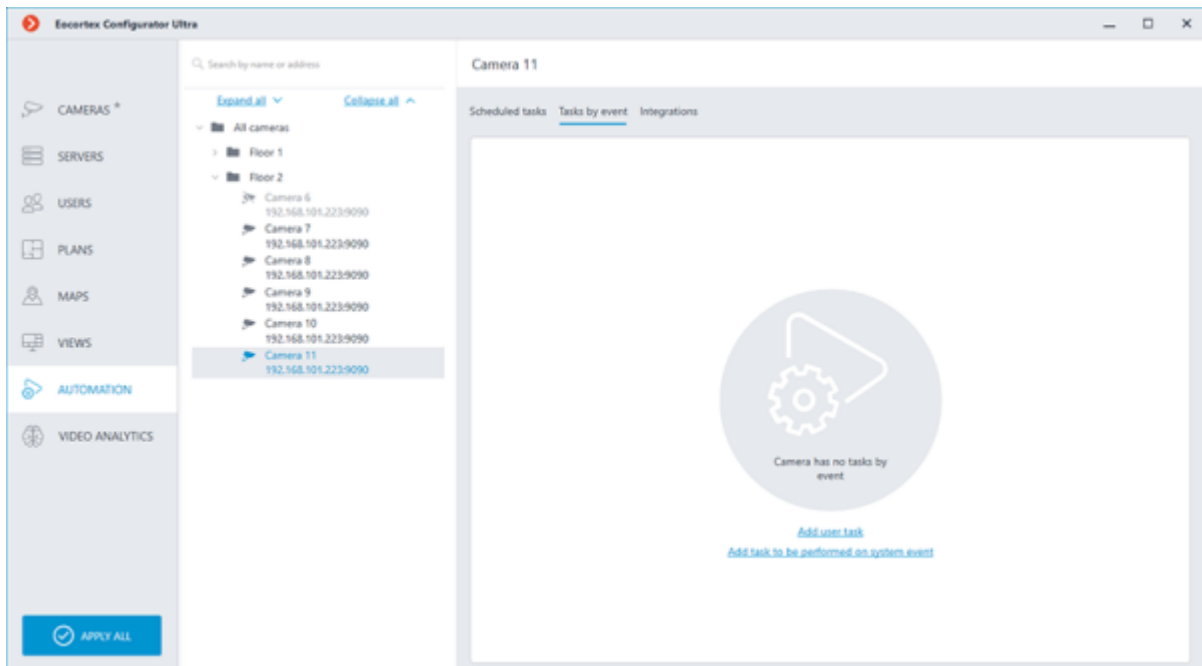
Go to the  **Cameras** page.



Select a camera in the list.

Scroll down the camera settings to the **Additional** section and activate the  **Sound transmission** slider.

Go to the  **Automation** page.

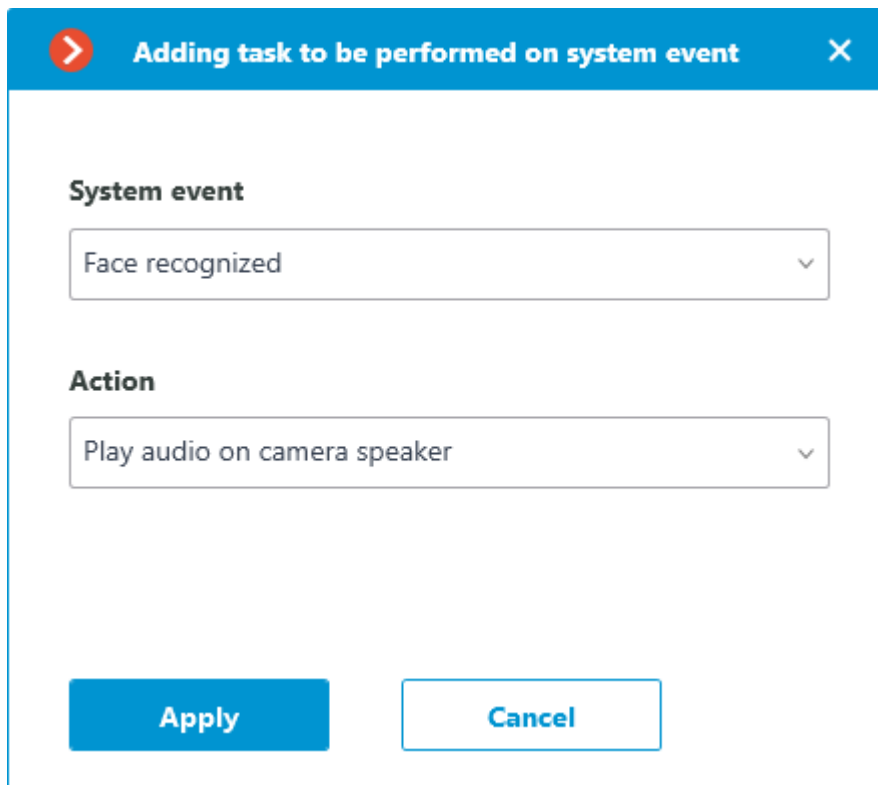


Select the camera or an entire folder in the list.

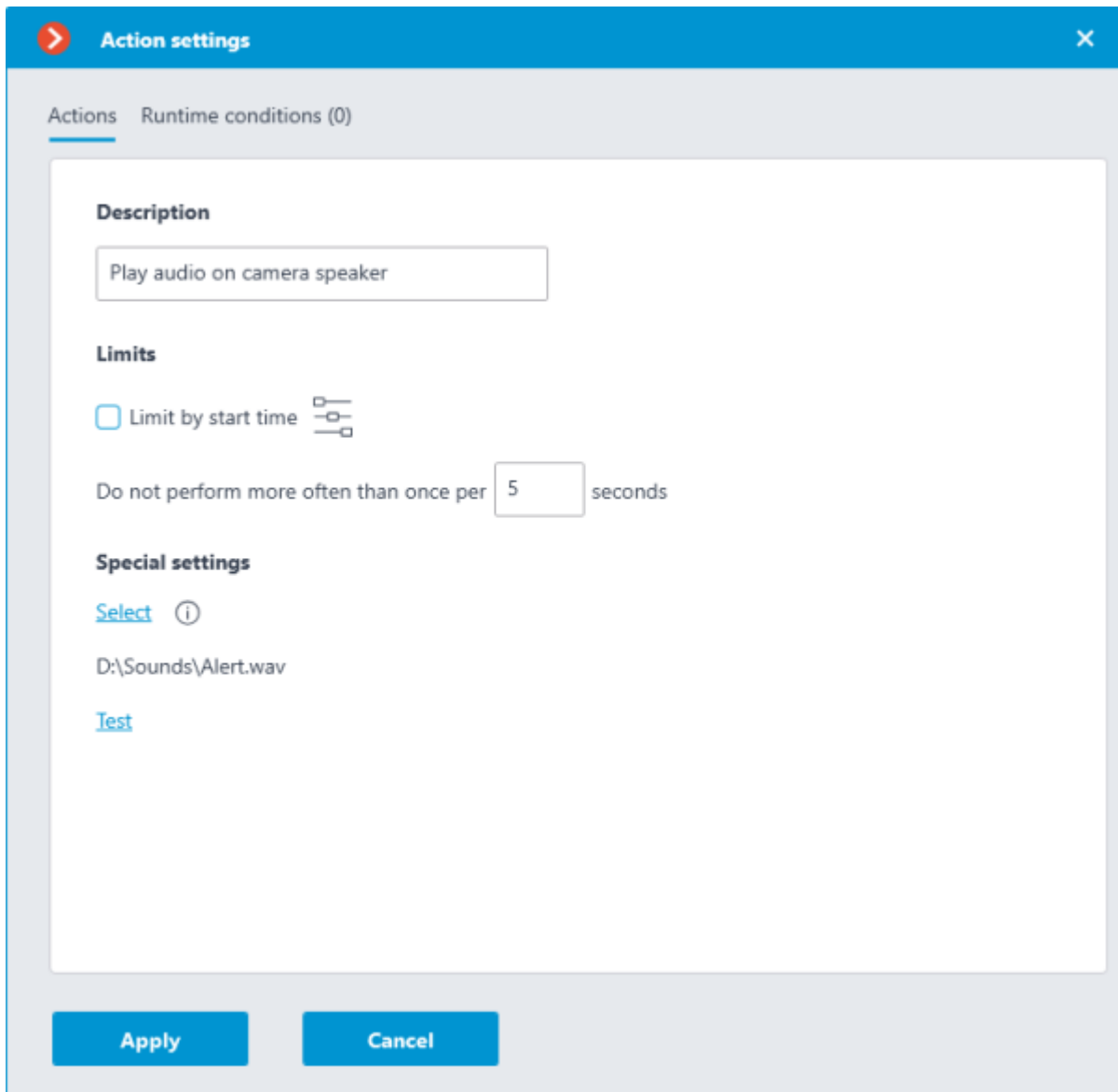
On the right part of the window, switch to the **Tasks by event** tab.

Select from the Events menu the event in the system for which the audio recording is to be played.

Select from the Actions list the **Play audio on camera speaker** and press the **Apply** button.



Select an audio file.



The audio file must be on the same computer with the **Eocortex** server to which the camera is connected. When configuring the **Play audio on camera speaker** action, the **Eocortex Configurator** application must be launched on this computer.

The duration of the audio record should not exceed the time interval specified in the **Do not perform more often than once per** parameter.

Test the playback of the audio on the camera by pressing the **Test** button.

The same way can be configured [user tasks](#), executing the **Play audio on camera speaker** action.

Requirements to the audio file

File format: WAV

Sampling Rate: 8000Hz

Bits Per Sample: 16

Channels: 1

It is recommended to make a short pause at the beginning of the audio track, since part of the track can be lost if the connection with the camera takes a long time.

Custom notifications and webhooks

Eocortex provides the option of sending extended and customizable information about the event to external users and automated systems. This is possible by adding special template variables when configuring [actions](#) in the **Automation** section.

Only certain **Actions** can be set up with template variables.

This feature can be used, for example, to send the name, group and ID of a recognized person to the ACS so that the ACS will open the door.

Security

Active Directory Single Sign-On

Eocortex supports the capability of logging into the system using **Active Directory** Pass-Through Authentication. This allows users to log into the **Eocortex** system through a domain user account without re-entering the login and password manually.

This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

Single Sign-On through **Active Directory** is available only for servers running on Windows.

Abandoned Objects Detection

The **Abandoned Objects Detection** is intended for finding objects that have stayed in the field of view of the camera without moving for the time that exceeds the preset value.



When an abandoned object is detected, the corresponding alarm is generated and the object becomes highlighted in the frame. It is possible to set a user action scenario for this alarm. Moreover, all the alarms are stored in the event log, allowing to view all the abandoned objects in the video archive.

The module can be used for locating abandoned objects outside or inside.

Details

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the module.

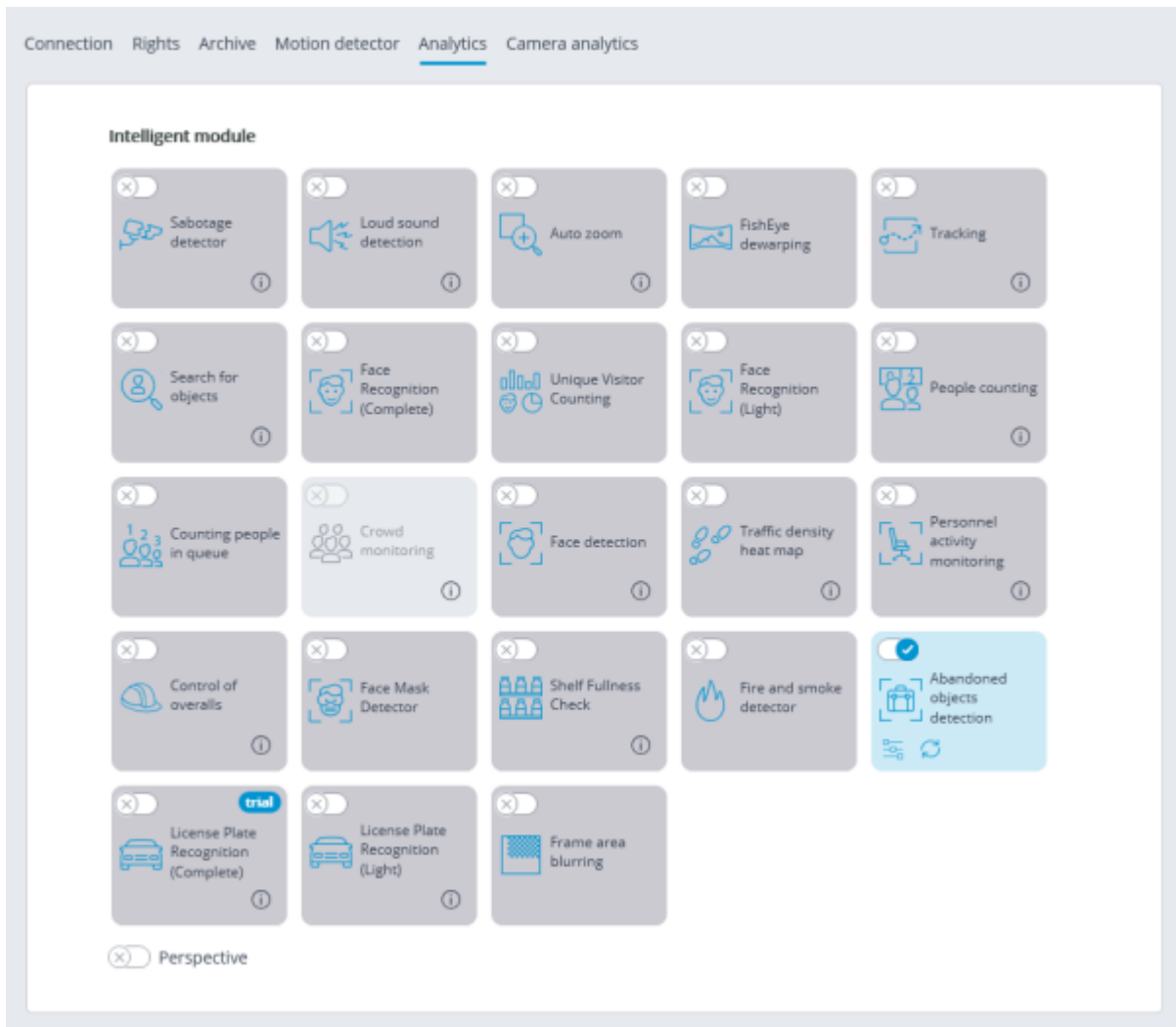

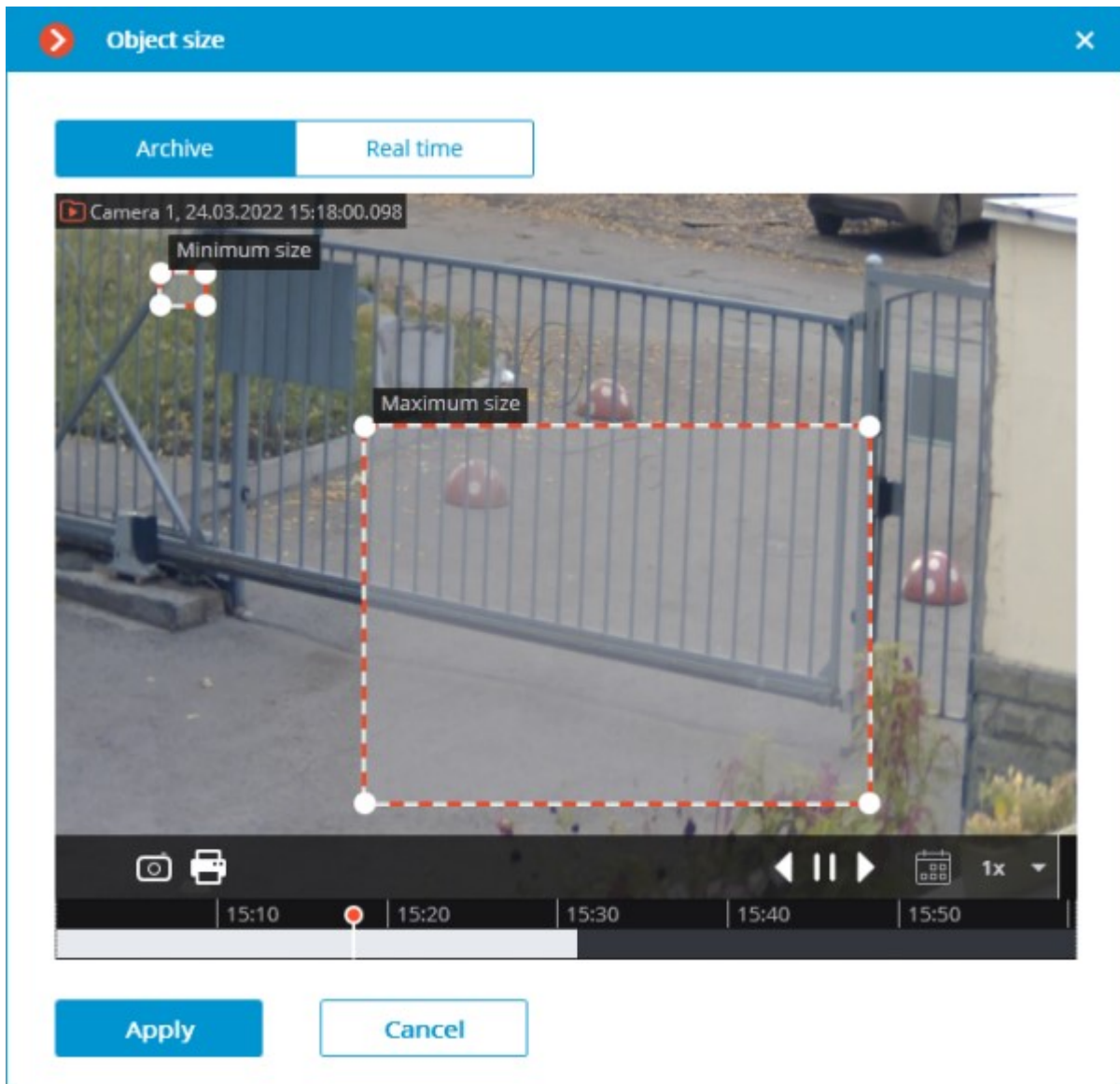

In the opened window the following settings have to be made:

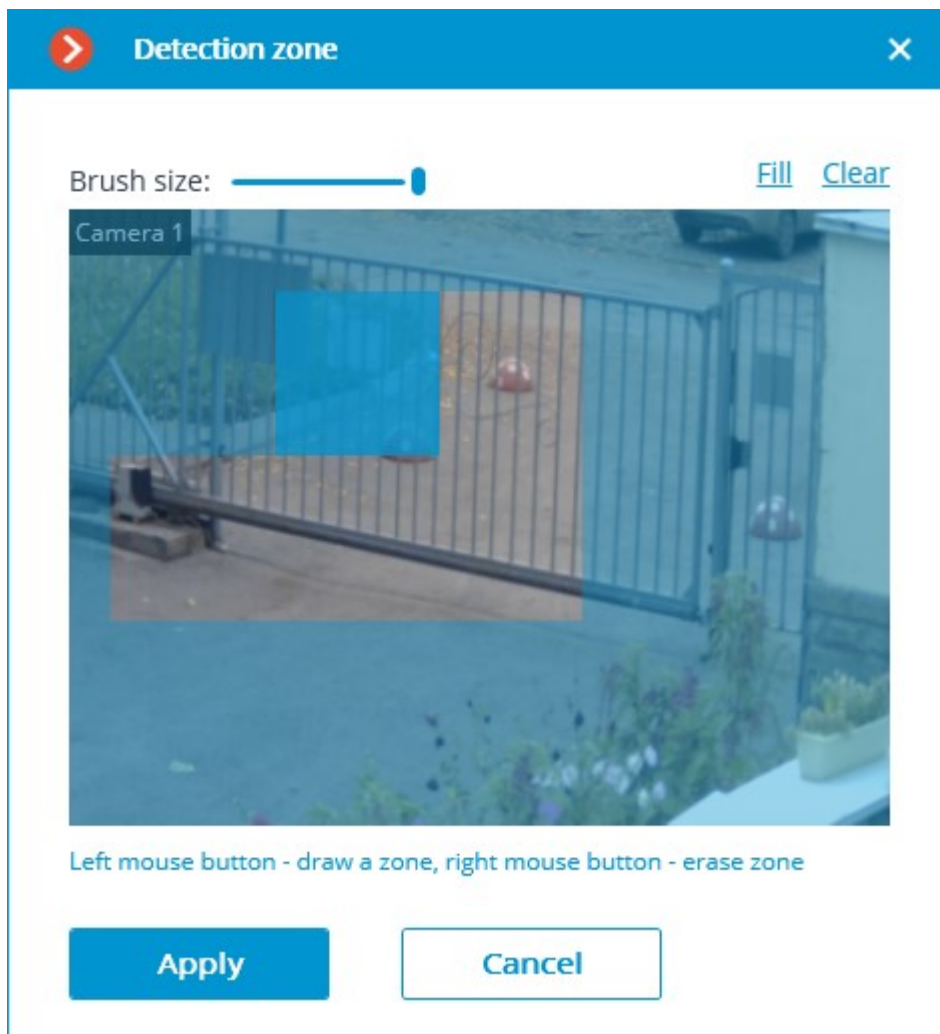
Detection time: the objects that do not move during the time that exceeds the time preset in this window will be considered abandoned. The time from 30 seconds to 10 minutes can be set.

Set object size limits: opens the window where the minimum and maximum sizes of the objects that may be considered abandoned are set.



Set detection zone: opens the window where the Abandoned Objects Detection zone is set.

Detection zones are the zones of the frame bounded by a closed polygon. The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.



The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

After launching or relaunching, the module will need time for learning. During the learning process the objects will not be detected. This period roughly equals the double detection time set in the settings.

For reducing module learning errors, it is recommended to ensure that during the launch of the video surveillance server there are no moving objects in the frame, and the static background is not blocked by temporary static and slow-moving objects.

Requirements and recommendations

For detecting the abandoned objects, it is required to provide the following conditions:

- Static and reliable camera fixing.
- View from the above, or perspective view from the above.
- Absence of refocusing and changing image sharpness.
- Absence of non-mobile or slow-moving objects in the frame, for example, trees or clerks sitting at their desks. Such objects in the frame may lead to false triggering of the detector. At the same time, the presence of a non-mobile object close to the abandoned object may result in the triggering of the detector since the abandoned object and the non-mobile object may incorporate into one moving area.
- Absence of the light sources slowly changing their position in the frame.

The most favorable conditions are as follows:

- Static background.
- No windows in the frame.
- Small quantity of moving objects.
- Constant lighting; for example, light fixtures in the premises.
- The abandoned objects are not blocked by other objects.
- The abandoned object color differs significantly from the color of the background.
- Absence or small number of the outstanding small-size objects.

Influence of the module's settings:

- Detection zones: if more than a half of the object is in the zone, the object is detected; if not, it is not detected.
- Maximum dimensions: if both dimensions (width and height) are smaller than the set maximum dimensions, the object is detected; if at least one of the dimensions exceeds the set limitations, the object is not detected.
- Minimum dimensions: if both dimensions (width and height) are larger than the set minimum dimensions, the object is detected; if at least one of the dimensions is smaller than the set limitations, the object is not detected.
- If one of the dimensions of the object is close to the set limitations, the probability of the detector's triggering decreases.

Since the current version of the module cannot determine the shifts of the objects (insignificant changes of the object's position), such shifts will result in the triggering of the detector.

There are no more particular requirements to the frame's parameters or the software motion detector's settings.



Auto Zoom

The **Auto Zoom** module serves to display a separate zoomed-in area of the frame with the moving objects in the **Eocortex Client** application.



Details

The **Auto Zoom**, **FishEye Dewarping** and **Frame Area Blurring** modules are mutually exclusive, meaning that only one of these modules can be used on a camera at a given moment.

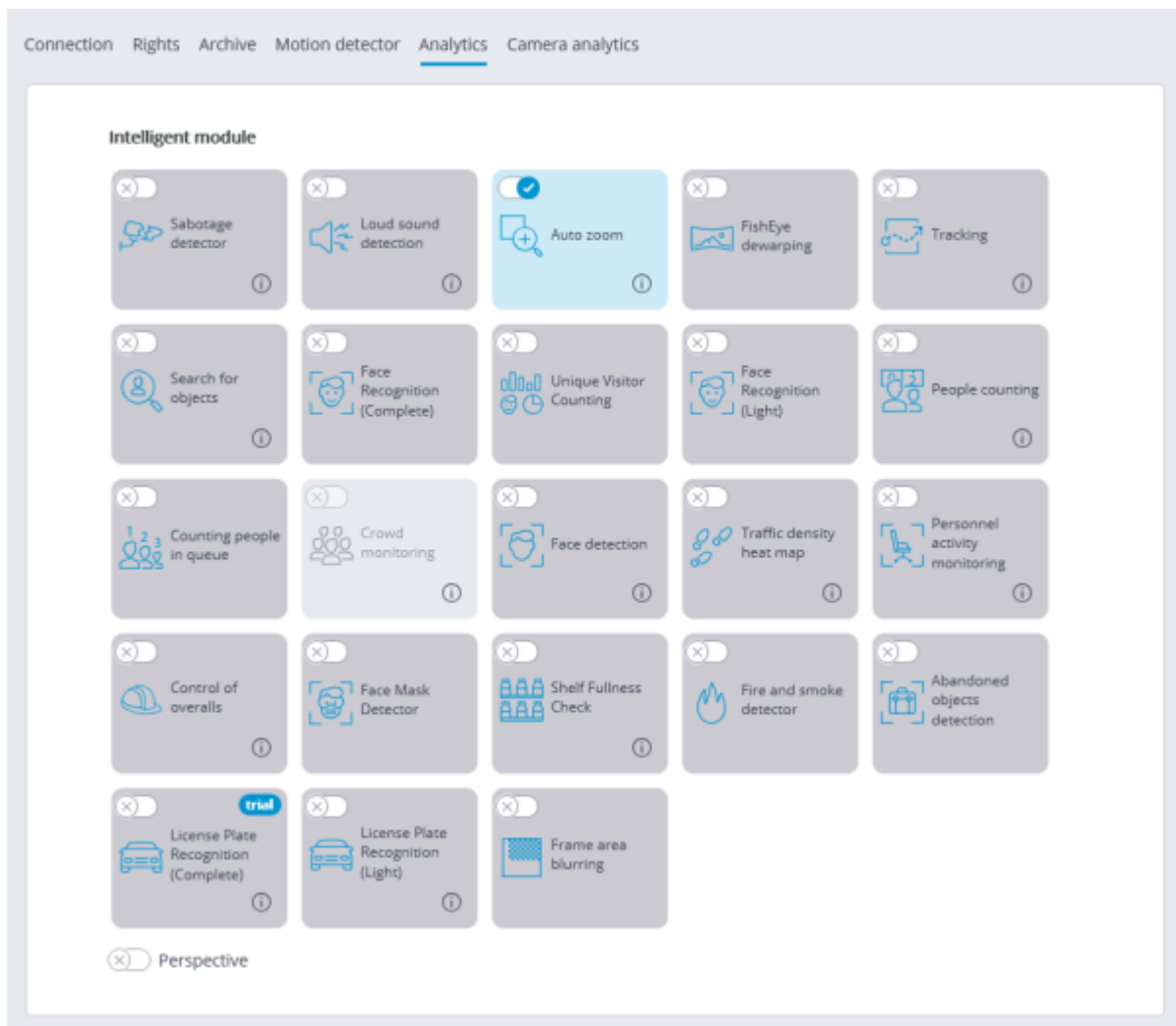

Temperature for recognized faces


Description

The **Eocortex** server receives the temperature of a person from the camera. If the automatic calibration using a black body calibrator has been configured, the resulting temperature is corrected according to the specified settings.

Setup

To enable support of the **Temperature for recognized faces** video analytics used on a thermal camera, it is required to toggle the switch  on the **Camera analytics** tab in the camera settings in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.



To open the analytics settings, it is required to press .

Alarm temperature, °C: If this preset temperature threshold is reached or exceeded, an alarm will be triggered.

If a black body calibrator is used to automatically calibrate the thermal camera, it can be configured by enabling the **Black body settings** option and setting the following parameters:

Temperature set on black body.: Set black body temperature, °C.

Measured black body area coordinates, pixels (X, Y, W, H): Optional. Frame area where the search for black body will be performed by the highest temperature. 0,0, _ , _ - upper left corner coordinates.

In order to update the black body settings on the server, it is required to click the **Update black body settings** link. In this case, the fields **Measured black body coordinates, pixels (X, Y)**, **Thermal frame resolution, pixels (W x H)** and **Measured black body temperature, °C** will display data transmitted by the camera.

Use

To set up automatic calibration, it is required to follow the steps below.

1. Enter the temperature set on the black body calibrator in the **Temperature set on black body.** field. If a value of zero **0** is entered, no automatic temperature compensation will be performed.



2. Make sure that there are no people in the frame and click the **Update black body settings** link.
3. If the coordinates or the temperature of the black body do not match the actual values, adjust the area of the black body.
4. Press **OK** and apply the settings.

Requirements and recommendations

Ideally, there should be no objects in the frame whose temperature is higher than that of a person.

Since the highest temperature on the face is usually found in the inner corner of the eye, in the cases described below the temperature of a person may be determined as being lower than in reality:

- if the face of a person is tilted and the inner corner of the eye is not visible to the camera;
- if a person is far from the camera and the inner corner of the eye in the frame is too small;
- if a person is wearing glasses, the temperature of the inner corners of their eyes cannot be determined.

If a person is too close to the camera, the thermal camera may pick up hot objects (e.g., incandescent lamps) behind the person since the thermal camera and the video camera are at a distance between them.

The following can be done to improve the accuracy of the measurements:

- make the thermal imaging background for cameras more or less uniform;
- remove any objects with the temperature that exceeds the human temperature from the thermal imaging background (e.g., by bringing the camera closer or moving it);
- move the black body so that it is as close to the detected person as possible.

By changing the value of **Temperature set on black body.**, it is possible to compensate for the temperature detection in the current conditions.

Troubleshooting

If the displayed temperature does not approach the actual temperature on the black body or the coordinates are much displaced, the area should be adjusted (in particular, it will be required to remove all objects whose temperature exceeds the black body temperature) and update the settings.

Counting People in Queue

The **Counting People in Queue** module is intended for counting people in lines and warning the operator about the exceedance of the preset threshold.

Capabilities of the module

- Setting of up to six lines (queues) in the frame as the non-intersecting controlled zones.
- Counting people in each of the lines.
- Generation of the alarm when the preset threshold of the number of persons in a line is exceeded.
- Generation of the reports regarding the number of people in each of the lines.
- Real-time display of the quantity of people in each of the lines.

Details

For the module to work properly, it is necessary to correctly position and configure the camera, install the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package, and enable and configure the module.

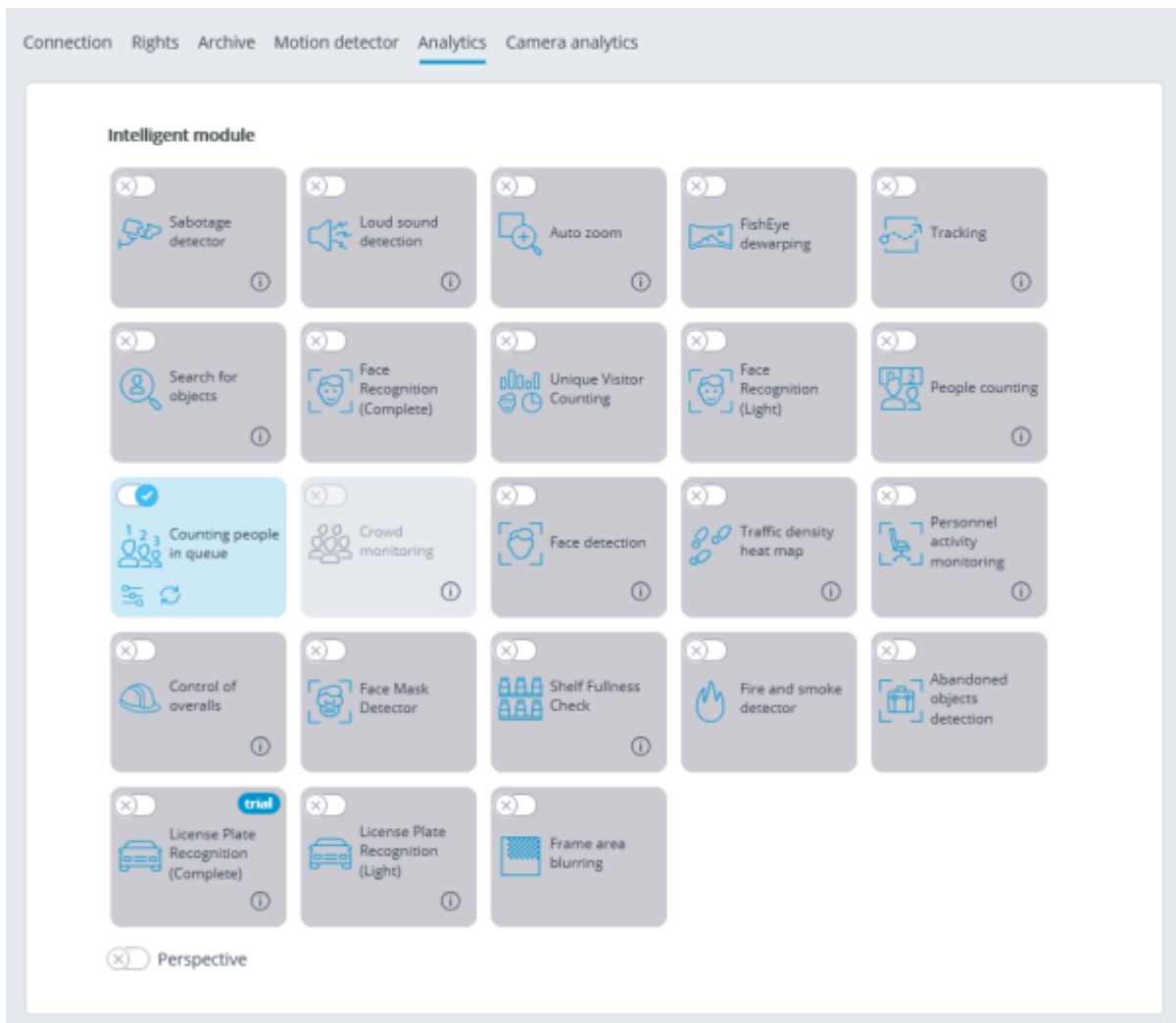

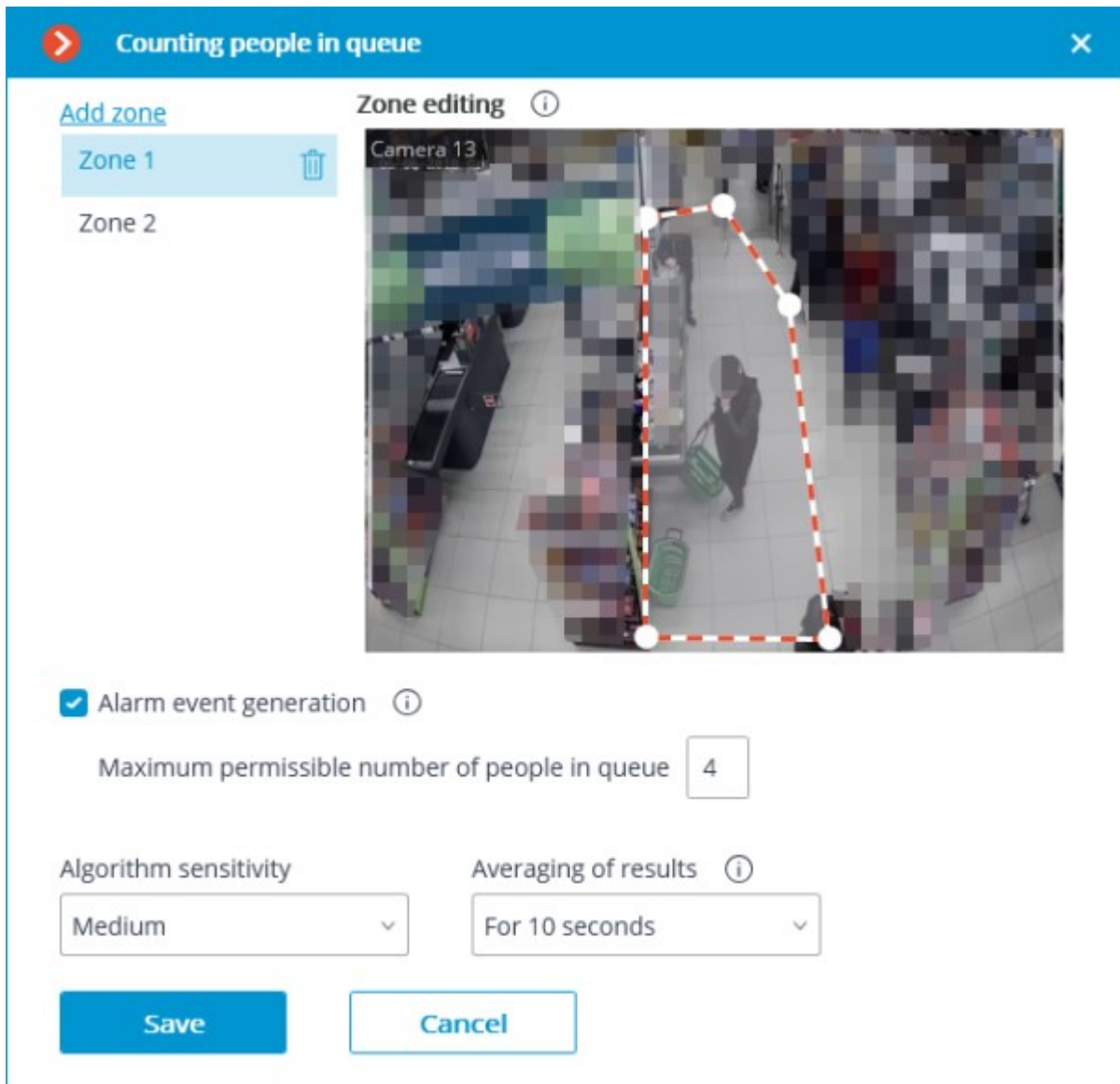

Detection zones are the zones of the frame bounded by a closed polygon. The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

Alarm event generation: when this option is enabled and in the case of the number of people in the zone exceeding the value set in the Maximum permissible number of people in queue, the **Large number of people in the queue** alarm event will be generated.

Algorithm sensitivity is the internal value of the module. If the module fails to correctly detect people in the set zone, it is required to increase the sensitivity; if the module counts the foreign objects as people, it is needed to lower the sensitivity.

Averaging of results allows to make counting more resistant to the sharp changes of the quantity of people in the zone. At the same time, the raise of the averaging interval leads to the lag between the actual change of the number of people in the queue and the reflection of this change in the system. The following averaging periods are available: 10, 15, 30 and 60 seconds; it is also possible to disable the usage of averaged results.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

Image requirements

The camera must be fixed in position.

The camera tilt angle must be between 40 and 70 degrees to the vertical plane.

A person to be counted must have at least 70% of its head visible.

The people may overlap each other but to ensure detection of both the overlapped and the one who overlaps him/her the overlapping in the head and shoulders area shall not exceed 30%.

The head and shoulders of a person must comprise at least 10% of the largest dimension of the counting zone and have a size of at least 30×30 pixels.

The head and shoulders of a person must comprise less than 50% of the largest dimension of the counting zone.

The image must be in color.

The image must have a moderate contrast; the people must be distinguishable from the background.

The people to be detected must not be too blurred.

The image compression rate shall ensure the medium or better image quality; the compression must not create significant artifacts.

The optimal image resolution for ensuring proper operation of the module is HD or FullHD.

Hardware and software requirements



Eocortex Neural Networks package must be installed before it will be possible to use neural networks-based features of the module.

The following equipment is required to use this neural network-based module:

- A processor with AVX instructions support;
- swap file at least half of the total RAM size.

It is also possible (optional) to use a video card. In this case, an NVIDIA video card (GPU) with a computing capability index of at least 6.5 and a memory size of at least 4GB is required, and the characteristics and performance of the graphics card must be at least as good as the NVIDIA GTX 1650 Super.

If the package will be installed on a virtual machine, it may additionally be required to:

- Enable support for AVX instructions in the guest machine settings;
- Use GRID drivers for GPU virtualization.



Eocortex must use video cards selected for running neural networks in monopoly mode. It is not allowed to use such card for other applications or tasks that consume GPU resources, including for displaying video. Simultaneous use of a video card for several tasks may lead to incorrect system operation: from analytics performance degradation to server instability.



The neural network works with the 64-bit version of **Eocortex** only.



When upgrading Eocortex to another version, it is necessary to also upgrade the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package to the corresponding version.

Performance

The time it takes the CPU to process one frame, depending on the CPU used, may be up to 2 seconds.

The time it takes the module to update the data for each camera is in a linear dependence of the number of cameras using the module.

The usage of the GPU permits to lessen the CPU load and reduce the time of processing of one frame.

All the cameras are processed by the same module, so the increase of the number of cameras using the module does not lead to the proportional raise of the computational load; only the decoding time for each additional camera will be longer.

When the module operates on the CPU, its load will always be relatively high, so it is advisable to use the GPU for the module's operation.

The architecture of the module is such that when it is launched on even a single camera, the module immediately allocates a large volume of computing resources for its needs. When the number of cameras using the module is increased later, the load is only moderately increased.

Directly after the launching, the module allocates a significant amount of RAM - around 1,5 Gb. After several minutes the majority of the resources is freed and the usage of RAM by the module becomes low.

Crowd Monitoring

The **Crowd Monitoring** is intended to count people in crowds and alert the operator in case of the preset limit is exceeded.

Capabilities of the module

- Setting up to six zones in the frame and setting a quantitative criterion for each zone: the maximum acceptable level.
- Counting of the number of people in each zone.
- Alarm generation in case of exceedance of maximum acceptable level in the zone.
- Creation of reports with the number of people in each of the zones.
- Real-time display of the number of people in each zone and the maximum acceptable level.



Estimation of the number of people is performed analytically, with the help of the special algorithms, so the estimated number of people may differ from their actual quantity.

Details

For correct operation of the module it is imperative to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector, perspective and the module itself.

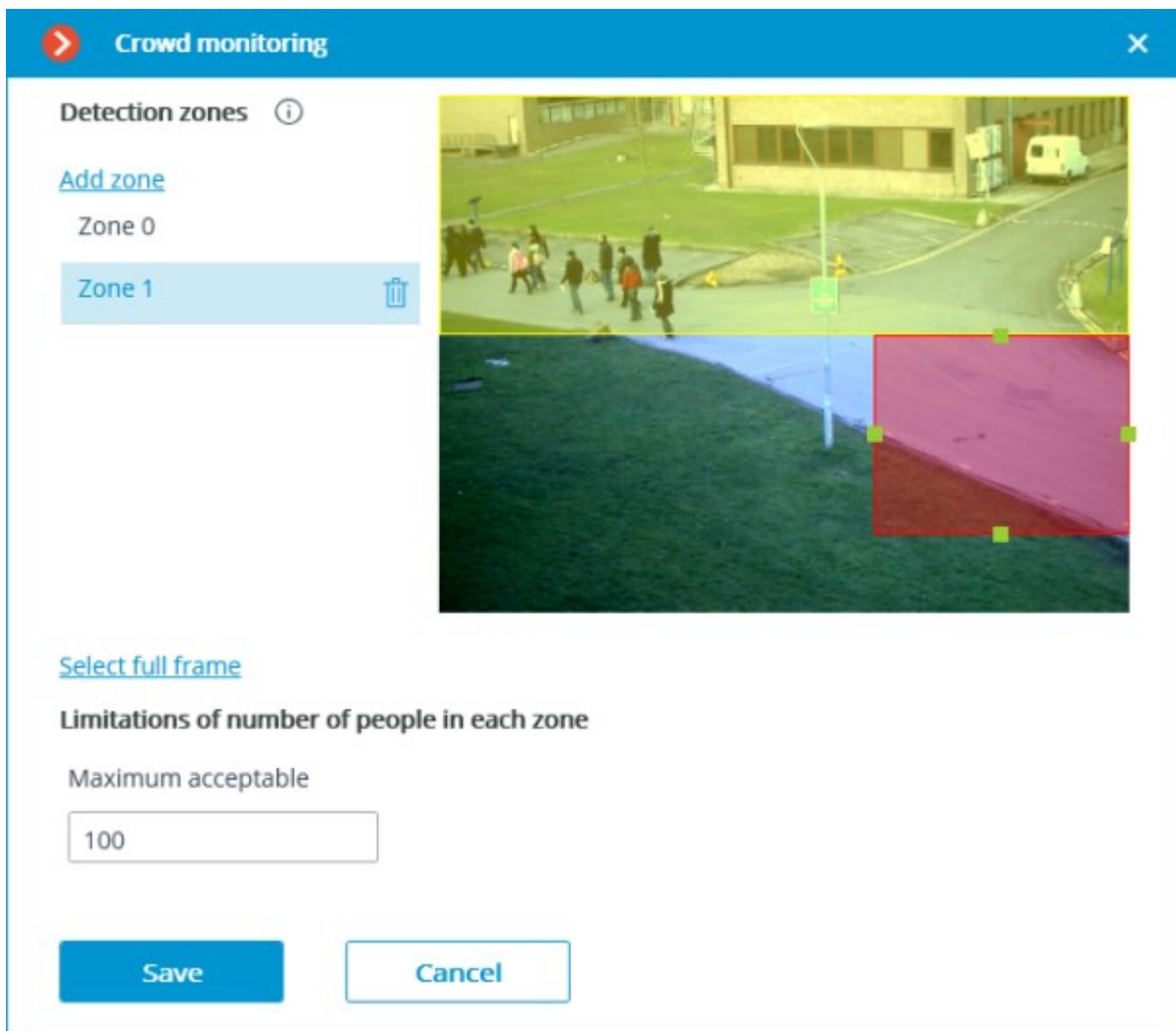

Perspective 



In the opened window, set and adjust up to six detection zones.

Detection zones are the zones of the frame bounded by a closed polygon. The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

To avoid counting errors at the zone borders it is recommended, wherever practical, to use the smallest possible number of zones.

It makes sense to use several zones in the following situations:

- If there are an automobile road and a pedestrian zone in the frame. In this case it is required to limit the controlled area to the pedestrian zone.
- If there is a rest area in the frame that is crossed by the pedestrian way with heavy foot traffic. In case it is necessary to prevent people from flocking in the recreational area, the controlled area shall be limited to the rest area.

It is needed to indicate the limit of the number of people for each zone: **Maximum acceptable** level.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

When installing the camera, it is recommended to meet the following requirements:

- Heads and shoulders of the people to be counted must be in full view.

- Minimum head size is 1/30 of the largest dimension of the zone. For example, for the 1024x640 zone the size of the head must be no less than $1024/30 = 34$ pixels.

There are no specific requirements regarding the framerate and video stream format.

Emergency Vehicle Detection

The **Emergency Vehicle Detection** module allows recognizing fire, ambulance, and police vehicles in the real-time mode. The recognition is available for predefined areas of the frame. To avoid false positives, a minimum time can be set for special vehicles to be in the area. Recognition events can be used in automation scenarios. For example, to automatically open the barrier.

Capabilities of the module

The following emergency vehicles can be recognized:

Ambulance,

Fire engine,

Police car.



All the module events are recorded in the [Events log](#).

For the correct operation of the module it is required to set up the software motion detector. There are no specific requirements to the image.

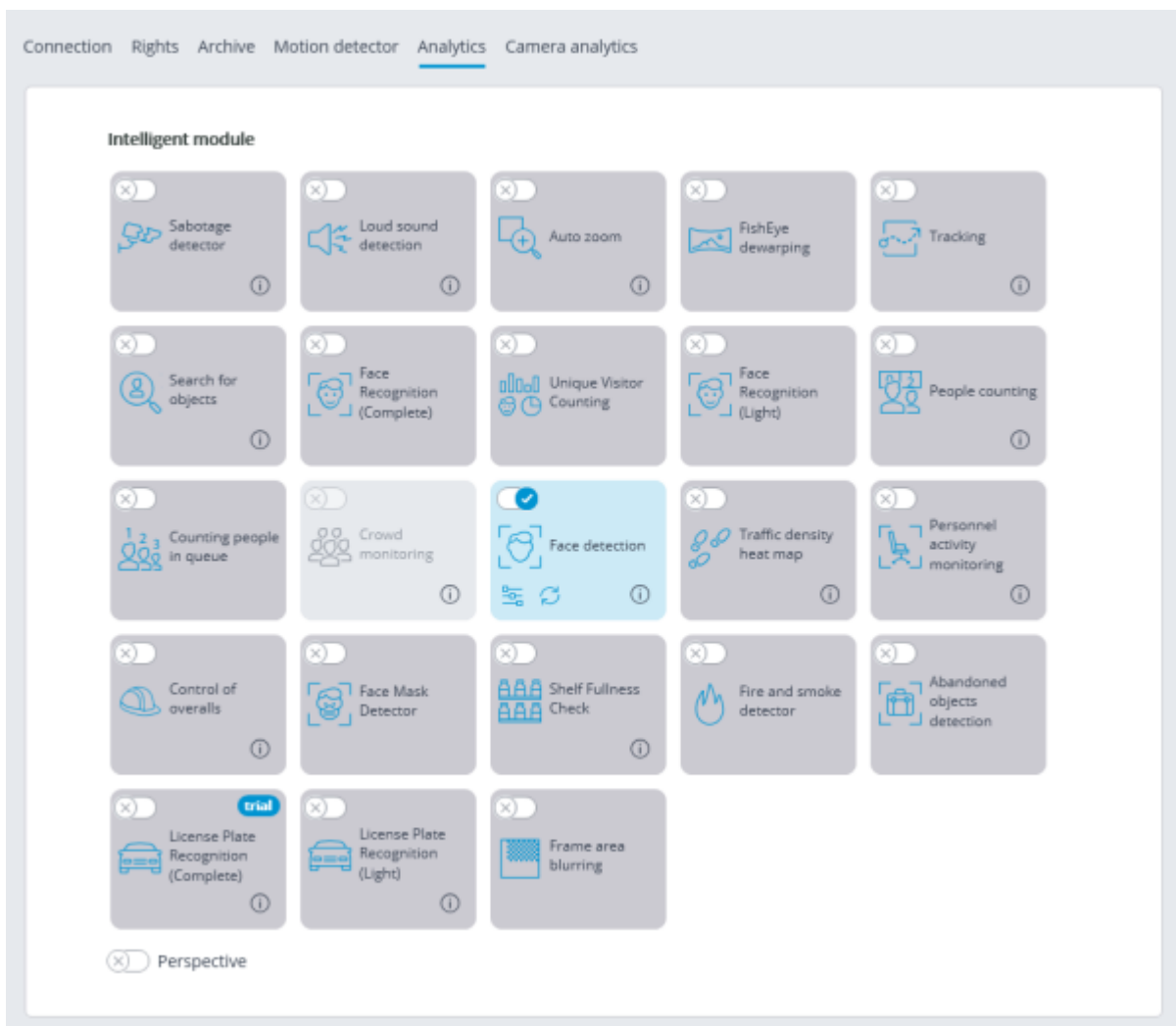

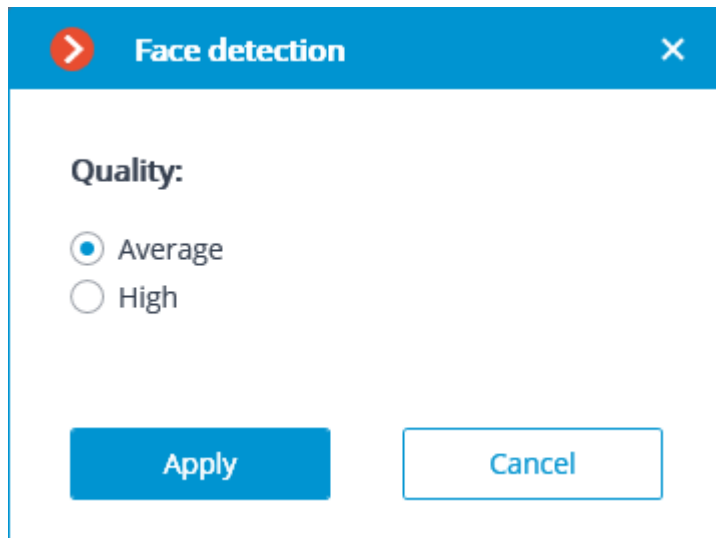

The **Face Mask Detector** module is designed to detect people not wearing medical face masks in the frame. When such persons are detected, the module highlights them in the frame with a square in real time and enters the event in the event log.

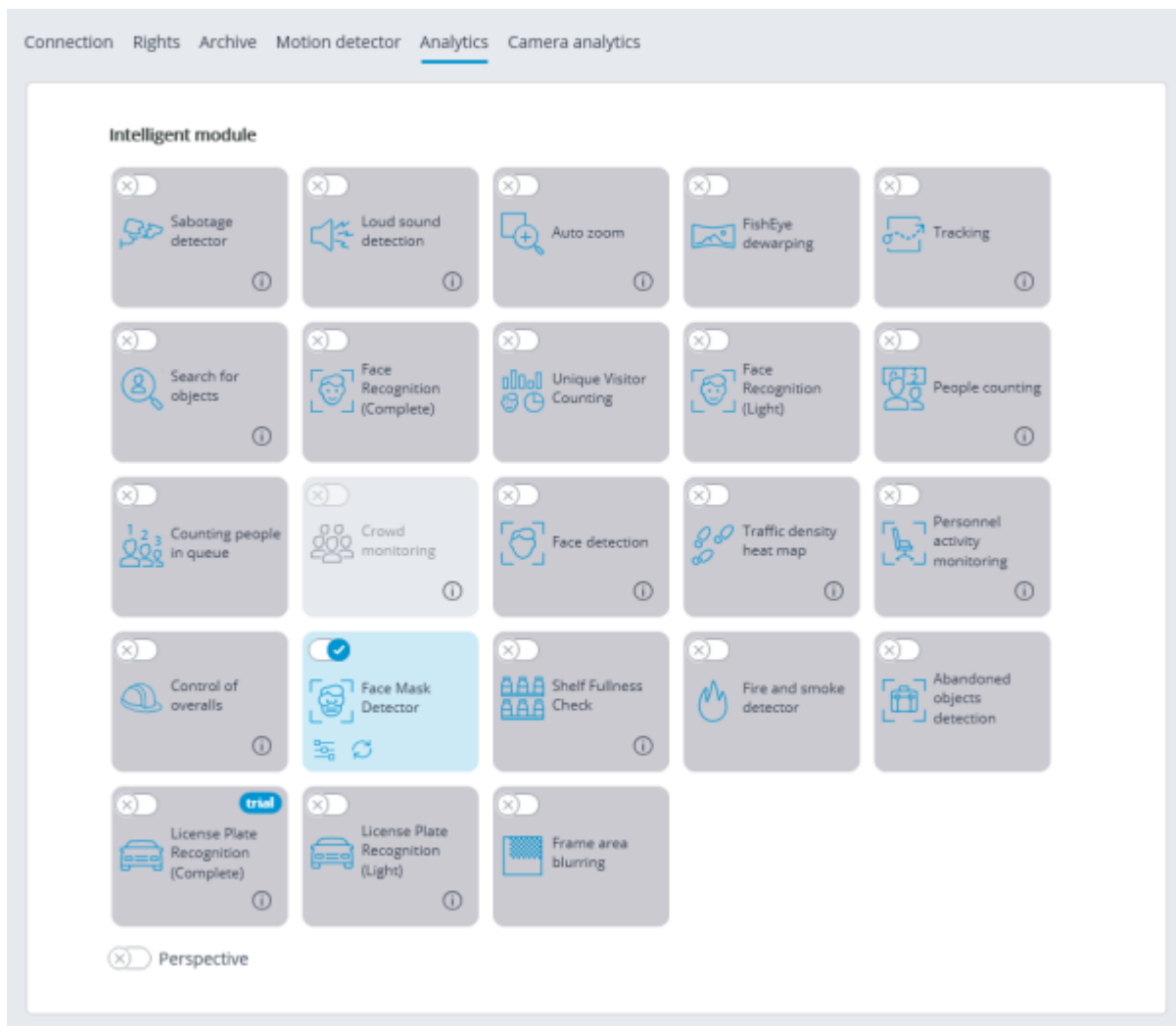

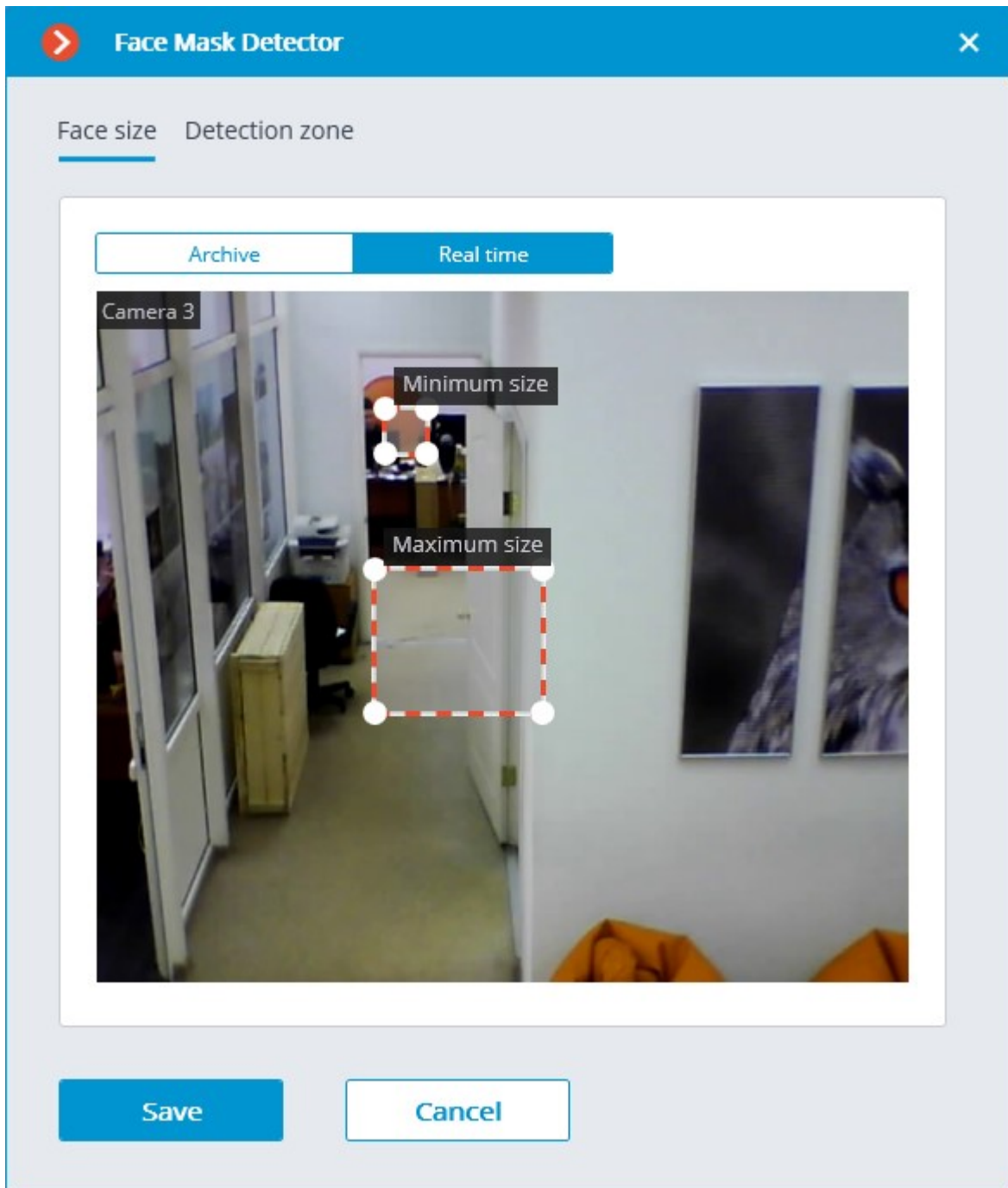

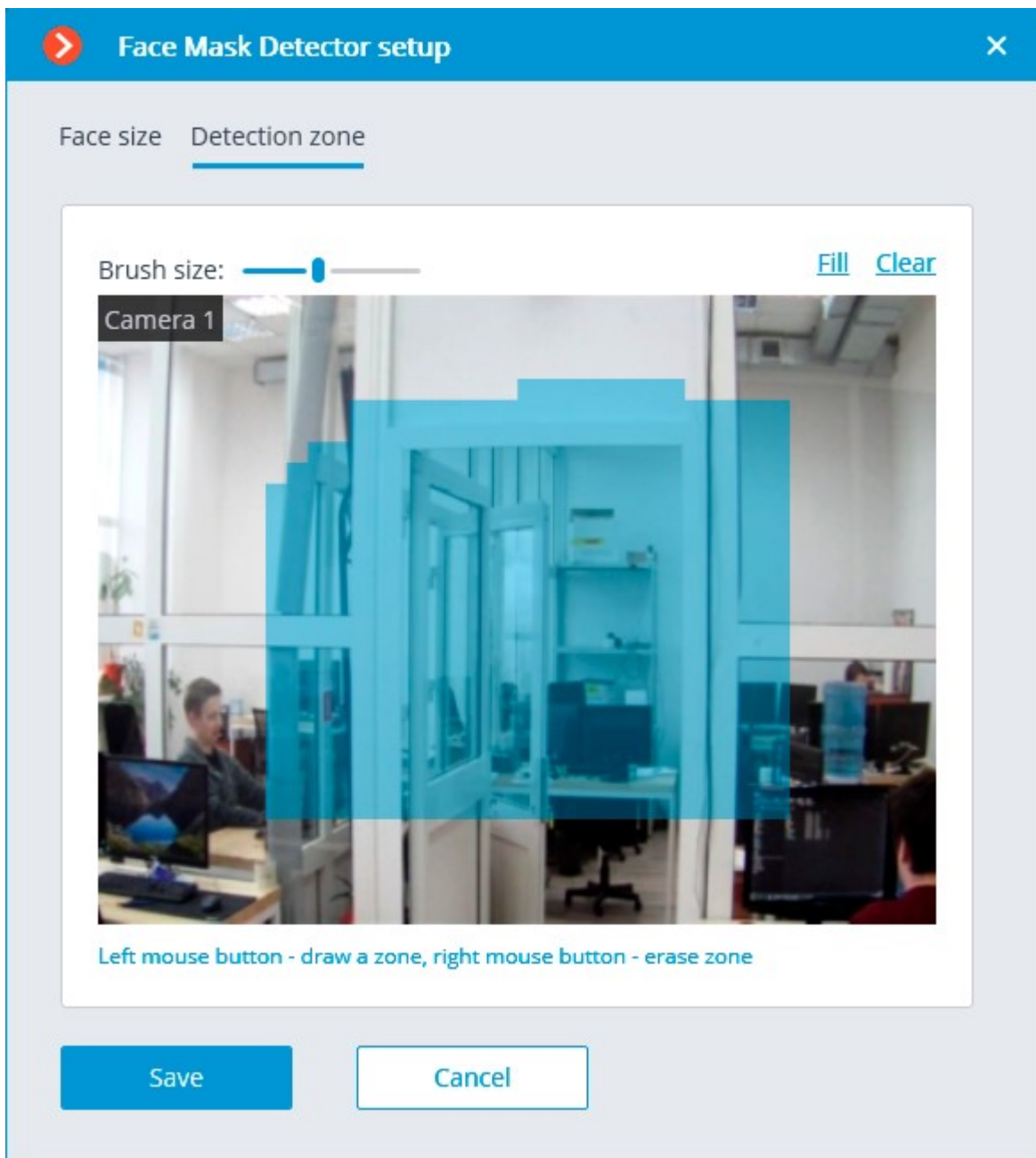

In the opened window, it is required to make the appropriate settings in the corresponding tabs.

Face size: the minimum and maximum sizes of the faces of the people to be monitored.



Detection zone is the zone of the frame filled with the semitransparent blue fill in the settings window. The mouse is used for modifying the zone: left mouse button serves for filling the zone, and the right one is used for clearing it. With the help of the **Fill** and **Clear** buttons you can fill or clear the whole area of the frame. The corresponding slider is used to modify the **Brush size**.



The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

Detection

The module is capable of detecting up to ten people not wearing face masks in the frame at the same time (if allowed by the computing capacity).

The module does not recognize (identify) faces, it cannot tell one person from the other or compare a person's face with the faces from a database; it only finds people without face masks in the frame.

When an infringement event (no mask) is detected, the module briefly highlights the person's face with a red square in the client application and creates a corresponding event in the event log. The repeated detection of the infringement by the same person will become possible only after the disappearance of this person from the frame for three seconds minimum (e.g. when the person leaves the frame or covers his/her face completely).

Hardware and software



Eocortex Neural Networks package must be installed before it will be possible to use neural networks-based features of the module.

The following equipment is required to use this neural network-based module:

- A processor with AVX instructions support;
- An **NVIDIA** video card (GPU) with the computation capacity index of at least 6.5 and with at least 4 Gb of memory; the parameters and performance of the video card must be similar or better than those of **NVIDIA GTX 1650 Super** model;
- version of the video card driver at least 460;
- swap file at least half of the total RAM size.

If the package will be installed on a virtual machine, it may additionally be required to:

- Enable support for AVX instructions in the guest machine settings;
- Use GRID drivers for GPU virtualization.

Module settings

Setting too small minimum face size may lead to false positives due to low image quality.

The shape of the detection area can be arbitrary.

Masks

The examples of supported face masks:



The supported colors are as follows: white, black, yellow, different tones of green, blue and red.
The face covered by a hand or a scarf will trigger the detector unless the area of a nose is covered.

Video stream

Image resolution: no lower than HD (1280x720).

Framerate: 15 fps or more.

Lighting and image quality

Illumination of faces in the frame must be uniform and constant.

If the camera is installed opposite a bright source of light (sun behind the entrance door, etc.), it is required to adjust the exposure or brightness in such a way that the face in the frame is light. The overexposed background is acceptable.

The image quality must be medium or better. Significant compression artefacts are not acceptable.

No blurring of moving people's faces is allowed.

The image must be in color.

Scene and camera position

The faces must be fully seen in the frame.

There must be no mirror surfaces giving reflections in the frame (glass, mirrors, etc.).

Strong lateral illumination (e.g. sunlight from the window) resulting in the overexposure of one part of the face is not acceptable.

The camera may be placed above the face level, directly facing the people to be recognized. In such a case, the camera elevation angle must not exceed 35°.

The distance between the pupils of a face to be recognized must be at least 30 pixels.

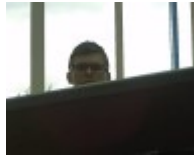

Face Recognition

Eocortex allows to use several modules that perform Face Recognition using a database: **Face Recognition (Complete)**, **Face Recognition (Light)** and **Unique Visitor Counting**.

However, it is not possible to use **Face Recognition (Light)** module with other Face Recognition modules on one camera at the same time.

The modules ensure high recognition accuracy and can be used together with access control systems at the facilities with high security requirements, for example, at banks or restricted access facilities. Another important use of the modules can be automatic identification of the hotel guests, restaurant customers, and the visitors of other similar enterprises.

Details

Face Recognition (Complete) and **Unique Visitor Counting** modules use all the suitable video cards installed on the server. Every camera with the recognition module enabled is assigned to one of the cards.

When the number of cameras with the recognition modules enabled exceeds the quantity of video cards used, the cameras will be uniformly distributed among the video cards, as applicable, without considering the characteristics of the video streams coming from the cameras and the performance of the video cards (i.e. an equal number of cameras will be assigned to each video card, wherever possible).

Unique Visitor Counting module is intended for generating Unique Visitor Counting reports based on detecting and recognizing faces. It is possible to exclude faces pertaining to certain groups from the counting, for example, to avoid counting employees.

The **Face Recognition (Complete)**, **Face Recognition (Light)** and **Unique Visitor Counting** modules determine the uniqueness of a face on the basis of the set of features jointly called the "index". The modules do not use individual points (dots) of faces when determining the index; instead, the image with the size of 100x100 pixels (using the "points" terminology, a face is recognized using approximately 10 thousand points). For each face located, an entry is created in the archive of the server where this face was found, even if the face has not been explicitly entered into the database. Subsequently, these events will be available for viewing in the event archive. These modules are capable of recognizing several faces present in the frame at the same time (10 or more, if the computing capacity allows it).

The **Face Recognition (Complete)** module can identify masked faces with high accuracy; provided that the database contains samples of these persons without a mask. Also, this module can recognize turned faces; despite the fact that only images of faces looking directly into the camera are entered into the database.

The face database may be located on the same server where the recognition is being performed, or, alternatively, on another server of a unified multiserver video surveillance system.

Each entry in the face database contains the following:

One or more images (screenshots and/or photographs) of a person's face;

Surname, first name, patronymic of a person that are entered manually and are optional;

Additional information (optional text box);

Group affiliation (optional parameter).

The uniqueness of the entries of the database is determined by the face index. Thus, the database can contain several entries with the coincident surname, first name and patronymic (including the empty field).

It is possible to work with the face database from the **Eocortex Client** application, or using the API.

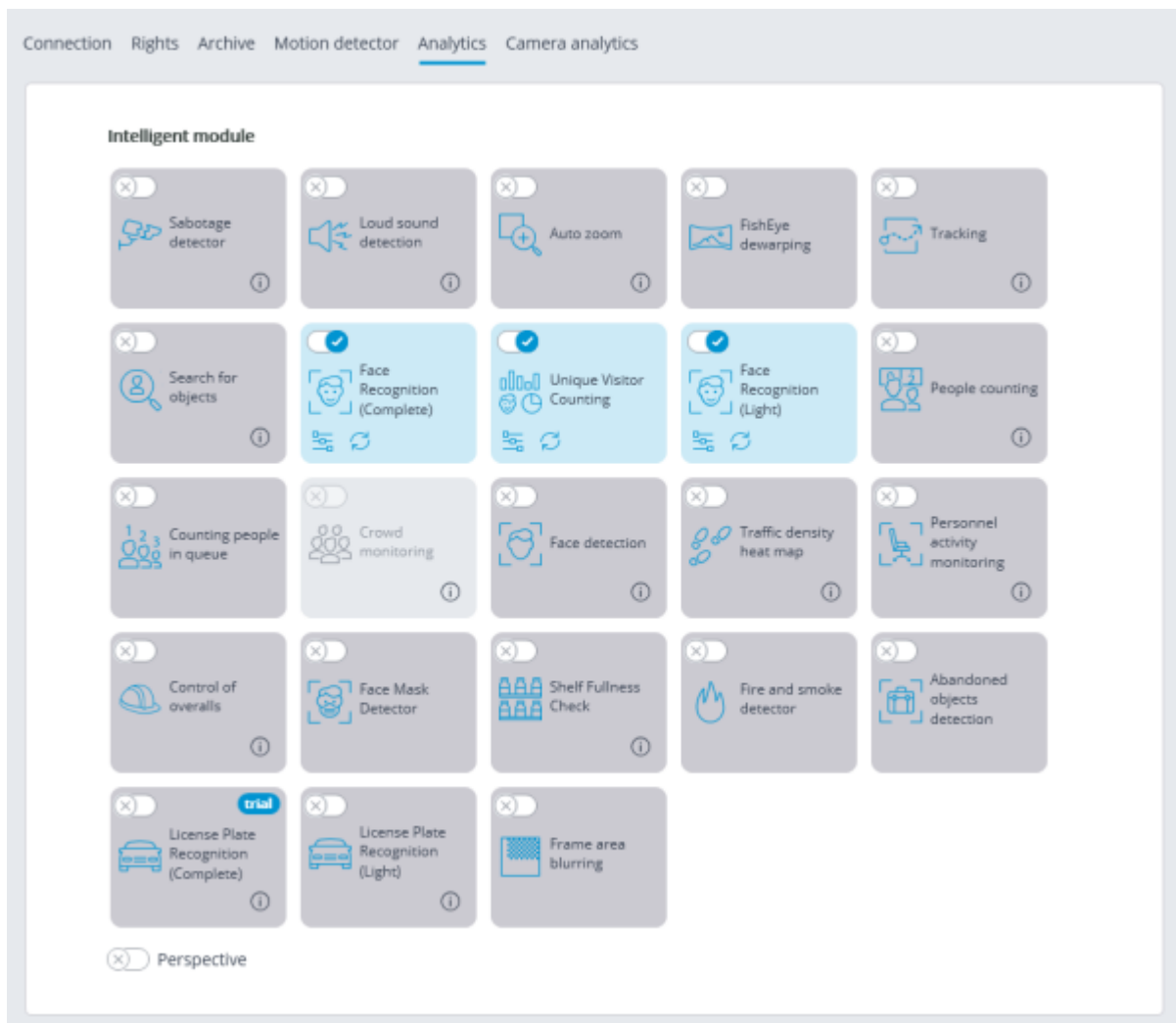

Clicking the  button opens the module setup window.

It is possible to simultaneously enable on the same camera only those modules that are based on the Face Recognition technology: **Face Recognition (Complete)** and **Unique Visitor Counting**. No other Face Recognition modules can be enabled simultaneously on the same camera.

The minimum width and height of an object in the software motion detector settings must be smaller than the size of a face.

Some of the settings of the modules are the same; others are unique for each one. The module settings are described below.



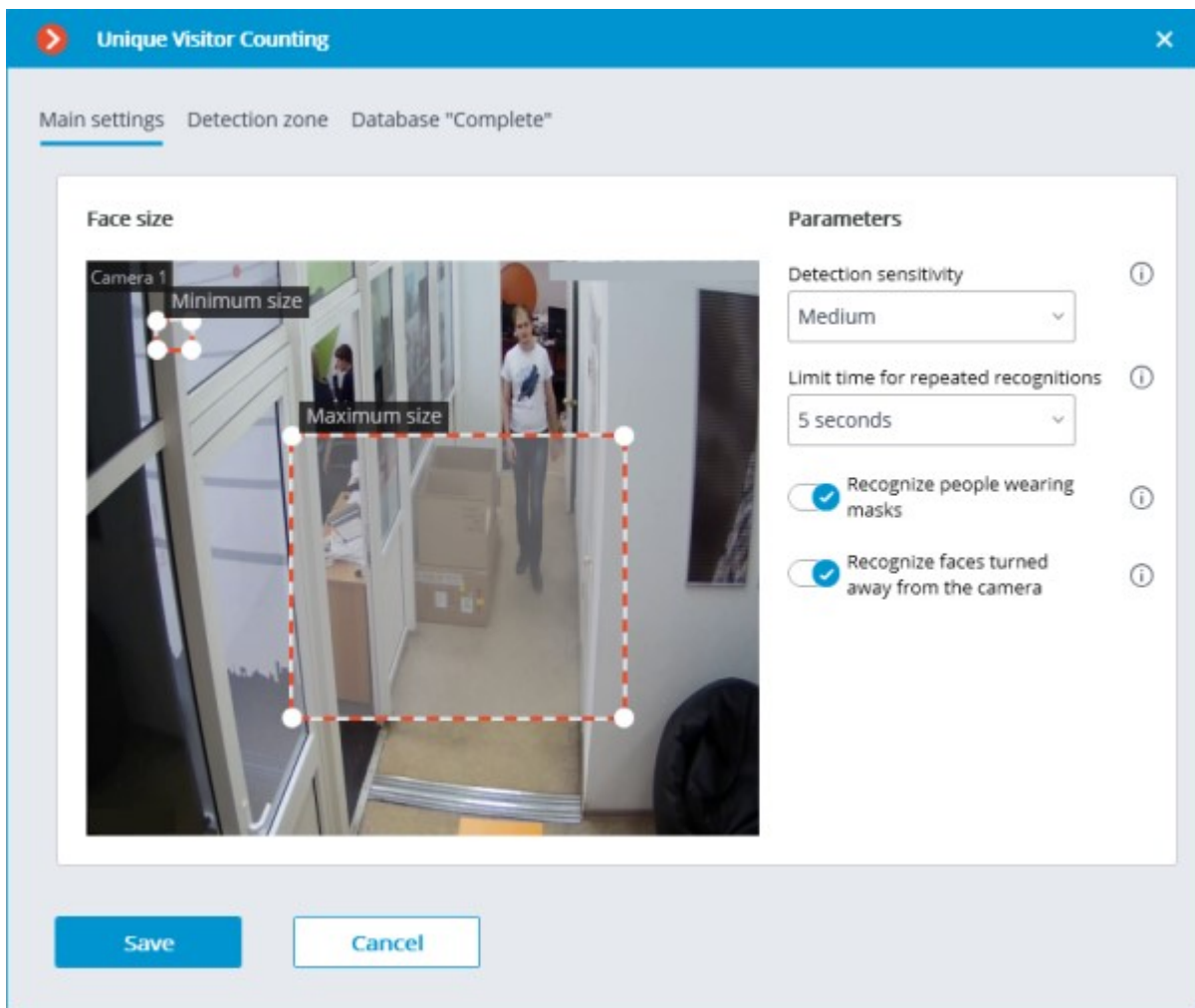

Minimum size and **Maximum size**: Allow to set, using frames, the minimum and the maximum size of a face to be detected. The minimum size that is too small may lead to false detections due to the low quality of small images of the faces.

Minimum recognition positiveness: the cases of recognition with the similarity value lower than the specified threshold will not count. Lowering the value will allow to better recognize people wearing sunglasses, with partially covered faces, etc., but, at the same time, may lead to false recognitions. The available range of values is 70–100%; default value: 80%.

Detection sensitivity: The higher the sensitivity, the lower the minimum acceptable quality of the images of the faces required for recognition. The higher value can help in case of low light conditions, but may also result in erroneous detections and in detecting bad quality images of the faces. The lower value reduces the module's capability to detect faces turned away from the camera. The allowable range of values is as follows: **Minimum, Low, Medium, High** and **Maximum**; the default value is **Medium**.

Limit time for repeated recognitions: the minimum time between detections of a face of the same person. It prevents occurrence of the identical entries in case of the successive appearances of the same person in the frame. The allowable range of values: **Not to limit, 5 seconds, 30 seconds, 1 minute**; the default value is **Not to limit**.

Minimum number of frames for recognition: if a person was detected in the camera field of view less than a specified number of times, no recognition will be performed. The available range of values is 1-5; the default value is 2.

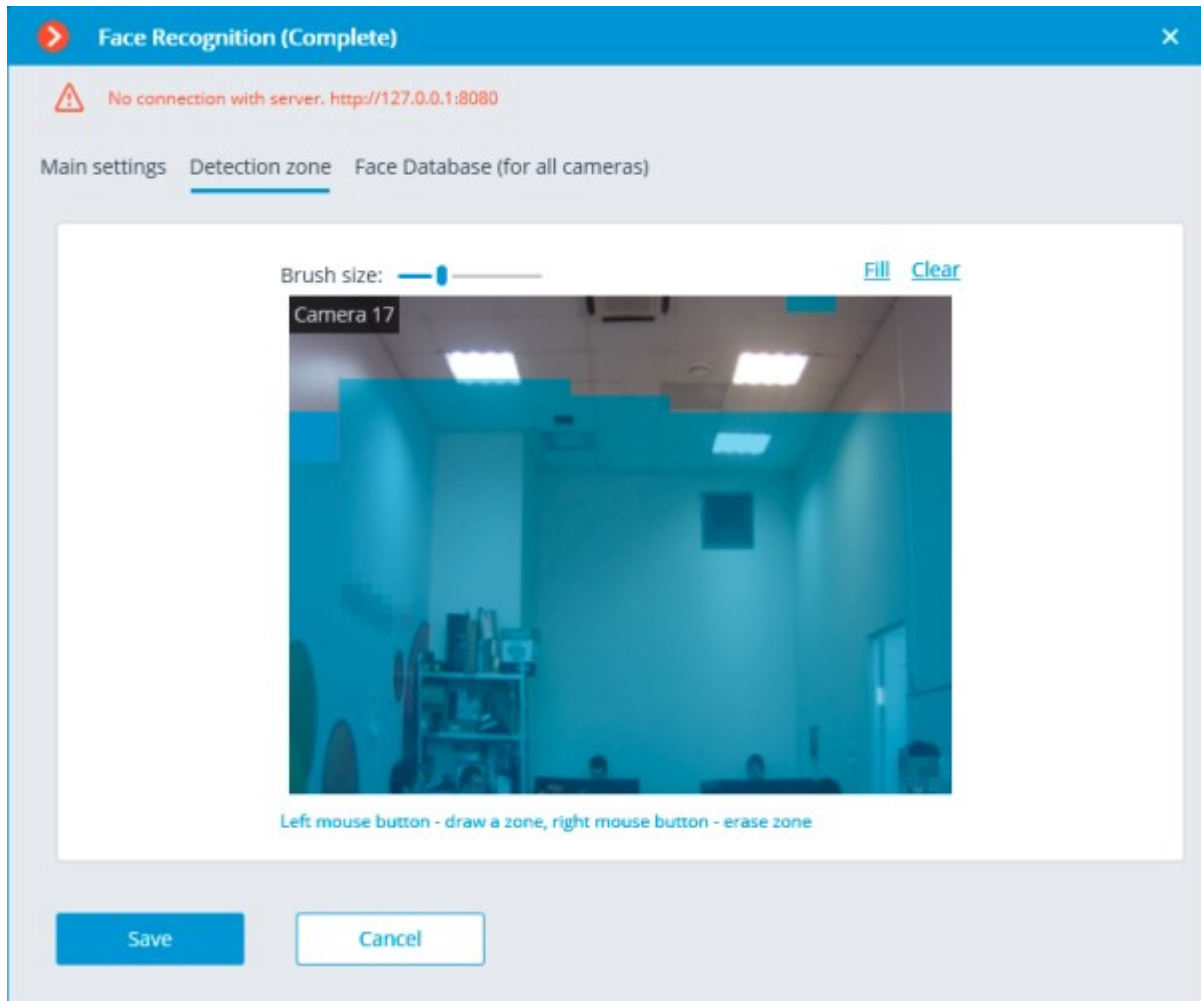
Recognize people wearing masks and **Recognize faces turned away from the camera**: allow more flexible configuration of the module: if these parameters are disabled, this will reduce the number of potentially false triggerings, and if they are enabled, the module will detect and recognize faces more accurately.

These parameters only affect the ability to identify masked and turned away faces, detection will be performed in any case.

In [Tasks by event](#), it is possible to set [scenarios](#) based on the presence or absence of a mask on a person's face, as well as by the attribute of whether a person's face is turned away from the camera.

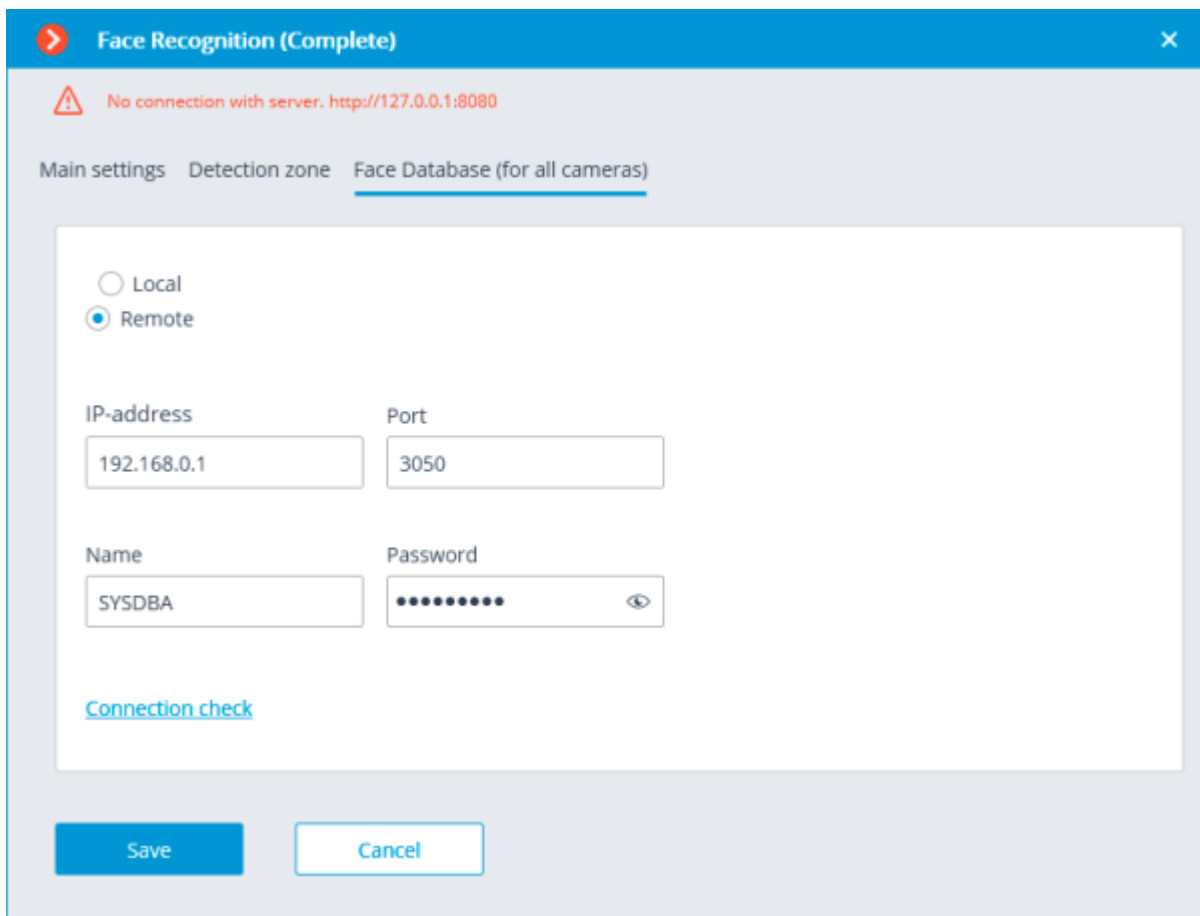
Detection area

On the **Detection area** tab, the user can specify the area where the system will search for faces. By default, the detection zone occupies the whole frame.



Card-file

On the **Database "Complete"** tab, the parameters of connection to the face database are set.



Two database deployment options are available: **Local** or **Remote**.

If the recognition process runs on only one server, it is recommended deploying the database on this server by selecting **Local**.

If the recognition process is running on several servers, the database should still be hosted only on one of them. For this purpose, select the **Remote** option for all cameras and specify the database connection parameters: server address, name and password of the database administrator. The same applies when the database of the module is deployed on one server, and the camera with the module enabled is attached to another one.

Eocortex version 3.6 and lower uses **Firebird** DBMS with the following default values:

- **Port:** 3050
- **Username:** SYSDBA
- **Password:** masterkey

Starting from version **Eocortex** 4.0, the module's database is handed over to the [PostgreSQL DBMS](#) with the following default values:

- **Port:** 5432
- **Username:**
 - For Windows: postgres
 - For Linux: eocortex
- **Password:** masterkey

Remote access to databases is not allowed by default in PostgreSQL and must be additionally configured if remote databases are used for analytics. All settings must be

done for the server where the database is stored. Settings are slightly different for [Windows](#) and [Linux](#) operating systems.

When the server is running for the first time after upgrading **Eocortex** to version 4.0 or higher, the existing module database will be automatically transformed to be compatible with **PostgreSQL**.

If connecting to a **Remote** database, use the DBMS **Username** and **Password** that are valid for the server storing the database.

Independent of the database location, the recognition events (date and time of recognition, coordinates of the object in the frame, binding of the recognized object to the database) will always be stored on the server to which the camera with the corresponding events is bound.

Synchronization with the database located on a remote server can take some time

When using a remote database, the [remote database replication mechanism](#) will be applied.

It is possible to check the availability of the database clicking the **Connection check** link. If the server is unavailable, the corresponding message will be displayed.

It is possible to set the [own face database](#) for the **Face Database Complete** for an individual camera of a group of cameras using the field **Database identifier**.

The field **Database identifier** is not initially displayed at the launch of the module.

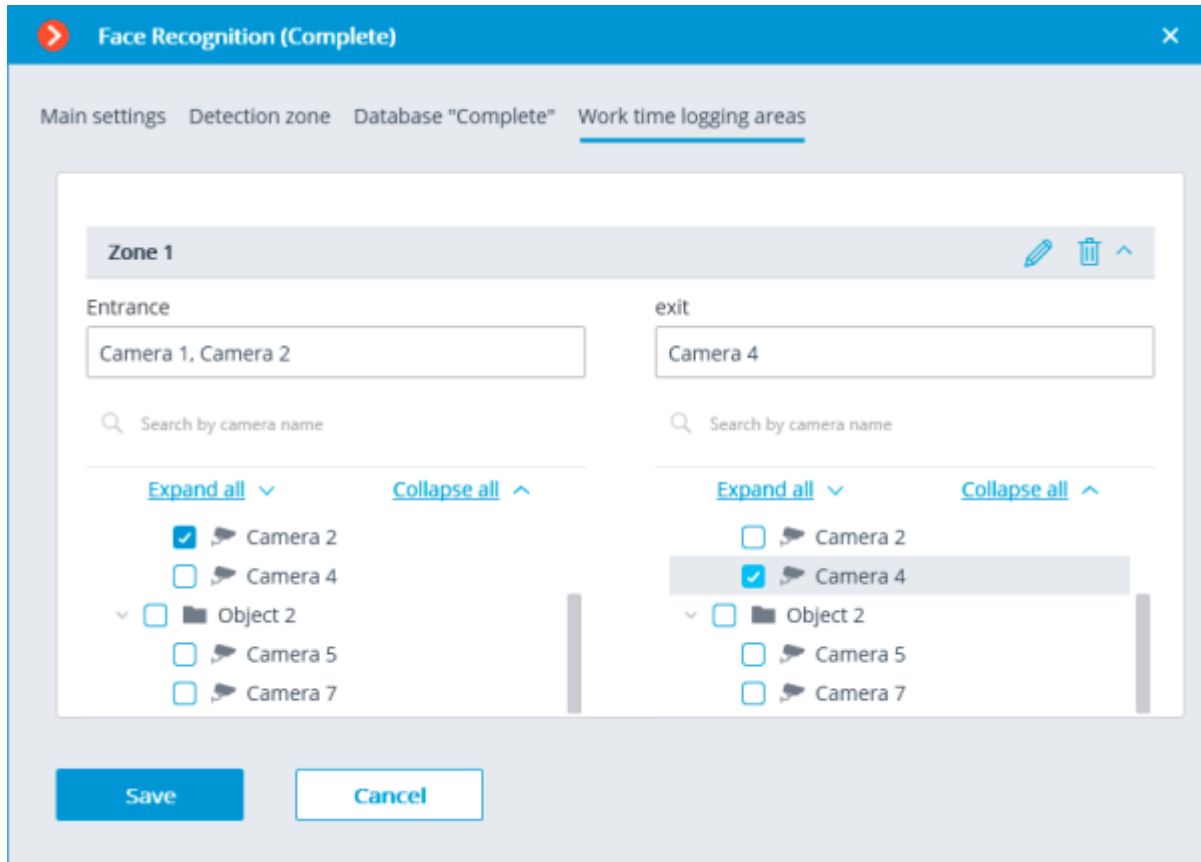

Time logging areas

This tab is only available in the settings of the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module.

The parameters to be used for creating **Work time logging (Complete)** report are set on the **Time logging areas** tab.



Work time logging (Complete) report is formed by areas (zones). An area is a territory where it is required to monitor the presence of persons. The people's faces must be recognized at the entrance to and the exit from the area by the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module. Several cameras may be used for a single area both at the entrance and at the exit.

Traffic Density Heat Map

The **Traffic Density Heat Map** is designed for the visualization of the traffic intensity in the different areas of the frame. The heat map is generated by the way of summing up the time during which the movement is observed in the selected point. As a result, the areas where the objects are staying during the longest period of time are highlighted.

Capabilities of the module

For the visualization, the color scale is used: the color areas hued depending on the intensity of traffic are superimposed on the video image as a semitransparent layer. For example, when using the four-color scale, the area with high traffic density is colored red, with low traffic density – blue; the green and yellow areas are transitional.

The module can be used for determining the popularity of various locations in the shopping mall, to visualize the preferred routes of visitors or vehicles on the premises, for analyzing statistics of visits to various facilities etc.

There are three ways of using the heat maps:

- real time mode;
- report;
- superimposition of the heat map on the camera field of view on the facility plan.



In the real time mode, the areas of the frame where movement has been registered in the course of the last 10 minutes are displayed. In the report, the time interval is set during which the information regarding movement intensity in the frame will be analyzed. The heat map superimposition mode allows to generate the heat map not only in the frame, but also on the facility plan.

Details

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector and the module itself.

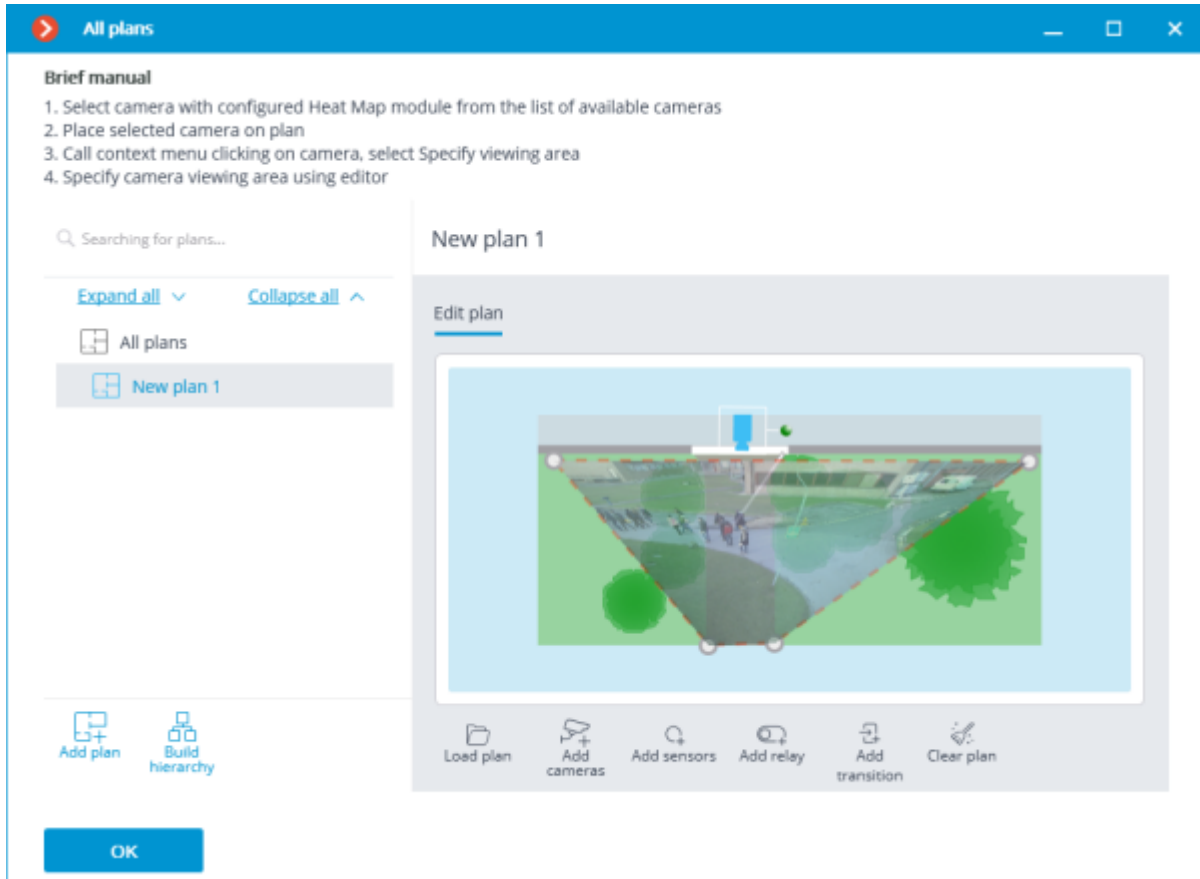

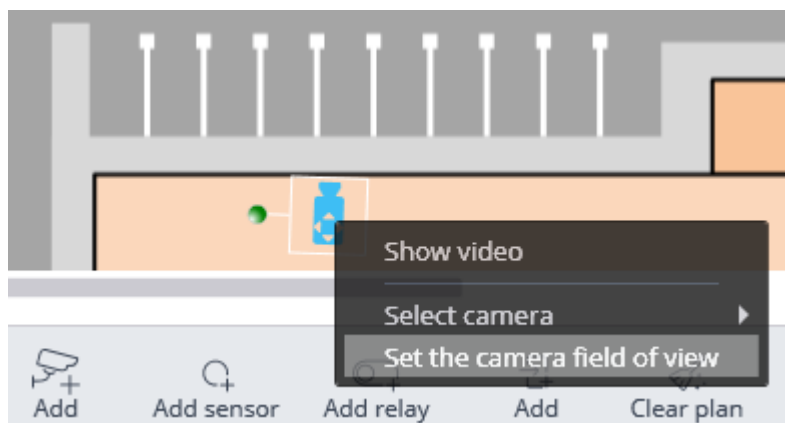
Wake decay time when viewing in real time: sets the time during which the wake of the moving object in the frame disappears completely.

Autosaving of data on plan: when this option is enabled, the server, with the indicated regularity, will save the plan images with the superimposed heat maps for the specified period. This option will work only if the camera being set up and its field of view are placed on the plan.

Clicking on the **Open plans** link will open the plan setup window.



For setting up the field of view, it is required to load the plan, place the camera on it, select the **Set the camera field of view** item in the context menu, then stretch the field of view by the corners to make the image correspond with the plan, then save the field of view settings by pressing **OK**.



For interactive selection of a folder on the drive, click on the **Select folder** link.

It is only advisable to select the folder interactively if the **Eocortex Configurator** application is launched directly on the server, because in case of performing remote setup, the file explorer of a local computer used for making adjustments will be opened when selecting a folder. Consequently, when

performing adjustments from the remote computer, the path shall be entered as text, thereupon the folder must already exist on the server.

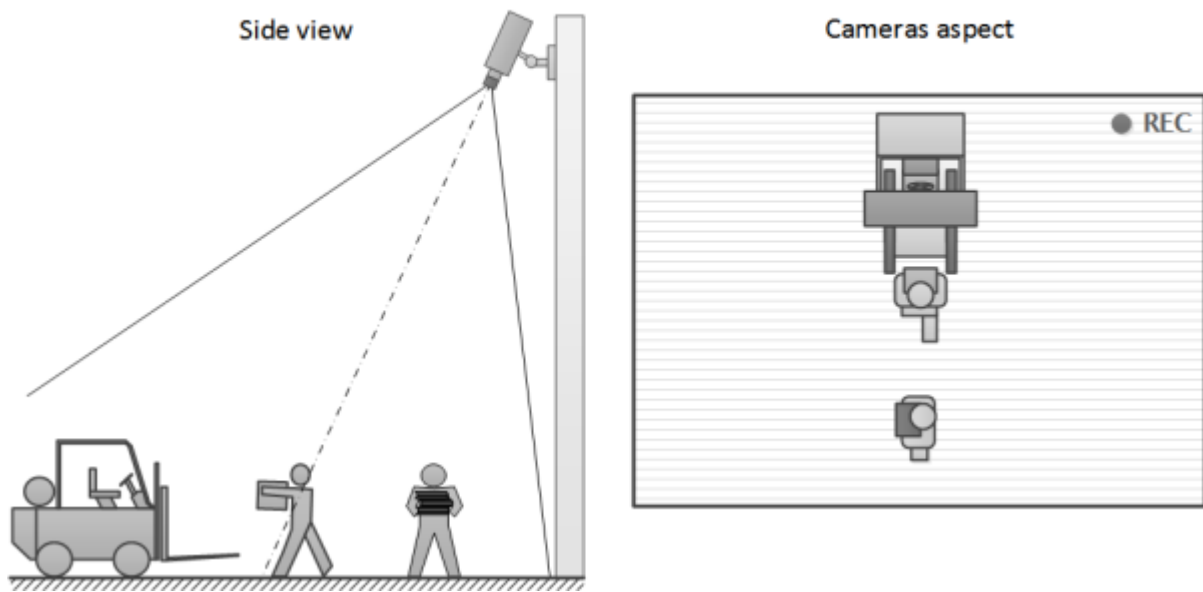

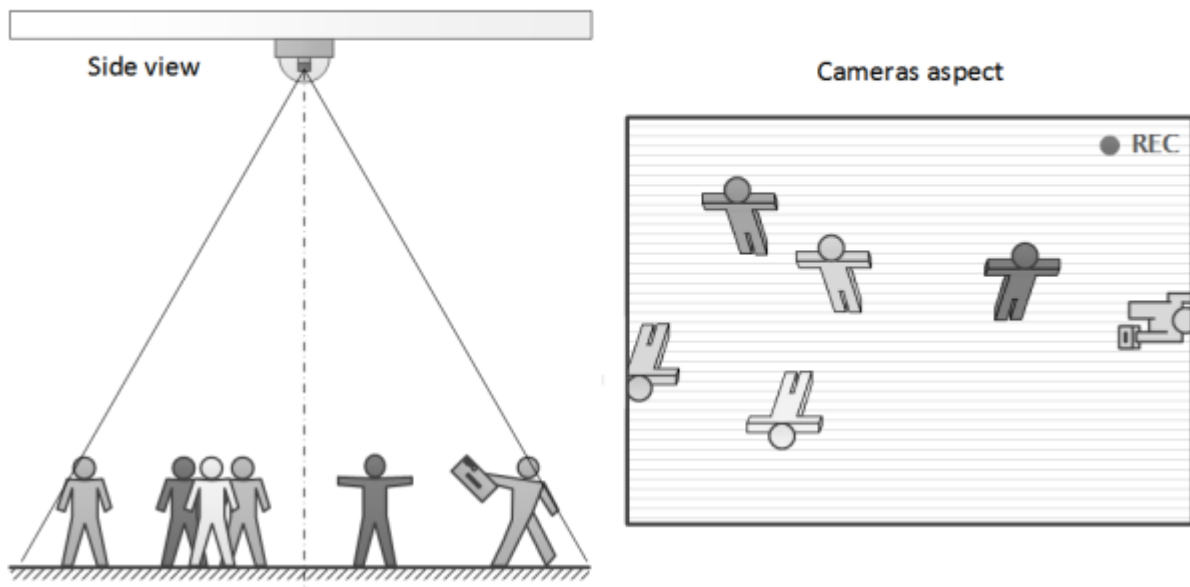
For the proper operation of the module, it is required to install the camera as high as possible to minimize the influence of the perspective and avoid the superimposing of the objects of the foreground on the remote areas. The ideal position of the camera is from above, at right angle to the horizontal plane.

There are no specific requirements regarding framerate, resolution and video stream format.

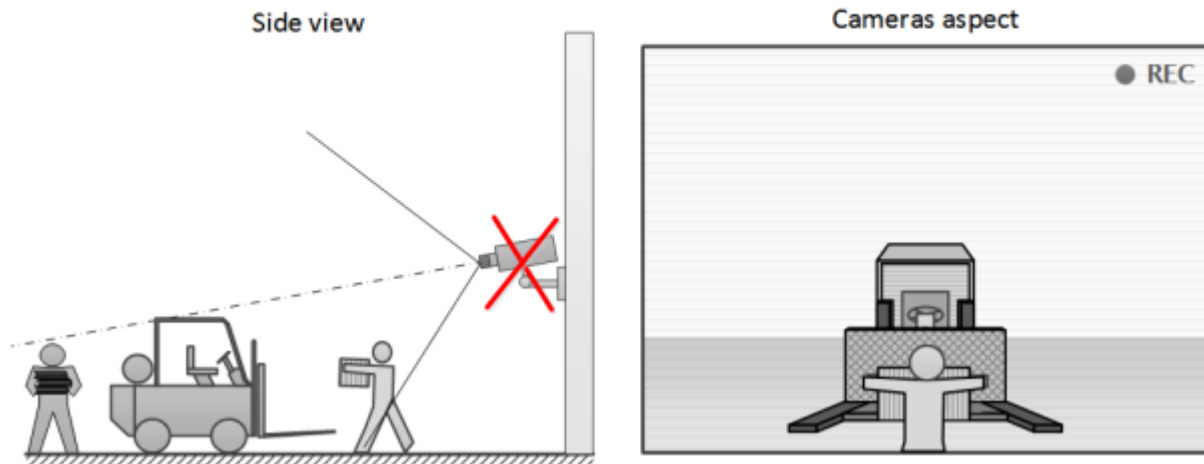

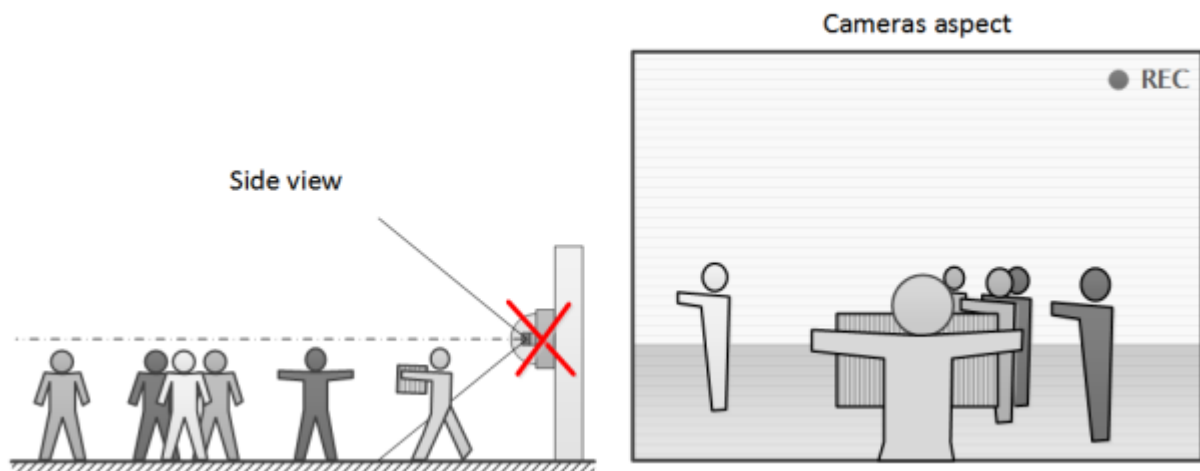

License Plate Recognition (Complete)

The **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module is intended for recognizing the license plates of the moving vehicles and saving the information regarding the time and date of recognition, the license plate number and the reference to the corresponding video frame.

Capabilities of the module

- Real-time recognition of the license plate numbers of moving vehicles.
- Recognition of the license plate numbers of the vehicles of 120 countries:

- Real-time comparison of the recognized license plate numbers with the license plate number database and generation of the alarm if the recognized number is in the list of the vehicles to be intercepted.
- Working with the integrated database of automobile license plate numbers: adding and editing of numbers, providing additional information regarding the vehicles, such as color, owner, etc.
- Possibility to import the license plate numbers into the database from a CSV file.
- Creating the groups of license plate numbers for interception, automatic opening of a rising arm barrier etc.; adding a number to one or more groups.
- Searching for the recognized numbers in the archive by time, by date and by additional information from the database.
- Downloading of the recognized license plate numbers to Microsoft Excel or CSV format.
- Automatic sending of the lists of recognized license plate numbers by email.
- Rising arm barrier control.
- Counting the number of vehicles in parking lots.
- Counting the time spent by vehicle in the parking lot.

Details

Since this module is external and is not included into the basic Eocortex installation package, before setting it up and using it install it on the computer to which the cameras that will use this module are connected.



The module is intended for recognizing the license plates of moving vehicles only. The parked vehicles' numbers will not be recognized.

It is possible to use the capabilities of the **Eocortex API** for the automation of the downloading of the recognized license plate lists.

Interaction with the rising arm barriers is performed via signal outputs of the IP cameras.

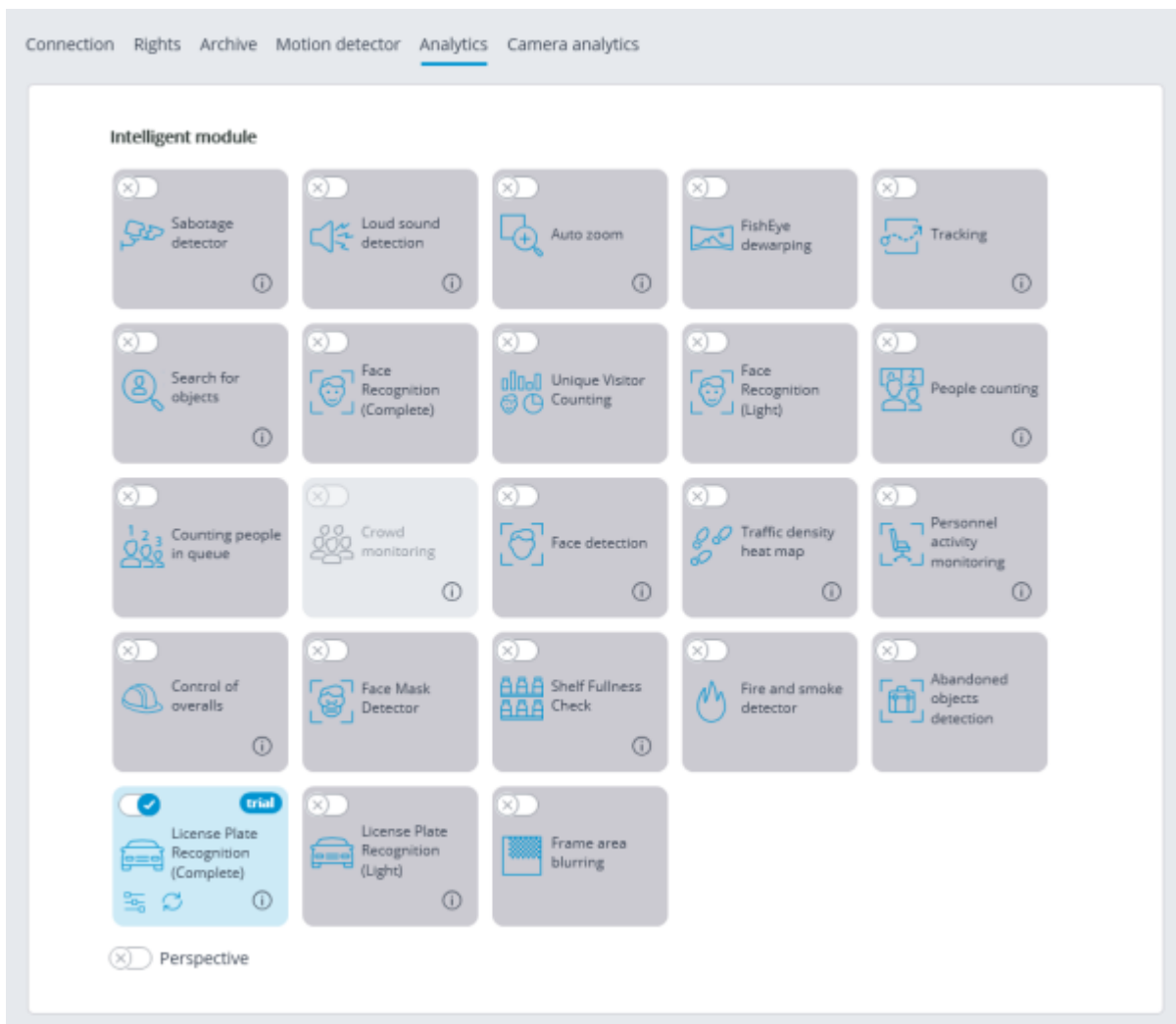
Module setup


This module is distributed as a separate installation package. The package should be installed on the server to which the cameras using this module are connected. After installation, an additional license key need to be activated on the server to license the module.

To use the module, enable and set up the software motion detector, then activate the module itself.

To do that, [launch the Eocortex Configurator application](#), go to the  [Cameras](#) tab, select a camera in the list, and set up the motion detector on the [Motion detector](#) tab on the right part of the page.

Then go to the [Analytics](#) tab and enable the module using the  switch, then adjust it pressing the  button.



Clicking the  button opens the module setup window.

It is only possible to use one of the two versions of the module on the same camera: **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** or **License Plate Recognition (Light)**.

In the software motion detector settings, the minimum width and height of the object must be smaller than the dimensions of a vehicle.

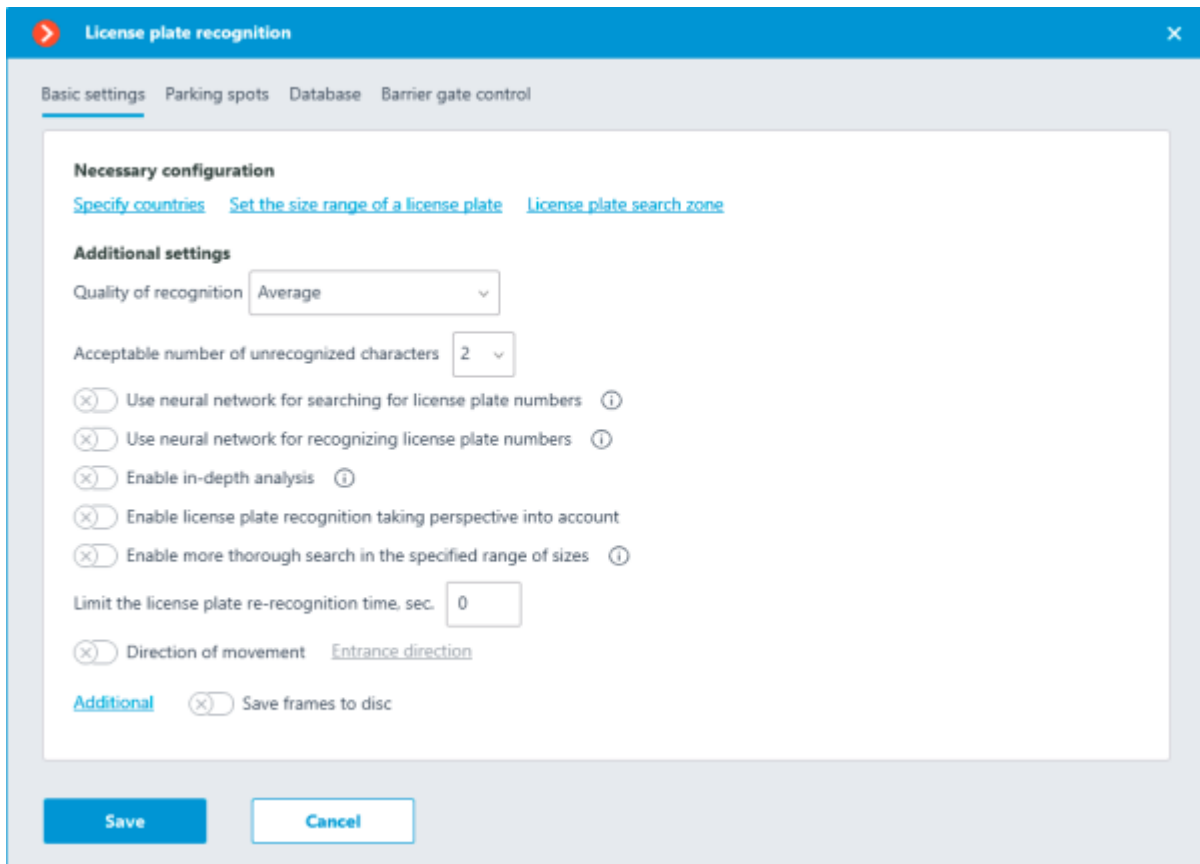
Additionally, it is recommended to set the whole frame as the detection area for the software motion detector to ensure reliable recognition.

In the right bottom corner of the module settings window, the version of the SDK libraries used by the License plate recognition module is indicated.

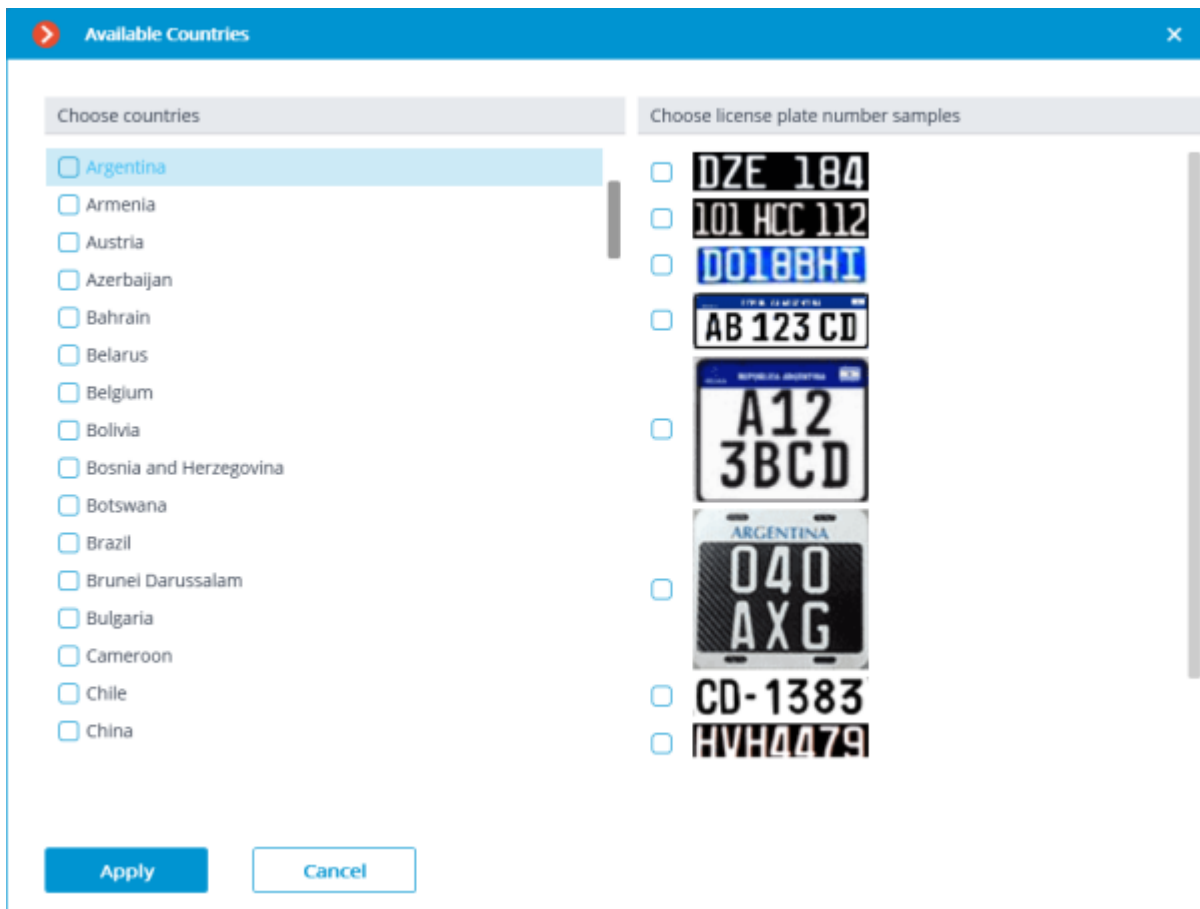
The module settings description is given below.

Basic settings

The settings of the license plate recognition can be set on the **Basic settings** tab.



Specify countries: opens a window where license plates and countries that should be recognized can be selected.

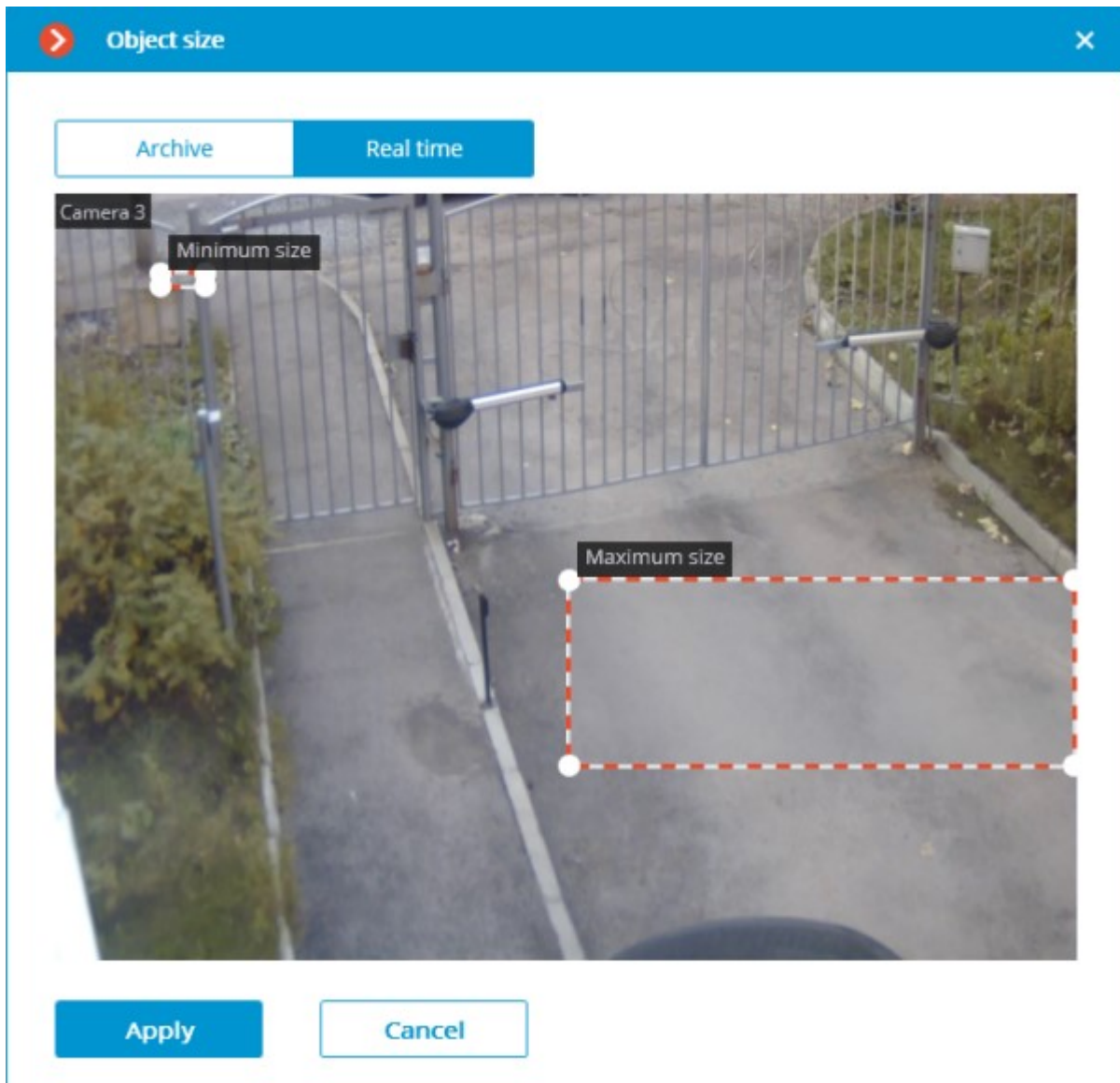


In the window that opens, mark the countries whose license plates should be recognized and select license plate templates for each selected country. Unmarked countries and templates will not be recognized.

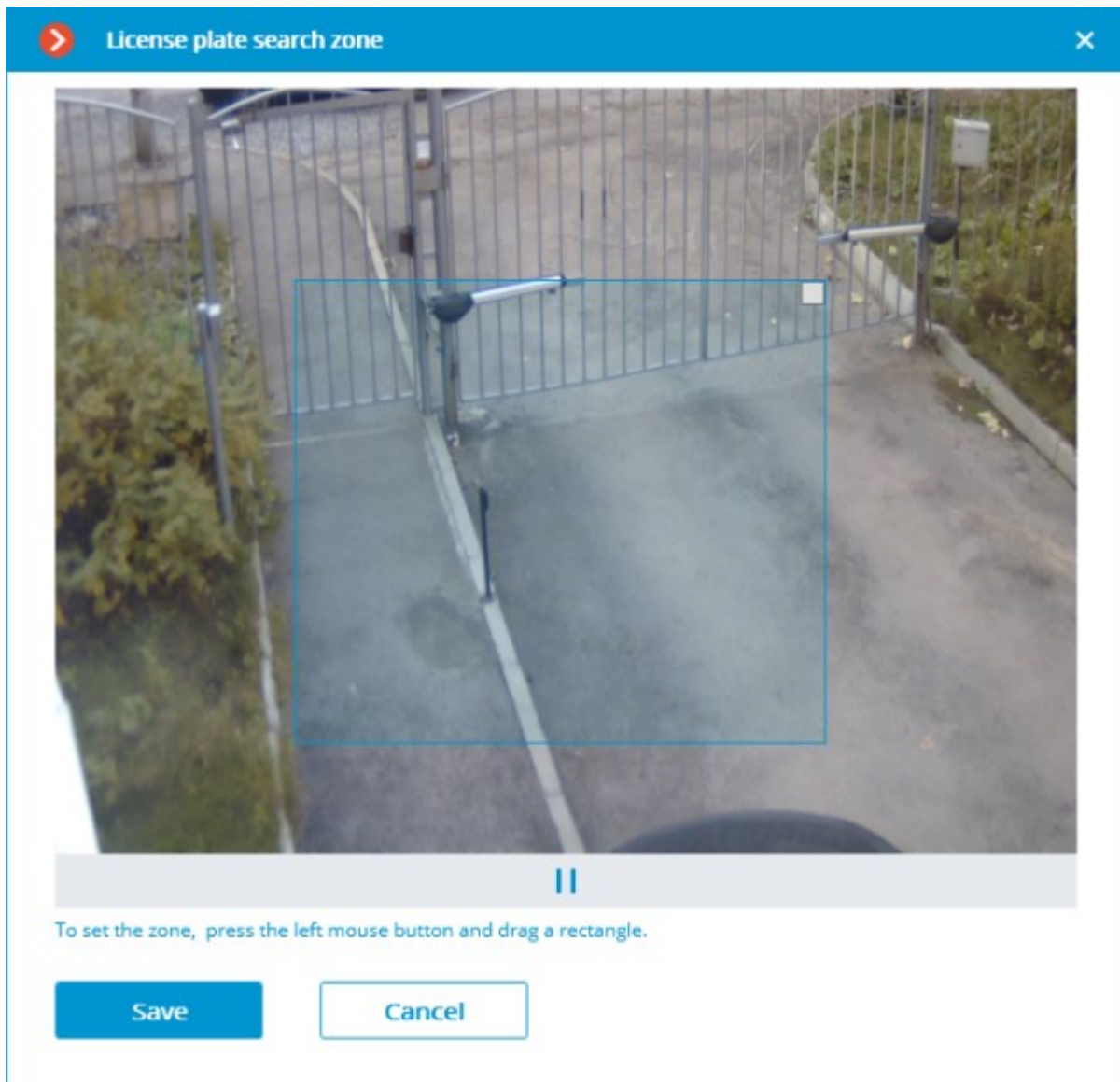
The empty list of countries means that the License Plate Recognition (Complete) module is not installed, or that errors occurred during its installation, or that there is no protection key, or its activation encountered problems.

The more countries and samples have been selected for recognition, the higher the computing load on the server. When the processor load exceeds 80%, the recognition quality may drop significantly.

Set the size range of a license plate opens the window of setting the minimum and maximum width of the license plates to be recognized.



License plate search zone opens the window of setting up the zones of the frame where the license plate numbers to be recognized will appear.



For creating a new zone, it is required to press the left mouse button and, holding it, select a rectangular area. The total area uniting all the set zones will be used for recognition. To delete the zone, click on the close icon in the upper right corner of the zone.

Quality of recognition is the internal parameter of the module's operation. It sets the filtering by the quality of recognition, meaning that the license plates the reliability of whose recognition is lower than a preset value will be automatically discarded. The value of this parameter shall be selected tentatively: when it is higher, the reliability of the recognized numbers will be higher, but the total quantity of the recognized numbers will be smaller; when it is lower, the quantity of the recognized numbers will be larger, but the number of recognition mistakes will increase.

The Acceptable number of unrecognized characters setting filters the license plate numbers by the quantity of the unrecognized symbols: the plates where the number of unrecognized symbols is bigger than the preset value will be automatically discarded.

Use neural network for searching for license plate numbers: Enabling this option allows to increase accuracy of searching for number plates. However, the server load from the given camera will increase 50% approx.

Use neural network for recognizing license plate numbers: Enabling this option will increase accuracy of license plate symbols' recognition. However, the load on the server from the given camera will increase 50% approx.

Enable in-depth analysis: Enabling this option allows to improve license plate recognition accuracy under unfavorable conditions, e.g. when the camera's parameters are not in complete

conformance with the relevant requirements, or when the weather conditions are poor. Using this option leads to the increase of the frame processing time of 20 to 30%. Under normal conditions, this parameter has no effect on the recognition quality.

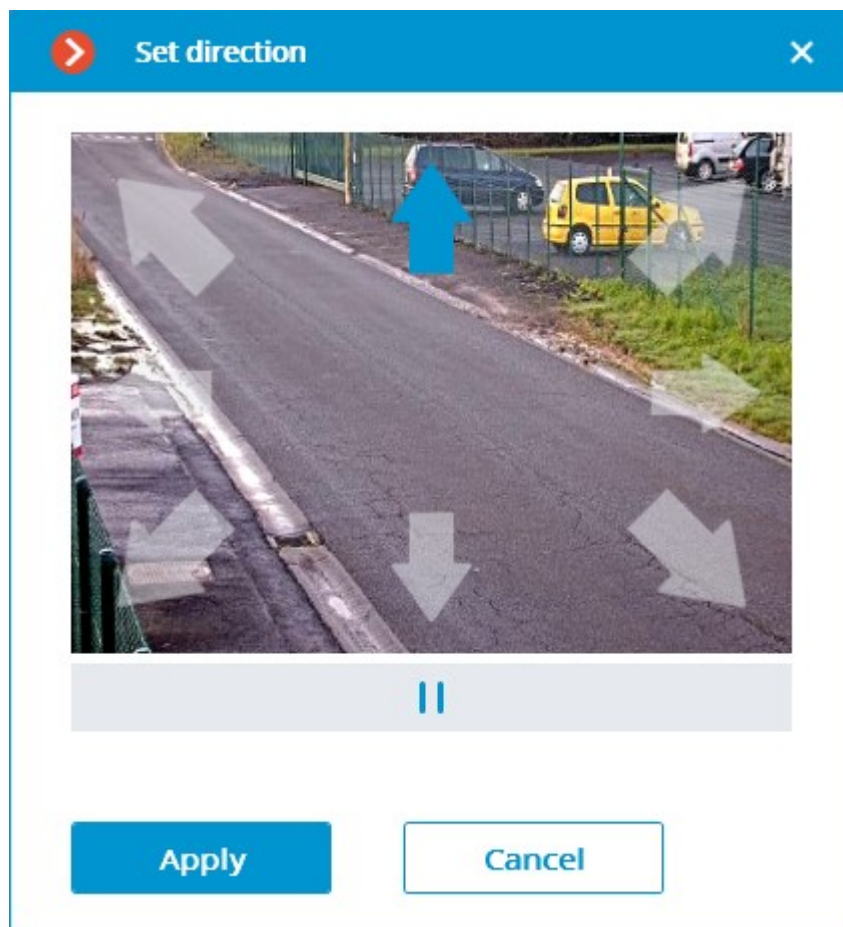
Enable license plate recognition taking perspective into account: allows to make allowance for a perspective distortion.

Enable more thorough search in the specified range of sizes: Enabling this option allows to improve recognition accuracy in a case when the difference between the minimum and the maximum dimensions of the license plate number is very big (more that three times). In this case, the load on the server from the given camera will increase 30% approx.

Limit the license plate re-recognition time, sec.: allows to set the period of time from the initial recognition of the plate number, during which no attempts will be made to recognize the same number.

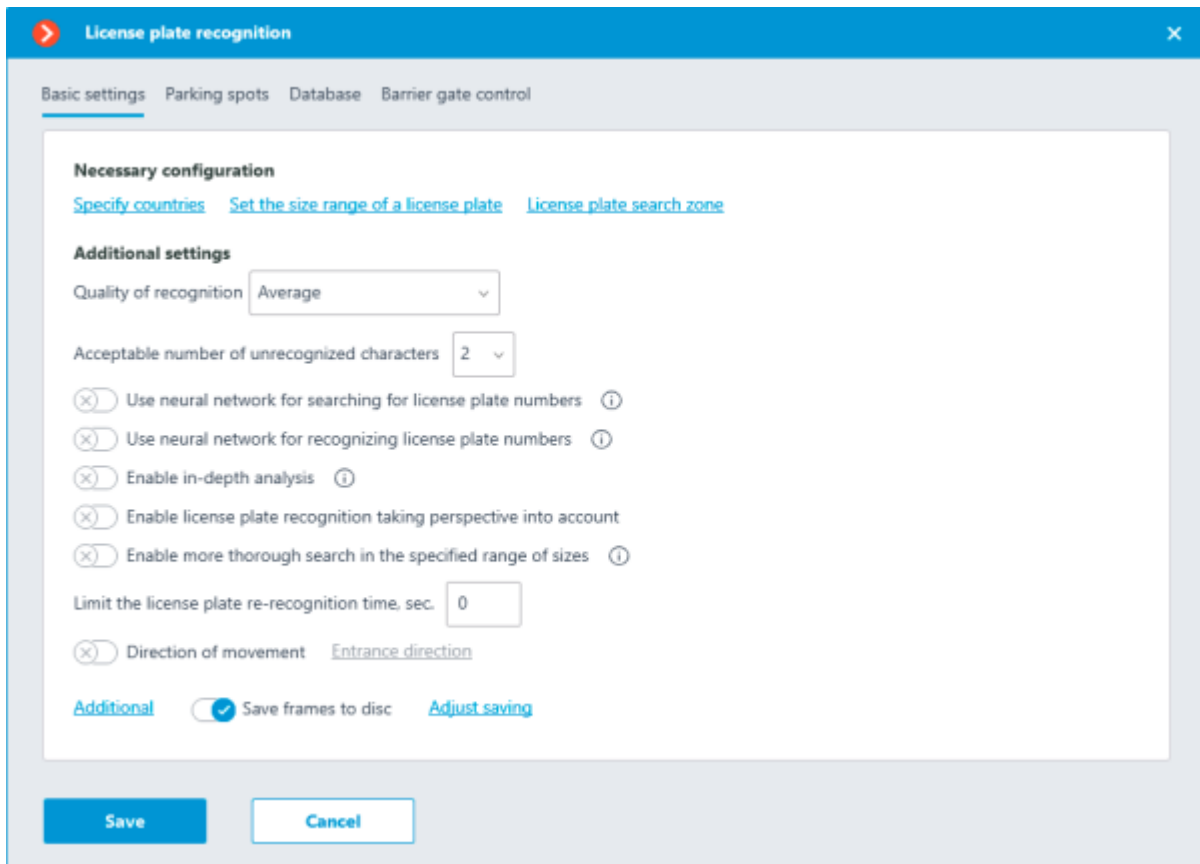
This setting may be useful, for example, for the situations involving the automatic opening of a rising arm barrier, when the vehicle stops before the barrier and the module may attempt to recognize its license plate one more time after the vehicle starts to move again. Such repeated recognition may also happen when the license plate was temporarily blocked by some object.

Direction of movement: enabling this option allows to configure the definition of the movement direction of the plate on the camera frame. After enabling this option, it is needed to set the entry direction by clicking the **Entrance direction** link and selecting the arrow in the window that opens. At the same time, vehicles moving in the opposite direction will be considered as driving out.

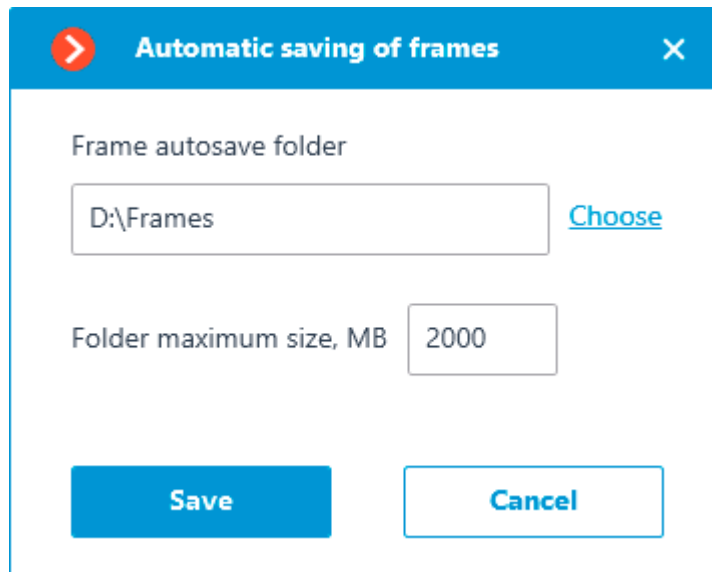


Additional: Allows importing and exporting settings of the license plate recognition module.

Save frames to disc: Allows saving frames with detected license plates to a folder on the server.



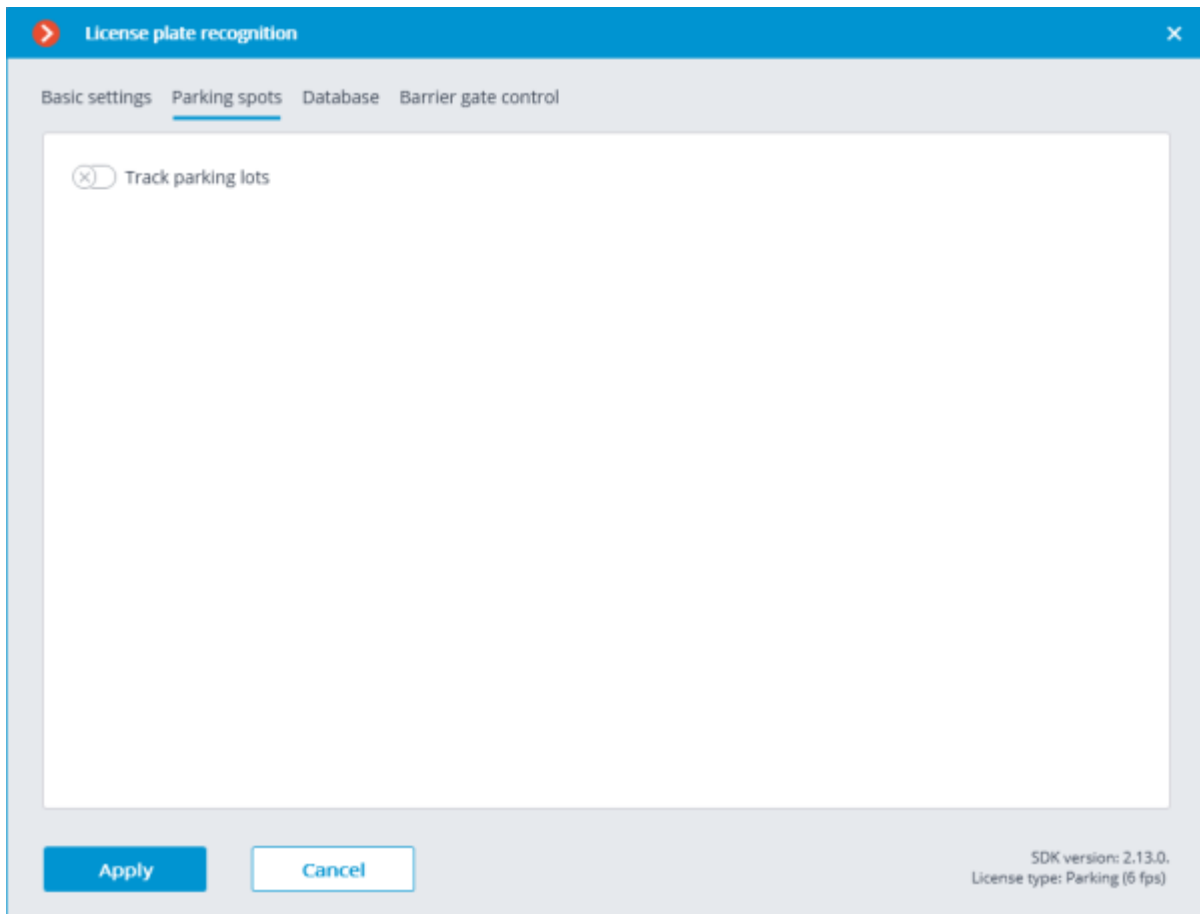
The option must be configured after enabling by clicking the **Adjust saving** link.



In the window that opens, specify the path to the directory where the frames should be stored, as well as its maximum size.

Parking spots

On the **Parking spots** tab, settings for parking lots can be made.



To access the settings for parking lots, turn on the **Track parking lots** slider.

Parking lot settings are set for the entire system.

The following actions can be performed in the settings window:

create a new parking lot;

edit or delete an existing parking lot.

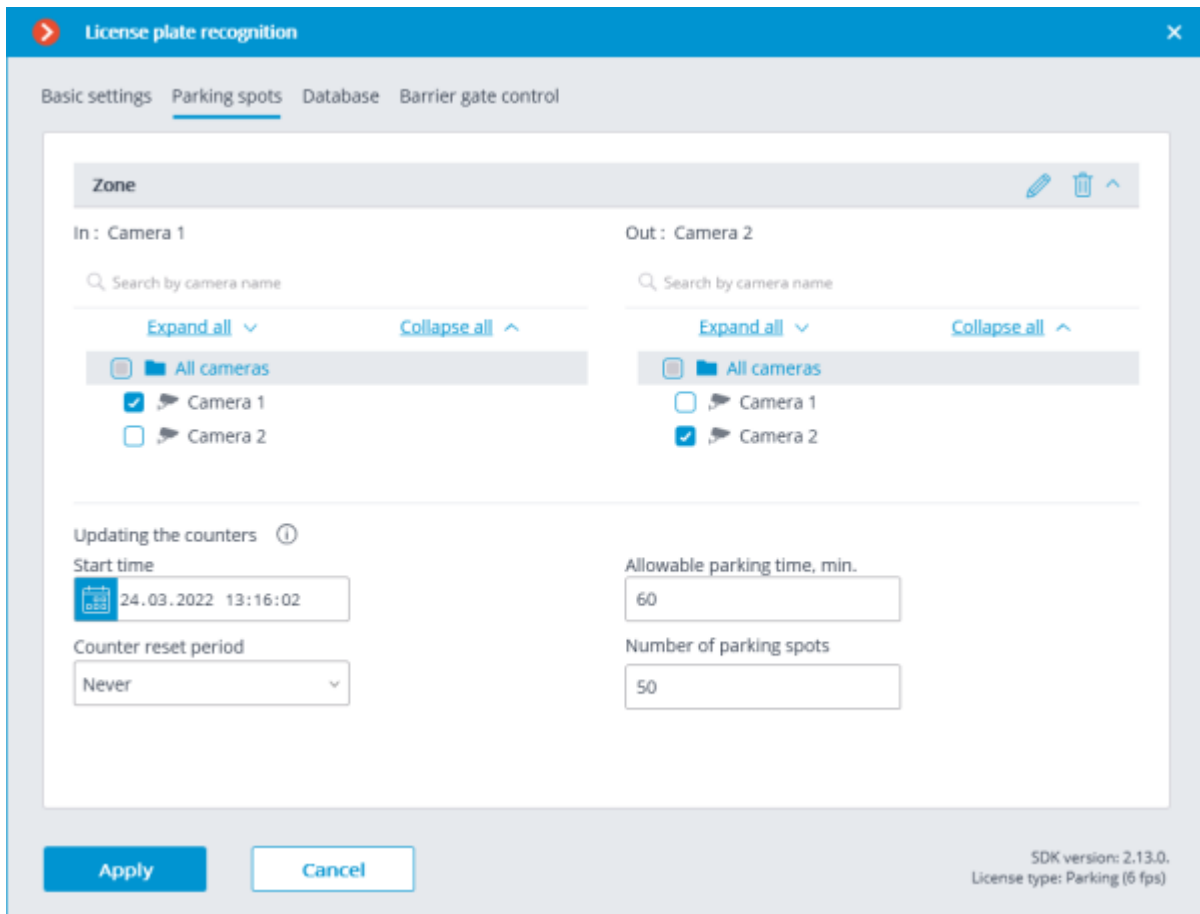

A new [user right](#), **Adjusting the number of occupied parking spots**, has been added to the Users section. This right allows the user to change the value of the occupied parking spots counter in the **Ecortex Client** application. By default, this right is enabled.

Database

The access to the license plate database can be set on the **Database** tab.

Two database deployment options are available: **Local** or **Remote**.

If the recognition process runs on only one server, it is recommended deploying the database on this server by selecting **Local**.

If the recognition process is running on several servers, the database should still be hosted only on one of them. For this purpose, select the **Remote** option for all cameras and specify the database connection parameters: server address, name and password of the database administrator. The same applies when the database of the module is deployed on one server, and the camera with the module enabled is attached to another one.

Eocortex version 3.6 and lower uses **Firebird** DBMS with the following default values:

- **Port:** 3050
- **Username:** SYSDBA
- **Password:** masterkey

Starting from version **Eocortex** 4.0, the module's database is handed over to the [PostgreSQL DBMS](#) with the following default values:

- **Port:** 5432
- **Username:**
 - For Windows: postgres
 - For Linux: eocortex
- **Password:** masterkey

Remote access to databases is not allowed by default in PostgreSQL and must be additionally configured if remote databases are used for analytics. All settings must be

done for the server where the database is stored. Settings are slightly different for [Windows](#) and [Linux](#) operating systems.

When the server is running for the first time after upgrading **Eocortex** to version 4.0 or higher, the existing module database will be automatically transformed to be compatible with **PostgreSQL**.

If connecting to a **Remote** database, use the DBMS **Username** and **Password** that are valid for the server storing the database.

Independent of the database location, the recognition events (date and time of recognition, coordinates of the object in the frame, binding of the recognized object to the database) will always be stored on the server to which the camera with the corresponding events is bound.

Synchronization with the database located on a remote server can take some time

When using a remote database, the [remote database replication mechanism](#) will be applied.

It is possible to check the availability of the database clicking the **Connection check** link. If the server is unavailable, the corresponding message will be displayed.

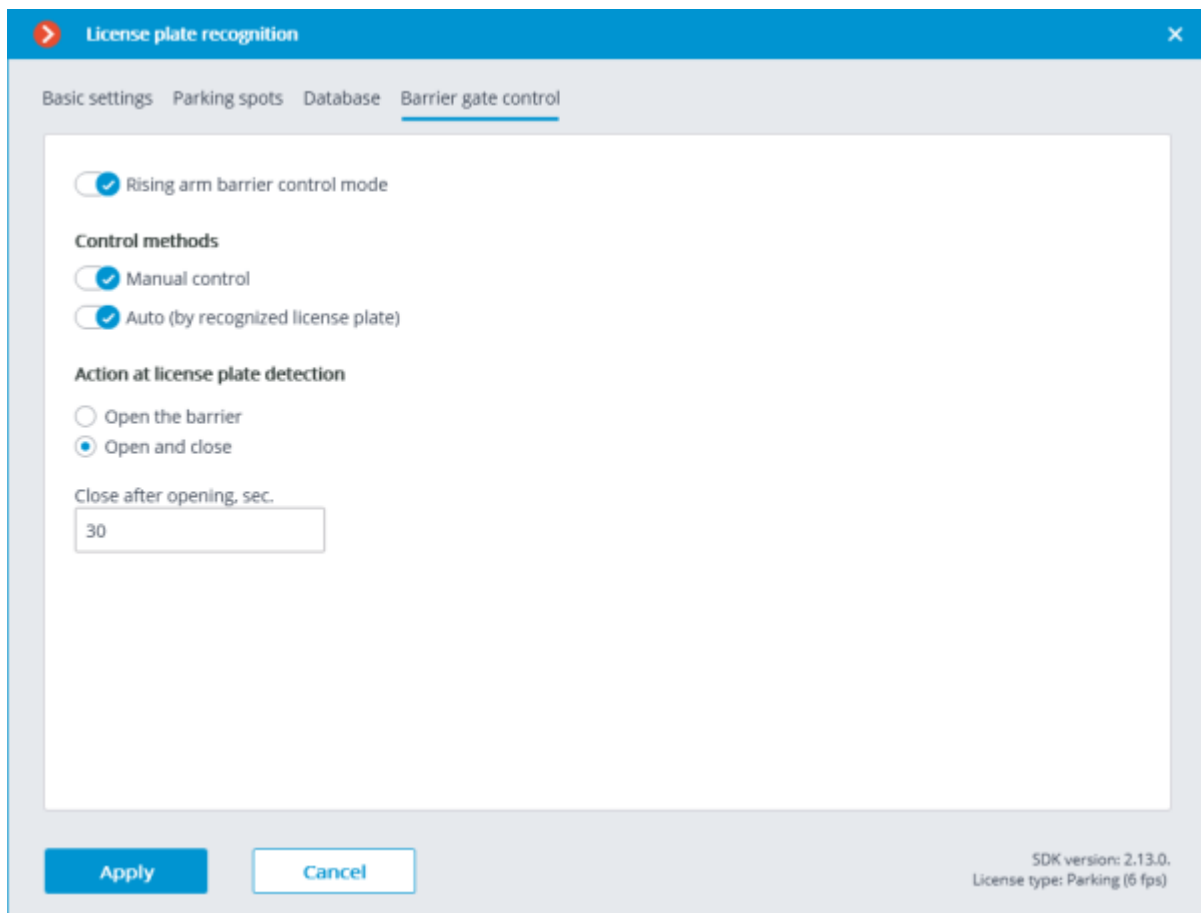
The **Database identifier** field sets its [own license plate database](#) for an individual camera or groups of cameras.

The field **Database identifier** is not initially displayed at the launch of the module.

To use this capability, it is required to set **Database identifier** via REST API.

Barrier gate control

The settings of the module's interaction with a rising arm barrier can be made on the **Barrier gate control** tab.



The **Rising arm barrier control mode** must be activated to access the settings of the module's interaction with a rising arm barrier.

To use the module only for controlling a rising arm barrier, the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module license or protection key is not required. However, for ensuring the abovementioned functionality, it is necessary to have the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module support indicated in the **Eocortex** license file or software key for the corresponding quantity of cameras.

When the rising arm barrier control mode is activated, the following capabilities are available:

Control methods:

Manual control: allows the operator to open and close the barrier using the **Eocortex Client** application.

Auto (by recognized license plate): allows to open the rising arm barrier automatically if the recognized number is in the white list, i.e. is included in the group of vehicles for which the automatic opening of the barrier is envisioned.

In case the automatic rising arm barrier control is activated, the following options are available:

Open the barrier: if the recognized number is in the white list, the **Eocortex** server generates a command to open the barrier.

Open and close: if the recognized number is in the white list, the Eocortex server generates a command to open the barrier; then, in a number of seconds set in the **Close after opening in (sec)** field, a command for closing the barrier is generated.

Most of the modern rising arm barriers automatically close after the passing of one vehicle. For such barriers, the **Open the barrier** option shall be selected.

When the **Open and close** option is selected, it is imperative that the barrier itself has a feature of preventing its closing when a car is below the rising arm. It means that after generating the closing command the barrier's automatics must check if there is a vehicle or a person on the line of closing, and proceed with the closing only in the absence of the above.

Both in manual and in automatic barrier control mode, the opening or closing command is understood as the generation of the [Request to open rising arm barrier](#) or [Request to close rising arm barrier](#) event, correspondingly. To control the rising arm barrier, it is required to set the actions for these events depending on the control wiring diagram of the particular barrier.

For the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module, the following types of [Automatic reports](#) can be configured: **License plate recognition, Entry/exit time recording, Vehicle counting**.

Requirements and recommendations

The module works only with 64-bit version of **Eocortex**.

For the proper operation of the module, it is imperative to correctly select, place and set up the camera, adjust the software motion detector and the module itself. When choosing the camera, it is recommended to consider the image quality requirements, control zone particularities, and the conditions of the camera installation and operation.

Requirements to the license plate image

It is assumed that the license plates of the vehicles to be recognized correspond to the requirements of the Vienna Convention on Road Traffic (Part I: Convention on Road Traffic – Attachment 2), in particular:

"2. The registration number shall be so composed and displayed as to be legible in normal daylight at a distance of at least 40 m by an observer placed on the axis of the vehicle, the vehicle being stationary ..."

"3. When the registration number is displayed on a special plate, this plate shall be flat and fixed in a vertical or nearly vertical position and at right angles to the vehicle's median longitudinal plane".

The license plate number will be recognized only if its image is rich in contrast and fits entirely in the frame.

Additionally, there is a requirement regarding the minimum height of a symbol on the image of the license plate in the frame (i.e. the height at which it is still possible to provide recognition): 30 pixels. This limitation is illustrated on the picture below. You can also see the minimum permissible dimensions for the license plate of Ukraine and Russia (the overall width is given for reference because it may help when calculating the focal length).



When the camera is installed outside, the natural noise pollution of the video image may happen due to the unfavorable weather conditions (rain, snow). In order to improve recognition in such circumstances, it is advisable to increase the size of the license plates in the frame.

Recommendations on camera installation

In this section you will find the recommendations on camera installation that need to be followed in order to ensure the reliable recognition of license plates in the control zone. Each installation location has its individual characteristics. This section contains the typical camera installation diagrams. They are to be taken into consideration at the stage of designing the traffic video surveillance systems with due account for the specific parameters of the site.

The correctly performed installation must ensure the following:

The license plate image in the frame must correspond with the requirements specified in the previous section;

The maximum duration of presence of the license plate in the frame.

It is also necessary to fulfill the following requirements listed below (both for highway and checkpoint installation locations).

To minimize the occurrence of false triggering in the process of recognition, it is imperative to install the camera in such a way as to avoid the presence of the high-contrast objects in the frame, for example, billboards, trees, grille fences etc.).

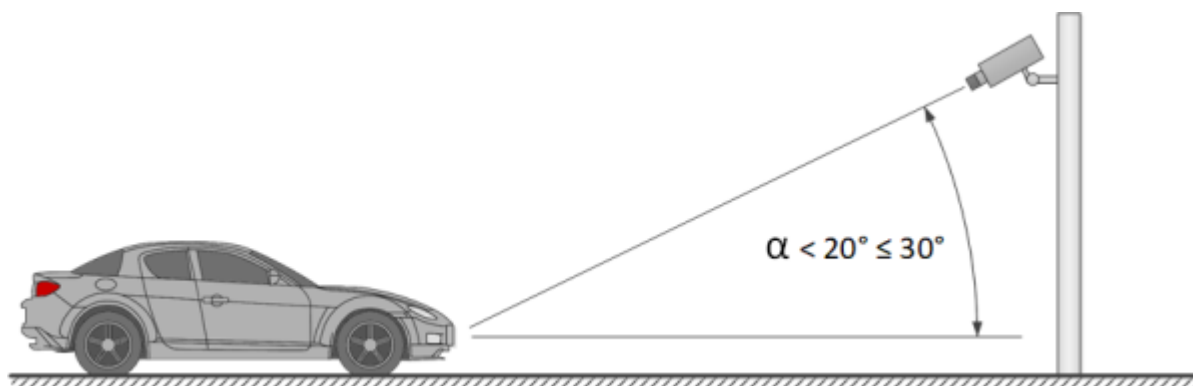
In order to avoid camera flaring, it shall not be directed at the light sources (the Sun, streetlamps) and at the highly reflective objects.

To prevent the distortion of the symbols on the license plate image, it is advisable to ensure the optimal camera installation angles. When performing the surveillance on descending or ascending vehicles, the road inclination angle must also be taken into consideration.

Vertical camera installation angle

Recommended: up to 18–20°

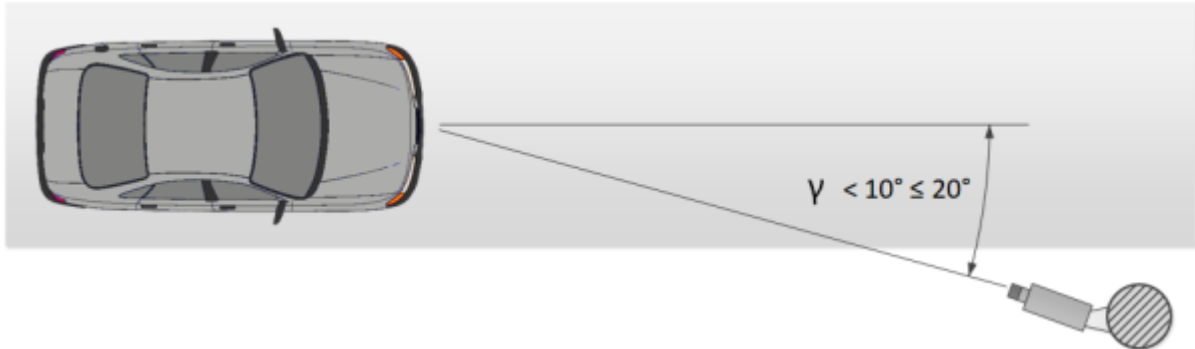
Maximum permissible: 30°



Horizontal camera installation angle

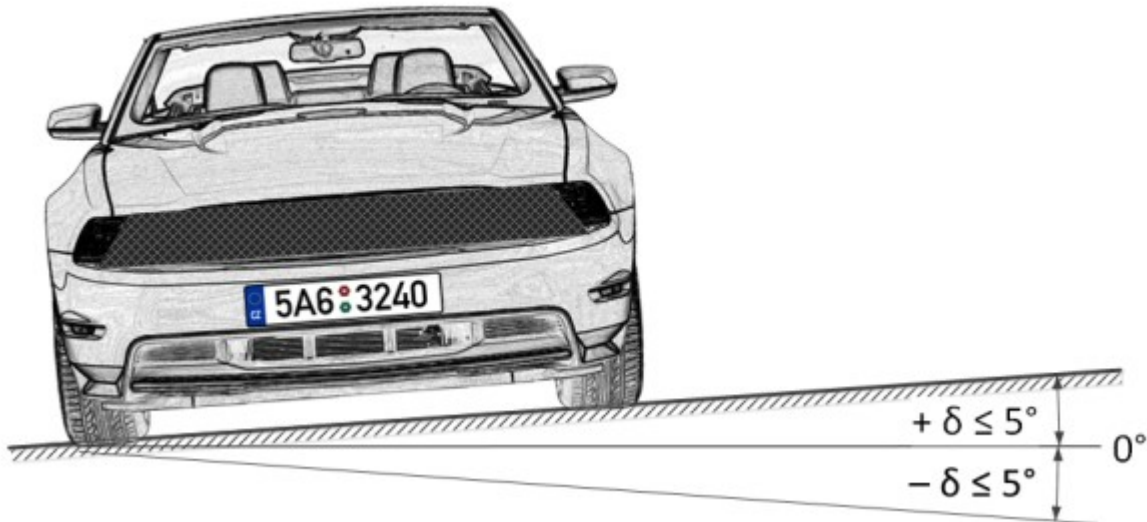
Recommended: up to 5–10°

In the course of the installation, it is required to ensure that the tilt of the license plate on the image in relation to the horizontal plane of the camera does not exceed 5° both clockwise and counterclockwise. When recognizing the single line numbers with no more than six symbols it is possible to check the appropriateness of the selected camera tilt angle using the "single line rule": the imaginary horizontal line must cross the first and the last symbols of the license plate.

Permissible license plate banking angle



Single line rule

The distance from the camera installation location to the beginning of the viewing zone is determined by the focal length of the lens. And conversely, if the distance from the camera installation location to the center of the control zone is known, it is required to ensure the appropriate focal length of the lens.

When using the separate IR illuminator, the angle of the infrared light must correspond to the camera viewing angle. The correspondence of the IR illuminator beam angle and the camera lens viewing angle is especially important at the large distances, when the camera operates at the limit of its sensitivity.

The typical camera installation diagrams for license plate recognition are given below.

Camera installation on a checkpoint

When performing video surveillance of the entrances and exits of the protected areas, the speed of the vehicles normally do not exceed 20 km/h, meaning that it is possible to use the license plate recognition module in the Parking mode. In this case, the camera is normally installed at the edge of the lane.

The camera installation height shall be above the level of the headlights of the vehicles.

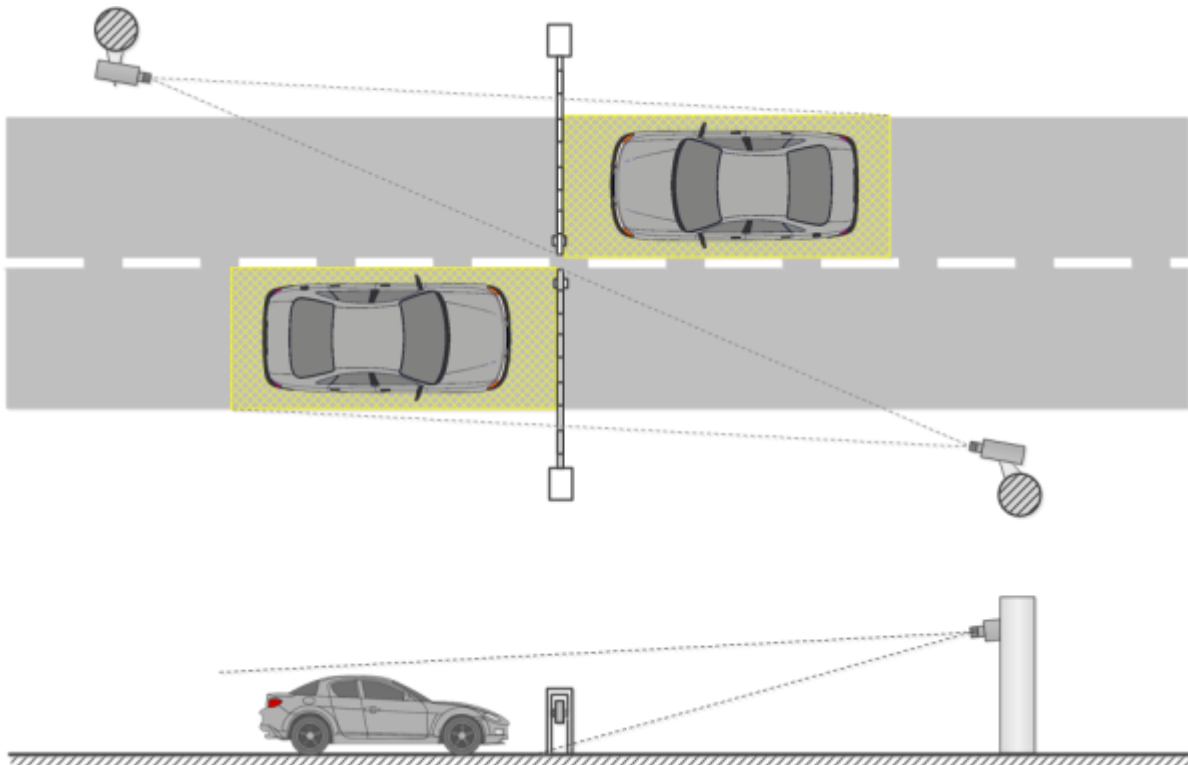
The distance between the place of installation and the focus area must be at least 3 meters.

The installation of the camera in close proximity to the prospected license plate detection area and the usage of the short focus lenses lead to the depth of field reduction and the distortion of the image at the edges. Both must be avoided to ensure reliable recognition.

For the separate control of the exits and entrances, it is recommended to install separate cameras, one on the entrance and the other on the exit. When only one camera is used, the vehicles travelling in the opposite directions may block one another. Moreover, it is advisable to separate the traffic lanes not only with road marking, but also with a barrier, where the width of the road allows it.

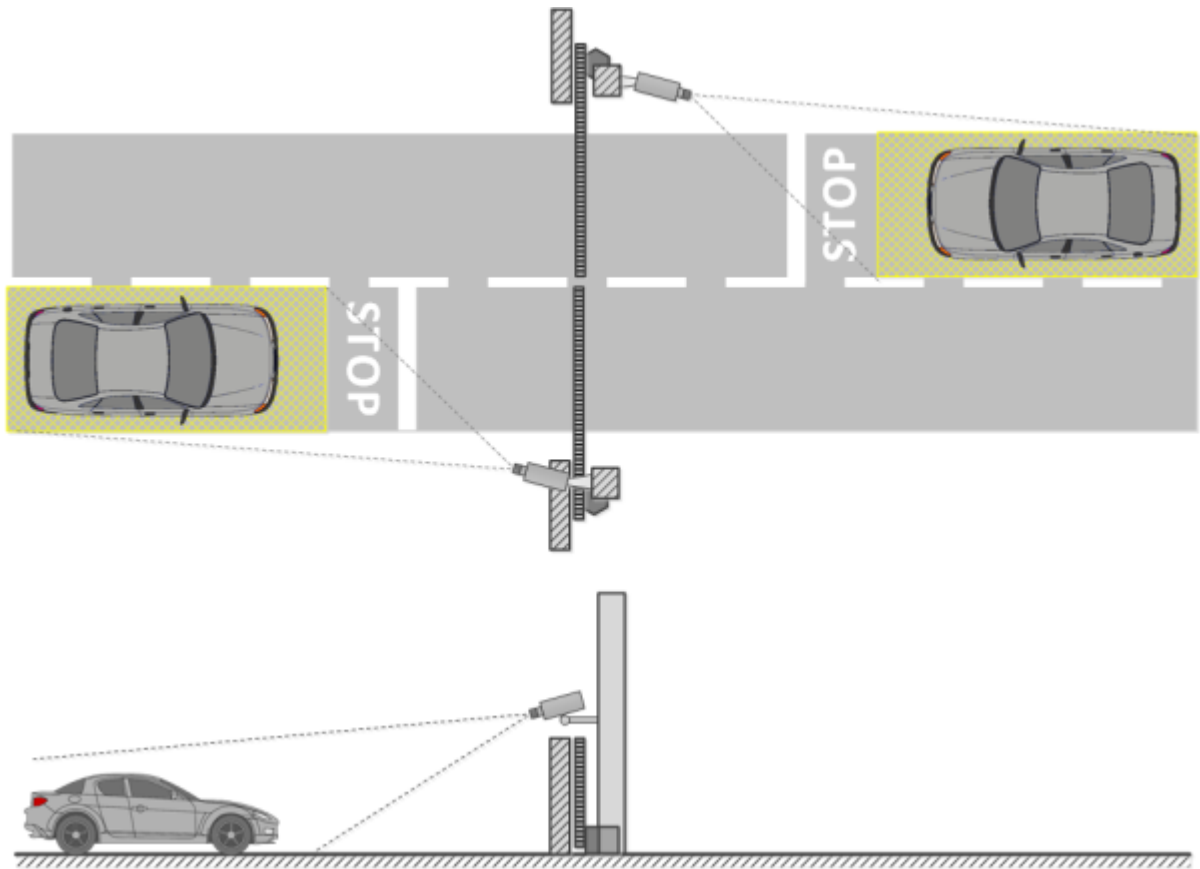
When using the rising arm barrier, the controlled area may start immediately before it. In this case the camera is to be installed at a distance from the barrier line.

Controlled areas with separate lanes and a rising arm barrier



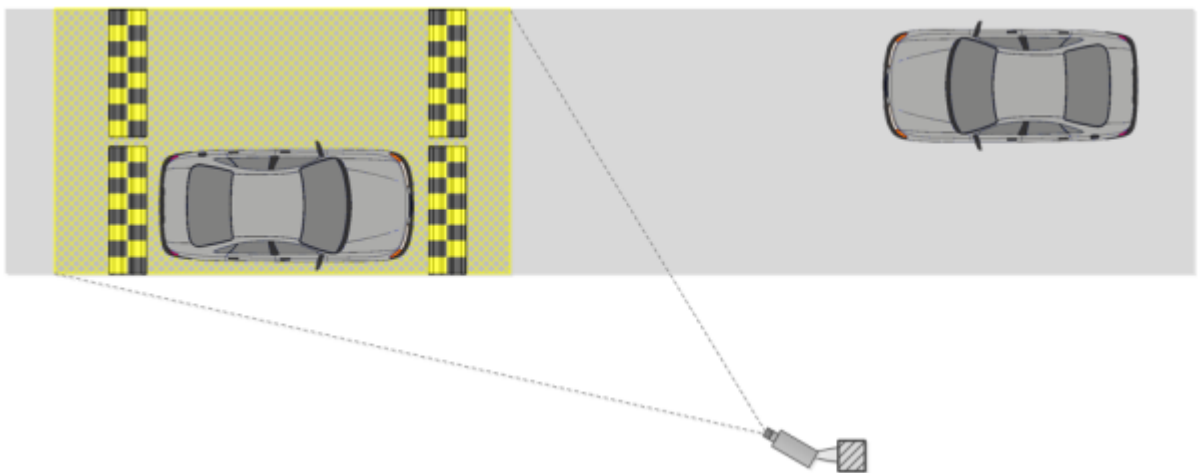
When using the gates, the controlled area must not start immediately before the gates, because the camera is usually installed at the level of the gates. In such a case a stop line, a mandatory stop sign or a traffic light is used for stopping the vehicle in the controlled area.

Controlled areas with separate lanes and gates



At the unregulated crossing points it is required to use speed bumps (road humps) to make the drivers reduce speed to ensure successful recognition; it is also advisable to use additional means such as the speed limit signs (up to 5 km/h), mandatory stop signs, stop lines etc.

Open controlled area with two-way traffic



The suggested camera installation parameters for surveillance of exits and entrances calculated for the cameras with the sensor size of 1/3" are shown in the following table. These parameters allow to provide the minimum distance between the camera installation location and the controlled area of the given width. It is also required to be guided by the quality of the license plate image in the focusing area in the course of the installation.

The parameters shown in the above table are indicative. It is strongly recommended to calculate the camera installation parameters individually, using the CCTV calculator, with due regard for the design and operational characteristics of the particular cameras and their working environment.

Camera installation on a highway

When organizing the surveillance on a highway, the camera is normally installed on an L-shaped pole at the edge of the lane or on the arch support above the center of the lane.

The standard installation height is 4 to 6 (maximum 20) meters.

The vertical camera tilt angle is regulated by the basic guidelines.

The distance to the controlled area and, correspondingly, the focal length of the lens are determined based on the camera installation height, tilt angle and width of capture.

The higher the camera is installed, the higher is the probability that the license plates of the vehicles moving at a small distance from one another (for example, in case of a traffic jam) will get into the frame. But it needs to be noted that the increase of height leads to the higher distortion of the license plate images, and the symbol size may be close to the permissible minimum (or may even be unacceptable). In such cases it is possible to shift the region of interest to the higher distance by reducing the camera vertical tilt angle and changing the focal length in order to ensure reliable recognition.

The modern IP cameras are capable of covering several (up to 4) traffic lanes. Thus, it is possible to reduce the quantity of cameras to be installed in the controlled area. But in this case it is required to choose the installation height, tilt angle, and focal length in such a way as to minimize the optical image distortion (for example, the short focus lenses give significant image distortion on the periphery of the frame).

In the table below you will find the approximate parameters of camera installation for performing video surveillance on a highway. The camera parameters used for the calculation are as follows: 1/3" sensor and 5-50 mm varifocal lens. The values shown in the table allow to provide the minimum distance from the camera installation location to the controlled zone of the specified width. In the course of the installation it is imperative to ensure the quality of the license plate image to be obtained by the camera in the focal zone.

The table above contains the indicative values. It is strongly advised to perform calculations of camera installation parameters individually, using the CCTV calculator, with due consideration to the design and operational characteristics of the particular cameras and their working environment.

Recommendations on choosing and setting up a camera and lens

When choosing a camera for the license plate recognition purposes, be guided by the above requirements for the received image and recommendations for the camera mounting, as well as the following recommendations for the stream generation settings. Note that some features and settings may be not presented in the description and/or design of specific cameras.

General settings

Frame resolution: This parameter must be calculated individually for each camera setup, as depends on the requirements for the minimum allowable size of the license plate on the frame, the distance from the camera to the license plate, the characteristics of the camera lens, and other parameters.

Frame rate (fps): Depends on the requirements, settings, and mode of operation of the module.

Camera color mode: Monochromatic (black and white) image is a recommended option.

Colored image is allowed if necessary but a camera must have a full-fledged Day/Night mode with a retractable IR-cut filter.

Codec: MJPEG, MPEG-4, H.264 or H.265.

When choosing a codec and video stream compression settings, it is necessary to ensure the maximum possible preservation of fine details and the absence of any artifacts on the frame.

Bitrate type: When choosing the type of bitrate between constant (**CBR**) and variable (**VBR**), **VBR** is preferred.

Image sensor and signal processing

Sensor type: Both Complementary Metal-Oxide Sensor (**CMOS**) and Charged Coupled Device (**CCD**) sensors are suitable for the recognition of license plates.

CCDs have slightly better light sensitivity and less noise than CMOS sensors. Higher light sensitivity provides better image in low light conditions. But CCDs are more expensive and can consume up to 100 times more power than CMOS, and sometimes when using a CCD sensor, a smearing effect may occur that interferes with the plate recognition process:



Nowadays, CMOS sensors are very close in terms of image quality to CCDs. At the same time, CMOS sensors reduce the overall cost of the camera because they contain all the necessary logic to build the camera and provide more integration capabilities and features than CCDs.

Sensor size: 1/3" or bigger (pixel size is more important).

Pixel size: 3.75 μm (micron) or bigger

Increasing the pixel size increases the image quality in low light conditions.

The size of a single pixel (x_1) can be calculated by dividing the sensor width in mm by the sensor width in pixels:

$$x_1 = w/W$$

Where:

w is a sensor width in millimeters.

W is a sensor width in pixels.

Typical sensor sizes in mm are shown in the table below. It should be taken into account that the dimensions of specific sensors may differ from typical ones.

As an example, the calculation of the pixel size for a 1/3" sensor with a resolution of 1024x768:

$$x_1 = 4.8/1024 = 0.00468 \text{ mm} = 4.68 \text{ } \mu\text{m}$$

Light sensitivity: 0.1 - 0.01 lux (in combination with a high-aperture lens).

Caution should be exercised with a camera with a claimed sensitivity below 0.003 lux, as this level of sensitivity requires additional signal processing. This significantly degrades the image quality and causes fast moving objects to blur, which as a result interferes with the recognition process.

IR Light Sensitivity: Availability of the Day/Night mode is recommended for round-the-clock recognition of license plates.

Dynamic Range: minimum 60 dB (an approximate contrast ratio is 1:1000).

Wide Dynamic Range (WDR): Activation of WDR is recommended. WDR significantly improves the image quality in high-contrast lighting conditions, which allows to capture details both in dark and bright parts of the field of view.

Lens

If the camera is designed to allow lens interchangeability, it is very important to choose the right one. A lens designed to work with a 1/2" sensor is compatible with 1/2", 1/3" and 1/4" sensors, but it would not work with a 2/3" sensor.

If the lens is designed to work with a sensor smaller than the one installed in the camera, then the image will have black borders. If the lens is designed to work with a sensor larger than the camera's, then the field of view will be smaller than the capabilities of the lens, and part of the image will be left outside the sensor, creating a telephoto effect when the image looks enlarged.

Nowadays, cameras with the three most common types of lenses can be found:

Fixed lens: A lens with a constant focal length and therefore only one field of view available.

Varifocal lens: A lens with the configurable focal length that allows to get multiple fields of view. The field of view can be manually adjusted, but users then have to manually refocus the lens.

Afocal system (Zoom lens): Similar to a varifocal lens, afocal lens has a range of focal lengths and fields of view. However, the lens does not need to be manually refocused if the field of view is changed. Focus is maintained over the entire focal length range (for example, 6 to 48 mm). Moving the lens can be carried out manually or mechanized (with remote control). If the lens has the ability to zoom, then the magnification factor (multiplicity) corresponds to the ratio of the maximum focal length of the lens to the minimum.

Lens type: It is recommended to use lenses with configurable focal length (including afocal system) for the recognition of license plates.

Resolving power: The number of line pairs per millimeter must correspond to the physical resolution of the sensor.

When getting acquainted with the characteristics of a lens that can potentially be used for the recognition of license plates, it is necessary to take into account the number of line pairs per mm

(LP/mm) that it is capable to project onto the sensor. For example, 5 dark and 5 light lines per mm form a resolution of 10 lines per mm, i.e. 5 pairs of lines per millimeter.

To calculate the exact number of pairs of lines per millimeter that the lens must provide visual distinction with a known sensor size, divide the sensor width in pixels by the sensor size in millimeter, then divide the result by two. Such a calculation can be represented as the formula below:

$$L_{mm} = (W / w) / 2 = (1 / x_1) / 2$$

Where:

L_{mm} is the number of pairs of lines per millimeter

W is the sensor width in pixels

w is the sensor width in millimeters

x₁ is the size of a single pixel in millimeters

As an example, the calculation of LP/mm number for a 1/3" sensor with a resolution of 1024x768:

$$L_{mm} = (1024 / 4,8) / 2 \approx 107 \text{ pairs of lines per mm.}$$

It should be taken into account that the resolving power may be affected by other factors. In particular, resolution may vary depending on different f-stop values (resolution is at its minimum when the iris is completely open). Minimum resolution value is provided in lens specifications. As the iris is closing, the resolution becomes higher (residual optical-system aberrations are reduced). It's important to keep in mind that focusing mistakes may reduce resolving power as well.

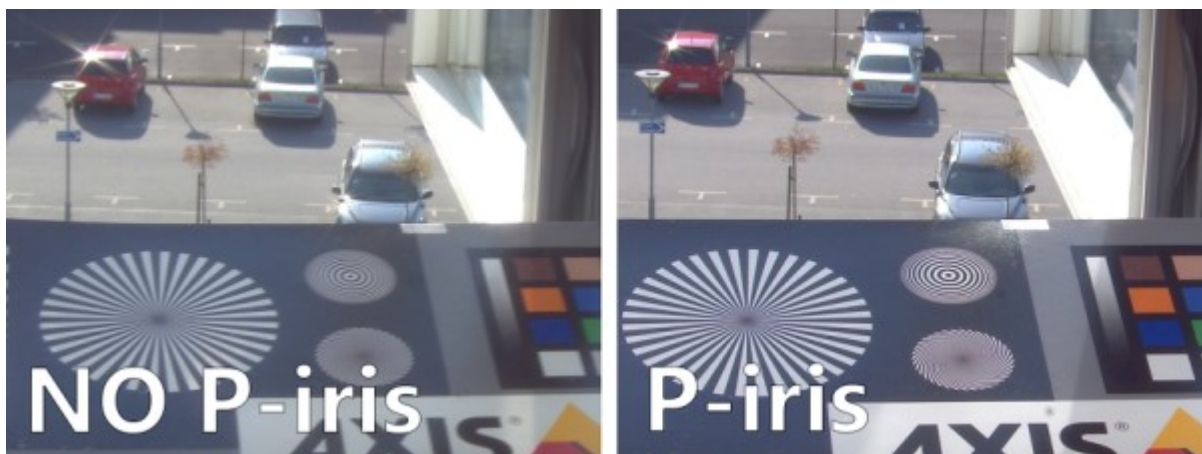

Focal length range: Recommended ranges are 5-50 mm, 7-70 mm.

Aperture (f) number: 1.0, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, 1.8.

Aperture control:

P-Iris. The recommended option, especially in non-constant lighting conditions. It allows avoiding diffraction (blurring of the image) effect and increasing the sharpness of the image, allowing video surveillance in a wide range of lighting conditions and distances - both in parking lots and on highways. This is achieved by automatically limiting aperture narrowing in strong light conditions. The limits for automatic control of the aperture additionally can be configured through the user interface of the camera.



For some cameras with P-iris, the user interface allows to configure the aperture opening on an index scale - from maximum to minimum. With this function, the iris position, which is set by auto adjustment for most lighting conditions, can be adjusted to the desired position.

DC-Iris. The allowed option. Comparing with P-iris, it only manages the exposure of the sensor. When DC-iris is opened, the sharpness is affected and auto-tuning of this image quality is not available.

Fixed or manual aperture. This option can only be used for surveillance under constant lighting conditions (e.g. indoor parking) when there is no need for constant aperture adjustment. The exposure in this case is set by adjusting shutter speed and AGC that is not as flexible as dynamic aperture tuning. A fixed aperture is set constructively during the manufacture of the lens, a manual aperture is set during lens adjustment and is not automatically adjusted during operation.

IR correction. Required to avoid overexposure if IR projector is used. Lenses of the kind usually have IR index in their marking.

Focal length

To select a proper lens for a camera, it is needed to know the following values: sensor size, distance between the camera and the object and width of the object. Those three values are enough to calculate focal length of the lens in mm (or, if the focal length is available, calculate the width of field of view at set distance) using various CCTV and Lens Calculators.

Such calculators are available online (for example, on camera/lens manufacturers' websites).

Moreover, approximate focal length may be calculated using the following formula:

$$f = d * w / W$$

Where:

f is a focal length in millimeters.

d is a distance between the camera and the object in meters.

w is a width of the sensor in millimeters.

W is a width of the object in meters.

Camera's angle of view is determined by focal length value. When calculating the angle of view, the following points must be borne in mind:

The shorter the focal length, the larger the angle of view, and vice versa.

The smaller the sensor size, the smaller the angle of view (for a lens with the same focal length).

The following table represents the correlation between angle of view and sensor size as well as focal distance of the lens. A standard CCTV Calculator was used for calculations.

Depth of field

Depth of field refers to the distance in front of and behind the focus point within which objects are sharp. The depth of field is an important value when recognizing license plates.

Depth of field is affected by the following three factors: focal length, aperture opening and distance from the camera to the object. A long focal length, long aperture opening or a short distance between the camera and the subject limiting the depth of field.

Many modern surveillance lenses are designed to provide a great depth of field over a wide range of focal lengths.

For some lenses it may be needed to adjust the depth of field manually. In this case, set the focal length first and only then configure the back focus. Adjust the back focus either in natural low light (evening or night) or artificially reduced daylight using an external neutral density filter (the ND filter usually places in front of the lens). Adjusting the back focus in bright daylight may cause an out-of-focus image at night. Adjust the back focus when the aperture is fully open (the maximum aperture is needed to reduce the depth of field to make back focus adjustment easier and more accurate). Sometimes it is difficult to precisely adjust the back focus, in which case it is recommended to set the focus to infinity.

Note that if the depth of field is shallow, the license plate number may not be recognized correctly or not at all. This is due to the fact that the application uses several adjacent frames received during the movement of the vehicle through the controlled area for recognition. With a shallow depth of field, the license plate can not be clearly recognized only in one sharp image, while in the rest of the frames it will be blurred.

Lenses with automatic iris (fixed and adjustable focal length) can have two settings:

Automatic or **Auto Light Control (ALC)**, which controls the sensitivity of the automatic iris control circuitry to changes in light levels.

Level, which allows setting the average value of the iris.

For such lenses, it is recommended to set the medium value for the **Automatic** adjustment and configure the **Level** as follows: set the maximum value and point the camera so that the maximum amount of light enters the lens (it is strictly forbidden to point the lens directly to the sun as it will lead to sensor malfunction) and then cover the camera lens for 5 seconds. After opening the lens, the image should reappear. If this does not happen — repeat the adjustment.

Shutter speed

Shutter speed (Exposure) is one of the critical parameters when recognizing license plates. It is highly recommended to use cameras with manual shutter speed control for license plate recognition.

It is important to keep in mind that too slow shutter speed result in the blurring effect of the license plate characters on the image. Moreover, while watching a video, they may seem clear, but when viewed frame-by-frame, distortions are clearly visible.

For each movement speed mode there is a range of recommended values which should be set for shutter speed depending on the maximum speed of vehicles in the control area.

In addition, if the horizontal camera rotation angle to the license plate plane exceeds 10°, it is recommended to halve the shutter speed, since the license plate image in this situation is blurring along several axes.

Infrared illumination

To provide round-the-clock recognition in the area with changing lighting conditions, an infrared illumination (by means of either embedded or standalone IR projector) is required. In this case, it is necessary to select a camera with an infrared-sensitive sensor (so called day/night camera). The camera must be equipped with a lens with infrared correction (IR compensation). Marking of such lenses usually contains the "IR" index. As a result, an informative monochromatic image will be provided even for a poorly illuminated areas.

IR illumination range: Recommended value for license plate recognition is **850–880 nm**. It has sufficient recognition distance and generates a comparatively low amount of visible illumination.

IR illumination mode: It is recommended to use IR projector in impulse mode when the illumination impulse is synchronized with global shutter operating mode. This provides more rational use of projector's energy resources, prologing its service life and saving electricity.

Angle of illumination (if standalone IR projector is used): Should be the same as the camera angle of view. If illumination angle of IR projector is lower that camera angle of view, an exterior light source or well-lit object may get captured in the field of view making the shutter work under the average frame lighting value and thus lower the exposure (equal to forced decreasing of the camera sensitivity). Balancing illumination angle of IR projector and angle of view of the camera is especially important for long-distance surveillance when the camera works at the limit of its sensitivity.

Back focus and depth of field with IR lighting: Since IR light has a longer wavelength and lower refractive index than conventional light, the plane of the focused image is positioned slightly behind the plane of the image sensor.

ND filters

When surveillance is carried out under changing lighting conditions (usually, outdoors), an overexposure may occur. In such cases, a required f-stop is achieved by combining the features of mechanic iris and a neutral density (ND) filter. This type of filter is also useful for minimizing the depth of field when adjusting the back focus or adjusting the auto iris level during the day.

There are built-in and external ND filters. It should be noted that the optical accuracy of ND filters is very important, because as the f-number increases, the resolving power of the lens must be maintained, which theoretically is at its maximum in the middle of the mechanical aperture setting range and decreases as the f-number increases/decreases (this is different from the depth-of-field effect). The possibility of the neutral-gray filter reducing the resolution of the lens has to be taken into account.

Filter properties may be specified in different ways:

ND* and ***X** indicate light blocking by how many times the filter attenuates the light.

***.* ND** indicates the optical density number of the filter.

f-stop reduction value indicates the number of exposure compensation steps (aperture steps, f-number).

Filters can be combined to achieve the desired degree of light attenuation. For example, combining the ND8 and ND100 results in a filter with attenuation of 800 times.

Module installation and update

Only one of the License Plate Recognition modules can be installed on the same server: either **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** or **License Plate Recognition (Light)**.

The module works only with 64-bit version of **Eocortex**.

Installation under Windows OS

This module is external; it is not included in the basic **Eocortex** distribution package and requires individual installation.

The module must be only installed on the computer with **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone** application, to which the license plate recognition cameras are bound. The computers with just **Eocortex Client** application installed do not require installation of the module.

The module's version must match the version of **Eocortex** software installed on a particular computer.

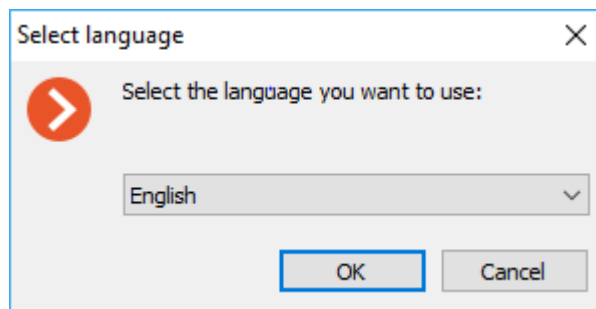
The installation files must be run under the administrator's account.

To update the module, it is required to perform the same steps as for the initial installation of the module. After selecting the installation language but prior to launching the installation wizard, the windows offering to uninstall the previous version will appear. It is required to confirm the uninstall. After the uninstall is complete, the module installation wizard will appear.

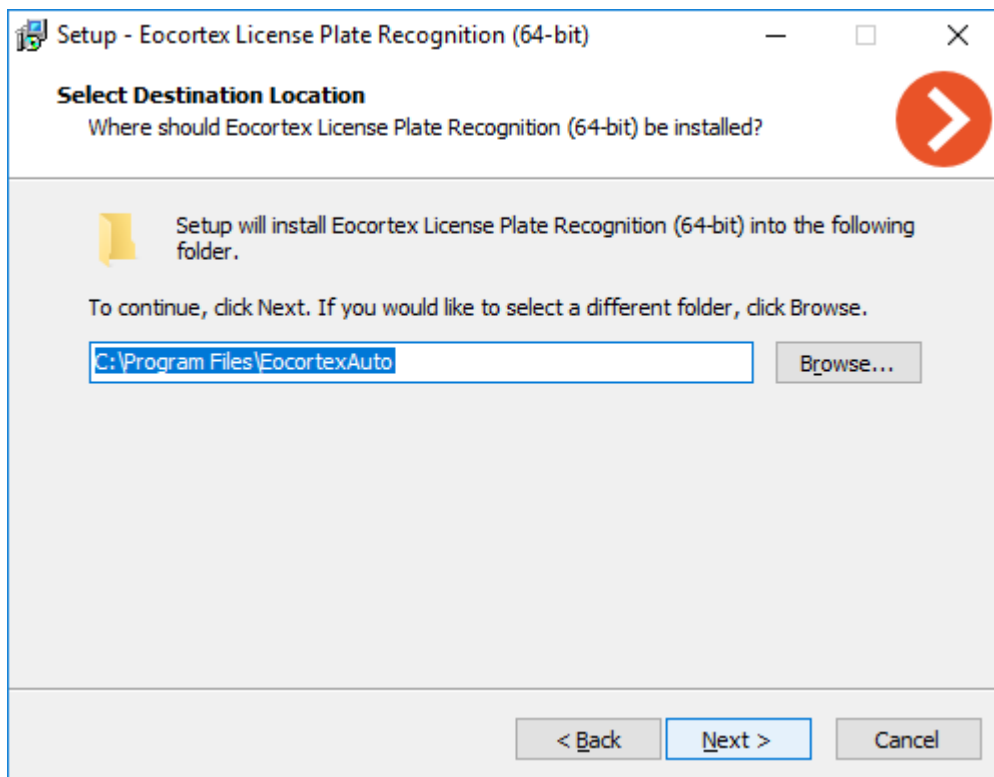
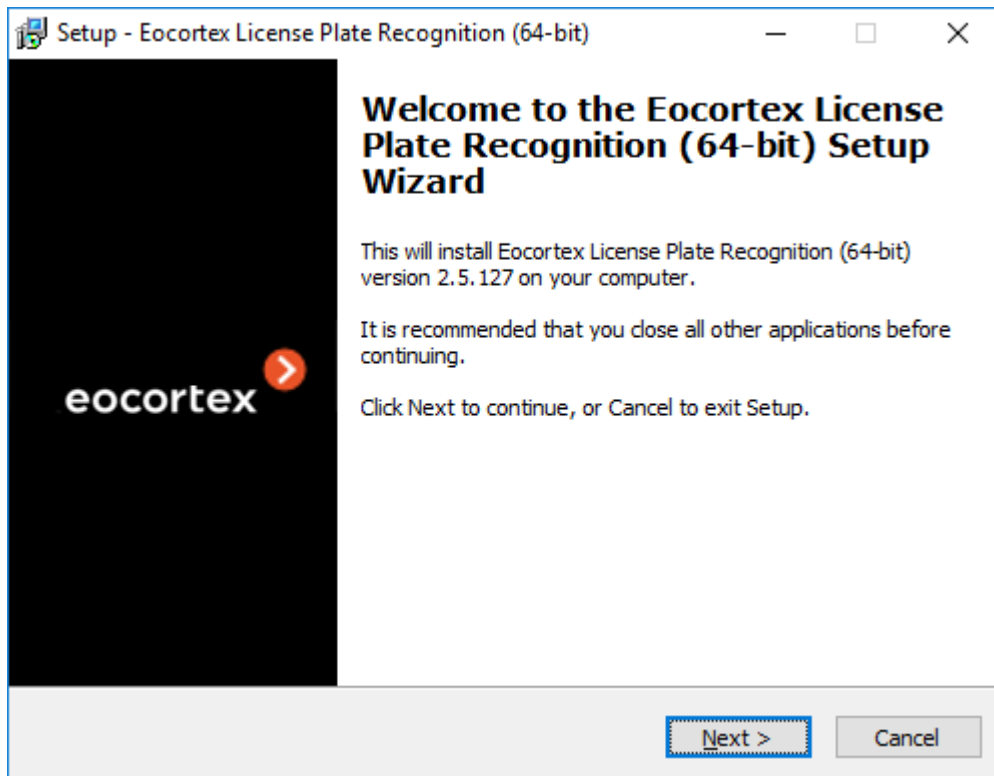
Before installing the module, it is required to stop all the **Eocortex** applications running on the computer, and to insert the module protection key in the USB port.

To install the module, it is required to run **EocortexAuto Installer_x64.exe** file.

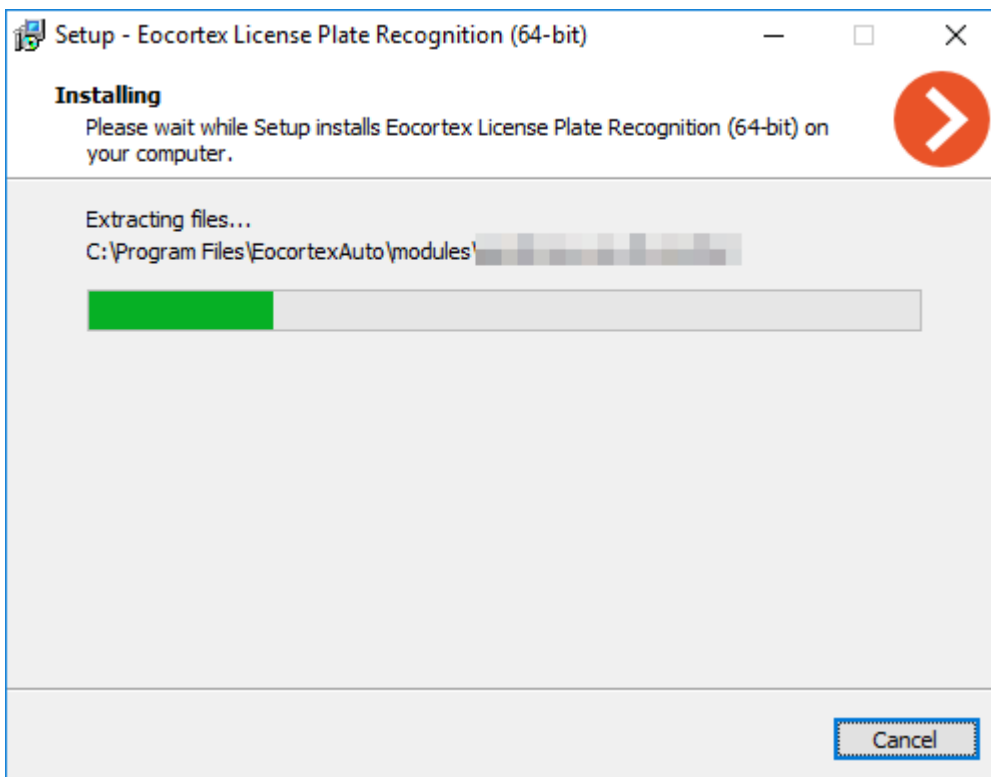
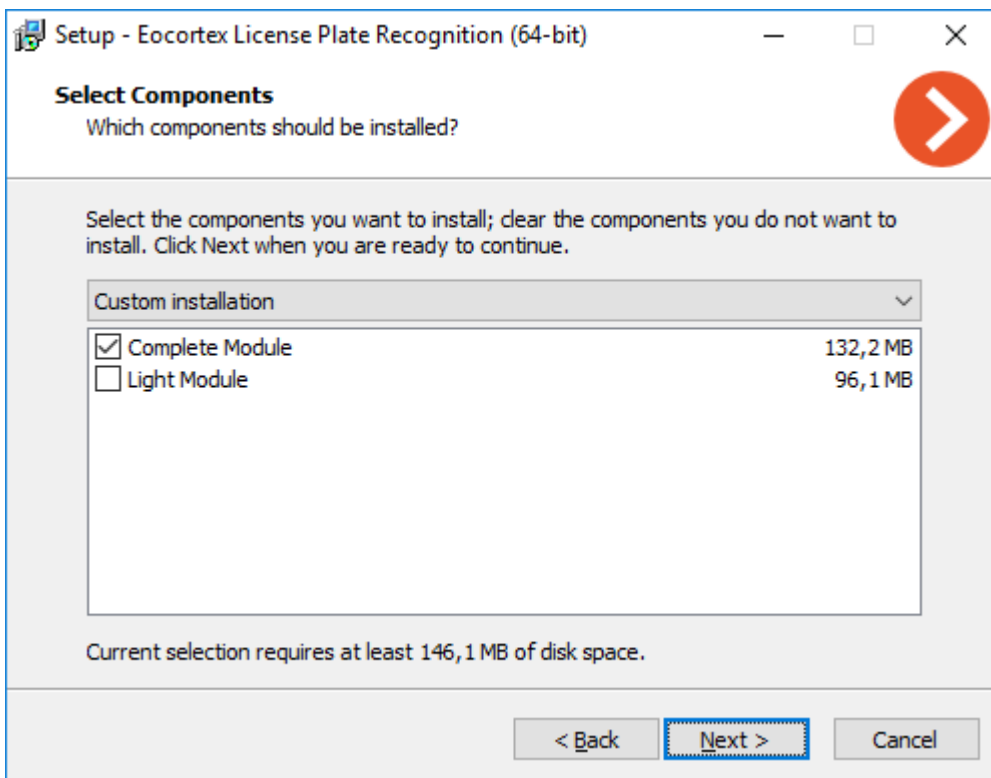
It is required to choose the installation language in the opened **Select language** window.

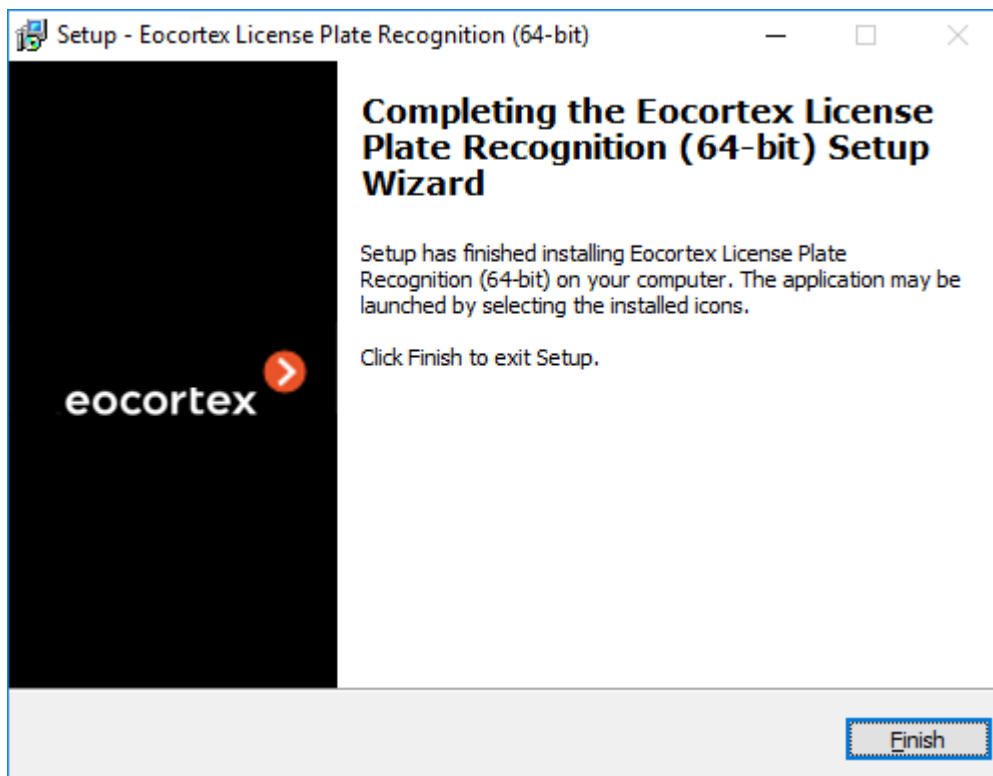


Then it is necessary to follow the steps of the installation wizard.



At the **Select component** step, choose the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** option.





By default, the module will be installed to **C:\Program Files\EocortexAuto** folder.

Installation under Linux OS

This module is external, meaning that it is not a part of the main distribution kit of **Eocortex** and needs to be installed separately.

It is required to install the module exclusively on a computer that already has the **Eocortex Server** application installed; this computer must have the cameras for license plate recognition bound to it.

The module's version has to be the same as the version of **Eocortex** installed on the given computer.

The module is installed on Linux using the standard procedure. The files are located in the repository:

Depending on the type of processor and recognition procedure, it is necessary to choose one of the following packages:

With neural network technology:

Licensing the module

Since the module uses libraries developed by a third party and requires separate licensing, two elements are used for its licensing protection: the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module's hardware protection key and the license, bound to the **Eocortex** protection key.

The need to use two elements of the license protection at the same time is only a technical feature: upon purchase, only one license is paid for each server, which indicates the type of module - **Highway** or **Parking** - and the number of cameras for plate recognition on this server.

The module's hardware protection key is a Sentinel (HASP) USB dongle:



[The Eocortex protection key](#) can be either hardware or software.

The module is licensed according to the type of license, groups of recognizable countries and the number of recognition channels.

Types of license:

- **Highway:** Recognition of license plates moving with the speed up to 250 kmph. Stream analysis is performed either with the actual frame rate received from the camera or according to the analysis rate specified in the settings of the software motion detector.
- **Parking:** Recognition of license plates moving with the speed up to 20 kmph. Stream analysis is performed at a frequency of no more than 6 frames per second, regardless of the actual frame rate received from the camera.

The **Eocortex** server that handles license plate recognition cameras must have the module's own protection key plugged in. In addition, this server must have a **Eocortex** license with the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module usage supported.

One **Eocortex** server can have only one **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module protection key.

Only one speed mode can be used on the same **Eocortex** server at the time: **Highway** or **Parking**.

The number of cameras recognizing license plates on the server can be increased. To do this, purchase the license update for the module, [update the Eocortex license](#) on the server and then [update the module protection key](#).

License type of the module can be changed, but only from the **Parking** to **Highway** speed mode. To do this, purchase the license update for the module and [update the module protection key](#). It is not necessary to update **Eocortex** license if the number of plate recognition cameras is not changed.

In a multiserver system, the license plate recognition module can be applied to cameras connected to different **Eocortex** servers, with the following conditions:

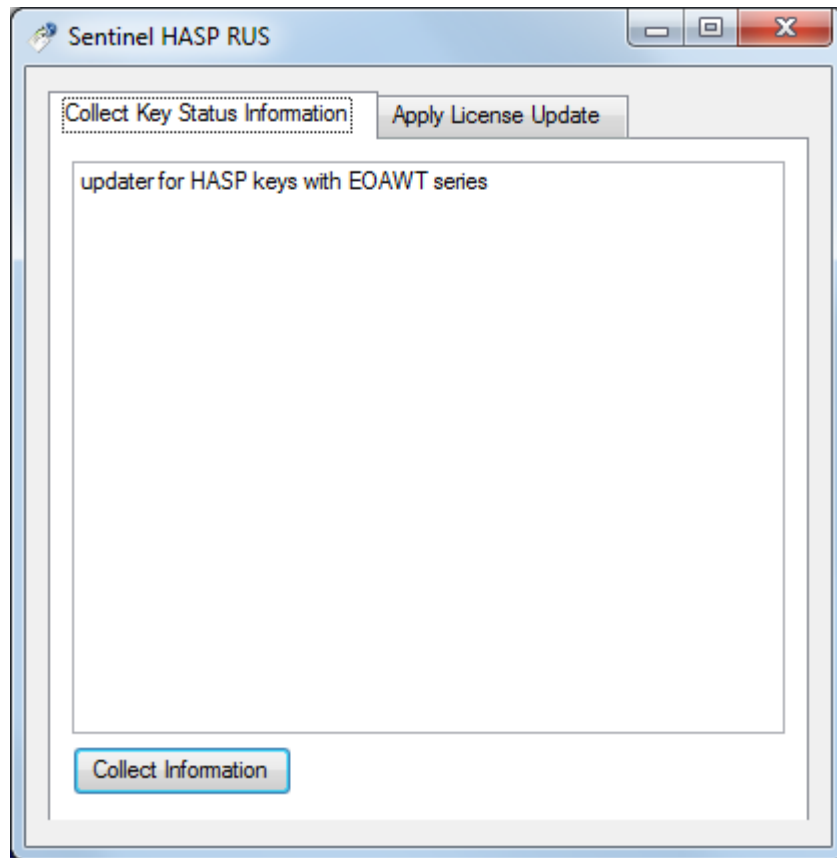
- Each server must use its own separate module protection key and installed **Eocortex** licenses with the appropriate number of cameras that recognize license plates.
- All cameras in the system will use the same license plate database and archive of recognized plates.

If any other software that use Sentinel (HASP) license protection keys is installed on the same computer with the **Eocortex** server, then the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module may operate unstable.

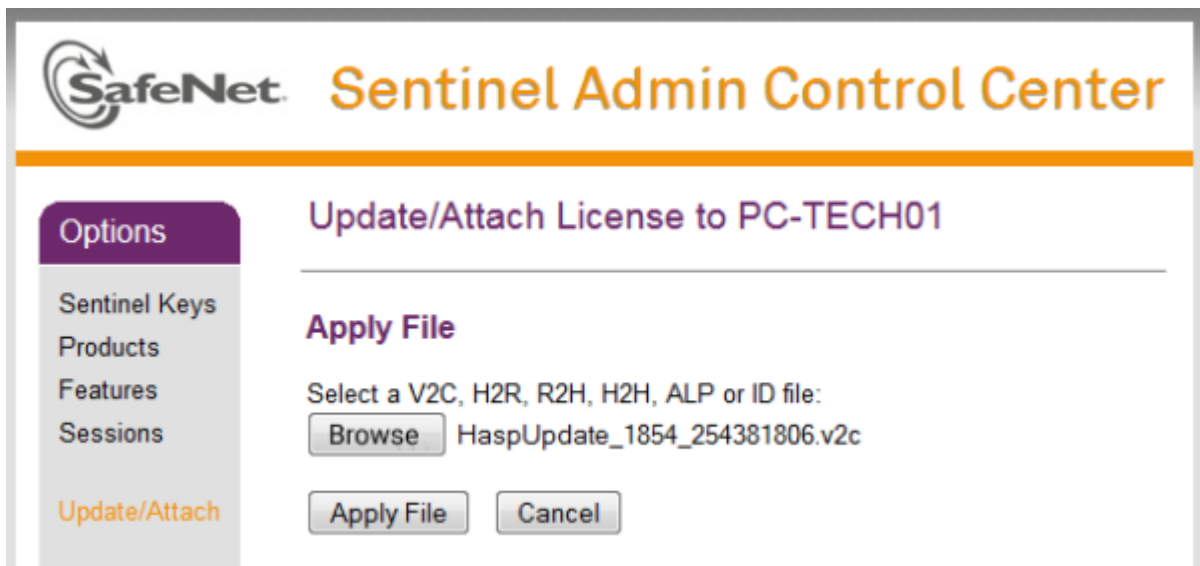
Updating the module protection key

There may be a situation when it is necessary to change the license parameters of the module protection key. To do this, follow these steps:

- With the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module protection key plugged into the computer's USB port, open the Sentinel (HASP) driver web interface in any browser on the **Sentinel Keys** page: <http://127.0.0.1:1947/int/devices.html>. Copy the values of the **Key ID** and **Vendor** fields and tell them to the company where the **Eocortex** license was purchased.
- A utility (hasp_update.exe) to take a snapshot of the key will be sent in response. Each **Vendor** uses its own utility, but they have the same user interface.
- With the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module protection key plugged into the computer's USB port, run the utility and go to the **Collect Key Status Information** tab. Press the **Collect Information** button and save the resulting c2v-file. It is recommended to use the **Key ID** value as the file name.



- Send the c2v-file to the company where the **Eocortex** was purchased.
- An update file (with *.v2c extension) will be sent in response. Save this file.
- With the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module protection key plugged into the computer's USB port, open the Sentinel (HASP) driver web interface in any browser on the **Update/Attach** page: <http://127.0.0.1:1947/int/checkin.html>. Click the **Select file** button and find the v2c-file. Click the **Apply file** button to apply the key update, which takes a few seconds to complete.
- After updating the key, the **Eocortex** server must be restarted for the changes to take effect.



Troubleshooting

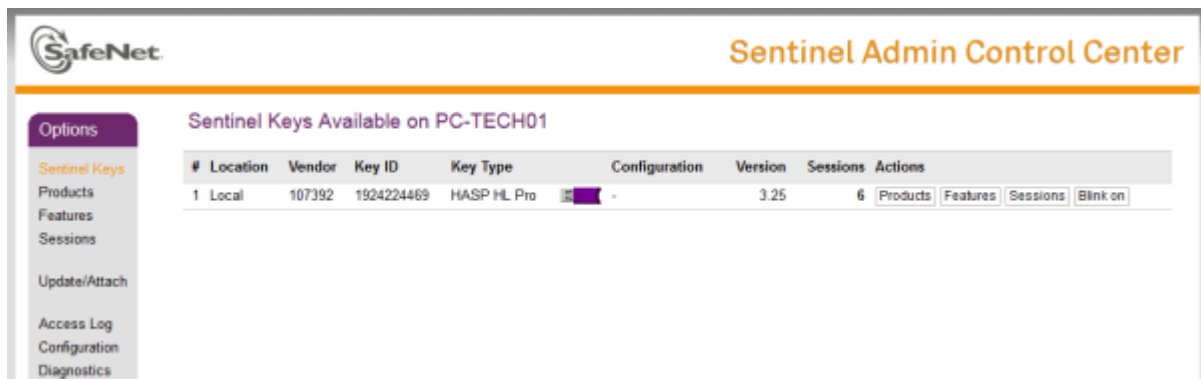
If the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module does not work correctly, or does not work at all, the following diagnostics should be performed:

Work correctness of the Sentinel (HASP) protection key driver and module libraries

To check the correctness of Sentinel (HASP) protection key driver installation, try to open the <http://127.0.0.1:1947/int/devices.html> page in any browser on the server. The module protection key must be plugged into the server.

The address above must be entered completely, including the http:// prefix.

If as a result, the browser displays a page similar to the one shown below, then the Sentinel (HASP) driver is installed correctly. The **Key ID** line should contain the identifier of the protection key. It is recommended to provide this identifier to the technical support specialists in case of issues with the module. The License Plate Recognition module protection key must have one of two possible values in the **Vendor** line: 106763 (AAOTB) or 107392 (EOAWT).



If the Sentinel (HASP) driver page does not open, try to open it in another browser.

If other browsers also fail to open the Sentinel (HASP) driver page, then the Sentinel (HASP) driver is most likely installed incorrectly or not installed at all.

Case 1

Sentinel (HASP) driver is not installed or installed incorrectly.

Possible causes and solutions

Cause 1.1

Installation is not finished.

Solution 1.1

Restart the computer. Sometimes the installation process of the driver may require rebooting the server machine.

If the driver page does not open after reboot, reinstall **Eocortex Server / Standalone** - the Sentinel (HASP) driver is installed as a component of the system during the main installation process. Restart the computer again after reinstalling **Eocortex Server / Standalone**.

Cause 1.2

Installation is blocked by antivirus software.

Solution 1.2


Stop AV software if any installed on the server and reinstall **Eocortex Server / Standalone**.

It is not recommended to use AV software on **Eocortex** servers, but if security policies require it, make sure that all **Eocortex** components are whitelisted and excluded from scanning.

All installation files must be run as administrator.

If the **Eocortex Server / Standalone** is running and at least one camera has the License Plate Recognition module configured, then the **Session** line must have a non-zero value, which indicates that the License Plate Recognition module is currently running.

Case 2

The License Plate Recognition module is not working and the **Session** line is empty or have a dash as its value.

Possible causes and solutions

Cause 2.1

The License Plate Recognition module is not activated for any camera on the server. The server configuration was not applied after module activation. **Eocortex Server / Standalone** was not restarted after applying the configuration.

Solution 2.1

Activate the License Plate Recognition module at least for one camera on the server. Apply the configuration after activating the module. Stop and start again **Eocortex Server / Standalone** manually.

Cause 2.2

The license on the key has expired.

Solution 2.2

In some cases, the user may be provided with a time-limited test key for the License Plate Recognition module. If the license has expired, then in the **Restrictions** field on the **Features** tab of the key on the Sentinel (HASP) driver page will be the **Expired** value.

Cause 2.3

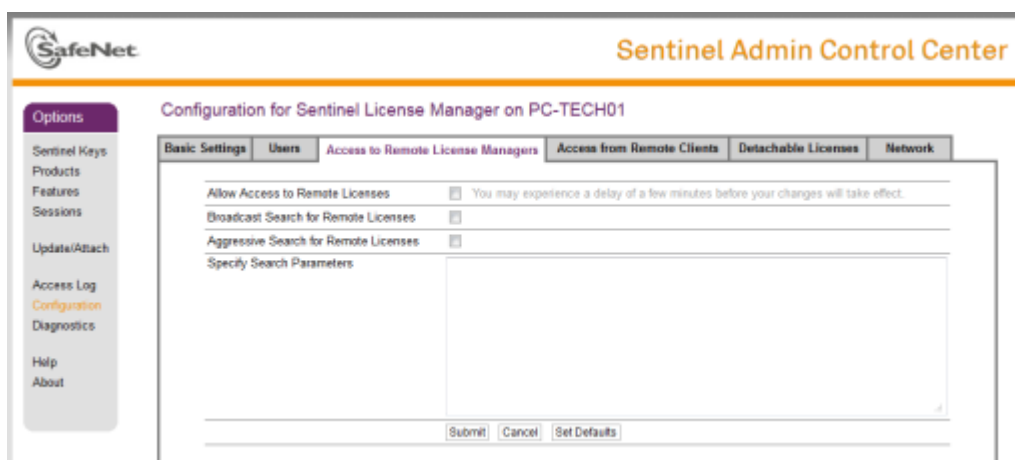
Protection keys conflict. The License Plate Recognition module key conflicts with another Sentinel (HASP) protection key installed on **Ecortex Server / Standalone**.

Solution 2.3

It is not recommended to install **Ecortex Server / Standalone** on a computer that has other software that uses Sentinel (HASP) protection keys installed.

The **Ecortex** license can also be provided as a Sentinel (HASP) protection key with Vendor ID 104213. It does not conflict with the protection key of the License Plate Recognition module.

To ensure that no Sentinel (HASP) protection keys (including those required by third-party software) other than needed for the License Plate Recognition module are installed on the same computer with **Ecortex Server / Standalone**, open the Sentinel (HASP) driver web-interface, go to the **Configuration** page and switch to the **Access to Remote License Managers** page (or simply open the link: http://127.0.0.1:1947/int/config_to.html) where disable all checkboxes.



The next step is to open the **Sentinel Keys** page (<http://127.0.0.1:1947/int/devices.html>) and make sure that there are no other Sentinel (HASP) protection keys available on this computer.

If other Sentinel (HASP) protection keys except the License Plate Recognition protection key (**Vendor ID: 106763** or **107392**) and optional **Eocortex** protection key (**Vendor ID: 104213**) are installed on the computer, unplug them and restart **Eocortex Server / Standalone**. Check if the module is working.

If the License Plate Recognition module is working after extracting third-party keys (the **Session** line contains a non-zero value), then either third-party software protected with Sentinel (HASP) keys or **Eocortex Server / Standalone** needs to be transferred to another computer.

Work correctness of the License Plate Recognition module

Below are typical issues that may be encountered when using the License Plate Recognition module, as well as recommendations on how to fix them.

Case 1

None of the license plates are recognized. Specific types of license plates or license plates of the specific country are not recognized. Most of the plates visible on the frame are not recognized.

Solution 1.1

Make sure that the desired country and all the needed templates are selected in the module settings. Note that in addition to the Country checkbox, the checkboxes for all desired templates must also be enabled.

Solution 1.2

The minimum and maximum sizes of the license plate in the module settings do not match the actual size of the license plate on the frame. Set the sizes so that the license plate on the frame will be in the range between the minimum and maximum sizes.

Solution 1.3

The search area may be configured incorrectly in the module settings. Set the search area so that the license plates are included in this area. If multiple separate search areas are used for plate recognition, make sure that there are no uncovered spaces between them. A simple search area consisting of a single rectangle is more preferable to a complex one consisting of multiple parts.

Solution 1.4

The software motion detection may not be activated or configured. Activate and configure the software motion detector.

Solution 1.5

The image received from the camera may not be suitable for plate recognition (image is blurry, noisy, contains artifacts or distortions). Run the **Eocortex Client**, open the video archive of the camera with the license plate recognition module activated and find the frame with license plate that must be recognized. Save the frame in TIFF or BMP format (resolution of the saved frame must match the resolution of the frame received from the camera) and open it in any graphics editor. Set the scale to 1:1 and make sure the license plate image is clear and legible. If the image is blurry or noisy, adjust the camera to get a clearer image (additional lens focus and codec compression changes may be required).

Solution 1.6

The camera position or field of view may not match the recommendations provided on the **Requirements and recommendations** page. Adjust the camera position and field of view to meet the requirements to the license plate image.

Solution 1.7

The low-resolution stream may be selected for plate recognition. Run the **Eocortex Configurator** and open the camera settings. If [more than one stream](#) is activated in the **Video streams** section of the **Connection** tab, make sure that the **Main** stream or the stream with the most suitable resolution is selected in the **Video stream for analysis** section of the **Motion detection** tab.

Case 2

Not all license plates on the frame are recognized. Some license plates of the same type and size are not recognized on the same part of the frame.

Solution 2.1

See solutions 1.5 - 1.7 above.

Solution 2.2

Reduce the requirements for recognition quality in the module settings: decrease the level of the **Quality of recognition** parameter, increase the value of the **Acceptable number of unrecognized characters** parameter.

Solution 2.3

If the **Parking** license type is used for licensing the module, then unsuccessful recognitions can be caused by vehicle speed close to or greater than 20 kmph. In such case, if it is necessary to improve recognition accuracy and there is no way to limit the

movement speed in the control area, then it is recommended to change the module license type from **Parking** to **Highway**. Note that recognition with the **Highway** license type processes more frames to get an accurate result, which significantly increases CPU usage.

Case 3

Too many license plates are recognized incorrectly or not completely (Asterisks * instead of symbols in the recognition result)

Solution 3

Amplify the requirements for recognition quality in the module settings: increase the level of the **Quality of recognition** parameter, decrease the value of the **Acceptable number of unrecognized characters** parameter.

License Plate Recognition (Light)

The **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module is intended for recognizing the license plates of the moving vehicles and for saving the information regarding the time and date of recognition, the license plate number and the reference to the corresponding video frame.

Real-time recognition of the license plate numbers of moving vehicles.

Details

The module is intended for recognizing the license plates of moving vehicles only. The parked vehicles' numbers will not be recognized.

It is possible to use the capabilities of the **Eocortex API** for the automation of the downloading of the recognized license plate lists.

Interaction with the rising arm barriers is performed via signal outputs of the IP cameras.

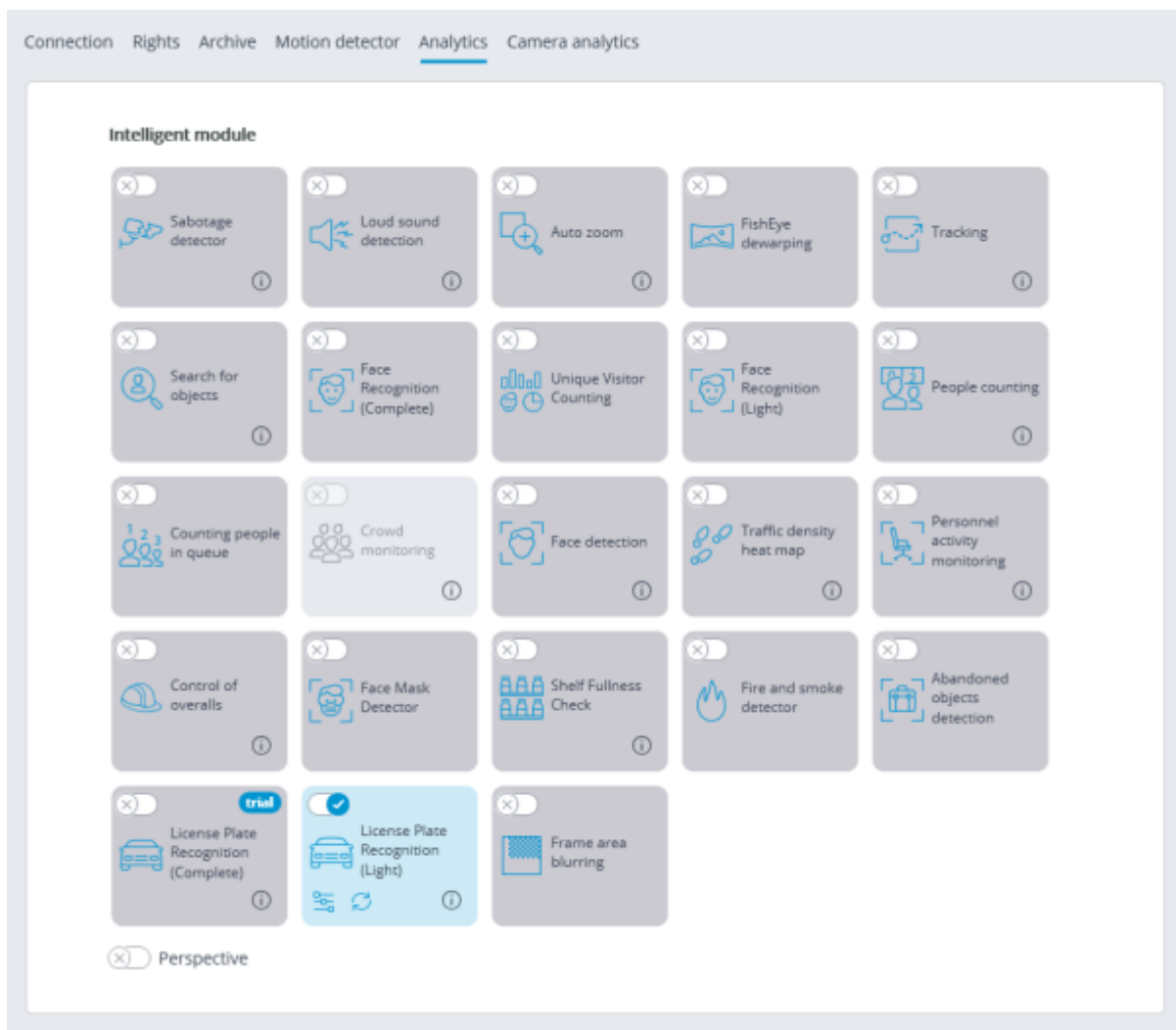
Module setup


Since this module is external and is not included into the basic Eocortex installation package, before setting it up and using it install it on the computer to which the cameras that will use this module are connected.

To use the module, enable and set up the software motion detector, then activate the module itself.

To do that, [launch the Eocortex Configurator application](#), go to the  [Cameras](#) tab, select a camera in the list, and set up the motion detector on the [Motion detector](#) tab on the right part of the page.

Then go to the [Analytics](#) tab and enable the module using the  switch, then adjust it pressing the  button.



Clicking the  button opens the module setup window.

It is only possible to use one of the two versions of the module on the same camera: **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** or **License Plate Recognition (Light)**.

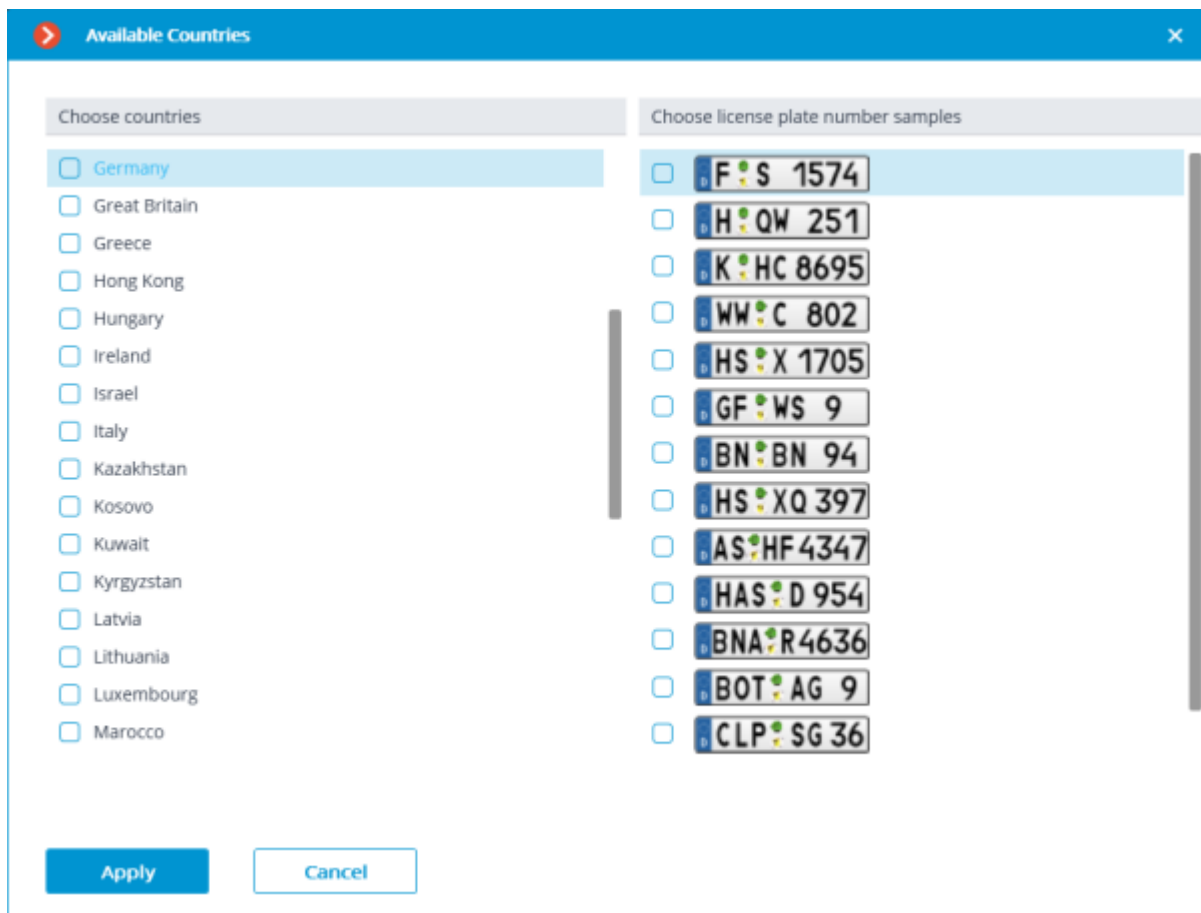

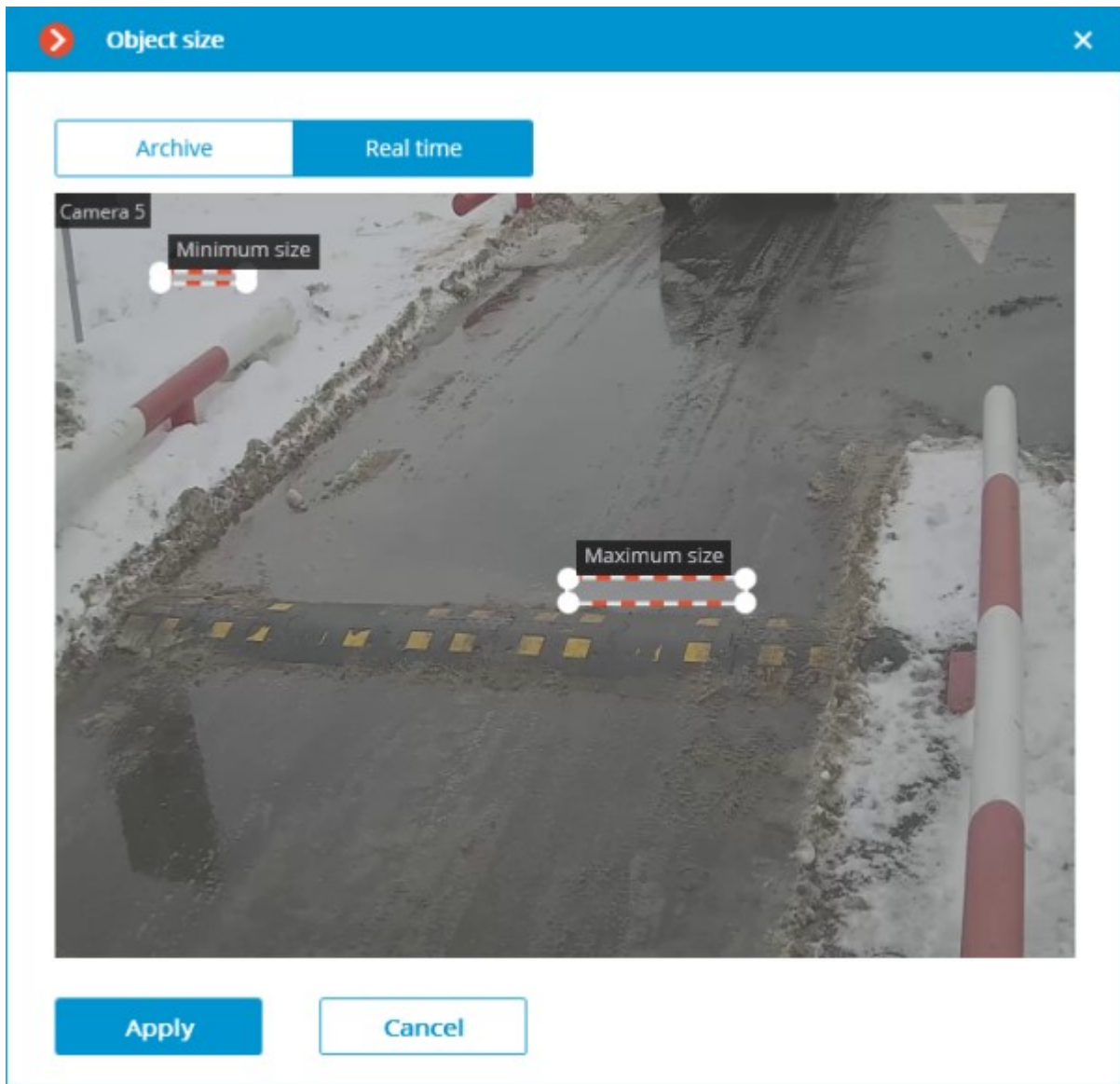


In the window that opens, mark the countries whose license plates should be recognized and select license plate templates for each selected country. Unmarked countries and templates will not be recognized.

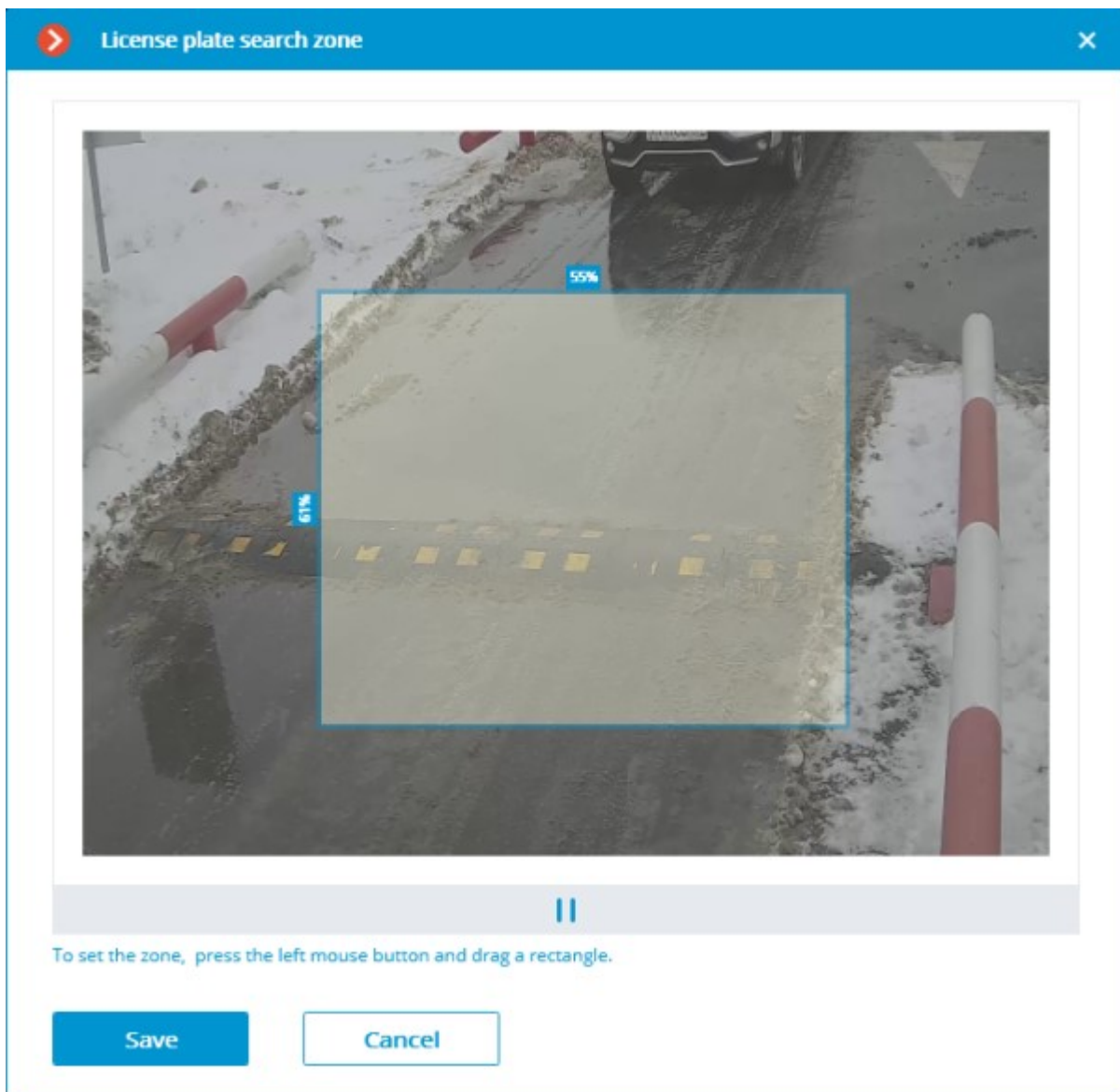
The empty list of countries means that the License Plate Recognition (Complete) module is not installed, or that errors occurred during its installation, or that there is no protection key, or its activation encountered problems.

The more countries and samples have been selected for recognition, the higher the computing load on the server. When the processor load exceeds 80%, the recognition quality may drop significantly.

Set the size range of a license plate opens the window of setting the minimum and maximum width of the license plates to be recognized



License plate search zone opens the window of setting up the zones of the frame where the license plate numbers to be recognized will appear.



For creating a new zone, it is required to press the left mouse button and, holding it, select a rectangular area. The total area uniting all the set zones will be used for recognition. To delete the zone, click on the close icon in the upper right corner of the zone.

Use neural network for searching for license plate numbers: Enabling this option allows to increase accuracy of searching for number plates. However, the server load from the given camera will increase 50% approx.

Use neural network for recognizing license plate numbers: Enabling this option will increase accuracy of license plate symbols' recognition. However, the load on the server from the given camera will increase 50% approx.

The minimum number of frames with recognized car plate: The license plate recognition event will be generated only after the preset number of frames, even if the number was recognized on the smaller number of frames. The larger this value, the higher the possibility to obtain the correctly recognized number.

The maximum number of unrecognized characters: this setting specifies the maximum permissible number of unrecognized characters when recognizing the license plate. If the quantity of the unrecognized characters exceeds the specified limit, the license plate recognition event is not generated.

Re-recognition lockout time, sec.: allows to avoid the repeated generation of the recognition event for the same number because the second recognition is only possible after the specified interval.

The minimum number of frames with unrecognized car plate: If it is not possible to recognize the license plate, the module generates a corresponding event. Using this setting, the number of frames in the analyzed sequence that the module will use in recognition attempts before deciding about the impossibility of recognizing can be adjusted. The higher this value, the higher the probability of obtaining a correctly recognized number.

Quality of recognition: the internal parameter of the module operation. It sets the filtering by the quality of recognition, meaning that the license plates the reliability of whose recognition is lower than a preset value will be automatically discarded. The value of this parameter shall be selected tentatively: when it is higher, the reliability of the recognized numbers will be higher, but the total quantity of the recognized numbers will be smaller; when it is lower, the quantity of the recognized numbers will be larger, but the number of recognition mistakes will increase.

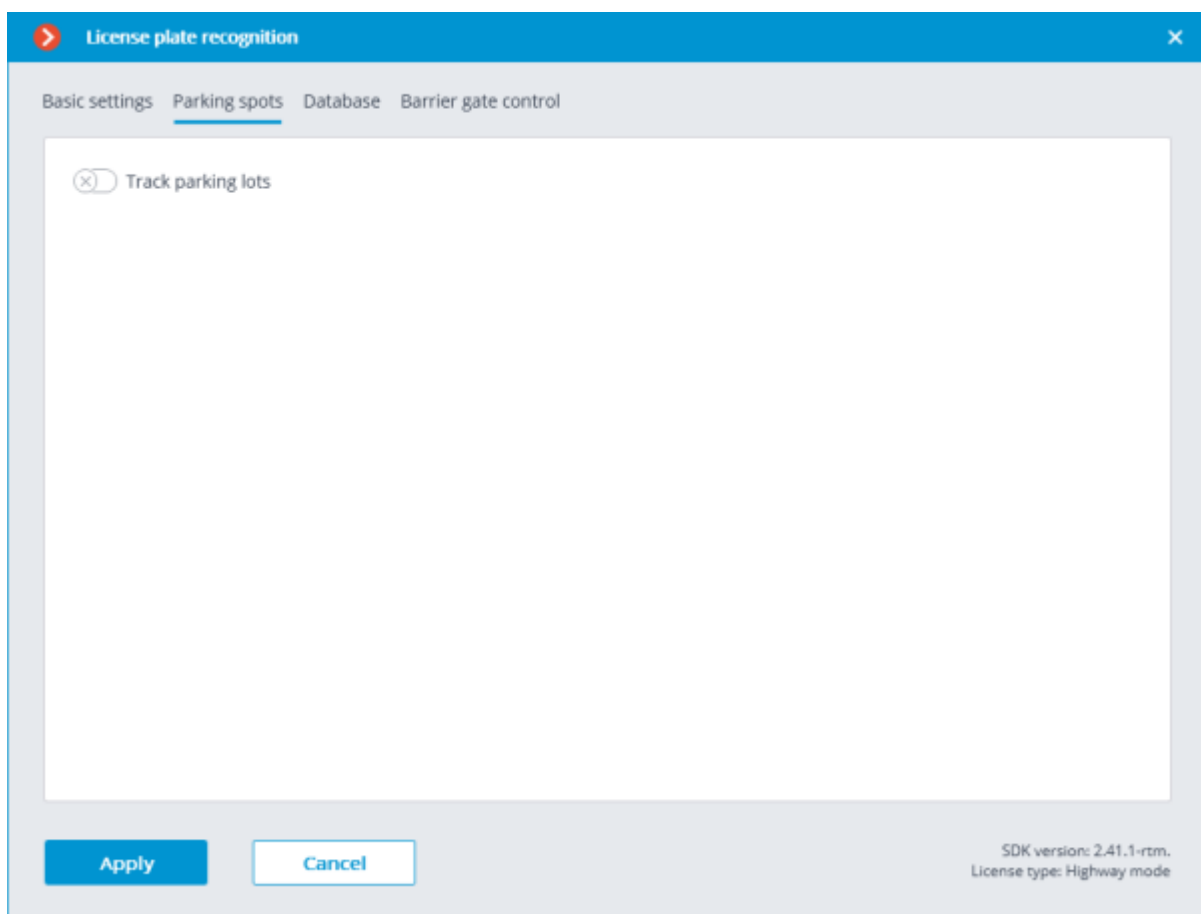
Use motion detector: Enabling this option allows detecting license plates only in case of movement on the frame.

Direction of movement: activation of this option allows to determine the direction of movement. From the drop-down menu, select which movement direction, relative to the camera position, will be assigned to license plates moving from top to bottom of the camera frame.

Additional: allows importing and exporting settings of the license plate recognition module.

Parking spots

On the **Parking spots** tab, settings for parking lots can be made.



To access the settings for parking lots, turn on the **Track parking lots** slider.

Parking lot settings are set for the entire system.

The following actions can be performed in the settings window:

create a new parking lot;

edit or delete an existing parking lot.

The following settings can be set for a parking lot:

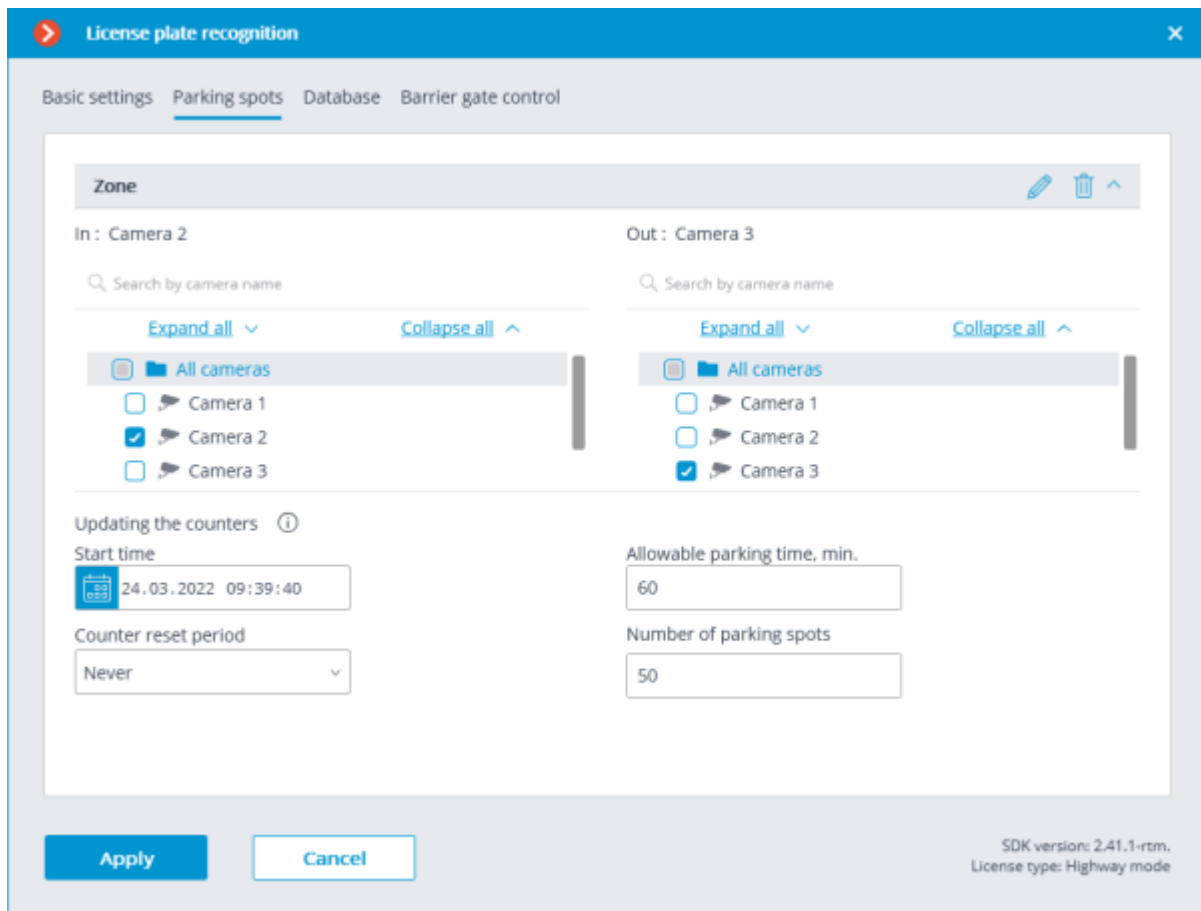

A new [user right](#), **Adjusting the number of occupied parking spots**, has been added to the Users section. This right allows the user to change the value of the occupied parking spots counter in the **Eocortex Client** application. By default, this right is enabled.

Two database deployment options are available: **Local** or **Remote**.

If the recognition process runs on only one server, it is recommended deploying the database on this server by selecting **Local**.

If the recognition process is running on several servers, the database should still be hosted only on one of them. For this purpose, select the **Remote** option for all cameras and specify the database connection parameters: server address, name and password of the database administrator. The same applies when the database of the module is deployed on one server, and the camera with the module enabled is attached to another one.

Eocortex version 3.6 and lower uses **Firebird** DBMS with the following default values:

- **Port:** 3050
- **Username:** SYSDBA
- **Password:** masterkey

Starting from version **Eocortex** 4.0, the module's database is handed over to the [PostgreSQL DBMS](#) with the following default values:

- **Port:** 5432
- **Username:**
 - For Windows: postgres
 - For Linux: eocortex
- **Password:** masterkey

Remote access to databases is not allowed by default in PostgreSQL and must be additionally configured if remote databases are used for analytics. All settings must be

done for the server where the database is stored. Settings are slightly different for [Windows](#) and [Linux](#) operating systems.

When the server is running for the first time after upgrading **Eocortex** to version 4.0 or higher, the existing module database will be automatically transformed to be compatible with **PostgreSQL**.

If connecting to a **Remote** database, use the DBMS **Username** and **Password** that are valid for the server storing the database.

Independent of the database location, the recognition events (date and time of recognition, coordinates of the object in the frame, binding of the recognized object to the database) will always be stored on the server to which the camera with the corresponding events is bound.

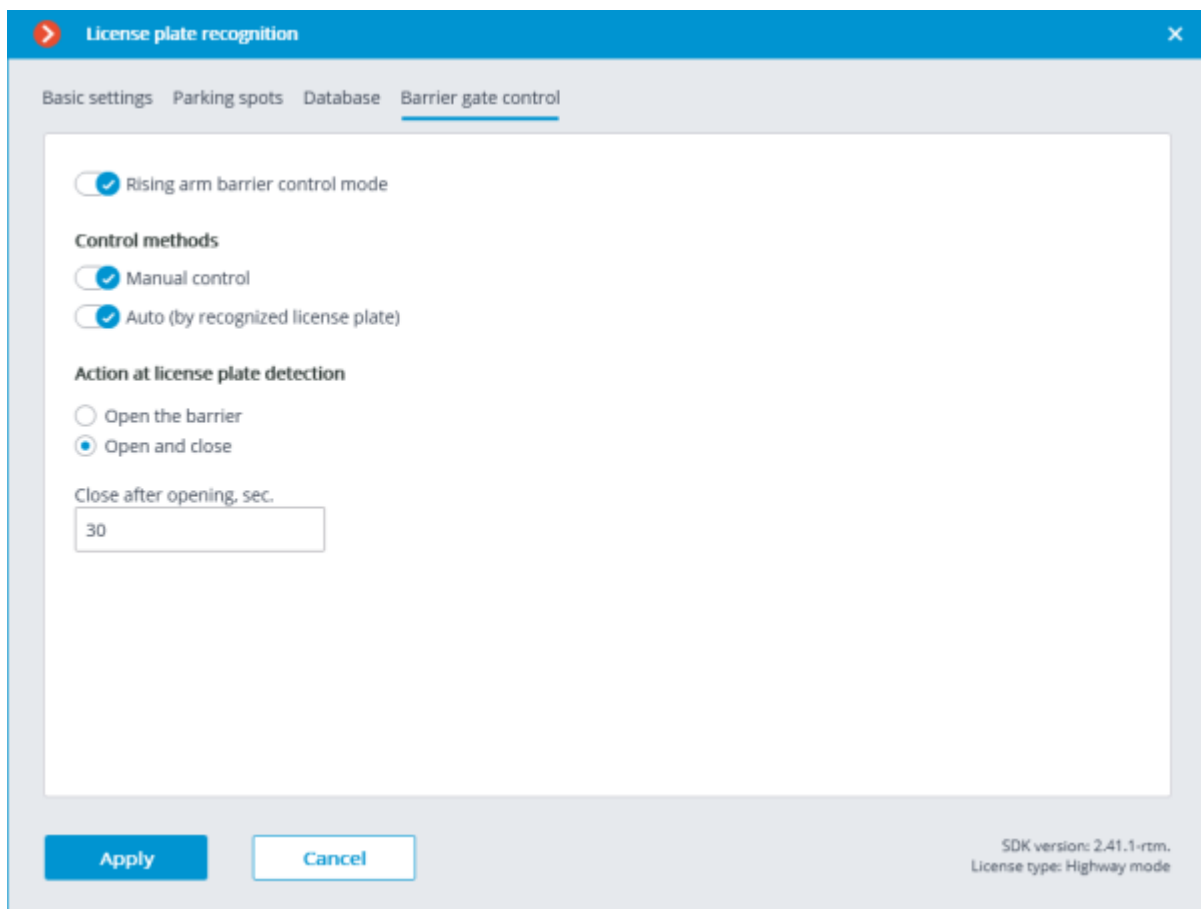
Synchronization with the database located on a remote server can take some time

When using a remote database, the [remote database replication mechanism](#) will be applied.

It is possible to check the availability of the database clicking the **Connection check** link. If the server is unavailable, the corresponding message will be displayed.

Barrier gate control

The settings of the module's interaction with a rising arm barrier can be made on the **Barrier gate control** tab.



The **Rising arm barrier control mode** must be activated to access the settings of the module's interaction with a rising arm barrier.

To use the module only for controlling a rising arm barrier, the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module license or protection key is not required. However, for ensuring the abovementioned functionality, it is necessary to have the **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** module support indicated in the **Eocortex** license file or software key for the corresponding quantity of cameras.

When the rising arm barrier control mode is activated, the following capabilities are available:

Control methods:

Manual control: allows the operator to open and close the barrier using the **Eocortex Client** application.

Auto (by recognized license plate): allows to open the rising arm barrier automatically if the recognized number is in the white list, i.e. is included in the group of vehicles for which the automatic opening of the barrier is envisioned.

In case the automatic rising arm barrier control is activated, the following options are available:

Open the barrier: if the recognized number is in the white list, the **Eocortex** server generates a command to open the barrier.

Open and close: if the recognized number is in the white list, the Eocortex server generates a command to open the barrier; then, in a number of seconds set in the **Close after opening in (sec)** field, a command for closing the barrier is generated.

Most of the modern rising arm barriers automatically close after the passing of one vehicle. For such barriers, the **Open the barrier** option shall be selected.

When the **Open and close** option is selected, it is imperative that the barrier itself has a feature of preventing its closing when a car is below the rising arm. It means that after generating the closing command the barrier's automatics must check if there is a vehicle or a person on the line of closing, and proceed with the closing only in the absence of the above.

Both in manual and in automatic barrier control mode, the opening or closing command is understood as the generation of the [Request to open rising arm barrier](#) or [Request to close rising arm barrier](#) event, correspondingly. To control the rising arm barrier, it is required to set the actions for these events depending on the control wiring diagram of the particular barrier.

For the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module, the following types of [Automatic reports](#) can be configured: **License plate recognition, Entry/exit time recording, Vehicle counting.**

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

The module works only with 64-bit version of **Eocortex**.

For correct operation of the module, it is imperative to properly choose, place and set up the camera, adjust the software motion detector and the module itself. When selecting the camera, it is necessary to take into consideration the image requirements, the controlled zone particularities, and the conditions of the installation and operation of the camera.

Requirements to the license plate image

The vehicle license plates (registration plates) to be recognized must conform to certain requirements. The **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module cannot guarantee the reliable recognition of a license plate if it is extremely dirty, low in contrast or significantly tilted or displaced. Below are the requirements to the license plates and their images (the vehicles whose license plates do not meet these requirements will not be identified).

No visible blurring of the license plate number on the image of the moving vehicle.

No sharp glare or shadows on the license plate.

The characters on the license plate must be in total accord with the applicable state standard as regards their font and size.

The license plate must meet the requirements concerning the cleanliness and legibility. All the characters shall be distinctly visible and not blocked by anything.

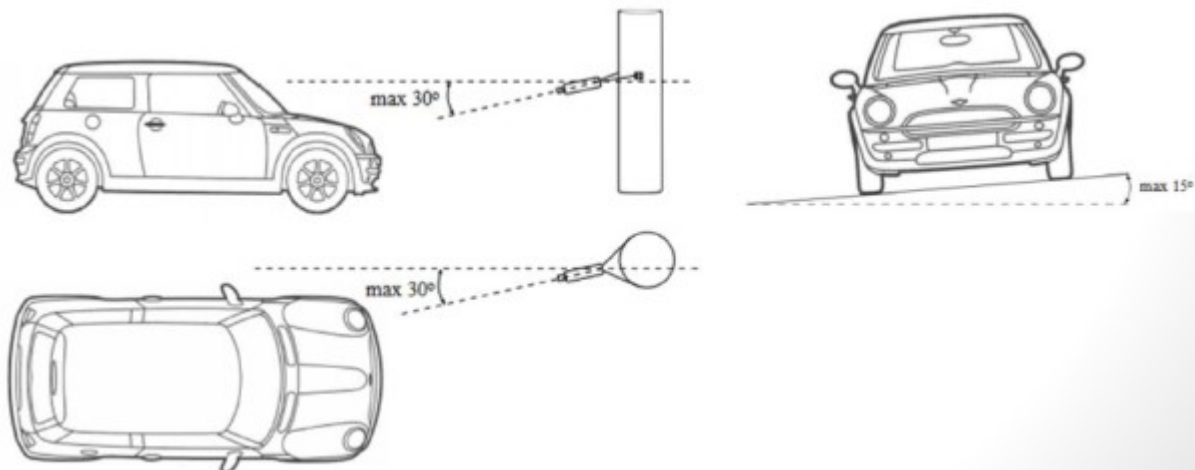
The images of the license plate numbers must be sharp. The contrast between the characters and the background must be at least 15%.

The height of the characters in the image must be at least 10 pixels.

The distortions of the perspective of the license plate image that occur due to the tilt and turn of the license plate's surface in relation to the camera axis shall not exceed 30°.

The horizontal deviation of the license plate must not be more than 15°.

The camera must have a straight part of the road in its field of view (without turns).



Recommendations on camera installation

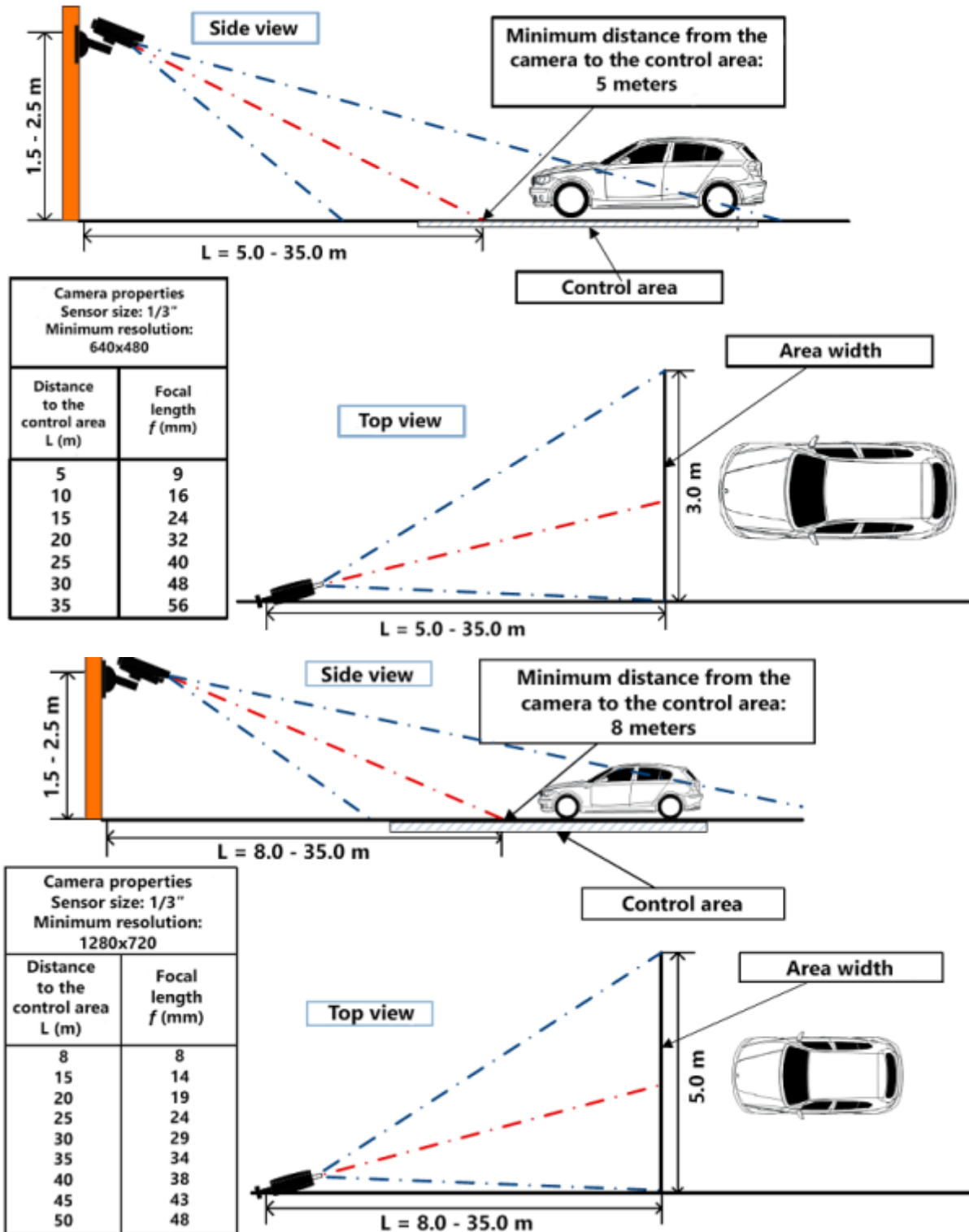
In this section you will find the recommendations on camera installation that need to be followed in order to ensure the reliable recognition of license plates in the control zone. Each installation location has its individual characteristics. This section contains the basic camera installation recommendations.

Installation of cameras on roads

For ensuring reliable recognition of the license plate numbers of the vehicles that travel in the stream, it is optimal to install the camera on a structure above the road in such a way that the camera is directed at the center of the recognition area. For example, if it is required to recognize

the plates of the vehicles travelling along a particular lane, the camera must be pointed at the center of that lane.

It is also possible to install the camera on a pole standing on the edge of the road. In this case it must be considered that when the recognition is to be performed on both lanes there may occur the situations when the farther lane will be blocked by the large vehicles such as a tractor-trailer unit, a truck, a bus etc. travelling on the lane close to the camera.



Installation of cameras indoors

Special considerations: low height; closeness to a license plate.

When installing the camera, it is required to avoid flaring from the vehicle headlights.

The camera must not face the outside because it will create flaring.

It is recommended to select one of the following installation arrangements:

Direct the camera toward the interior of the premises, at the rear license plate of a vehicle;

Install the camera at the height of 2 to 3 meters and direct it in such a way as to avoid flaring the camera lens by the light from the outside.

Recommendations on choosing and setting up a camera and lens

When choosing a camera for the license plate recognition purposes, be guided by the above requirements for the received image and recommendations for the camera mounting, as well as the following recommendations for the stream generation settings. Note that some features and settings may be not presented in the description and/or design of specific cameras.

Shutter speed (Exposure, electronic shutter)

To form a high-quality image of the license plate in motion, the camera should be able to set a fixed exposure time or limit the exposure value to avoid blurring caused by high movement speed. If the camera supports only the possibility to set a fixed exposure time, then it must additionally have a lens with automatic iris control (ALC) like **DC-Iris** or **P-Iris** to adjust the amount of light, coming to the sensor. At the same time, if the camera allows to set a limit on the maximum exposure time, then the lens without ALC can be used. In this case, the camera will automatically adjust the exposure depending on the illumination of the control area, but the exposure value will not be higher than the set value, which will help to eliminate high-speed blurring.

Some modern cameras may have both the ability to set a fixed exposure time and equipped with an ARD lens. It should be borne in mind that for such cameras, ARD does not work at a fixed shutter speed.

Recommended shutter speed (exposure) values depending on the speed of vehicles:

Maximum vehicle speed in the control area (kmph)	Recommended shutter speed (sec)
30	1/500
70	1/1000
150	1/2000

The actual shutter speed is not limited by these values and can be increased to get images of fast-moving vehicles sharp enough for license plate recognition.

Frame resolution

The minimum frame resolution depends on the size of the controlled area. For example, a camera resolution sufficient to control an area up to 5 meters wide should be at least 1280x720 pixels (1 Mpix), and for an area up to 7 meters wide, it is better to use at least 1920x1080 pixels (2 Mpix).

The actual resolution is not limited by these values and can be increased, but note that processing frames with higher resolution proportionally increases the load on CPU.

Frame rate (fps)

The minimum frame rate value depends on the speed of the vehicle crossing the control area. Recommended frame rates depending on vehicle speed are shown in the table below:

Maximum vehicle speed in the control area (kmph)	Recommended frame rate (fps)
30	6
70	15
150	25

The actual number of frames per second is not limited by these values and can be increased, but note that processing more frames proportionally increases the load on CPU.

Camera color mode

Cameras that only support color mode can only be used in areas with constant lighting. When using the camera in changing lighting conditions, a camera that works in monochrome or supports automatic Day/Night switching should be preferred.

Light sensitivity

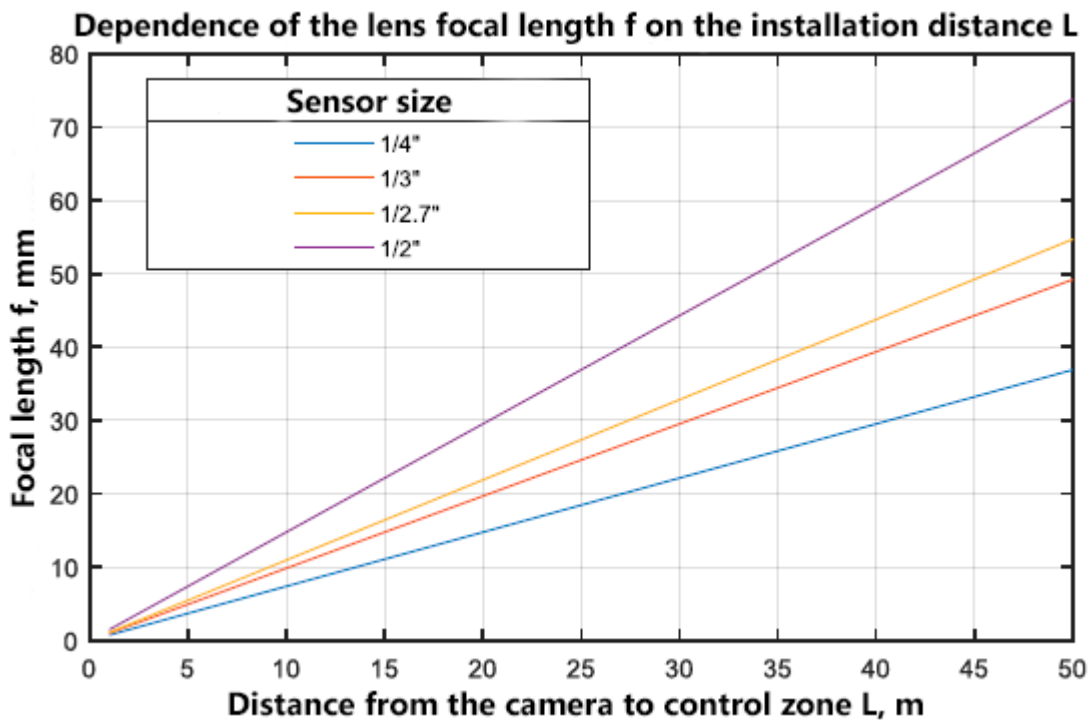
The sensitivity of a camera is important for creating high-quality images of a moving license plate. It is recommended to use cameras with a sensitivity of 0.01 lux or less (the lower the better). If the sensitivity of the camera is insufficient, then more powerful additional lighting of the control area is required.

WDR

Most modern cameras have a wide dynamic range (WDR) function that can be implemented both in software (digital WDR, HDR) and in hardware (optical WDR, true WDR). The use of WDR is most often necessary in conditions of unstable or non-uniform illumination of the controlled area, and when choosing a camera for such conditions, optical WDR should be preferred instead of digital WDR.

Focal length

The focal length of the lens determines the angle of view of the camera, which affects the size of the license plate in the image. For reliable recognition, the size of a single-line license plate in the image must be at least 120x20 pixels by width and height. The illustration below shows the dependence of the focal length of the lens on the installation distance of the camera and the size of its photosensitive sensor.



Module installation and update

Only one of the License Plate Recognition modules can be installed on the same server: either **License Plate Recognition (Complete)** or **License Plate Recognition (Light)**.

The module works only with 64-bit version of **Eocortex**.

This module is external; it is not included in the basic **Eocortex** distribution package and requires individual installation.

The module must be only installed on the computer with **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone** application, to which the license plate recognition cameras are bound. The computers with just **Eocortex Client** application installed do not require installation of the module.

The module's version must match the version of **Eocortex** software installed on a particular computer.

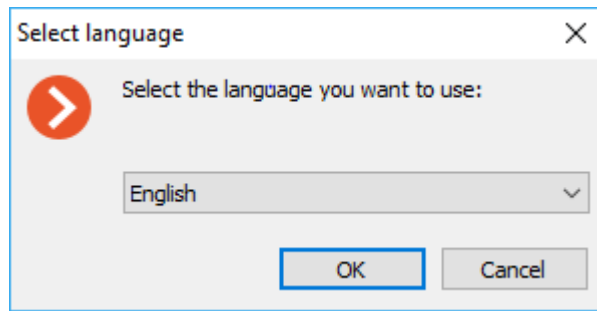
The installation files must be run under the administrator's account.

To update the module, it is required to perform the same steps as for the initial installation of the module. After selecting the installation language but prior to launching the installation wizard, the windows offering to uninstall the previous version will appear. It is required to confirm the uninstall. After the uninstall is complete, the module installation wizard will appear.

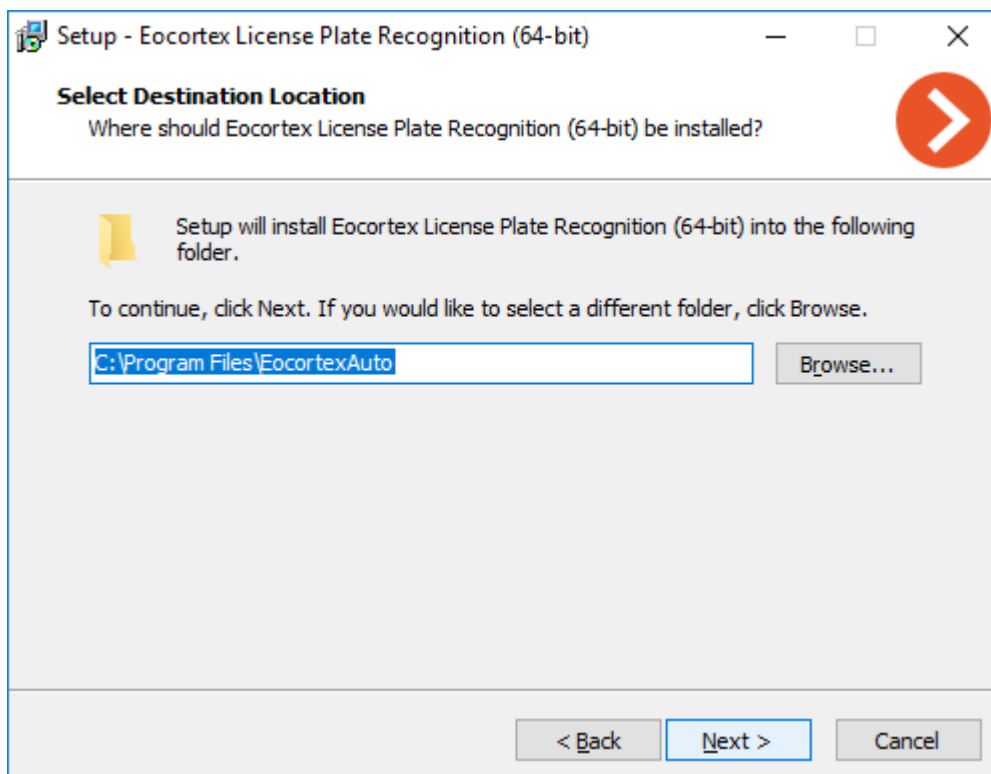
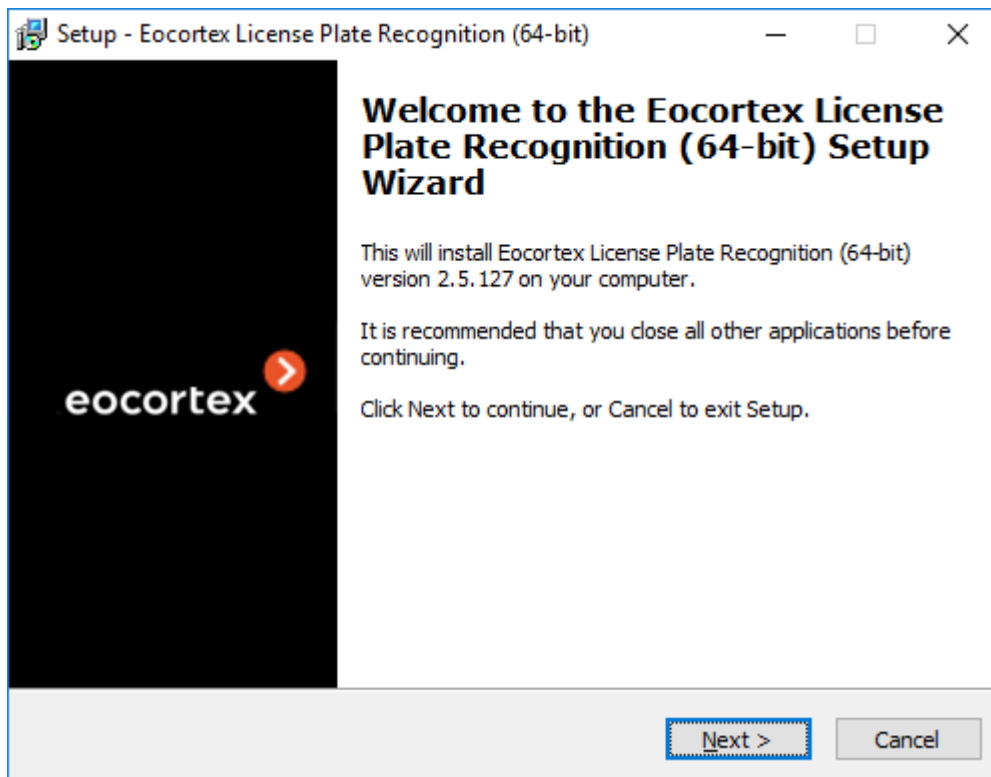
Before installing the module, it is required to stop all the **Eocortex** applications running on the computer, and to insert the module protection key in the USB port.

To install the module, it is required to run **EocortexAuto Installer_x64.exe** file.

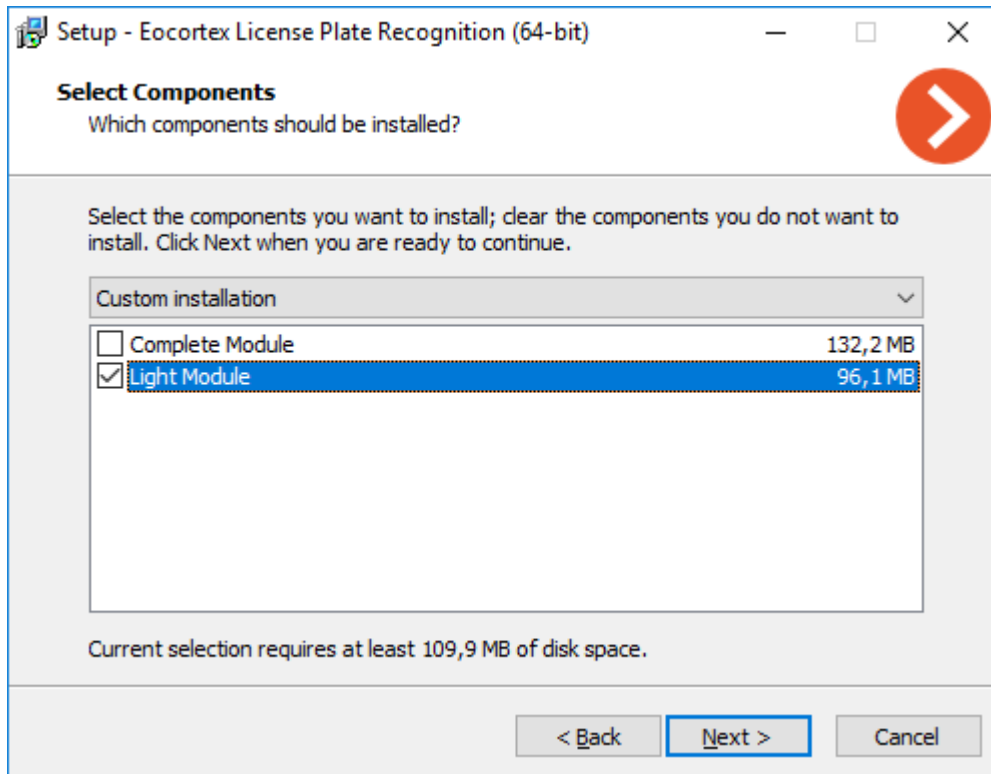

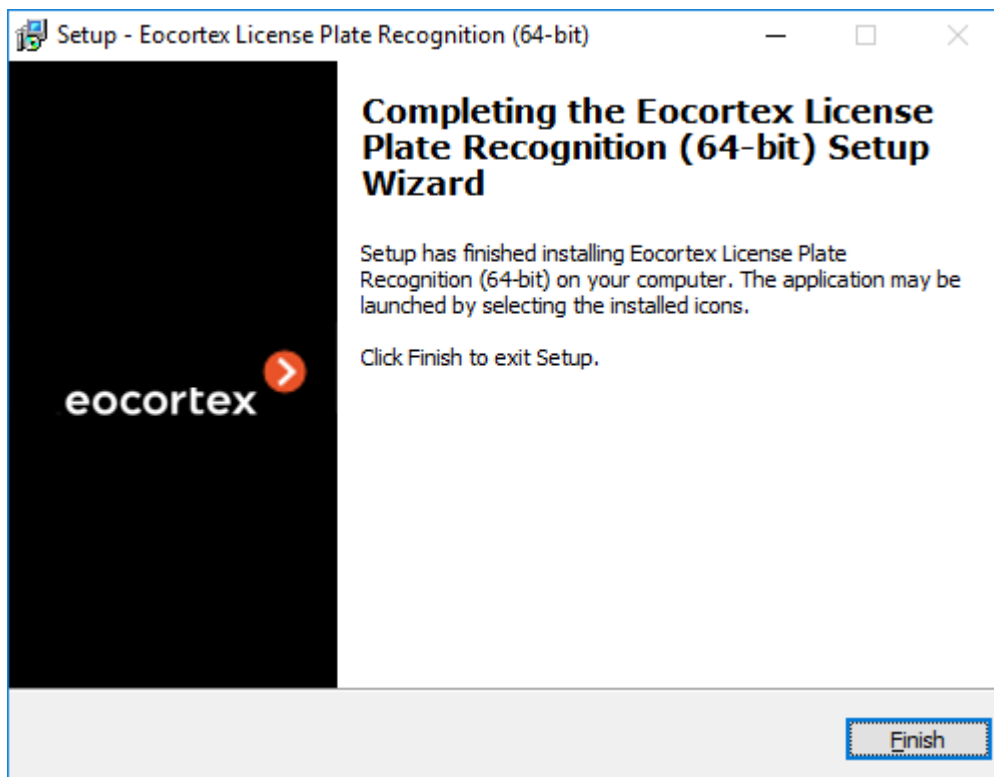
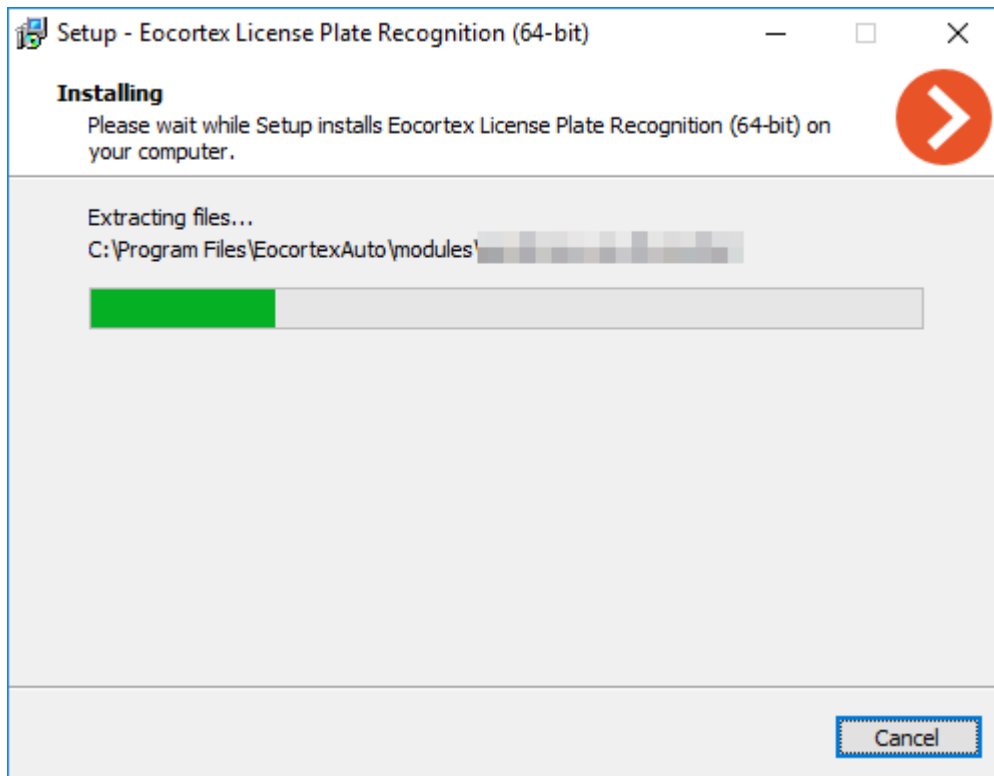


At the **Select component** step, choose the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** option.



At the next step it is required to indicate the path to the module license file.





By default, the module will be installed to **C:\Program Files\EocortexAuto** folder.

Licensing the module

Since the module uses the libraries developed by a third party that require separate licensing, two engineering elements are used for its license protection: the hardware protection key of the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module and the license bound to the **Eocortex** protection key.

The presence of two license protection elements is just a technical particularity: only one license per server is to be paid for. The type of module (**Highway** or **Parking**) and the number of cameras for license plate recognition on the given server are indicated in the license.

The hardware protection key of the module is a Guardant USB key:



The **Eocortex** protection key may be a hardware or a software key.

The module is licensed according to the type of license and to the quantity of the recognition cameras. It is also required to specify the list of countries whose license plates it is planned to recognize.

Types of licenses:

- **Highway** is intended for the recognition of the license plates of the vehicles travelling at the speed of up to 150 km/h.
- **Parking** is designed for the recognition of the license plates of the vehicles travelling at the speed of up to 30 km/h.

List of all available countries (The license may include only a few countries from the list; therefore, for each specific license, the countries included in this license are indicated explicitly):

Azerbaijan (AZ), Armenia (AM), Belarus (BY), Belgium (BE), Bulgaria (BG), Czech Republic (CZ), Estonia (EE), Finland (FI), France (FR), Georgia (GE), Germany (DE), Great Britain (GB), Greece (GR), Hong Kong (HK), Hungary (HU), Ireland (IE), Italy (IT), Israel (IL), Kazakhstan (KZ), Kuwait (KW), Kyrgyzstan (KG), Latvia (LV), Lithuania (LT), Luxembourg (LU), Moldova (MD), Mongolia (MN), Montenegro (ME), Netherlands (NL), Poland (PL), Portugal (PT), Qatar (QA), Romania (RO), Russia (RU), South Korea (KR), Spain (ES), Sweden (SE), Tajikistan (TJ), Turkey (TR), Turkmenistan (TM), Ukraine (UA), United Arab Emirates (AE), Uzbekistan (UZ), Vietnam (VN).

For the operation of the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module it is required that the module protection key with the activated license is inserted into the **Eocortex** server to which the cameras recognizing the license plates are bound. The **Eocortex** license with the specified support of the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module must also be activated on the server.

One **Eocortex** server may have only one **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module protection key installed.

Only one of the modes (**Highway** or **Parking**) may be used on the same server.

The quantity of the cameras that recognize license plates on the server may be increased. To do it, it is required to purchase a license for the module, then, with the help of the **Eocortex Configurator** application, [update the Eocortex license](#) and activate the license of the module by launching the module installation software and selecting the corresponding key activation option.

The type of license may also be changed, but only from **Parking** to **Highway**. To do it, it is required to purchase a license for the module and activate the license of the module by launching the module installation software and selecting the corresponding key activation option.

In the multiserver system, it is possible to set up the license plate recognition on the cameras bound to different **Eocortex** servers, however:

- It is required to use a separate module protection key on each server, and the corresponding number of cameras that perform recognition must be indicated in the **Eocortex** licenses;
- The common database and the common archive of the recognized license plate numbers will be used for all cameras.

If third party software using Guardant protection keys is installed on the **Eocortex** server, the **License Plate Recognition (Light)** module operation on such server may be unstable.



Loud Sound Detection



The **Loud Sound Detection** module allows to register the situations when the sound received by the camera microphone exceeds the preset level. Additionally, it displays the current sound level in the Eocortex Client application.

Details

For the proper operation of the module, it is required to correctly aim the microphone and set up the module.

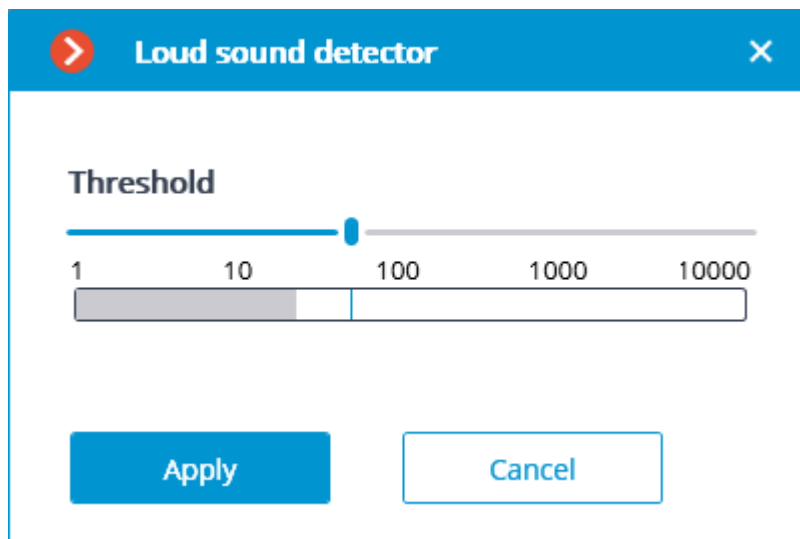
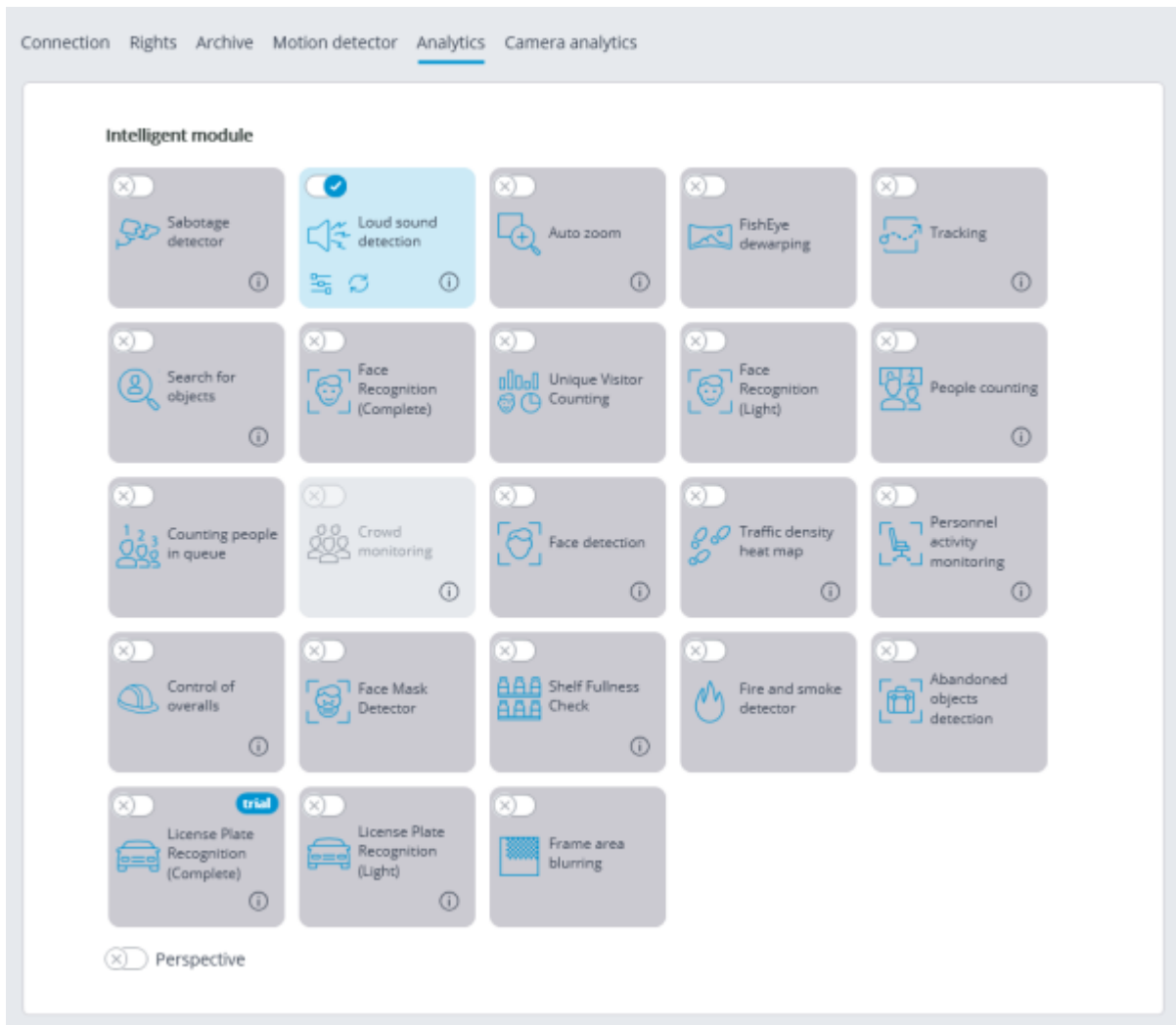

The sound level logarithmic scale will appear in the opened setup window, where the sound level entering the camera microphone will be displayed in real-time mode. Using the **Threshold** slider, you will be able to set the sound level that will trigger the detector.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

It is required to take into consideration that the detector reacts only to the level of sound. For the detector, the sounds of various types differ only by their levels. The subjective perception of the sound level by a person and the evaluation of the level of a particular sound among the sounds of the camera's sound stream by the detector may differ; for example, the camera may be more sensitive to the sounds of a particular frequency, or it may subdue sounds according its own algorithms.

Another adverse factor is the high noise level that leads to the situation when some sounds that require a response (for example, shouts or banging of a door) become poorly perceivable against the sounds in the background, making the triggering of the detector unreliable.

Also, wind gusts perceived by a camera microphone not protected against the wind may lead to the false triggering of the loud sound detector.

The abovementioned factors are required to be taken into consideration at the stage of choosing a camera or a microphone as well as when setting up the detector.

Object Classification and Counting

The **Object Classification and Counting** counts objects that are crossing specified lines or contained in predefined areas of arbitrary shape, distinguishing them by categories.

Capabilities of the module

Counting of objects of a specified category:

People

Animals

Vehicles by type: Passenger cars, Buses, Trucks, Motorcycles.

Displaying of counter meters in the **Eocortex Client** application.

Generation of analytical reports.



Manual and automatic export of analytical reports, as well as automatic reports sending via email.

Details

For counting objects of specific categories, it is necessary to [install the Eocortex Neural Networks package](#). For the best performance it is recommended to use **Eocortex Neural Networks Special**.

The **Object Classification and Counting** is able to work on the same camera simultaneously only with the **License plate recognition** module.

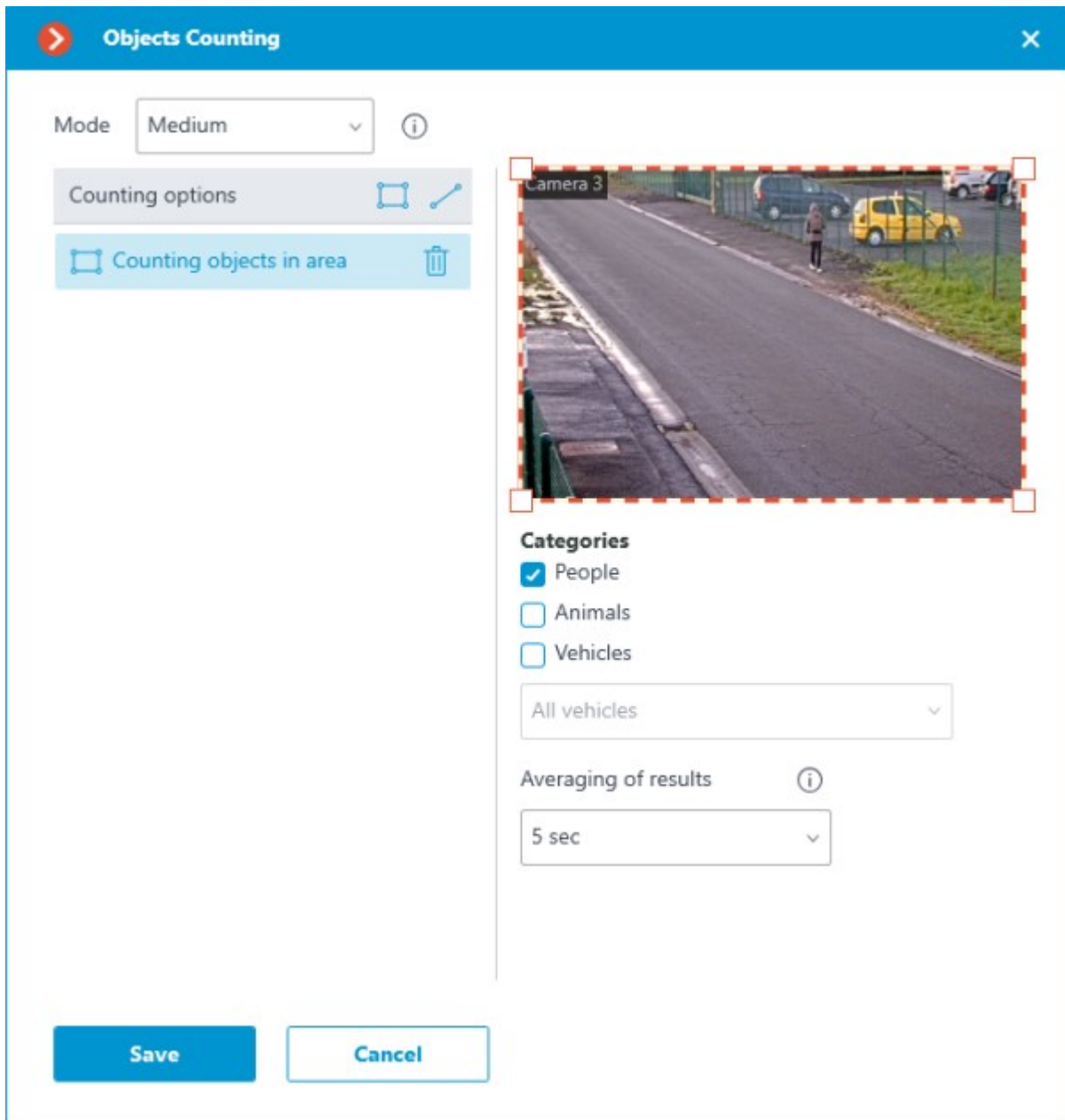

When setting up the module, it is necessary to select the operating mode. The following modes are available:

- Slow mode: for standing or slowly moving objects. For example, parking lots, people in line, etc. Shift of objects on the frame in one second should not exceed 1/4 of their size in the direction of movement.
- Medium mode: for objects moving at an average speed. For example, walking people, slow-moving vehicles in a parking lot, etc. Shift of objects on the frame in one second should not exceed their size in the direction of movement.
- Fast mode: for counting objects that quickly come into the frame and leave the field of view. Vehicles on the highway, people running, etc. Shift of objects on the frame in one second should not exceed 2.5 object's sizes in the direction of movement.

In the **Counting options** list it is possible to set and configure counters. The following counter types are available:

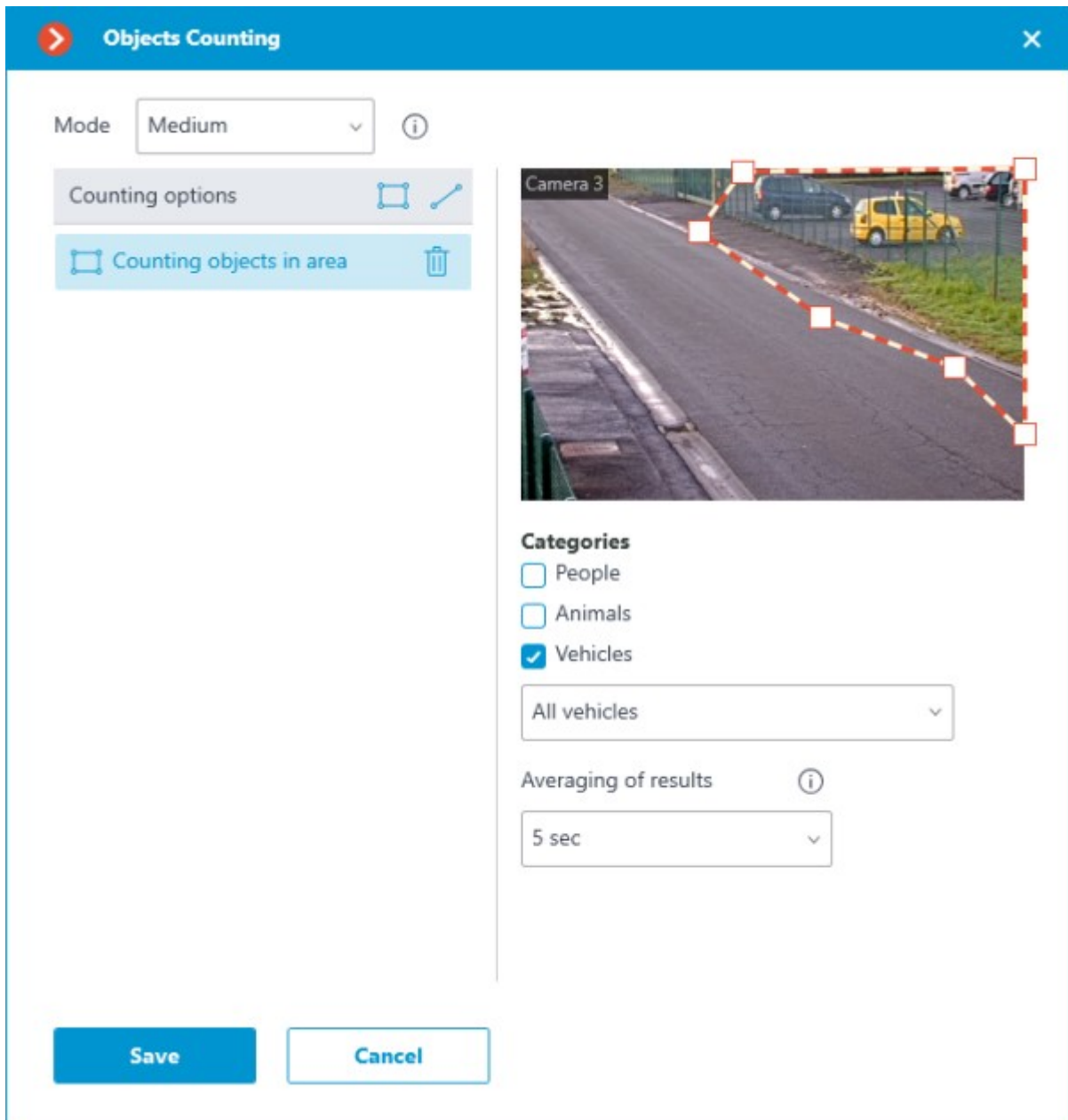
-  **Counting objects in area:** The count of objects within the area.
-  **Line intersection:** The count of objects that crossed the line in a specified direction.

Counting objects in area

To add an area, click • • . When doing this, a rectangular area will be created in the preview window.


The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

For counting objects in the area, it is necessary to set the interval of averaging results. Averaging makes counting more resistant to sudden changes in the number of objects. The longer the averaging period, the slower the result will change.

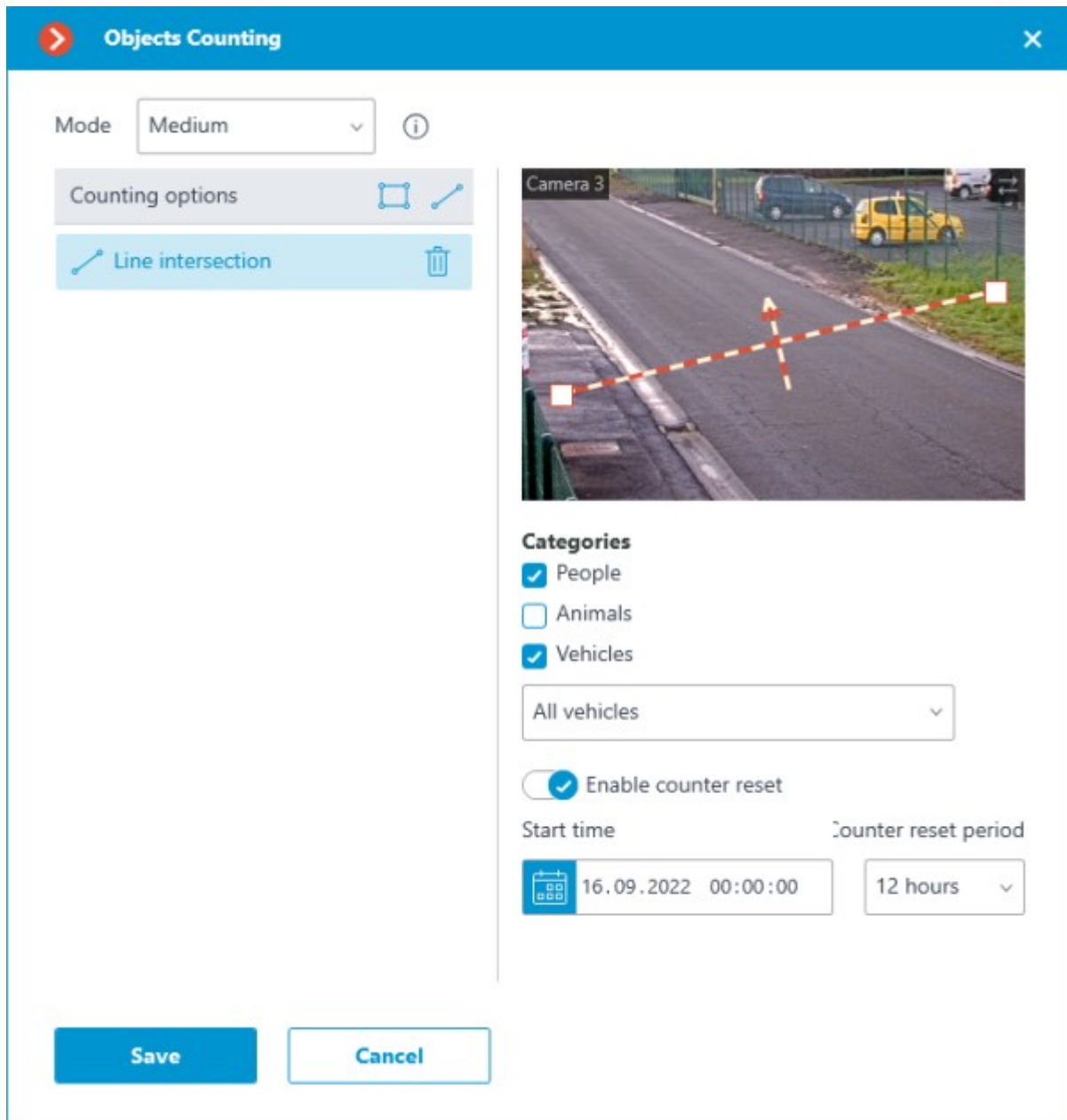


Line intersection

To add a line, click • • . When doing so, a straight line will be created in the preview window. Position of the line can be changed by dragging it by the waypoints on the tips.

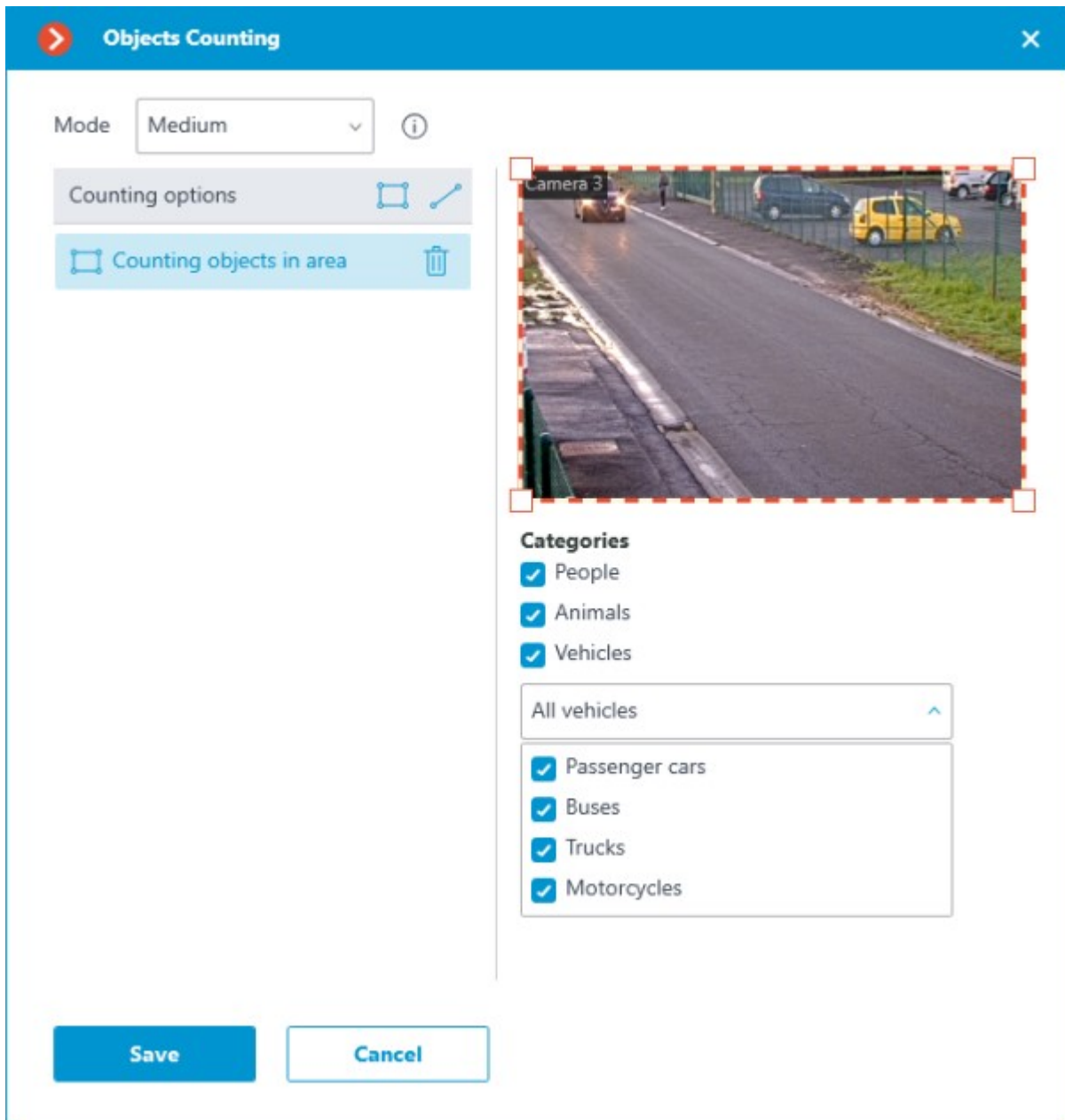
To reverse the direction of counting, click the  button in the upper-right corner of the preview window.

For counting objects crossing the line, resetting the counters can be enabled. It will require configuring the parameters for resetting the counters.



It is also necessary to select objects of which categories will be counted. The following categories are available:

- People
- Animals
- Vehicles by type: Passenger cars, Buses, Trucks, Motorcycles.

Requirements and recommendations

Hardware and software



For counting people, vehicles and animals it is necessary to install the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package.

The following equipment is required to use this neural network-based module:

- A processor with AVX instructions support;
- An **NVIDIA** video card (GPU) with the computation capacity index of at least 6.5 and with at least 4 Gb of memory; the parameters and performance of the video card must be similar or better than those of **NVIDIA GTX 1650 Super** model;
- version of the video card driver at least 460;
- swap file at least half of the total RAM size.

If the package will be installed on a virtual machine, it may additionally be required to:

- Enable support for AVX instructions in the guest machine settings;
- Use GRID drivers for GPU virtualization.



Eocortex must use video cards selected for running neural networks in monopoly mode. It is not allowed to use such card for other applications or tasks that consume GPU resources, including for displaying video. Simultaneous use of a video card for several tasks may lead to incorrect system operation: from analytics performance degradation to server instability.



The neural network works with the 64-bit version of **Eocortex** only.



When upgrading Eocortex to another version, it is necessary to also upgrade the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package to the corresponding version.

Video stream

Frame frequency: no lower than 10 frames per second;

Determination of objects

The object should be clearly visible on the frame, not overlapped by other objects and not blend into the background.

The object should not be blurred.

Frame resolution should not be lower than HD (1280×720 px).

The minimum size of object: 40 pixels in height. Recommended: 80 pixels.

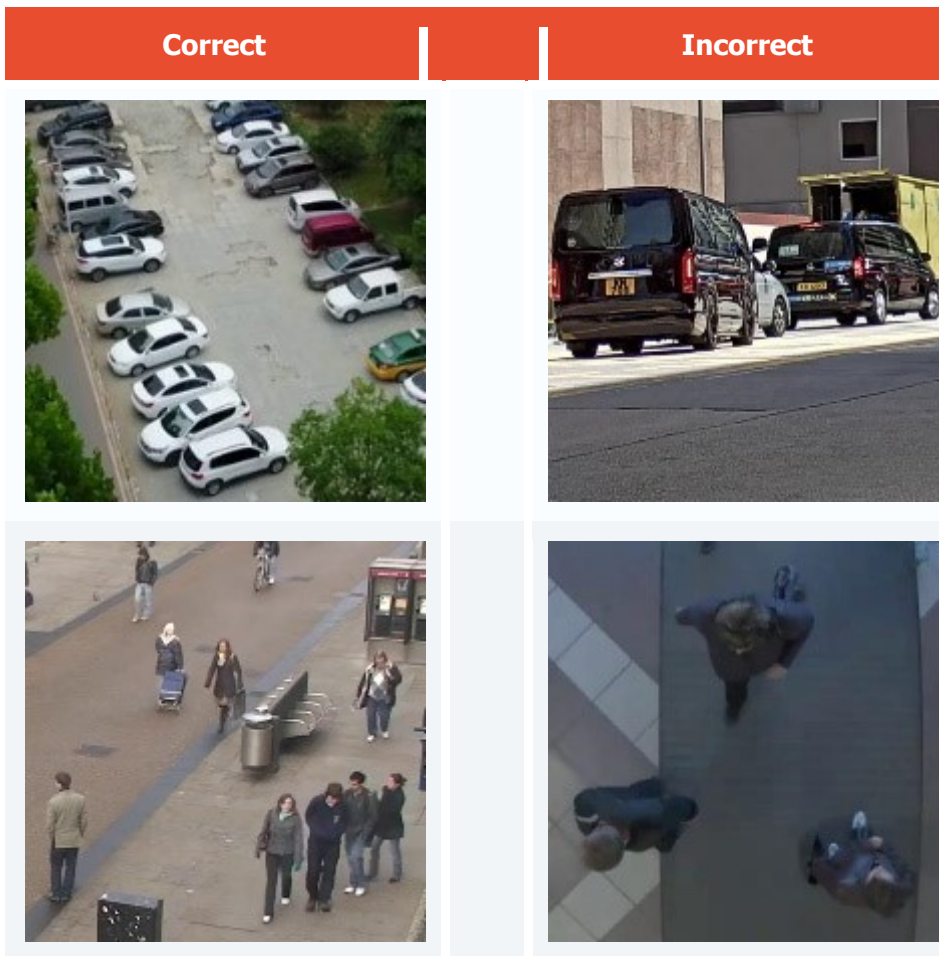
Counting by line crossing:

The greatest side of the object should not exceed $\frac{1}{4}$ of the size of the whole frame.

Movement speed of the object should be such that in $\frac{1}{10}$ seconds the object moves in frame by no more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of its size.

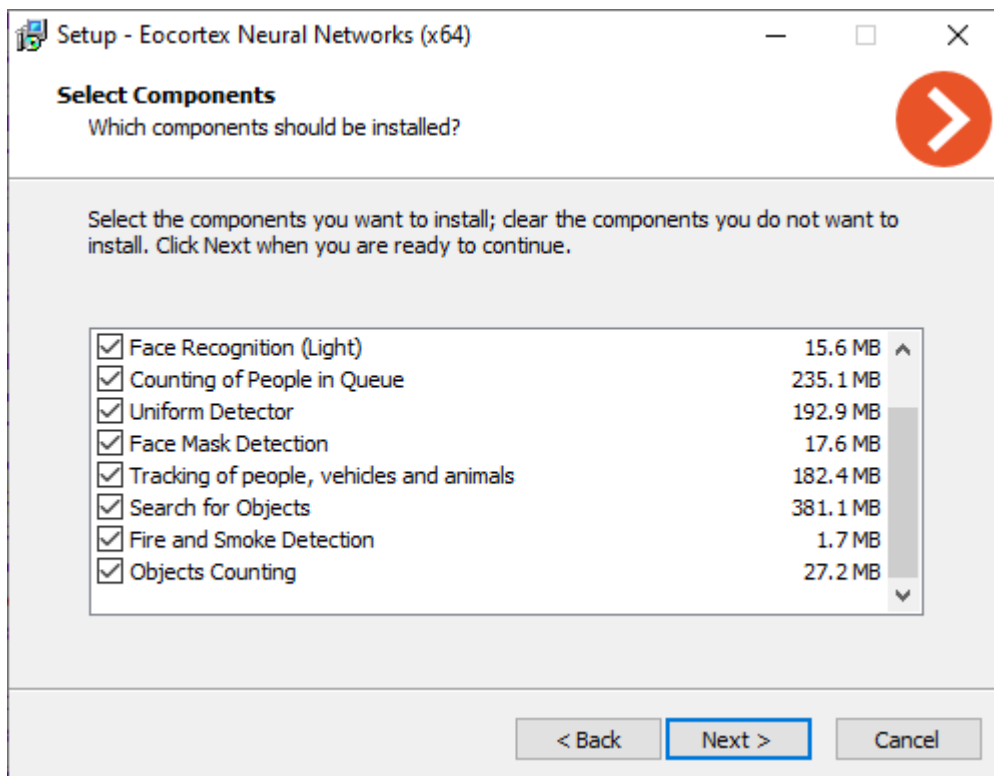

Deployment of the module

For counting people, vehicles and animals it is necessary to install the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package.

To install the module, select the corresponding item when installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package:



It is recommended to run the module on graphics cards (GPUs).

People Counting

The **People Counting** is designed for counting people in the frame who cross a preset line, taking into account the direction of crossing.

Capabilities of the module

- Real-time counting of the entering and exiting visitors at one or more entrances (using several cameras).
- Displaying the readings of the counters in the **Eocortex Client** application.
- Creating the reports of the number of visitors who entered, exited and remain in the premises for different periods of time, and for one or several cameras.
- Automatic and manual download of the reports and the automatic sending of the reports by email.
- Automatic update and reset of the counters.

Additionally, the module allows to set the counting zones and, subsequently, determine the number of people in the zones in real time, providing the following capabilities:



- Setting several counting zones each of which can include an unlimited number of cameras with the active module, assigned to the same server.
- Displaying in real time the information regarding the current number of people in each zone where the camera being viewed is included.
- A possibility to set the current value of the number of people in a zone manually.
- Generating alarm events in case of the maximum allowable number of people in a zone is exceeded as well as in case of the return of this number to the allowable value.



The number of people in the zones comes into account only when the server is functioning. When the server is restarted, the values of the counters will be set to zero; in such a case, the values can be set manually.

Details

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector and the module itself.

The module settings are described below.

The **Real time** and **Archive** buttons permit to select the source of video for the preview window.



It is required to specify the crossline in the preview window by dragging the ends of the line with the mouse. This line must be crossed by all the entering and exiting visitors in order for the counting to be performed.

It is not recommended to place the crossline in the immediate proximity of doors or other moving objects.

Additionally, in the preview window, it is required to set up the average object size by dragging the corners of the rectangular frame with the mouse. The dimensions of the frame must enclose the counted object of the average size in the confluence with the line. This dimension is taken into account when counting: if the line is crossed by the object significantly bigger than the frame dimensions, it will

be counted as several objects (for example, if the object is three times larger than the frame, it will be counted as three separate objects).

It is recommended to use the video from the archive for the convenience of setting up the average size.

The rectangle of setting the average size may be located in any part of the frame, i.e. it is not required to place it on the crossline.

The **Change movement direction** link permits to change the direction in which the entering people will be counted. To designate the direction of entrance and exit, the ends of the arrows perpendicular to the counting line are provided with the corresponding legends.

The **Counting method** dropdown list allows to select the way of counting in accordance with the conditions of the module's operation. The following options are available:

- **Several people in frame** ensures the counting of both separately moving people and groups of people. This method is recommended to be used in the majority of cases when the conditions of the module operation are met.
- **Separately moving people in frame:** this method is recommended to be used only when it is not possible to provide all the conditions of the module's operation (for example, if the camera is installed in a low position, or when it is not installed vertically) and more than one moving person rarely enters the field of view of the camera.

The following settings are available on the **Additional settings** tab:

Counting options is used to select the value that will be calculated, stored in the archive, and displayed in the client application.

Sensitivity: high sensitivity increases the chances of detecting objects but the probability of false triggering also increases; low sensitivity reduces the instances of false triggering but the counting accuracy may suffer.

Full frame analysis: activation of this option allows to increase the counting accuracy at the cost of the increased processor load.

Automatically save data to csv files enables automatic data saving to disc.

People Counting data period sets the interval for which the counter data of one report line are summed up.

Unload data every determines the interval of the creation and saving of the report.

Path to files allows to set the folder on the server where the report files will be stored.

The folder on the server to which the camera being set up is bound is specified for automatic saving.

The **Select folder** button may be used only when the **Eocortex Configurator** application is launched on the server to which the camera is bound.

The CSV filename format is as follows: **Counters_CameraName_DDMMYYYY#hhmm.csv**. For example, for the **Hour** period of autosaving for **Camera 1** camera the following files will be saved:

Counters_Camera 3_02022017#10.csv

Counters_Camera 3_02022017#11.csv

Counters_Camera 3_02022017#12.csv

The example of the CSV file contents:

time;in;out;inside;

02/02/2017 12:00:00;6;4;2;

02/02/2017 12:01:00;6;11;-5;

02/02/2017 12:02:00;10;6;4;

where **time** is the date/time of the beginning of the single counting interval;

in/out/inside is the quantity of the people who, correspondingly, entered, exited and remain inside for the given period of time.

Counter reset determines the reset to zero parameters of the counters in the **Eocortex Client** application.

Start time sets the date and time the reset intervals will be counted from.

Counter reset period sets the counter reset interval.

The switch **For specific camera** sets the counter reset settings for an individual camera or for all cameras.

If this switch is off, the counter reset settings will be applied to all cameras whose switches are off as well.

When the switch is on, the counter reset settings are set for an individual camera and do not change the counter reset settings for other cameras.

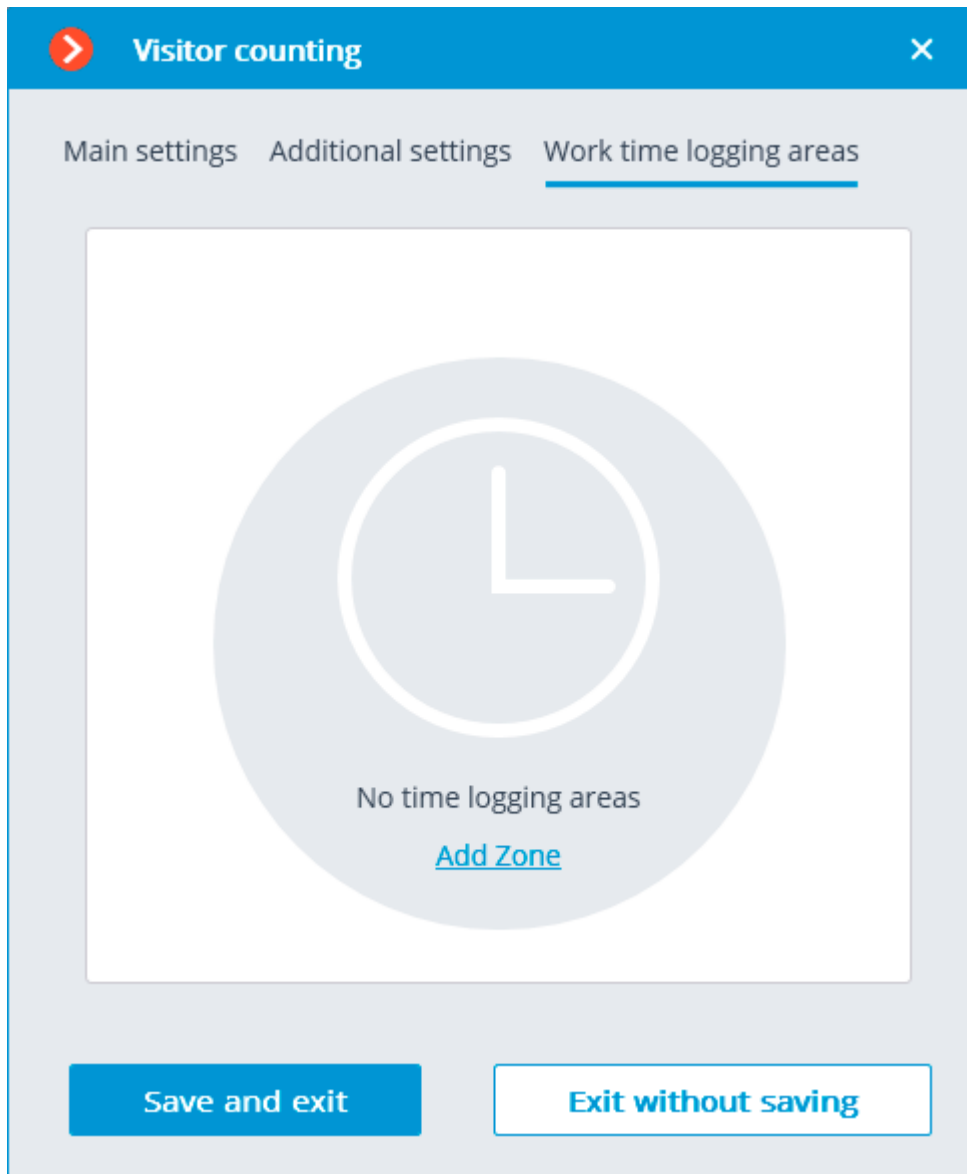
If the switch for an individual camera is off and the changes are made, the selected settings will be applied to all other cameras with the switch off upon saving the settings.

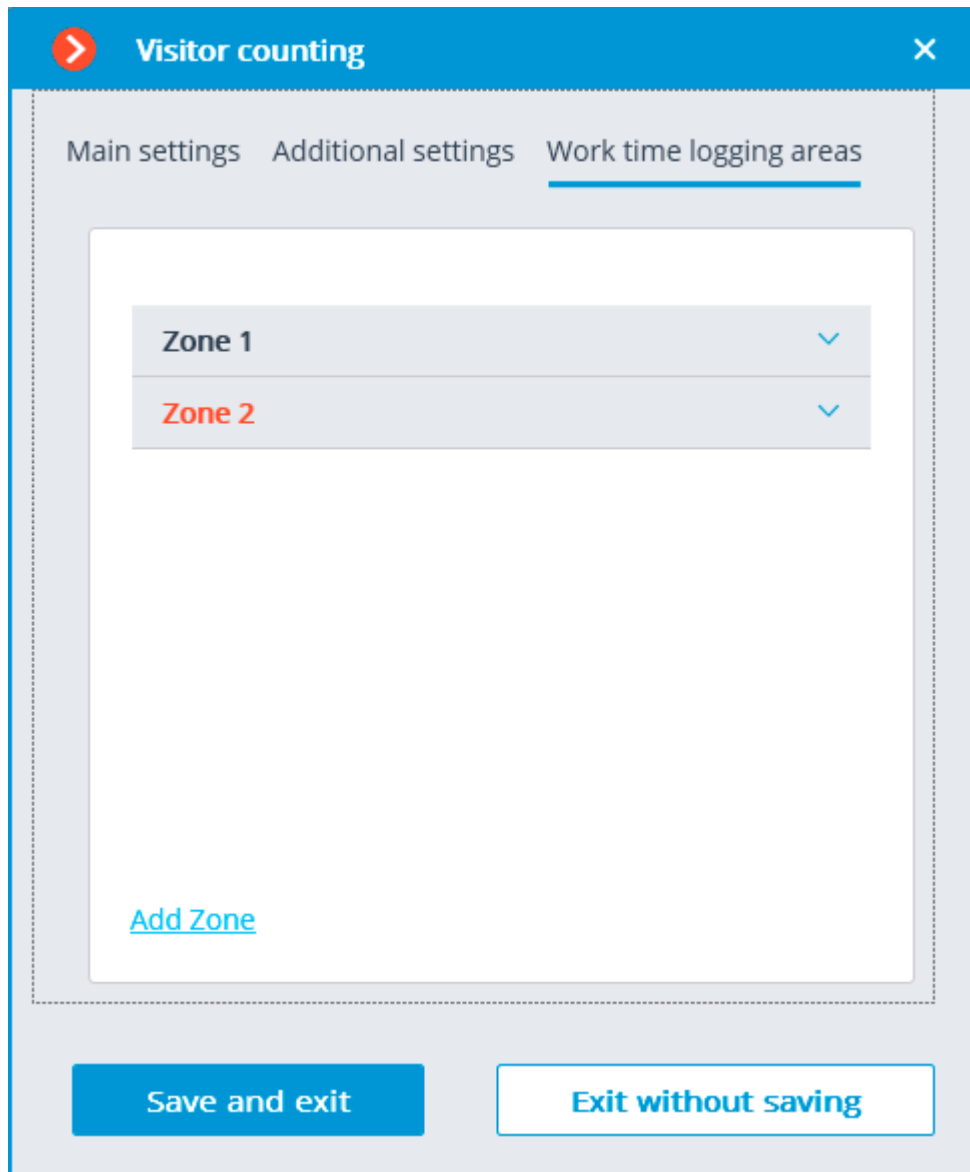
When the switch mode is changed, the following settings are made automatically:

- When switching to general settings: general settings
- When switching to unique settings: the most recent (saved) unique settings.

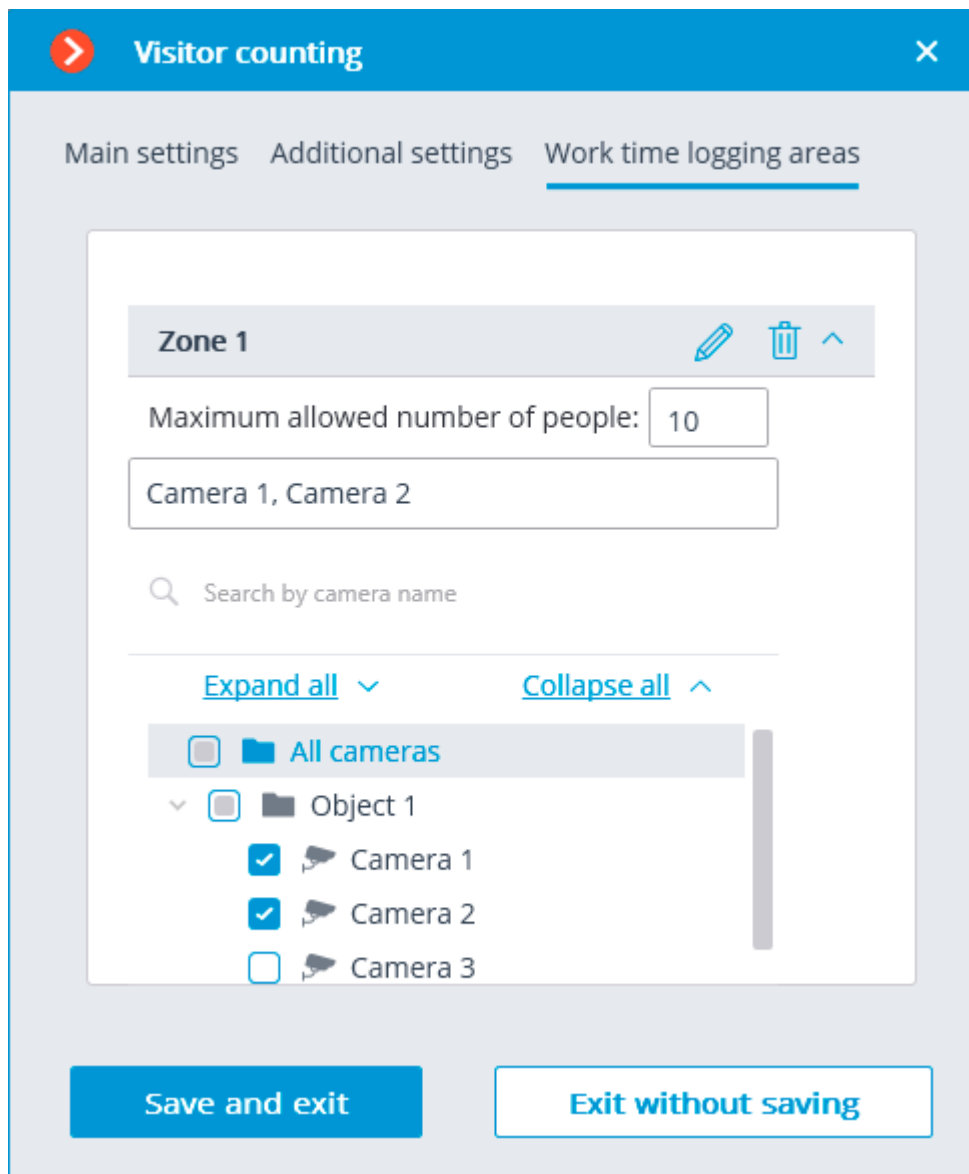
By default, the switch is off.

On the **Time logging areas** tab, it is possible to set the zones that will be used for counting visitors in the premises.





In order to set the maximum allowable quantity of visitors and to include the cameras into the zone, it is required to open the settings of the corresponding zone.



The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Within 10 to 15 seconds after the application of the settings the module will be in the process of "learning"; during this time the counting results will not be accurate. Since during "learning" the registering of the permanent background is performed, it is recommended to use this setting when there is a minimal number of moving and foreign objects in the frame in order to ensure the more accurate counting.

Requirements and recommendations

For the proper operation of the module, it is recommended to ensure that the following conditions are met:

The camera must be installed vertically. A different way of camera installation may adversely affect the counting accuracy.

The recommended minimum camera installation height is 3 meters above the ground.

The camera must be fixed.

Depending on the operation conditions, the framerate must be as follows:

- **Several people in frame:** at least 10 fps;

- **Separately moving people in frame:** at least 5 fps.

For reducing false triggering due to the changes of the background and lighting, it is required to ensure uniform illumination without flicker and sharp changes of brightness. The presence of moving foreign objects in the camera field of view is to be avoided because such objects may also be counted.

If the **Separately moving people in frame** option is used and there are moving foreign objects in the frame, including such objects as doors, escalators etc., it is recommended to specify the detection zone that does not include these objects in the software motion detector settings.



Personnel Activity Monitoring



The **Personnel Activity Monitoring** is designed for monitoring personnel activity at their workplaces. The activity in this context is the movement in the work zone, including minor movements.

Details

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector and the module itself.

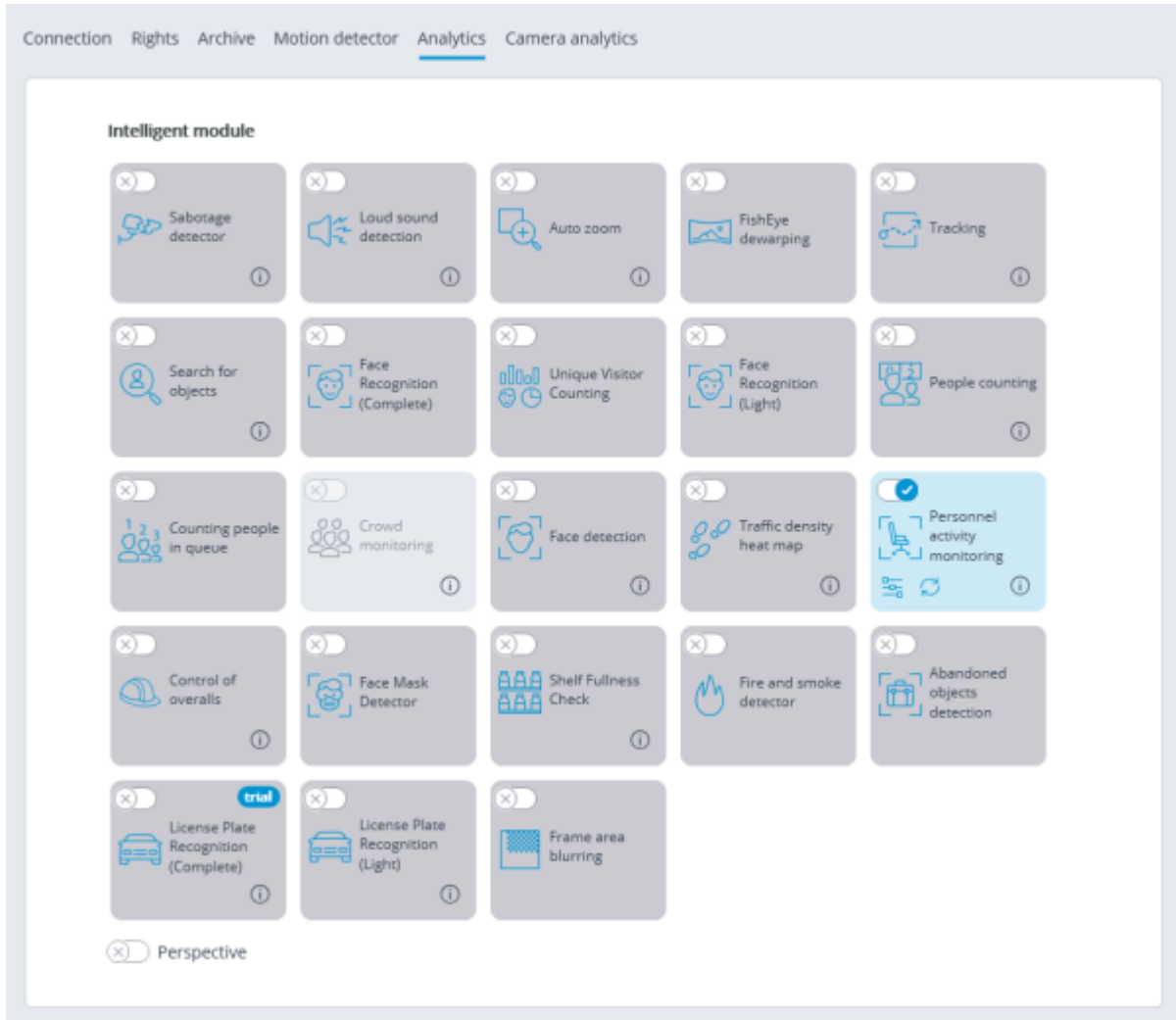

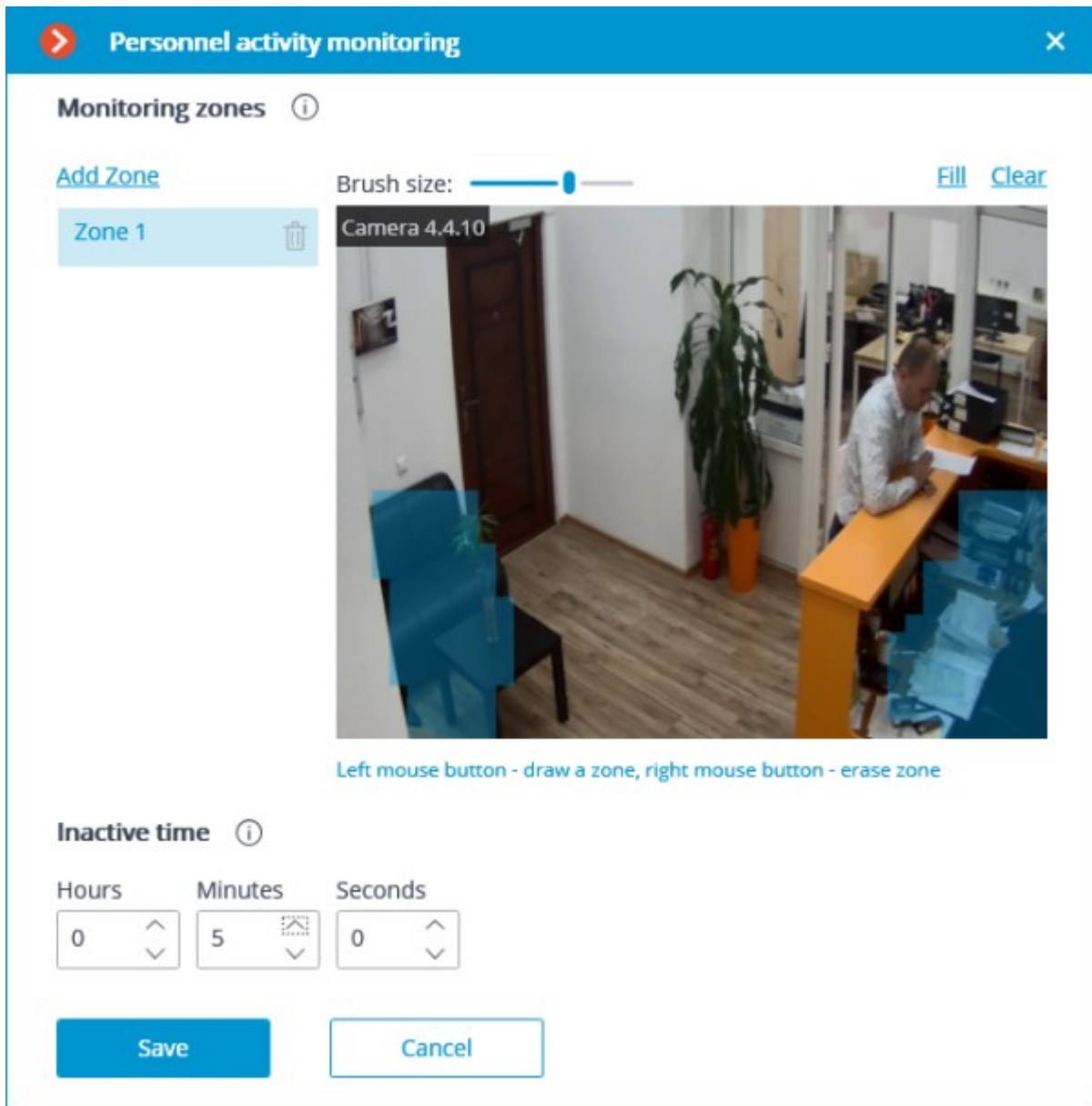

In the opened window it is required to specify up to six detection zones and the inactivity time.

Detection zones are the zones of the frame bounded by a closed polygon. The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

Zone setup requirements:

- The zones must not overlap;
- Only one employee must be present in the zone;
- The small movements of the personnel must be taken into consideration in the zone, such as sitting back, rolling back on the chair etc.;
- The zone must not contain any moving objects not depending on the activity of the personnel: fans, water tanks, moving parts of the equipment etc.;
- No computer displays, instrument panels, clock faces etc. shall be present in the zone.

Inactive time is the time interval upon the expiry of which the Inactive zone event will be generated in case of the absence of activity in the zone. The specified value is extended to all of the zones.

The inactivity in the zone does not mean that no employee is present: for example, a person may stay motionless or be asleep. The presence of the activity in the zone, in its turn, does not necessarily mean

that the employee is in his or her workplace – it may be caused by the presence of other persons in the given zone.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

The camera must be fixed. It is preferable to mount the camera on the ceiling facing vertically down in order to isolate the workplace of each employee.

Sabotage Detector

The **Sabotage Detector** module is designed for detecting the actions deliberately aimed at the disturbance of the normal operation of the CCTV cameras by impairing the image quality or provoking the loss of visual information about the objects under surveillance.


Capabilities of the module

- Camera defocusing.
- Camera turnaway.
- Camera flaring.

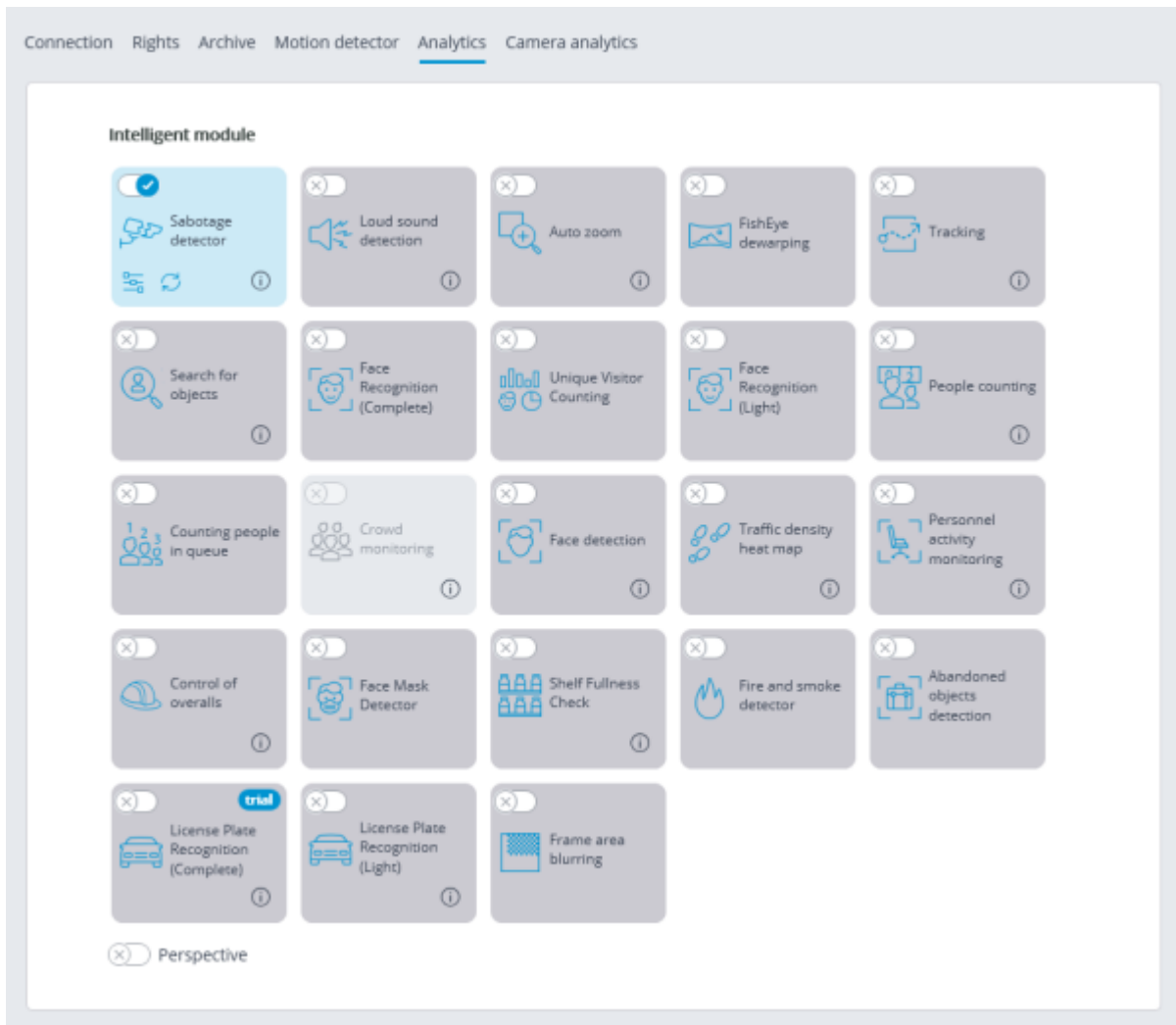

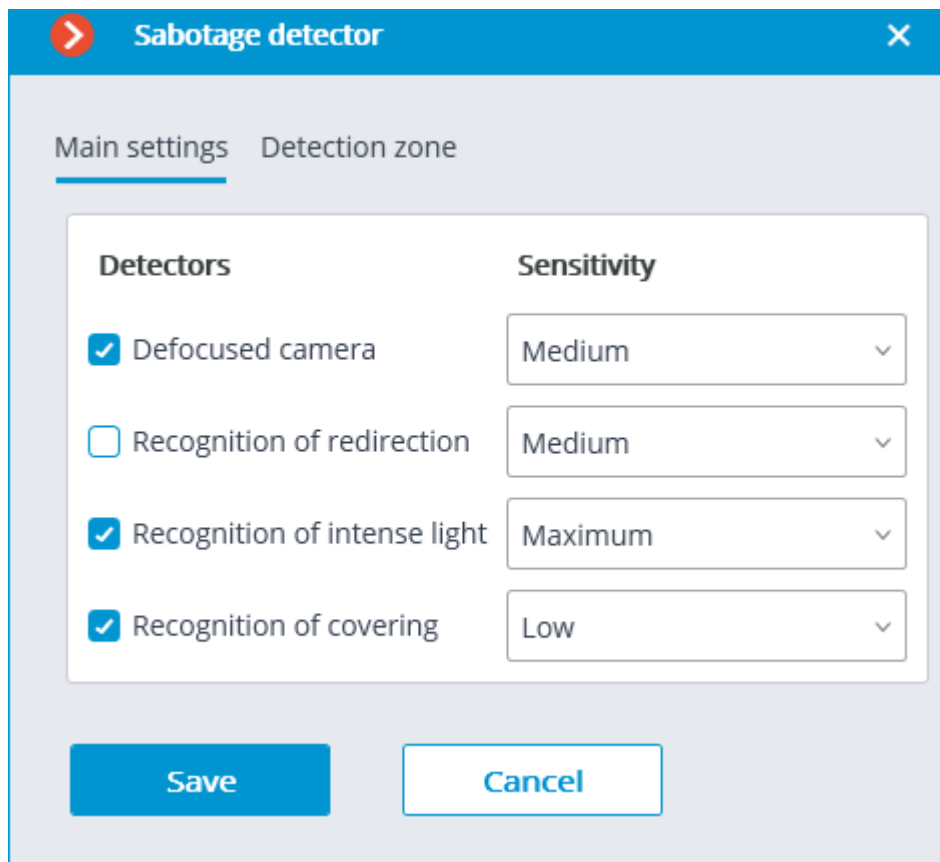

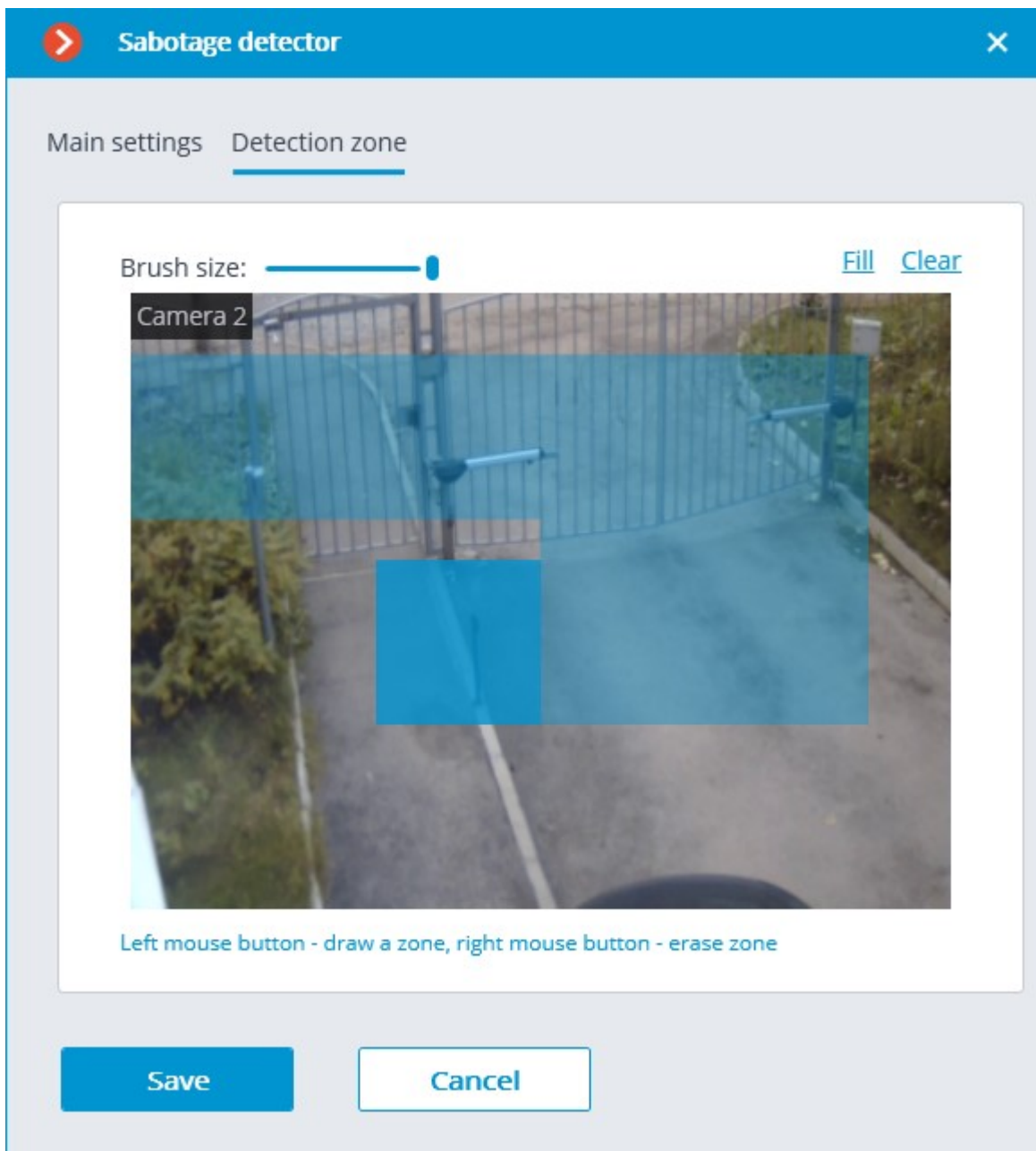
It is required to make the following settings on the appropriate tabs in the window that opens:

Main settings: enabling detectors and adjusting **Sensitivity** of any of them.

The higher the value of the **Sensitivity** parameter, the greater the likelihood of detecting a sabotage. If the detector raises false alarms, the value of this parameter needs to be decreased.



Detection zone is the zone of the frame filled with the semitransparent blue fill in the settings window. The mouse is used for modifying the zone: left mouse button serves for filling the zone, and the right one is used for clearing it. With the help of the **Fill** and **Clear** buttons you can fill or clear the whole area of the frame. The corresponding slider is used to modify the **Brush size**.



Do not turn on the module on the cameras that are equipped with the automatic focus or focal distance control, and on the PTZ cameras.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

Camera requirements

The video resolution must be at least 0.3 MP; the framerate must be at least 5 frames per second; the image quality must not be reduced significantly by compression, because the high compression rate may negatively affect the work of the defocusing detector.

Aspects of operation

For the detector to trigger, it is required that the changes in the video stream that are indicative of the sabotage of the video surveillance last at least 5 seconds. The detector does not trip in case of

brief flashes, darkening, etc. Among other things, this is done to avoid triggering of the detector during the switching of the camera from the day mode to the night mode, because such switching may be accompanied by a significant short-term change of brightness in the frame.

It is allowed to use the detector round-the-clock on the cameras with night mode and on those cameras that switch to such mode. However, the switching to the night mode and back must not take more than 3 - 4 seconds.

The repeated generation of the event cannot happen earlier than in 2 minutes.

After the launch of the module, it is required to wait for 15 seconds for the initial automatic adjustment to be completed.

Aspects of individual detectors

Camera flaring detector

The camera flaring detector is designed for detecting the attempts of flaring a video camera by directing a bright beam of light (e.g. of a flashlight) at its lens. Normally, a camera tries to compensate for the local flaring by darkening the rest of the image. That leads to the indiscernibility of objects in the whole field of view of the camera. For the detector to trip, the specific brightness and area of the flaring spot are required.

Camera defocusing detector

This detector is triggered by an attempt to defocus the image.

Camera overlapping detector

This detector trips when the lens is covered by foreign objects.

The detector triggers with the following area of overlapping:

50% of the area of the frame is overlapped by a dark stationary object, or by an object placed very close to the lens;

78% of the area of the frame is overlapped by a light moving object, or by an object placed at some distance from the lens.

Detector of an attempt to turn the camera away from the pre-defined view

This detector trips when the camera is turned.

It triggers only when the turning angle exceeds 20 degrees and the turning rate is more than 6 degrees per second.

Search for Objects

The **Search for Objects** module allows to quickly find people and other objects in the archive.

Capabilities of the module

Search in the archive for

- any moving objects:
- in a set rectangular area;

- crossing a set line.
- people:
 - any people;
 - by the color of clothes;
 - by samples from the archive or an image file.
- vehicles:
 - by category: passenger cars and trucks, buses, two-wheel transport;
 - by color;
 - by samples from the video archive or an image file.
- hazardous items (firearms and baseball bats).
- animals (terrestrial animals and birds).
- bags (luggage, suitcases and backpacks).

Cross-camera Tracking:

- chronologically connected search among several cameras for the person found before using the interactive search;
- generating a video clip of the fragments found;
- displaying a trajectory on the plans (if the cameras with the found fragments were placed on the plans).



Details

Starting with version 3.5 of **Eocortex**, the **Tracking, Search for Objects** and **Uniform Detector** modules running on the same camera share the processor and video card resources. This reduces the load on the server.

For the most efficient sharing of resources, it is recommended to set the same operating mode for the camera in the settings of these modules: either using a video card or without using a video card.

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector and the module itself.

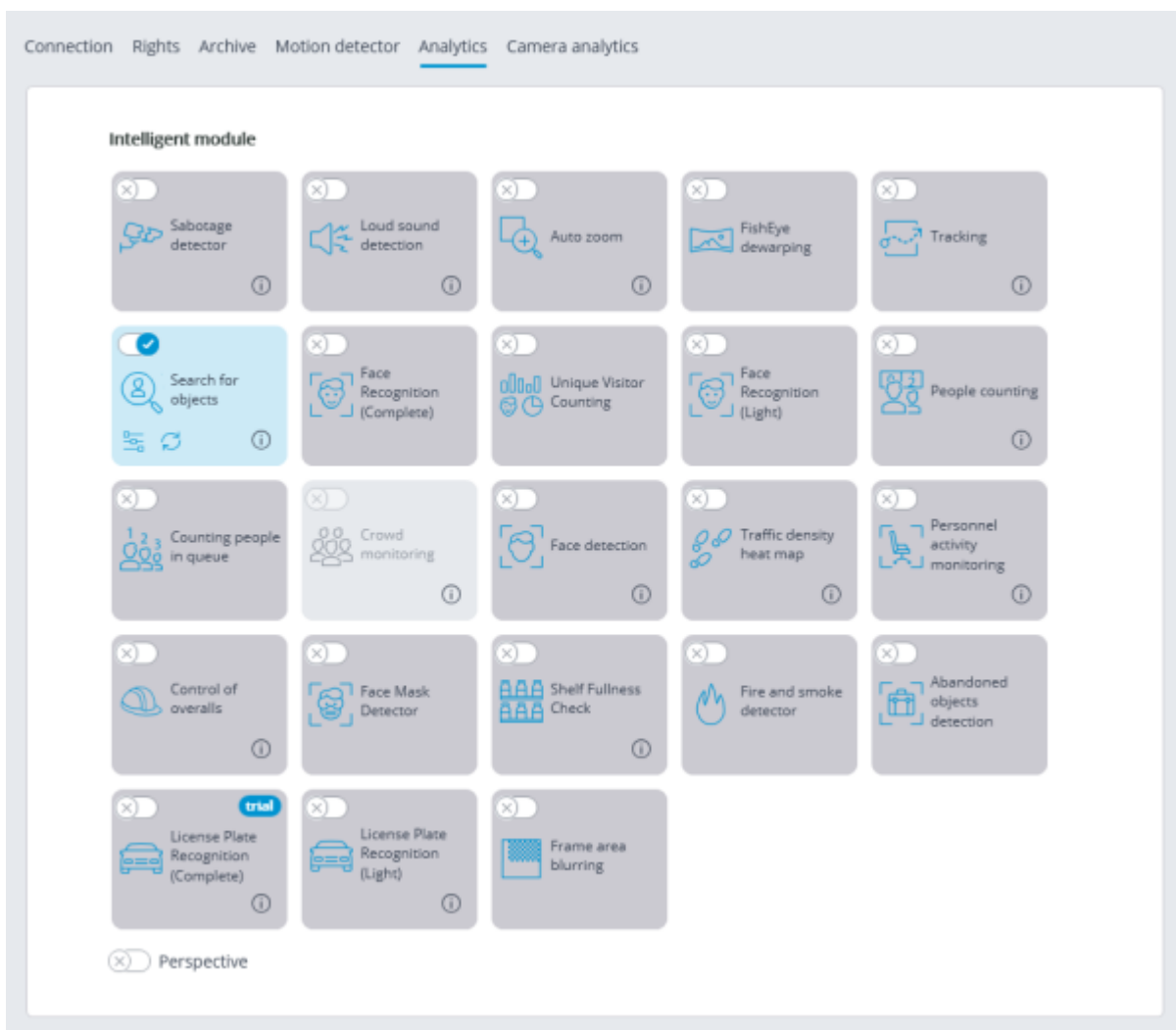

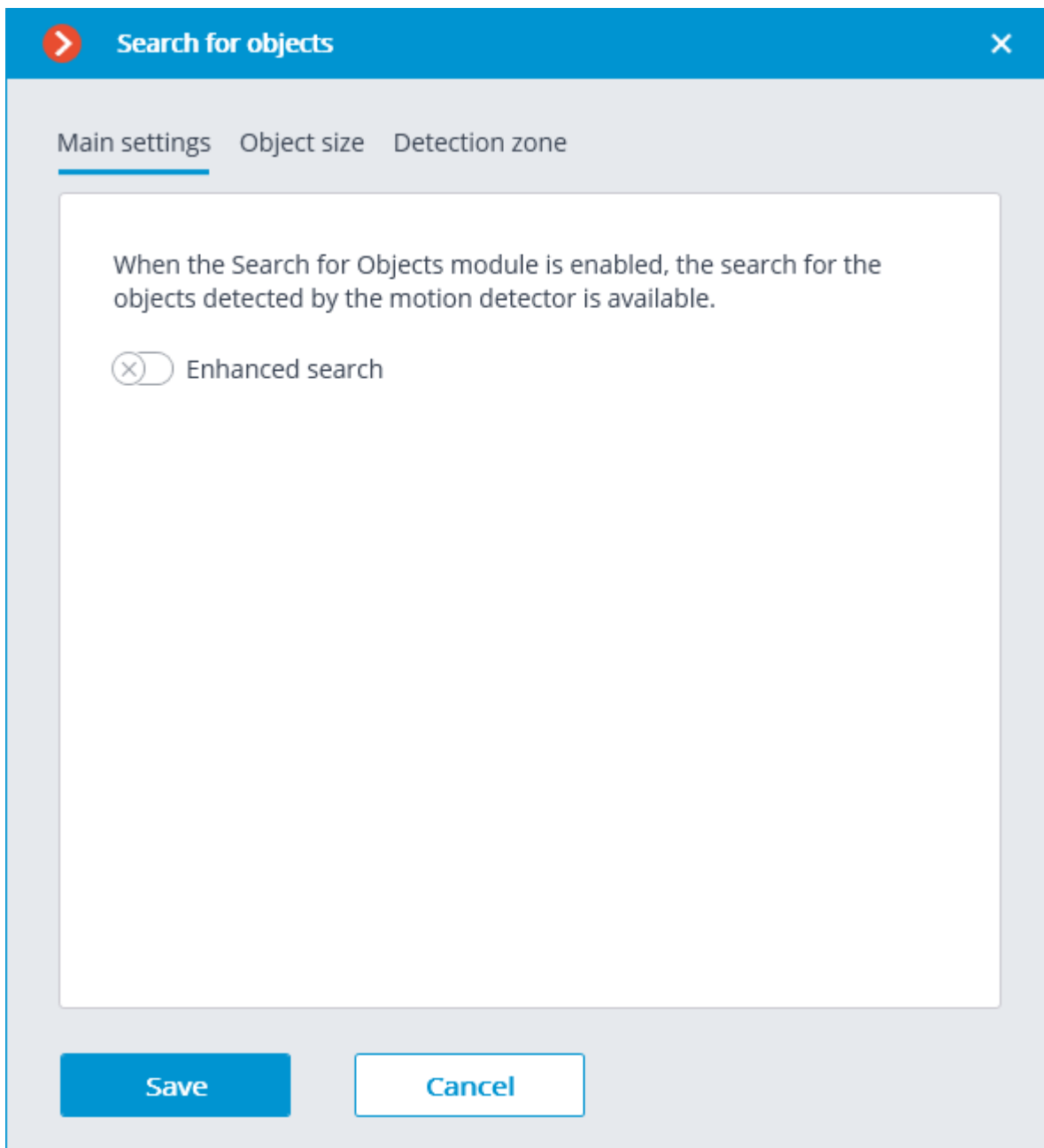

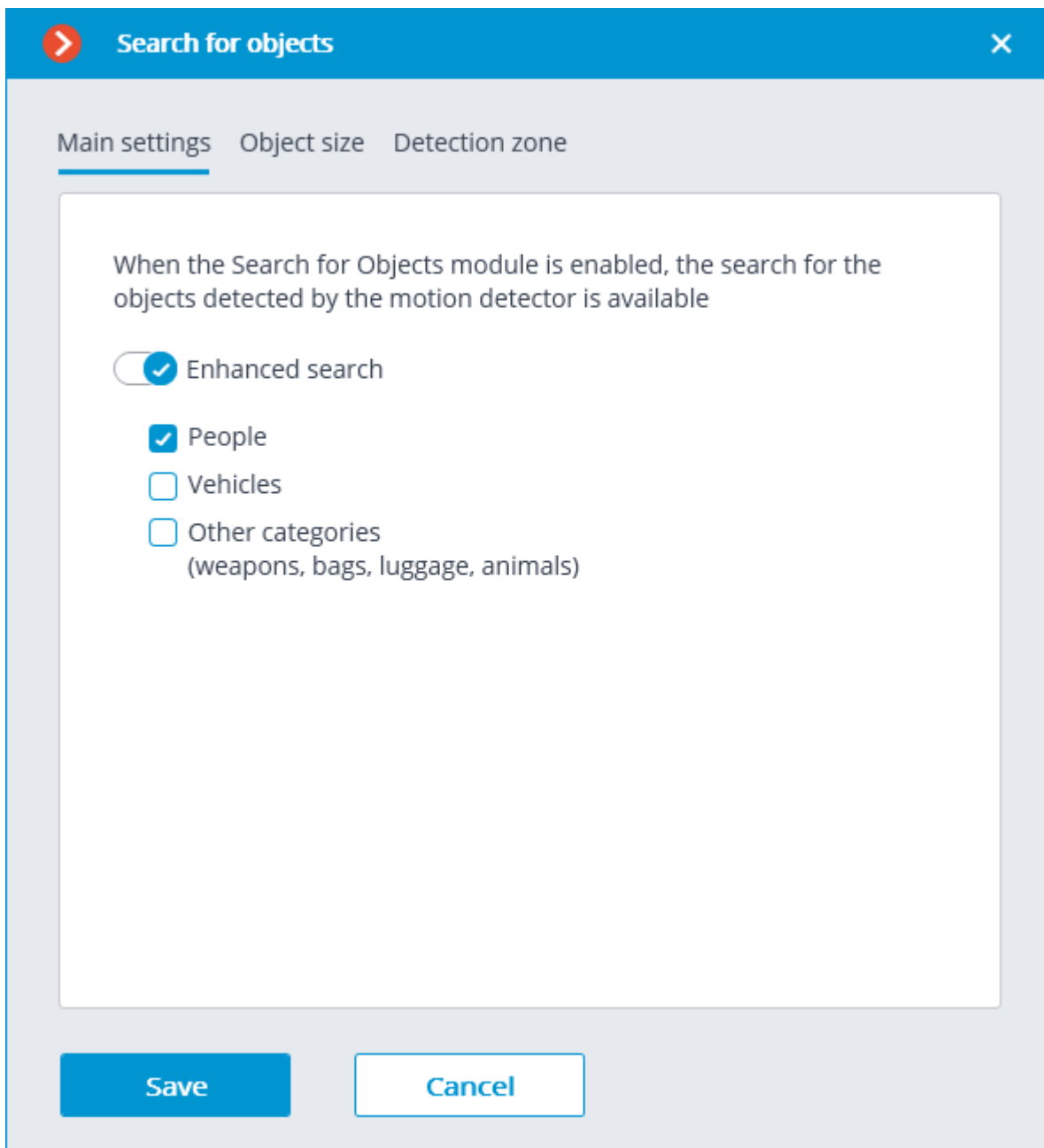

The **Enhanced search** mode, when enabled, allows searching for objects of the following categories:

- People;
- Vehicles;
- Other categories.



Later, when receiving search results, objects from **Vehicles** and **Other categories** can be filtered by object type.

The **Vehicles** category includes objects of the following types:

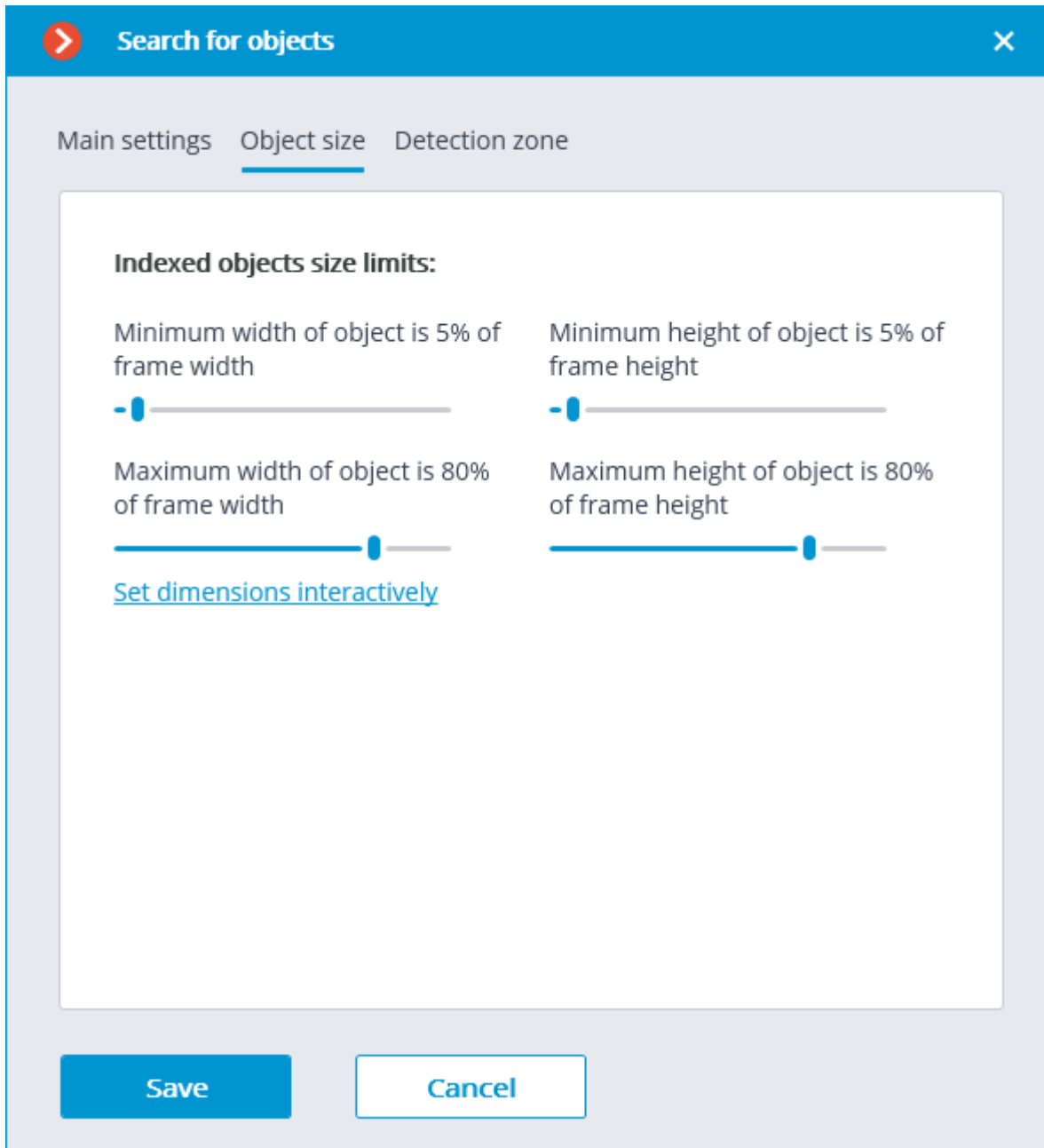

The **Other categories** includes objects of the following types:

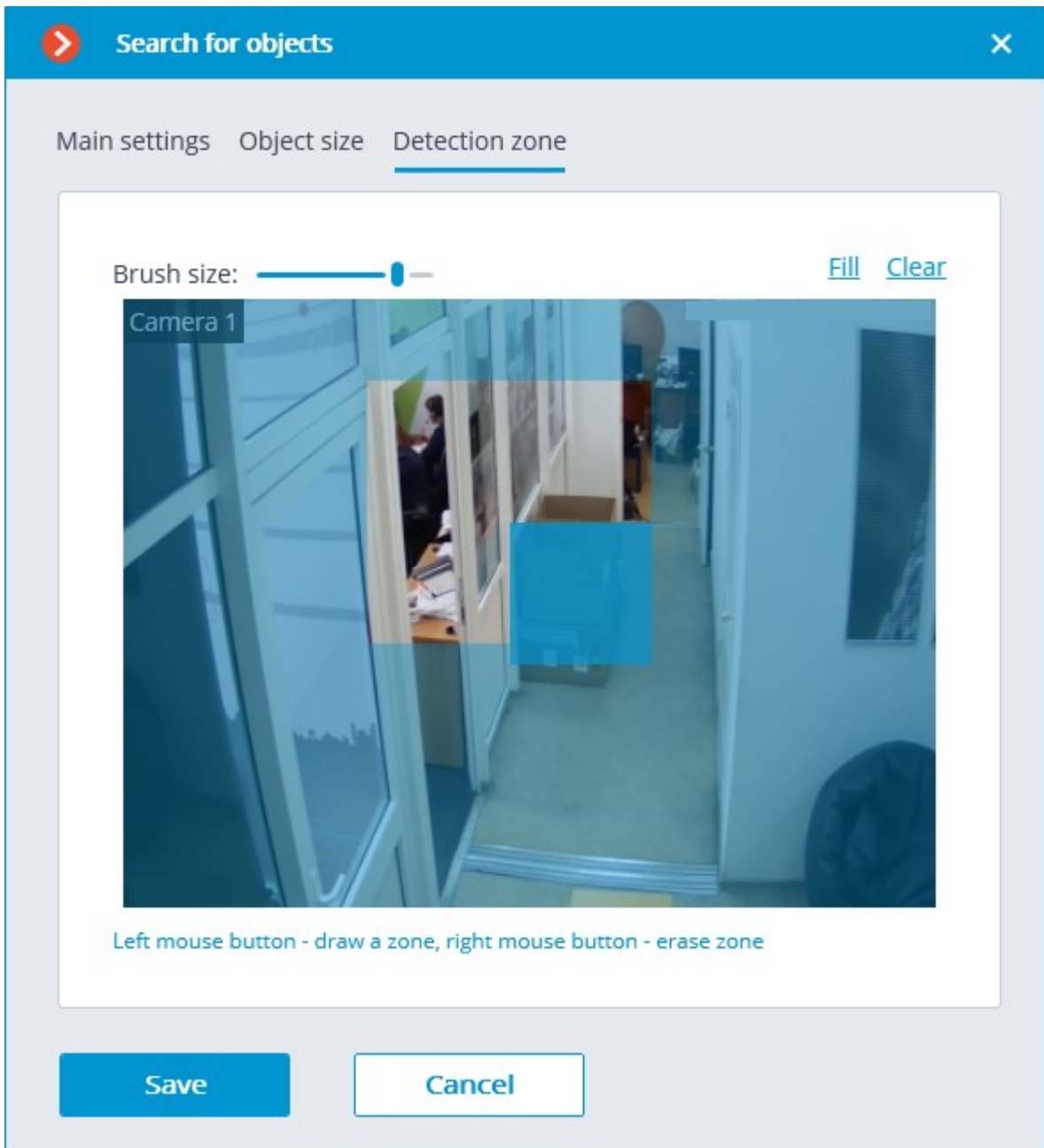
- Animals (terrestrial animals and birds);

When searching for objects from the **Other categories**, the consumption of server resources increases significantly.

The **Object size** tab sets the minimum and maximum sizes of the detected objects.



Detection zone is the zone of the frame filled with the semitransparent blue fill in the settings window. The mouse is used for modifying the zone: left mouse button serves for filling the zone, and the right one is used for clearing it. With the help of the **Fill** and **Clear** buttons you can fill or clear the whole area of the frame. The corresponding slider is used to modify the **Brush size**.



The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

Functionality limitations

After updating **Eocortex** from version 3.3 and lower to version 3.3 and higher, the **Search for Objects** module will not be able to Search for Objects for the period preceding the update. This is due to the database change in version 3.4.

Hardware and software



Eocortex Neural Networks package must be installed before it will be possible to use neural networks-based features of the module.

The following equipment is required to use this neural network-based module:

- A processor with AVX instructions support;

- An **NVIDIA** video card (GPU) with the computation capacity index of at least 6.5 and with at least 4 Gb of memory; the parameters and performance of the video card must be similar or better than those of **NVIDIA GTX 1650 Super** model;
- version of the video card driver at least 460;
- swap file at least half of the total RAM size.

If the package will be installed on a virtual machine, it may additionally be required to:

- Enable support for AVX instructions in the guest machine settings;
- Use GRID drivers for GPU virtualization.



Eocortex must use video cards selected for running neural networks in monopoly mode. It is not allowed to use such card for other applications or tasks that consume GPU resources, including for displaying video. Simultaneous use of a video card for several tasks may lead to incorrect system operation: from analytics performance degradation to server instability.



The neural network works with the 64-bit version of **Eocortex** only.



When upgrading Eocortex to another version, it is necessary to also upgrade the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package to the corresponding version.

For searching for moving objects only and for simplified search, the video card is not used.



When using a video card, the stable operation of the module is guaranteed on operating systems Windows 10, Windows Server 2016, Ubuntu versions 18.04 and 20.04 exclusively, as well as on the newer versions of these operating systems.

On other operating systems (Windows versions 7 and 8, Windows Server versions 2008 and 2012, CentOS, Debian), issues may arise when trying to use NVIDIA graphics cards. On Windows 8, this is due to the cessation of support for NVIDIA graphics card drivers. On CentOS and Debian, the problem is due to the high complexity of installing workable versions of video card drivers.



The **Eocortex Neural Networks** package must be installed on a video surveillance server even when a video analytics server is used. This is due to the fact that the module uses PostgreSQL DBMS that is installed together with the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package.

Video stream

- The frame rate must not be lower than 10 frames per second;
- The optimal resolution is HD or FullHD.

Image

- Lighting in the frame should be uniform and constant.
- If the camera is installed in front of a bright light source (the sun behind an entrance door, etc.), it is required to adjust the exposure (or brightness) to ensure that the objects in the frame have a natural color (not overexposed or darkened). In this case, it is permissible for the background to be overexposed.
- The image must be in color.
- There must be no significant compression artefacts.
- The compression quality must not be lower than average.
- The object must be seen from a suitable angle, at which it will be clearly distinguishable from the background and plainly visible when observed by the human eye.

For searching for people:

- A strong lateral light source (sunlight from a window) is not permitted because in this case one half of the person will be overexposed and the other half will be too dark.

Scene and camera position

- The frame must not contain mirrored surfaces that give reflections: glasses, mirrors, etc.
- It is allowed to place the camera overhead. The tilt angle of the camera should not exceed 45 ° from the horizontal line.

For searching for people:

- People must be visible at full height.

For searching for vehicles:

- Installing the camera at an angle to the axis of movement of the vehicles provides the most advantageous perspective.

Module's performance

The accuracy of searching for people using colors is about 70%.

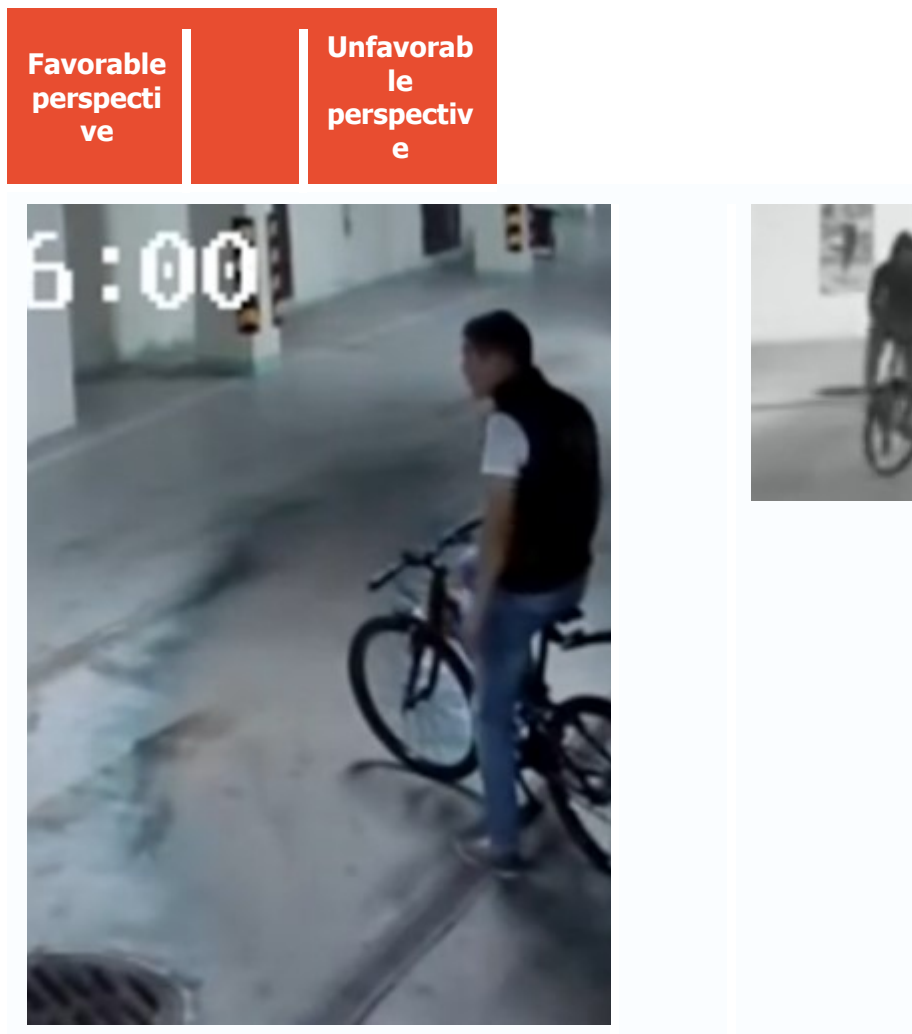
The accuracy of searching for people using samples is about 80%.

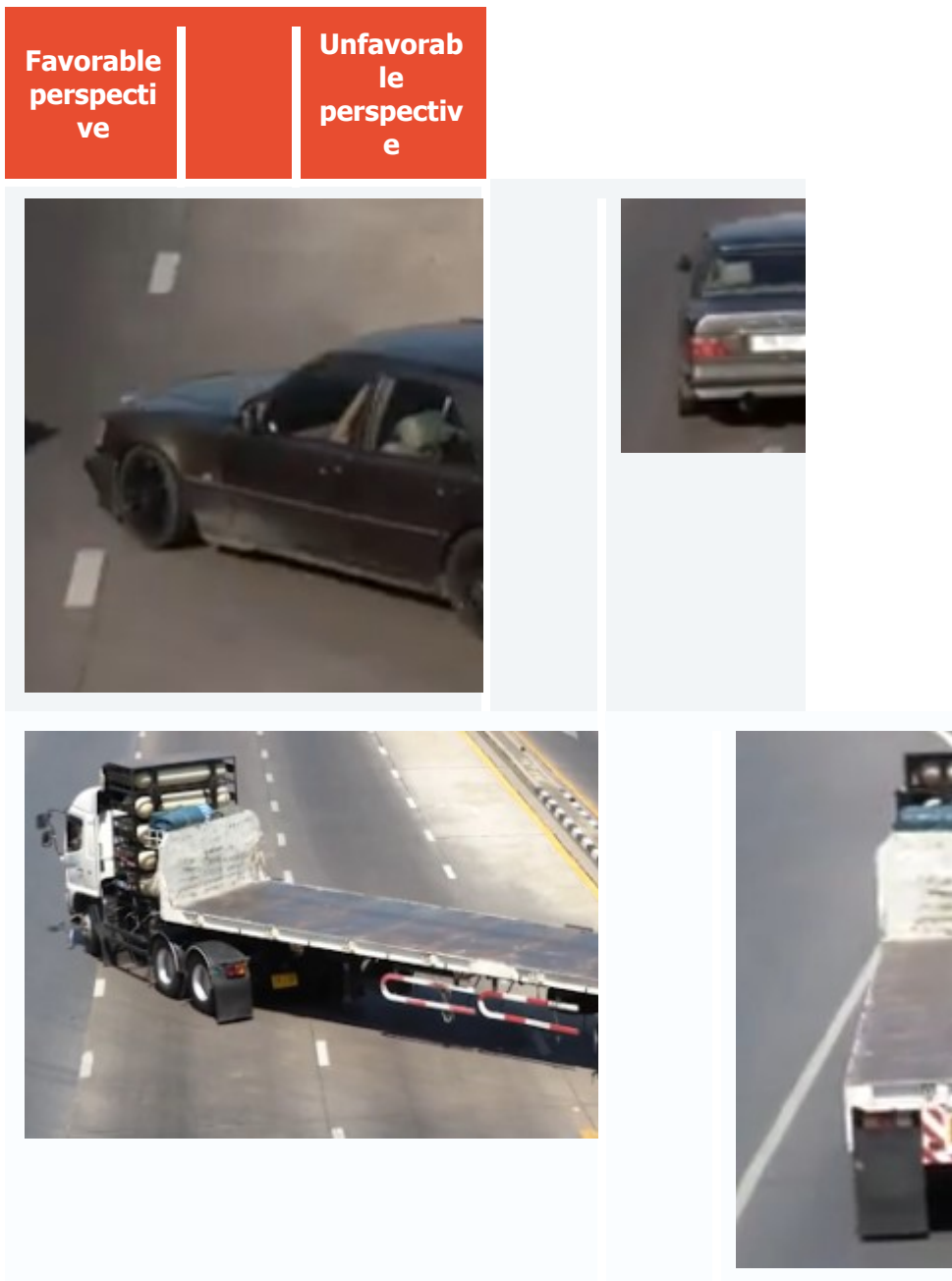
The accuracy of searching for vehicles using colors and samples is from 50 to 70%, depending on the perspective of the vehicle and lighting. Glare and flare from headlights significantly reduce the accuracy of color definition.

Minimum requirements for searching vehicles by color:

- The vehicle must be of single color, without multicolored stickers or the like.
- The vehicle must be captured during daylight hours and in good weather.
- The exposure and contrast on the camera must be adjusted in such a way that the color of the subject can be unambiguously determined by the human eye.
- The body of the vehicle must not be light-struck by headlights or other reflections of light, including sunlight.
- The angle at which the vehicle was captured must allow to correctly determine the dominant color of the object (for example, if the car is seen from behind, the bumper is painted in a dark color and the rear window is tinted, the color of the car may be detected as black).

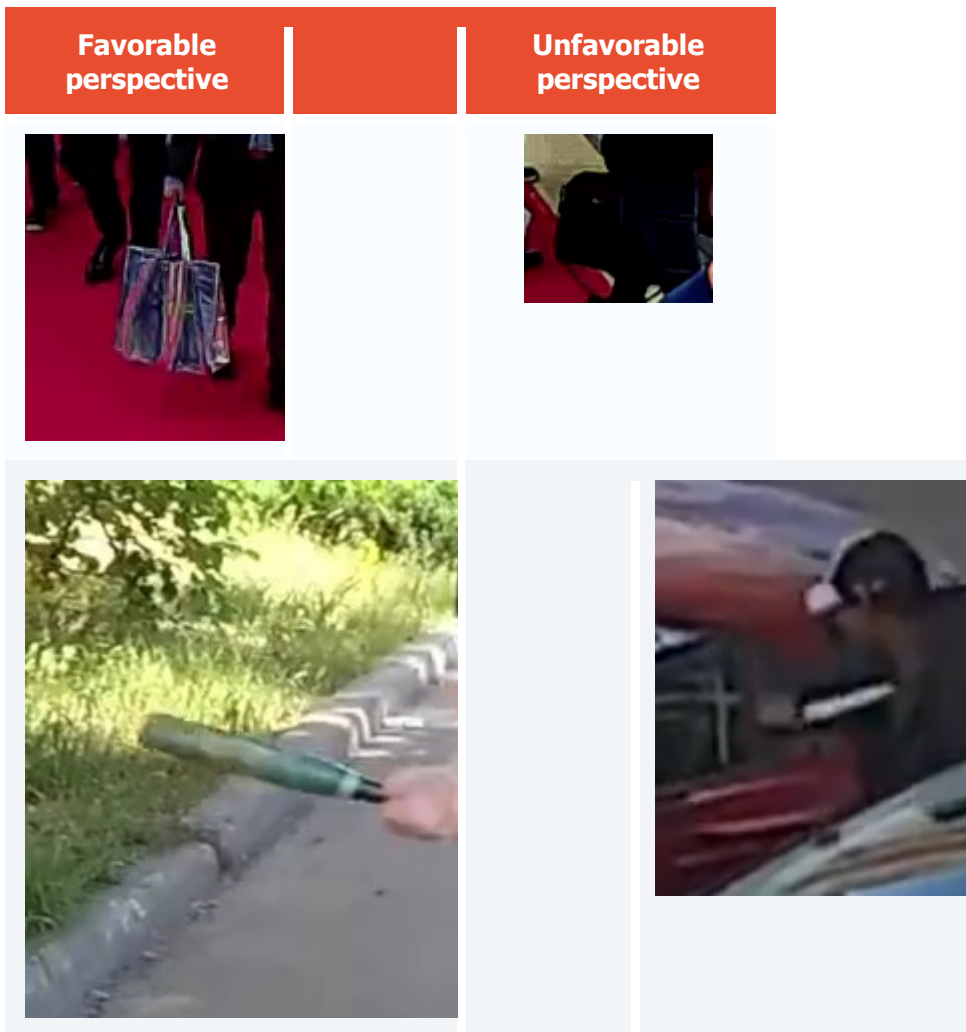
Below are the examples of favorable and unfavorable angles for determining the type of vehicle. The better the perspective, the higher the accuracy of determining the type of a passing vehicle. On average, under good conditions, the accuracy of determining the type of vehicle is about 80%.





The accuracy of searching for other objects significantly depends on the quality of the image, on the size of the object in the frame, as well as on the perspective from which this object is seen. Under suitable conditions, the accuracy of searching for other objects can reach 40% to 60%, depending on the degree of visibility of the object in the frame and its size (for example, a partially hidden weapon or a suitcase hidden behind a corner will be much less likely to be detected than clearly distinguishable objects of the same type). Moreover, this category of objects is characterized by a greater number of false triggerings than others.

Below are the examples of favorable and unfavorable angles for searching for other objects.

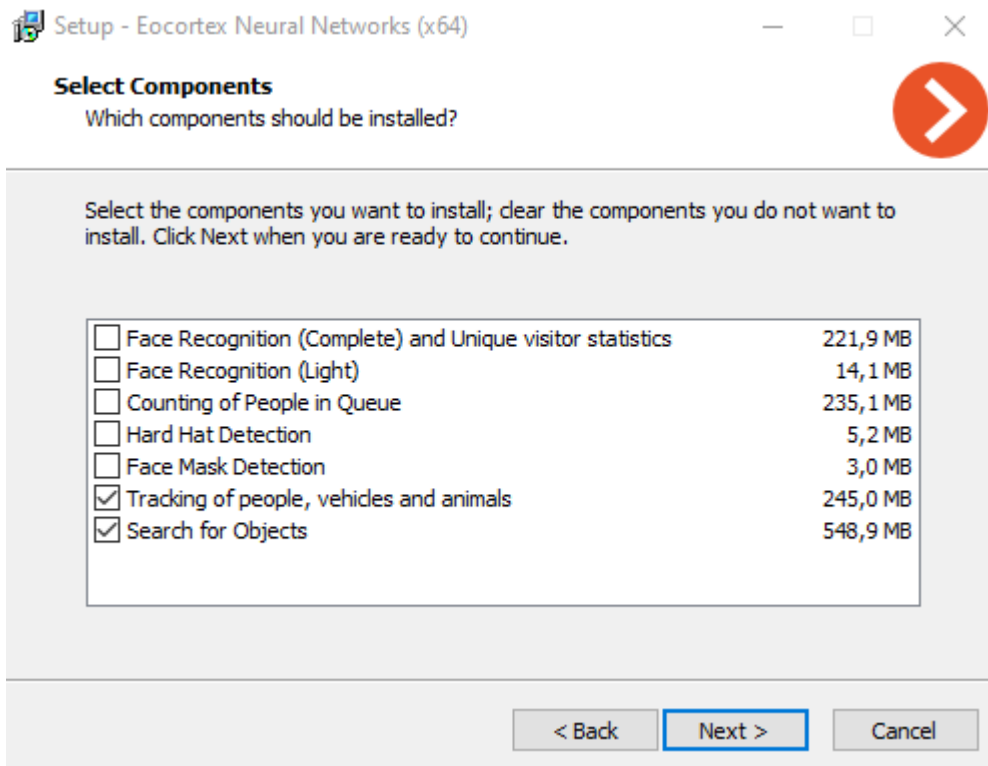

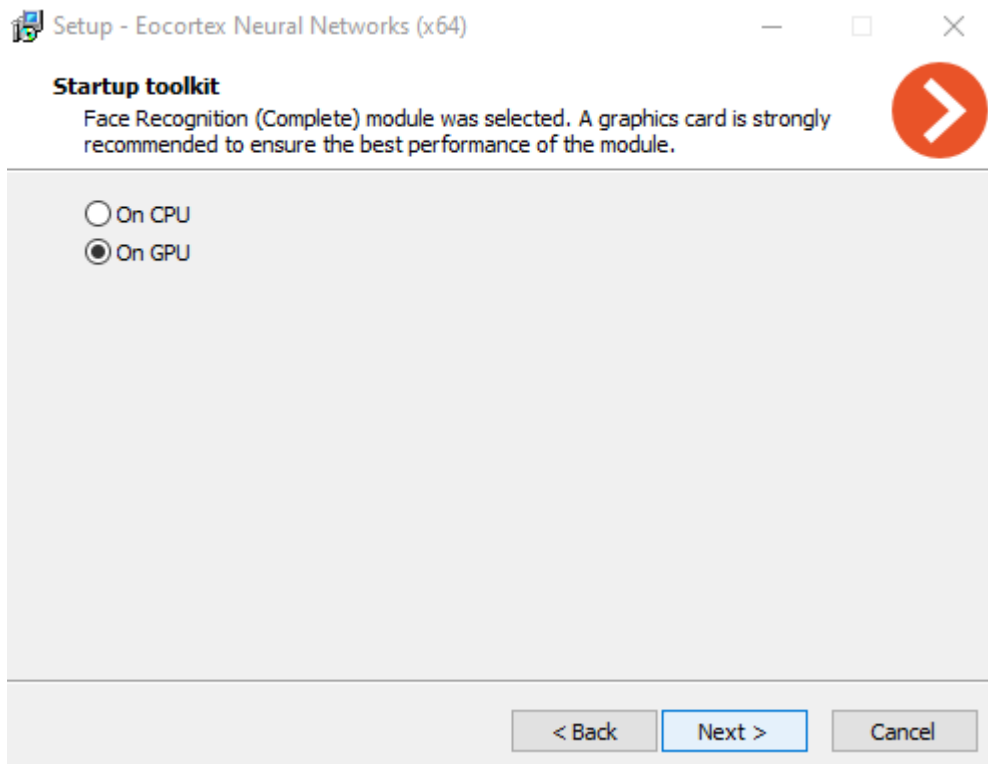
When updating **Eocortex** to a different version, it is also required to update the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package to the relevant version.

Starting with version 3.4 of **Eocortex**, the **Search for Objects** module uses version 11 or higher of PostgreSQL. In this respect, before installing version 3.4 and higher (as well as when upgrading from version 3.3 and lower to version 3.4 and higher), it is required to review the [PostgreSQL installation information](#).

When installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package, it is required to select the appropriate component.



For neural network-based search, at the stage of picking tools for launching, it is necessary to select the **On GPU** option. For searching for moving objects only and for simplified search, the video card is not used.





Shelf Fullness Check



The **Shelf Fullness Check** module is designed for monitor the fullness of shelves in a store in order to fill them with merchandize in time.

Details

For the correct operation of the module, it is required to properly place and set up the camera, enable and adjust the software motion detector and the module itself.

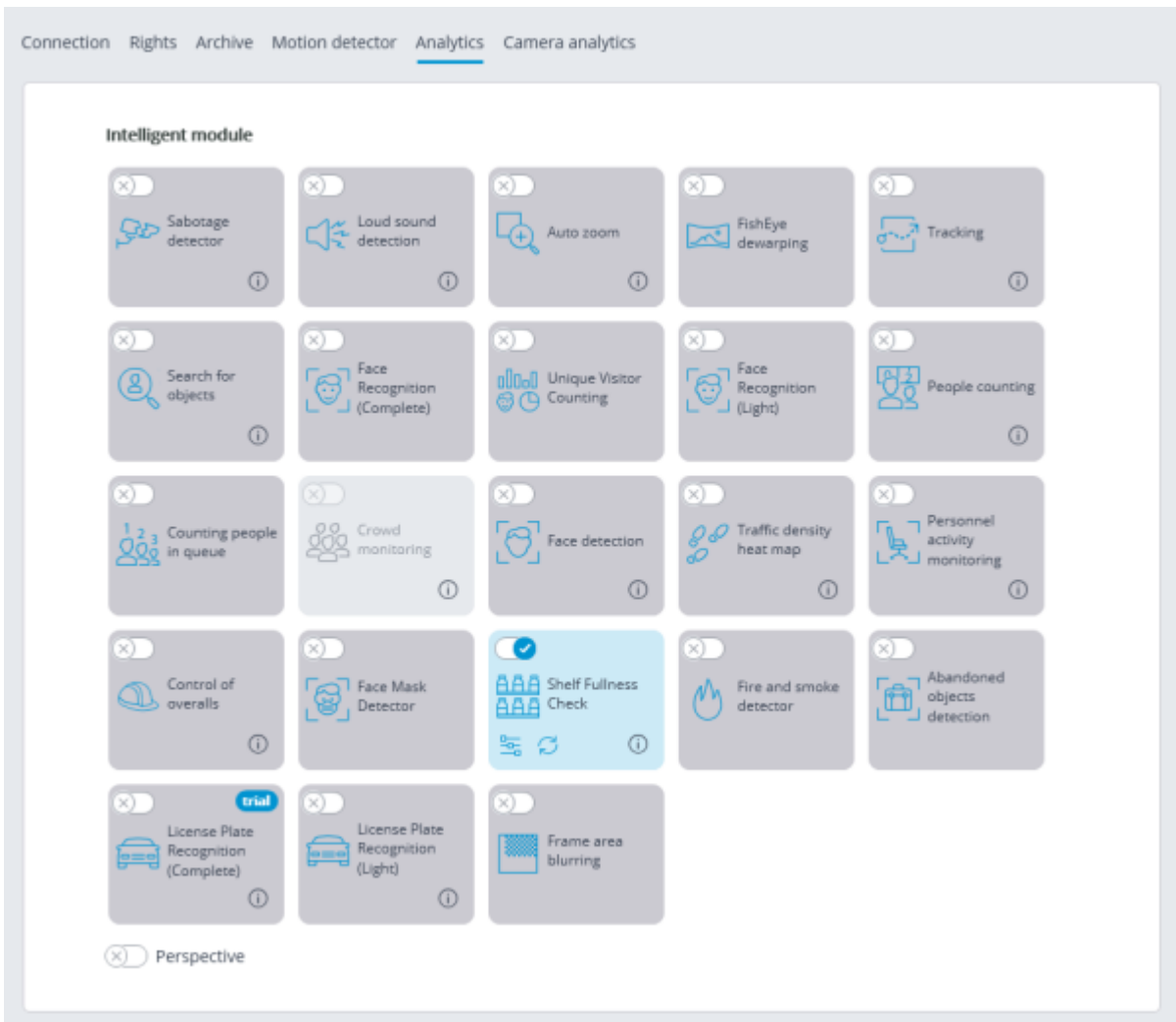

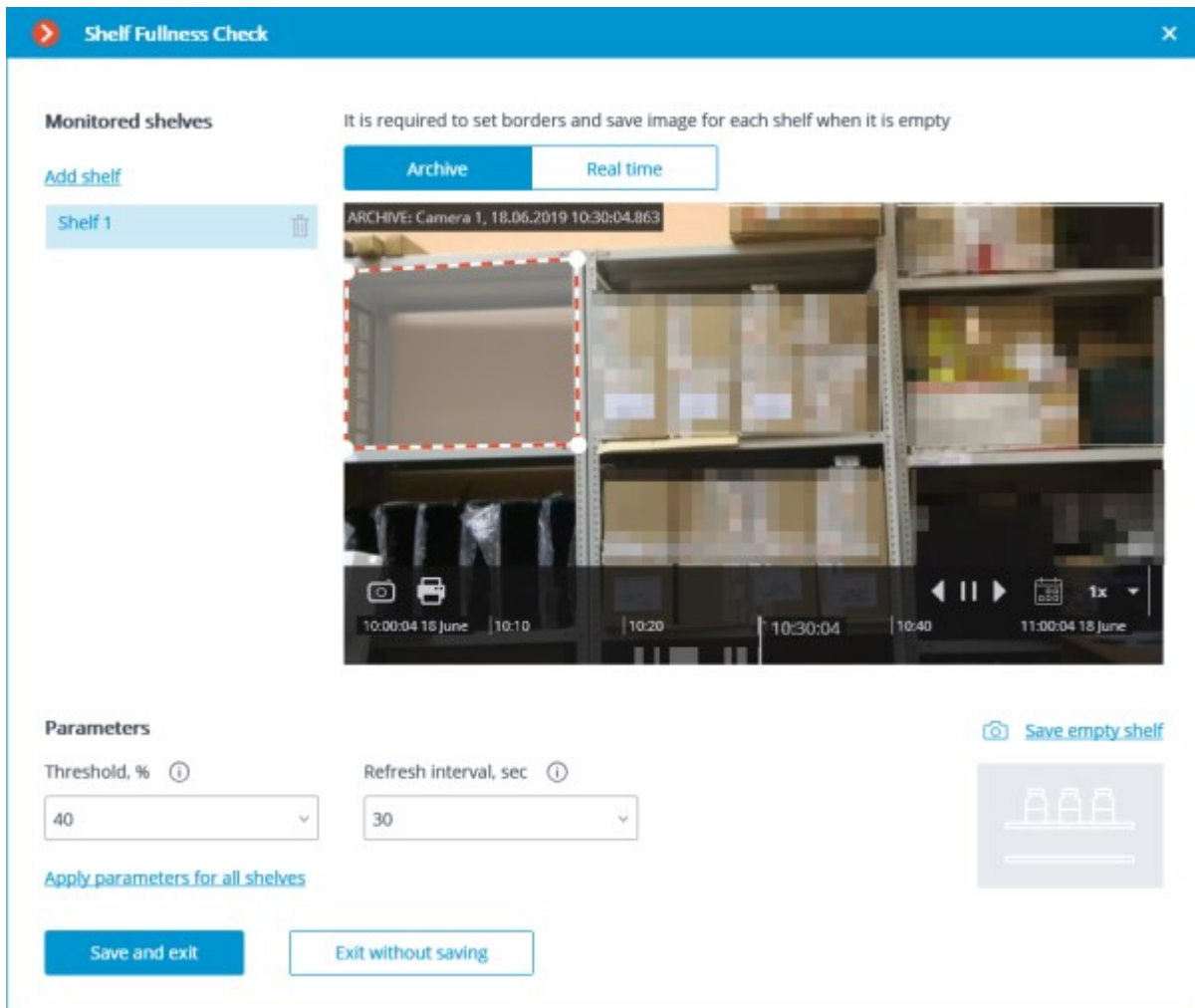

The following controls are located in the opened window:

The cell that transmits the video from the camera both in real time and from the archive. The shelf outlines are displayed in the cell. The list of the shelves being monitored is located to the left of the cell.

You can specify up to 10 shelves for one camera.

The outline of the shelf must be set in such a way as to fully enframe the zone to be monitored.



The parameters chosen for the selected shelf are shown in the lower part of the window:

- **Threshold, %:** Shelf fullness percentage below which an alarm will be generated.
- **Refresh interval, sec:** Shelf condition refresh interval. When this value is smaller, the empty shelf will be detected earlier, but the processor load is larger.

Apply parameters for all shelves: Applies the selected parameters for all shelves.

Save empty shelf: An image of empty shelf.

It is obligatory to save the image of an empty shelf for all the shelves being monitored.

The module will start working only when [the settings are applied](#).

Requirements and recommendations

Only up to 10 shelves can be set up for a single camera.

The update of the values is made only within the intervals when there has been no motion within the shelf's boundaries for three seconds.

Requirements for video stream

The recommended optimal resolution of the image for the module to work: HD or FullHD.

The image must be in color.

The frame rate of the stream must be no lower than 1 frame per second.

If different video streams from a camera are used for analysis and display in the Client Application, the aspect ratio of the streams must match.

Requirements for lighting, color reproduction and quality of the image

The image must be of moderate contrast. The details of the objects must be clearly distinguishable in the image.

The quality of the image must be moderate to high, without significant compression artefacts.

Sample image with compression artifacts:



Glare and flare should be avoided in the shelf area, as they can obscure small details of the image.

Lighting conditions and image parameters must remain constant. Flickering of lighting, as well as changes in color reproduction and differences in brightness and contrast over time, should be avoided.

It is recommended to disable automatic white balance and auto exposure in the camera settings.

Requirements for installation and scene of the camera

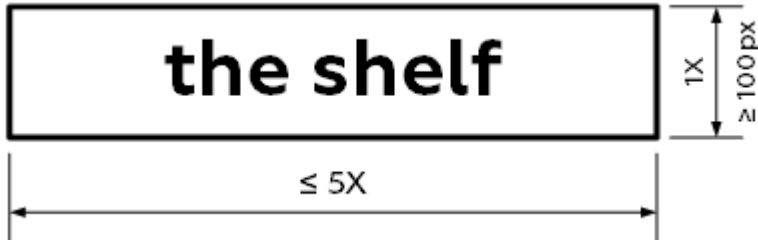
The camera angle should be set in such a way that individual goods or packages of goods are clearly visible on the filled shelf. In particular, the shelf must not be at an excessively sharp angle to the camera.

The image below shows examples of camera angles in relation to the shelf (highlighted in blue): both good (2, 3, 4) and bad (1).



The shelf area must not be too stretched. The maximum acceptable height to length ratio is 1/5.

The shelf image resolution in the smallest measurement must be at least 100 pixels.



The color and texture of the goods on the shelf must be visually different from those of the shelf itself. For example, it is not recommended to put goods in blue packaging on a blue shelf.

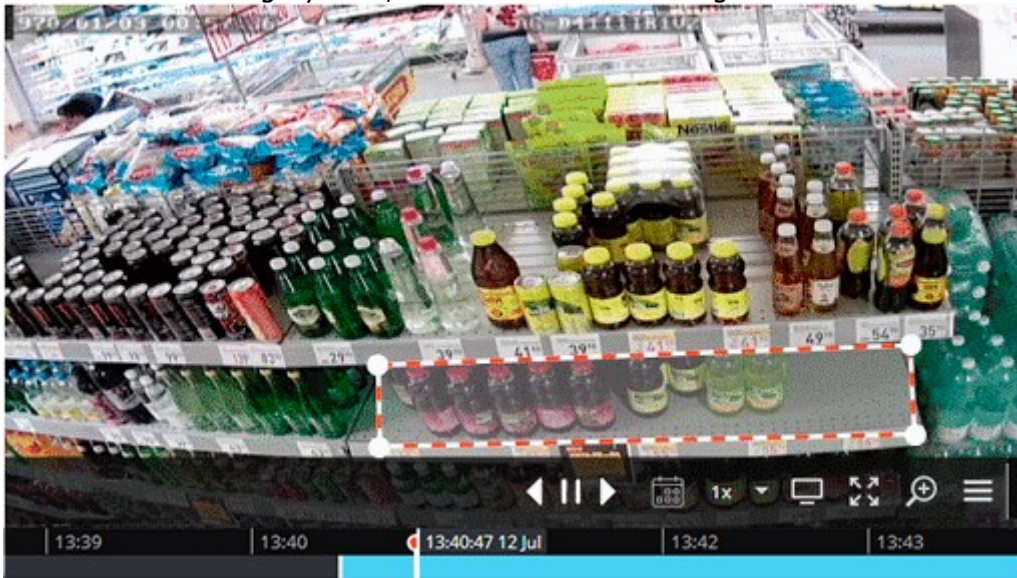
To ensure maximum accuracy, the perspective distortion must be kept to the minimum. In particular, the shelf area must not be affected by distortion from the FishEye lens.

The shelf on the camera image must remain strictly in the part of the frame where the model image of an empty shelf was set for it in the module settings. This means that the camera must be rigidly fixed, and even a slight shift in the camera's field of view is not allowed. The shelf must not physically change its position in space either.

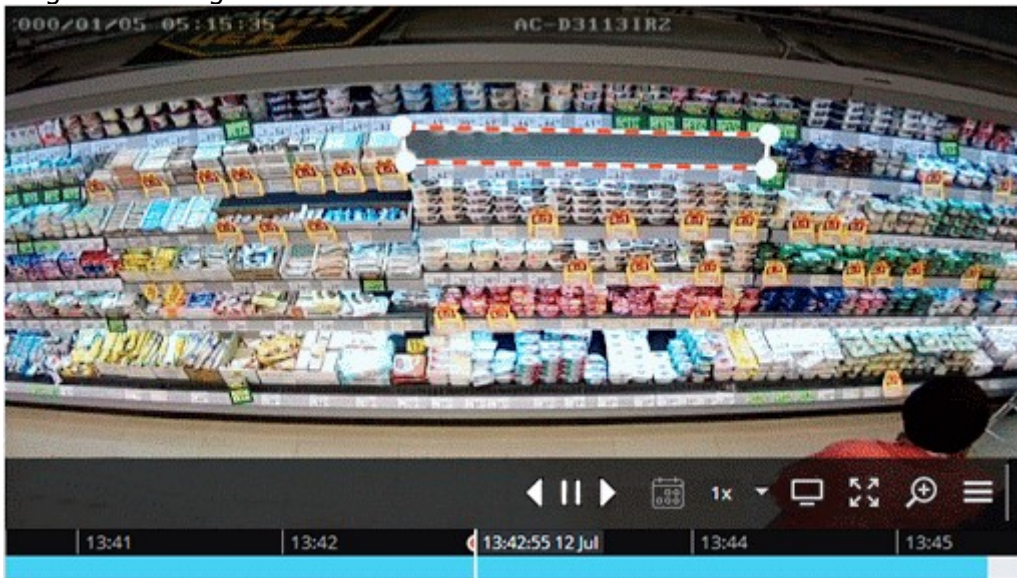
Shadows should be avoided in the shelf area.

Sample images with violated requirements

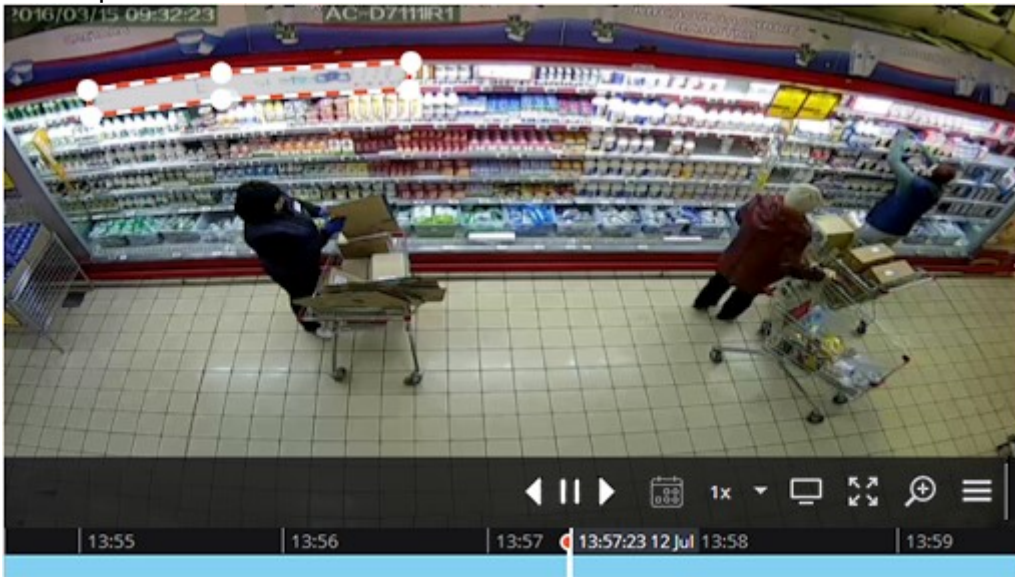
The camera is not rigidly fixed, the field of view is shifting:



Brightness changes in the shelf area:



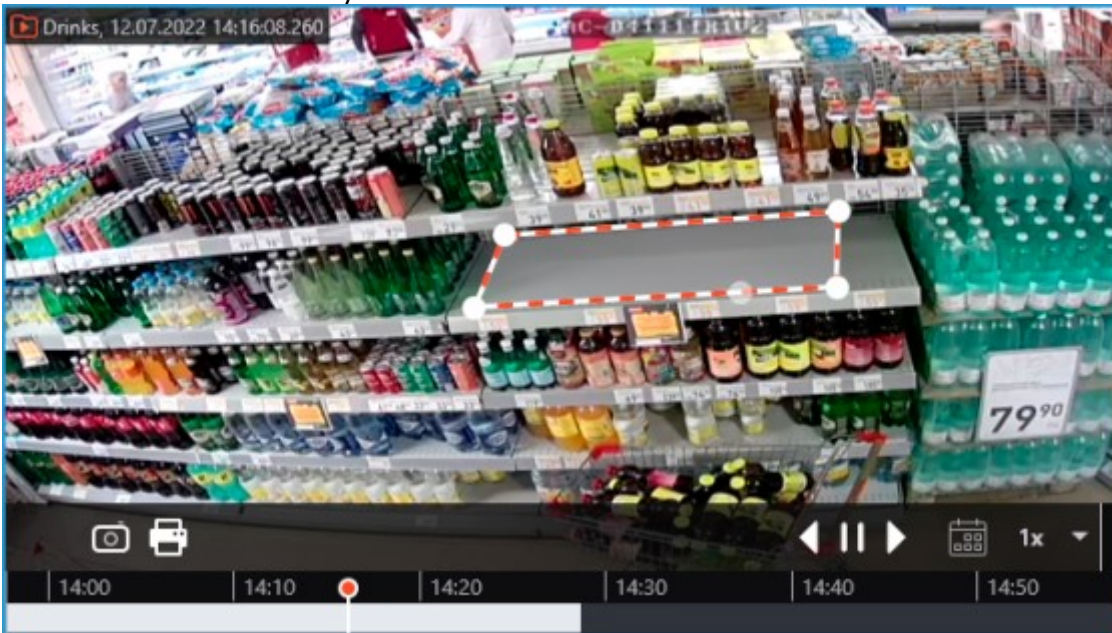
Overexposure of the shelf area:



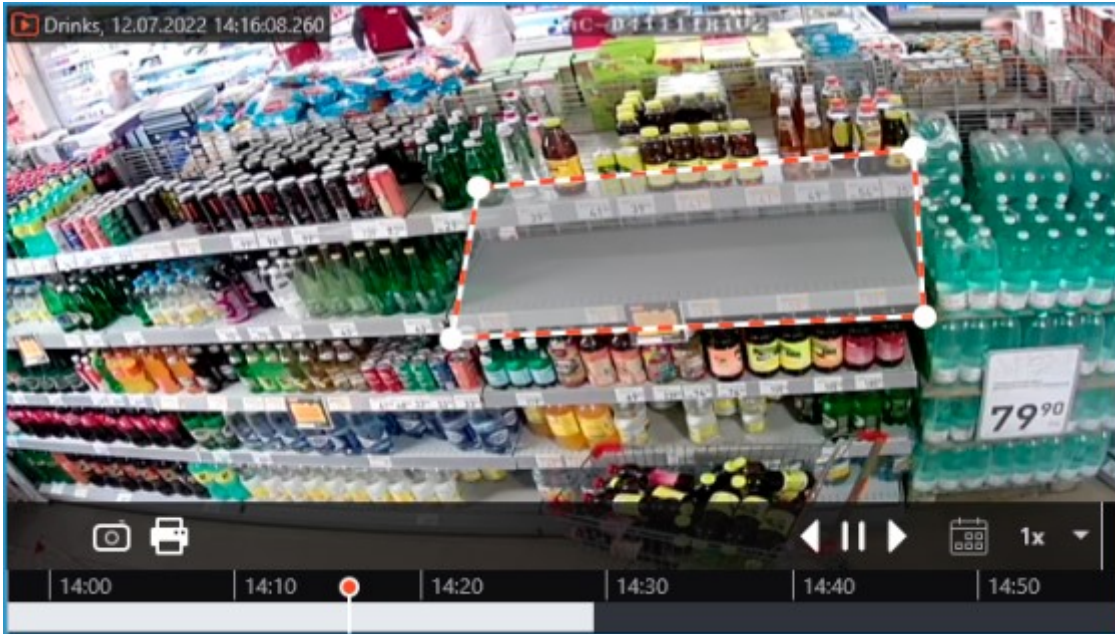
Examples for setting up the contours of the shelves

For the correct work of the module, it is necessary to set the contours of shelves in the module settings. It is important to set the boundaries of each contour so that they cover the area filled with goods as accurately as possible.

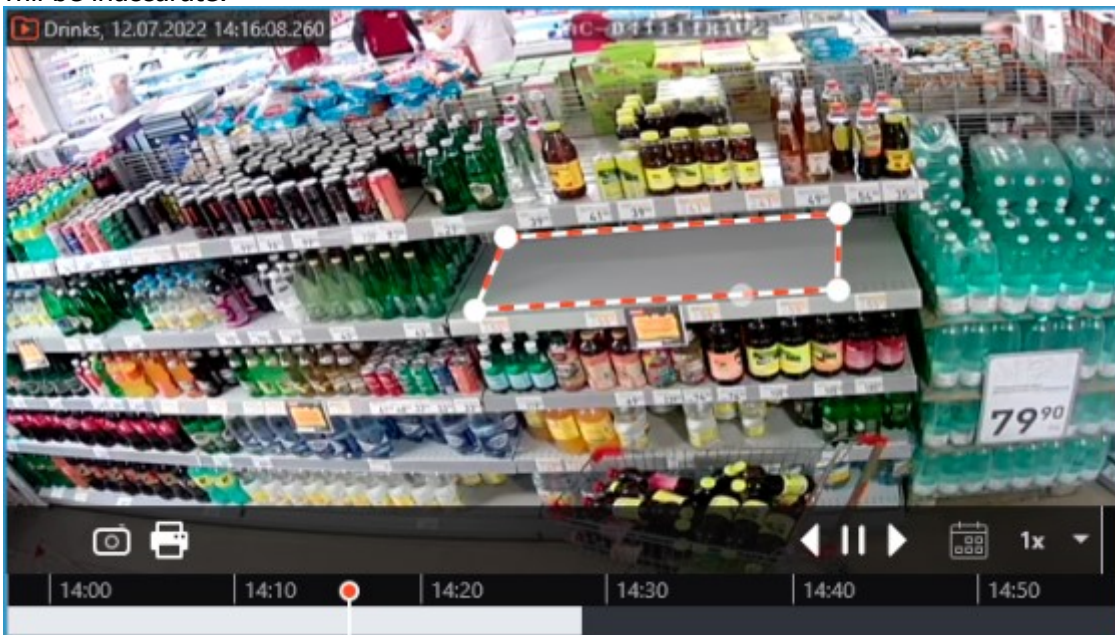
Boundaries are set correctly:



Incorrect setting of boundaries – the contour captures excessive areas, so the fullness values will be underestimated:



Incorrect setting of boundaries – the contour does not cover the entire shelf, so the fullness values will be inaccurate:



Performance

Since the central processor load becomes higher when the video resolution is increased, it is not recommended to use video with the resolution higher than FullHD.

Shelf images with a long side of more than 300 pixels will be additionally scaled during the processing. The longest time to process will take a square shelf with high original image resolution.

During shelf occupancy measurements, peak CPU load spikes may occur. To reduce the overall load on the server, it is recommended to increase the shelf status update intervals, which are set to 30 seconds by default, if possible.

Tracking

The **Tracking** module allows to build trajectories of the objects that move in the fields of view of the cameras, track the crossing of lines by these objects in one or both directions, monitor the presence of the objects in the zones of arbitrarily set shapes, and also filter alarm events by object type. At that, the monitored lines and zones as well as the objects' trajectories can be shown on the screen in real time, and the objects themselves can be highlighted by the rectangles of various colors. All the events of the module are recorded in the event log.

Capabilities of the module

Moreover, it is possible to set up the Tracking of objects of a certain range of dimensions.

Details

Starting with version 3.5 of **Eocortex**, the **Tracking**, **Search for Objects** and **Uniform Detector** modules running on the same camera share the processor and video card resources. This reduces the load on the server.

For the most efficient sharing of resources, it is recommended to set the same operating mode for the camera in the settings of these modules: either using a video card or without using a video card.

To track people, vehicles and animals, it is required [to install the Eocortex Neural Networks software package](#); a video card [with the parameters matching the module's requirements](#) is also necessary.

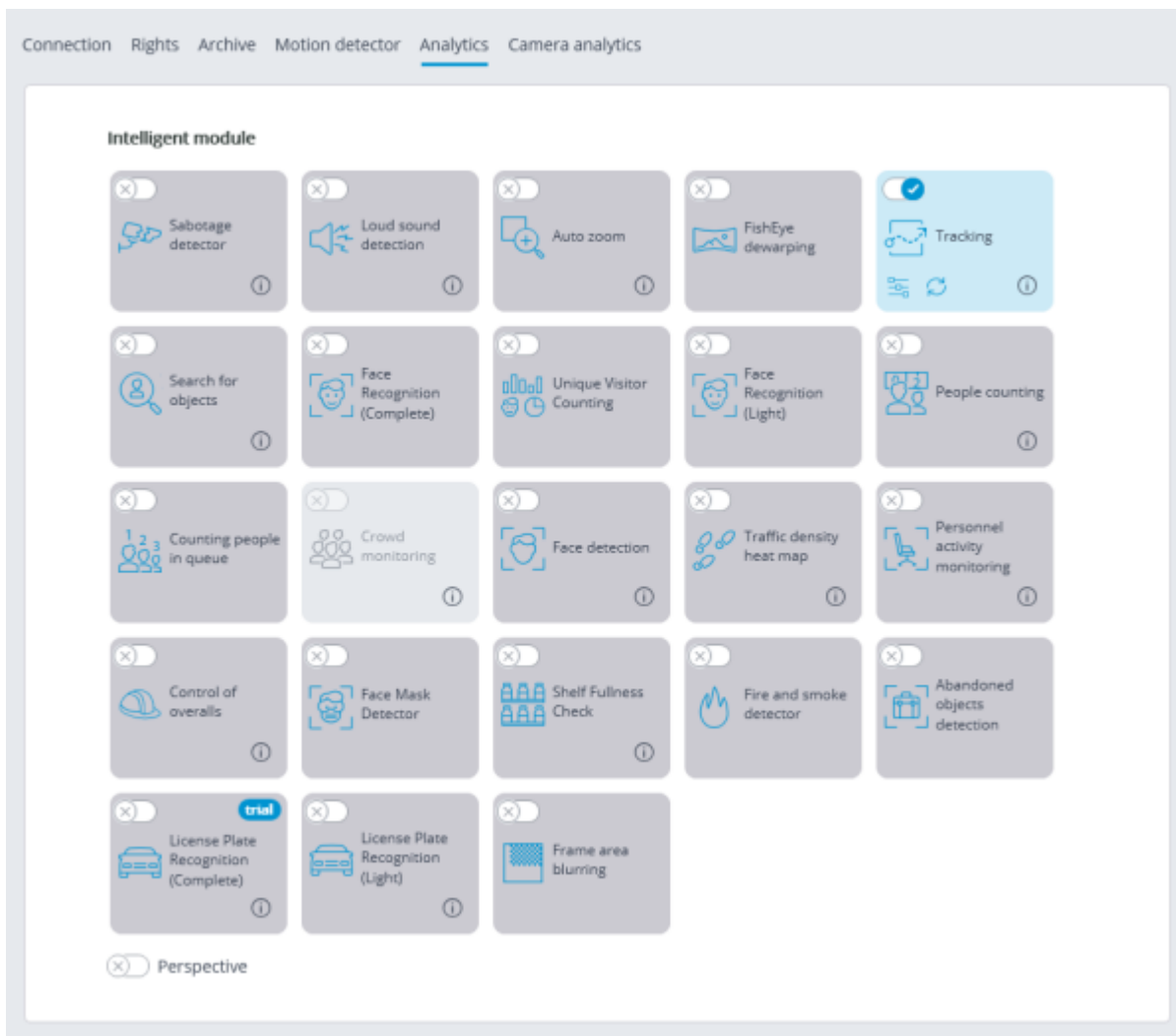

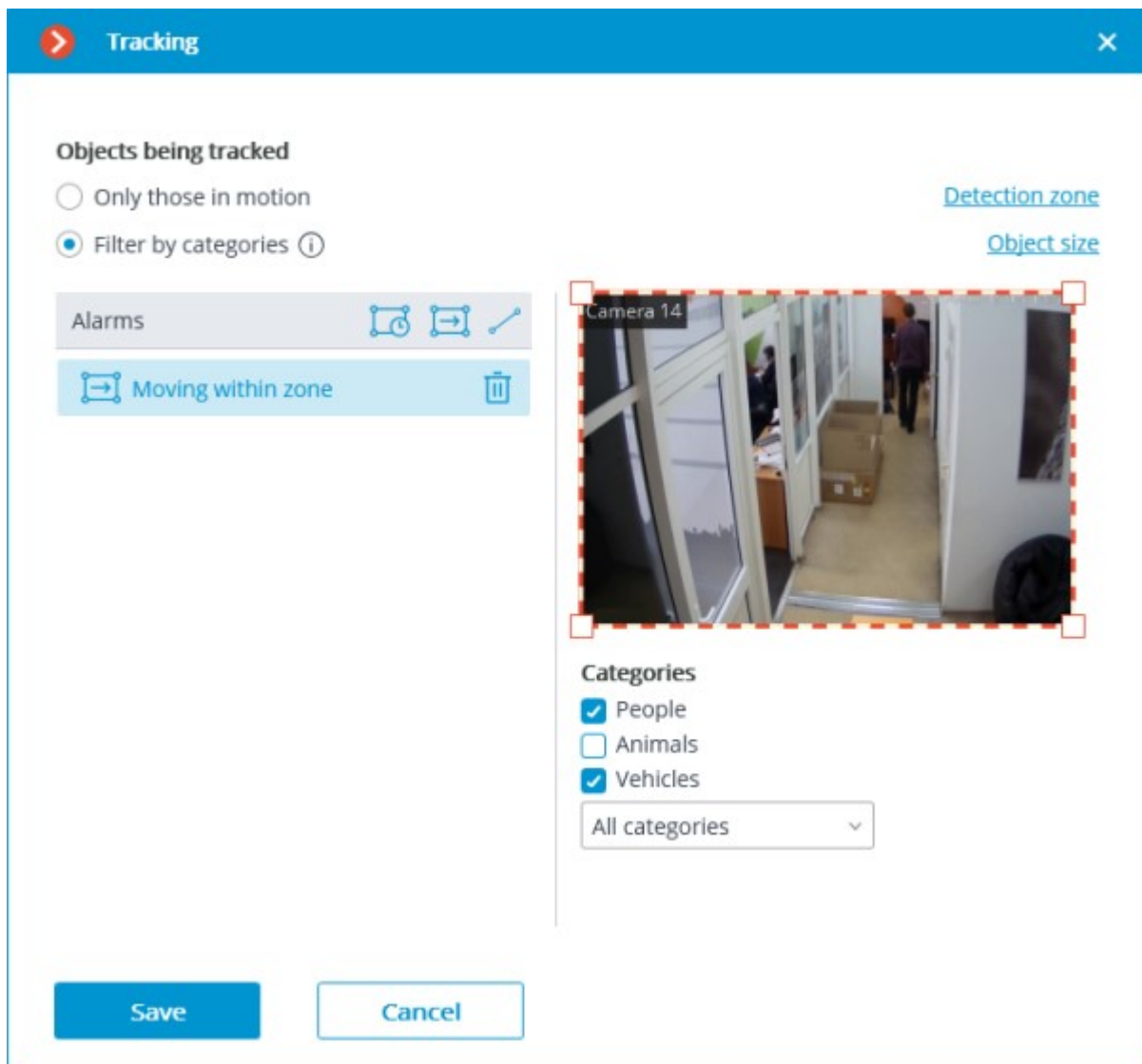

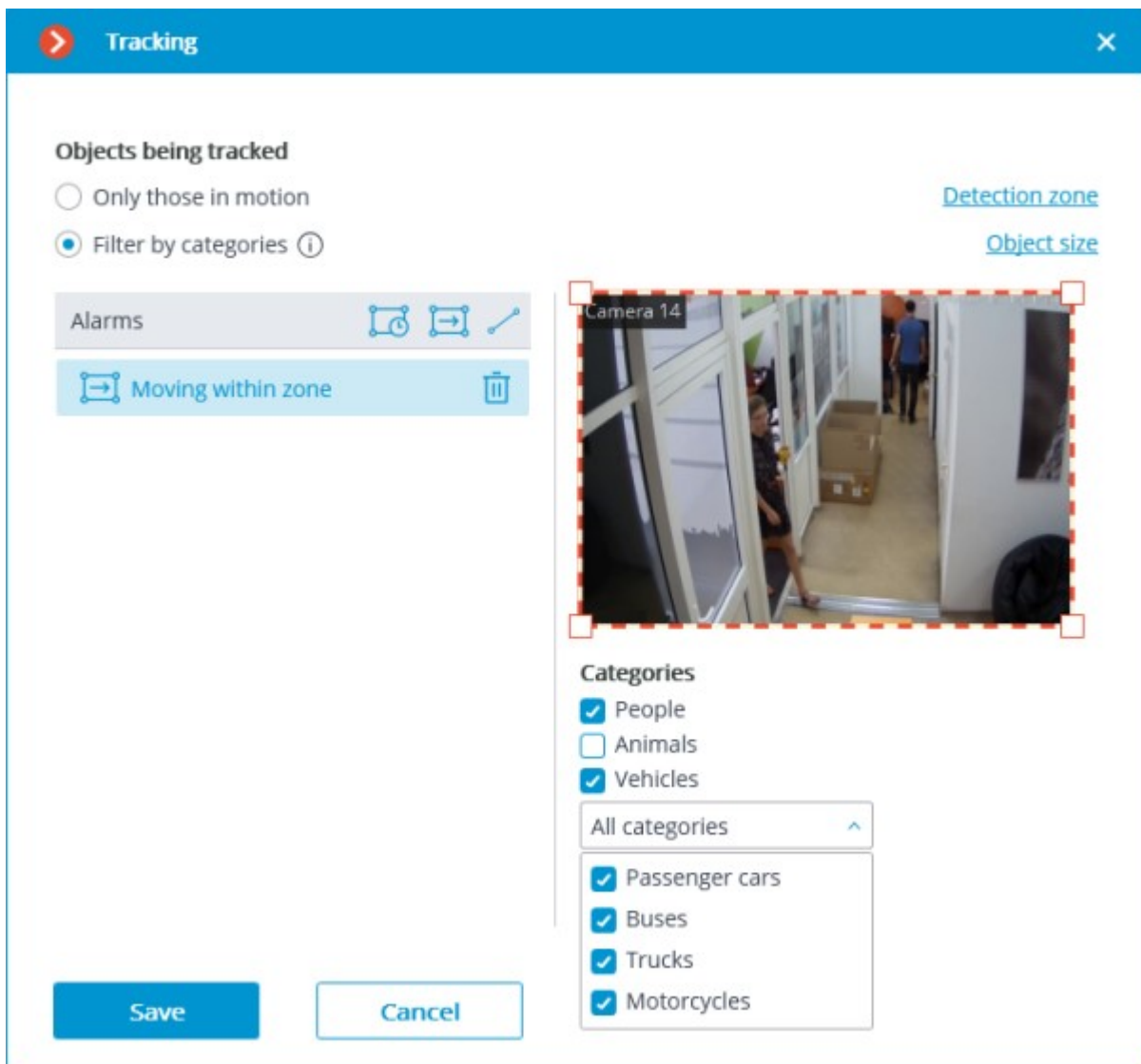
In the **Objects being tracked** group of settings, it is possible to select which objects will be tracked: either all moving objects or only objects of a specified category.

Selecting **Filter by categories** it is possible to optionally select which object categories will be tracked:




- People
- Animals
- Vehicles by type: Passenger cars, Buses, Trucks, Motorcycles.

By default, **People** and **Vehicles** of all modes of transportation are selected.

To track people, vehicles and animals, it is required [to install the Eocortex Neural Networks software package](#); a video card [with the parameters matching the module's requirements](#) is also necessary.



In the **Alarms** group of settings, it is possible to set the situations that will trigger alarms:

-  Long stay of an object in a preset area;
-  An object entering a preset area;
-  Crossing of a preset line.

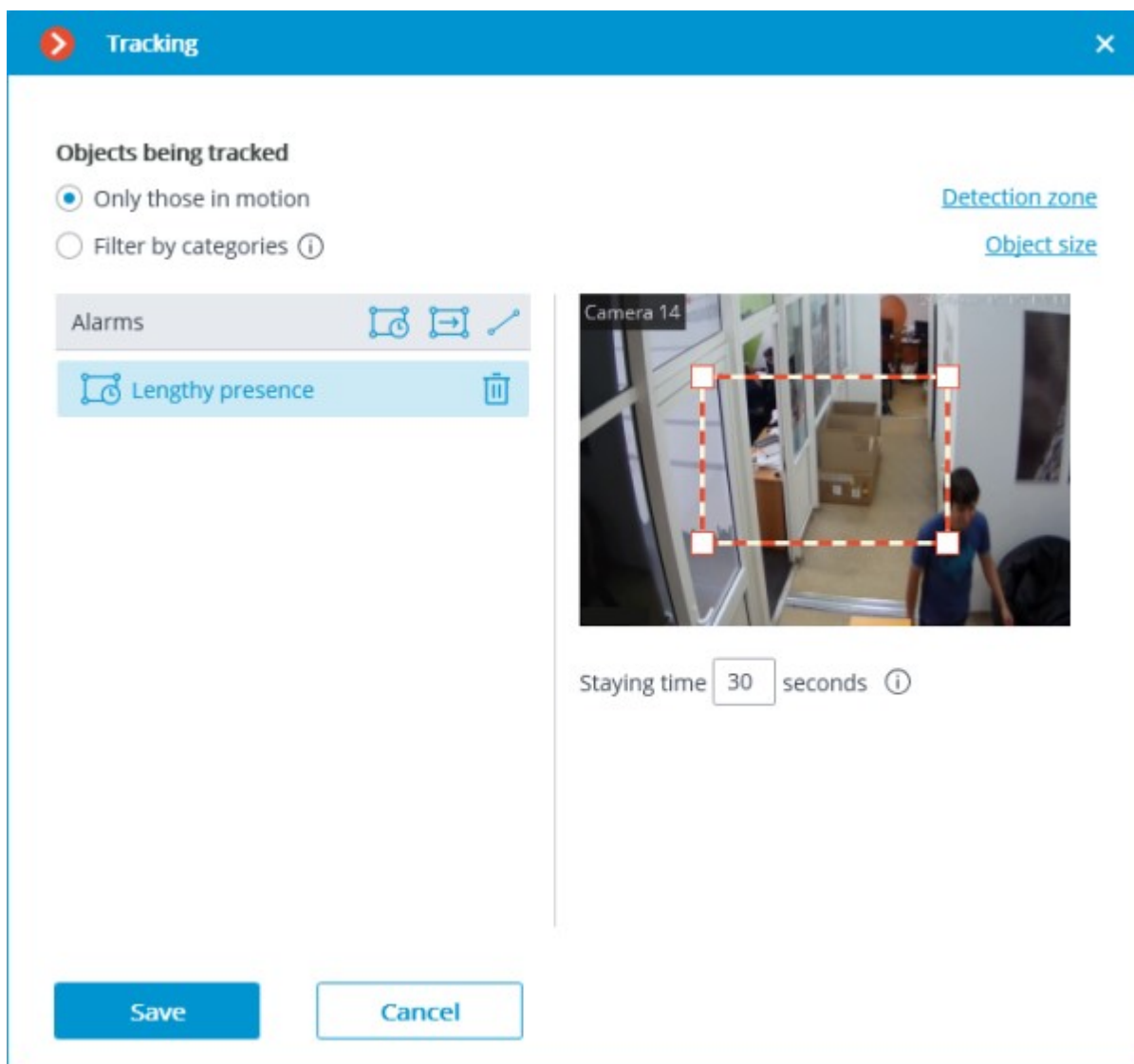
Long stay in the zone

To set the control zone, it is required to press the  button. A rectangular zone will appear in the preview window.


The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

For the **Long stay in the zone** alarm, the allowable duration of stay must be set. The default setting is 30 seconds. The maximum permissible value is 300 seconds.

Alarm will be generated only when the object has stayed in the zone for longer than the allowed time. The object may be out of the zone for a short time, but no more than 5 seconds.

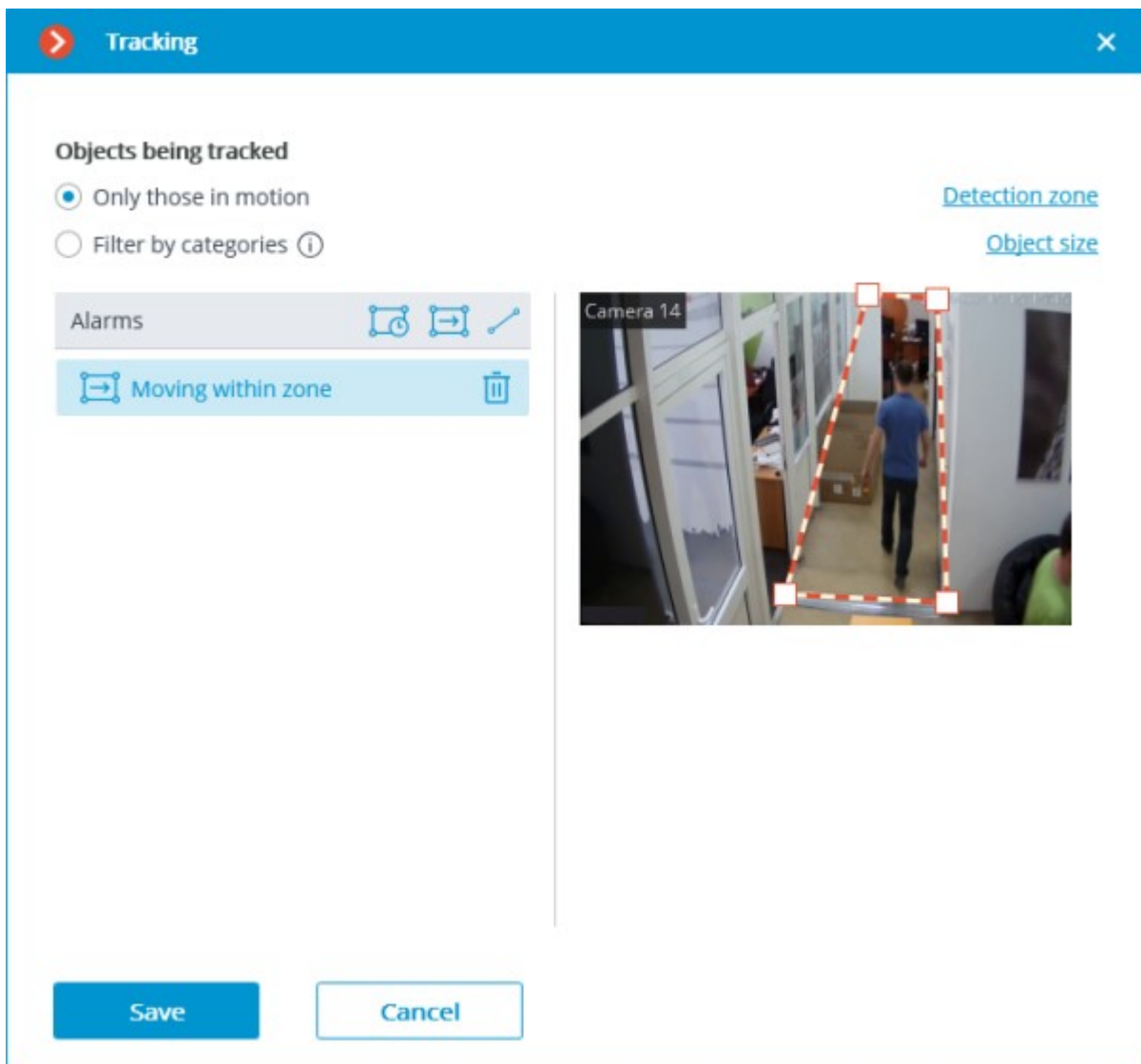


Movement in the area

To set the control zone, it is required to press the  button. A rectangular zone will appear in the preview window.

The zone configuration can be changed by dragging the key points at the corners of the polygon. To add a key point, it is required to double-click the left mouse button on the line; to delete - right-click on the key point.

The alarm will be generated when any object with the preset parameters enters the zone.




Crossing of the line

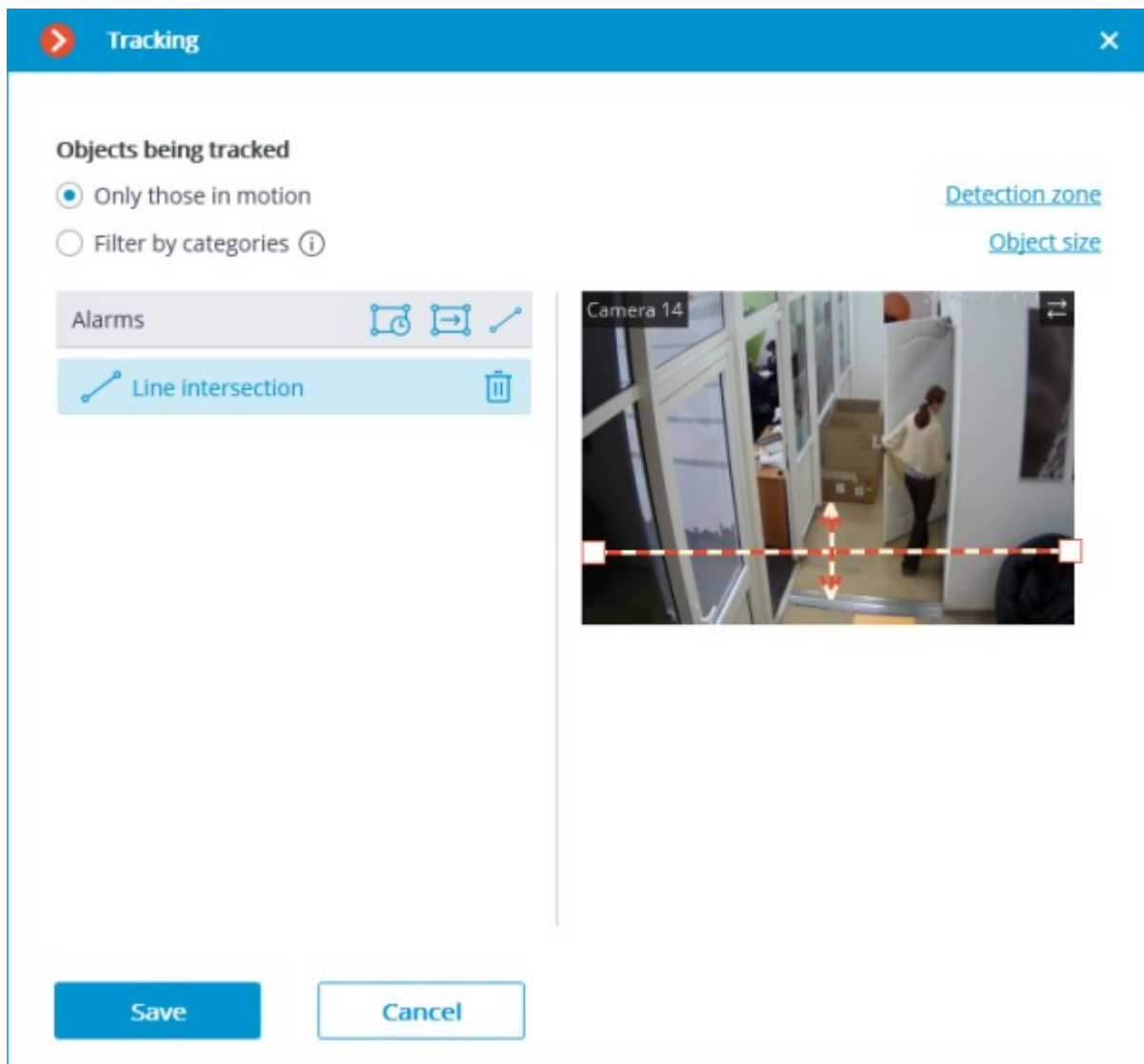
The position of the line can be changed by dragging the key points on its ends.

In order to indicate the direction of triggering, it is required to select the corresponding value in the **Moving direction** dropdown list. When only one direction is selected, an arrow showing the set direction will appear perpendicular to the line. In this case, an alarm will be generated only when the line is crossed in the preset direction.

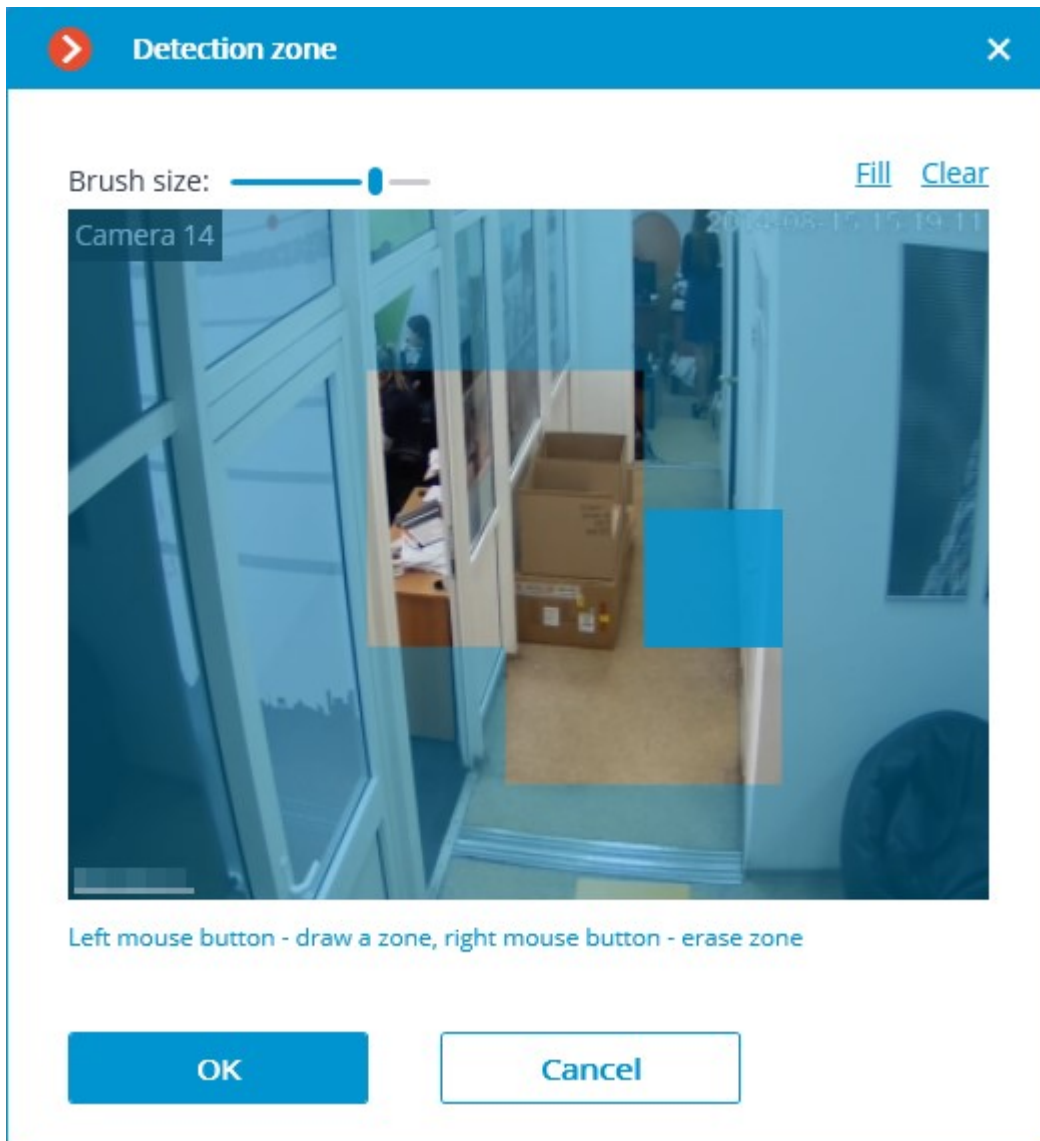
To set an intersection line, it is required to press the  button. A line will appear in the preview window.

The position of the line can be changed by dragging the key points on its ends.

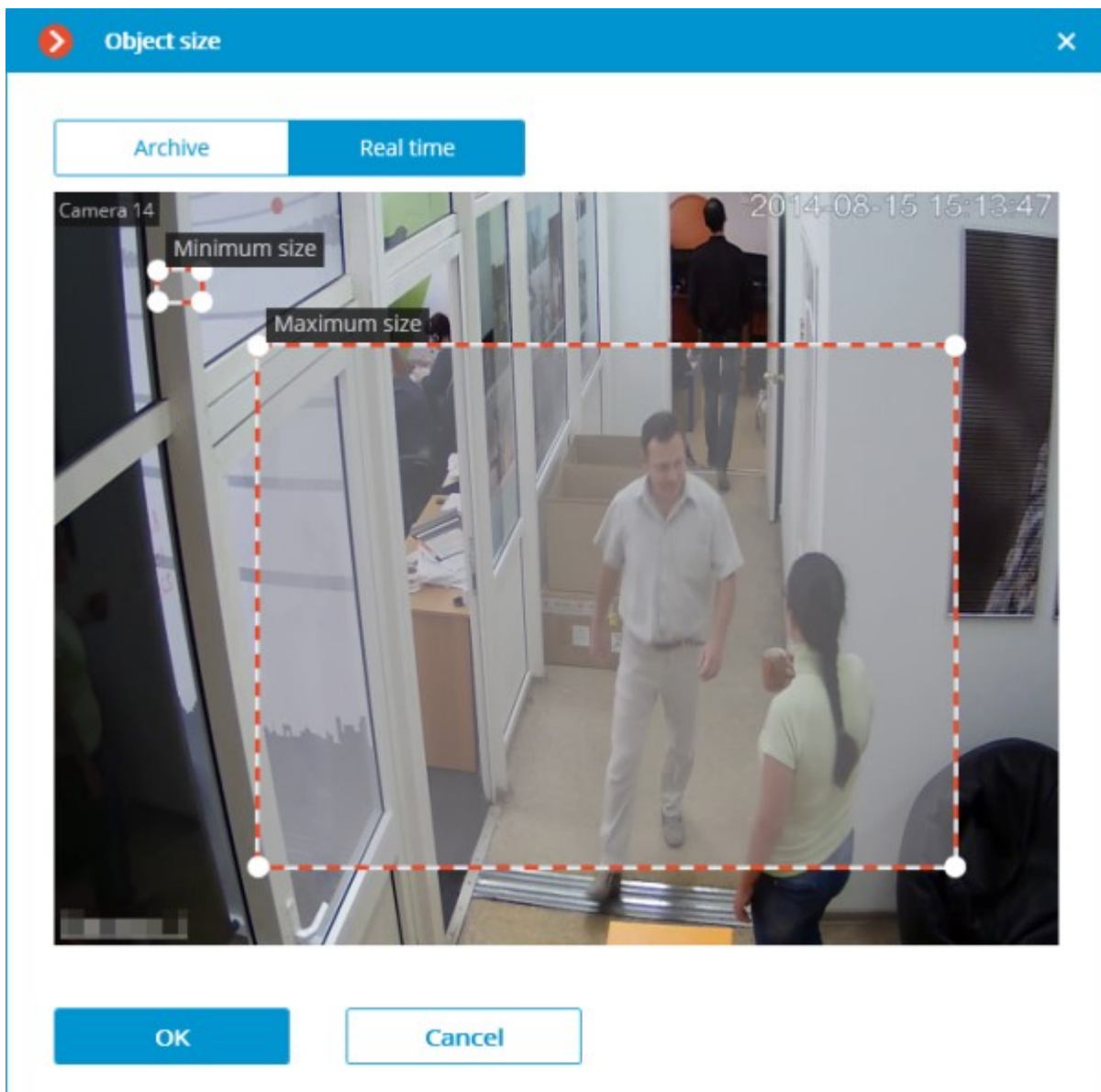
To indicate the direction of operation, click the button  located in the upper right corner of the preview window. If only one direction is selected, an arrow will be displayed to indicate the direction you set. In this case, the alarm will be generated only when the objects cross the line in the given direction.



Detection zone is the zone of the frame filled with the semitransparent blue fill in the settings window. The mouse is used for modifying the zone: left mouse button serves for filling the zone, and the right one is used for clearing it. With the help of the **Fill** and **Clear** buttons you can fill or clear the whole area of the frame. The corresponding slider is used to modify the **Brush size**.



The minimum and maximum sizes of the objects to be detected are set on the **Object size** tab.

Requirements and recommendations

Hardware and software

Video stream

Frame frequency: no lower than 10 frames per second;

Image resolution: no lower than HD (1280x720).

Image

Lighting in the frame should be uniform and constant.

If the camera is installed in front of a bright light source (the sun behind the entrance door, etc.), it is necessary to adjust the exposure (or brightness) so that the objects in the frame have a natural color (not overexposed or too dark). In this case, an overexposed background is acceptable.

The image must be in color.

Image quality should be at least average. There should be no significant compression artifacts.

Scene and camera position

The object should be seen from a suitable angle so that it is positively distinguishable from the background and clearly visible to the human eye.

The frame must not contain reflective surfaces: glass, mirrors, etc.

It is permitted to place the camera overhead. In this case, the angle of inclination of the camera in relation to the horizontal must not exceed 45°.

Recognition of vehicles

Minimum requirements to ensure the identification of vehicles are as follows:

The resolution must be at least HD (1280x720).

Detection of vehicles must be performed during daylight hours in good weather.

Exposure and contrast on the camera must be set so that the color of the object can be unambiguously detected by the human eye.

The body of a vehicle must not be light-struck by headlights or other light sources. There must not be any bright glare on the body.

The angle of view must provide correct identification of the type of vehicle (e.g., it is sometimes difficult to distinguish a bus from a truck when viewed from behind).

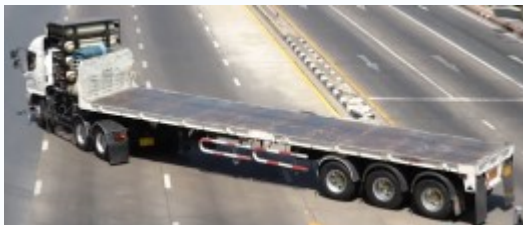
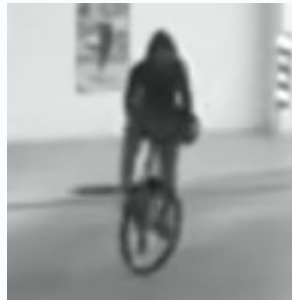

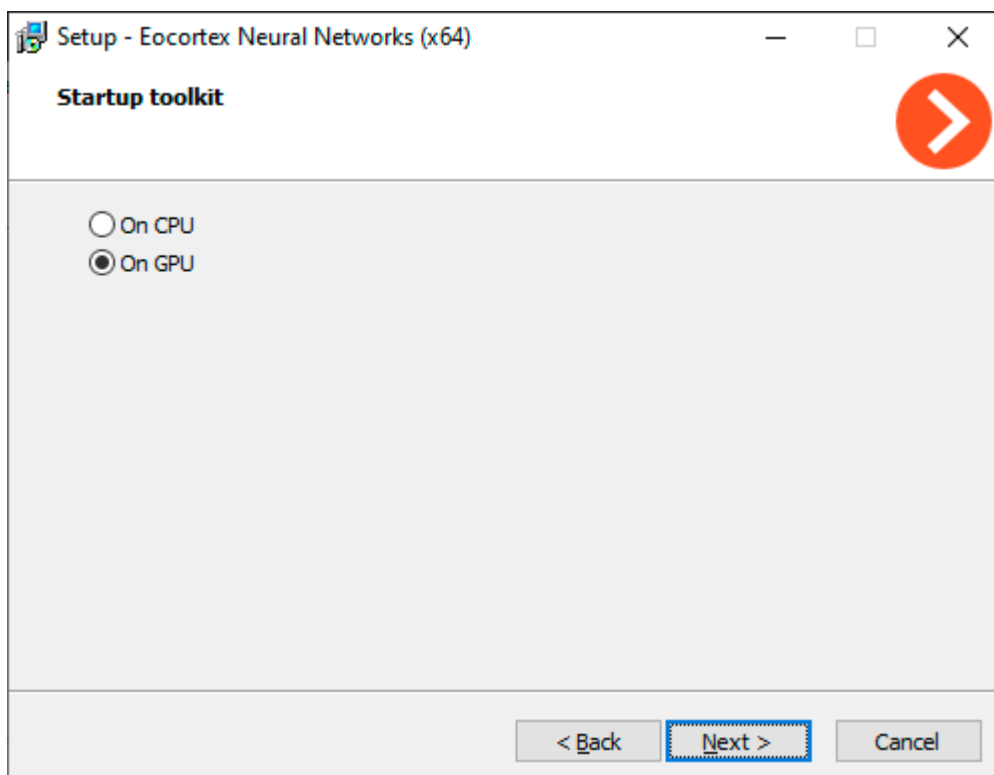
Deployment of the module

To track people, vehicles and animals, it is required [to install the Eocortex Neural Networks software package](#); a video card [with the parameters matching the module's requirements](#) is also necessary.

In the process of installation of **Eocortex Neural Networks**, it is required to select the **Tracking of people, vehicles and animals** component.



The module's operation requires a video card (GPU).



Uniform Detector

The **Uniform Detector** is designed to detect people both in workwear and without it. In live view, such people will be highlighted on the screen with a colored frame, and the incidents will be recorded in the event log.

The alarm event is the event of the absence of workwear, a common one is the presence of workwear. Depending on the event, the detection frame and the corresponding text will be highlighted in red or green.

The main use case for this module is to monitor compliance with occupational safety rules at manufacturing and construction sites.

Capabilities of the module

Depending on the corresponding settings, the module can determine **Presence**, **Absence** or both values of the following parameters:

Hard hat;

Safety vest;

Uniform.

If the **Uniform** parameter is selected, it is necessary to set a **color** for it.

Details



For the proper functioning of the module it is required to place the camera correctly and to set up the software motion detector and the module itself.

It is required to [install the Eocortex Neural Networks package](#) before using the module.


An alarm will be generated when a person enters the zone without uniform, or in the uniform that does not meet the specified parameters.



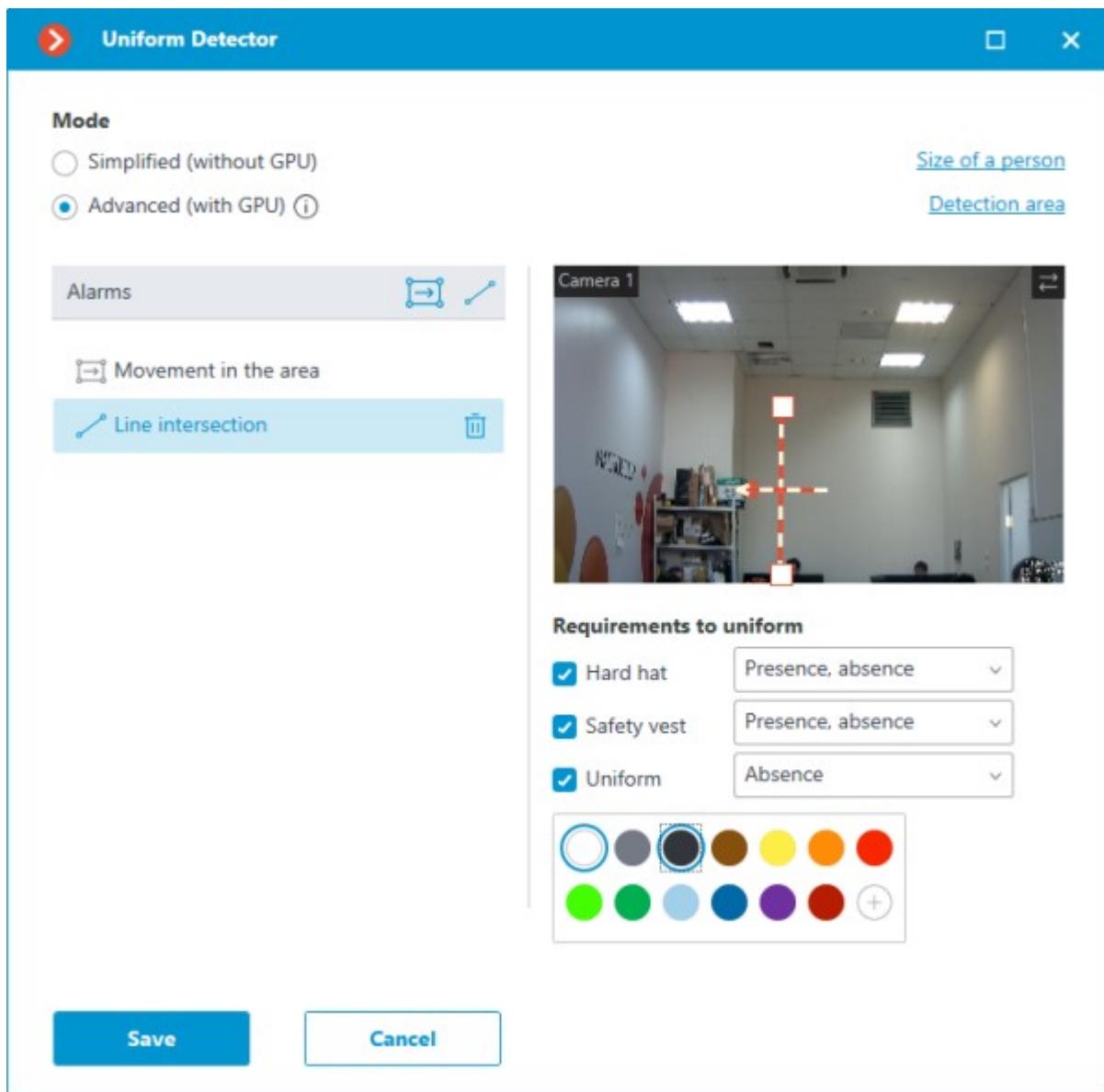
Crossing of the line

To set the line, press the button . The line will appear in the preview window.

The position of the line can be modified by dragging the key points at its ends.

To indicate the direction of triggering, it is required to click the button  located in the upper right corner of the preview window. If only one direction is selected, an arrow will appear indicating the direction set.


An alarm will be generated when a person without a uniform crosses the line, or when their uniform does not meet the specified parameters. If the direction has been specified, the alarm will be generated only when a person crosses the line in the specified direction.



It is possible to set specific requirements to workwear below the preview window. The following options can be set to **Presence**, **Absence** or both:

- Hard hat;
- Safety vest;
- Uniform.

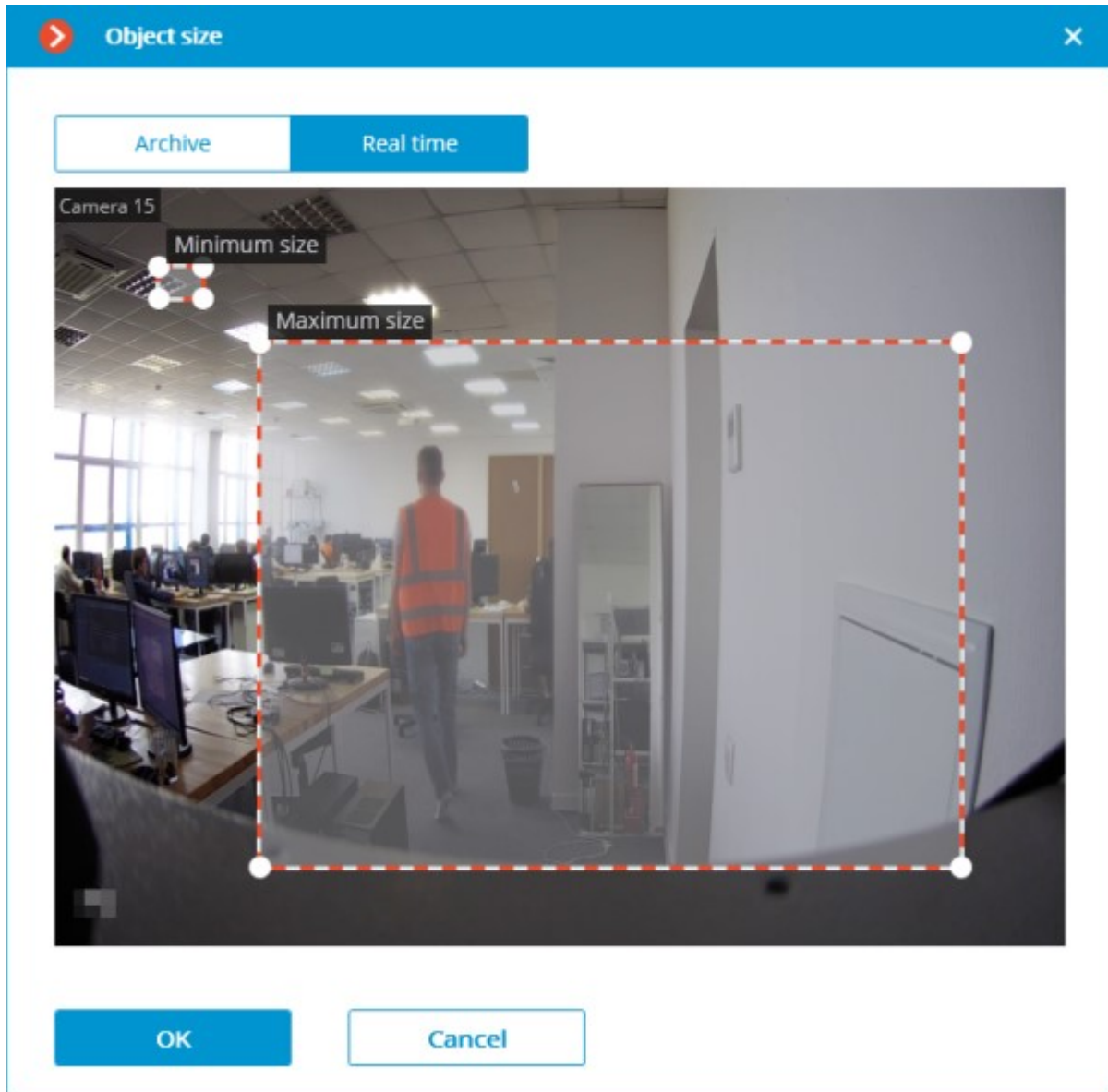
When selecting **Uniform**, it is possible to choose from 1 to 3 colors that will be considered as workwear colors.

If the desired color is not in the palette, it is possible to add it by opening the color selection window using the button .

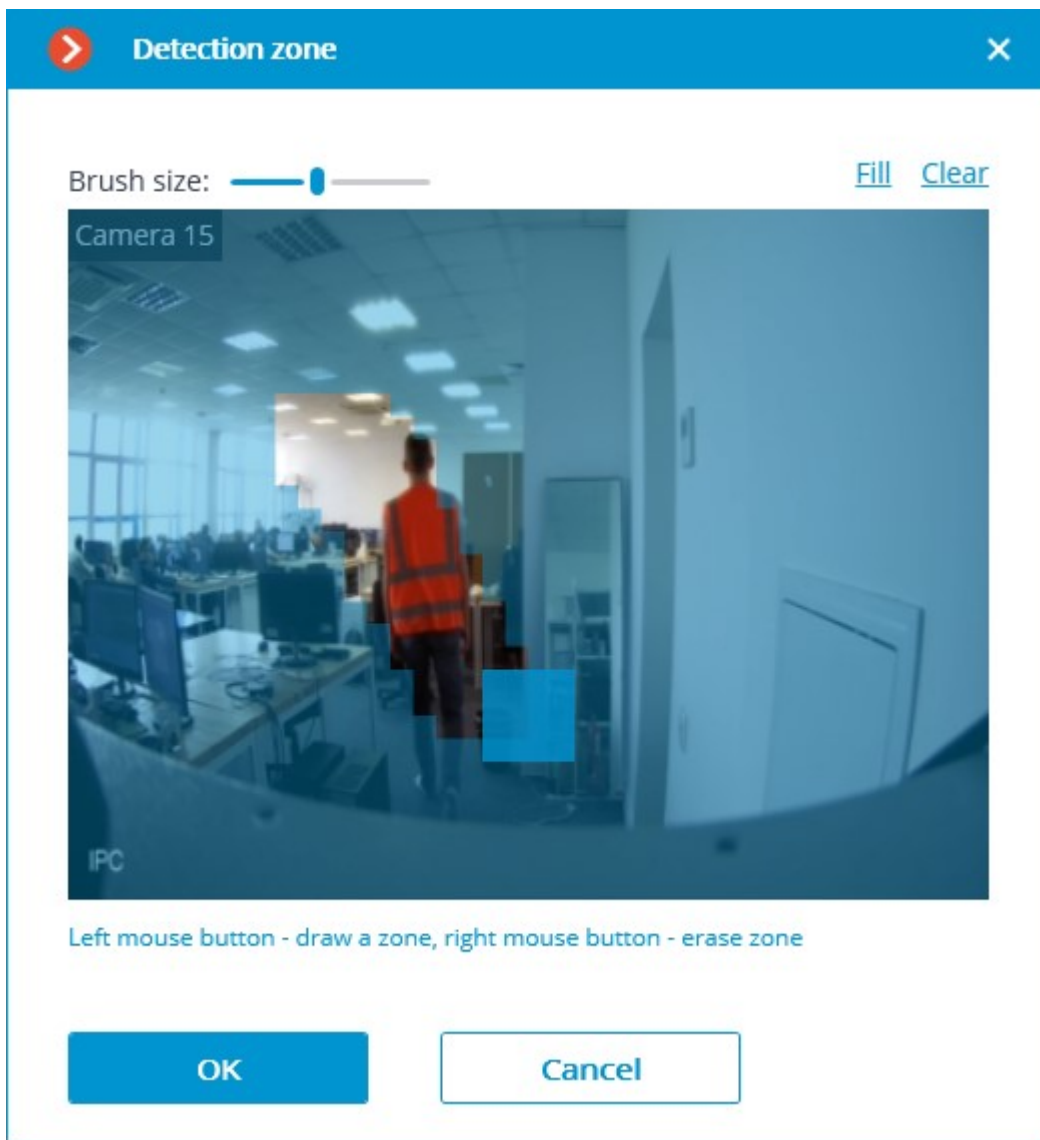
For a more accurate color definition, a slightly darkened shade of colors as compared with those recognized by the human eye when seeing clothes in real life should be set. In this case, possible shadows on the clothes will be compensated.

Also, when adjusting the color, it is required to take into account that when comparing colors, the module tries to compensate for possible changes in the brightness of the illumination. This affects the search for shades of gray to the greatest extent. For example, when 50% gray is selected in the settings, both white and dark gray clothes may appear as matching under certain lighting conditions.

On the **Size of a person** tab, it is possible to set the minimum and maximum sizes of people to be detected.

- If the camera is installed in front of a bright light source (the sun behind the entrance door, etc.), it is necessary to adjust the exposure (or brightness) so that the objects in the frame have a natural color (not overexposed or too dark). In this case, an overexposed background is acceptable.
- The image must be in color.

- White balance must be adjusted correctly.
- People to be detected must be visible in the frame while standing, full-length, not overlapped by other objects.
- The exposure and contrast must be adjusted on the camera in such a way that the color of the uniform could be unambiguously recognized by the human eye.
- People must not be overexposed.

Scene and camera position

- In the **Simplified (without GPU)** mode, the people to be detected must be visible full-length, not overlapped by other objects.
- In **Advanced (with GPU)**, people may be overlapped by half; however, it may reduce the accuracy of the module.
- Strong lateral illumination (e.g., sunlight from a window) is unacceptable as it will overexpose parts of clothing.
- A scene that is too dark is unacceptable, since in this case the color of the clothes will always be close to black.
- The frame must not contain reflective surfaces: glass, mirrors, etc.

- It is permitted to place the camera overhead. In this case, the angle of inclination of the camera in relation to the horizontal must not exceed 35°.

Detecting

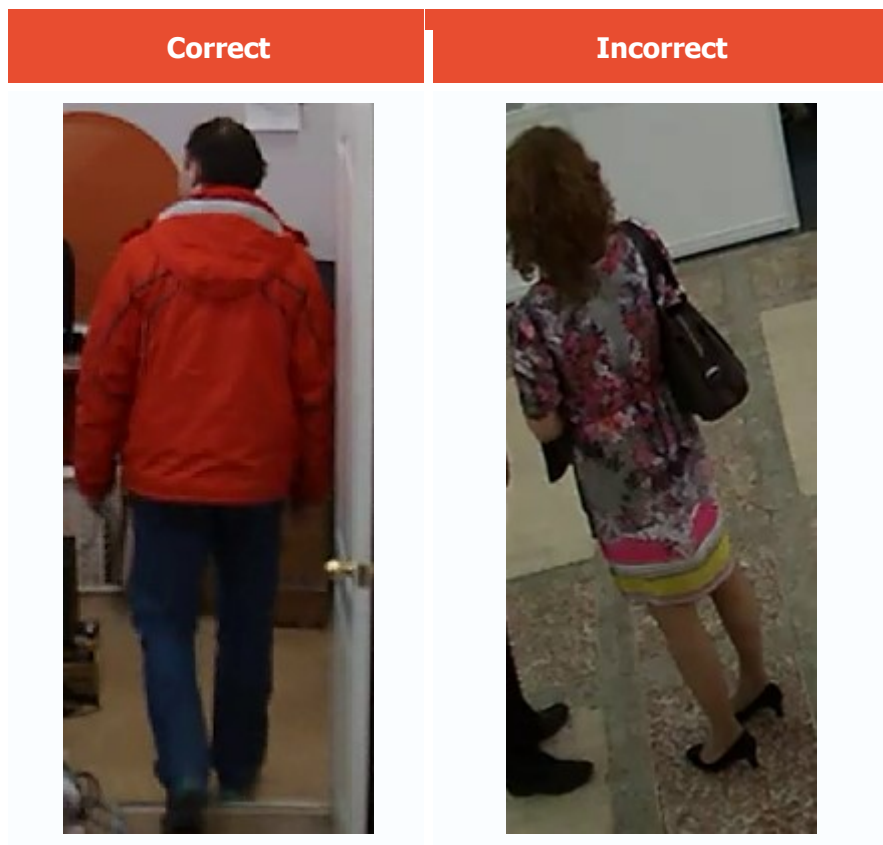
It is advisable to use one-color uniform.

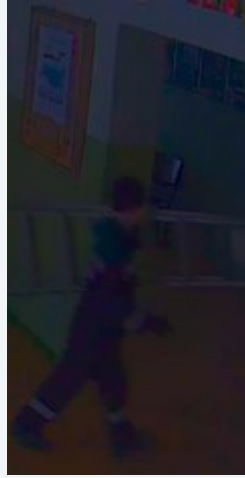
Uniform (workwear) color detection ensures around 90% accuracy on bright, distinctive colors. The accuracy drops when attempting to detect dark and gray colors. For example, dark blue uniform may appear dark green as well. Clothes in gray shades can also be confused with other shades. Issues can be caused by various non-single-colored clothes, whose color is not always distinguishable, and, as a result, tends to appear darker. The accuracy of defining colors under these conditions, when the color of clothes is not bright, is about 75%.

When detecting hard hats, it is required that the person's head is always above their shoulders in a normal position, with minimal inclinations.

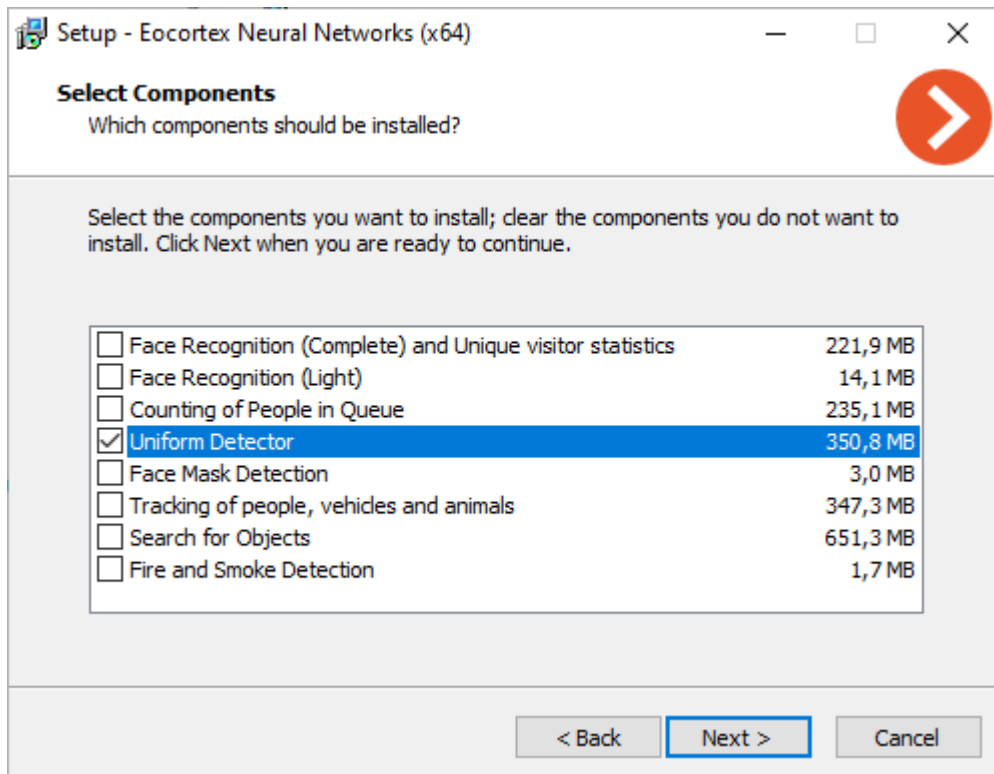

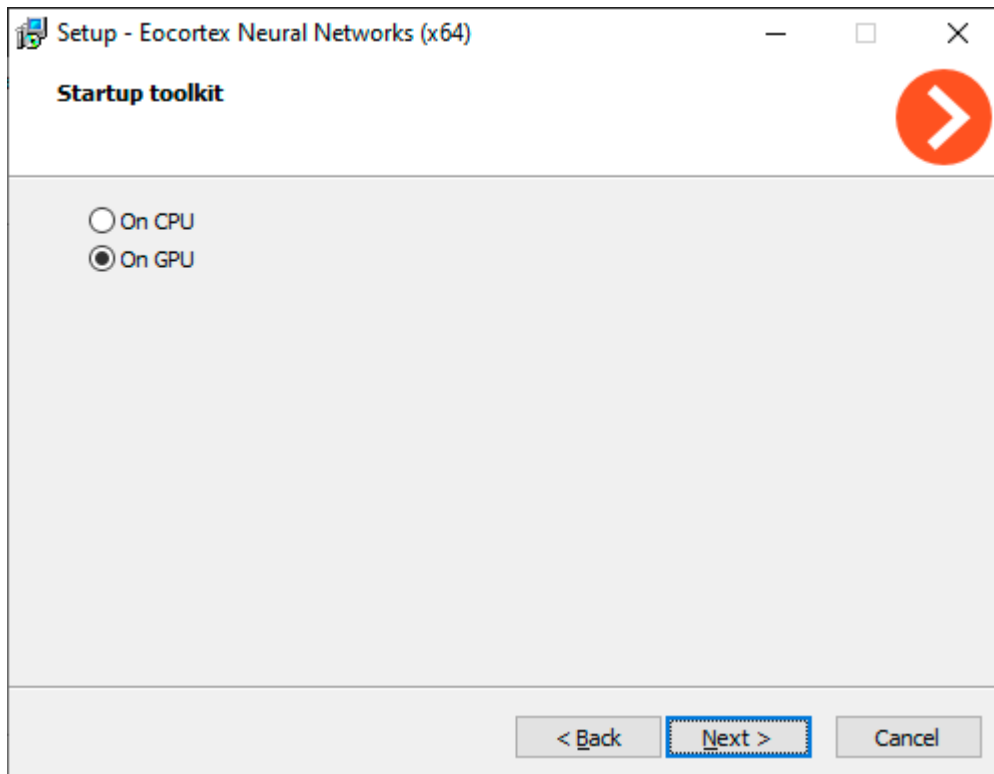

Integration with External Systems and Devices

Integration with messengers

Eocortex integration with messengers is a service that connects Eocortex servers and popular messenger platforms. This integration allows interaction with **Eocortex** video surveillance systems through messengers: receiving camera images, notifications about registered events, server status reports and other information. The communication between messenger users and the video surveillance systems is done through a special bot called **EocortexBot**.

Facebook Messenger, Telegram, and Viber are currently supported.


Licensing

By default, the number of messenger users that can be tied to a specific **Eocortex** video surveillance system is limited. To increase the number of messenger users, contact the organization that provided **Eocortex** licenses for this system or your personal **Eocortex** manager.

Setting

The messenger interaction subsystem is initially disabled in **Eocortex** video surveillance system.

To enable and configure interaction with messengers, you need to launch the **Eocortex**

Configurator application, go to the  **Users** tab, enable the **Users of messengers** button and [configure the messenger users](#).

Use

To start interacting with the **Eocortex** video surveillance system via messenger, the user must follow the link sent to them.

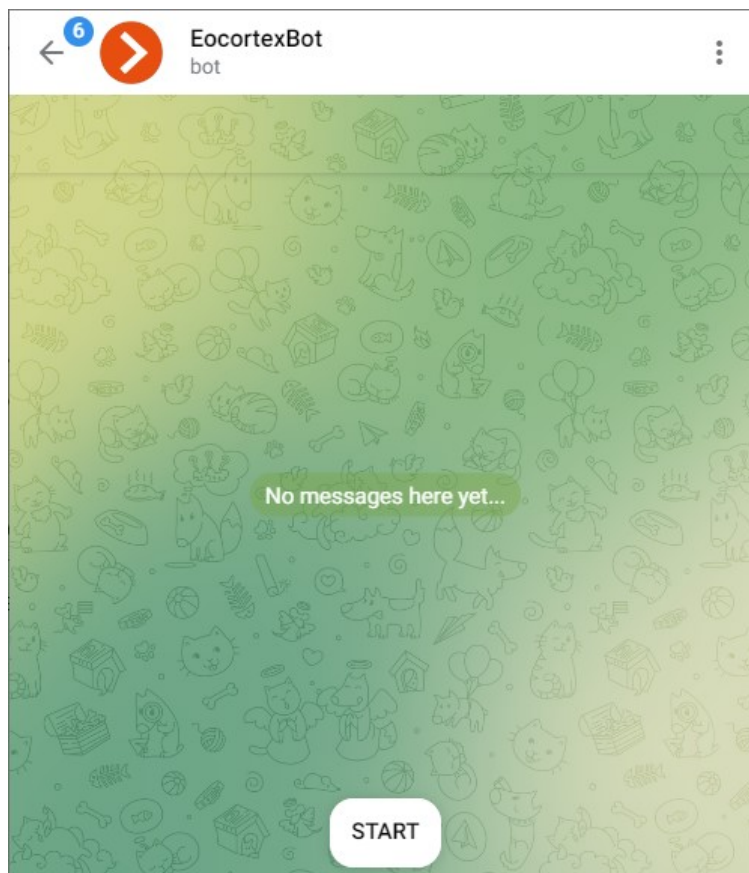

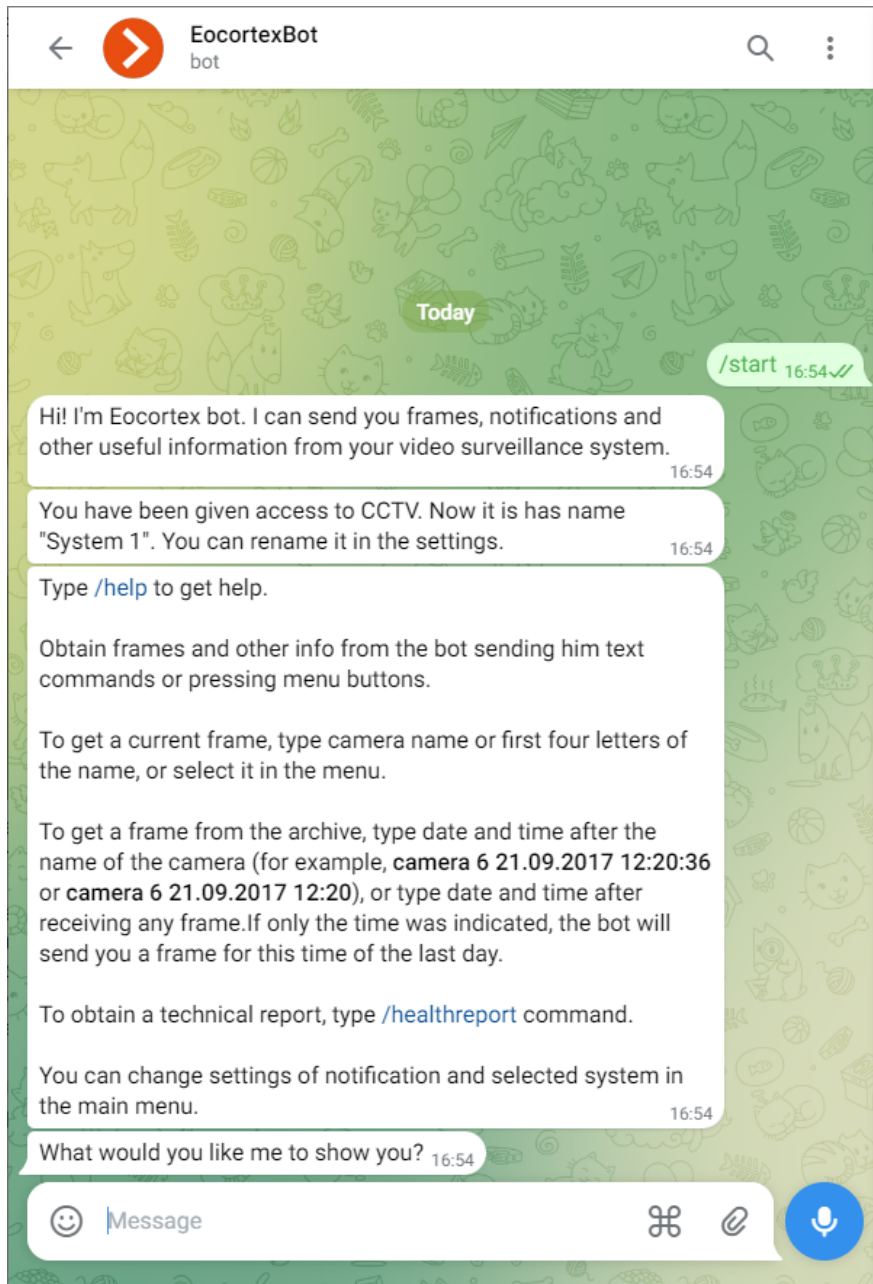
The process of adding a second and subsequent systems is no different from adding the first system. All that is required to be done in such a case is to follow the link received from the corresponding video surveillance system.

When you follow the link to the messenger, the start page will open. To start interaction with **EocortexBot**, press the **Start** button, after which the bot will send a welcome message.

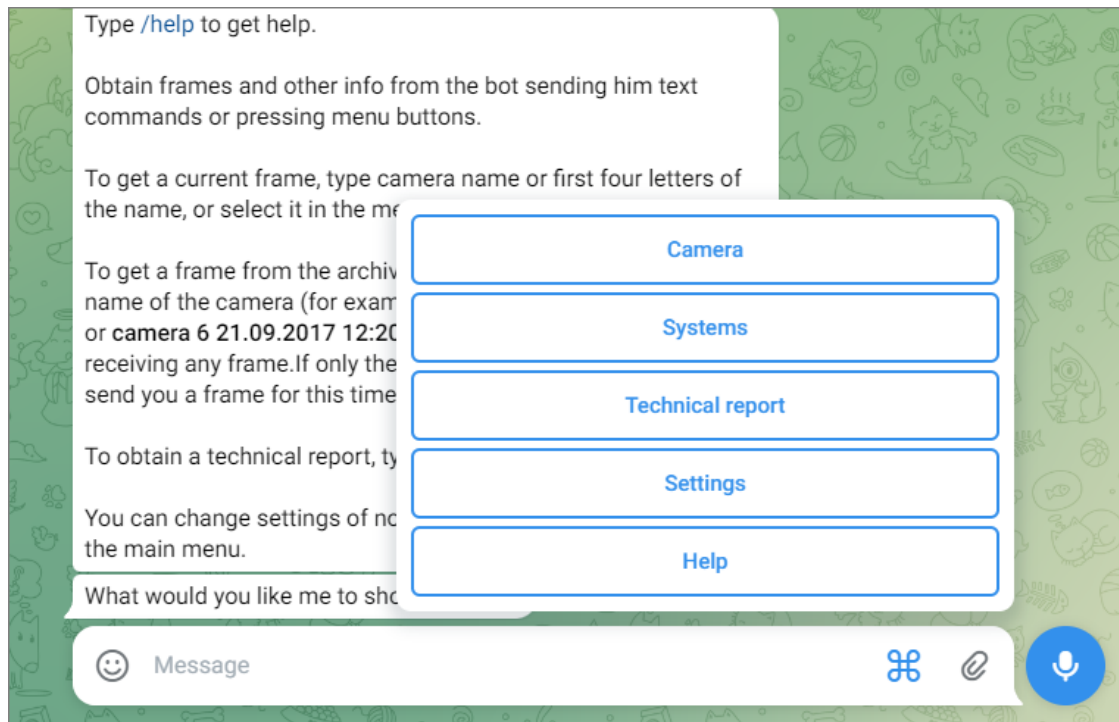
There is no start page in **Viber**, so **EocortexBot** directly sends a welcome message.



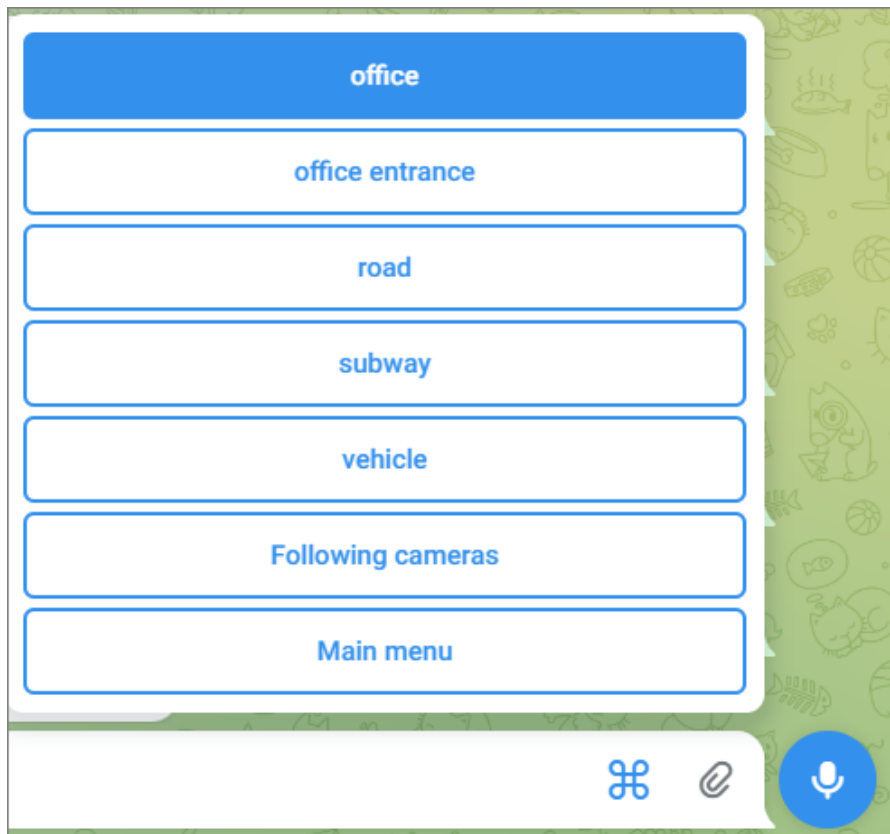
Next, the user is presented with information about the functionality of this bot: what it can do and how to interact with it. If more than one system is added, instructions on how to work with several systems will be provided.



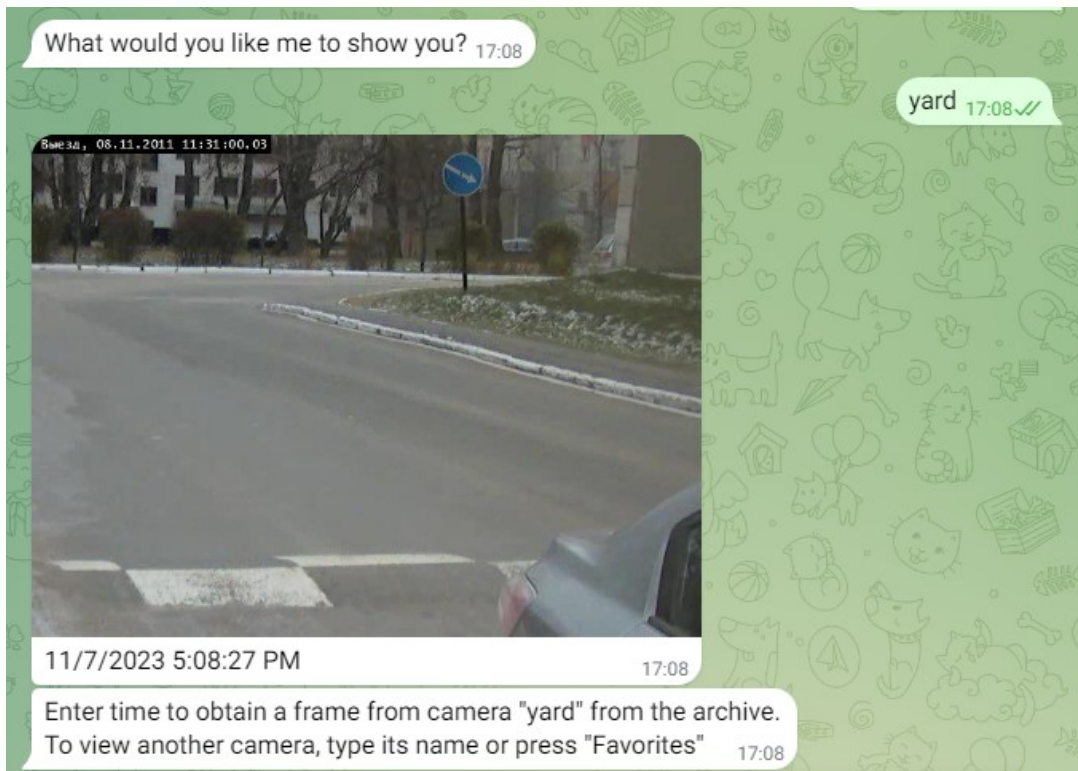

To receive a frame from the archive for the selected camera, you need to enter the time.



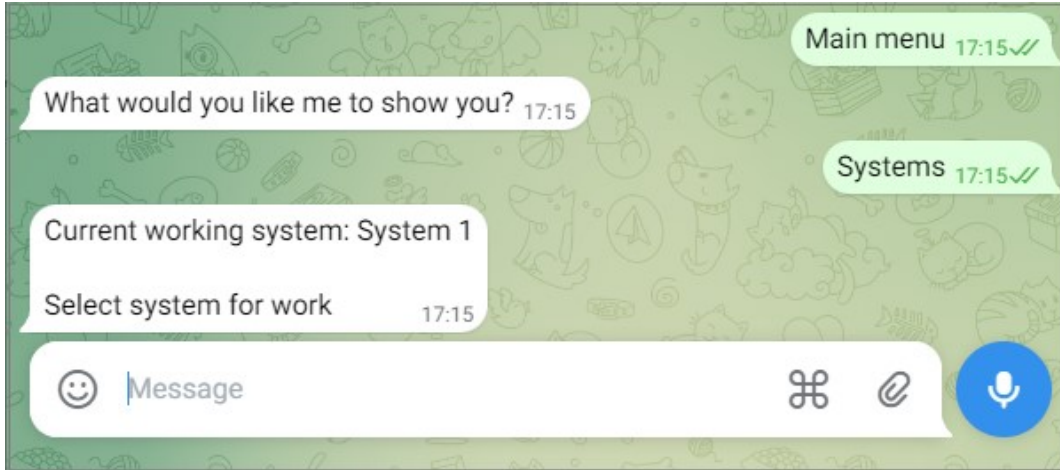
After receiving the frame, you can go to the **Favorites** section, where the cameras from which frames were recently requested are displayed. When you select a favorite camera, a frame from that camera will be sent.



In the main menu, pressing the **Systems** button will display a list of all systems to which the user has been invited. At the same time, interactive interaction is possible only with one system - the one

called **Current System**. To change the current system, select it from the list of the presented systems.

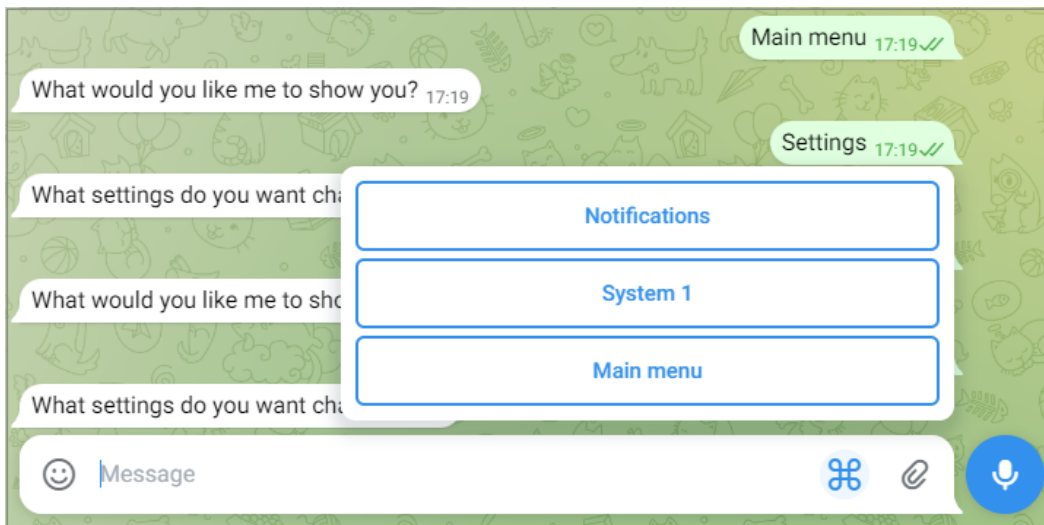

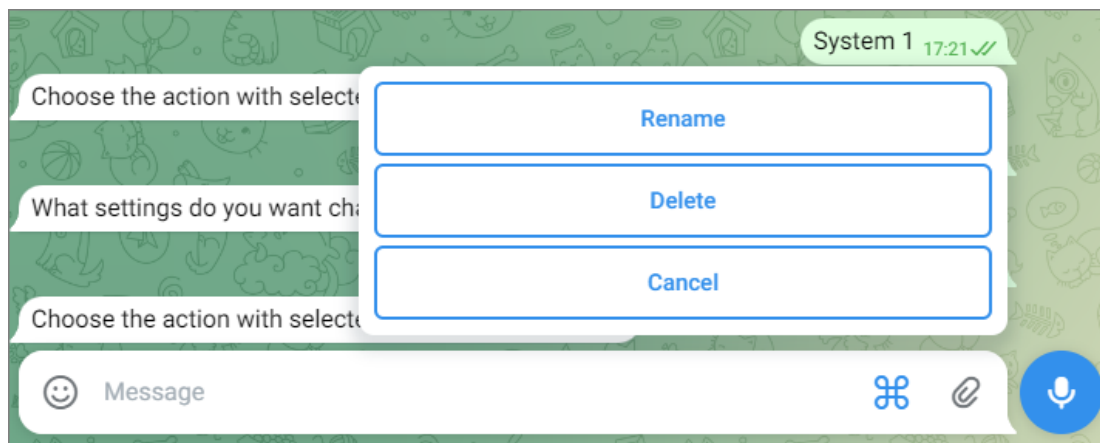

/help or **/help** — get information about the bot's capabilities.

/healthreport or **/technical report** — obtain information about the state of the system.

/changesystem — change the active system. After entering the command, a list of available systems will open.

camera_name — get a frame from the specified camera.

camera_name time — get a frame from the archive from the specified camera at the specified time.

The **camera_name** can be specified with errors of several letters, including omitting them or adding extra ones. In this case, the more errors there are in the name, the higher the probability that the bot service will not be able to correctly recognize the correct name. If there are too many errors, the user will be sent a message **I haven't quite understood you.**

The **time** is specified in the format **MM/dd/YYYY hh:mm** (for example, 03/23/2018 16:56). The time should be specified in accordance with the local time of **Eocortex** server.

Integration with BioStar 2

Eocortex has the integration with the **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS. With this integration, **Eocortex** can receive and process events from **Suprema BioStar 2**, as well as send commands to the ACS to perform various actions.

Integration is available for servers running both Windows and Linux.

Description

The integration supports two-way interaction between **Eocortex** and **Suprema BioStar 2**, allowing to receive and process events from ACS in **Eocortex** applications, as well as to send control commands to the doors controlled by **Suprema BioStar 2**.

Receiving events

The event information can contain the following lines:

Type of event (code and description) (e.g.: Door opened by operator, Fire alarm, Access denied);

Information about the device (controller) (name and identifier). The controller can have relays and readers to which the doors can be connected. Information about them is not used in **Eocortex**;

Information about the door (name and identifier);

Information about the user (name and identifier);

Information about the user group (name and identifier).

Performing actions

As a command to the ACS, requests for one of the following actions can be sent:

Open — temporarily opens the door.

Release — removes the manual door lock/unlock.

Manual lock — manually locks the door. The door remains locked even if the user is successfully authorized.

Manual unlock — manually unlocks the door. The door remains open without the need for user authorization.

Clear alarm — removes the alarm state from the door.

Events log

Events received from the ACS or created by sending commands to it are displayed in the Event Log of the **Eocortex Client** application. These events are associated with the relevant camera.







Setting tasks by events

To set up the scenario executing as a response to the event received from the security platform, go to the **Automation** section of the **Eocortex Configurator** application. In the list of cameras, select a camera or a group of cameras and switch to the **Tasks by event** tab on the page that opens.

It is possible to configure any standard task for the **Suprema BioStar 2 event**:

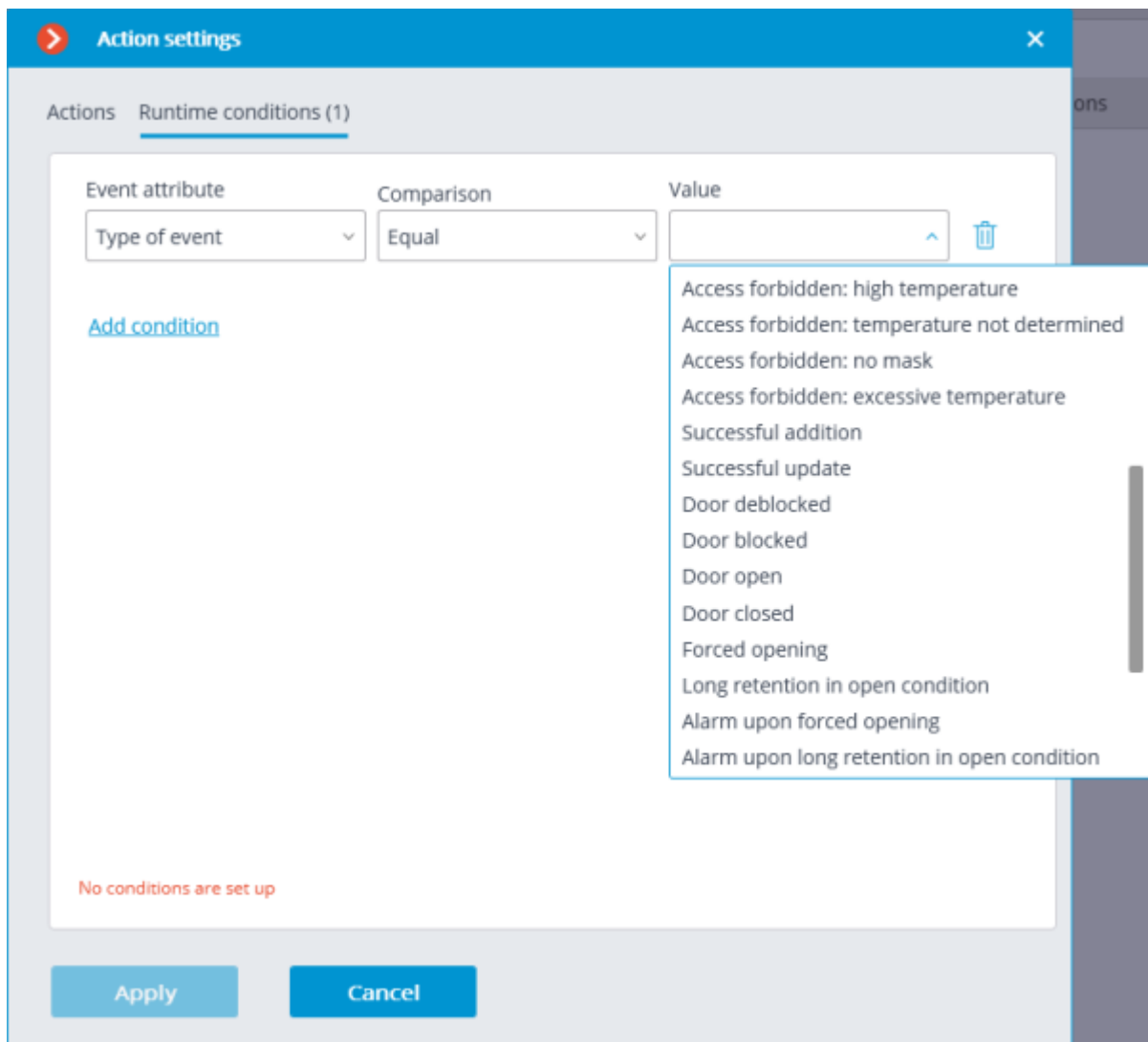

Before this feature can be used, it must be [enabled and configured](#) for the selected camera on the **Integrations** tab of the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

To configure an **Execute action in Suprema Biostar 2** action, run the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the **Automation** tab, select an individual camera or a whole folder in the camera tree. 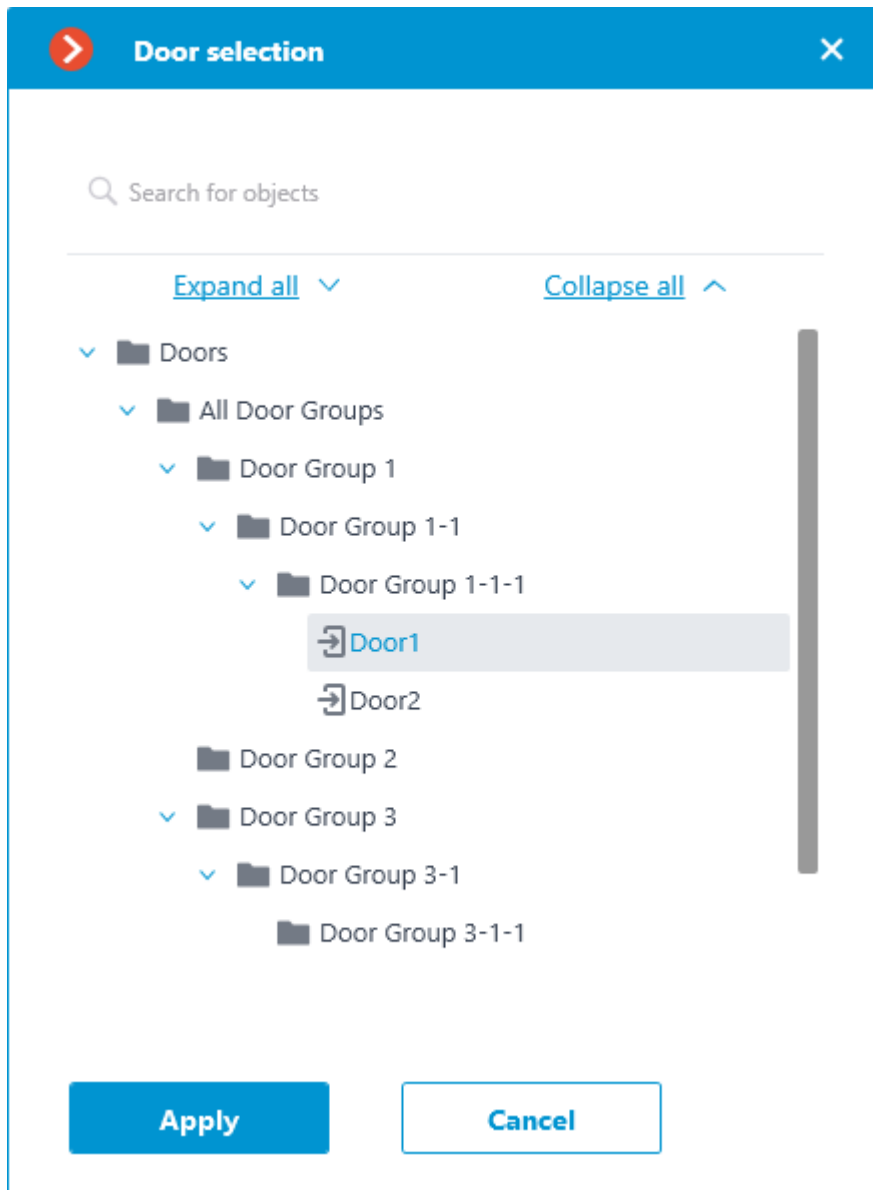

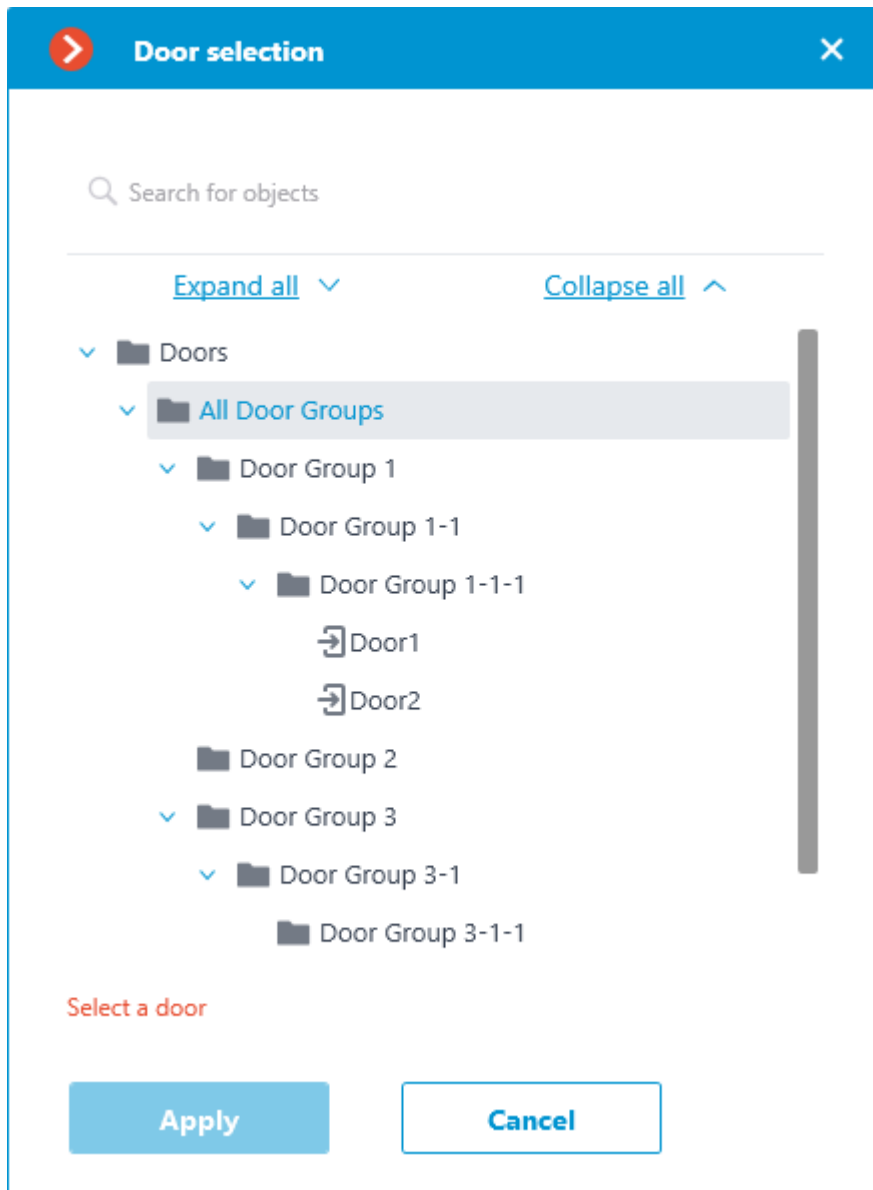

Door selection

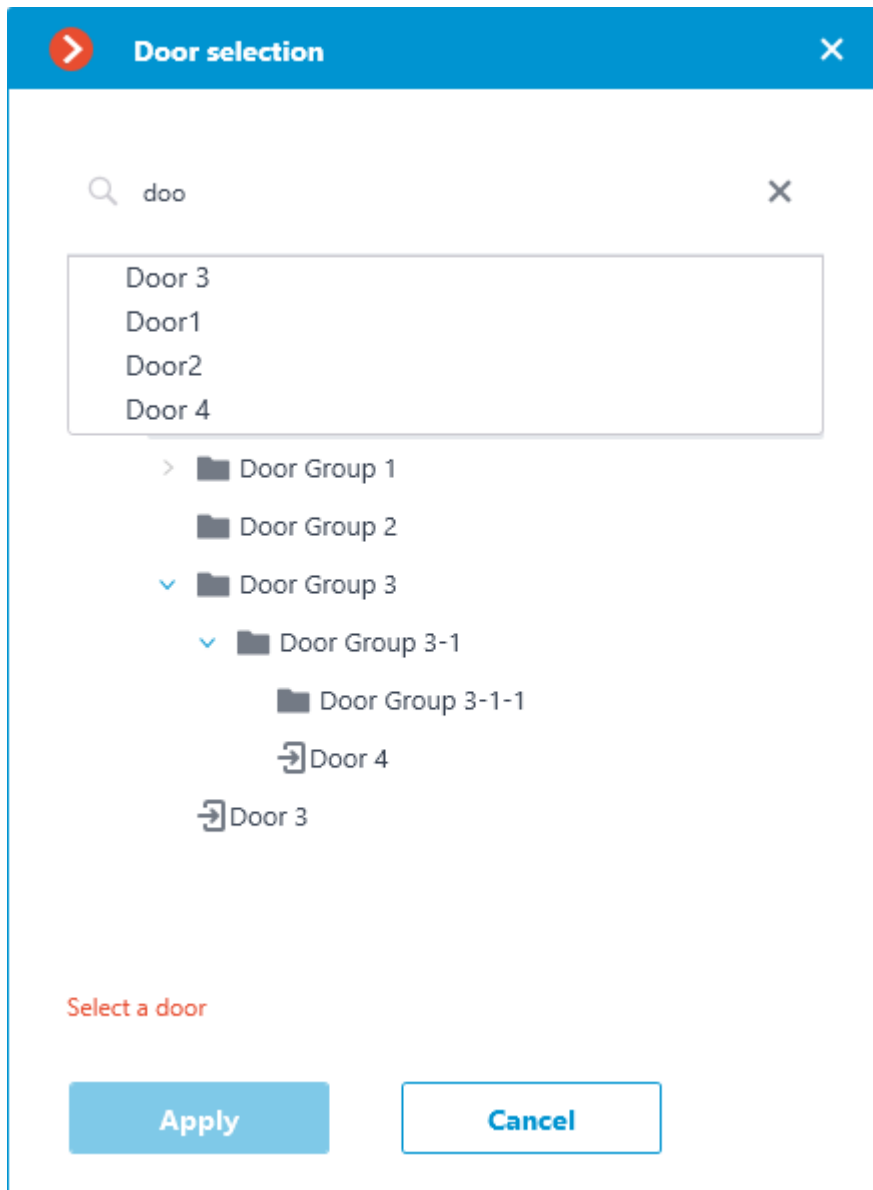
Clicking the **Select** button next to the **Door** field opens the device selection window. To load the list of doors available for interaction, the connection to **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS will be established with the credentials that were specified in the **Integrations** section.




The **Door selection** window allows selecting the door from the list, for which the action should be performed. It is necessary to select a specific door, selecting a group of doors at once is not possible.



For easy navigation to the right door, the text search by its name is available at the top of the window. Select the desired door and click **Apply** to confirm.



Once the door is selected, the previously inactive  **Copy** button, located in the **Door** field, becomes available. Clicking this button saves to the clipboard the name and ID of the selected door, which can be used later for diagnostic or automation tasks.

Action selection

The **Action** drop-down list provides a choice of actions to be performed on the selected door. The following options are available:

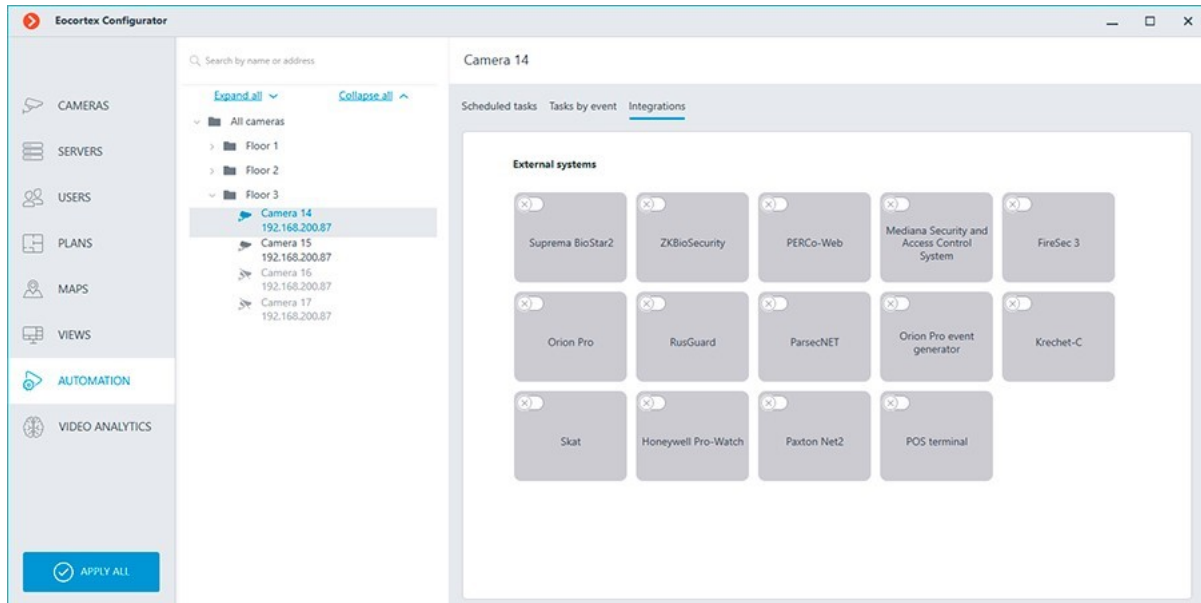

Before the **Eocortex** server will be able to interact with the **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS, it is necessary to configure the integration. To set it up, go to the **Automation** section of the **Eocortex Configurator** application. In the list of cameras, select a camera and switch to the **Integrations** tab on the page that opens, then activate the slider for **Suprema BioStar 2** tile.

General settings

The **General settings** tab contains the settings for a network connection to the **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS for the whole system.

The following settings are available:

Server address: IP address or URL of the **Suprema BioStar 2** server. Prefixes, such as `http://`, are not required to be specified in this field. To enable a secured connection via HTTPS, click the  button.

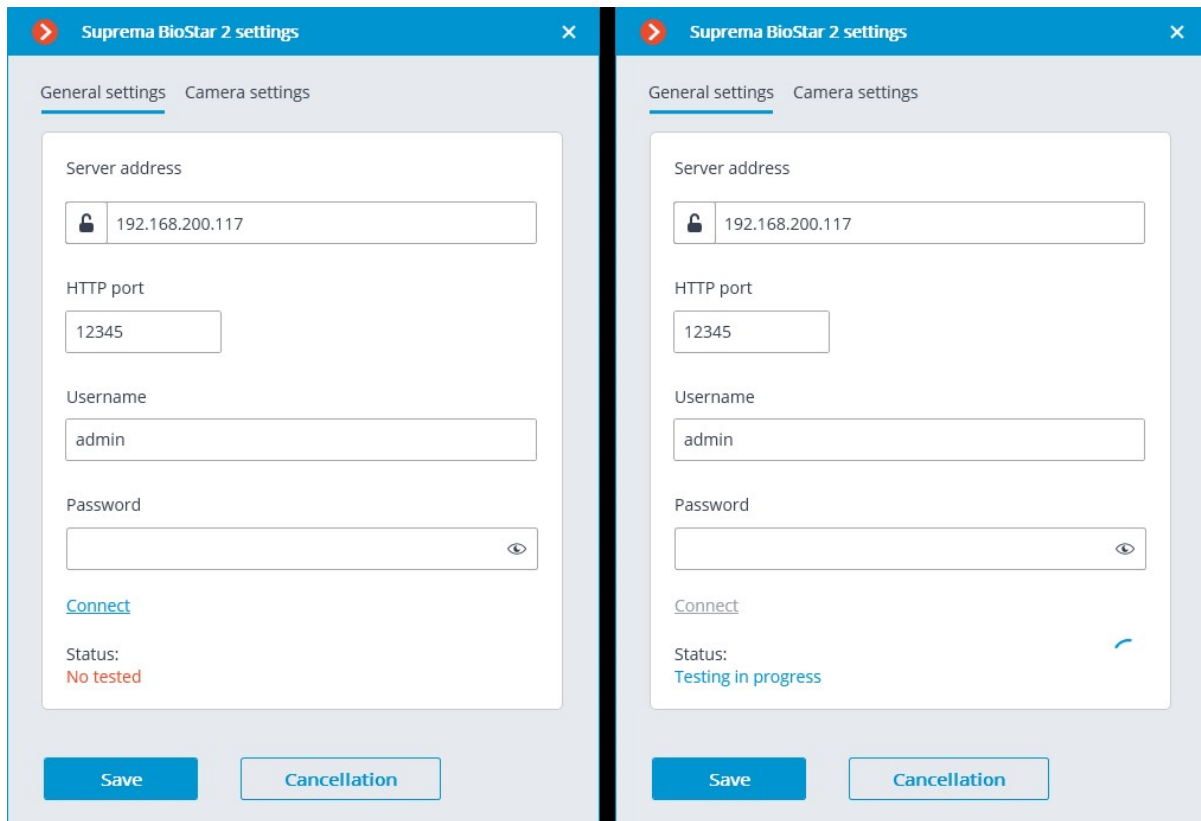
HTTP port: HTTP(S) port of the **Suprema BioStar 2** server. Interaction with the ACS utilizes the HTTP and WebSocket protocols, but both protocols use the same port. The WebSocket port can be configured individually in **Suprema BioStar 2** settings, but it is not necessary to set it in the integration settings.

Camera settings


The **Camera settings** tab contains settings from which devices the system should receive events for this camera.

By default, all ACS events will be received from all devices.

If the integration is enabled on multiple cameras with the default settings, the events will be duplicated for all enabled cameras.

There are 2 types of **Suprema BioStar 2** objects available for configuration:

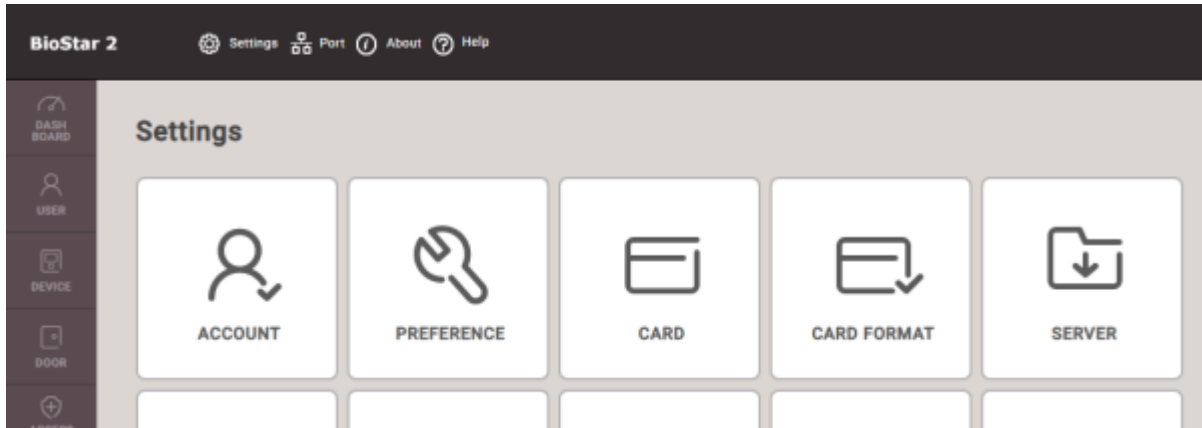
 **Doors.** A high-level object that is most often configured with rules in **Suprema BioStar 2**. Usually the door is connected to a relay and a sensor of other device. Receiving events from specific doors allows to configure the integration more precisely;

 **Devices.** A lower-level **Suprema BioStar 2** object. Setting up to receive events from the device allows configuring the integration more flexibly. For example, if **Suprema BioStar 2** is in the deployment phase, the list of doors and their properties will continuously change. When configuring to receive events from the specific door, it will be necessary to change the integration settings each time when something has changed. But when configuring to receive events from a device, when new doors are connected to the device, the integration settings would not need to be changed.

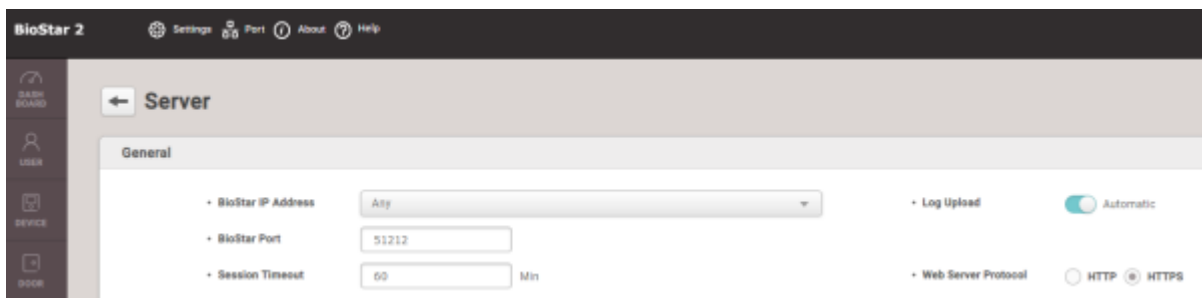
Setting up Suprema BioStar 2

To configure **Suprema BioStar 2** for this integration, use the ACS web interface, which is available on the same port that is specified in the integration settings.

The minimum version of **Suprema BioStar 2** must support control over the used protocol (BioStar 2 New Local API).

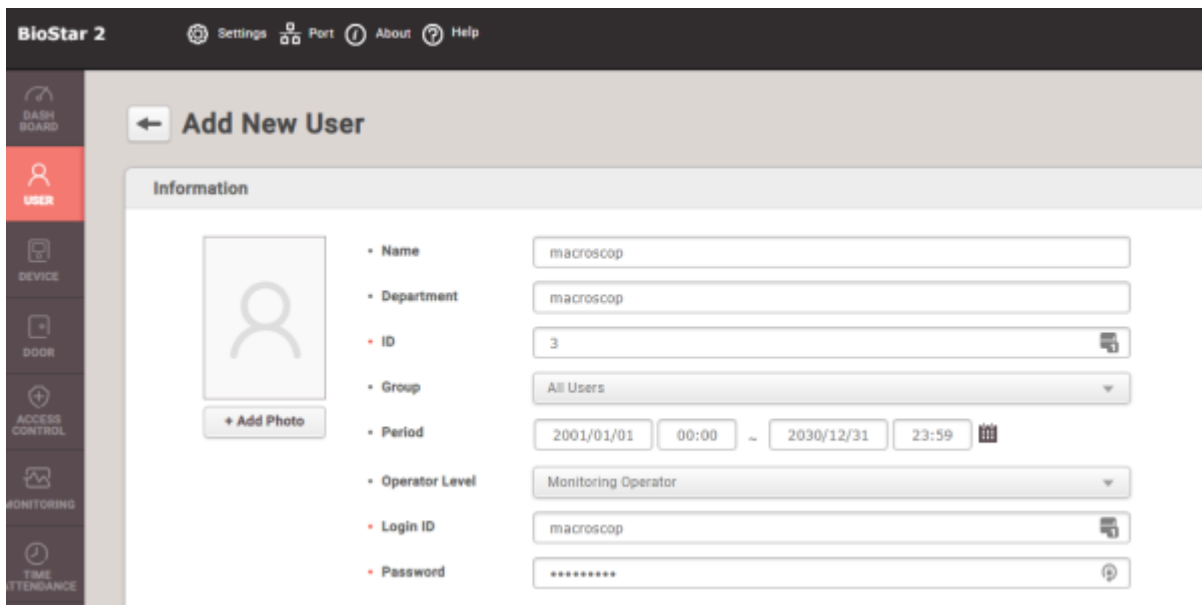


On the **Settings** tab of the **Server** section, the use of a secure connection can be configured. HTTPS is used by default.



On the **Port** tab, network ports for connection can be configured. **Ecortex** uses either HTTP (if insecure connection is selected) or HTTPS (if secure connection is selected) connection port.

The user under which **Ecortex** connects to the ACS must be provided with rights to read and monitor data (Monitoring Operator level), in case of problems it is recommended to provide administrative access.



Requirements and limitations

Integration is developed using **BioStar 2 New Local API**, available in **Suprema BioStar 2** since version 2.7.10. The possibility of enabling integration with earlier versions of ACS is not guaranteed.

One **Eocortex** system can be connected only to one **Suprema BioStar 2** server at a time.

Integration with Honeywell's Pro-Watch®

Eocortex is integrated with the **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** comprehensive security platform. The integration makes it possible to receive and display the **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** events, as well as to set up responses to such events.

The integration will work with versions 4.3.5 and later of **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®**.

For the integration to work, it is required to properly set up both **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** and **Eocortex**.

Honeywell's Pro-Watch® Setup

The information regarding the setup of **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** for integration purposes is found in the restricted API setup and operation documentation supplied together with the **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** distribution kit. The brief list of conditions, requirements and actions aimed at ensuring the successful integration of **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** is shown below.

The availability of the activated **Pro-Watch Database Transfer Utility** and **Pro-Watch Database Transfer Utility via API** licenses.

The **Pro-Watch API Service** is activated and launched by the user with the access to **Pro-Watch** database.

The **REST** and **SignalR** ports (**8734** and **8735** by default, correspondingly) of **Pro-Watch** servers are available.

There exists a **Pro-Watch** user for whom the **Web password** has been enabled in the user settings of the database. This password will be required to be indicated in the **Eocortex** settings.

The capability of transferring events between the **Pro-Watch** workstations is enabled.

Eocortex Setup

For setting up the response of the **Eocortex** server to the **Honeywell's Pro-Watch®** events, it is required to launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to **Automation** tab, and select a camera in the list. Then, in the opened page, go to the **Integrations** tab and [set up the connection to the Honeywell's Pro-Watch® server](#). After that, it is required to go to the **Tasks by event** tab and [set up the responses](#) to the [Honeywell Pro-Watch event](#).

Integration with intercoms

Ecortex allows the interaction with video intercoms connected with the network via the IP protocol. The outdoor panel acts as an IP camera with additional functionality — the ability to unlock the door lock. For interaction with the intercom, a special interface is used in the **Ecortex Client** application.

Configuring TrueIP TI-6000WD Call Panel

To configure the **TrueIP TI-6000WD** Panel, log into the web interface of the panel (its default IP address is 10.5.22.89).

In the web interface, go to the LAN settings and set the Register to the MGT Centre flag.

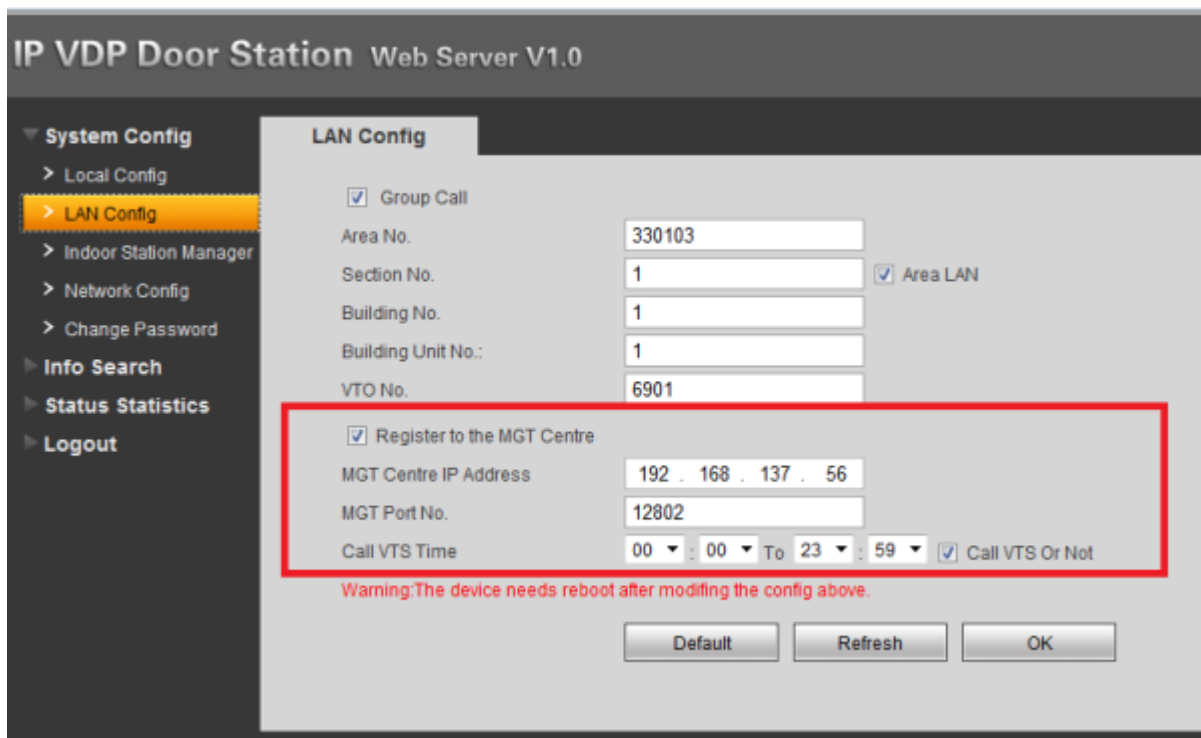
Then in the **MGTCentreIPAddress** field specify the IP address of the **Ecortex** server.

The IP address of the **Ecortex** server must be from the same subnet as the address of the call station.

In the **MGT Port** field, specify the UDP port that will be used for connecting the panel to the **Ecortex** server.

If there are several panels, the UDP ports for them must be different.

Also, set the flag **Call VTS Or Not** and set the **00:00 To 23:59** value to the **Call VTS Time** field.



Reboot the device for the settings to take effect.

Camera settings

The **Camera settings** tab is used for setting up the registration of events from Paxton Net2 objects in **Eocortex**.



To receive events only from certain objects, enable the **Receive events from selected objects only:** option and check the selected objects.

If the **Receive events from selected objects only:** option is disabled, **Eocortex** will register all Paxton Net2 events as related to the selected camera.

Eocortex registers events for the camera independently of the settings of other cameras, so the same Paxton Net2 object can cause the reaction of the system and create an entry in the Events Log for multiple cameras simultaneously.

Integration with POS terminals

The integration with POS terminals that allows to receive and display receipts from POS terminals has been implemented in **Eocortex**. This feature makes it possible to search for transactions and archive fragments for different purposes, e.g., to determine at which checkout an item was purchased.

POS terminals are integrated as external devices, which means that they must be linked to cameras in **Eocortex** (one POS terminal per camera).

The integration is available only for servers running on Windows OS.

An additional license required to use the integration and connect a POS terminal.

The integration is available for **LS**, **ST**, **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses only.

List of terms

POS (Point of sale) — the place where the purchase occurs. This place is equipped with POS terminal.

POS terminal — external device that sends text messages to the **Eocortex**. Such a device can be a cash register or any other that is capable of outputting text.

Receipt — text message sent from the POS terminal to the **Eocortex**.

Transaction — a sequence of data associated with an individual cash receipt. A transaction begins and ends with messages signaling the start and end of a receipt, respectively. If the message about the closure of the receipt is not received within the specified time, the transaction is terminated by a timeout. Also, the previous transaction may be terminated when a beginning message for a new receipt is received.

ESC/POS — receipt printer control language developed to control POS terminals.

POS terminal transaction log — log of all receipts received from POS terminals.

Advantages

Receive data from POS terminals about cash receipts.

Store received cash receipts.

View received cash receipts both in real time and in the archive.

Filter stored cash receipts by cameras and content.

Use data of cash receipts in Automation scenarios.

Watch the video related to the transaction both frame-by-frame and step-by-step.

Navigate through the archive on the timeline by data of received cash receipts.

Features


Service commands of the ESC/POS protocol are removed from the message without affecting its display.

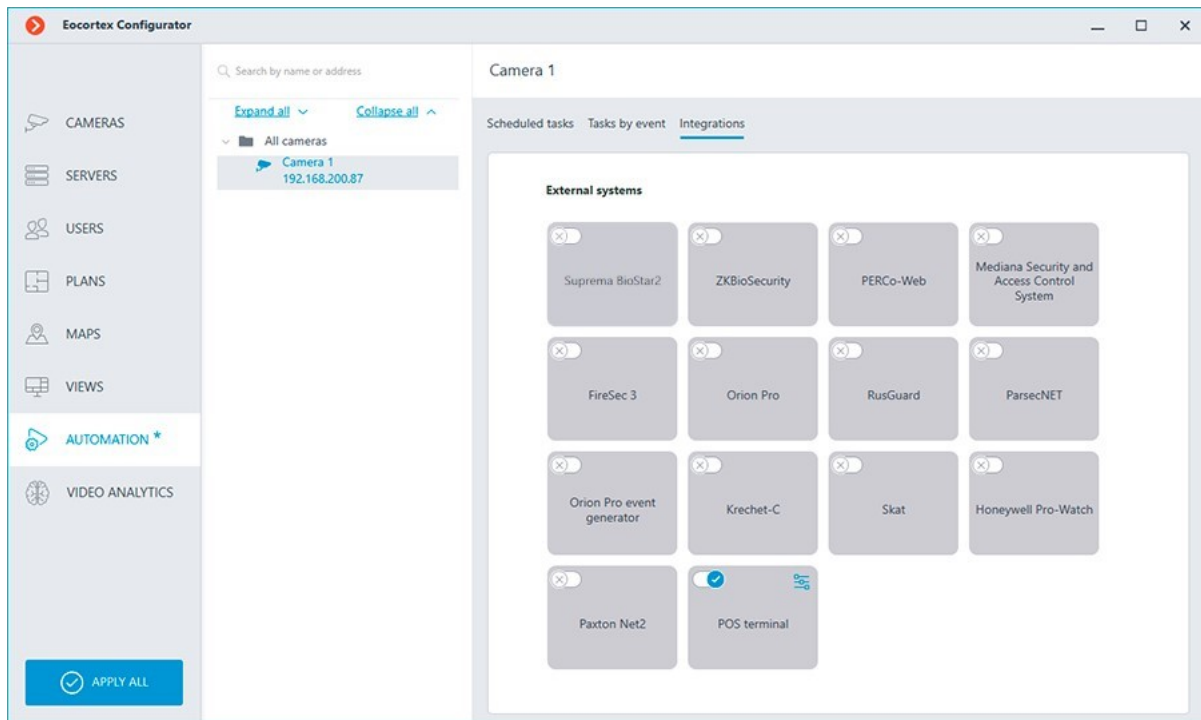
Cash receipts from POS terminals can be received only via TCP/IP.

POS terminal should operate in server mode. In other words, **Eocortex** initiates the connection.

Displaying of graphical images in the cash receipt is not supported.

Setting the integration in Eocortex Configurator

To set up integration with POS terminals, run the **Eocortex Configurator** application and go to the **Automation** section. Select the camera that will be associated with the terminal from the list, then switch to the **Integrations** tab on the page that opens and enable the slider for the **POS terminal** tile. To configure the integration, click the  button.



This will open the settings window for integration with the POS terminal, which is observed by the selected camera.

The **Connection** tab contains settings for connecting to the terminal.

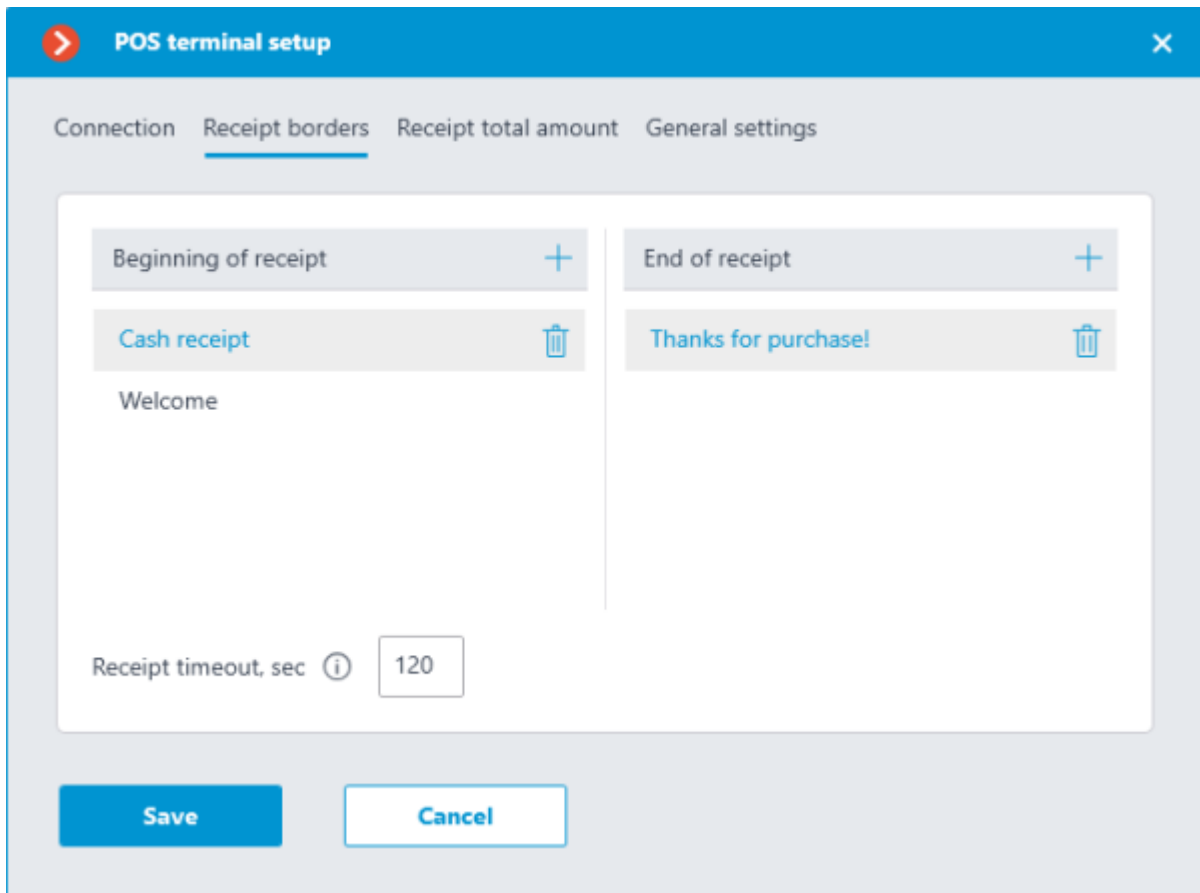

The POS terminal to be connected must operate in server mode.

The **Message coding** field requires to select the encoding in which the data comes from the POS terminal. Availability of encodings depends on the operating system of the computer where the **Eocortex Configurator** application is running. At the same time, it should be noted that the selected encoding must be supported by the server to which the camera is bound as well.

When the settings are defined, the connection can be tested by clicking on the **Connect** button.

The **Receipt borders** tab contains the rules for separating receipts from each other, since the data from the POS terminal comes as a continuous stream.



The **Beginning of receipt** and **End of receipt** lists allow specifying signal substrings indicating the opening (beginning) and closing (end) of a cash receipt, respectively. Each received line will be inspected for the presence of signal substrings. For the system, the check will start with a line containing any of the substrings specified in the **Beginning of receipt** list and will end with a line containing values from the **End of receipt** list.

The match between the text of the signal substring and the text in the received line of the cash receipt must be precise, including the case.

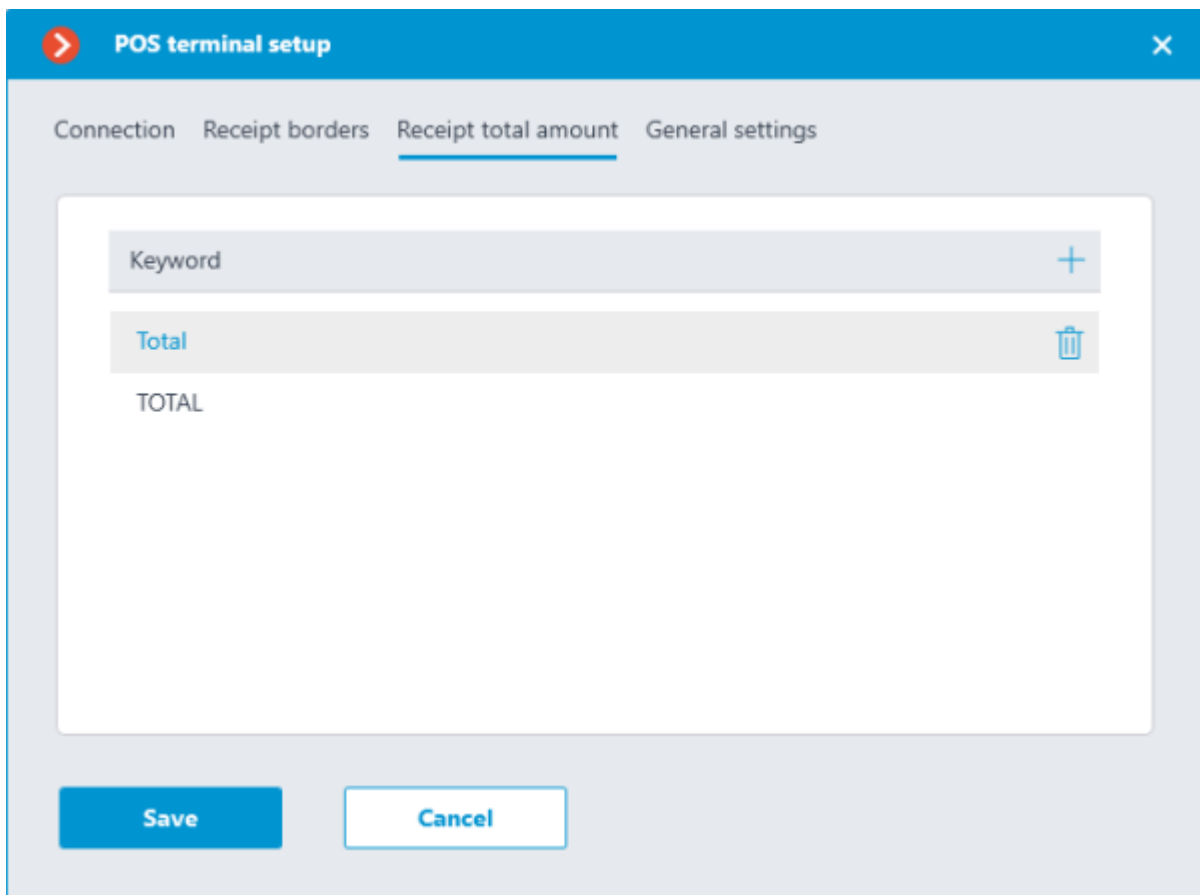
As a beginning of a cash receipt there can be, for example, the name of the store, captions like **Welcome** or **Receipt**, and so on. The end of a cash receipt is often the store's website address or the caption like **Thanks for purchase!**

The **Receipt timeout, sec** field allows specifying the time of waiting between opening and closing the receipt. The receipt will be closed if no new line has come since the last line was received within this time period.

A receipt will also be closed when one of the following commands is received from the POS terminal:

- Full cut (of paper).
- Partial cut (of paper).

The **Receipt total amount** tab allows specifying signal substrings that contain the total amount of a cash receipt.



As the total amount will be considered the value behind the specified signal substring.

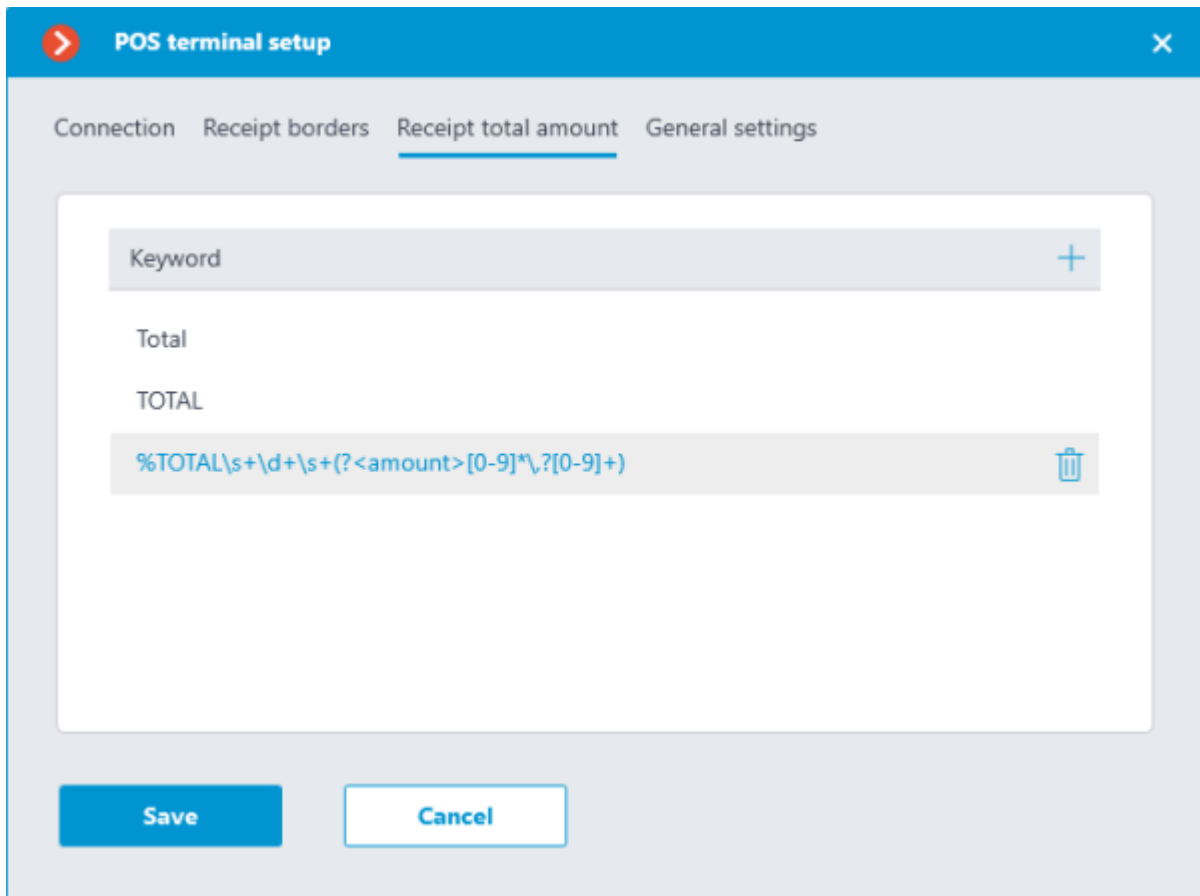
Signal substrings are case-sensitive. For example, the **Total** and **TOTAL** lines should be set as two different substrings.

For more flexible configuration for getting the total amount of the receipt, a regular expression can be used as a signal substring. Such line must start with the **%** sign and contain a named group with the **amount** name.

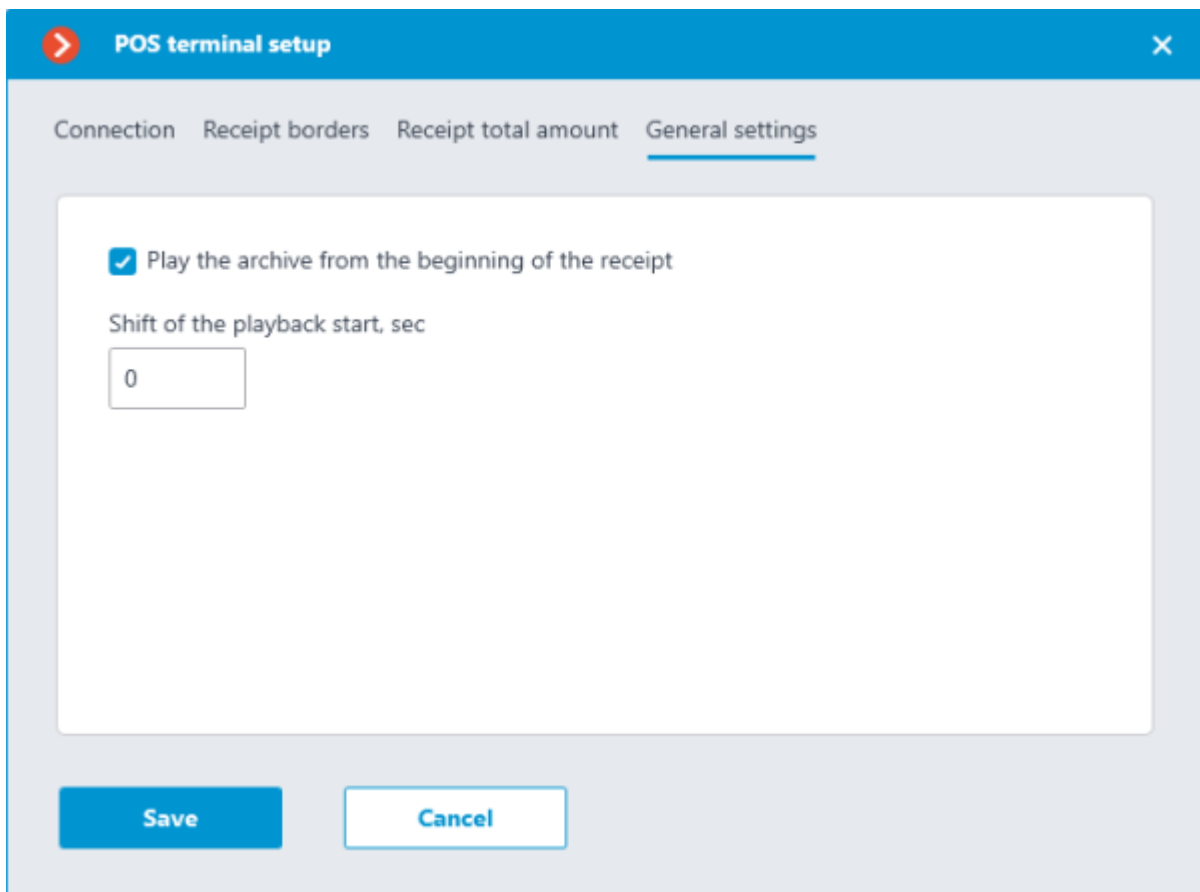
As an example, below is a receipt from which the value of the total amount can not be obtained using the signal string containing plain text — the value of the **TOTAL** line will be **164050**.

In such case, to get the total amount as **4050**, the signal substring can be set as a regular expression as displayed below.

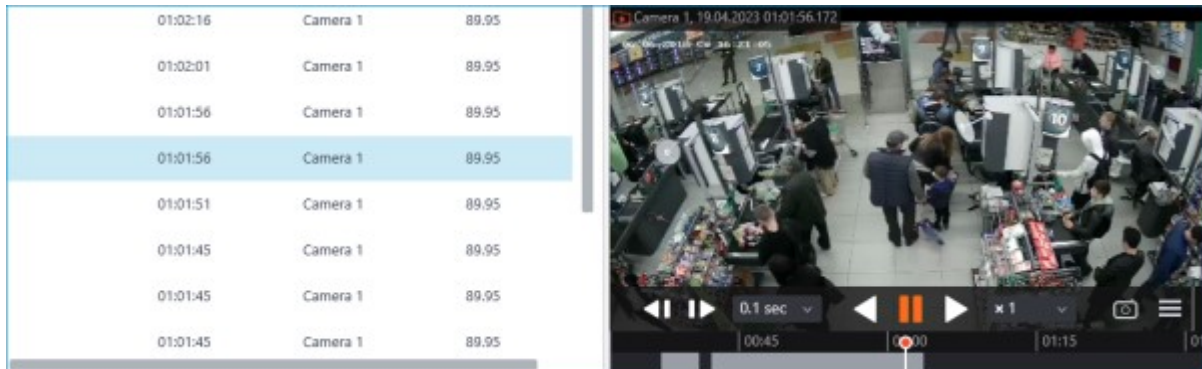


The **General settings** tab contains the settings for pointing on the timeline in the archive of the video associated with the received cash receipt.



If the **Play the archive from the beginning of the receipt** option is enabled, the pointer to the beginning of such video will be set on the timeline to the time of the receipt beginning, including the time shift specified in the **Play the archive from the beginning of the receipt** field. If this option is disabled, the pointer to the beginning of the video will be set to end of the receipt.

For example, below is the pointer to the video with the time shift of 10 seconds from the beginning of the receipt.

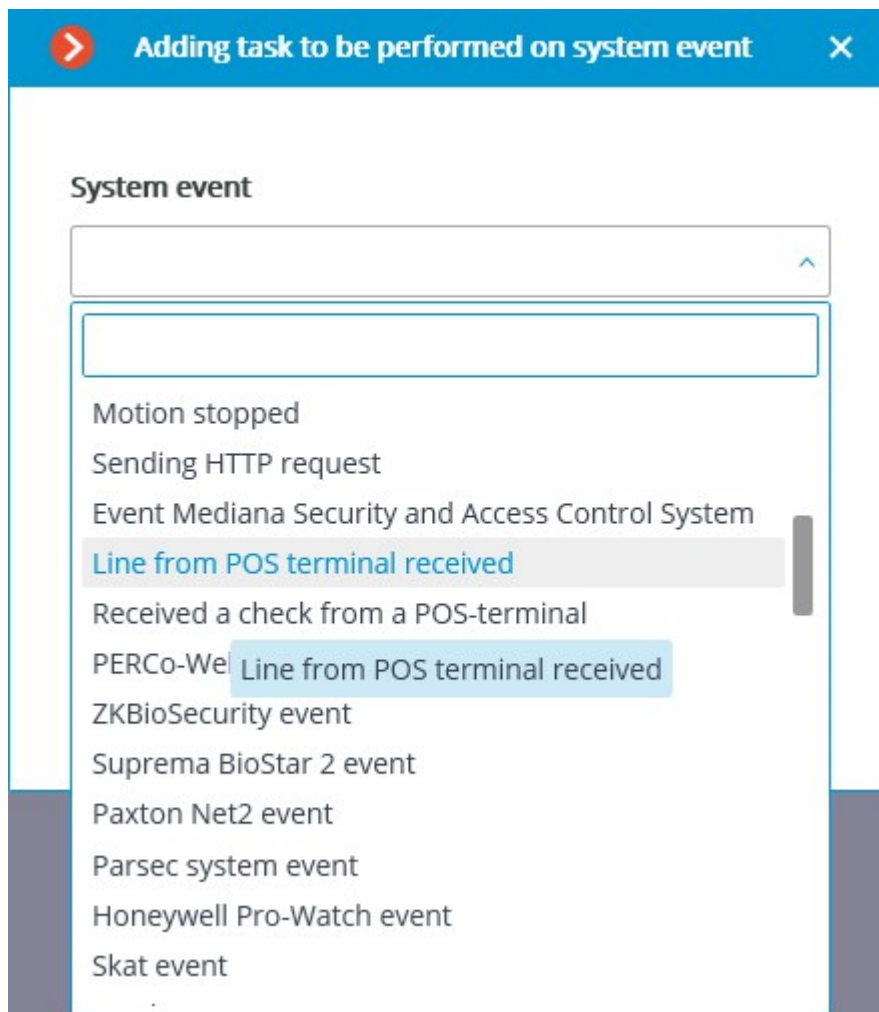


Position of the pointer on the timeline may have a slight inaccuracy.

Setting tasks by events

The system is able to perform actions in response to events occurring with Automation scenarios. To set up such a scenario, go to the **Automation** section of the **Eocortex Configurator** application. Select a specific camera or a group of cameras in the camera tree and on the page that opens, select the **Tasks by event** tab.

For the **Line from POS terminal received** event, it is possible to set up any standard task.



For the scenario, the runtime conditions based on the content of the line can be set:

By this way, it is possible to make the scenario executable only in the specific cases. For example, enable the archive recording if the cash receipt contains an item that has any restrictions on the sale.

Also, the scenario can be set up for the **Received a check from a POS-terminal** event.

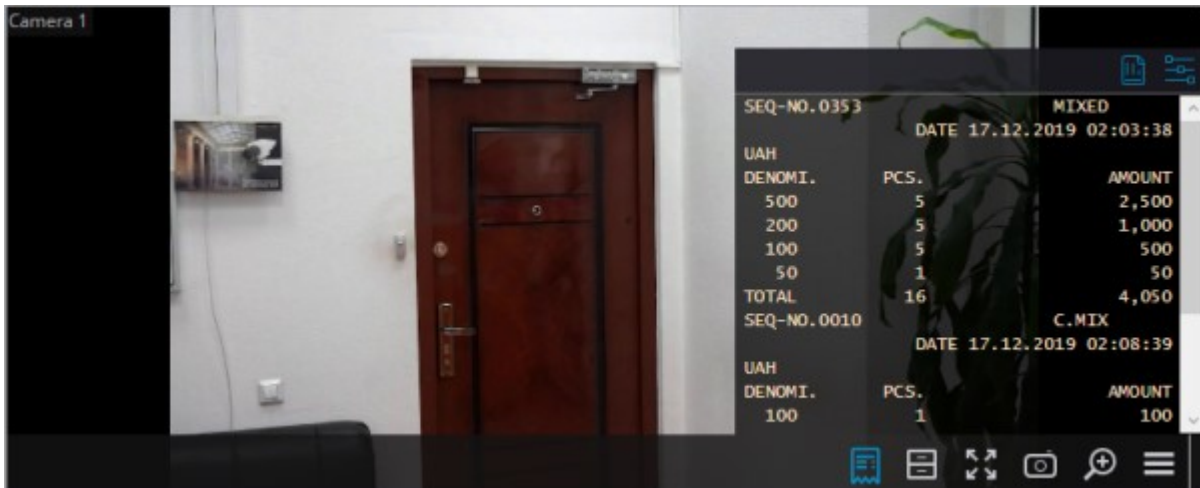

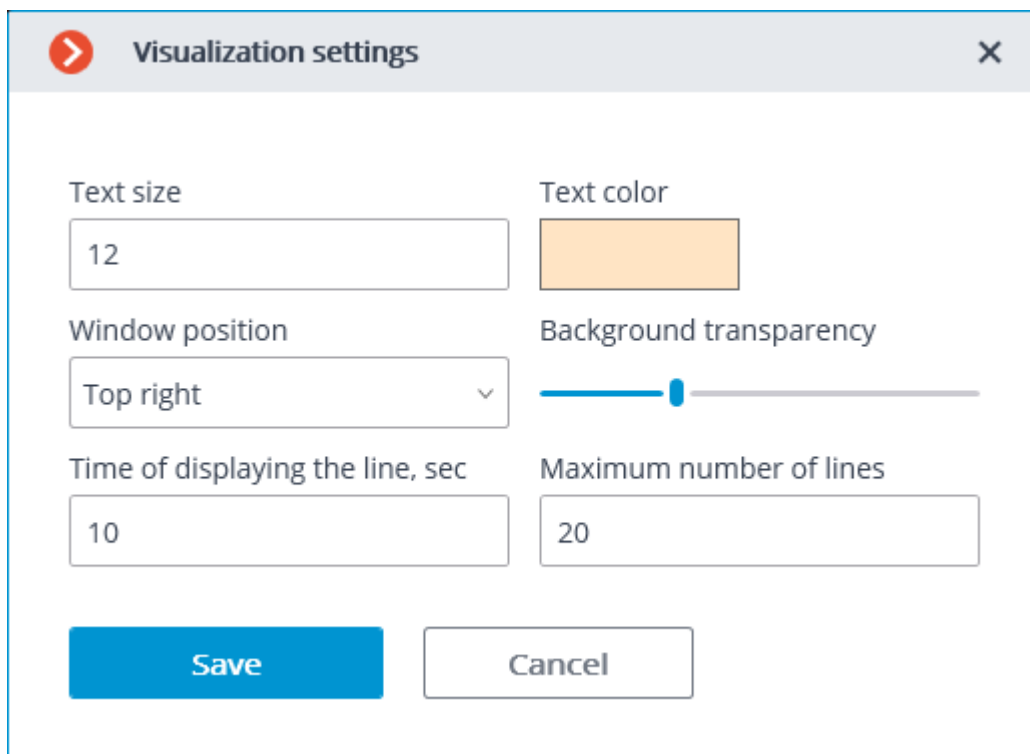

When the integration with POS terminal is enabled, the new button  will appear in the bottom part of the camera cell. This button enables and disables the panel for displaying cash receipts in the camera cell.



By default, the panel is located in the upper right corner of the cell. The panel itself has two additional buttons ; the first one opens the **POS terminal transaction log**, when the second opens the **Visualization settings** window.

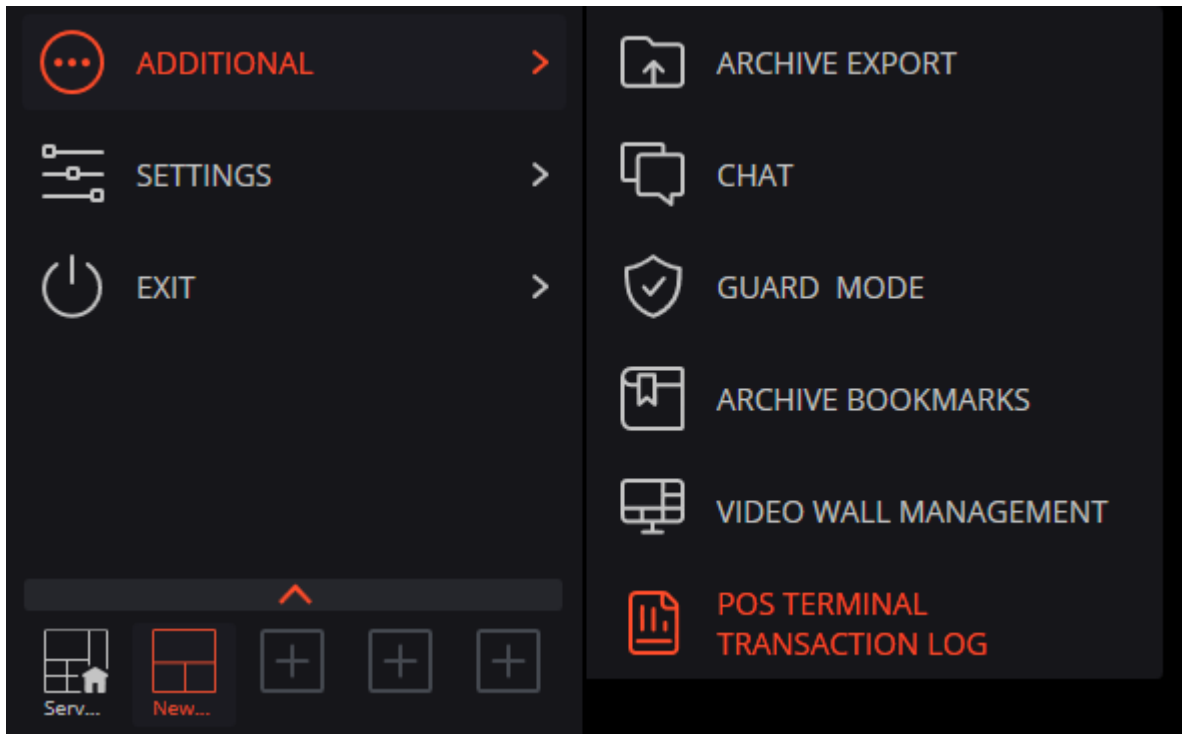

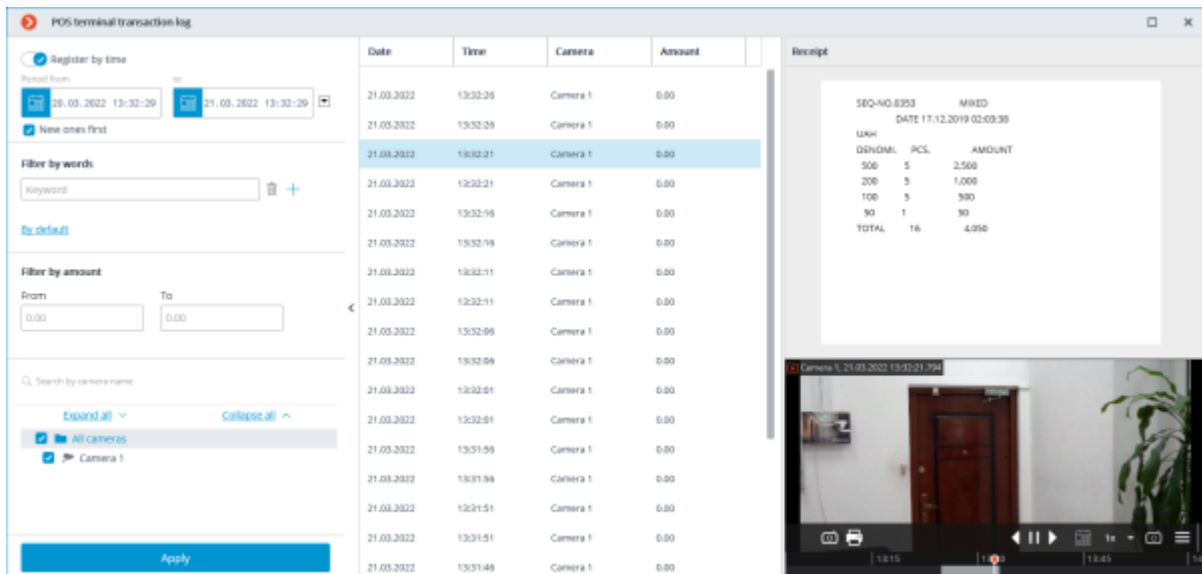
In the **POS terminal transaction log**, the user is able to view cash receipts stored in the **Ecortex** database, filter cash receipts by various parameters, view the archive for the moment of time the cash receipt was generated.



The transaction log can be opened by the corresponding button in the **Additional** section of menu or from the panel for displaying cash receipts.



The transaction log is divided into three work areas (left to right):
filtering area where search parameters for cash receipt are configured;
list of transactions;
display area of a cash receipt, which corresponds to the selected transaction.

By filtering by keywords, only those cash receipts that contain the specified words will be displayed. The system will search for all the specified keywords in the cash receipt, and not just one of them.

With applying the filters, a search is carried out for cash receipts that match the filtering parameters. If the found cash receipt is related to any camera and previously was displayed in the camera cell, the list of transactions will contain this camera name. Each line in the list of transactions corresponds to a single cash receipt.

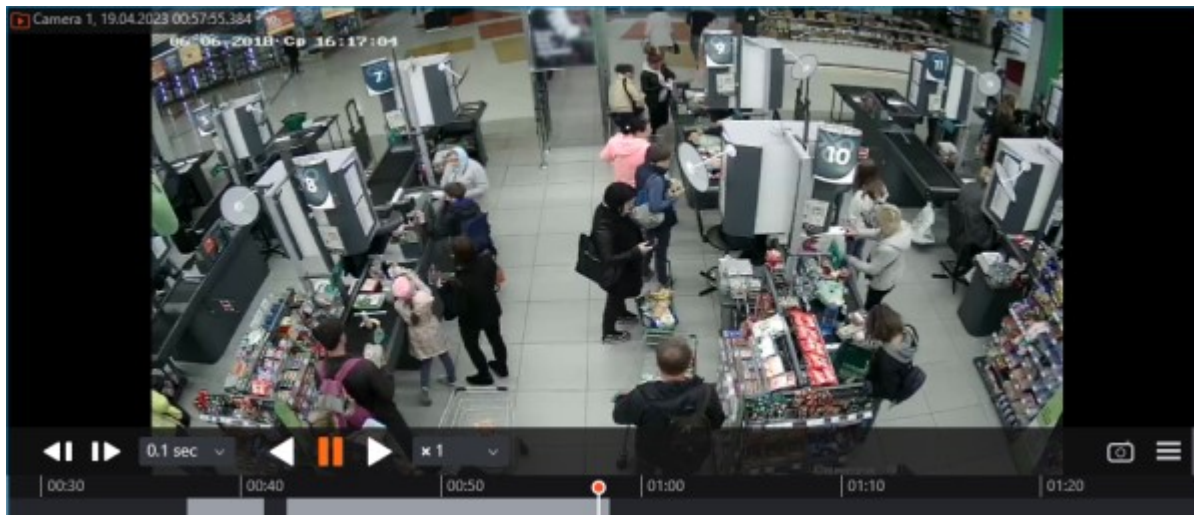

To view transactions step by step, select the view step length on the left side of the bottom cell panel.



When viewing in step-by-step mode, transaction event filters will be disabled.

Integration with ZKBioSecurity ACS

In **Eocortex**, it is possible to receive events from **ZKBioSecurity** ACS and configure the reaction to these events, as well as to view the received events in the **Events Log** of the **Eocortex Client** application.

The integration is available on both Windows and Linux-based servers.



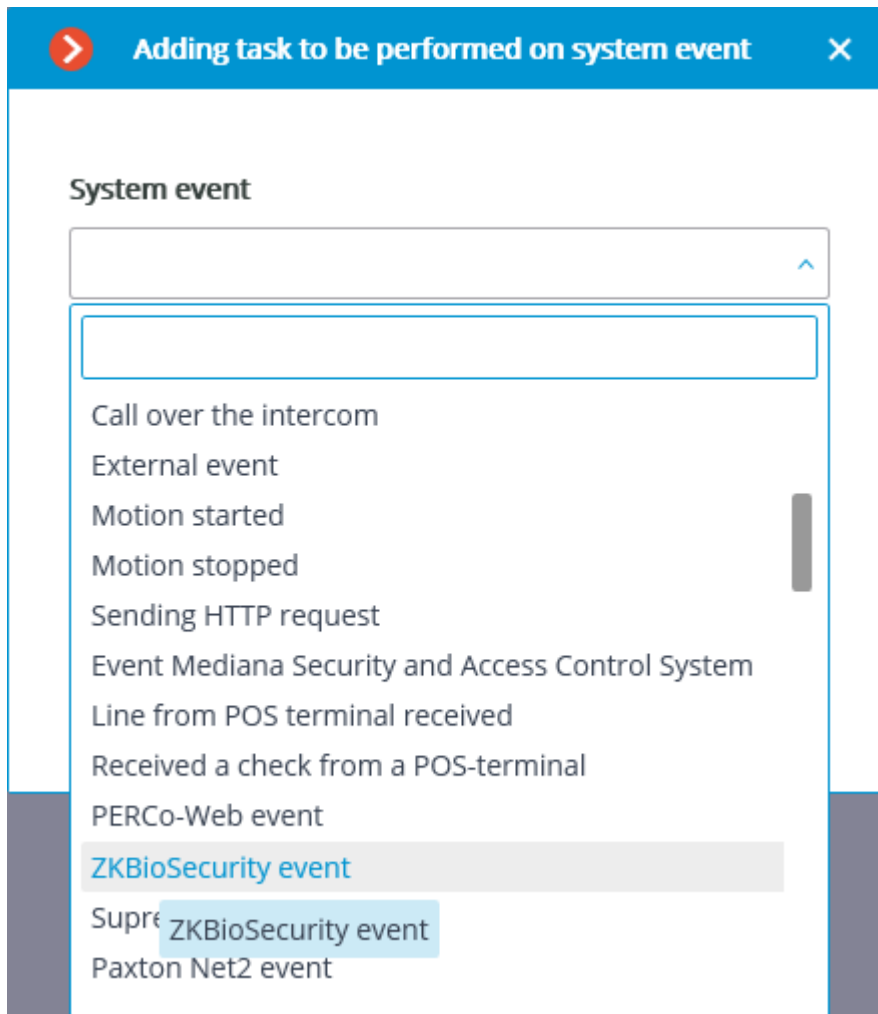

Setting up tasks by events

To configure the actions to be performed in response to events occurring in the video surveillance system, it is required to go to the **Automation** tab in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, select an individual camera or folder in the camera tree, and then, on the page that opens, go to the **Tasks by event** tab.

Any standard **ZKBioSecurity event** tasks by event can be configured.

Door data:

- Area name (Area Name), string;

- Area name (AccZone), string;
- Door name (Door Name), string.


User data:

- Employee ID (Pin), string;
- Employee (Name + Last Name), string;

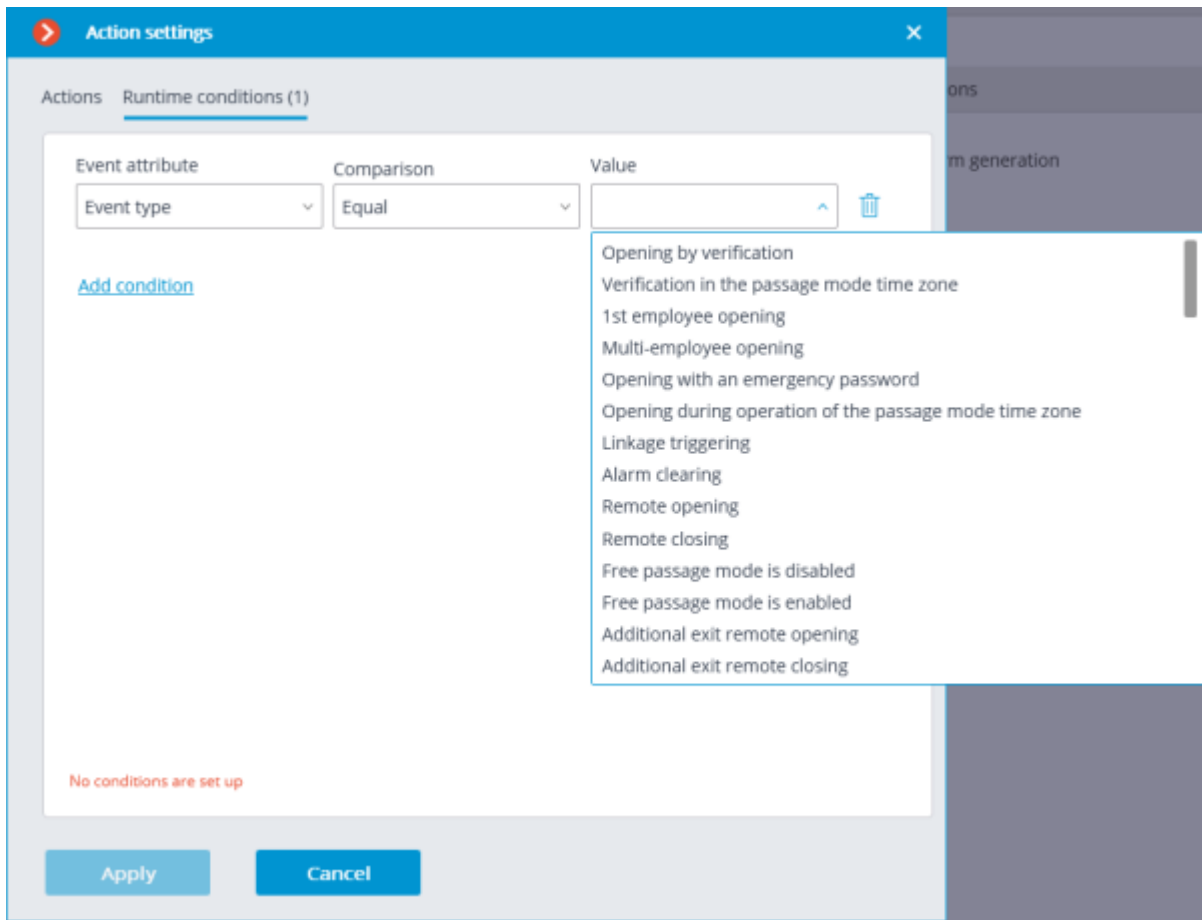

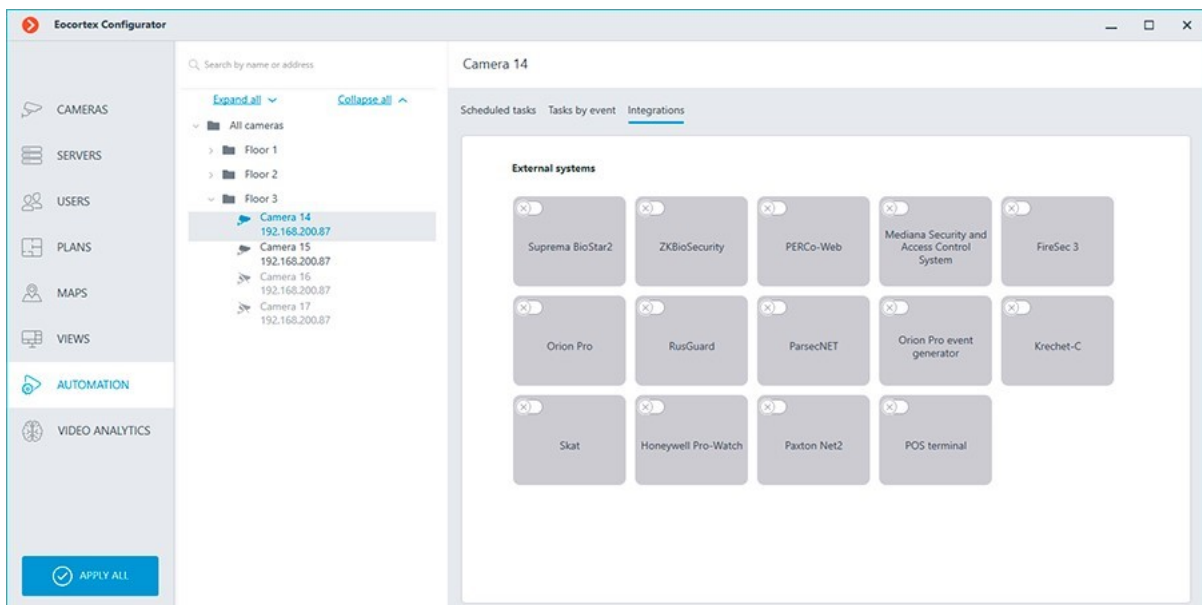

Configuring in Ecortex Configurator application

In order for the **Ecortex** server to respond to events from the **ZKBioSecurity** access control system, it is required to start the **Ecortex Configurator** application, go to the **Automation** tab, select the camera in the list, then, on the page that opens, go to the **Integrations** tab and enable **ZKBioSecurity**.



Two tabs are available in the integration settings:

General settings;

Camera settings.

General settings

The **General settings** tab is used to configure the system-wide connection to **ZKBioSecurity**.

Setting up the connection to only one **ZKBioSecurity** server is available per one server system.

The following settings are available:

Server address (IP address or URL. Prefixes as http:// are not required to be specified in this field).

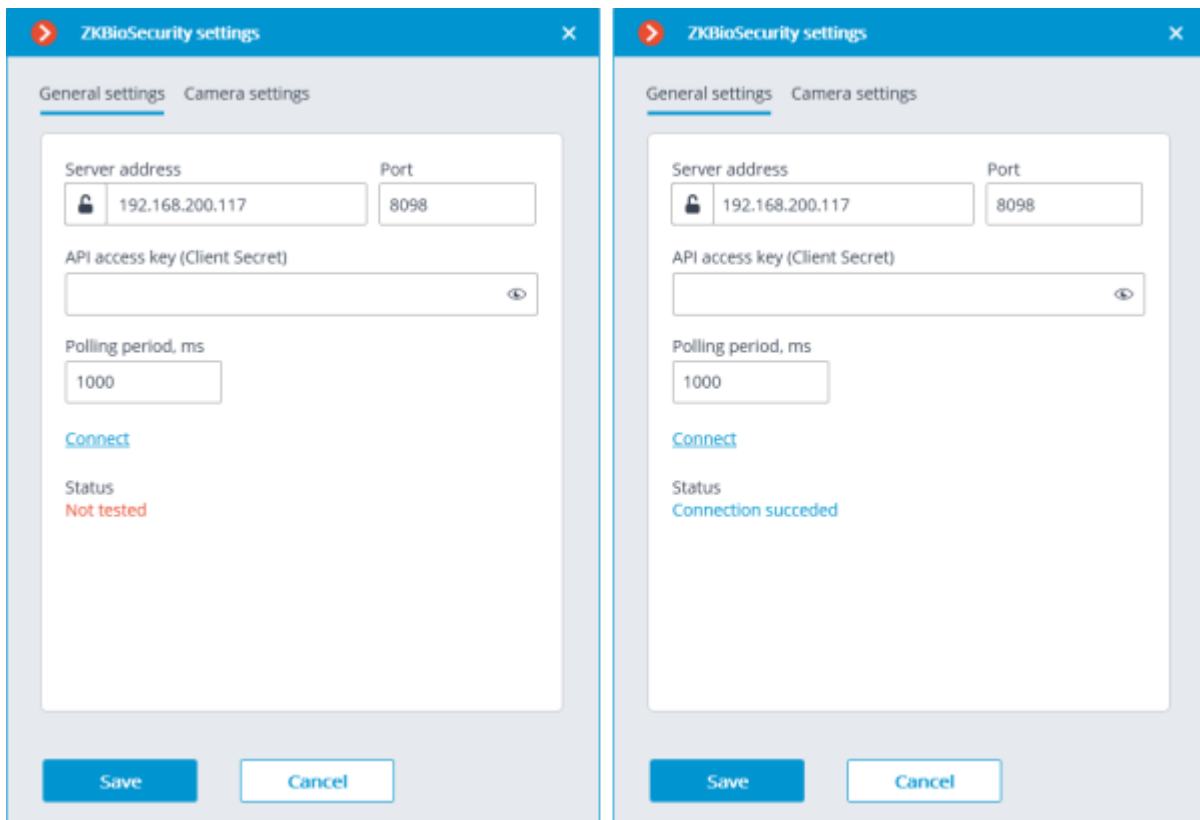
- Use of a secure connection can be set here.

Port. Interaction with **ZKBioSecurity** is performed via HTTP.

API access key (Client Secret).

After making the settings, it is required to press the **Connect** button.

The **Status** field will show the verification result.





Camera settings


On the **Camera settings** tab, it is possible to specify the devices whose events are to be received for the given camera.

By default, all the **ZKBioSecurity** events are received from all devices. Enabling integration on multiple cameras with the default setting will provide duplication of the events for all enabled cameras.

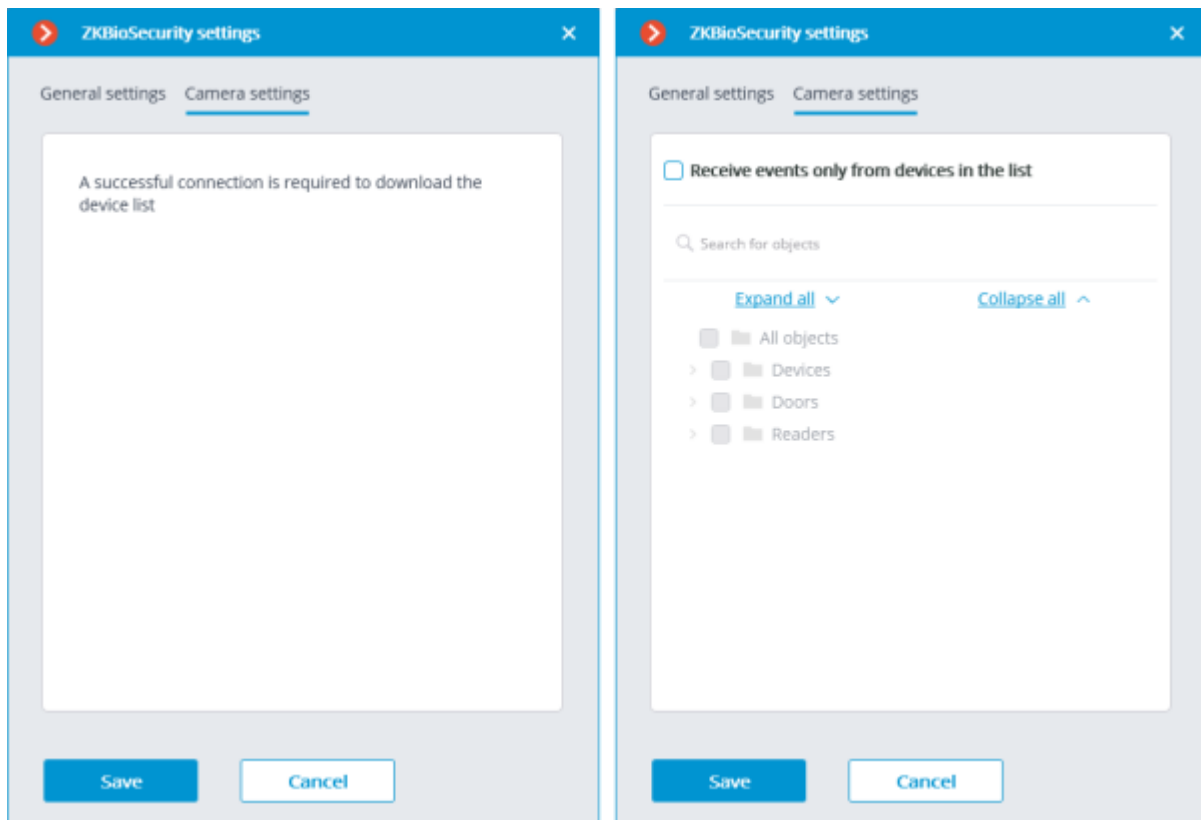
Three types of **ZKBioSecurity** objects are available for configuration (full text search is available):

Doors . A high-level object whose rules are usually configured in **ZKBioSecurity**. Usually, the door is connected to a relay and a sensor of some device. Receiving events from specific doors allows for a more precise integration.

Readers . A high-level object whose rules are usually configured in **ZKBioSecurity**. Typically, the reader is installed on doors, turnstiles and other access control points. Receiving events from specific readers allows to configure the integration more precisely.

Devices . A lower-level **ZKBioSecurity** object. Setting up the reception of events from the device permits to configure the integration more flexibly. For example, if multiple doors are connected to the same device and **ZKBioSecurity** is in the process of being set up, and the doors are being connected and disconnected, the integration settings will have to be changed frequently when setting up the reception of events from the specific doors. In the process of configuring the reception of events from a device, the integration settings do not need to be modified when new doors are being connected to the device.

Changing the names of **ZKBioSecurity** objects (devices, doors or readers) requires their manual reassignment in the device list every time. Otherwise, the events from the newly renamed object will not be registered.

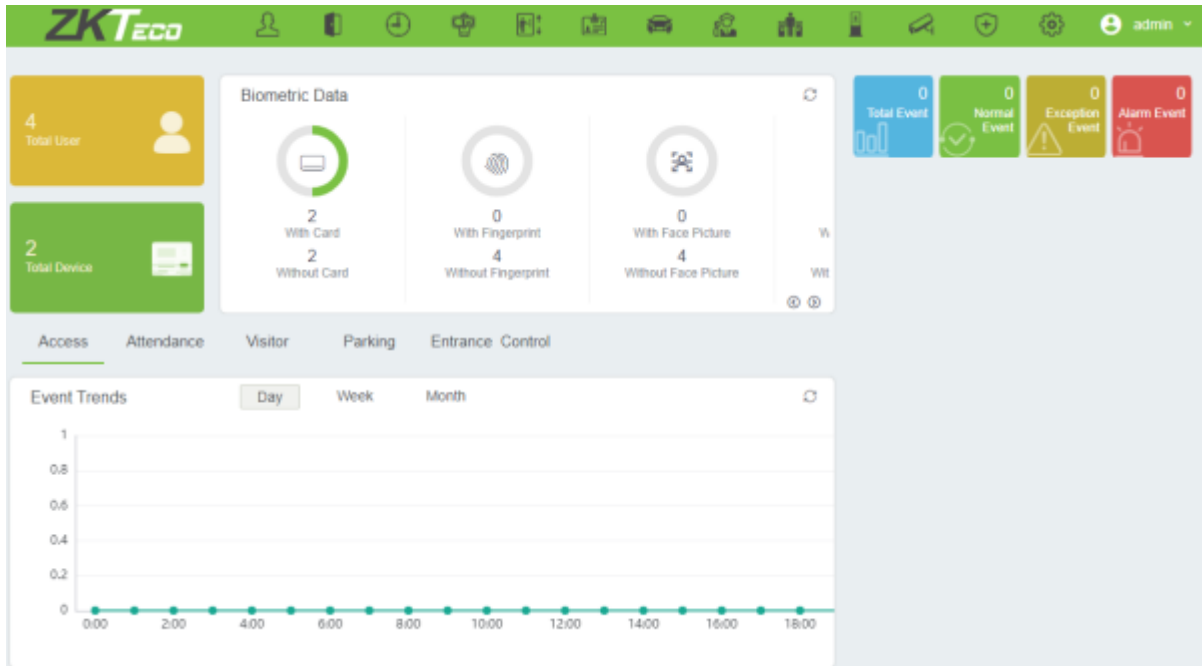

Configuring **ZKBioSecurity** for integration is performed via the web interface on the same port that is specified in the integration settings.

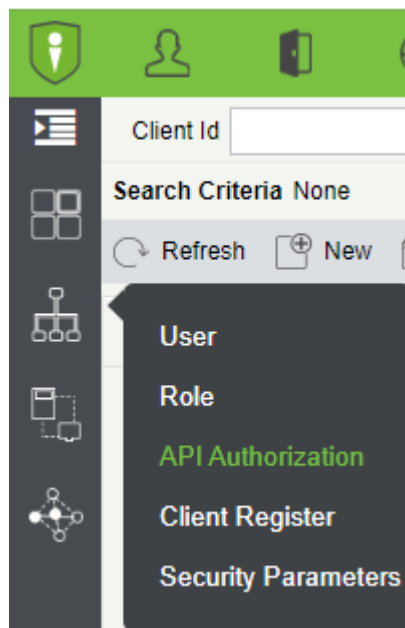





Eocortex Configurator

With the help of the **Eocortex Configurator** application, the **Eocortex** video surveillance system is set up, including license management, parameters of connected cameras, features used for the cameras, scenarios, schedules and intelligent modules, video server parameters, archive and redundancy settings, user authority, site plans, display profiles, archive bookmarks categories and other settings.

The **Eocortex Configurator** application is included in all the installation packages and is automatically installed with both server and client applications of **Eocortex**.

To work with the **Eocortex Configurator**, it is recommended to use the screen resolution of no less than 1024×768 since using the screens with lower resolution may lead to issues with displaying the application.

Below you will find the procedure to be followed after having installed **Eocortex Server** (or **Eocortex Standalone**), in order to start the full-scale work with the system.

- [Start the Eocortex Configurator application](#) stating the IP address and the network port (**8080** by default) of the server, as well as the username and password of the user with configuration privileges (by default, **root** user with the empty password).
- [Set up servers](#).
- [Set up cameras](#) (connection to cameras, archiving parameters, video analytics, etc).
- If required, [set up system user authority](#).
- [Apply settings](#) and close **Eocortex Configurator** application.
- [Install](#) and launch the **Eocortex Client** application, set up client workplace parameters, if required.

Launching Eocortex Configurator

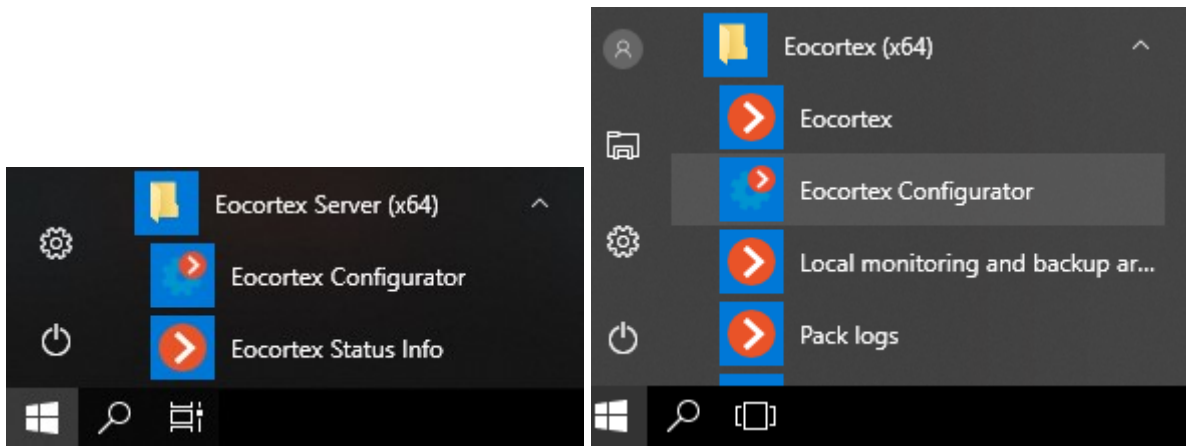
The video surveillance server (**Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone**) application to which the connection is being made must be operating at the moment of the connection.

In the course of setting up the server, the same version of the **Eocortex Configurator** application as the server version must be used.

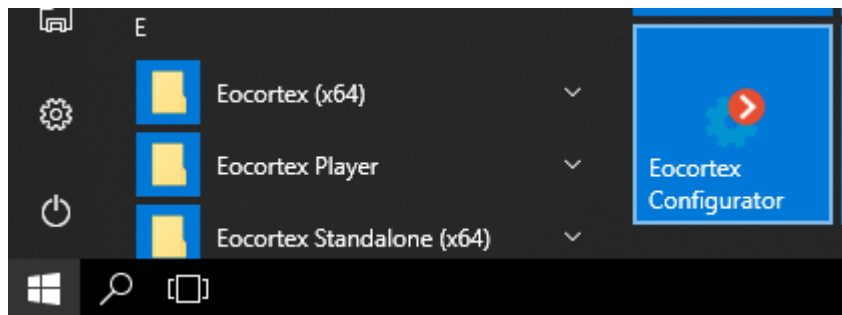
The active system configuration is stored on the **Main server**. In the event of making changes to the configuration, the **Eocortex Configurator** application automatically saves the configuration on the **Main server**, sending it afterwards to all the available member servers. Consequently, to avoid system conflicts, it is recommended to perform the connection via the **Eocortex Configurator** or directly connect to the **Main server**, or to the server that has access to the **Main server** at the moment.

There are several ways to launch the application:

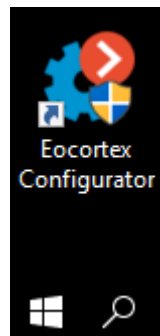




In the course of the launch, the authorization window will open. It is required to indicate the server address there in the **Server** field (or select the address in the dropdown list to the right of the input field) and the account type, username and password, then press the **Connect** button.

The authorization window will open. It is required to indicate the server address there in the **Server** field (or select the address in the dropdown list to the right of the input field) and the account type (only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA**), username and password, then press the **Connect** button.

Account type:  **Eocortex;**  **Active Directory.**

For **Active Directory** accounts, the user name is specified as: **username@domain**; where **domain** is the domain name, **username** is the name of the user in the domain. Registration under an **Active Directory** account is available not for all types of licenses.

The secure connection to the server via HTTPS is enabled by pressing  button located in the left side of the field with the server's address.

Since the capability of a secure connection to the server is set up by the system administrator on the server itself, the parameters of such connection must be obtained from the administrator.

In the cases when it is impossible to obtain the secure connection parameters from the system administrator, it is important to keep in mind that the port explicitly indicated after the two-spot in the end of the connection address line is used for the secure connection. If no port is explicitly indicated, the port **18080** will be used for the secure connection.


The system administrator can forbid the connection to the server using the insecure protocol. Such servers will always require a secure connection.

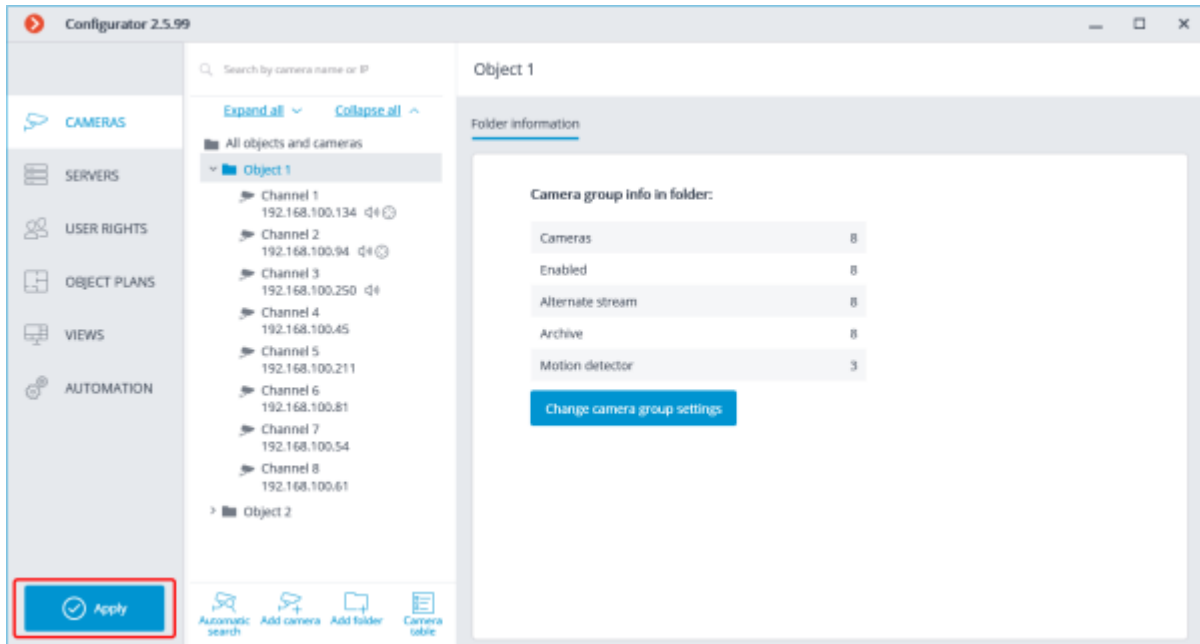
During the initial installation on the **Eocortex** server the **root** user with an empty password is created. This user has a full set of rights. In the course of setting up user authorities it is recommended to change the username and password of this user. Client connection port is **8080** by default; if required, it can be changed in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.


Following the successful authorization, the main window of the **Eocortex Configurator** application will open.

Applying settings

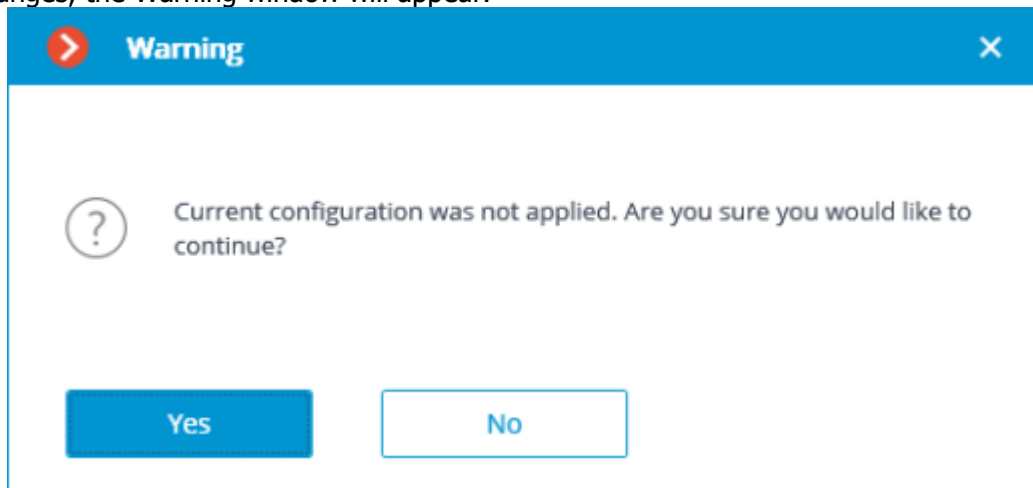
After making any changes to the settings, it is required to apply them. The new settings will be enabled only after their application.

In order to apply settings, press the  **Apply** button.



The  **Apply** button will be visible only in case there are unapplied changes in the configuration. Titles of the settings tabs with the unapplied changes are marked by an asterisk.

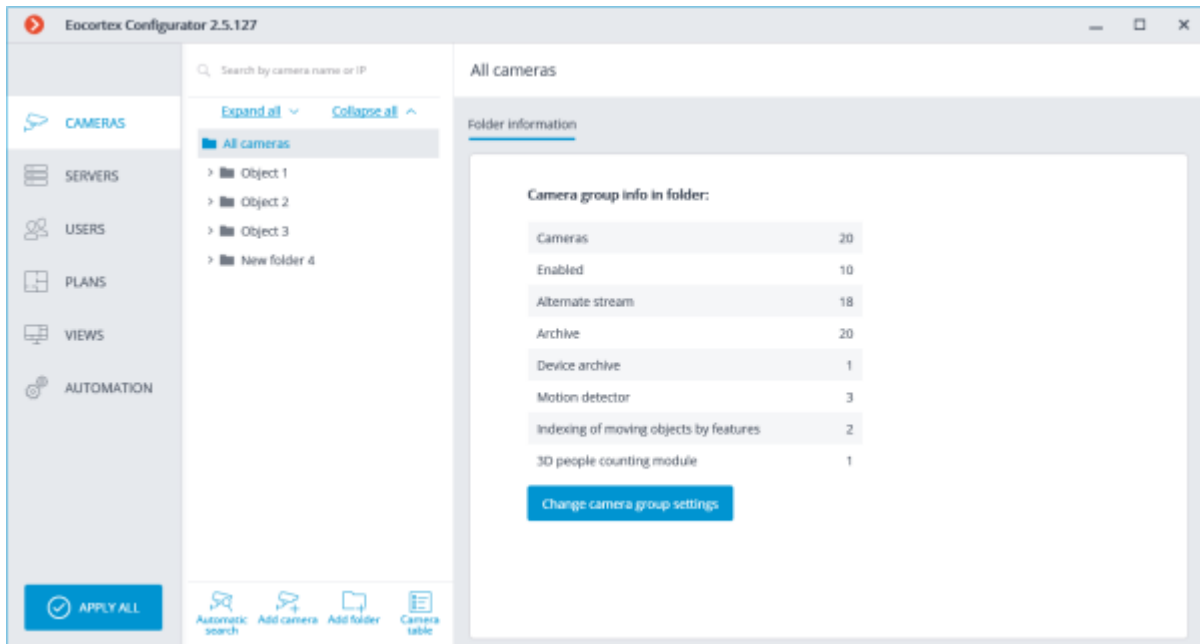
At an attempt of exiting the **Eocortex Configurator** application without applying the changes, the Warning window will appear.



In order to return and apply the changes, press the **No** button. To exit without applying settings, press **Yes**.

Cameras

For setting up cameras in the **Eocortex Configurator** application it is required to go to the **Cameras** tab. 



The **Camera** term in the **Eocortex** system has a wide meaning, because, apart from the cameras, one can connect video server and video encoder channels to the system, as well as video recorders, door phones, sound capture devices, thermal cameras, and digital to analog converters

Not all the features of the devices are supported by **Eocortex** even if such features are available in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

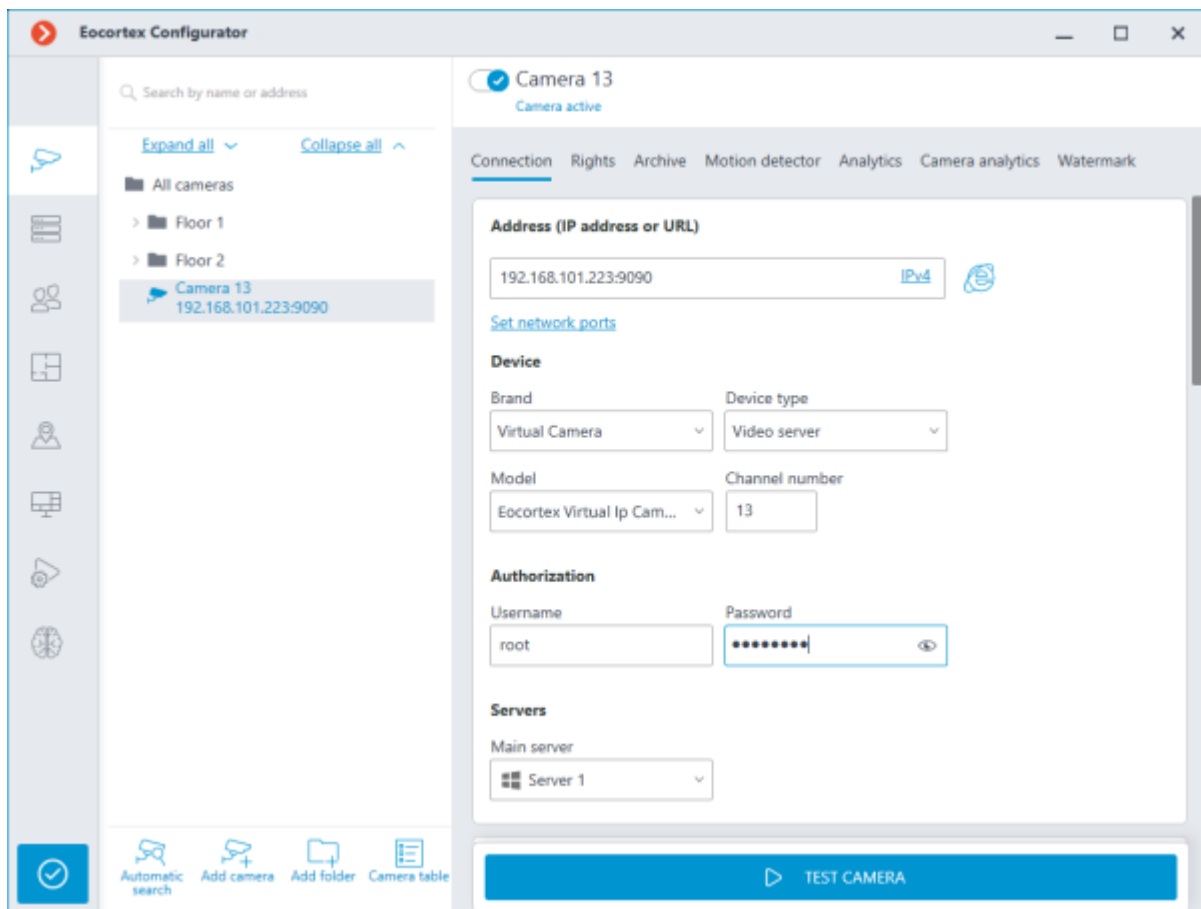

A list of supported cameras and devices can be found at eocortex.com, on the [Support / Supported Cameras](#) page. For information about support of additional camera functions (second stream, audio, PTZ, etc.), contact **Eocortex** technical support.

The list of cameras in the **Eocortex** system has a tree structure and uses **Folders** which may contain cameras or other folders. Such hierarchy is easy to use for both navigation thru the list and for grouping cameras by various characteristics.

In particular, it is possible to create a tree by the territorial principle; for example, **City / Building / Floor / Room**. Also, for convenience, on one of the levels of the tree one can group the cameras by type; for example, **Fixed, Controllable, Video recorders**. Moreover, it is possible to group the cameras based on security principles; for example, **Shared access** and **Restricted access**.

For setting up a particular camera it is required to highlight it in the tree. At that, the settings page of the camera will be displayed in the right part of the window.



In the upper part of the settings page there is a full name of the camera, including the path to it in the tree. To the left from the name there is a switch that allows to disconnect the camera from the system or reconnect a previously disconnected camera.

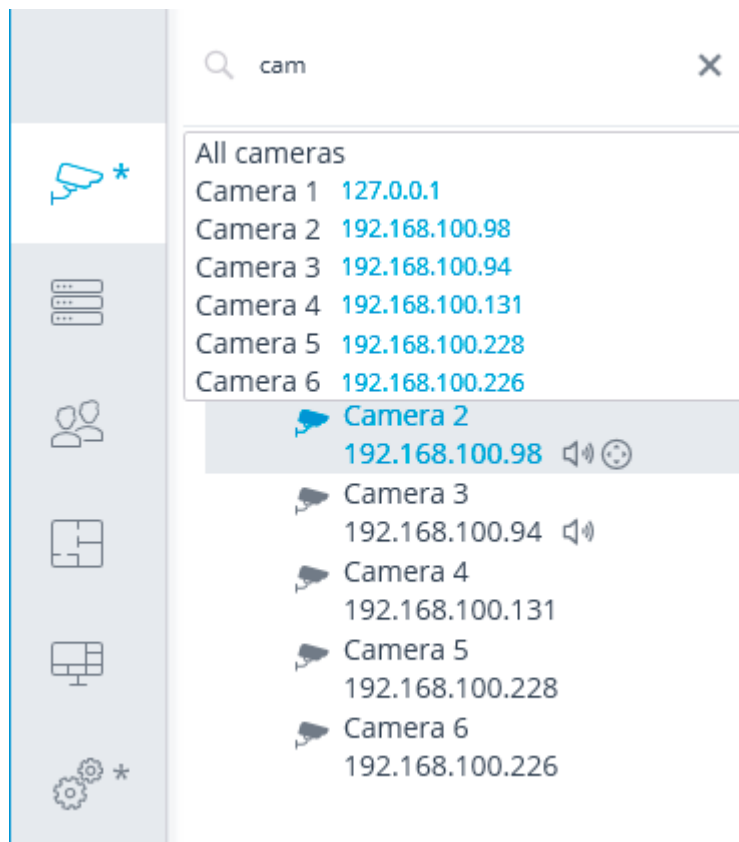
A disconnected camera, including the features used at its setup, are disregarded by the license protection.

For example, a single-server system has a license for 100 IP cameras and 2 channels with Face Recognition installed. At that, 100 cameras are connected to the server, and the Face Recognition operates on two of the channels. If 20 cameras are disconnected, including one Face Recognition channel, it will be possible to connect 20 cameras more, including one camera with Face Recognition feature.


Actions


For setting up a group of cameras located inside a folder and its subfolders it is required to select this folder in the tree and press the **Change camera group setting** button in the right side of the window on the **Folder information** tab. The [Camera group editing](#) window will open.

The search field located above the list serves for finding cameras and folders in the tree.




Listed below are the commands available during the camera hierarchy setup. All the commands are accessible from the context menu. Some commands are doubled by buttons and hotkeys.

Add folder (button ) adds a new folder to the selected current folder.

Add camera (button ) adds a new camera to the current selected folder.

Create new camera based on the highlighted one adds a new camera on the basis of the selected one.

Create a group of cameras based on the selected one: adds several new cameras in the specified range of IP addresses based on the highlighted camera.

The maximum number of cameras that can be added is 999.

In the **Initial address** field, the IP address values are automatically assigned: **IP address of the highlighted camera + 1**.

For example, if the IP address of the selected camera in IPv4 format is 192.168.10.12, the **Initial address** field will contain 192.168.10.13. It is possible to change the address if required.

The **Initial address** can be entered in two formats: IPv4 and IPv6.

If the values exceed 254, the boundary number counter is increased by 1. For example, if the specified initial address is 192.168.100.254 and the number of cameras is 2, their addresses will be 192.168.100.1 and 192.168.101.2. Addresses with 255 and 0 are ignored.

If the address of the selected camera is in IPv6 format, the next address will be specified in the initial address field, but in full format.

For example, if the address is [fe80::aecc:8eff:fe13:24f4], the settings window will show fe80:0000:0000:0000:aecc:8eff:fe13:24f5.

If the highlighted camera has a URL address, the **Initial address** field will be empty. The URL address is not copied.

Filling in the **Port** field is optional. When adding cameras, the default port will be used.

Rename (F2 shortcut or double click on the name) allow to rename the selected folder or camera. To do so, it is required to type a new name and press **Enter**.

Ctrl-drag shortcut copies the selected folder or camera.

Delete (or **Delete** shortcut) removes the selected camera or folder.

Switch off camera disconnects a camera: removes it from the system but keeps it in the tree preserving all its settings.

Switch on camera enables a camera, adding it to the system.

Move up moves camera or folder up within the parent folder.

Move down moves camera or folder down within the parent folder.

Copy to clipboard copy camera or folder to the clipboard for its subsequent pasting.

Cut copy camera or folder to the clipboard for its subsequent moving.

Paste pastes camera or folder from the clipboard.

Expand folder expands the selected folder.

Collapse folder collapses the selected folder.

Camera configuration export saves the settings of a selected camera or all the cameras and folders within the selected folder to disk. The user sets the name and location of the destination file in the process of uploading.

Camera configuration import loads the previously saved camera and folder settings from the disk. The loading is performed to the selected folder.

The loading of the camera settings file from the disk does not cause the deletion of all the current folders and cameras. Thus, if the same settings file is imported to the same folder twice, the uploaded files and folders will be duplicated.



Automatic search button performs the [automatic search](#) of the available cameras in the local network and connects them to the system.



Camera table button opens the table with the information about all the cameras connected to the system. The table can be exported in **CSV** and **XPS** formats.

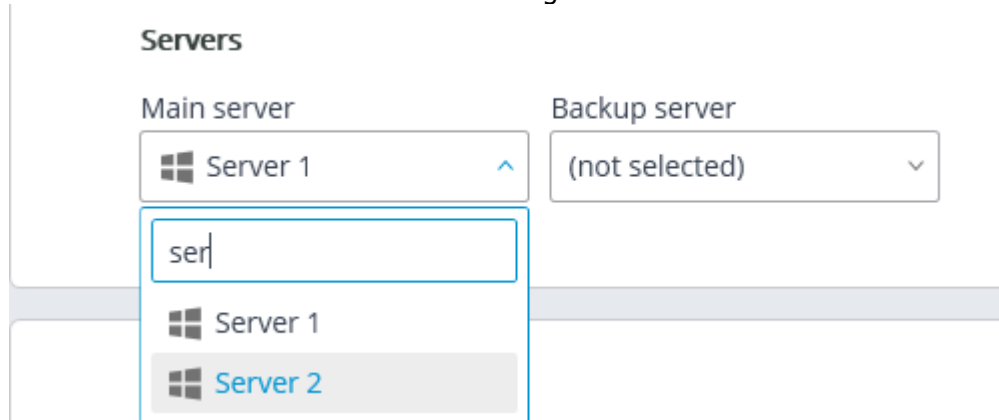
Connection setup

On the **Connection** tab, the connection to camera is set up as well as the parameters of the video streams received from the camera.

In the drop-down list, the needed position can be selected either with the mouse or with the keyboard using the up/down arrows and the **Enter** key.

If the user switch to another control during the search, then the list position that was highlighted during the switch will be used as a search result.

Address (IP address or URL)

In order to connect to a camera, it is required to indicate its **Address (IP address or URL)**. Prefixes like **http://** are not required in this field). In some cases, it may be required to state a management port / data port of the device, for example, **192.168.1.55:8000**.

If a camera supports the secure connection via HTTPS, it can be enabled by clicking on  button.

This capability is available for selected cameras.

The port indicated in the connection address field is used for the secure connection. If no port has been explicitly indicated, the port **443** will be used for secure connection.

The operability of all the utilized camera features with the secure connection is checked before starting to use such connection. The camera features whose safety cannot be verified will not work when the secure connection is established.

With the majority of cameras, all the features will work via HTTPS port with the secure connection. However, some cameras may use different ports for different functions. That is why the availability of all camera ports is verified.

Due to the above reasons, when the secure connection is used, it is recommended to check the operability of all the required camera features, such as alarm inputs and outputs, before applying the settings.


The validation of the TLS/SSL certificates used for the secure connection with the cameras is not performed. Thus, it is possible to use any certificate for the above mentioned means.


In case of using the secure connection, the connection to the camera through the server is always used.

If the **DevicePack** or the server version earlier than 2.8 is used, the secure connection will be unavailable.

If a camera is connected using the IPv6 protocol, it is required to select this protocol in the dropdown list in the right part of the **Address (IP address or URL)** field.



Pressing the  button attempts to open the camera in a web browser.

It is also necessary to set the manufacturer and the model of the camera.

The connection of cameras the manufacturers or model of which are not in the list is described in [Camera connection features](#) section.

Apart from the cameras, it is possible to connect video servers, video recorders and door phones selecting the appropriate device type.

For video servers, it is required to additionally indicate the number of a channel that the camera on this server is connected to.

Authorization

If in order to connect to the camera it is required to log in, **Username** and **Password** must be set.

Specified user must have full access to the camera.

Servers

In the multi-server system, it is required to indicate which server will be assigned as main for the given camera. In case there are redundancy licenses, it is also possible to specify a backup server for the camera.

Main server is the server that connects to the camera and processes its video and audio data, including the analysis performed by the video analytics, recording to the archive and forwarding to the client applications.

Backup server is the server that connects to the camera and processes its video and audio data in case of a failure of the main server or all of its archive drives. Switching to the backup server means that all of the video analysis modules enabled on the camera will cease to operate.

Video analytics server is a server exclusively dedicated to launching video analysis modules that process video data sent from other servers. Having said that, the video analytics server does not perform archiving of the video data being analyzed nor its broadcasting to client workplaces; these actions are performed on the general servers of a video surveillance system. Thus, the Video analytics server allows to remove the load associated with video analysis from the rest of the servers.

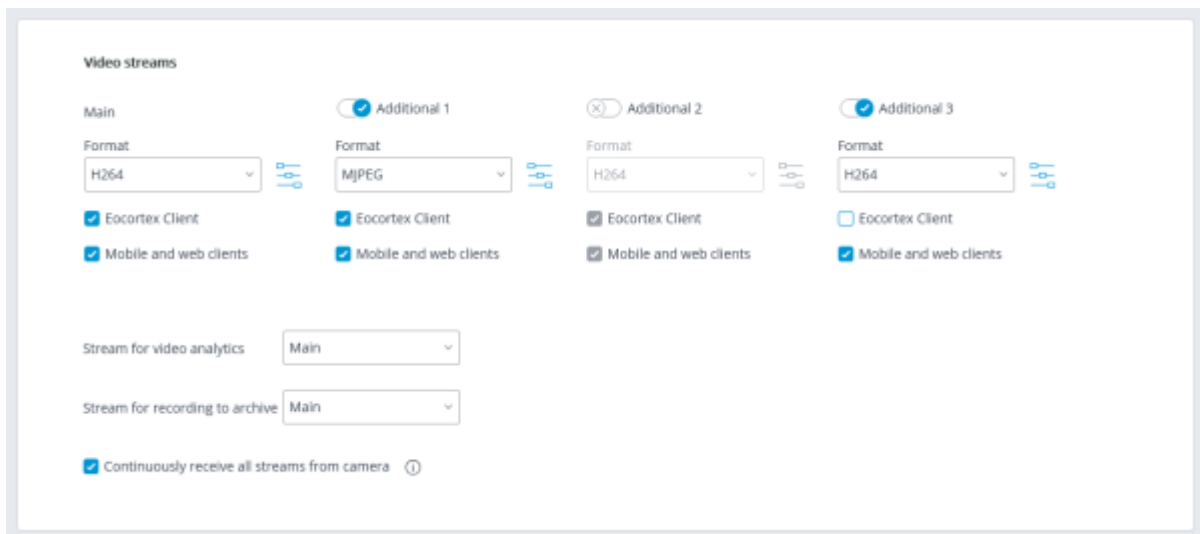

In the **Time zone** group of settings, the time zone that the camera will use in operations can be set:

Server time zone: the time zone of the server the camera is linked to will be used.

Camera time zone: the selected time zone will be used, regardless of what time zone has the server the camera is linked to.

Video streams



In the **Video streams** group of settings configuring the reception of video streams from the camera.


If the selected camera model supports additional video streams, it is possible to enable and configure them. It is required to select streams for archive recording and video analysis.

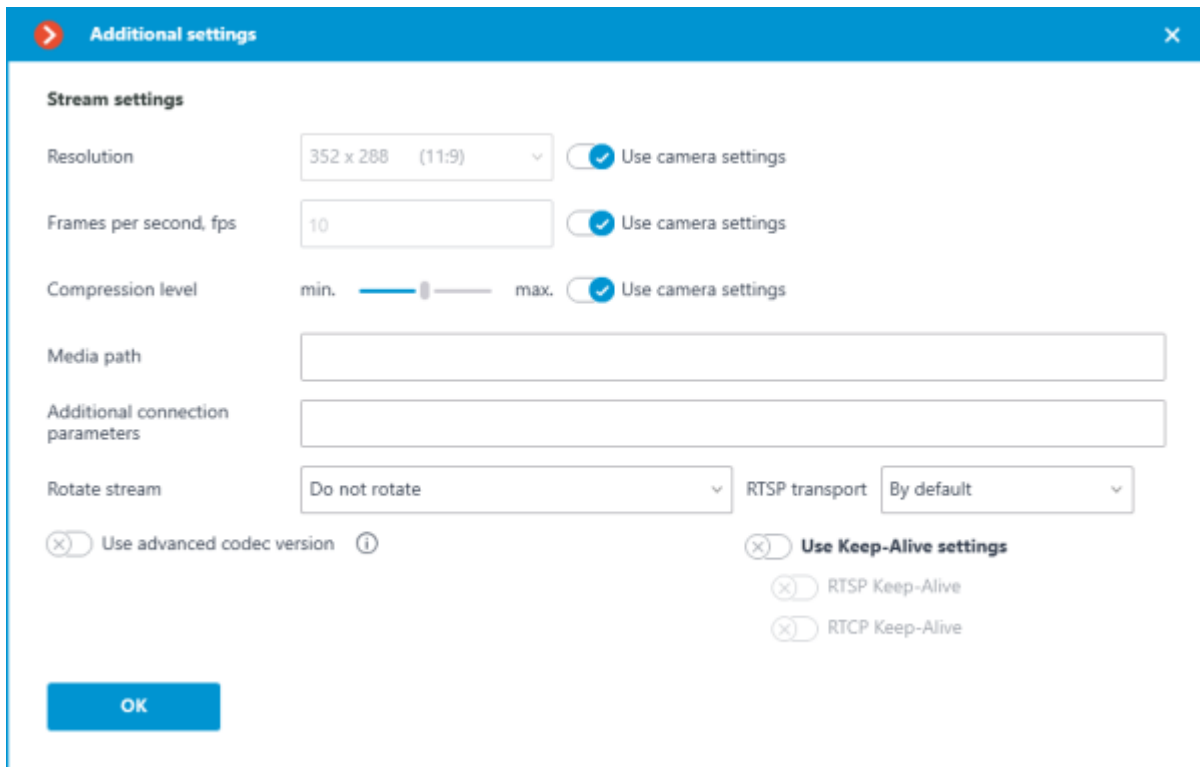
More details regarding the video streams can be found in the [Using multiple streams](#) section.

Support of three additional streams is not implemented for all the cameras: for many cameras, only one additional stream is supported; for some cameras, only the main stream can be received.

The number of additional channels that are implemented in **Eocortex** is shown in the settings, even if the camera itself supports a larger number of streams.

The streams are configured on the camera itself. In the **Eocortex Configurator**, only the reception of these streams and their use in **Eocortex** are configured.

For each video stream, a codec is specified; client applications where the stream will be used are also selected. Clicking the button  opens the window with additional video stream settings.



The parameters available in the **Eocortex Configurator** window may differ depending on the camera models.

Setting camera parameters from the **Eocortex Configurator** application is available for a limited number of camera models.

To display the **Use advanced codec version**, selected video stream must be of H.264 or H.265 codec.

There are [some requirements and limitations](#) in the use of advanced versions of codecs.

Eocortex Client option: allows you to broadcast this video stream for displaying it in the **Eocortex Client** application.

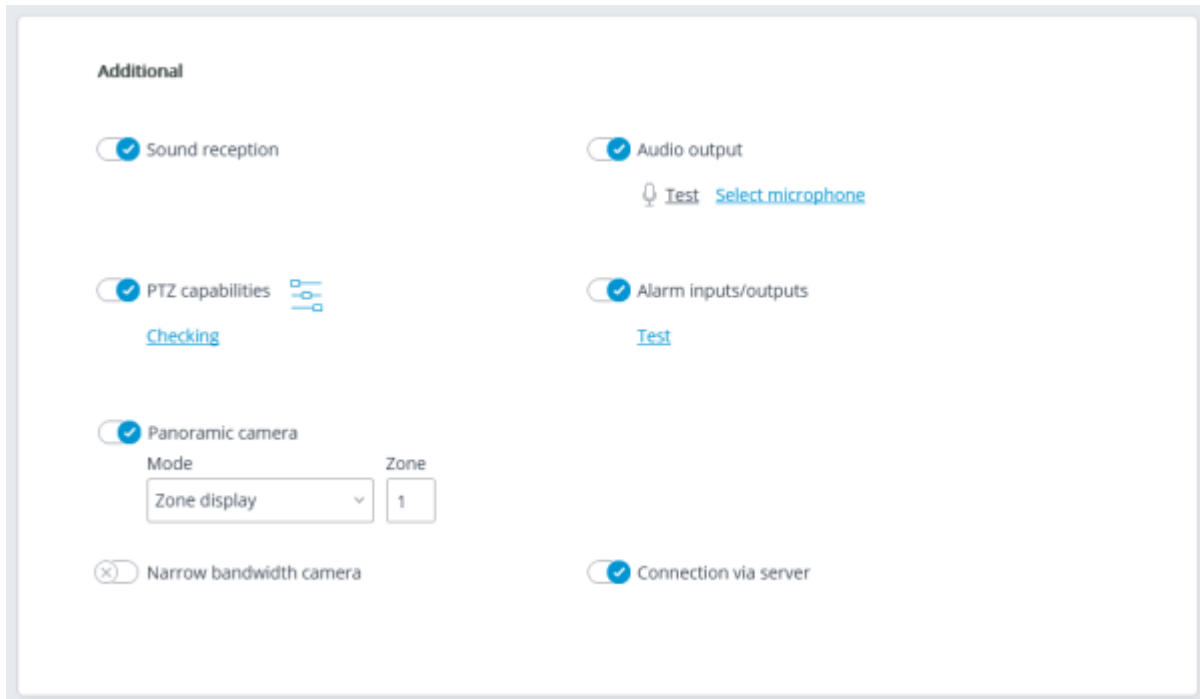
Mobile and web clients option: allows broadcasting the video stream for displaying it in the **Eocortex** mobile application and the **Eocortex Web-client**.

These options must be enabled for at least one video stream.

These options are enabled by default for all video streams.


Continuously receive all streams from camera: Constant receipt of all streams from the camera will improve the responsiveness of the interface in the clients at the expense of increasing the load on the server and network.

Additional



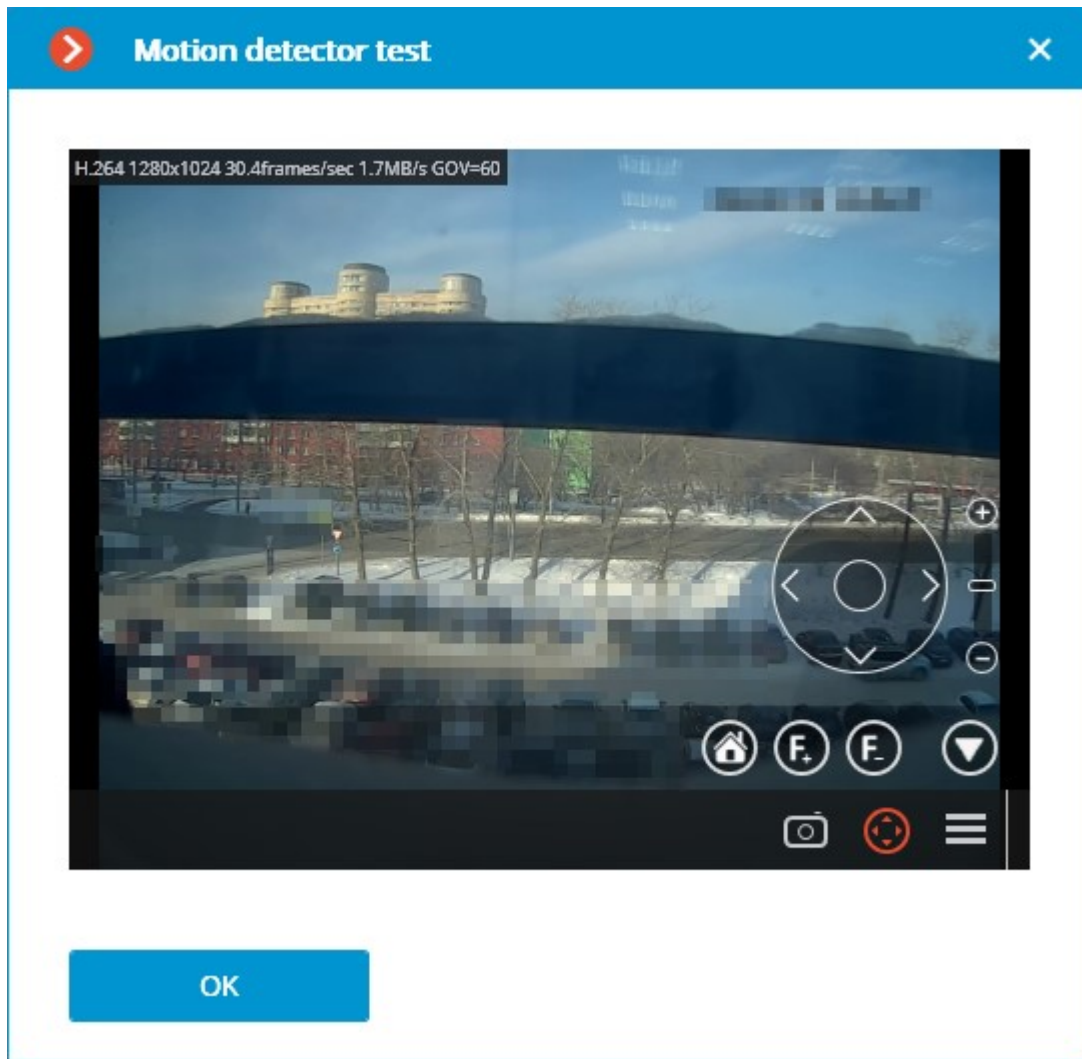
The following settings are available in the **Additional** group of settings.


Sound reception: enables the reception of sound from the camera.

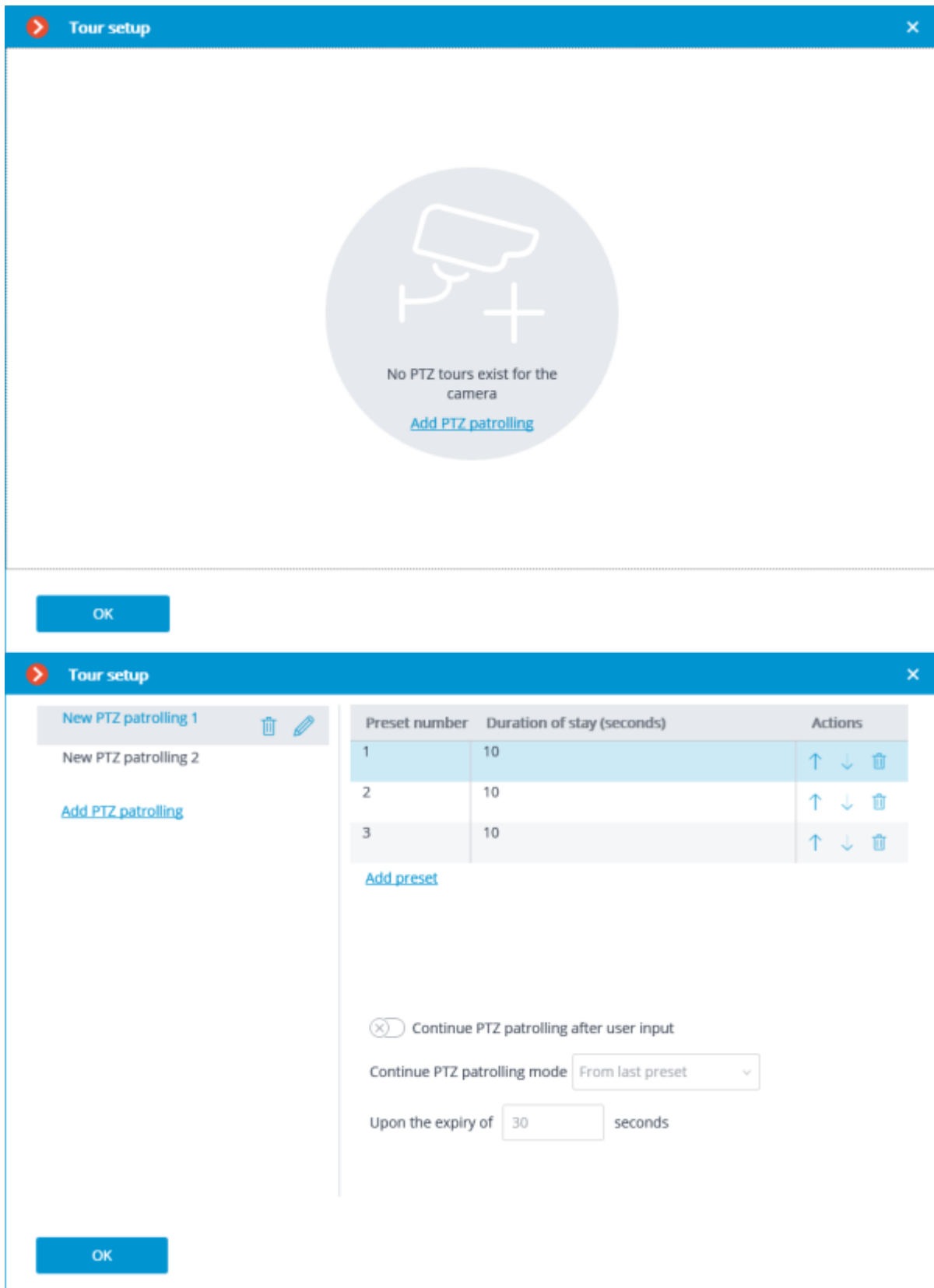
Audio output: it enables the transmission of sound to the camera. With the push of the  button, the microphone connected to a computer is switched on, allowing to test the sound transmission. The choice of a particular sound device (driver) is made following the Select microphone link.

PTZ capabilities enables the camera control features.

Test link opens the window with the test video broadcasting which contains PTZ controls.

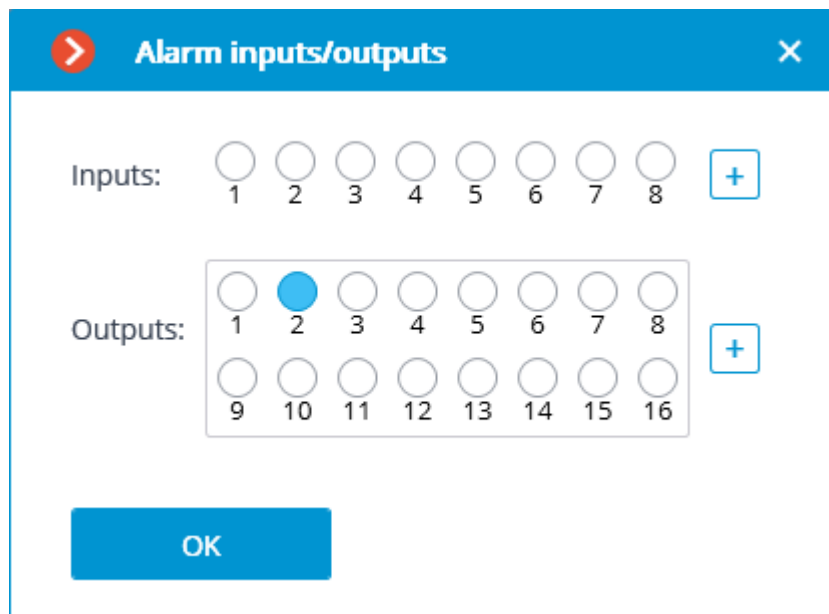


The  button opens the Tour setup (automatic patrolling) — the sequences of toggling camera presets.



Alarm inputs/outputs enables signal recording from the inputs and sending signals to the camera outputs.

The **Test** link opens the camera inputs and outputs window. When signals are sent to the inputs, the corresponding indicators will be highlighted in the **Inputs** line. For sending signals to the inputs it is required to click on the corresponding indicator in the **Outputs** line. By default, 8 input and output indicators are displayed; to have more inputs or outputs displayed, press **[+]** located to the right of the corresponding indicator block.



PTZ capabilities: allows to select the display modes available for the particular model.

If a position is selected in the **Model** field that corresponds not to a particular camera model but to a model range, the **PTZ capabilities** option will be available on the condition that the PTZ camera feature support is implemented for at least one model from the selected range. That is why the **PTZ capabilities** option is to be switched on only if the connected camera really is a PTZ one.

Narrow bandwidth camera: enabling this option will increase the time of waiting for the camera signal.

Connection via server: when this option is enabled, the video streams to the client workplaces will be transmitted through the server.

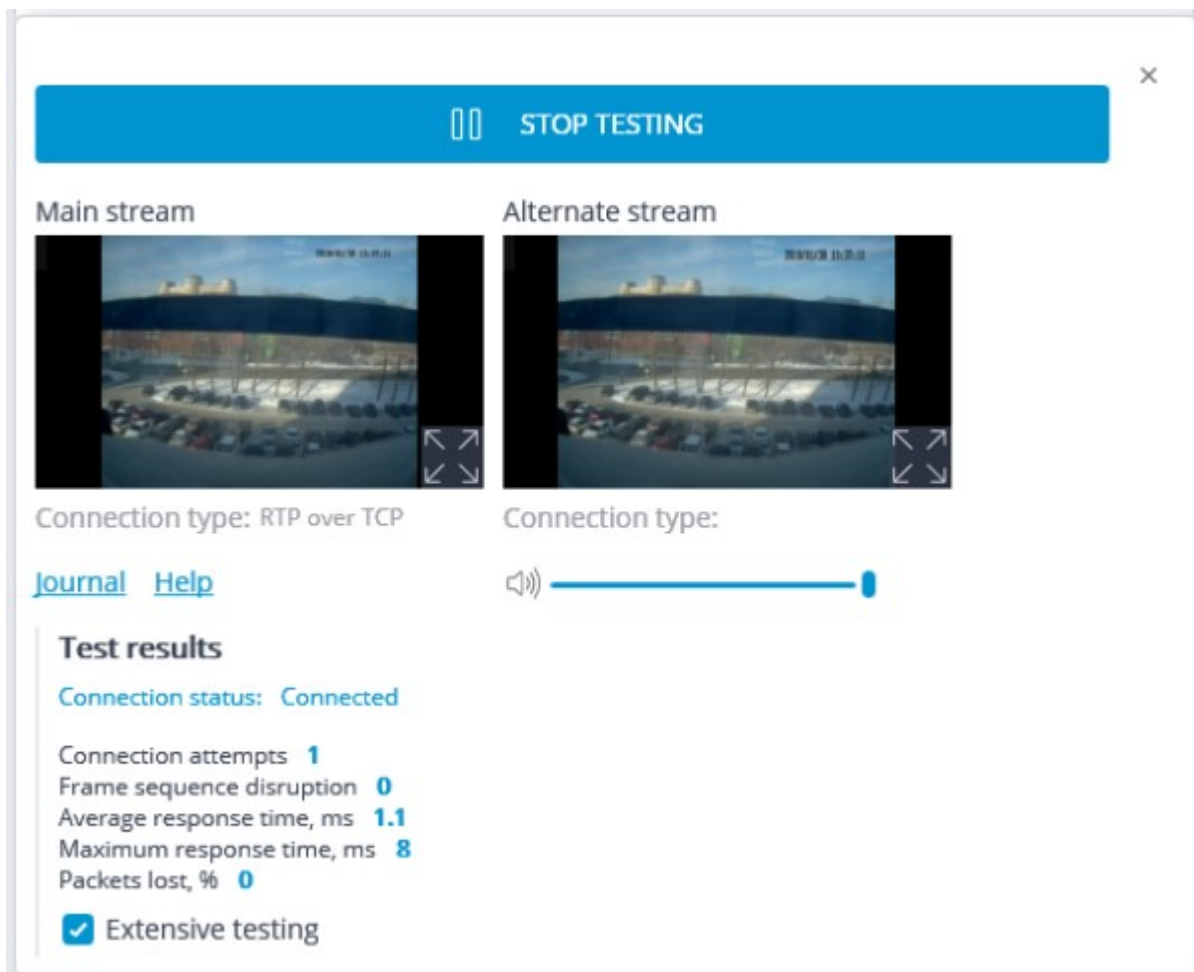
Some cameras have a limitation of the quantity of simultaneous connections, or they lower the frame transmission frequency when several simultaneous connections are in place. Thus, the connection through server ensures only one connection to the camera for any quantity of the client workplaces.

Test camera

Pressing the **Test camera** button initiates an attempt to connect to the camera with the current parameters.




The connection status will be displayed in the test window. The test connection events are available in the log at the corresponding link.




Camera connection features

The list of cameras supported by **Eocortex** grouped by their manufacturers can be found on [eocortex.com, Support / Supported Cameras](http://eocortex.com/Support/Supported%20Cameras) page.

The adjustments of the connection of cameras to the **Eocortex** server is made via **Eocortex Configurator** application, on the  **Cameras** / [Connection](#) tab.

If a camera manufacturer is not present in the **Brand** dropdown list, it is recommended to do the following:

Press the  **Automatic search** button. If the camera appears in the [list of detected cameras](#) and **ONVIF** is available for it, it is required to mark the camera, enable the **Automatic setup** option and press the **Add device** button. The camera will be added to the list and automatically set up. If after doing the above the image from the camera is not received, enter the login and the password and perform the setup manually.

If the camera has not been found by the automatic search, try to connect it using the standard protocols, selecting one of the standards in the **Brand** field (**Model** field will be filled in automatically).

- If the camera supports **ONVIF** or **PSIA** standards, it is required to manually indicate its address, login/password, select its manufacturer and set other parameters.
- If the camera supports **HTTP** connection for receiving **Motion JPEG**, or **RTSP/RTP** connection for receiving MJPEG, it is required to select **HTTP (MJPEG) device** or **RTSP/RTP device**, correspondingly, in the **Brand** field, and set a connection string in the **Address (IP address or URL)** field. The connection string depends on the camera model and is usually indicated in the documentation or on the manufacturer's web site. Login and password are set in the connection string

or in the corresponding fields (depending on the connection method implemented in the particular model).

If the manufacturer of the camera is in the **Brand** dropdown list, but the camera model is not in the **Model** dropdown list, try to connect to the camera using other models of the same manufacturer. For some manufacturers, the model ranges, series, or generations of cameras are indicated rather than camera models. For some manufacturers there is only one position in the list – that means that all the models use the same driver, or only a certain series/model of the manufacturer's devices is supported.

If the above connection method has failed, try to connect the camera choosing one of the standard protocols in the **Brand** field: **ONVIF**, **PSIA**, **HTTP (MJPEG) device** or **RTSP/RTP device**.

Using multiple streams

The majority of modern IP cameras support broadcasting two or more video streams simultaneously. This permits to record frames to the archive in high quality and display lower quality video in client applications, significantly reducing the load on the hardware.

In the **Eocortex** terminology, the first stream broadcast by the camera is called the **main stream**, and the rest are **additional streams**.

When using multiple streams the **Eocortex** server writes the main stream to the archive by default.

When displaying video from the camera broadcasting multiple streams in the client application, the stream with the resolution closest to the size of the window in which this stream will be shown is selected for displaying on the screen by default.

Using server and client settings, can to change the terms of use and display of streams.

When using a software motion detector, it is possible to choose which stream will be analyzed. If no other video analytics is used for the camera besides the software motion detector, it is recommended to use a lower resolution stream for analysis since this can significantly reduce the server load.

However, if other video analytics is used for the camera in addition to the software motion detector, in most cases it is recommended to use a high-resolution stream for analysis. This is primarily due to the fact that low resolution may not be sufficient for analysis.

For analysis and for recording to the archive the same stream should be used, otherwise in the archive will be incorrect the coordinates of the objects detected by video analytics.

Settings on camera

Despite the fact that **Eocortex** can work with one or multiple streams from cameras of any resolution, it should be borne in mind that the load on the **Eocortex** server largely depends on the parameters of the streams received from the cameras. It is also important to consider the specifics of setting up and functioning of **Eocortex** applications.

For most cameras, the parameters of the broadcast video and audio streams should be set on the camera itself, using the camera's web interface. An exception is made for certain brands and models of cameras, for which the parameters of video streams can be set in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

The list of terms that can be found in camera settings can be found below.

Stream

Possible names of the option: Stream, Channel

Stream means the video data transmission channel from the camera.

Eocortex supports receiving up to four streams from one source at the same time, in the camera settings these streams can be identified as:

First, Main

Second, Sub, Additional, Additional 1, Alternative, Alternative 1

Third, Additional 2, Alternative 2

Fourth, Additional 3, Alternative 3

For most devices, the **Stream** option is used to enable and select a channel to configure other broadcast settings.

Codec

Possible names of the option: Codec, Format, Video format, Compression format, Coding format, Encoding mode

Codec means a compression and decoding algorithm used to reduce the amount of data to be transmitted and stored.

Eocortex supports the following codecs:

MJPEG (Motion JPEG) — the standard with the lowest compression rate among the supported ones. The stream is composed of a series of JPEG images containing the full frames of the scene. Compared to other standards, it has the lowest demands on the resources of the decoding device, while at the same time requiring the largest channel width and disk space for storing the archive.

MPEG-4 (MPEG-4 Part 2) — the standard that provides a moderate compression rate, i.e. for the same image quality the channel width and archive size will be much smaller than that of **MJPEG**, while the resource consumption during decoding will increase insignificantly. The stream is composed of the reference frames (I-frames), containing full image of the scene, separated by a sequence of intermediate frames (P- and B-frames), containing only the moving part of the frame and object motion compensation data for predicting future frames. The prediction method causes moving objects to be visually blurred when viewed in slow motion and on pause. Modern cameras rarely use **MPEG-4** — instead, they use the more advanced **H.264**.

H.264 (MPEG-4 Part 10, AVC) — the standard that can be called as a successor of **MPEG-4**. With improved stream conditioning and next-frame prediction algorithms, it provides higher compression ratio and better quality of intermediate frames than its predecessor. This reduces the amount of transmitted and stored data of the same image quality by increasing resource consumption during processing compared to **MPEG-4**.

H.265 (HEVC) - the standard that can be called as a successor of **H.264**. Because of its more efficient encoding algorithms compared to its predecessor, it provides an even greater reduction in the amount of transmitted and stored data at the cost of increased resource consumption during data processing compared to **H.264**.

MxPEG — proprietary standard developed and applied by Mobotix. It is a sort of combination of **MJPEG** and **H.264** standards: each frame of the stream is an independent frame, but only part of the frames contains the full image of the scene, while most of the frames contain only the changed fragments. This approach reduces motion blur on fragmented frames, while the resource requirements for transmission, storage and stream processing are in between of **MJPEG** and **H.264**.

H.264+, **H.265+**, **WiseStream**, **Zipstream**, **Smart Stream** — standards that are enhanced versions of **H.264** and **H.265** with improvements to various algorithms of the original codecs. Most often presented in the camera interface as an option of the original codec, rather than a standalone codec. They allow to reduce the bitrate without a noticeable loss of quality, reducing the load on the network and decreasing the size of the archive. The higher compression rate compared to the original codecs also implies higher resource requirements for decoding.

Requirements and limitations of extended codec versions usage:
Limitations have an impact when the GOV is greater than 350

- Periodic lags may occur when viewing the archive.
- When the number of cameras with a high GOV value is large, a lot of video data is kept in RAM. This can lead to high CPU resource consumption.
- Lags may occur when positioning in the archive.
- When viewing live video, the **Waiting** message before playback starts may be displayed longer than usual. This happens when the **Connect via server** option is enabled in the camera settings. If this option is disabled, the **Eocortex Client** application connects directly to the camera and the video is displayed almost without delay.
- The higher the GOV value and the lower the frame rate, the more the archive is being decimated. In some cases, applying the second decimation stage is pointless.
- When playing back a camera archive recorded with a high GOV value, it is necessary to have the **Use advanced codec version** option enabled in the additional stream settings even if the camera is currently set to a low GOV.

The higher compression of the video, the smaller the amount of data to be transmitted and stored, but the greater the resource consumption for video decoding when playing back and processing with video analytics modules.

Compression

Possible names of the option: Compression, Compression level, Quality, Quality level

All supported video formats provide the ability to adjust the balance between the quality of the frame and its bit rate. This setting can be represented in a camera settings as one of the following options:

Compression rate — the parameter that determines the degree of detail reduction of the frame.

Quality level — the opposite parameter to the compression rate, determining the remaining details of the frame.

The parameter values can be specified as a percentage of the source image (e.g., Quality=90%) or as levels predefined by the camera manufacturer (e.g., in the range from 0 to 12).

Both parameters are responsible for reducing the detail of the frame, the difference is in the method of applying the selected value: while the **Compression rate** indicates how much the detail is to be reduced, **Quality level** indicates how much the detail is to be preserved. For example, setting **Compression=30%** is the same as setting **Quality=70%**.

Depending on video surveillance conditions and camera hardware features, an acceptable compression level can be from 30 to 60%, although options from 0 (minimum compression) to 70% (high compression) are possible. The real compression rate should be set based on the visual evaluation of the resulting image quality.

Resolution

Possible names of the option: Resolution, Image size, Image quality

Resolution — the parameter that determines the detail of the frame by specifying the number of color dots (pixels) that form the image. Depending on the camera model, this setting can be expressed as a direct comparison of the number of dots in the horizontal and vertical direction (1920x1080), the absolute number of dots in the image (2 Mpix) or as a standard name (FullHD).

The higher the resolution, the greater the detail in the frame and the higher the resource consumption in transmitting, storing and processing it.

Eocortex has no limitations on this parameter except those imposed by the standard itself. However, a low resolution can make it impossible for video analytics modules to analyze the frame, while a high resolution may result in increased resource consumption when decoding an overly detailed frame.

Frame rate

Possible names of the option: Frame Rate, Frame frequency, Frames per second, FPS

Frame Rate — the parameter indicating the number of frames per one second of video.

The higher the value of this parameter, the smoother the motion in the video, but the higher the resource consumption in transmission, storage, and processing.

Eocortex has no limitations on this parameter except those imposed by the standard itself. However, a low frame rate can cause lags when playing video and make it impossible for video analytics modules to analyze the stream.

Profile

This option is mostly available only for the H.264 codec

Possible names of the option: Profile

Profile — a set of settings and restrictions in the codec algorithms application, providing compatibility of stream compression and decoding on different devices. The selected profile also determines the initial video compression rate, which determines resource consumption during transmission and decoding.

Eocortex supports the following profiles:

Baseline (BP) — profile that assumes minimum video compression. Compared to other profiles, it provides the lowest resource consumption during decoding at the expense of increasing the amount of data for transmission and storage.

Main (MP) — profile that assumes a balance between resource consumption in decoding, transmitting and storing data.

High (HP) — profile that assumes maximum video compression. Compared to other profiles, it provides the lowest load on the network and storage disks at the expense of increased resource consumption during decoding.

Bitrate

This option is mostly available only for the H.264 codec

Possible names of the option: Bitrate

Bitrate — the parameter that defines the amount of information transmitted by the camera per unit of time. Measured in bits per second (bits/c, bps), as well as derived values with kilo- (kbit/s, kbps), mega- (Mbit/s, Mbps), and similar prefixes.

Eocortex has no limitations on this parameter except those imposed by the standard itself. However, a low bitrate value can cause a significant degradation of image quality, especially in a high activity scene.

Bitrate type

This option is mostly available only for the H.264 codec

Possible names of the option: Bitrate type

Bitrate Type — the parameter that determines how to control the amount of data transmitted.

Variable Bit Rate (VBR) — type of bitrate with a dynamic amount of transmitted data. It provides the specified parameters of the video stream, while the used channel width can vary. This mode is recommended to use in most cases, if there are no problems with network bandwidth.

Constant Bit Rate (CBR) — type of bitrate with a static amount of transmitted data. It provides a specified channel width, at the same time, depending on the implementation in the given camera model, some parameters of the video stream can be changed and, as a result, the quality of the image may be reduced. This mode is recommended for use only when there are problems with network bandwidth.

GOV

This option is mostly available only for the H.264 codec

Possible names of the option: GOP, GOV, Group of Pictures, Group of Video, Group of VOP, I-frame

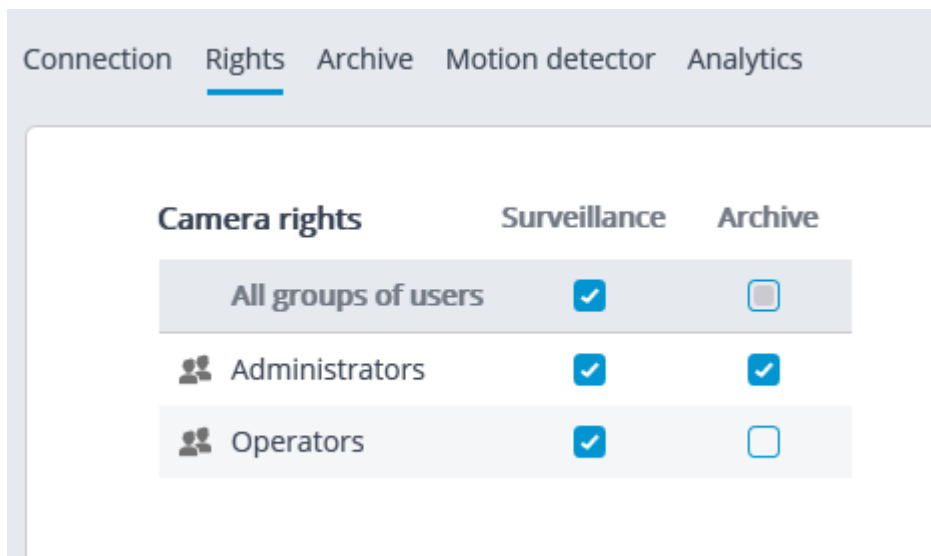
GOV — the parameter that defines the length of the group of frames (the distance between the reference frames).

For example, with a GOV of 50, there will be one reference frame for every 50 frames transmitted (i.e., there will be 49 intermediate frames between the nearest reference frames); with a GOV of 25fps and a GOV of 50, there will be one reference frame every 2 seconds. The higher the GOV, the smaller the video stream bitrate, but the greater the memory and CPU consumption. The reason is that to decode each subsequent frame, the reference frame and all subsequent intermediate frames must be stored in memory until the next reference frame.

Eocortex has no limitations on this parameter except those imposed by the standard itself. However, a high GOV value may cause video playback lags and inability to analyze the stream by analytics modules, while a low GOV value will increase the load on the network and the archive. For example, with a GOV of 1, **H.264** is no different than **MJPEG**.

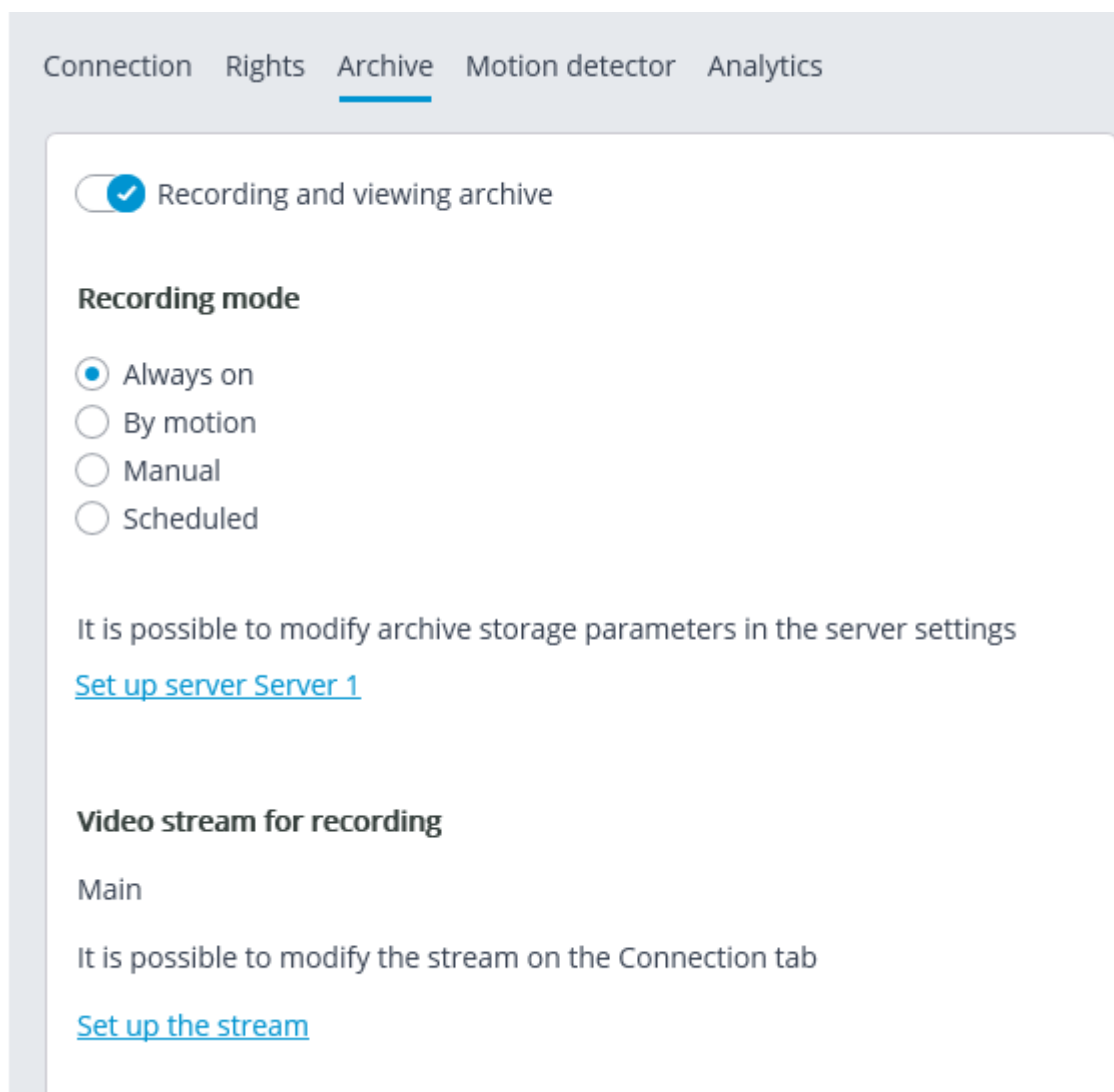
Access rights settings

The **Rights** tab allows to set up camera access rights.



Setting up the archive

On the **Archive** tab you can set up the parameters of writing camera audio and video to archive as well as the parameters of interaction with the archive located on camera.



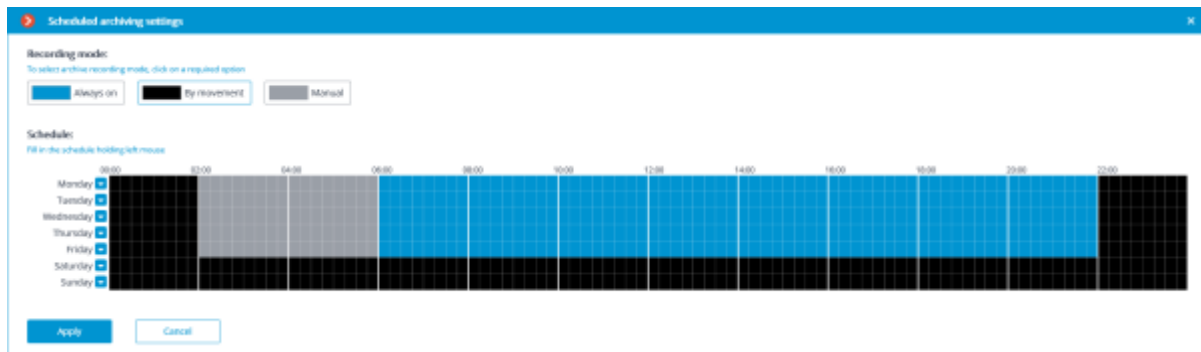
Below you will find a description of controls located on the tab.

Recording and viewing archive: enables recording the video and audio from a camera to archive.

Recording mode: allows to select one of the modes explained below.

- **Always on:** continuous recording to archive is performed.
- **By motion:** recording to archive is performed only when motion is detected in the frame (also when a set sound level is exceeded in case a sound detector is enabled). Moreover, the operator can start the recording to archive forcibly even if there is no motion in the frame.
- **Manual:** enabling and disabling recording to archive is done by the operator only.
- **Scheduled:** allows to flexibly set up modes of recording to archive.

Set schedule: opens the schedule.



In the Schedule window, select one of the modes by clicking the corresponding rectangle in the upper part of the window. Then by holding left mouse button select the periods when the chosen mode will be active. The corresponding periods will be colored accordingly.

For setting a mode for the whole day you can select it in the dropdown list located to the right of the day of the week.

Video stream for recording: allows to choose which stream will be recorded to archive. This setting is available only when receiving two streams from camera is enabled.

Recording only key frames to archive: when this option is enabled for MPEG-4, H.264 and H.265 codecs, only the key frames will be recorded, but for MJPEG codec the required frame rate is stated in the **Record speed** field.

If for MJPEG codec the frame rate of the camera is lower than the one stated in the **Record speed** field, all frames will be recorded to archive.

For MJPEG codec, **Recording speed limitation** option is shown.

Additional

Since the sound is not decimated during the recording to archive, it will be available only for the archive recorded without recording speed limitation.

Recording speed limitation influences the quality of video playback from archive and the archive volume: the decimated video recording played back from the archive will be less smooth, but the archive drive space will be saved.

Sometimes there appears a necessity to enable recording without speed limitation only during a specific period of time or as a response to a specific event, and record a decimated video at all other times. In this case, it is required to set up the **Scheduled tasks** or **Tasks by event** using **Disable frame skipping when recording to the archive**.

Sound recording: enables recording sound to archive.

In order to have sound recorded to archive, enable **Sound recording** on the **Connection** tab.

Prerecording and **Post recording:** using these sliders, you can set short periods of time during which the recording to archive will be performed before the start of the event that triggers the recording and after the start of the event that triggers stops the recording, accordingly. For example, **Prerecording** is performed when movement or exceeding of a preset sound level is detected, and **Post recording** is made after the motion has stopped and the sound level drops below the preset level.

Archive storage time: in this group of settings you can set minimum and maximum archive storage time.

Generally, the minimum and maximum set archive storage time for each camera assigned to server is analyzed, and an attempt is made to provide for the limitations indicated in the settings. In case it turns out to be impossible, the older recordings from all the cameras will be erased to make room for the archive.

If the archive decimation is configured in the system and there is not enough disk space for storing the undecimated archive, the decimation process will start. The values of the archive decimation settings will be used as the archive storage time. This setting can be disabled by turning off archive thinning.

Usage of archive on data storage card: enables access of **Eocortex** applications to the data storage card on the camera.

Synchronizing with main archive: if this option is enabled, the archive from camera will be downloaded to **Eocortex** server, but only of those periods when no connection with camera was available or the server was down.

The archive for a required period may be absent on the camera's memory card. It happens, for example, when there is no motion, if a motion detector on the camera is used for recording. In this case the archive on the server will be empty.

For **ULTRA** and **Enterprise** licenses, the Archive Decimation with Time Setting feature is available, which allows you to reduce the size of the archive after a specified interval.

The archive decimation operation can be executed in one or two stages: for example, recording is performed with an original frequency of 30 fps; in 7 days it is resampled down to 5 fps; and in 30 days - down to 0.5 fps (1 frame per 2 seconds).

When enabling archive decimation with time setting, all the archived recordings whose depth exceeds the depth of the undecimated archive specified in the settings will be deleted. The same will happen when the depth of the undecimated archive is modified.

E.g.: initially, the archive decimation with time setting is disabled; the specified maximum time of archive storage is 180 days.

If the first decimation stage is enabled and the time of storage of the undecimated archive is set to 30 days, the archive with the depth of more than 30 days will be deleted at the moment the settings are applied.

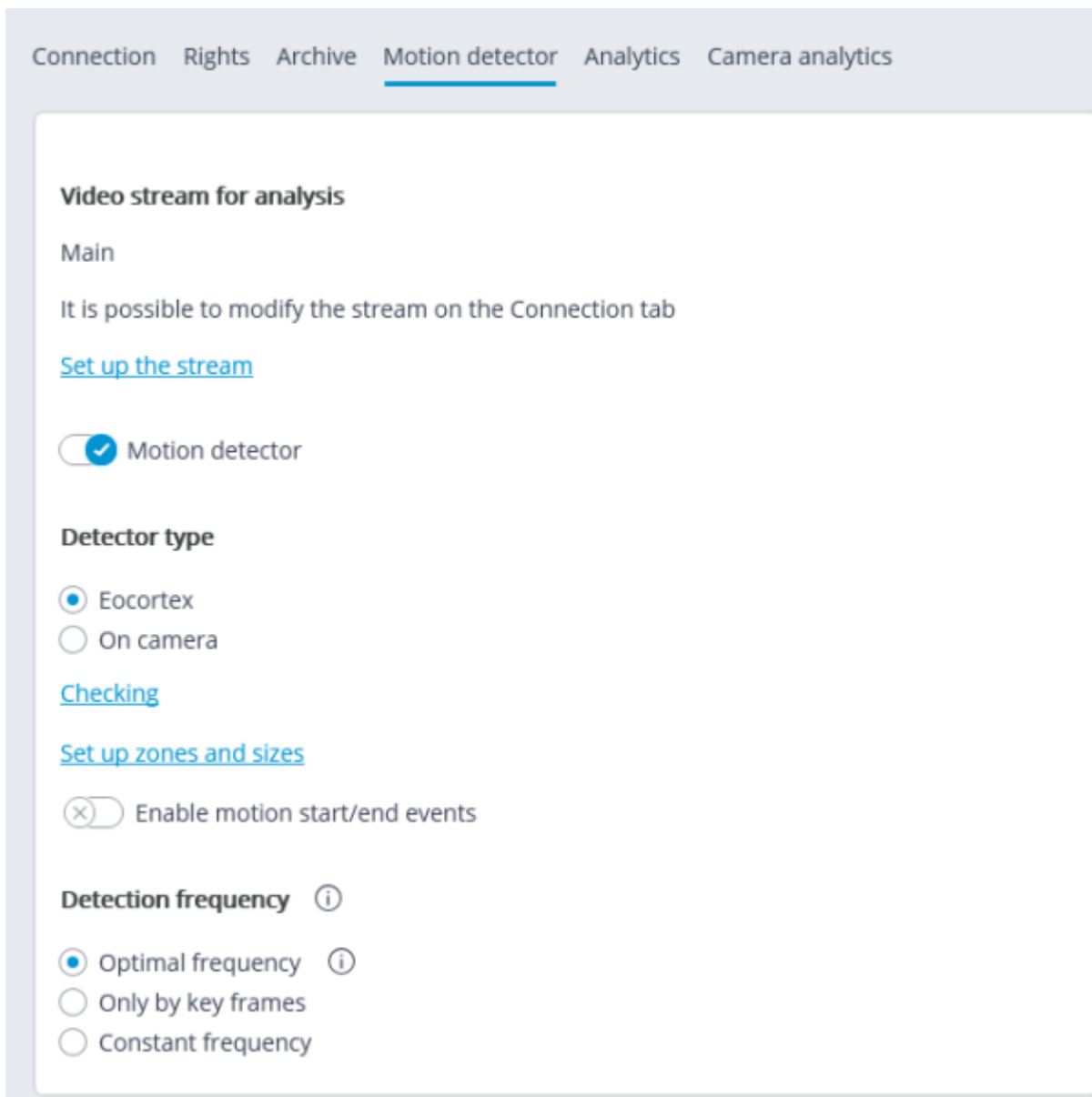
If subsequently the depth of the undecimated archive is set to 7 days, the archive with the depth of more than 7 days will be deleted at the moment the settings are applied.

For the MPEG-4, H.264 and H.265 codecs, only the reference frames will be recorded.

In case of playback of the archive in **Eocortex Client**, archive fragments, which have been decimated with time, will be displayed by the shaded area on the timeline.

Motion detector setup

Motion detector parameters can be set up on the **Motion detector** tab.



Below is the description of controls located on the tab.

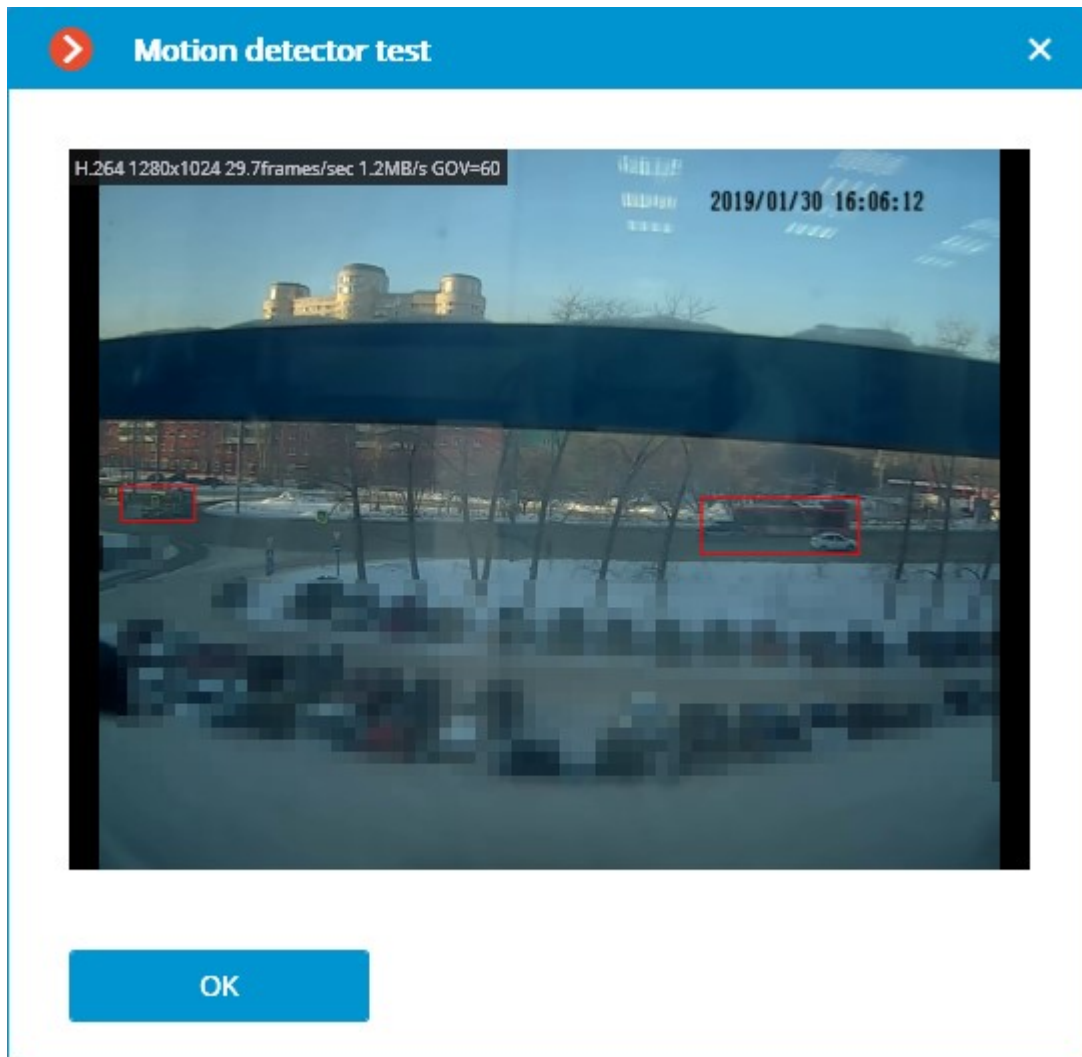
Motion detector: enables motion detector support.

Detector type: determines which motion detector will be used:

- **Eocortex:** software motion detector on **Eocortex** server.
- **On camera:** camera inbuilt motion detector.

When using the motion detector built into the camera, the **Eocortex** video analytics becomes unavailable.

The **Test** link opens the window of motion detector check.



Video stream for analysis: determines which stream will be used for software motion detection on **Eocortex** server.

Recommendations for choosing a stream for analysis, on a condition that the main stream has higher resolution than the alternative one; for example, the resolution of the main one is 1920x1080, the alternative - 640x480:

Alternative: no intelligent modules are used apart from the **Eocortex** software detector.

Main: at least one additional video analytics module, including the external ones, is used in addition to the **Eocortex** software detector.

The **Set up zones and sizes** link will open the window of setting up detection zones and minimum sizes of the objects to be detected.

Generate motion start/end events: enables generation of the corresponding events, for example, for using them in scenarios.

Detection frequency: determines the frequency of video stream analysis for detecting motion in the frame:

- **Optimal frequency:** video stream analysis and motion detection will be performed with the frequency set automatically in accordance with the following rules:
- If at least one video analysis module is enabled on the camera, the analysis will be performed with the frequency of 10 fps;
- If no video analysis module is enabled on the camera, the analysis will be performed with the frequency of 5 fps for MJPEG, and for H.264, H.265 and MPEG-4 the frequency will be chosen automatically within the range of 0.4 - 5 fps.
- **Only by key frames:** only the key frames will be analyzed for H.264, H.265 and MPEG-4 codecs.
- **Constant frequency:** the analysis will be performed with the set frequency.

Motion detector setup recommendations

The software motion detector analyzes the video stream received from the camera and, in case of detecting motion, generates the corresponding system event, based on which, for example, a recording to archive is started.

The motion detector consumes certain system resources of the server: loads up the processor, uses the RAM memory. At that, it can be estimated that the consumption of system resources is proportional to the resolution and frame rate. For example, for a video stream with a resolution of 1920x1080 with the use of motion detector, the processor load is approximately 6 times higher than for the 640x480 video stream. Likewise, when the analysis is performed with the frequency of 25 fps, the consumption of system resources is 4 times higher than when the analysis is performed with the frequency of 6 fps.

At the same time, triggering the recording by the motion detector allows to reduce the archive volume because the recording is performed only when there is motion in the frame.

To avoid the situation when the software motion detector is triggered by such insignificant movements as those of leaves, birds etc. it is possible to set it up for detecting the movement of the objects bigger than the preset size.

The software motion detector must be enabled on the following analysis modules:

- **Sabotage Detector;**
- **Loud Sound Detection;**
- **Auto Zoom;**
- **Tracking;**
- **Search for Objects;**
- **People Counting;**
- **Crowd Monitoring;**
- **Face Detection;**
- **Traffic Density Heat Map;**
- **Personnel Activity Monitoring;**
- **Uniform Detector;**
- **Shelf Fullness Check;**
- **License Plate Recognition (Complete);**
- **License Plate Recognition (Light).**

Many cameras have their own, inbuilt motion detectors (in **Eocortex** terms – Camera motion detector). When the camera motion detector is used, the system resources of the server are practically not consumed.

If it is planned for the camera to perform continuous recording to archive and it is not planned to use video analytics modules, the use of the software motion detector is not recommended. Instead, it is sufficient to select the mode of continuous recording to archive. Such situation is possible when, for example, there is motion that happens 24/7: during the continuous manufacturing process, at a large railway station etc.

If the camera is equipped with the inbuilt motion detector and it is not planned to use video analysis modules, it is recommended to enable the camera motion detector. It allows to lower the server load and reduce disk space usage at the same time.

That said, in some situations it is preferable to use software motion detector, for example, when there are many cameras of the same type and when setting up a motion detector on each camera would be too time-consuming. In such a case it is easier and faster to enable the software motion detector for a group of cameras, or set up one camera and copy its settings many times, changing only the network address.

In **Eocortex**, it is also possible to set up the combined mode of recording to archive (in **Eocortex** terms, the **Scheduled mode**). For example, there is constant movement at the entrance of a shopping mall from 10:00 to 22:00, but at other times there should be no movement. In such a case, it is possible to set up the recording as follows: from 10:00 to 22:00 – continuous recording (this will reduce server load); from 22:00 to 10:00 – motion detection-triggered recording (this will save disk space).

By default, the frequency of checking video stream for the presence of motion in the frame, which is called detection frequency, does not match the frame rate of the video stream: most of the time, the detection frequency is lower than the video stream frame rate. It is done to reduce the consumption of resources by **Eocortex** server. This mode is called detection with optimal frequency.

At the same time, it is possible to set constant detection frequency in the software motion detector settings in the **Eocortex Configurator** application. It is advisable to use this mode when the optimal detection frequency is a priori lower or higher than the one required and sufficient for analysis, or when it is necessary to set the fixed frequency for H.264, H.265 or MPEG-4 formats. The analysis frequencies recommended for a particular video analytics module are stated in the documentation for each module.

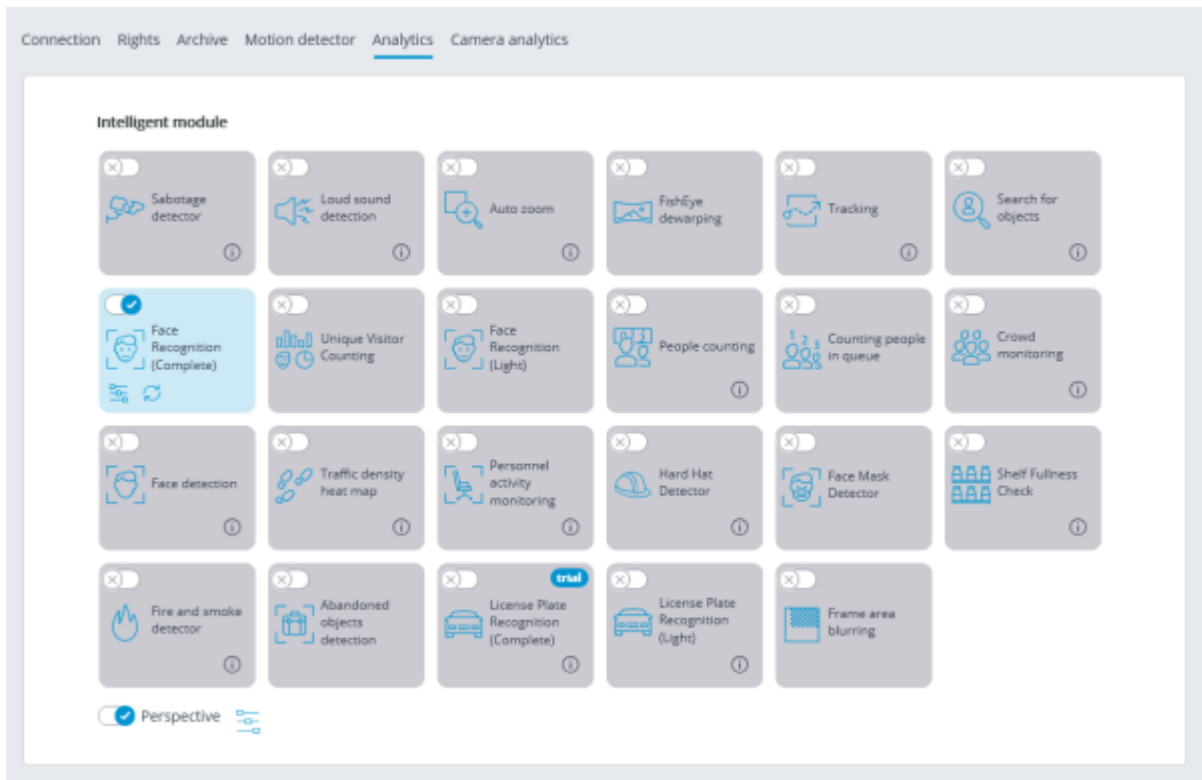
When multiple streams from a camera are used, the motion is by default detected on the first additional stream.

At the same time, in the software motion detector settings of **Eocortex Configurator** application it is possible to select which stream will be used for analysis on the camera.



If no other video analytics modules are used except for the software motion detector, it is recommended to use lower resolution stream for detection because it allows to decrease server load significantly.


Video analytics setup



On the **Analytics** tab the video analysis modules are set up.




On this tab, the settings of all the existing **Eocortex** video analysis modules are displayed, regardless of the presence of licenses for particular modules on the present server.

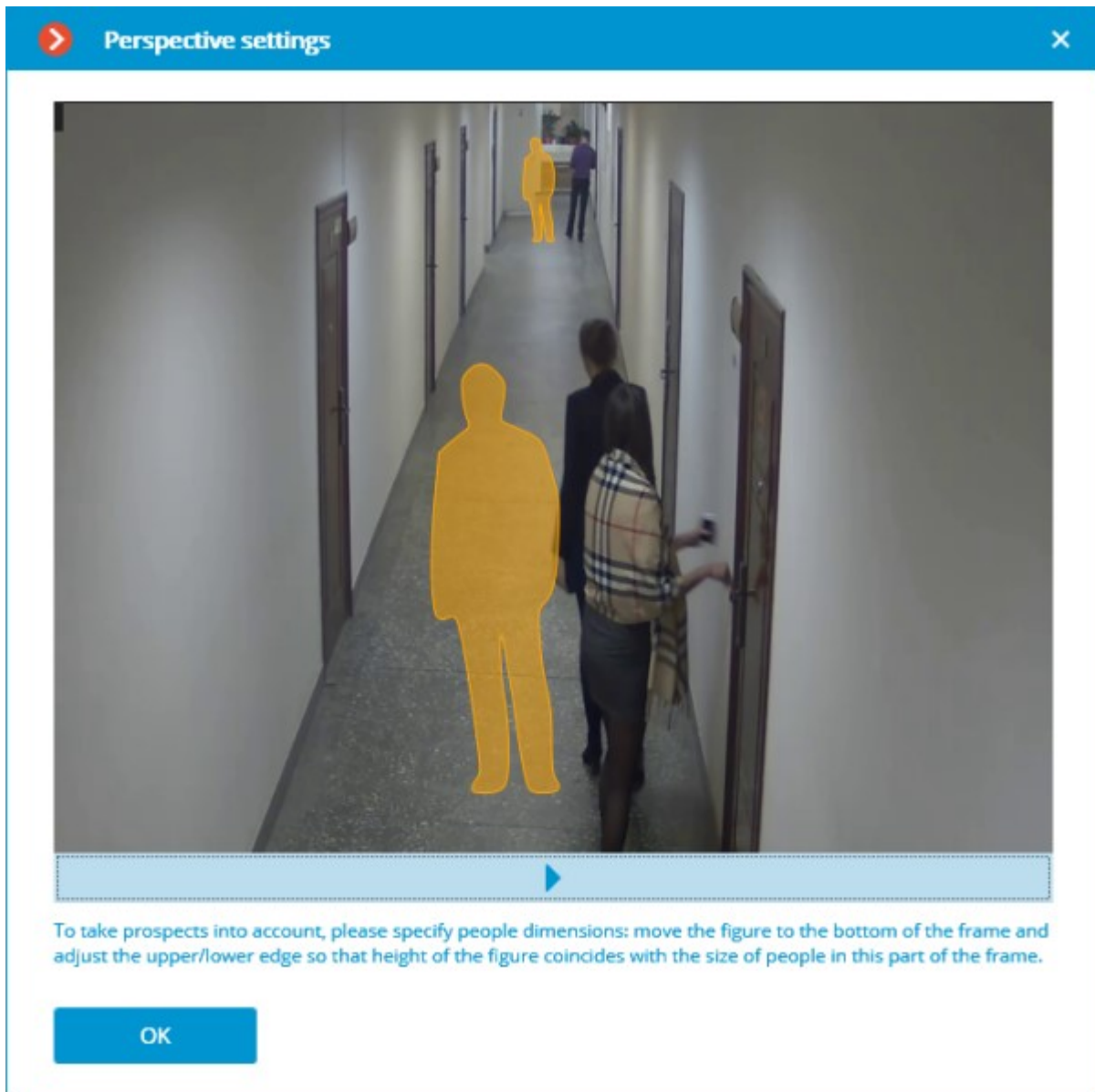
For enabling or disabling a video analytics module that analyzes the video stream set in the settings of the motion detector it is required to enable  or disable  the corresponding switch.


By the press of the  button the hint appears stating which capabilities must be enabled or disabled for activation and proper functioning of the module.

If the module is on, then by the press of the button  the module settings window is opened. The  button resets the settings to the default values. If these buttons are not displayed, the module requires no additional adjustment.

The settings of each module are described in the [Video analytics](#) section.

For the operation of some of the video analysis modules it is required to enable and set up the perspective first. The button  located to the right of the **Perspective** switch opens the perspective settings window.




The perspective is set using two scale forms  which are dragged with the mouse to the corresponding area of the frame and adjusted in a way that the height of the form matches the height of the persons in the given area of the frame. In order to change the size of the form it is necessary to click on the upper or lower edge of the form and, holding the mouse button, move the pointer up or down.


Camera analytics


The video analytics built into a camera can be set up on the **Camera analytics** tab.




This tab contains blocks of settings of all the video analytics built into the camera that is available in **Eocortex**.

The video analytics is enabled using the toggle switch .

The button  opens the prompt for video analytics.

If the analytics is set up in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, the settings window of this video analytics can be opened upon clicking on the button .

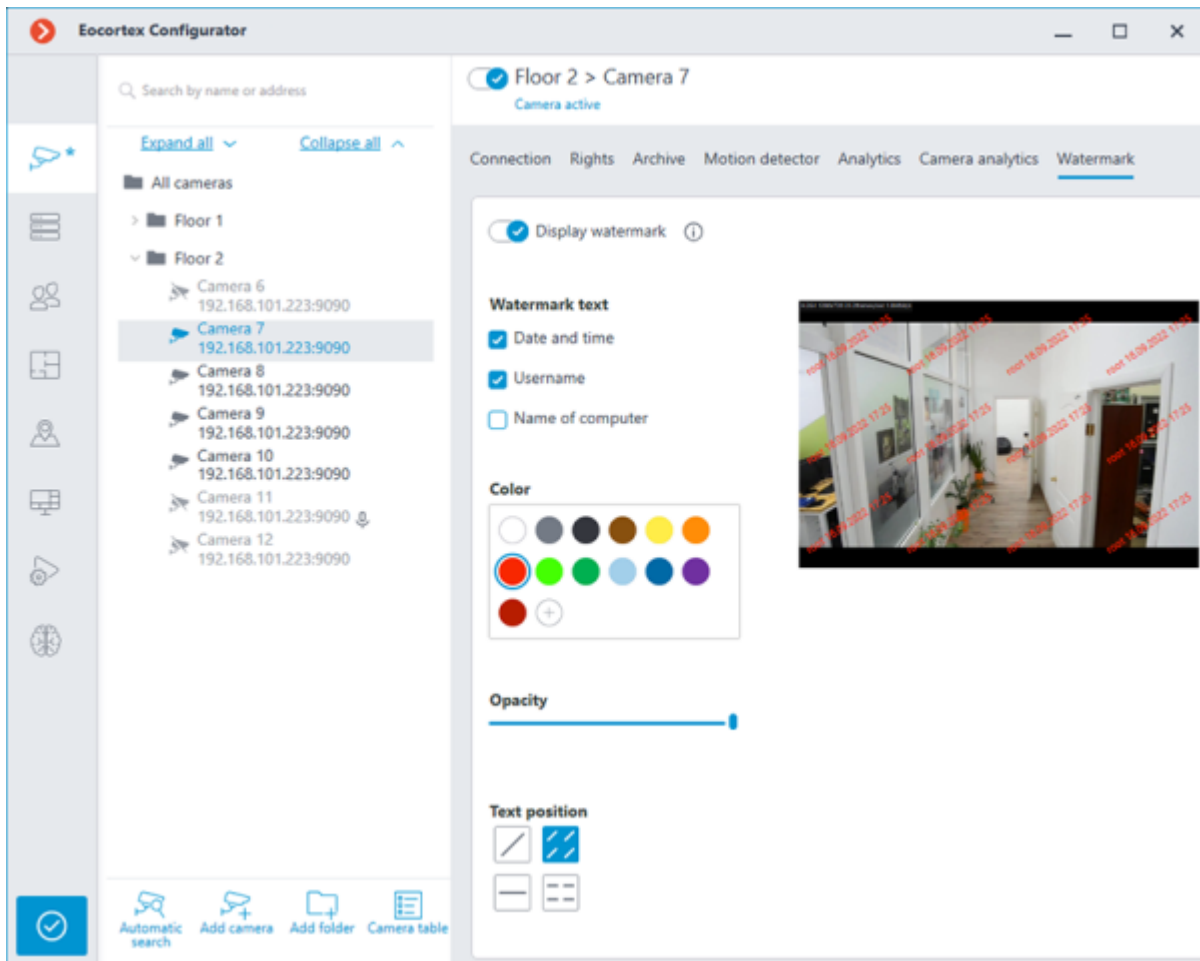

Modifying camera groups

To facilitate the setup of a large number of cameras with similar parameters there exists a possibility to set the parameters for all the cameras at once, or for the cameras contained in the same folder, including its subfolders and the cameras and folders in it.

To set the parameters of a group of channels, select the corresponding folder and press **Change camera group settings** button.

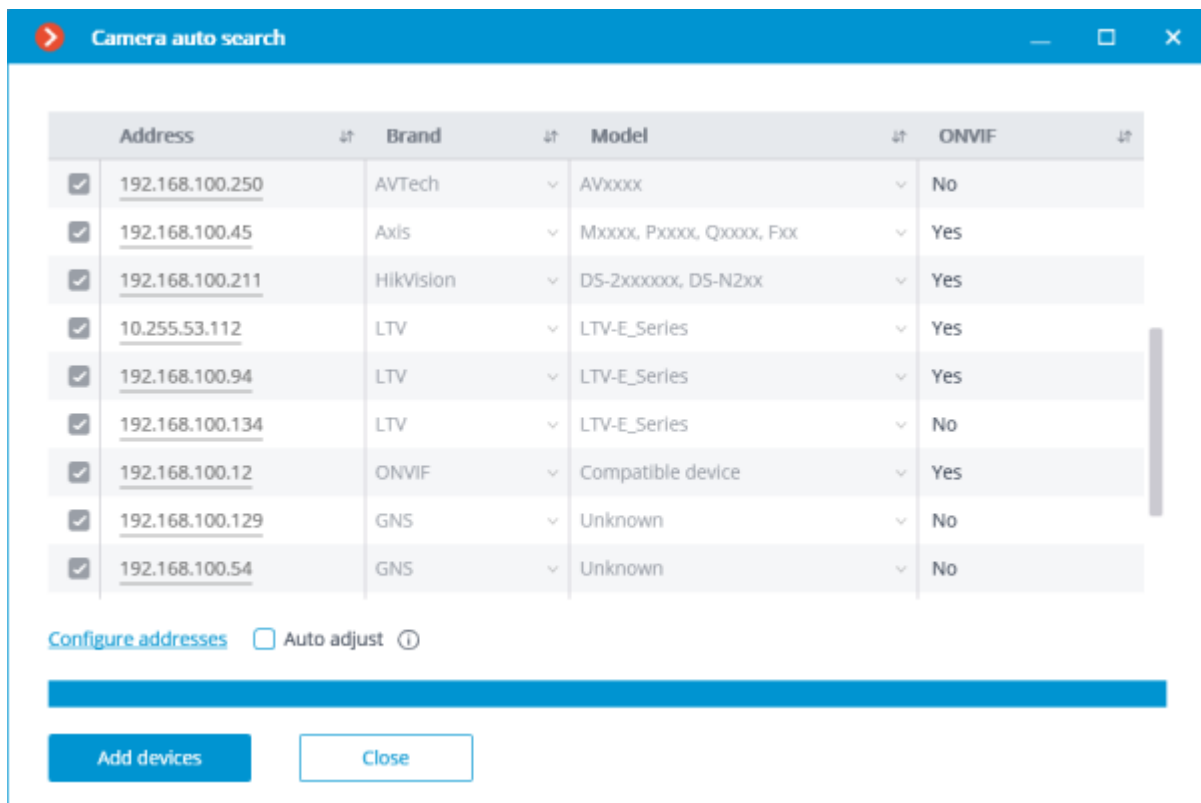

Automatic search and connection of cameras

For automatic searching for cameras in the local network and for adding them to the system it is required to press the  **Automatic search** button; after that, in the **Camera auto search** window, mark the cameras to be added and press the **Add devices** button.



In order to return to the main window of **Eocortex Configurator** press the **Close** button.

Not all of the cameras support features that allow to automatically locate them in the local network.

After automatically adding the cameras, in many cases it is necessary to manually enter the login and password of the camera administrator and select the video format in data stream settings.

In the course of the automatic adding, some cameras are defined as the cameras of other manufacturers or other models. In such a case it may be required to manually select the corresponding make or model after adding the cameras.

Configure addresses link opens the window of setting up the IP addresses of the cameras, which allows to modify the IP address from **Eocortex Configurator** without having to open the web interface of the camera. This feature is available for certain camera models only.

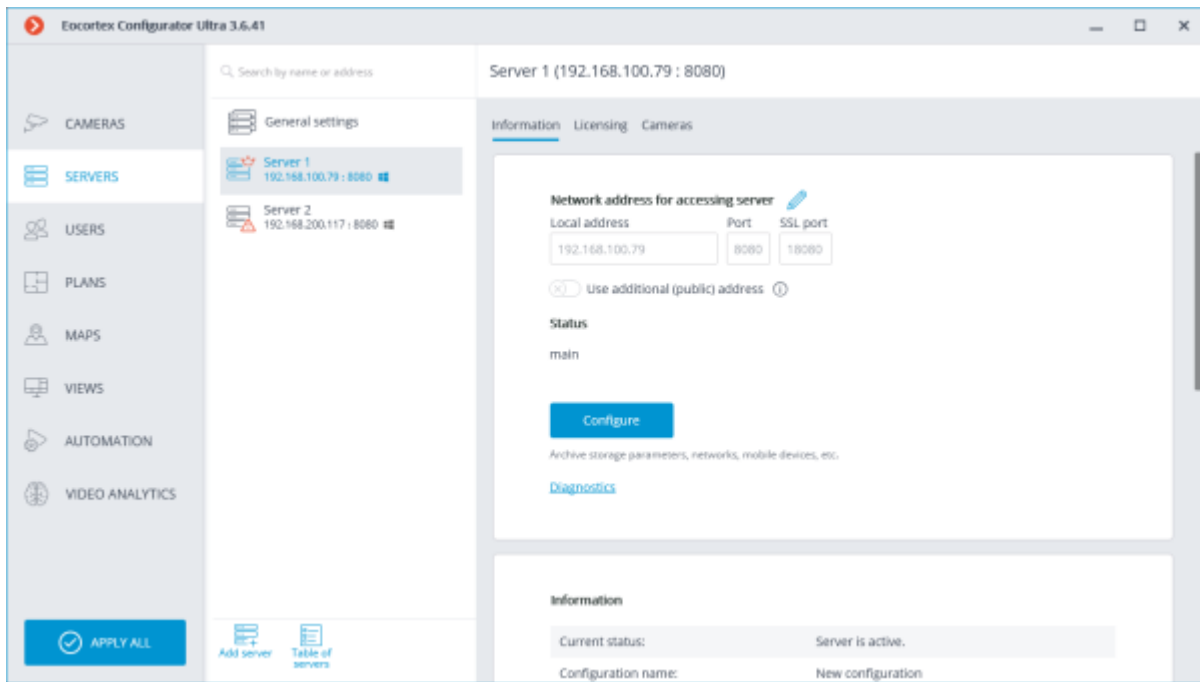
The **Automatic setup** option permits to automate the process of setting up channels, if the devices support the **ONVIF** standard (preferably, **ONVIF Profile S**). For the correct operation of this feature, it is recommended to disable the **ONVIF authorization** on the device, if it is provided in the camera's settings.


When using the automatic channel setup by **ONVIF**, do the following:

- If two streams are enabled on the camera, enable **Use two streams** option;
- If the camera supports PTZ, enable **PTZ camera** option;
- If the camera supports sound reception, enable **Sound reception** option.




Servers

For setting up servers in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the  **Servers** tab



The list of servers is shown in the left part of the  **Servers** tab. At the top of this list, the search field that allows to find the server by name or IP address is available above. To the right of the list you can find the page with the tabs of settings related to the position selected in the list. Moreover, some settings for the selected position are called from the context menu.

The list of servers contains the records of three types marked by the corresponding icons:

-  **Main settings** contain the following settings tabs:
 - [Update](#): Server update settings.
 - **Services**: connection and operation settings for [Eocortex System Monitoring](#), [Episode archive](#), and [Long-term databases](#) services.
 - [Cameras](#): Settings of camera distribution among servers.
 - [Archive bookmarks](#) Setting of archive bookmarks' categories.
 - [Network settings](#): adjusting multicasting and interaction between servers.
 - [Security](#): Setting up secure connection to servers.
-  **Main server**: the main server of the multi-server system. In the single-server system the server is always "main".


For the main and subordinate servers, their names and addresses are stated to the right of the icons.

Server name is not a unique feature, that is why a system may contain various servers with the same name. To rename a server it is required to double click on its name or open a context menu and select **Rename**, then enter a new name and press **Enter**.

If the **Eocortex Configurator** application cannot access the server, such server is marked by the



icon.

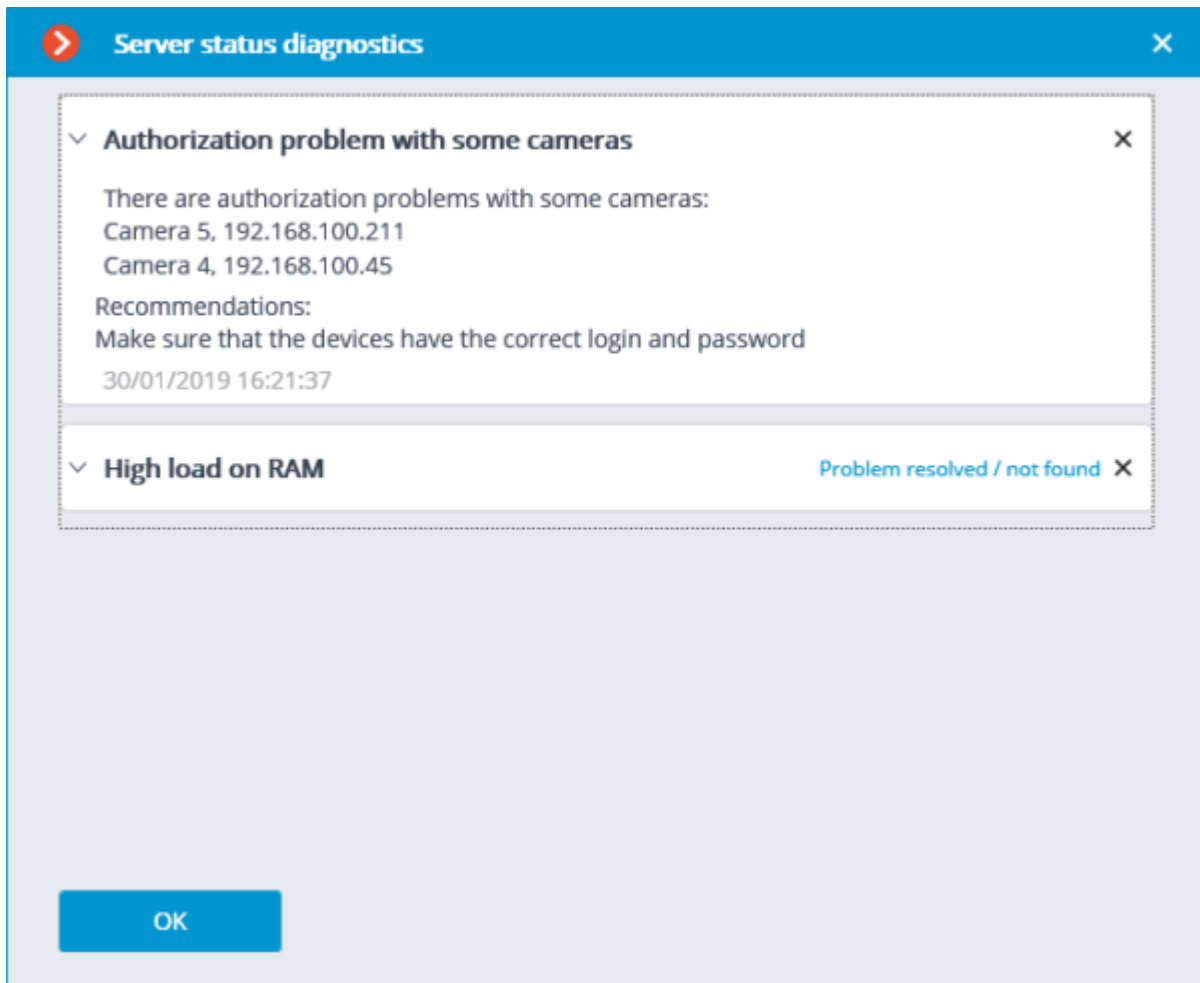
Changing the network address and port in the **Eocortex Configurator** application does not result in their actual change on the server. That is why it is recommended to first change the address and/or port using the operation system tools and then modify them in **Eocortex Configurator**.

In contrast, changing the network port in the **Eocortex Configurator** will result in its change on the server. In this case, depending on the state of the settings, the server will be restarted either immediately after changing the port in the application, or in the process of applying the settings.

Fast redundancy: when this option is on, fast redundancy will be applied to the main channels assigned to server, meaning that the redundancy will be activated not later than in 10 seconds after a loss of camera connection.

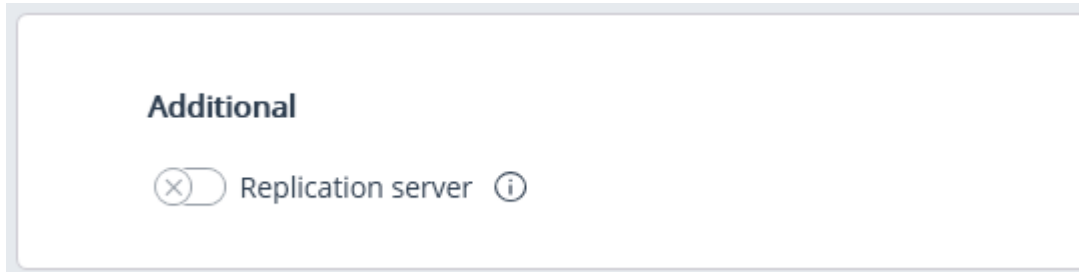
In the systems where periodical, including short-term, disruptions of camera connection are possible, enabling the fast redundancy may result in false redundancy responses.

Constant redundancy enables the constant redundancy mode. Redundancy of cameras for which this server will be assigned as the main one will work always, regardless of the status of the given server.

It is required to bear in mind that, in case of normal operation of the system, the cameras with constant redundancy will have two connections: one from the main and the



other from the redundant servers. Thus, depending on the design of the cameras, the bandwidth may increase and/or the framerate may decrease.

The **Fast redundancy** and **Constant redundancy** modes are mutually exclusive. Likewise, when the constant redundancy mode is on, notifications regarding the activation of redundancy (backup) will be switched off.




Replication server: when this option is enabled, the server is assigned as a [replication server](#). button is used to open the replication settings window.

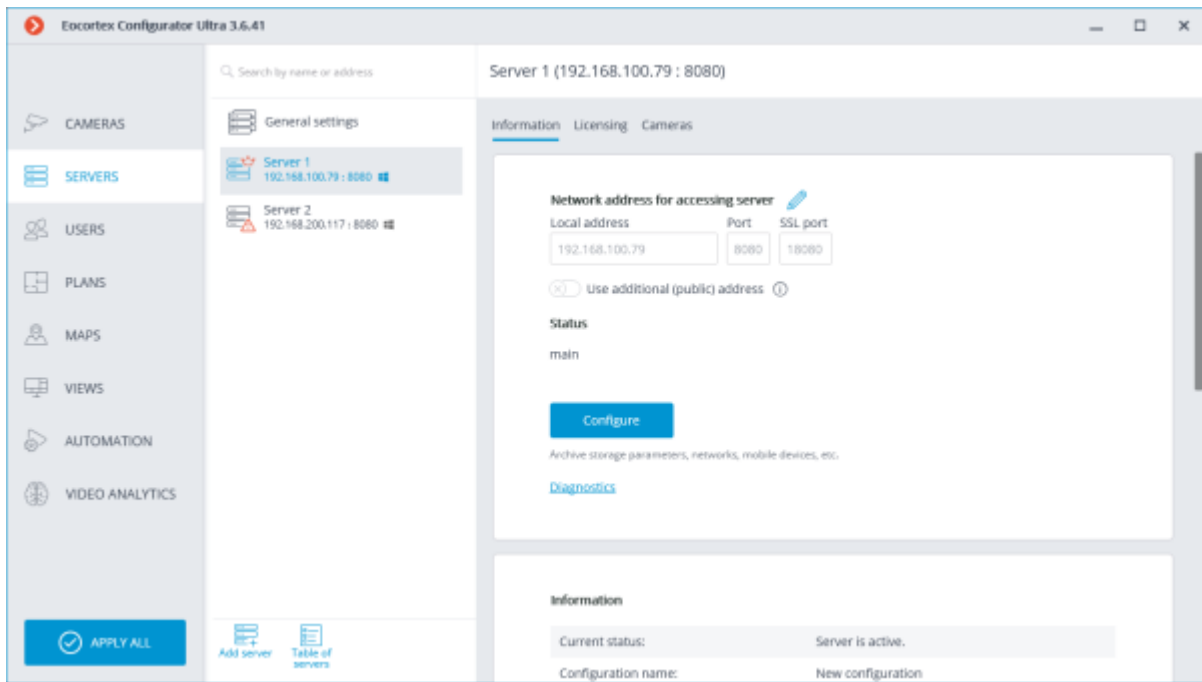

- Part of the network settings;
- Part of the archive replication settings (only for replication servers).

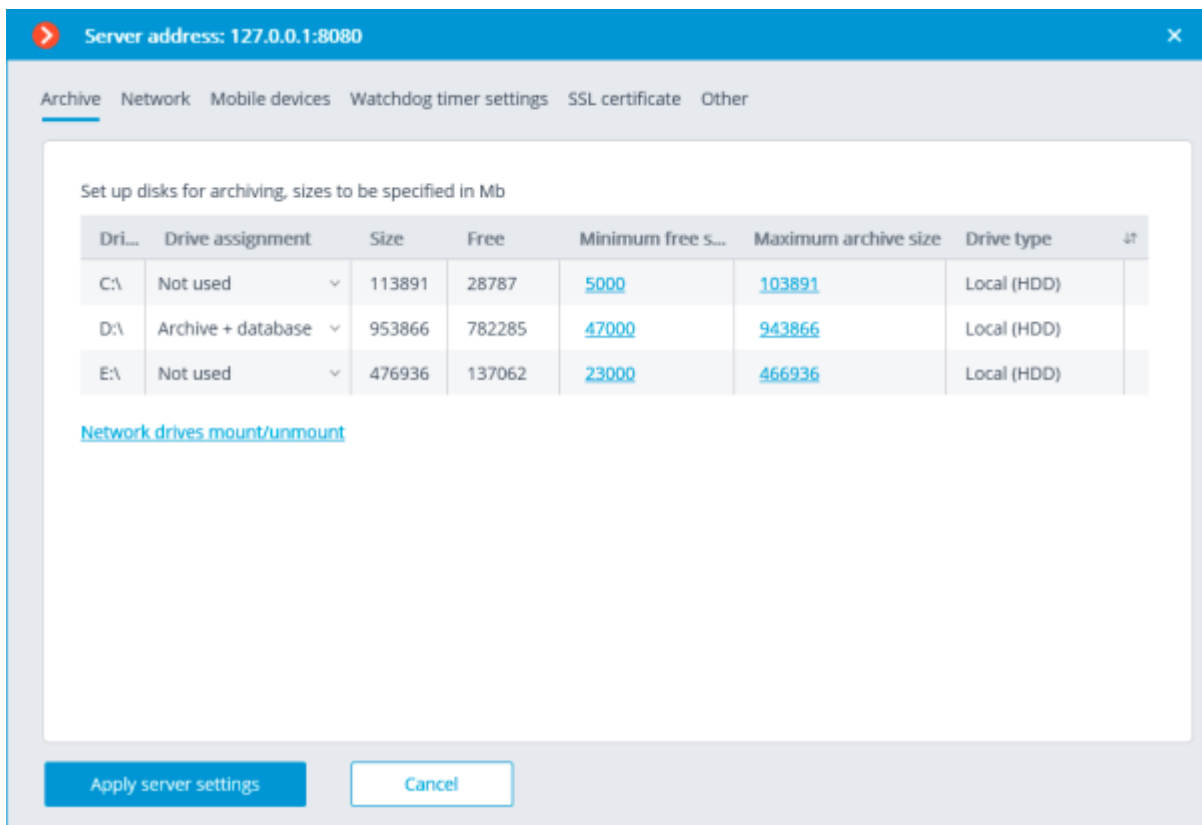
For opening the window of additional server settings, it is required to select the server in the list on

the  **Servers** tab in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, then select **Configure** in the context menu, or press **Configure** on the server settings page at the **Information** tab.



To save the changes made it is required to press the **Apply server settings** button.

Archive



Drive: logical name of a drive.

Drive assignment: indication of the usage of the drive. The following options are available:

Size: total drive size (Mb).

Free: currently remaining free space on drive (Mb).

Minimum free space: minimum drive space that is required to remain free when recording the archive (Mb). In order to set the value of this parameter, double click on the current value, enter the new one and press **Enter**.

Maximum archive size: maximum size of the archive in Mb. In order to set the value of this parameter, double-click on the current value, enter the new one and press **Enter**.

Drive type: information regarding the type of drive - **Local (HDD)** or **Network**.

Connecting network drives: this link opens network drive connection window.

Network drives mount/unmount

Attention!
Network disc will be connected only in case of a valid network path and account with non-blank password and full rights for network resource being connected (creation of folders, writing, deleting, reading). If this data is invalid, the connected disc will appear in Eocortex Configurator but will be unavailable. In such a case, it is required to disconnect the disc and connect it again with the correct parameters.

To connect a network drive, select a letter that will be used to designate the network drive being added in the **Connecting/disconnecting network drives** window, indicate a path to the network drive in the corresponding fields, and enter the user name and password of the user who has access to reading, writing and creating files and folders on this path; then click on the **Connect network drive** link and press the **OK** button.

After pressing the **OK** button, the server will restart and all the network drives listed will be added to the list of drives displayed in the **Archive** tab. After that, you will be able to configure the network drives in the same way as the local drives.

For disconnecting a network drive it is required to select the drive to be disconnected in the list of drives in the **Connecting/disconnecting network drives** window, then press the **Disable network drive** link, and then the **OK** button.

After you press the **OK** button, the server will restart and all the network drives not in the list will be excluded from the list of drives displayed on the **Archive** tab.

At the first start of the server its default settings are created automatically. **C:** drive is connected to the archive. During the initial setup it is recommended to assign other drives for archive allocation, because the placement of the archive on the same physical drive with the **Windows** operating system may lead to the reduction of productivity or system errors.

It is not recommended allocating database on the network drives.

The archive is stored on the server with the indication of the **Coordinated Universal Time (UTC)**. At that, in the client applications the local time of the device used for viewing the archive is displayed (with account for the time zone).

Example:

On the server with the time zone settings of **(UTC+03:00) Moscow** a fragment of the archive from 12:00 to 12:05 Moscow time is recorded.

This fragment launched directly on server in the **Eocortex Client** will be displayed with the time of 12:00 12:05.

If this same fragment is displayed on the computer with the time zone settings of **(UTC+05:00) Ekaterinburg**, the fragment's time will be from 14:00 to 14:05.

If the fragment is displayed on the computer with the time zone settings of **(UTC+01:00) Paris**, its time will be from 10:00 to 10:05.

Archive data:

The archive of each server stores the video recordings of only those channels that are assigned to this particular server.

The archive has a cyclic structure. If the space designated for the archive is full, the new archive files begin to replace the oldest ones, taking into consideration the archive depth parameters set for each channel.

When several drives are used, the recording to archive is performed simultaneously to all the available drives. If one of the drives becomes unavailable, the recording to it stops and the data is redistributed to the available drives. Likewise, if the unavailable drive becomes available again, the recording of data to it resumes.

One or more drives may be assigned as redundant. The recording of the new data to the redundancy drives starts only when all the main drives become unavailable; when a main drive becomes available again, the recording to the redundancy drives stops.

The archive is located in the **EocortexArchive** folder in the root directory of each drive used for archive storage.

One or more disks can be assigned as duplicates. New data is recorded on the duplicating discs in parallel with the recording on the main or backup discs.

Allow server location according to UPnP protocol: enables the **UPnP** protocol for the video surveillance server that allows to locate the server in the network using the stated protocol.

Accept RTSP connections (to broadcast H.264 and MJPEG): allows to receive video stream and operational information using direct requests to server via **RTSP** protocol.

RTSP port (for TCP or HTTP connections): port for client connections to server using **RTSP** protocol.

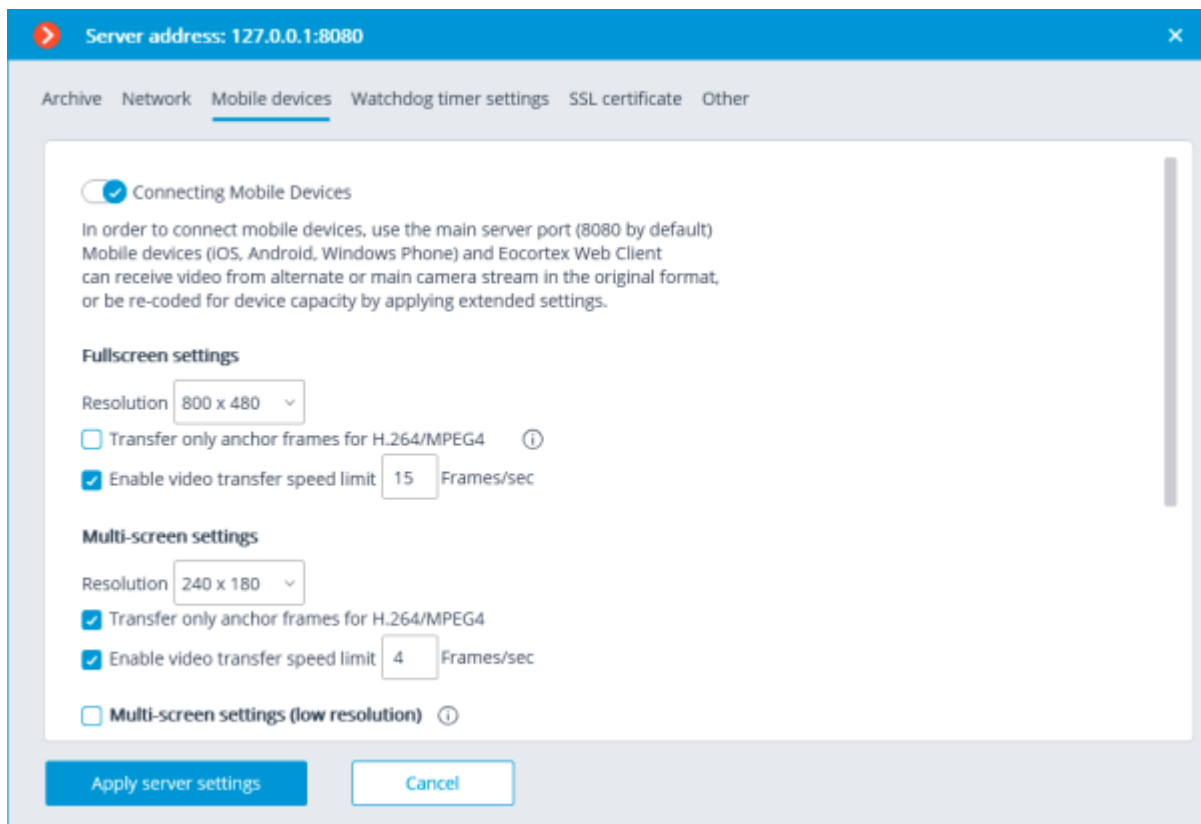
Allow MJPEG broadcasting via RTSP: enables **MJPEG** broadcasting via **RTSP** protocols.

Since **RTSP** protocol only supports **MJPEG** frames encoded in the base (**Baseline**) encoding mode, for broadcasting video streams encoded in other modes their recoding will be required. It will increase server load. Moreover, in the course of **MJPEG** recoding the framerate can be reduced (in comparison with the framerate transmitted directly by camera).

Accept ONVIF connections: enables client connections to video surveillance server via **ONVIF**. By default, username is **onvif**, password — **onvif**. It is recommended to change password when enabling this option. Username cannot be modified.

Allow multicasting: enables multicasting from the server for those channels that have this option on. If there is more than one network adapter installed on the computer, it will be possible to choose the adapter for multicasting in the dropdown list that appears upon enabling this option.

Mobile devices



Allow connecting mobile devices to server: activates the service of broadcasting video streams for mobile devices and web clients built in the **Eocortex** server application.

This service is also used for arranging broadcasting to site.

Depending on the resolution of the connected mobile device or web browser, the service can broadcast video streams in two or three modes:

Good quality (high resolution): used for full-screen mode.

Medium quality (medium resolution): used for multiscreen mode.

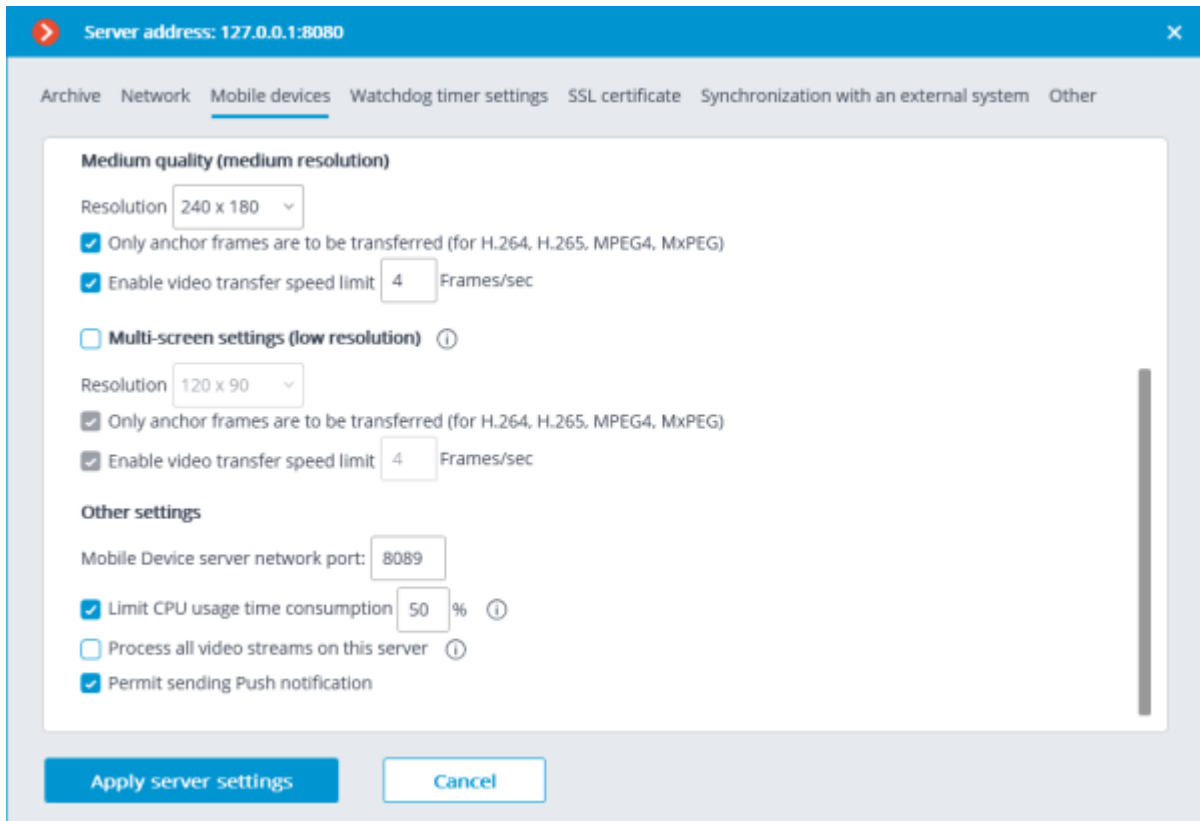
Low quality (low resolution): used for low resolution multiscreen mode. This mode is off by default.

It is possible to set the following for each of the modes:

Resolution that will be broadcast by default for each of the channels.

Transfer only anchor frames for H.264/MPEG-4: for these codecs, only anchor (key) frames will be broadcast; this setting allows to reduce the amount of data transferred in the networks with limited bandwidth.

Enable video transfer speed limit: the framerate of the frames being transferred will be limited to the set value; this setting permits to reduce the amount of data transferred in the networks with limited bandwidth.



Other settings:

Mobile device server network port: allows to set the port thru which the connection to the video stream broadcasting service will be available.

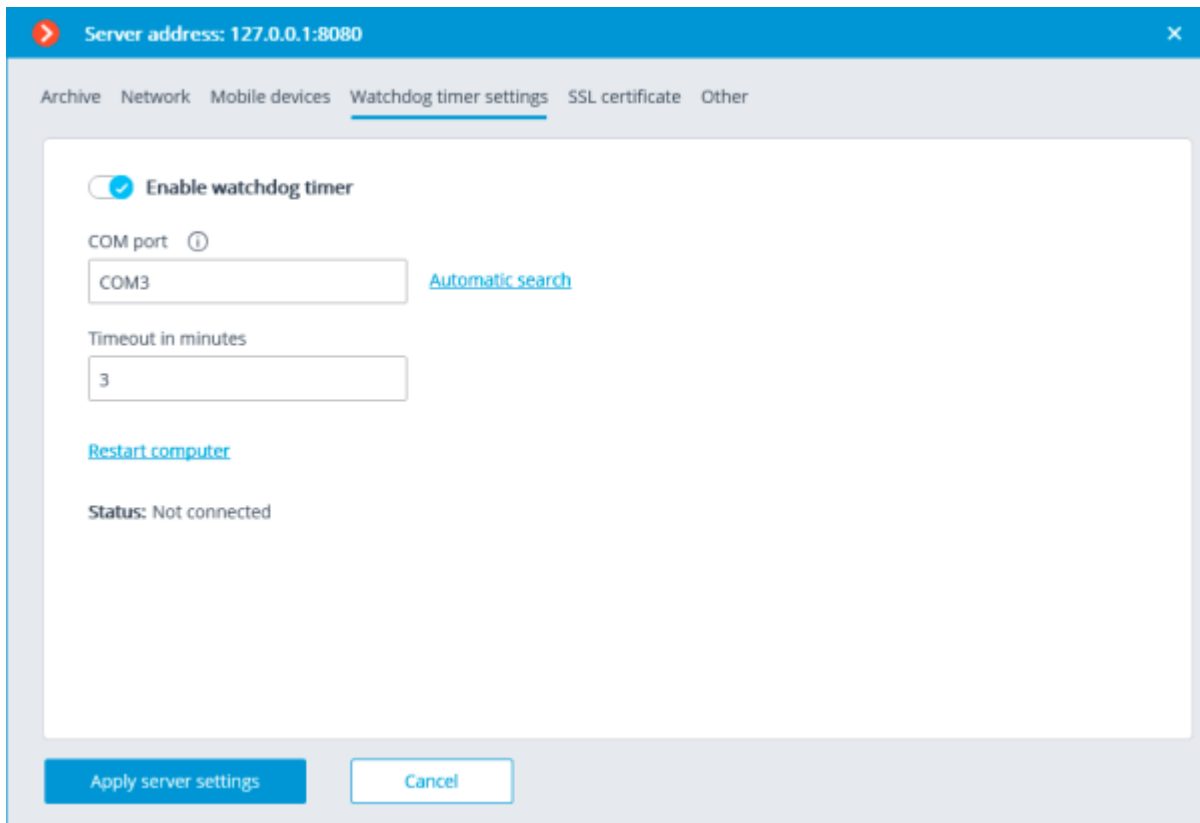
Limit CPU usage time consumption: allows to limit the consumption of CPU time by the mobile connections service.

Process all video streams on this server: when this option is enabled, all video streams sent from this server to mobile applications will be reencoded on this server; if the option is disabled, the streams will be reencoded on those servers to which the cameras are connected, and already reencoded streams will be sent to this server.

This feature appeared in **Eocortex** version 3.4. The servers upgraded from earlier versions will have this option enabled. The option is disabled by default for new servers.

Permit sending Push notification: enables the possibility of sending various Push notifications from the server to mobile devices.

Watchdog timer settings



Enable watchdog timer: activates interaction with the watchdog timer.

COM port: assigns a COM port to which the watchdog timer is connected.

Automatic search: performs automatic search for a connected watchdog timer.

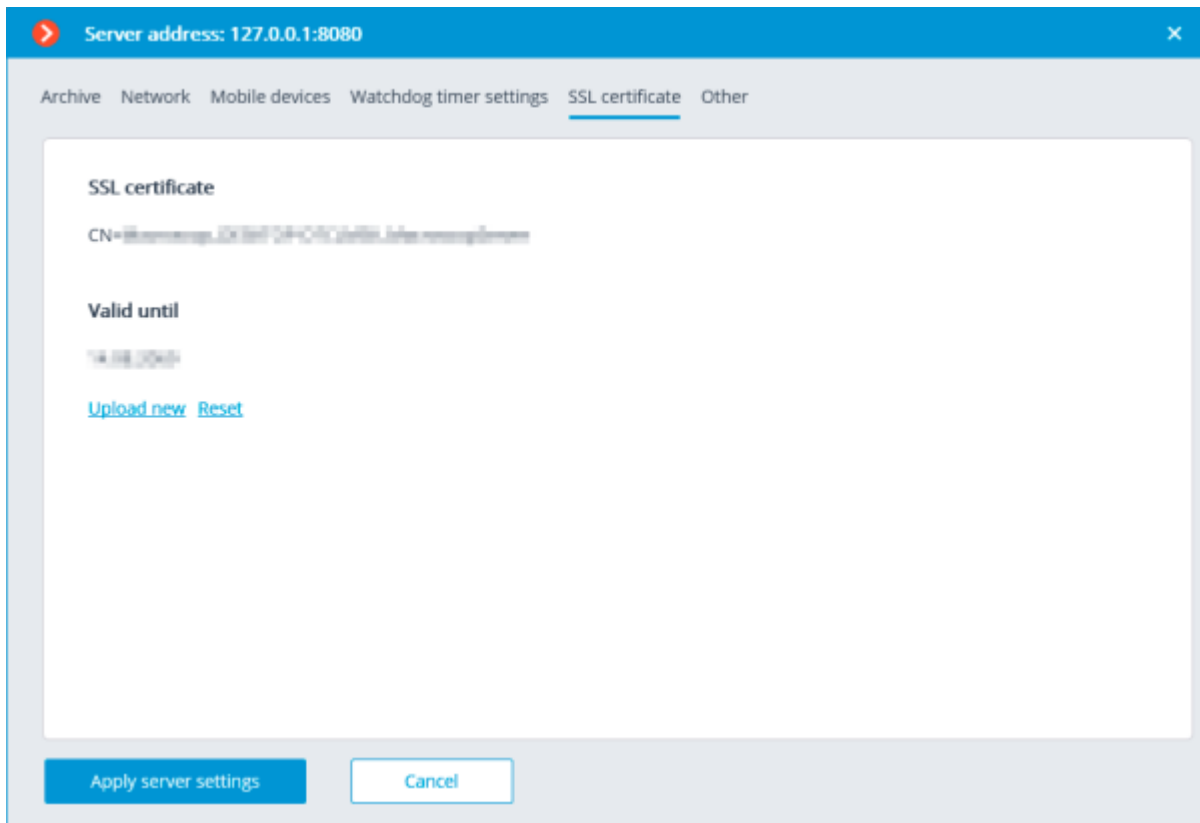
Timeout in minutes: sets a period after which the watchdog timer is triggered.

Restart computer: restarts the computer being set up.

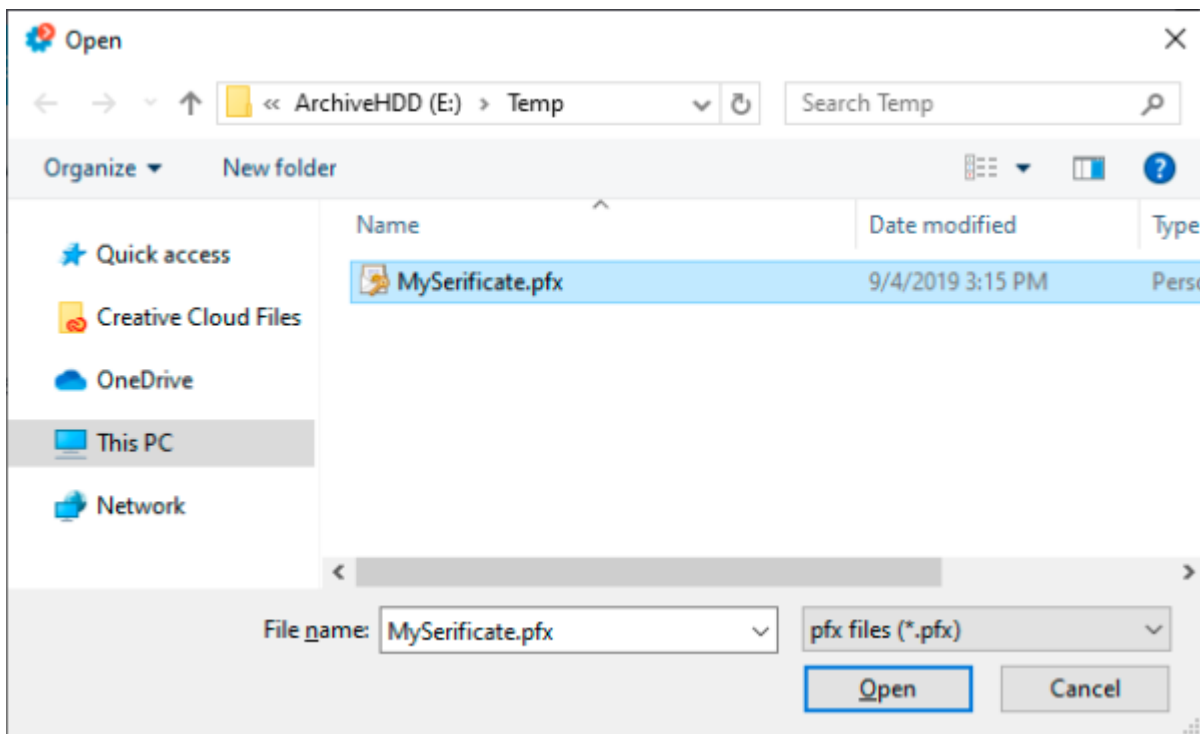
Status: displays the current watchdog status.

Firmware version: displays the current version of watchdog firmware.


SSL certificate



This tab shows the parameters of the certificate installed on the server. Likewise, it is possible to install a new certificate instead of the current one using the **Upload new** link.



When installing the certificate, it could be required to enter the password assigned to the certificate.


The uploaded certificate will be used for encrypting the secure connections only after the server settings are applied.

All the information regarding the modification and usage of the certificate is recorded in the event log.

If a third-party security certificate for the server is not installed or it has been impossible to load it during the launch of the server, the self-signed TLS certificate will be used for establishing secure connections with the server. Such certificate is generated on the server in the process of creating a new configuration of the video surveillance system. The self-signed TLS certificate has the following disadvantages:

- The certificate can be replaced by an insecure one within the network; the user may not even notice that, confirming the insecure connection.
- The users of the web application will have to confirm the insecure connection every time; it may lead to the distrust of the users.

The absence of the **Reset** link proves that the self-signed certificate is being used.

Synchronization with an external system

On this tab, it is possible to enable and set up the import of a face database used by one of the **Eocortex** Face Recognition modules from files located in a folder on the drive.

Synchronization with an external system is available for Windows only.

To perform setup, it is required to select **File system** as a type of external system and indicate a folder on the drive where the data will be uploaded from. The periodicity and the size of a data block are also set here, as well as the current synchronization status.

Only those entries of employees that contain photos suitable for use by the **Eocortex** Face Recognition module will be imported from the file system.

The entries imported from the file system are rerecorded during each synchronization session. Thus, if such entry is modified in **Eocortex**, the modifications will be lost during the subsequent synchronization session.

The image files will be uploaded from the server folder specified in the settings, and the full names will be derived from the filename; for that end, the words in the filename must be separated by spaces.

The synchronization can be enabled only for one of the Face Recognition modules.

For the synchronization to work, it is required that at least one camera assigned to the server with the synchronization set up had a synchronized Face Recognition module enabled.

In a multiserver system, the synchronization can be enabled only on one **Eocortex** server.

To connect to the Eocortex server, it is required to have a login and a password of the user with the rights to edit face and license plate databases in the **Eocortex** system.

In the course of the first synchronization session, all the entries of employees that meet the requirements (those with photos suitable for recognition) will be imported into **Eocortex**. However, those entries that have been added to the **Eocortex** Face Recognition module's database manually will not be affected in any way by the process

of synchronization. During the subsequent synchronization sessions, only those entries that were modified, added or deleted in the file system after the previous synchronization session will be imported.

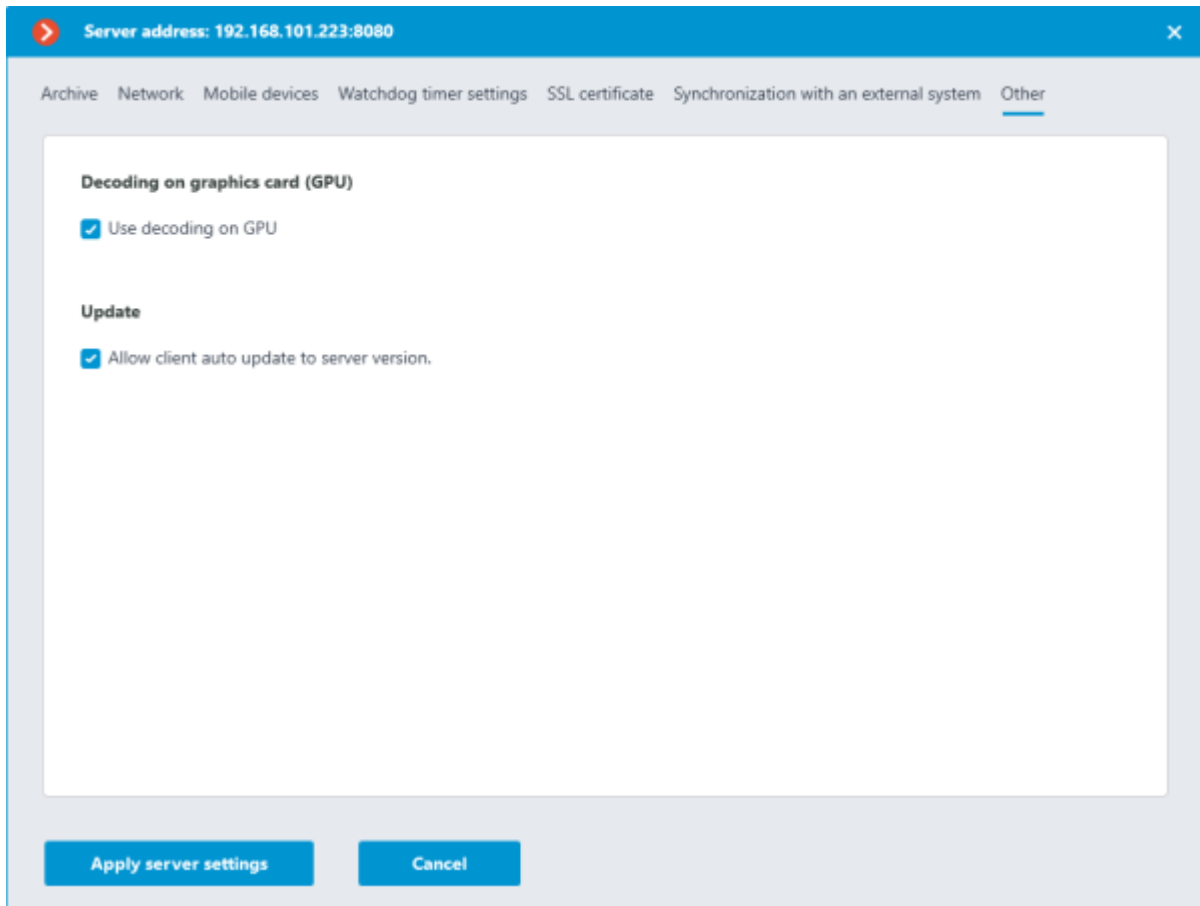
The synchronization period can be set in the range of 1 minute to 40 days.

Each entry of the **Eocortex** face database imported from the file system will have a corresponding note.


Other

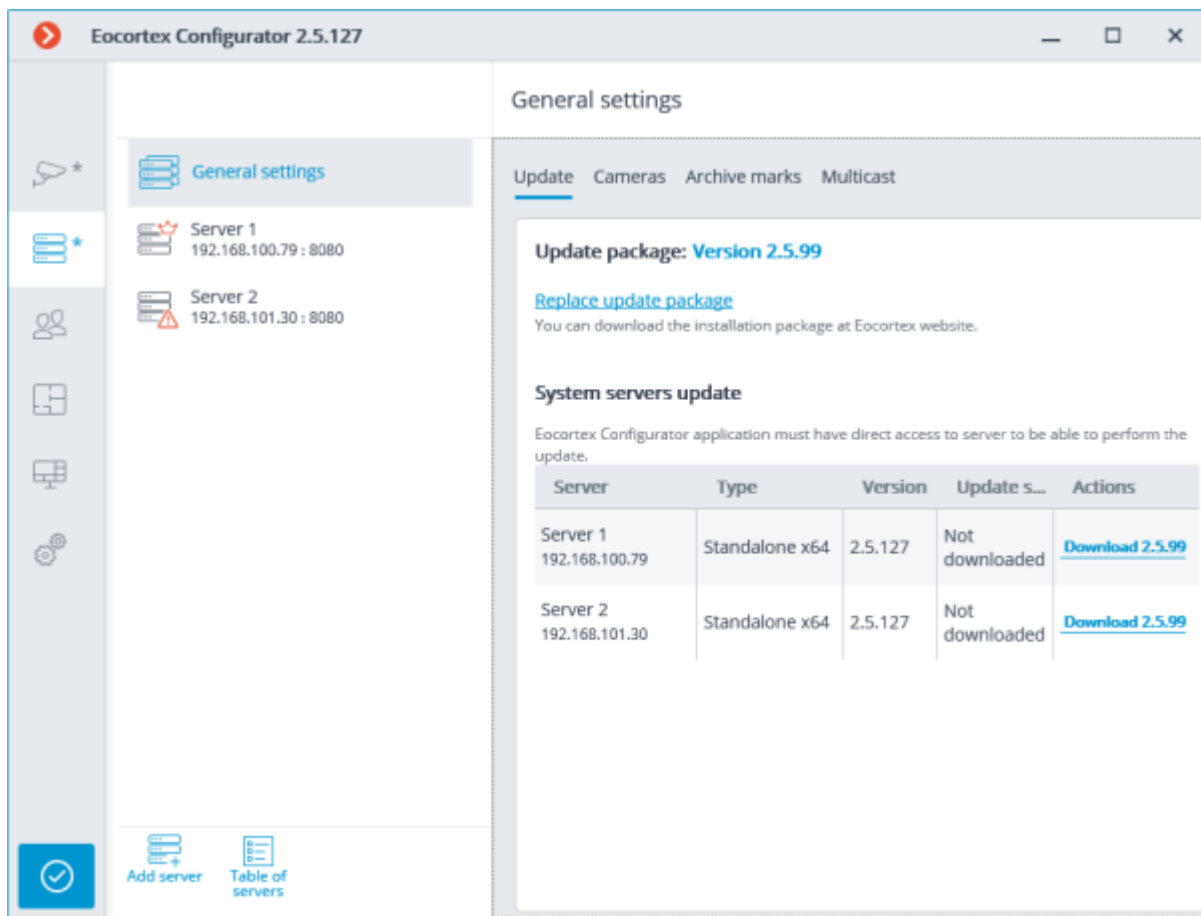
This tab allows optimizing the system load by enabling the **Use decoding on GPU** option.

Additionally, it is possible to enable the mechanism of automatic update of client applications built into the server application in the **Allow client auto update to server version.** option.



Centralized server update

In the **Eocortex Configurator** application, on the  **Servers** tab, under **General settings** item in the **Update** tab the centralized server update tools are located.



Before updating the server applications, it is required to upload the update package to the **Eocortex Configurator** application on the computer. The package can be downloaded following the **Load updates** link, or **Replace update package** in case the update package of another version has already been downloaded. It is required to download the file of the complete distribution package: **EocortexMainCommon Installer.exe**.

The most up-to-date version of **Eocortex** can be downloaded at eocortex.com: The distribution packages can be found at [Support / Software Installation Packages Supported](#).

To update the server, it is required to perform the following procedure on the server in the **System servers update** table:

For the server with the **Already installed** status the  **Roll back to ...** action is available, allowing to roll the server back to the previous version. In this case all the server settings go back to the values existing before the update.

If the server was updated using the centralized update procedure more than once, it is possible to roll back to any previous version in the opposite order, step by step.

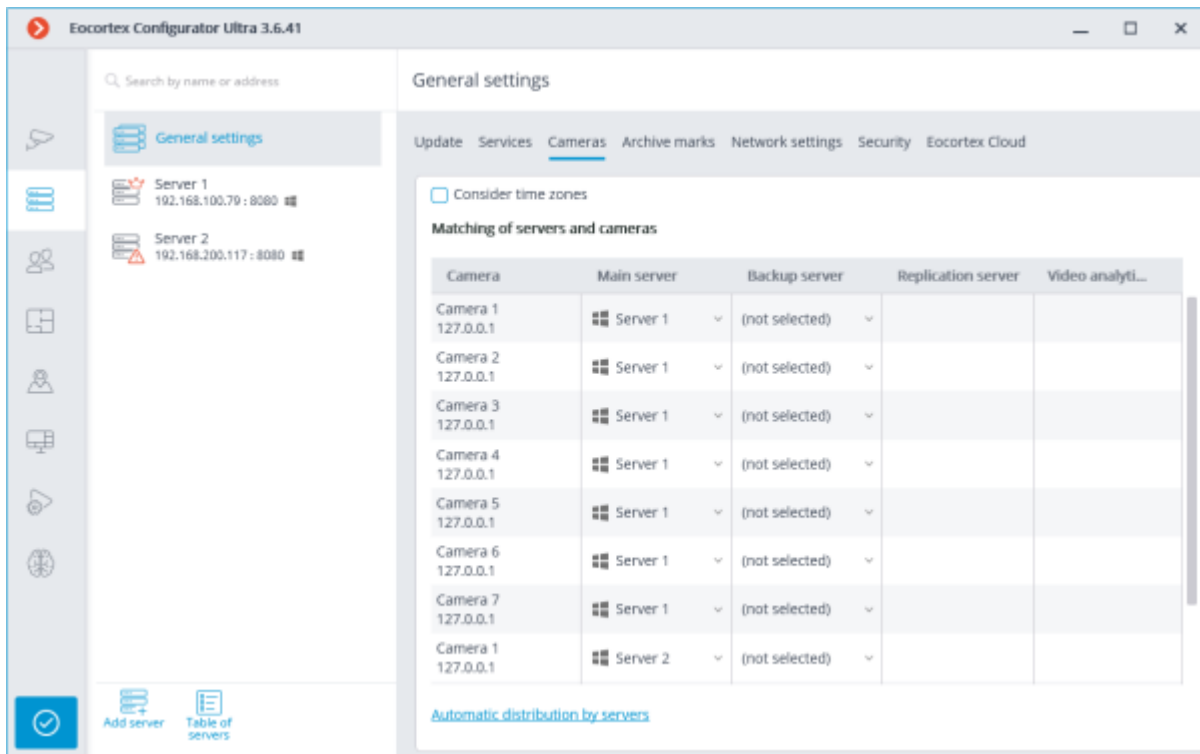
The centralized update is available only for the **Eocortex Server** and **Eocortex Standalone** applications. For the **Eocortex NVR** application the centralized update is not available.

The **Eocortex** server applications can be updated not only to the newer versions, but also to the older ones, provided that the first two digits of the version number are the same.

To upgrade servers to version 4.0 or higher, first upgrade those servers to version 3.6.57 or higher.

Distribution of cameras among servers

In the **Eocortex Configurator** application, on  **Servers** tab, the table of camera distribution among servers appears upon selecting the **General settings** item.




Consider time zones: this slider enables the ability to respect the selected time zones in applications.

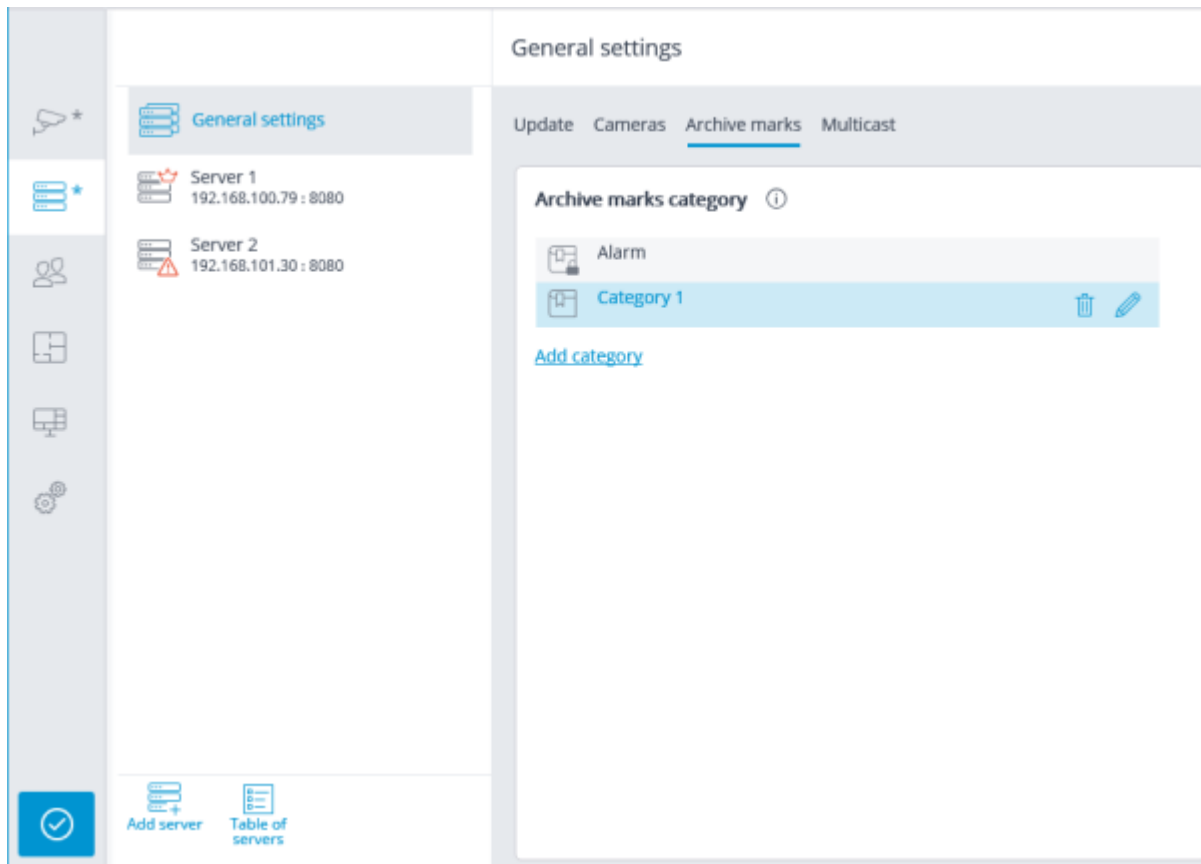
The changes made to the assignment of cameras to servers will take effect only after [the changes are saved](#).

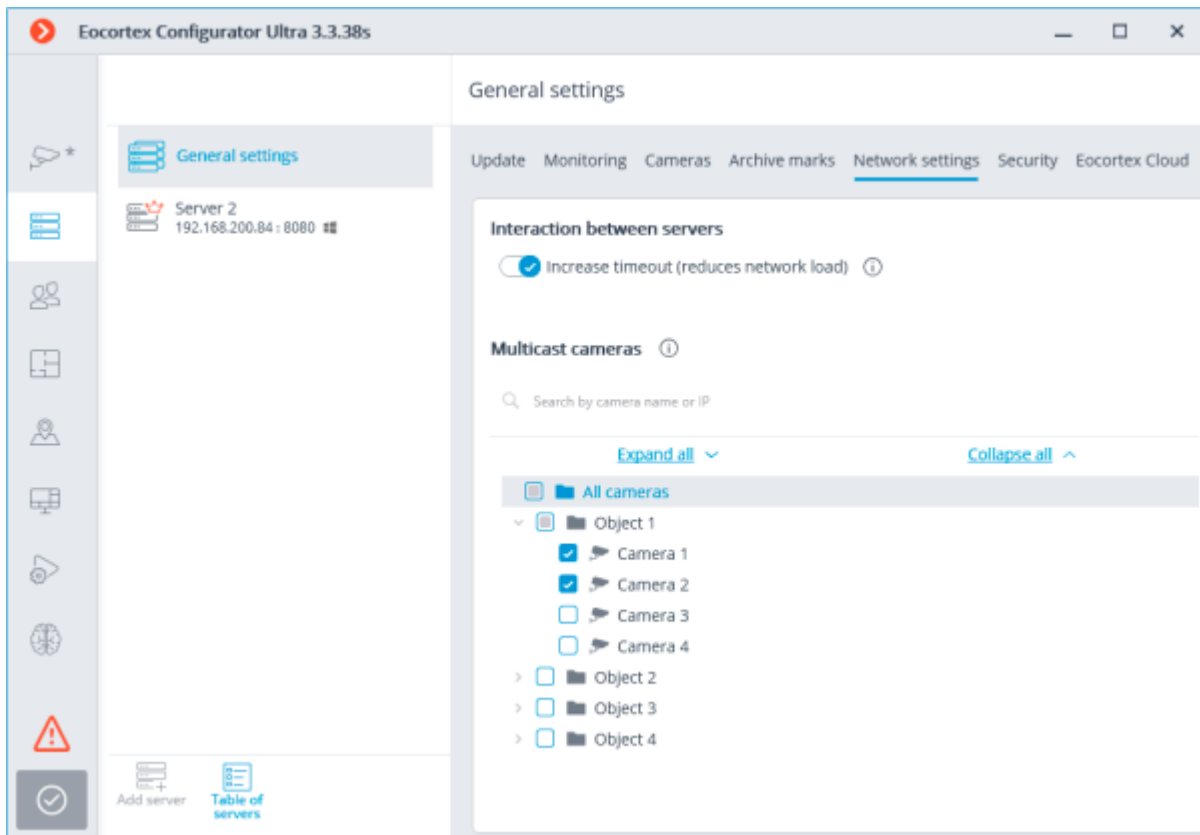
Archive bookmark category setup

In **Eocortex Configurator**, on the  **Servers** tab, the list of archive bookmark categories appears on the **Archive bookmarks** tab when selecting the **General settings** item.




General settings: Network settings

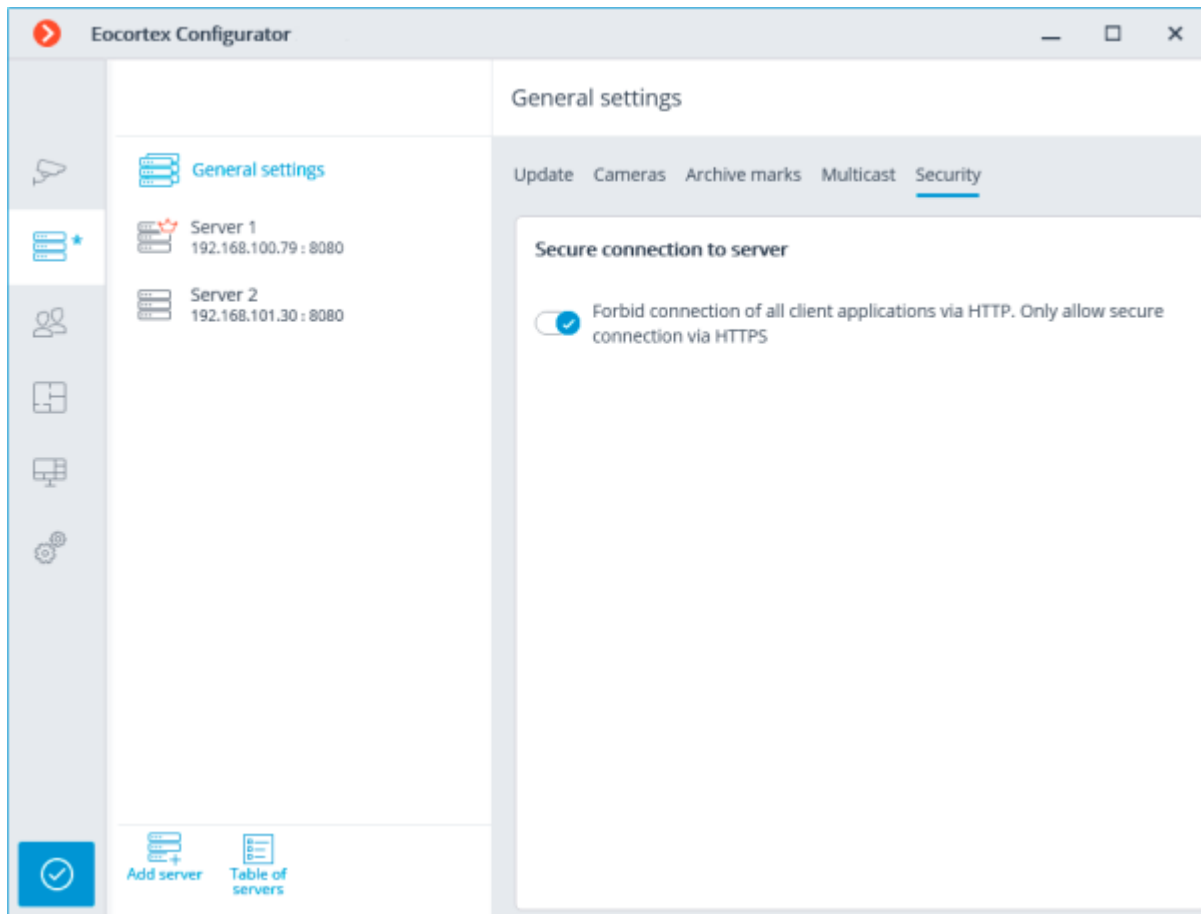
The settings of interaction between servers can be found in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, on the **Servers** page. The camera tree with the possibility to enable multicasting from a server appears on the **Multicast** tab upon selecting the **General settings** item.



When the **Increase timeout (reduces network load)** option is enabled, the period of data exchange between the main and the subordinate servers increases from several seconds to 1 minute.

General settings: Security

The insecure connections (via HTTP) will be forbidden when enabling the **Forbid connection of all client applications via HTTP. Only allow secure connection via HTTPS** option for all the system servers in the **Eocortex Configurator** application on the  **Servers** page, at highlighting the **General settings** item on the **Security** tab.



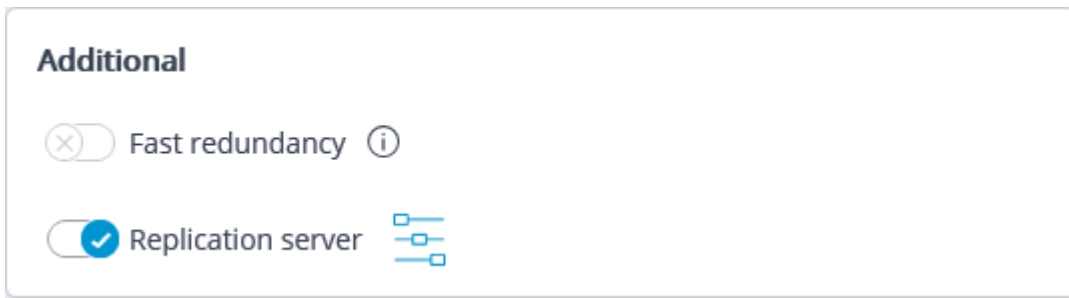
When applying the settings after enabling this option, the **Eocortex Client** and **Eocortex Web-client** applications connected to the servers will be automatically restarted using the secure connection. At the same time, the **Mobile client for Android** and **Mobile client for iOS** applications will not be restarted in this situation. Later on, the prohibition of the insecure connections to servers will be valid for all new connections from the **Eocortex Client**, **Eocortex Web-client**, **Mobile client for Android** and **Mobile client for iOS** applications. At that, the **Eocortex Client** application will be connected using the secure connection even in case of an attempt to use the insecure connection.


Replication server

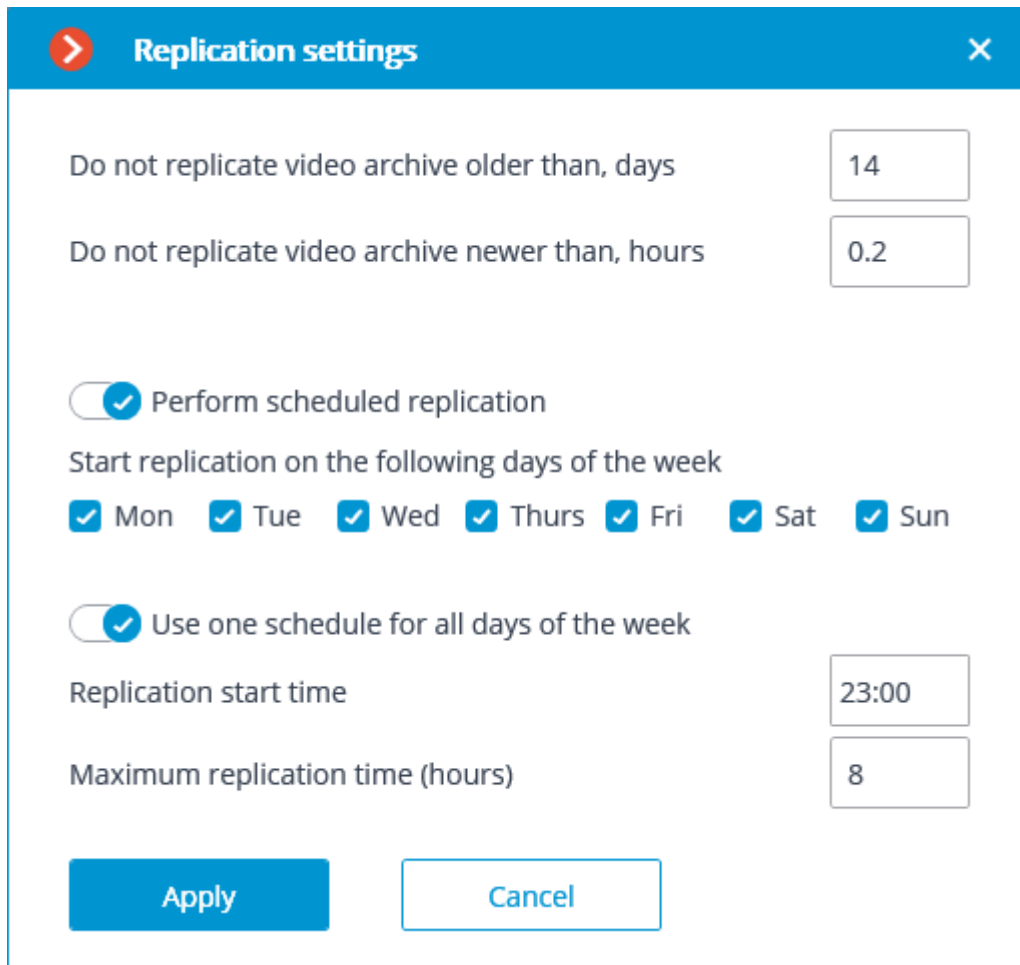
The **Replication server** is the server that stores backup copies of the archives from the other servers. The role of a replication server can be assigned to one or several servers in the system.

The replication server cannot be assigned as main or redundancy server for the cameras.

For using a server as the replication one, it is required to enable the **Replication server** option in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, on the  **Servers** tab, on the **Information** tab of the server settings page.



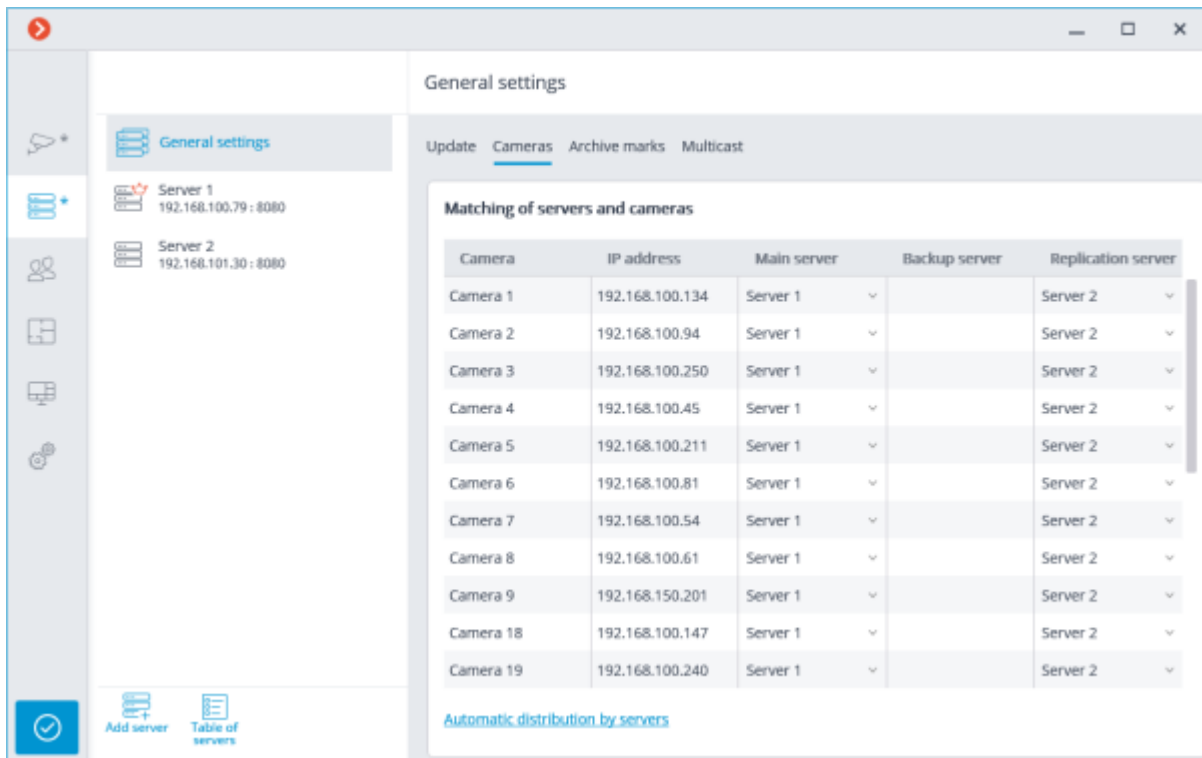
Then, by clicking the  button, open the **Replication settings** window, set the replication depth limits and schedule, and select channels that will be replicated on this server.



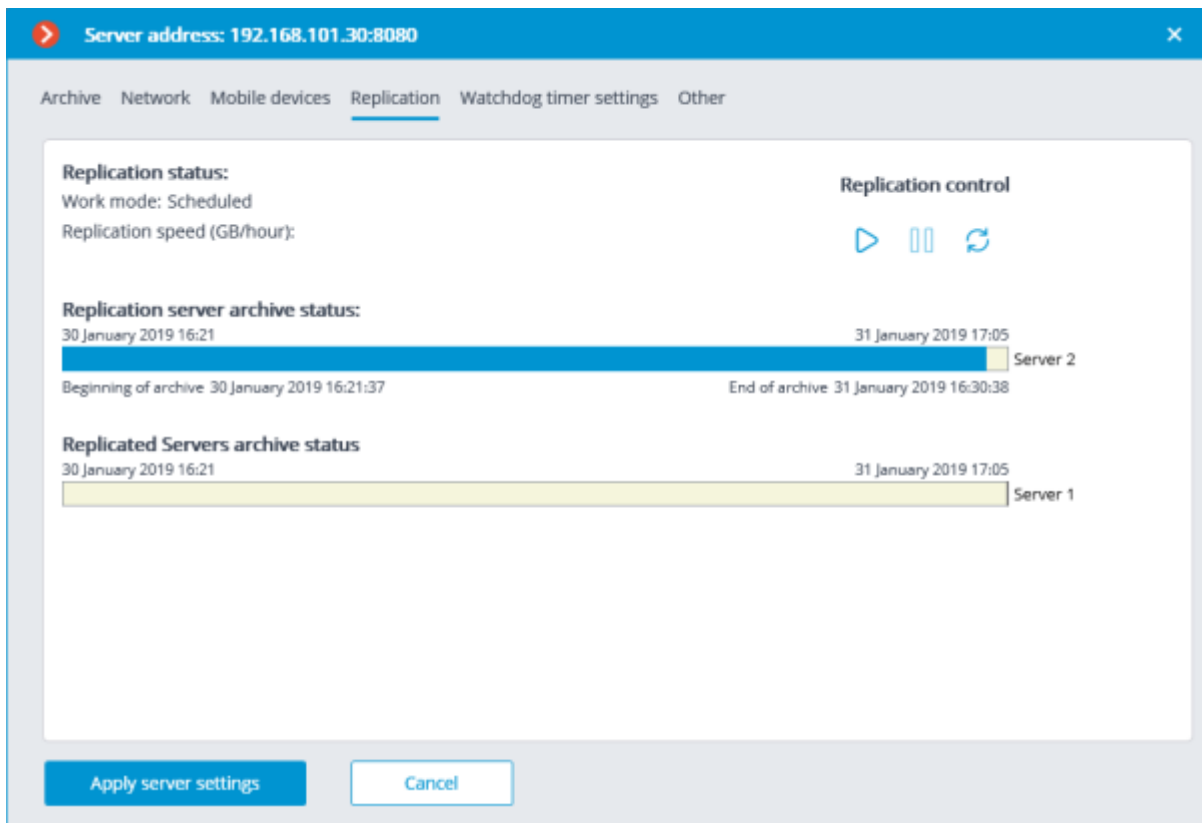
Then using one of the methods (thru camera settings, camera group settings, or camera distribution among servers settings) indicate the cameras the archives of which will be replicated.

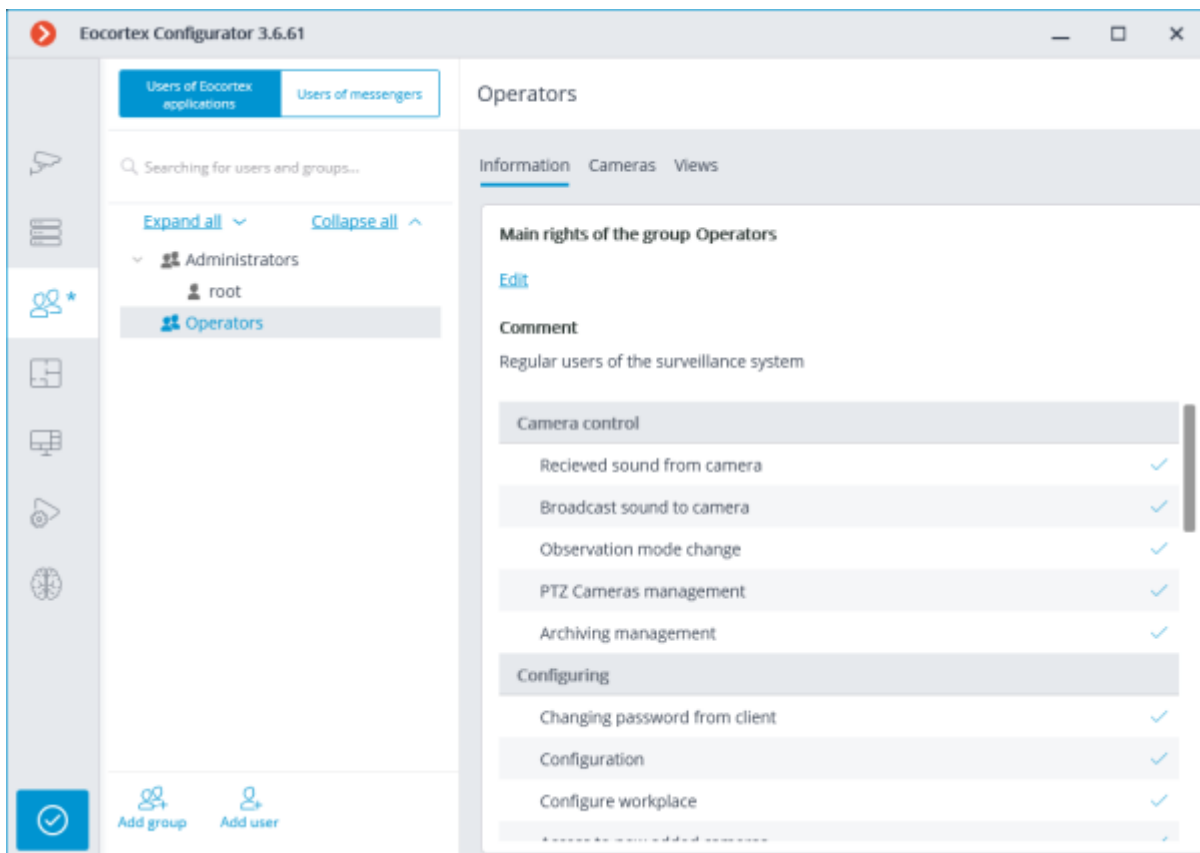


Users

The **Eocortex Configurator** application allows you to configure the rights of various categories of users of the video surveillance system.

Users of Eocortex applications (ML, LS and ST licenses)

To set up the rights of users of the Eocortex system running on **ML**, **LS** or **ST** license, run the **Eocortex Configurator**, open the  **Users** page and select the **Users of Eocortex applications** tab.



The tree of the groups and the users

The left part of the window contains a hierarchical tree of groups with the surveillance system users created in them. To configure an existing group or an individual user, select the required item in the list – the settings page of the selected group/user will be displayed in the right part of the window.

For the convenience of finding the necessary groups/users, the search field above the list can be used.

Particularities and limitations of user rights:

- The rights are provided only to the entire groups of users and are extended to all the users of the group. Individual users cannot be granted any rights that differ from the rights of the group.
- A single user can belong to only one group. A group may not contain users at all, but it is not possible to create a user which does not belong to any group.
- Every user is assigned a unique password.



- A user can be moved from one group to another, maintaining its password. The rights of the user in this case are modified according to those of the current group.

User groups in **Eocortex** running on **ML**, **LS** or **ST** licenses have two levels of rights:

- **Administrators:** System administrator access level. This is embedded group. Users of the group can configure the entire system, create, modify and delete other groups and users, view and listen to any cameras both in real time and from the archive. This group and its users can be deleted, provided that at least one user with configuration rights exists.
- **Operators:** Regular system user access level. The rights of group members with this level of access are limited to viewing cameras without access to the system configuration.

The ability to create user groups with partial system configuration rights is available only for **Eocortex** systems running on **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

Below is the list of actions available when setting up users of the system. These actions can be performed either from the context menu of the group/user, or using the buttons below the list of users and groups, or via links on the group or user information page. Some actions can be performed in multiple ways, including using hotkeys.

-  **Add group:** Opens the window of adding a group.
-  **Add user:** Opens the window of adding a user to the selected group.
- **Add group based on the selected one:** Adds a new group with the rights identical to those of the selected group.
- **Edit:** Opens the editing window for the selected group or user.
- **Delete:** Removes the selected group or user from the configuration.

The settings will come into effect only after they are [applied](#).

Operator permissions tree

Operator

Below is a list of the access rights that can be set for the user group with the Operator privilege level.

Surveillance

Access rights settings section, which is responsible for interaction with **Eocortex** using [client applications](#).

Includes the following subsections:

- **Basic**
A subsection that determines the accessibility of sections and functions of the **Eocortex Client** application to users belonging to this group.
- **Camera control**
- **Audio streaming from camera**
Provides the ability to listen to the sound received from the camera microphone. To receive sound in the system, the camera must have the **Sound capturing** option enabled in the [connection settings](#).
- **Broadcast sound to camera**

Provides the ability to transmit sound from a microphone installed at a user's workplace to the camera speaker. To transmit sound from the system, the camera must have the **Sound transmission** option enabled in the [connection settings](#).

- **Observation mode change**

Provides the ability to arm one or more cameras with the [Guard mode](#) in the **Eocortex Client** application in order to receive notifications when alarm events occur.

- **PTZ Cameras management**

Provides the ability to use the [PTZ functionality of the camera](#) in the **Eocortex Client** application. To use the PTZ functionality, the camera must have the **PTZ capabilities** option enabled in the [connection settings](#).

- **Archiving management**

Provides the ability to manually enable recording of the camera stream to the **Eocortex** archive, if the recording option **Manual**, **On motion** or **Scheduled** is selected for this camera in the [Archive Recording Settings](#).

- **Configuring**

- **Changing password from client**

Gives a user the ability to change the password for his system account in the **Eocortex Client** application.

- **Configuring**

Gives a user the ability to open the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

- **Configure workplace**

Gives a user the ability to change the [Workplace Settings](#) in the **Eocortex Client** application.

- **Access to new added cameras**

If enabled, a user from this group will be automatically granted access rights to all cameras added to the system later. If security policies require strict restriction of camera accessibility for users, it is recommended to disable this option and grant access to the required cameras to each user group manually.

- **Editing face database and license plate database data**

Determines the possibility of adding, modifying and deleting entries in the databases of the **License Plate Recognition** and **Face Recognition** modules.

- **Eocortex client applications capabilities**

- **Log access**

Specifies whether the [Events Log](#) is available to a user. Access to the Log can be granted to a user with one of two levels:

- **Current user in log only**

For a user, in addition to general system events (loss of connection with the camera, analytics events, etc.), only those events that were caused by his actions (execution of a user task, archive export, etc.) will be displayed.

- **All system users in log**

A user will see all system messages will be displayed, including those caused by the actions of other users.

- **Access to reports**

Determines for a user the ability to build reports based on the data collected by the **Eocortex** system ([Archive depth](#), [Face Recognition Report](#), etc.).

- **Access to archive marks**

Determines for a user the ability to create and view [Archive Bookmarks](#).

- **Access to maps**

Determines the availability of the **Maps** section for a user.

- **Access to Search for Objects**

Determines for a user the ability to use data collected by the system using the [Search for Objects](#) module.

- **Access to plans**

Determines the availability of the **Plans** section for a user.

- **Close application**

Determines the ability for a user to close the window of the **Eocortex Client** application using standard methods.

- **Limitation of the number of connections**

Sets a [limit on the number of simultaneous connections](#) using the credentials of the same user.

- **Application launch delayed**

Users of Eocortex applications (Enterprise and ULTRA licenses)

To set up the rights of users of the Eocortex system running on **Enterprise** or **ULTRA** license, run the **Eocortex Configurator**, open the  **Users** page and select the **Users of Eocortex applications** tab.



The tree of the groups and the users

The left part of the window contains a hierarchical tree of groups with the surveillance system users created in them. To configure an existing group or an individual user, select the required item in the list – the settings page of the selected group/user will be displayed in the right part of the window.

For the convenience of finding the necessary groups/users, the search field above the list can be used.

Particularities and limitations of user rights:

- The rights are provided only to the entire groups of users and are extended to all the users of the group. Individual users cannot be granted any rights that differ from the rights of the group.
- A single user can belong to only one group. A group may not contain users at all, but it is not possible to create a user which does not belong to any group.
- Every user is assigned a unique password.
- A user can be moved from one group to another, maintaining its password. The rights of the user in this case are modified according to those of the current group.

User groups in **Eocortex** running on **Enterprise** or **ULTRA** licenses have three levels of rights:

- **Senior administrators:** System administrator access level. An embedded group that cannot be deleted, and its rights cannot be modified. Only one group of users with such access level can exist in



the system. The users belonging to this group have unlimited configuration access: they are allowed to configure the whole system, create, modify and delete other groups and users, view and listen to any cameras, both in real time and from the archive. This group cannot be deprived of its rights. The configuration of the system must contain at least one member of this group (The default configuration of a system always contains an embedded user named root).

- **Junior administrators:** System administrator access level. Users of such group have also the ability to change the selection of the main server, as well as add new cameras and servers to the system. However, they are not allowed to configure the plans and users of the system. Removing a server from the system is available to the junior administrator only if no cameras that are unavailable for this user are bound to this server.
- **Operators:** Regular system user access level. The rights of group members with this level of access are limited to viewing cameras without access to the system configuration.

When updating the system running on **Eocortex ULTRA** version 1.4 or older to a later version, the following changes will be applied to user rights:

- **Senior administrators** group will be created. All the users with full system configuring rights will be transferred there.
- All groups which have the rights to partially configure the system become groups with junior administrator level.
- At rollback **Eocortex** to a version earlier than 1.4, all groups with junior administrator rights will have full access to perform configuring of the whole system.

Below is the list of actions available when setting up users of the system. These actions can be performed either from the context menu of the group/user, or using the buttons below the list of users and groups, or via links on the group or user information page. Some actions can be performed in multiple ways, including using hotkeys.

-  **Add group:** Opens the window of adding a group.
-  **Add user:** Opens the window of adding a user to the selected group.
- **Add group based on the selected one:** Adds a new group with the rights identical to those of the selected group.
- **Edit:** Opens the editing window for the selected group or user.
- **Delete:** Removes the selected group or user from the configuration.

The settings will come into effect only after they are [applied](#).

After the user clicks on the link in the appropriate messenger, a greeting will be sent to them.

When selecting a user in the list, the information about that user will be shown on the **General** tab. In addition, using the corresponding links, it is possible to delete a user, change their settings, and resend the links with invitations to their messengers.

Added users are bound to the system to which they have been added rather than to the account. If the same account is used to connect to another system, the list of users in that system will initially be empty. At the same time, if a different account is used to connect to the system, the users added to that system will be transferred to the new account.

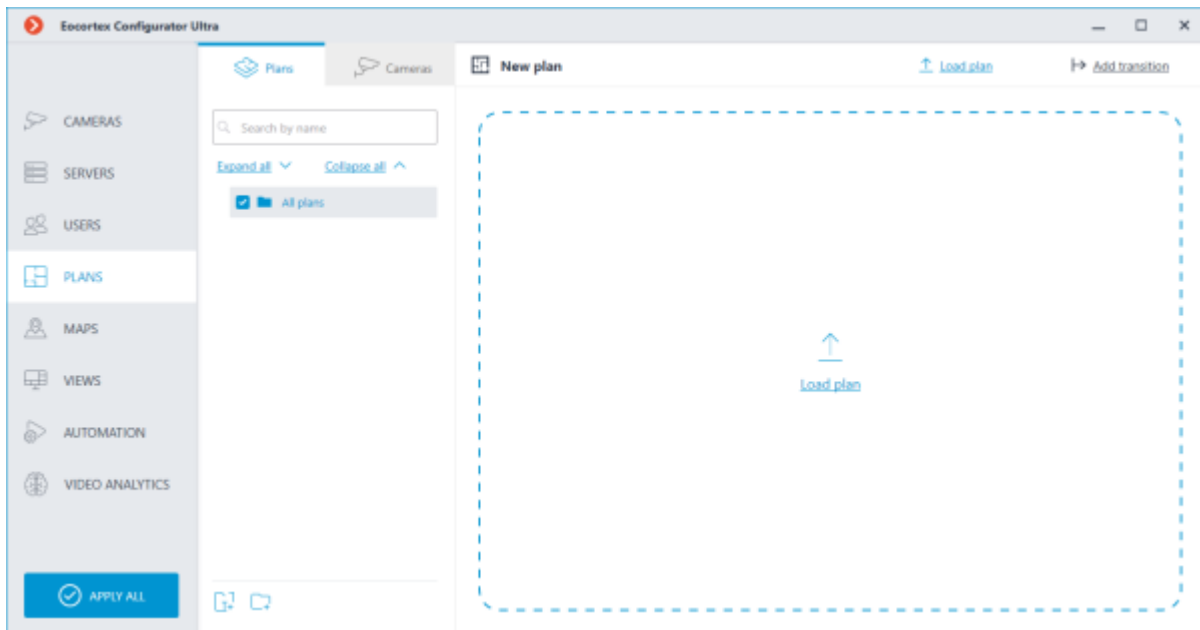
If the same account is used to connect to different systems, all added users in all systems will be added together. At the same time, the same user in different systems will be regarded as a different user. Thus, the current number of users bound to the account will correspond to the sum of all users in all systems.

The same user interacting with the same system through different messengers does not interact in different messengers with themselves. That is, the actions of this user in one messenger have no effect on the sessions of the same user in other messengers.

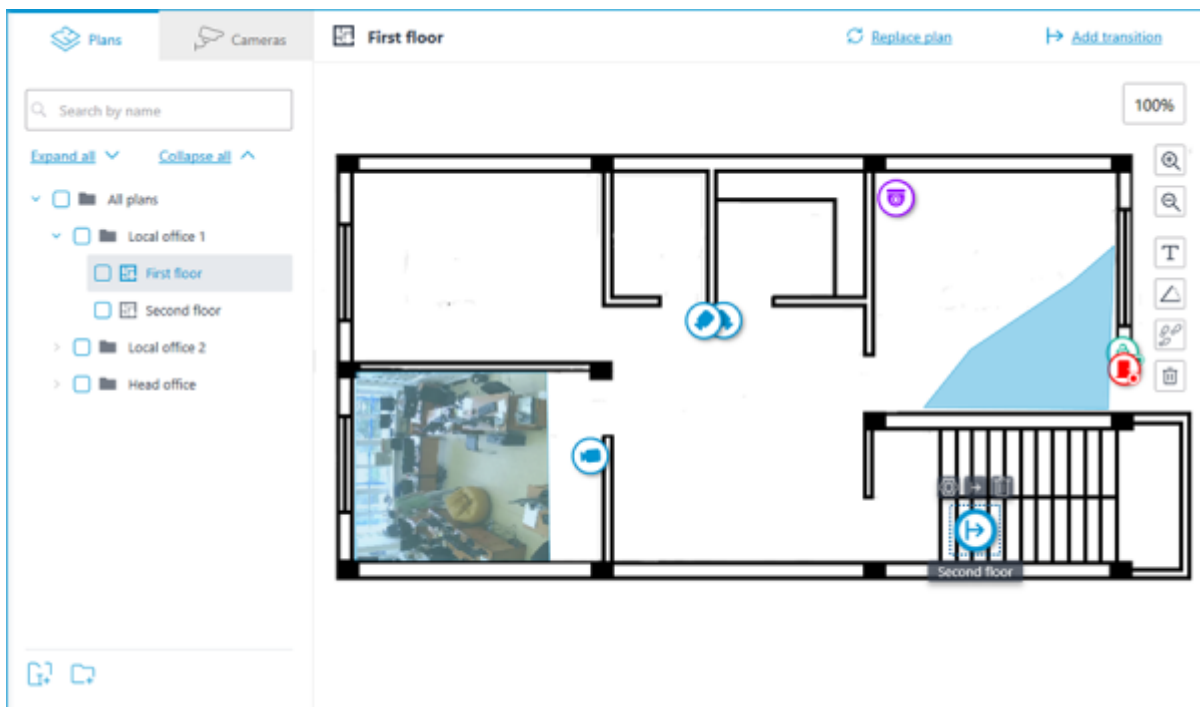
Plans

To set up camera layout in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to  **Plans** tab.

This tab contains site plans and the cameras, sensors, relays placed on these plans, as well as camera fields of view and transition points between the plans.

Plans

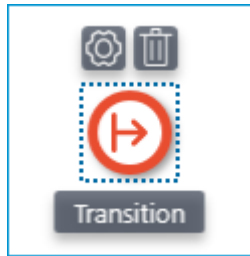

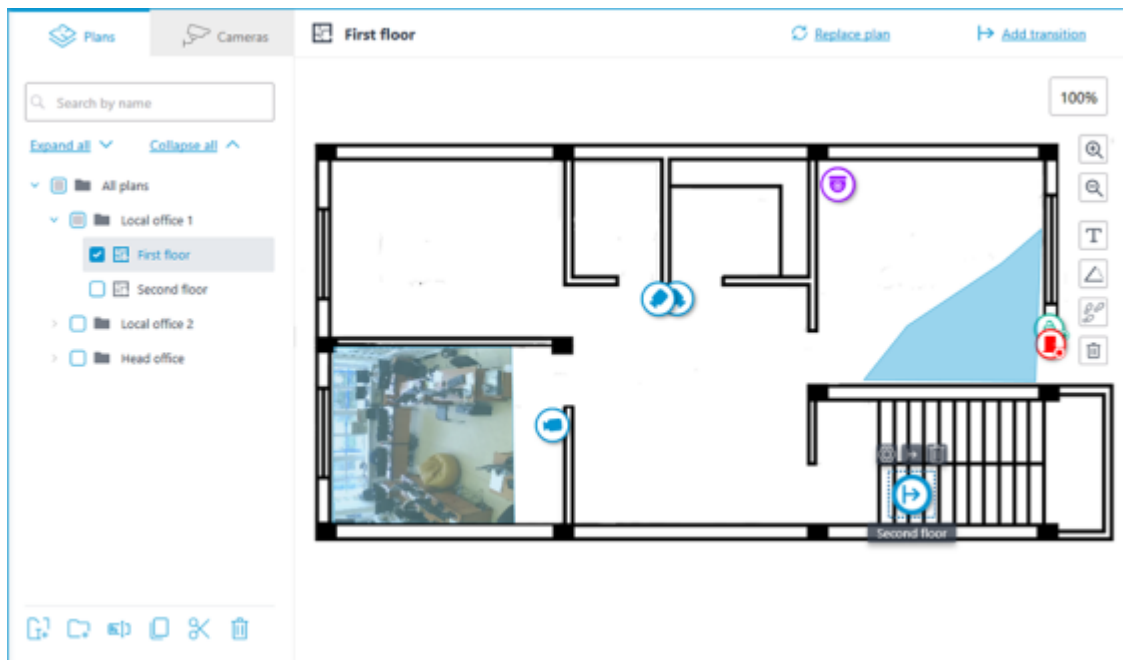




To set it up, place the transition point to the plan and click the  button.



In the **Transition settings** window that opens, select the plan to which the transition should guide to. In the **Distance between links, min:** field, set the time in minutes that a person would actually spend following this transition, and then click the **Apply** button.

The plans window will automatically switch to the specified plan, and a transition endpoint will be added in the center of the screen. Place it on the plan in a location that actually connects this plan to the previous one.




When selecting the icon of the configured transition on the map, the transition button  becomes available. It allows to quickly switch between the plans. When switching, the new plan will open in such a way that the transition endpoint icon will be located in the center of the screen.

A bar with the following buttons is available on the right side of the plan:

-  **Zoom in:** Scales the plan up.
-  **Zoom out:** Scales the plan down.

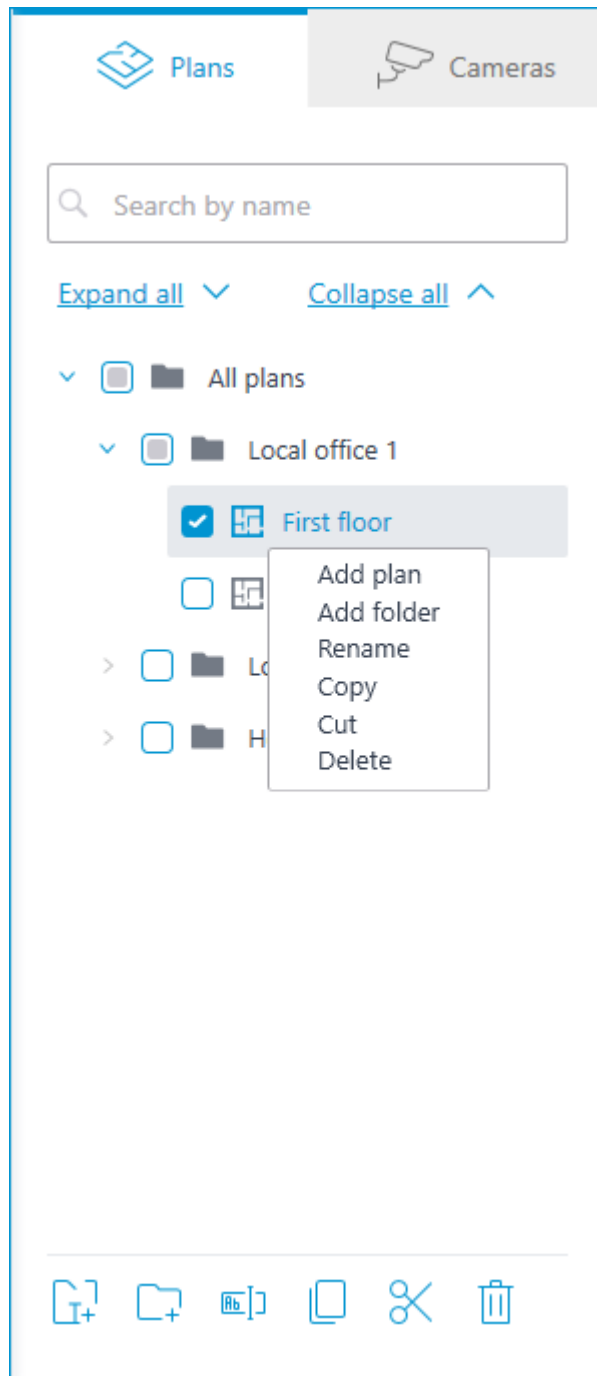

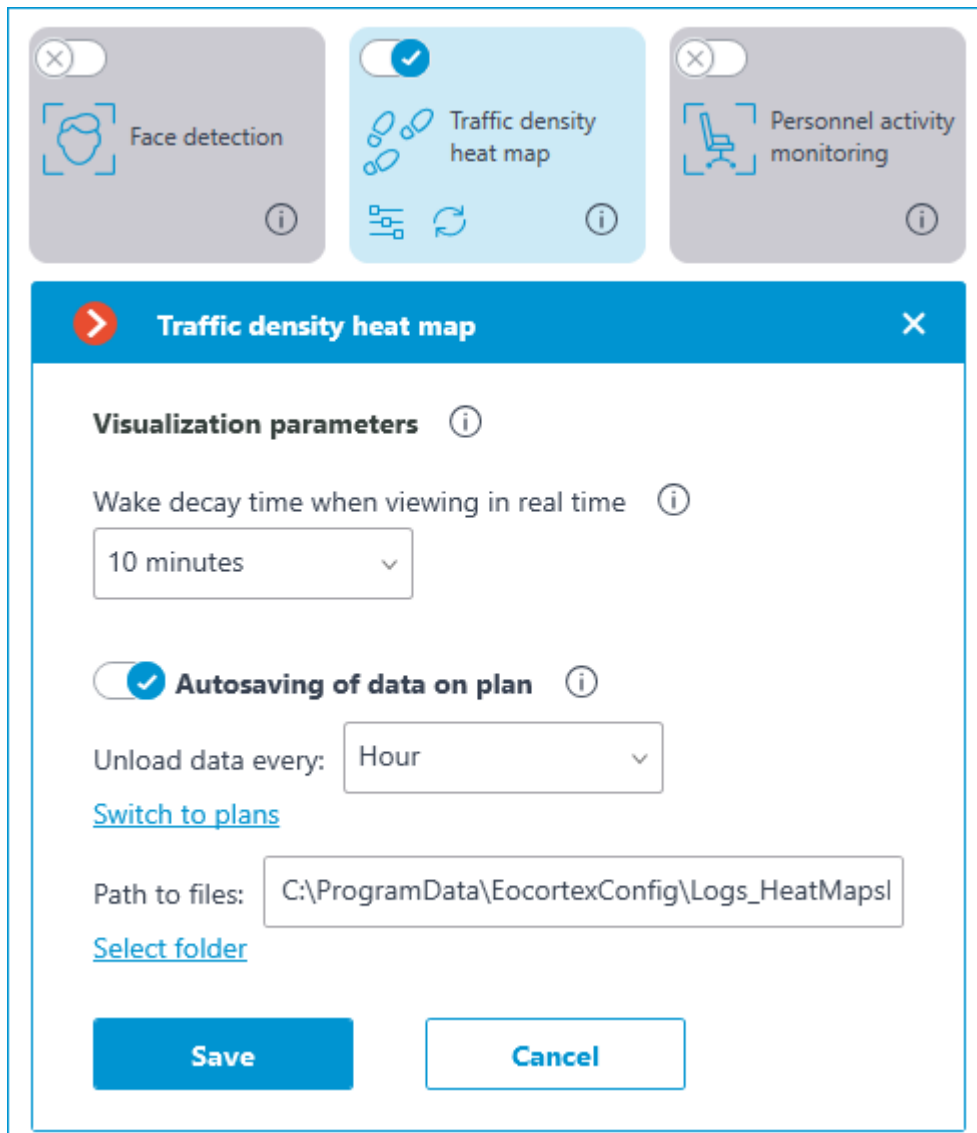
In addition to selecting a plan manually, it can also be found using the search field above the plans tree.

It is possible to move between folders both individual plans and even entire folders.

Plan, starting from **Eocortex 4.1**, is the lowest level element in the tree. When migrating settings from earlier versions, folders are used to keep the hierarchical structure. For an item with attachments, a folder with the same name is created at a higher level, in which the item itself and its attachments are placed in the same manner.

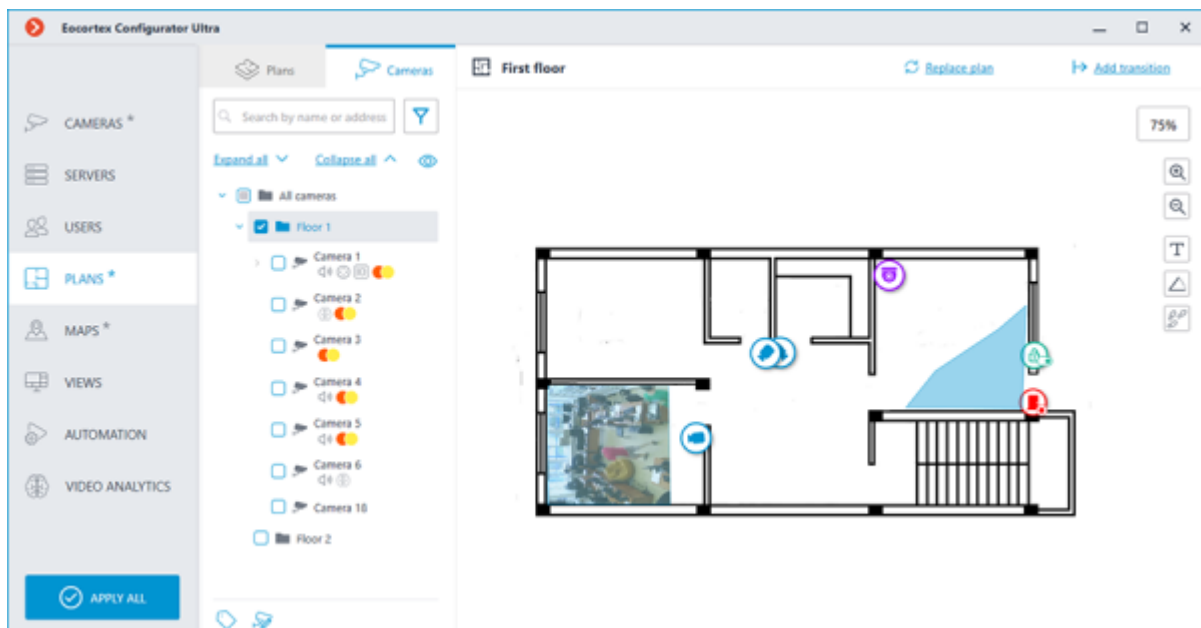

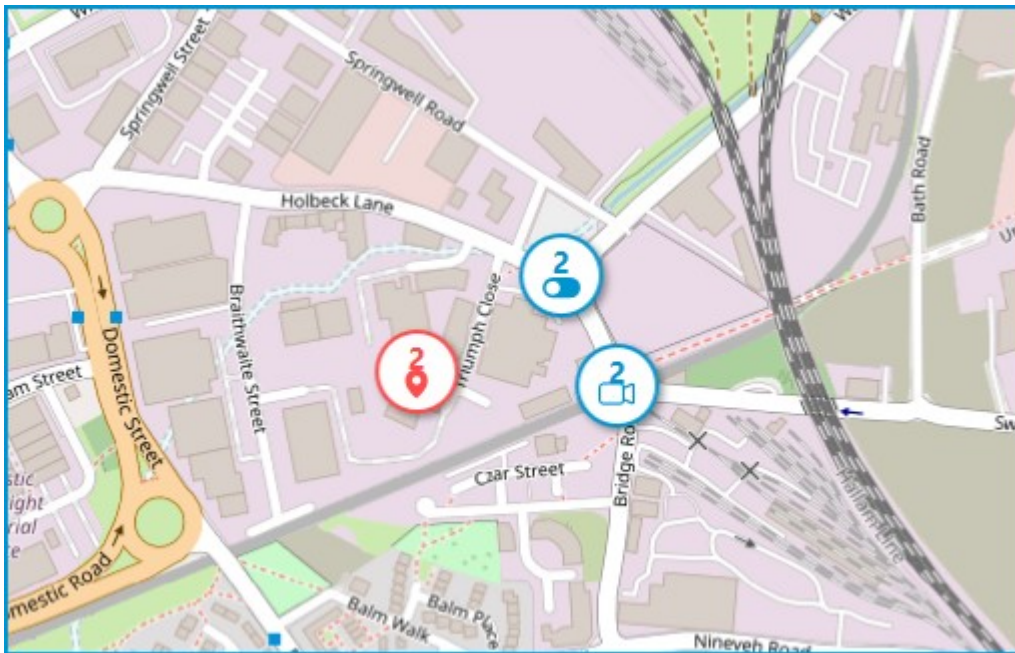
When the sensor is selected on the map, its name and the following buttons appear: **Edit parameters**, **Remove from map**, and **Show in tree**.

Grouping elements on the map

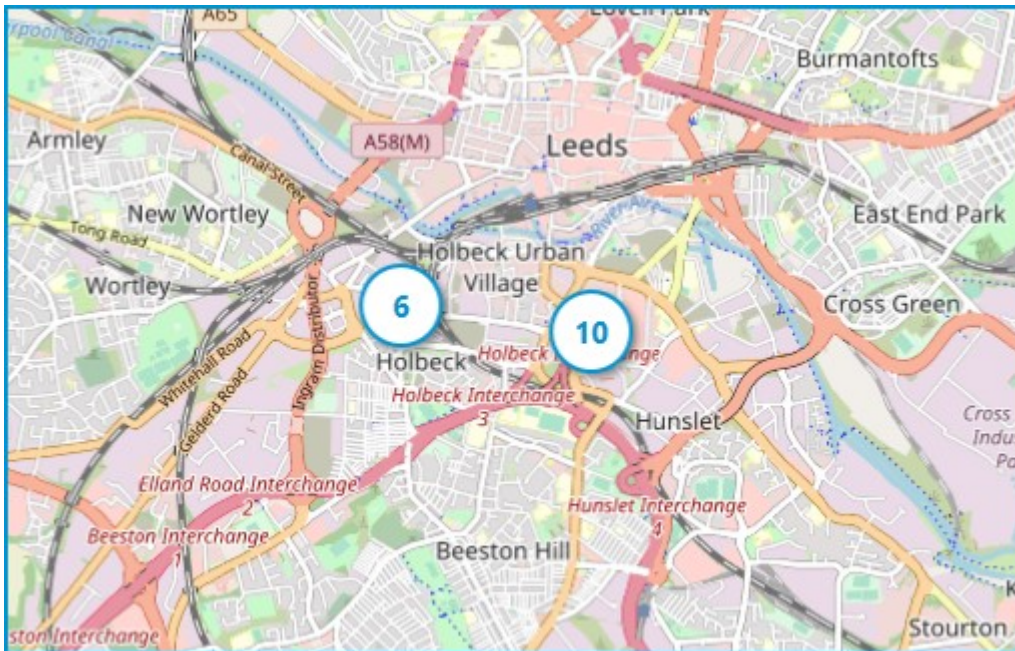
When the scale of the map is changing, cameras, sensors, relays, and objects on the map can be clustered into the group markers.



Elements of the same type located close to each other on the map are grouped into one marker with the number of grouped elements and their type: camera, sensor, relay, or object.



Elements of different types are grouped into one marker with the number of devices.



If the number of grouped elements is more than 99, the number on the marker will be displayed as **99+**.

Locations



On this tab, preset locations can be created on the map, using which users can quickly navigate to the required parts of the map with a given map scale.

To create a location, click the **Add location** option in the context menu or at the bottom of the locations tree.

If necessary, locations can be grouped by folders.

Location, starting from **Eocortex 4.1**, is the lowest level element in the tree. When migrating settings from earlier versions, folders are used to keep the hierarchical structure. For an item with attachments, a folder with the same name is created at a higher level, in which the item itself and its attachments are placed in the same manner.

The following actions are available in the context menu when selecting an individual location or an entire folder:



It is possible to move between folders both individual locations and even entire folders.

To define a location, select an area on the map. The bottom part of the area displays the coordinates of the selected area center and the map scale.

If necessary, the coordinates can be set manually. The following types of coordinates are allowed:

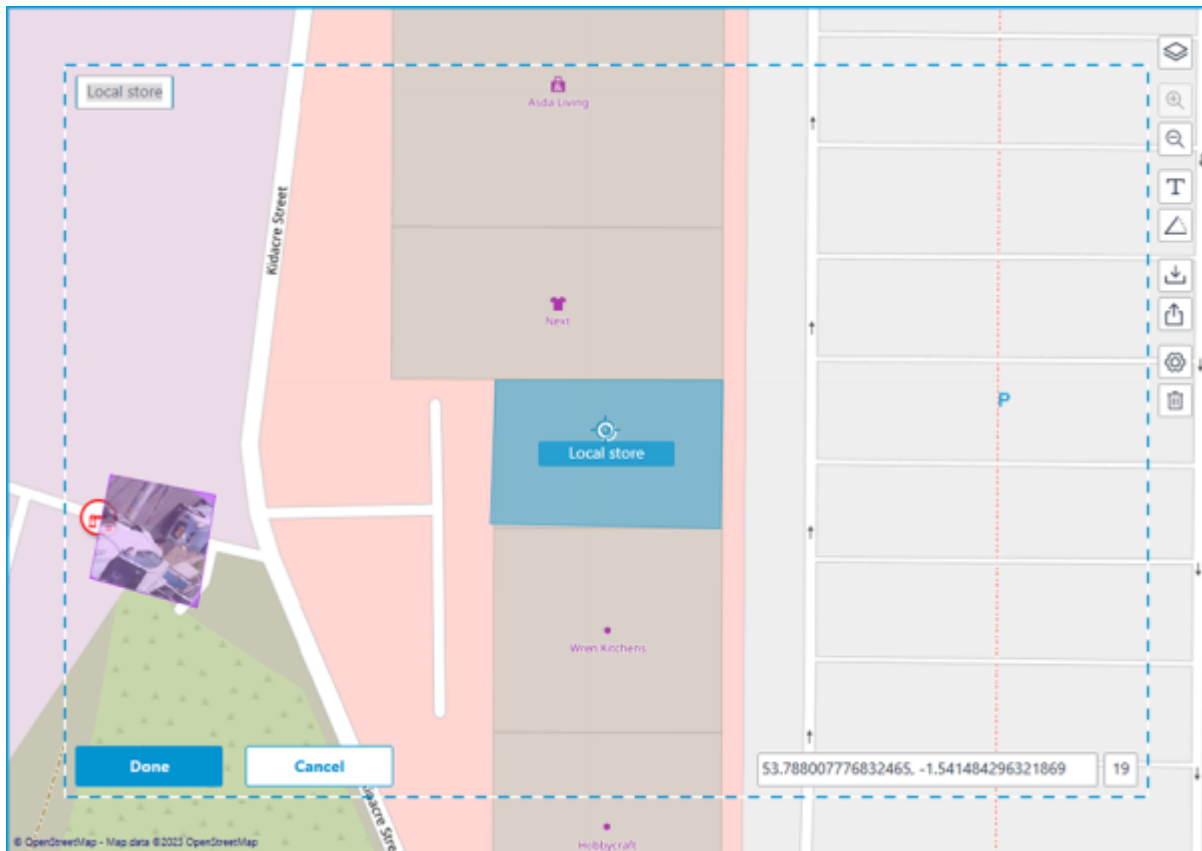

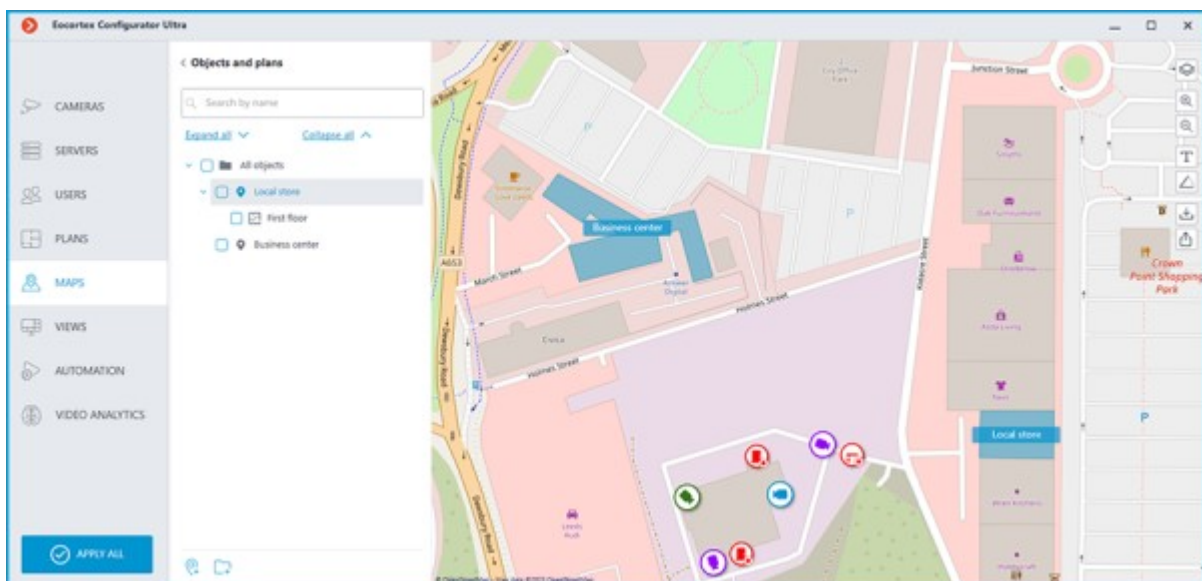

A **comma** or **semicolon** can be used as the separator, and the decimal separator can be specified as either a **comma** or a **dot**.

The name of the location can be set by double-clicking both In the tree and on the box in the upper left corner of the object on the map.



Objects and plans



On this tab, Objects can be created. Object is an area on the map, such as a building or facility area, for which a more detailed plan should be set up.

The object can have several plans attached. This feature is useful if the building has several floors.



The following actions are available in the context menu when selecting an individual object or an entire folder:

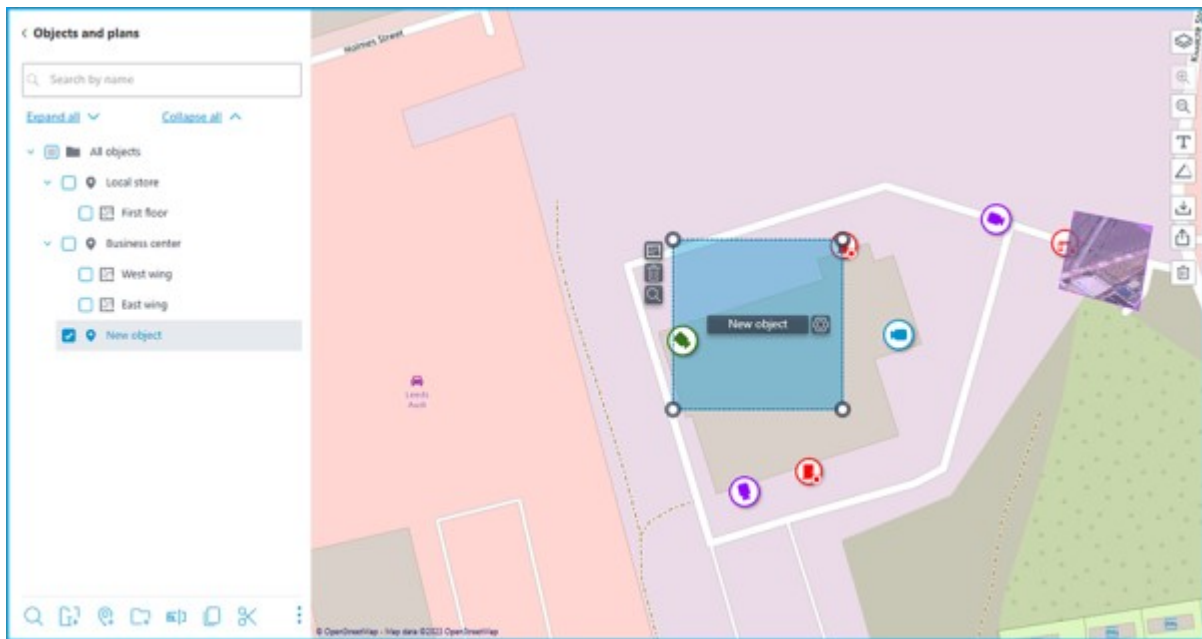



The same actions can be performed using the buttons in the bottom panel of the objects tree.

It is possible to move between folders both individual objects and even entire folders.

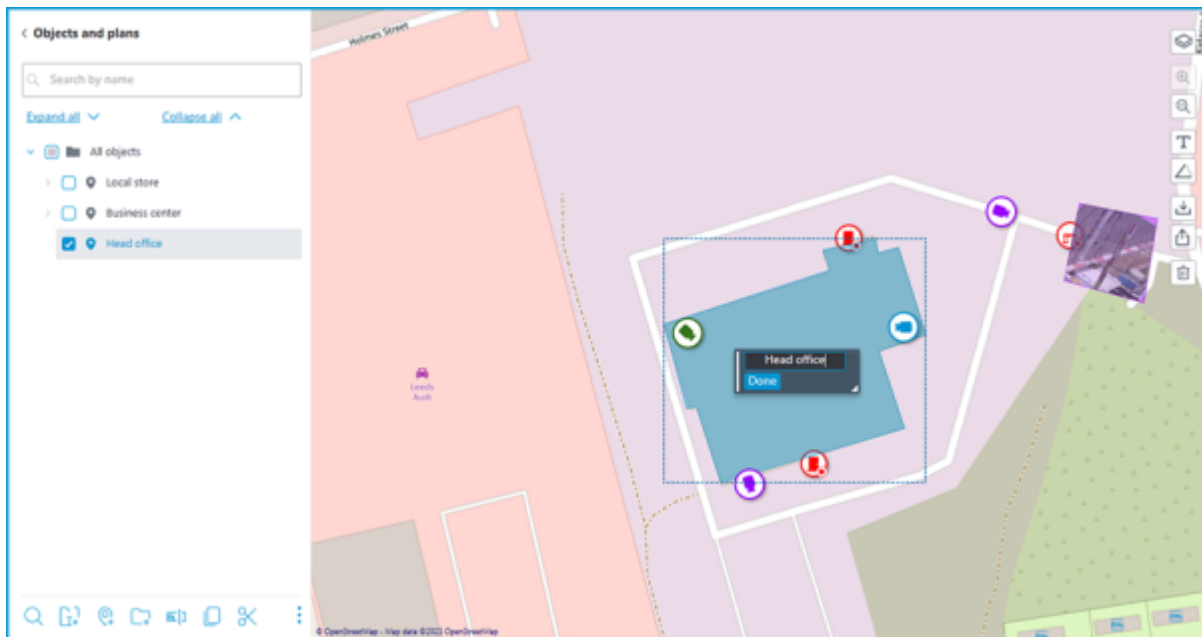
To create an object, click the **Add site** option in the context menu or at the bottom of the objects tree.

When creating a new object, a rectangular area appears on the map, which can be adjusted by dragging the nodes. A new node can be added by left-clicking on the object's boundary, and an unnecessary node can be removed by right-clicking on it.



You can name the object either by double-clicking on the object in the tree, or by clicking on the  button located in the interactive area of the object next to the current name.

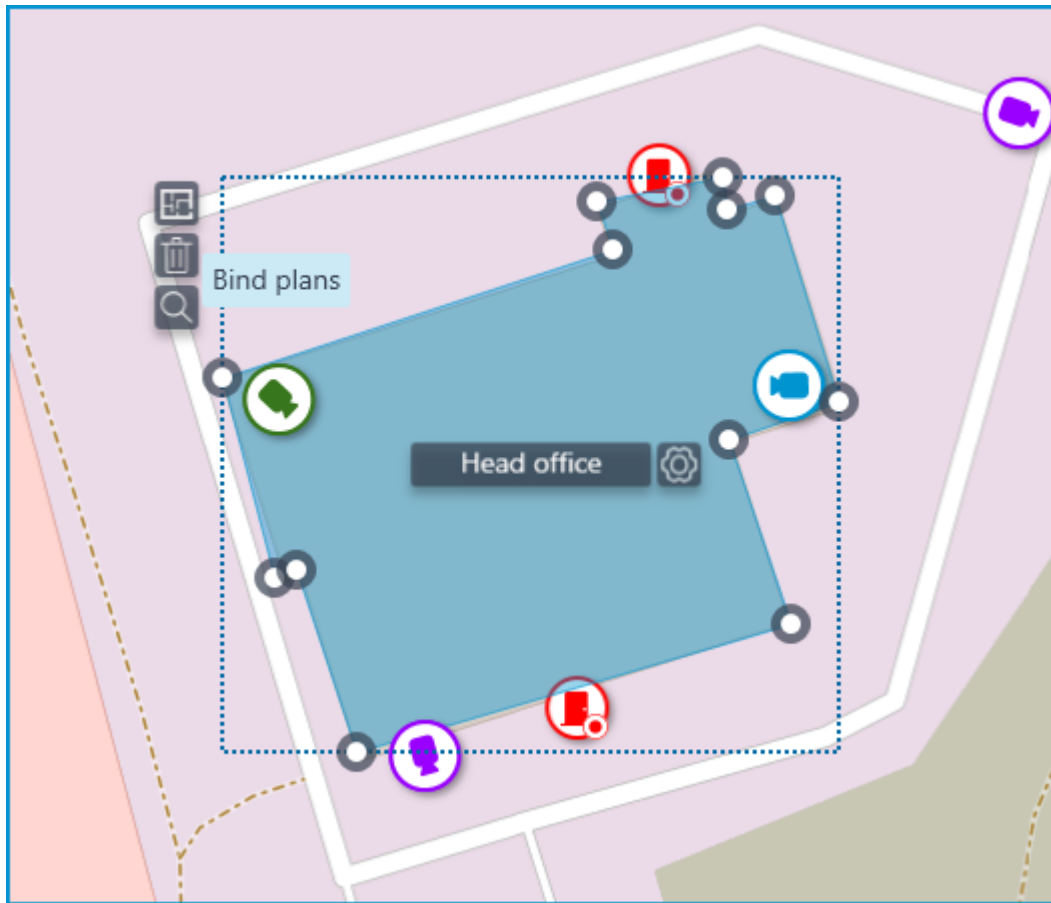
Clicking this button makes the name field interactive. In addition to changing its value, it is also possible to extend and reduce its size depending on the length of the name.



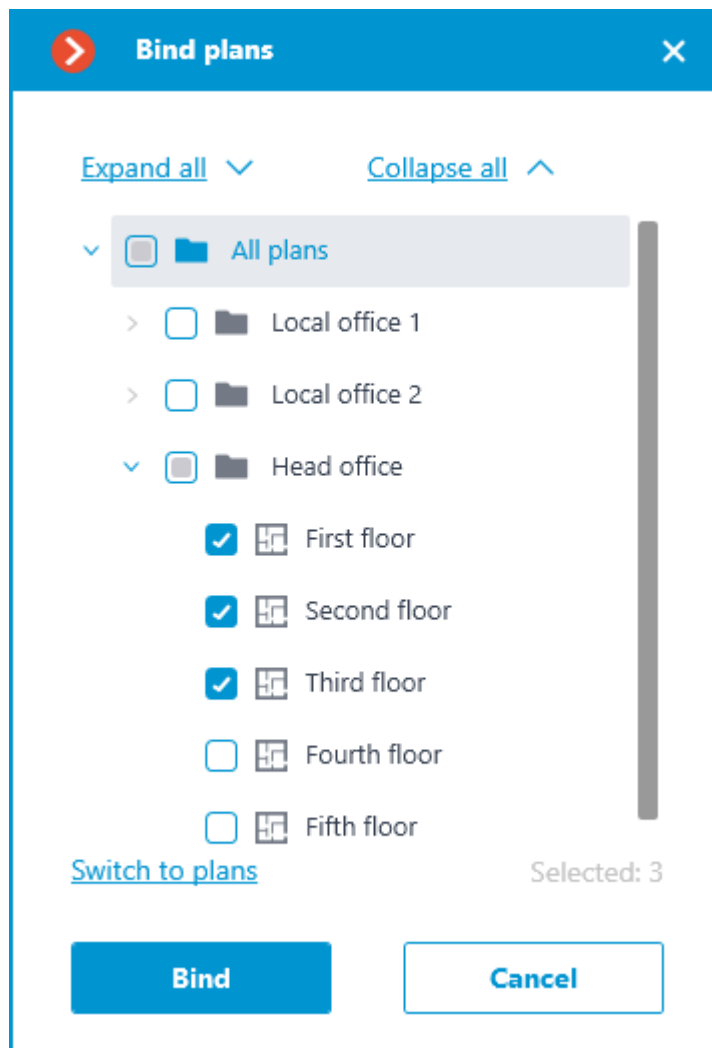
If the object name is too long to display, the name window can be resized by dragging the bottom right corner. Otherwise, the part of the name that does not fit into the rectangle will be replaced by an ellipsis when displayed.

If necessary, the name can be moved to the place where it should be displayed on the object. To do this, drag the rectangle by the left edge to the desired position and click the **Done** button. By default, the object name is displayed in the middle of the object.

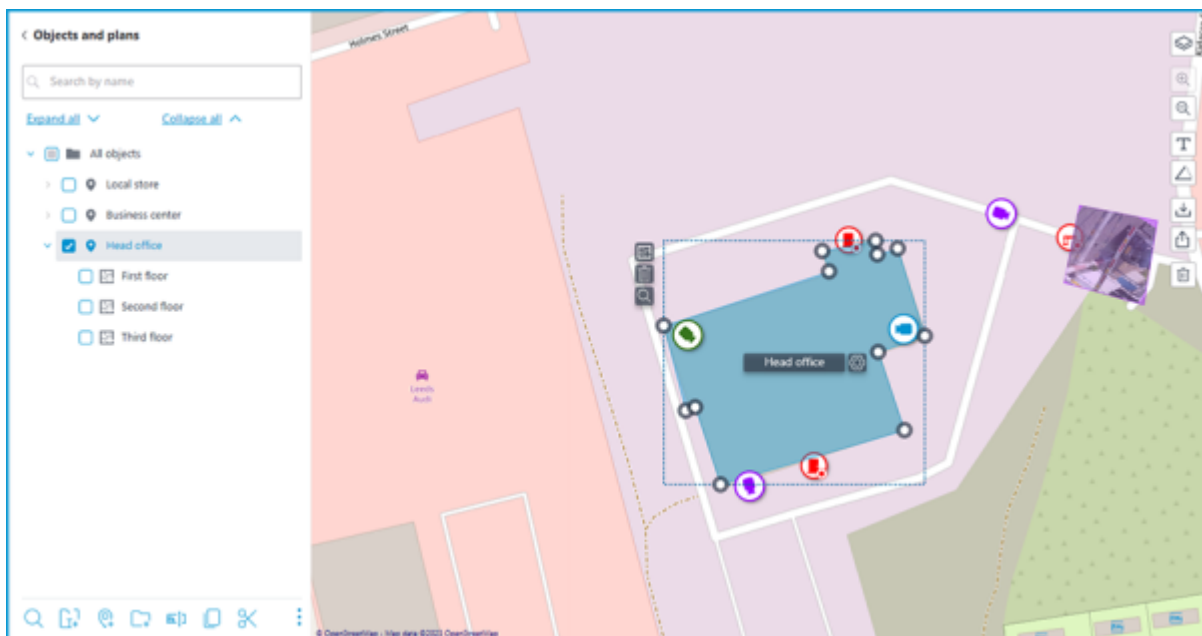
Plans can be attached to the object. Select the object in the tree and click the **Bind plans** option in the context menu or at the bottom of the objects tree. Also, the same button is available next to the object area on the map.



The window that opens displays all the plans available in the [Plans](#) section. Switching to plans can be performed by clicking **Switch to plans**.



Select the plans to be bound and click **Bind**. After that, all bound plans will be displayed in the tree for the relevant object.



Selected object can be deleted by clicking the  option in the context menu or at the bottom of the objects tree. Also, the same button is available next to the object area on the map.


Views

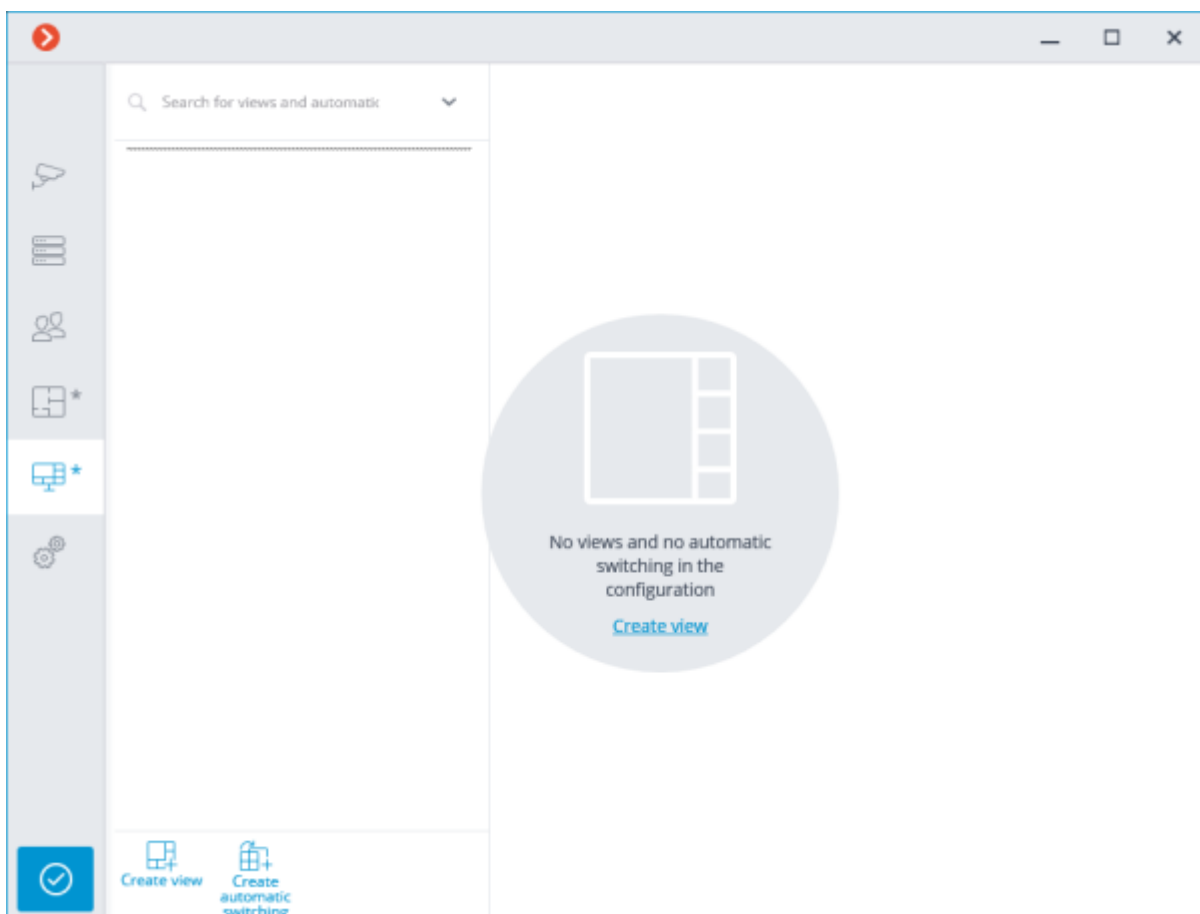
To display the images from the cameras on the screen in the client applications, **Eocortex** uses **Views** – grids with the images from the cameras shown in the cells. There are two types of views: Server and Client ones.

- **Server View** is a view created by a video surveillance system administrator in **Eocortex Configurator**. The server views are available in the **Eocortex Client** application as well as in the mobile client applications working under Android and iOS. In a multi-server system, the server views are available when connecting to any server of the system via the client application. At that, the server view is added to the client application at the moment of launching it. Thus, if you create or modify a server view, the changes will appear only after the restart of the application.
- **Client View** is a view created by a user in the client application. The client views are available only on a particular device or computer on which they were created, and only for the particular user who created them. Upon the termination of a session of working with the client application, all the client views that contain no cameras are deleted.



The server views that contain no cameras will not be added to the client application when it is launched.

In addition to views, automatic switching can be used. **Automatic switching** is a sequence of views that replace one another automatically. It is intended to change the views automatically with the preset periodicity so that the user would not have to do it manually.

To set up server views and automatic switching in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, go to the  **Views** tab.

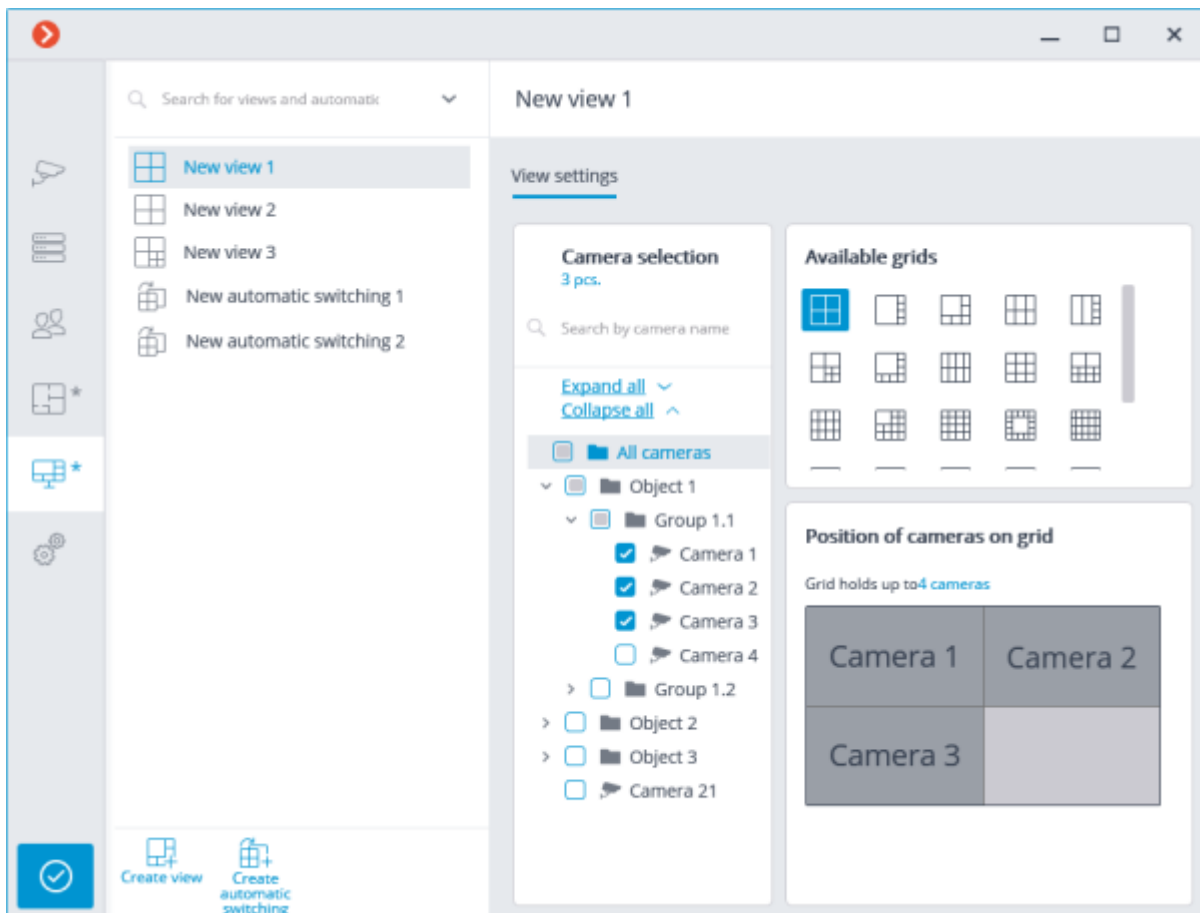


Below are the commands available in the course of setting up views and automatic switching. These commands can be opened from the context menu, by using the buttons at the bottom of the page, or by clicking the links on the page of the views and automatic switching. Some commands can be opened using various methods, including hot keys.

-  **Create view**
-  **Create automatic switching**

- **Delete**

Selecting a view or a switching in the right part of the tab makes their settings available.

Server view settings



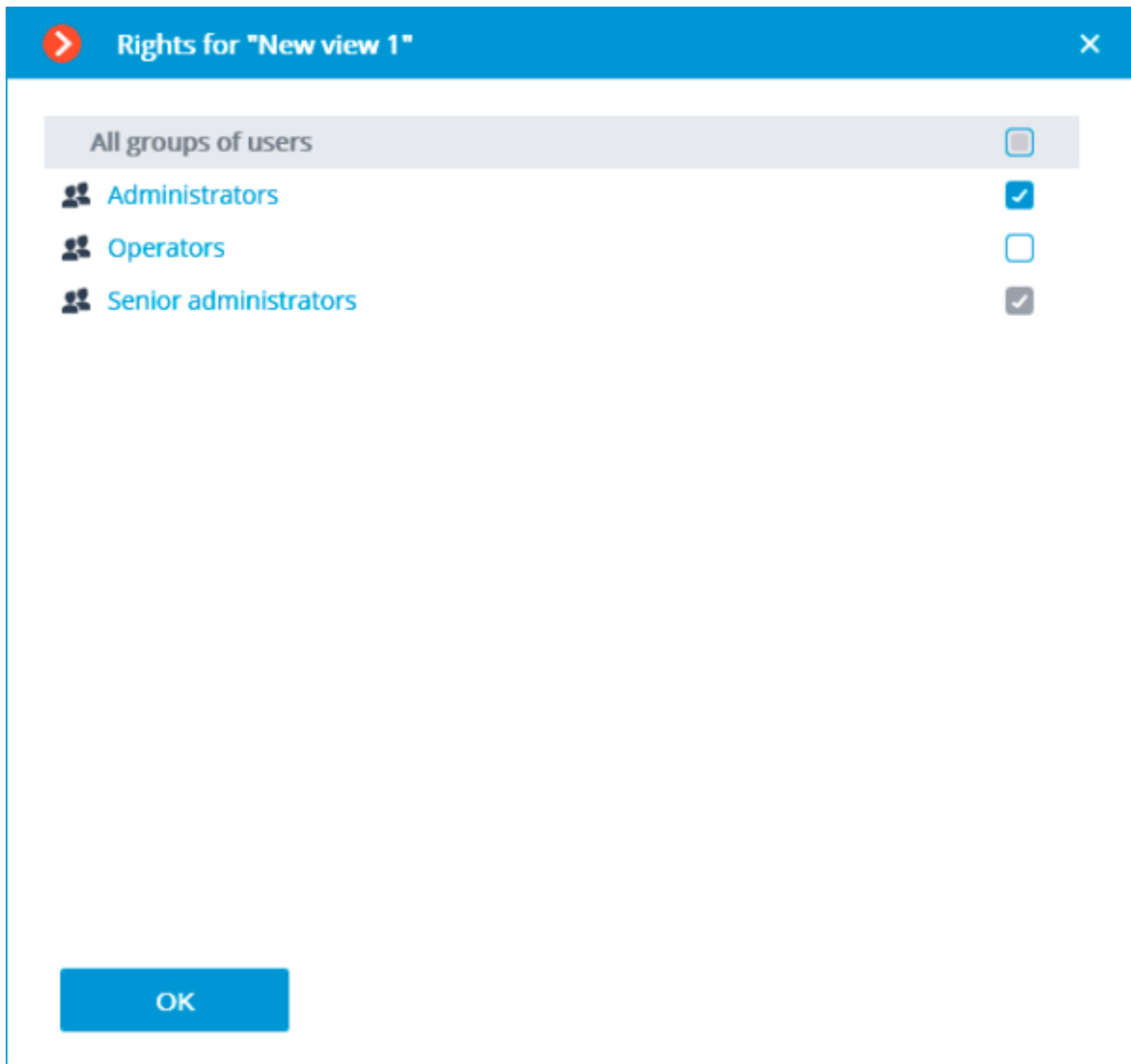
The view can be configured using various methods:

Mark cameras and folders in **Camera selection** tree, then choose one of the grids in the **Available grids** section. The cameras will be automatically placed in the grid cells.

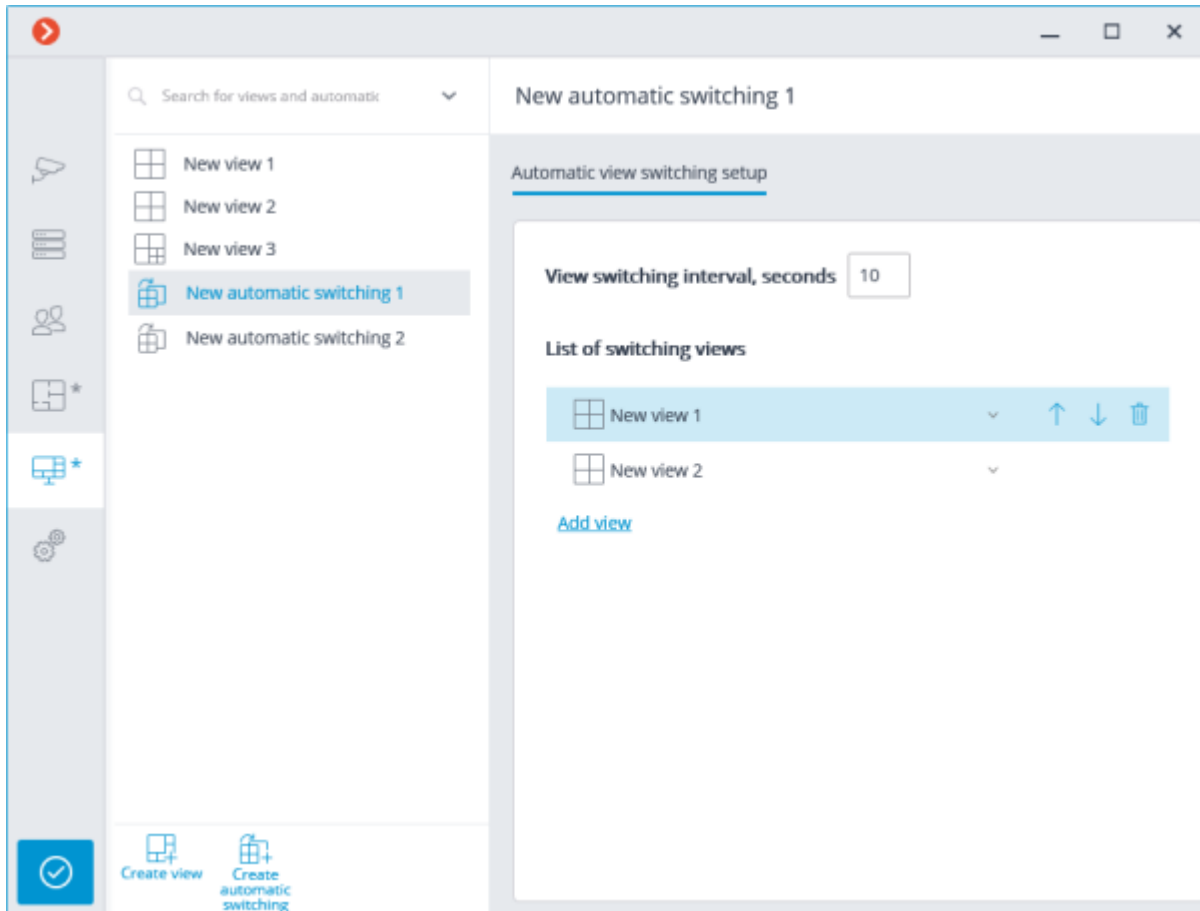
Select one of the available grids in the **Available grids** section, place cameras on the grid dragging them from the **Camera selection** tree to the grid.

You can modify the layout of cameras on the grid by dragging them between the cells with your mouse.

In certain types of licenses, the access rights are set for each view.







Automatic switching settings




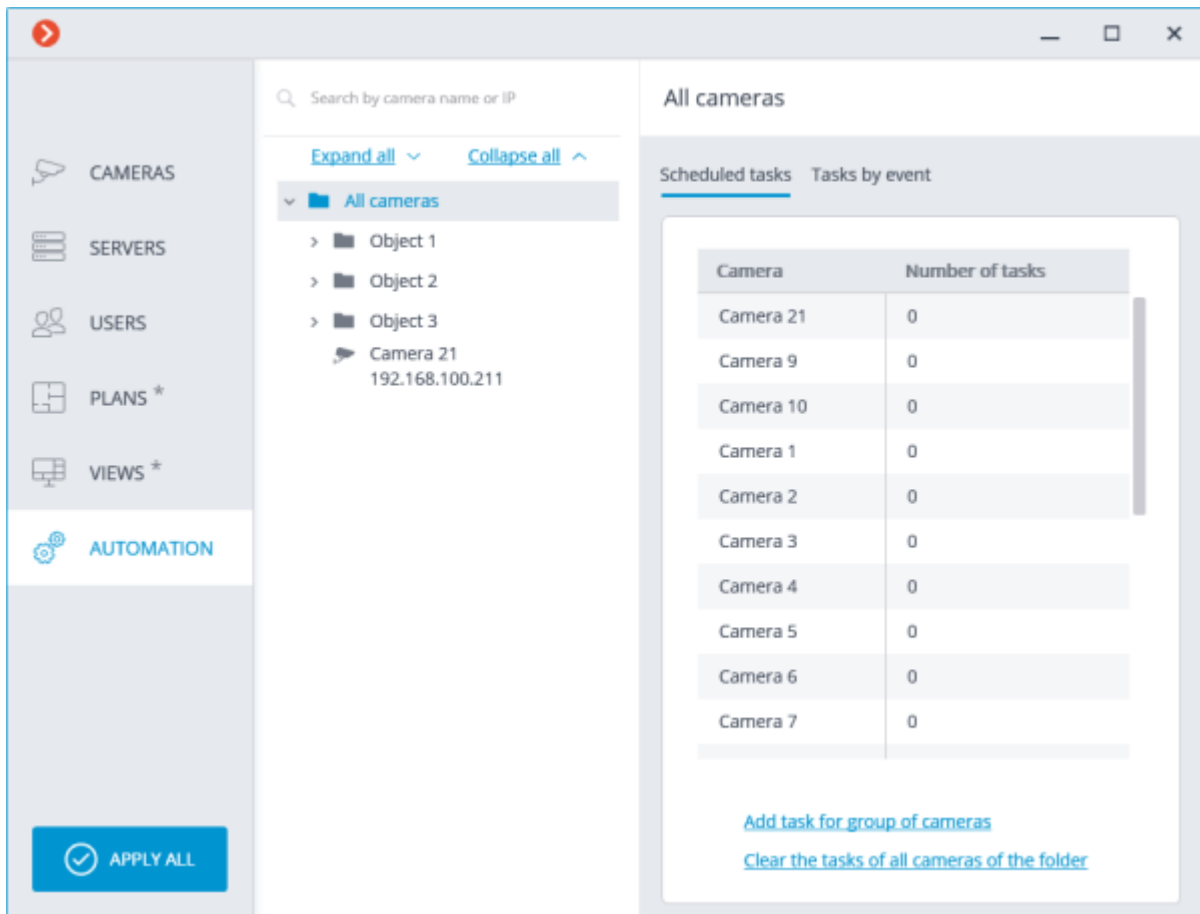
To set up the automatic switching, it is required to set the time of displaying each view in the **View switching interval, seconds** field and add the desired views to the **List of switching views** using the **Add view** command.

When adding a view to the list, the first available view is always added by default. To modify the added view, use the buttons located to the right of its name:

-  view selection/modification;
-  moving the view up the list;
-  moving the view down the list;
-  deleting the view.

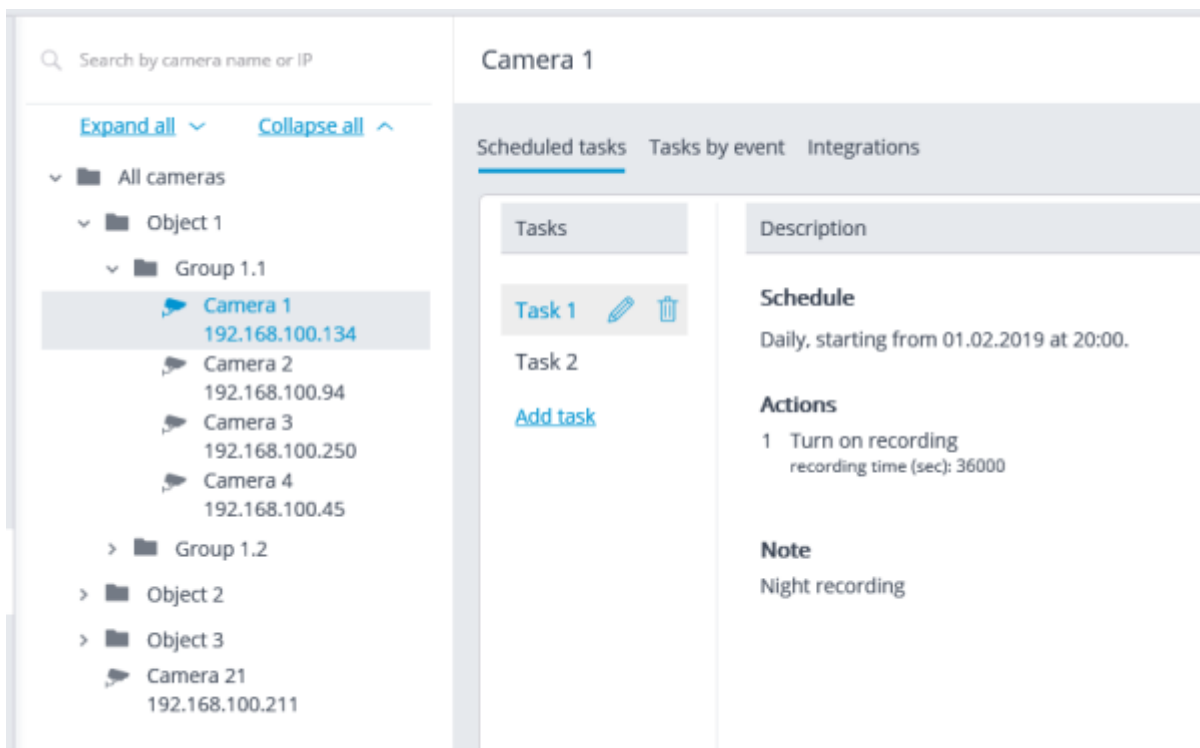
Automation

To set up actions to be performed on schedule or in response to certain events, as well as for adjusting the interaction with the external systems, it is required to go to the  **Automation** tab in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Door selection

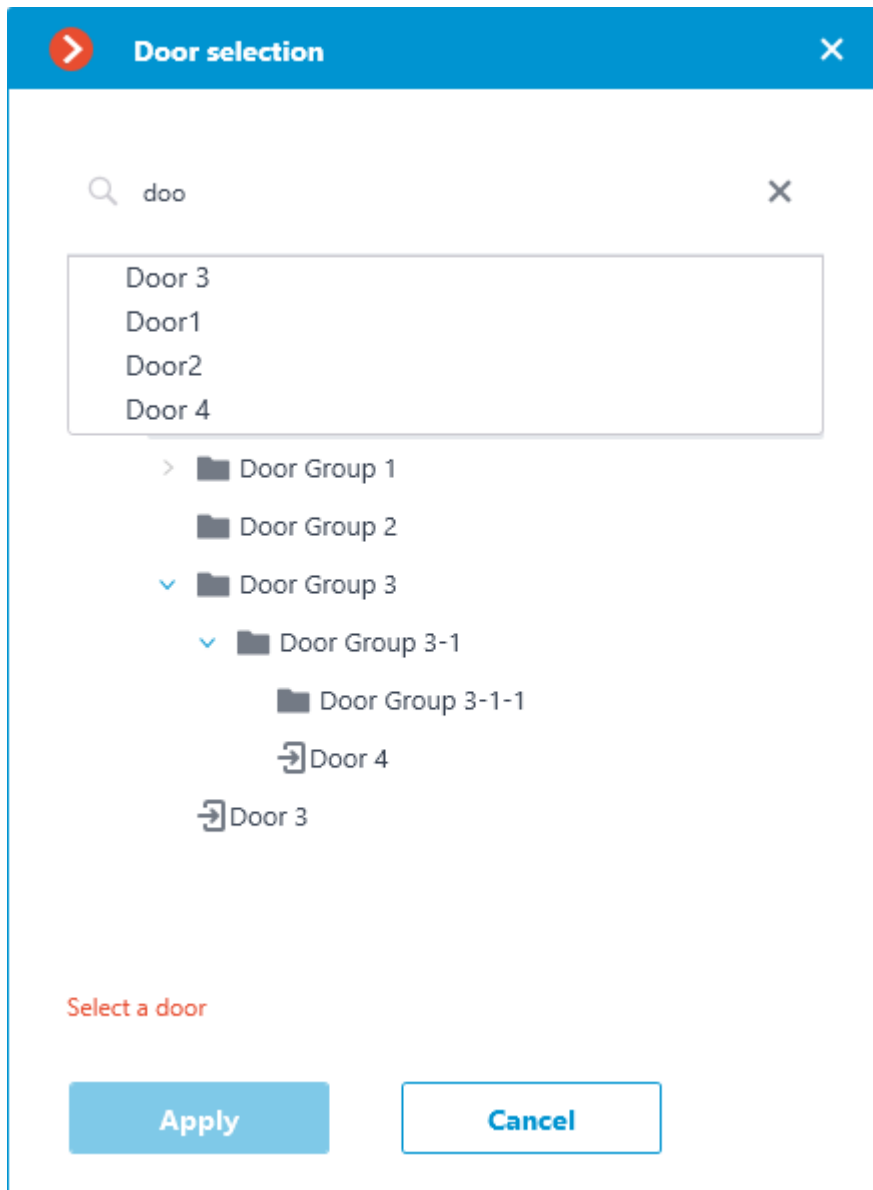
Clicking the **Select** button next to the **Door** field opens the device selection window. To load the list of doors available for interaction, the connection to **Suprema BioStar 2** ACS will be established with the credentials that were specified in the **Integrations** section.




The **Door selection** window allows selecting the door from the list, for which the action should be performed. It is necessary to select a specific door, selecting a group of doors at once is not possible.



For easy navigation to the right door, the text search by its name is available at the top of the window. Select the desired door and click **Apply** to confirm.



Once the door is selected, the previously inactive  **Copy** button, located in the **Door** field, becomes available. Clicking this button saves to the clipboard the name and ID of the selected door, which can be used later for diagnostic or automation tasks.

Before using the GSM modem on the server, it is required to install the drivers supplied with the modem, then check the modem's operability by sending a test message either with the software provided with the modem or using the operating system's means. After checking the modem's operability, it is required to close or stop the software used for working with the modem — otherwise the modem may become unavailable for use with the CCTV system.

The number of the COM port to which the GSM is connected may be found in the Windows Device Manager or in the software provided with the modem.



Folder (on server): sets the path to the folder where the frames will be stored. Use of [template variables](#) is supported.

File name template — the name of the saved frame, to the end of which will be added date and time in the format **_dd_MM_yyyy hh.mm.ss** to provide uniqueness. If the template name is not specified, it will be formed by default from the name of the camera and the time of the event. Use of [template variables](#) is supported. For example, if setting up a template using the **{{ cameraname }}** variable, the name of the resulting file would be **Office_01_11_2022 16.47.59.jpg**.

Saved frame format: image file format (JPEG or PNG).

On the **Runtime conditions** tab, it is possible to set the conditions for an action to be performed.

When adding several conditions, it is required to take into consideration that all the conditions are combined by the AND logical operator. Consequently, there can be a situation when, with certain settings, the action will never be executed.

For example, if two different zones were set for the movement event in the conditions, the action will be performed only in case that the movement is registered in the part of the frame where these zones overlap. If the zones do not overlap, the action will never be performed.



The procedure of adding a task by event to a group of cameras is similar to the procedure for a single camera, with the exception that the adjustment of the attributes is not available.

Tasks for a group of cameras

Automation tasks (**Scheduled tasks** and **Tasks on system events**) can be configured not only for each camera separately, but also for all cameras in the folder and its subfolders.

When doing so:

Tasks configured for the parent folder will be added to task settings of each subfolder.

A new camera added to a folder will have applied all the tasks configured for this folder.

A camera that has been moved from one parent folder to another will update the task list, overriding the old folder's tasks and inheriting the new folder's tasks.

A subfolder that has been moved from one parent folder to another will update the task list, overriding the old folder's tasks and inheriting the new folder's tasks.

Only Scheduled tasks and Tasks by events can be configured for folders. Configuration of User tasks for folders is not available.

Creating Scheduled tasks

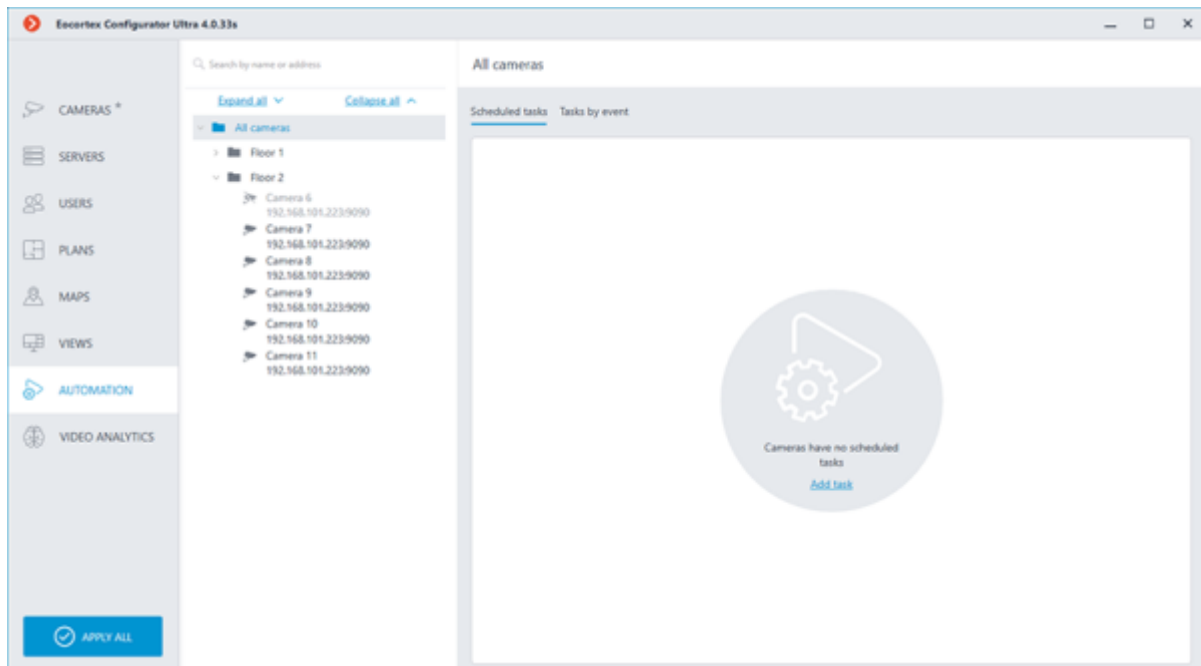
To set up a scheduled task for all cameras located in a specific folder and its subfolders, do the following:

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Switch to the **Automation** section.

Select the desired camera folder in the list.

Select the **Scheduled tasks** tab on the right side of the window.

A task can be edited or deleted only when the folder for which this task was created is selected. When selecting a subfolder or camera, the task configured for the parent folder will be marked with the  icon and will be locked for any changes.

Hovering over the  icon will display a tooltip indicating which folder the task is set to.



The same applies to actions configured for folders as a response to events.

This event is generated when the **Counting People in Queue** module is enabled on the camera in the event that the quantity of people in the queue has exceeded the preset limit.

The **Zone** condition can be set for this event, indicating the zone name from the module settings. If this condition is not set, the action will be performed for any zone, in accordance with the settings of that zone.

Face Detection

This event is generated when the **Face Detection** module is enabled on the camera and a face is detected in the frame.

This event is generated when the **Face Recognition** module is enabled on the camera and a face is recognized.

Various runtime conditions can be set for the event. For example, if the condition **Identified | Equal | Yes** is set, the action will be performed upon recognition of any face added to the database. This event is generated when the **Face Recognition** module is enabled on a camera that combines the functionality of video surveillance and thermal imaging, and the set temperature for a recognized face is exceeded.

Analog camera connection fail

This event is generated when the connection with the analog camera that is bound to this channel is lost on the channel of the hybrid video recorder or decoder.

Camera number attribute is obligatory for this event.

This event is generated when the software motion detector stops registering movement in the frame. To do this, the option **Enable start/stop motion events** must be enabled in [the motion detector settings](#).

To set up the integration of **Eocortex** video surveillance system with the external systems, it is required to go to the **Automation** tab in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, select an individual camera in the camera tree, then, on the opened page, go to the **Integrations** tab.



On the tab, it is required to enable the integration with the required system using the  switch, then set up the integration by pressing the  button.

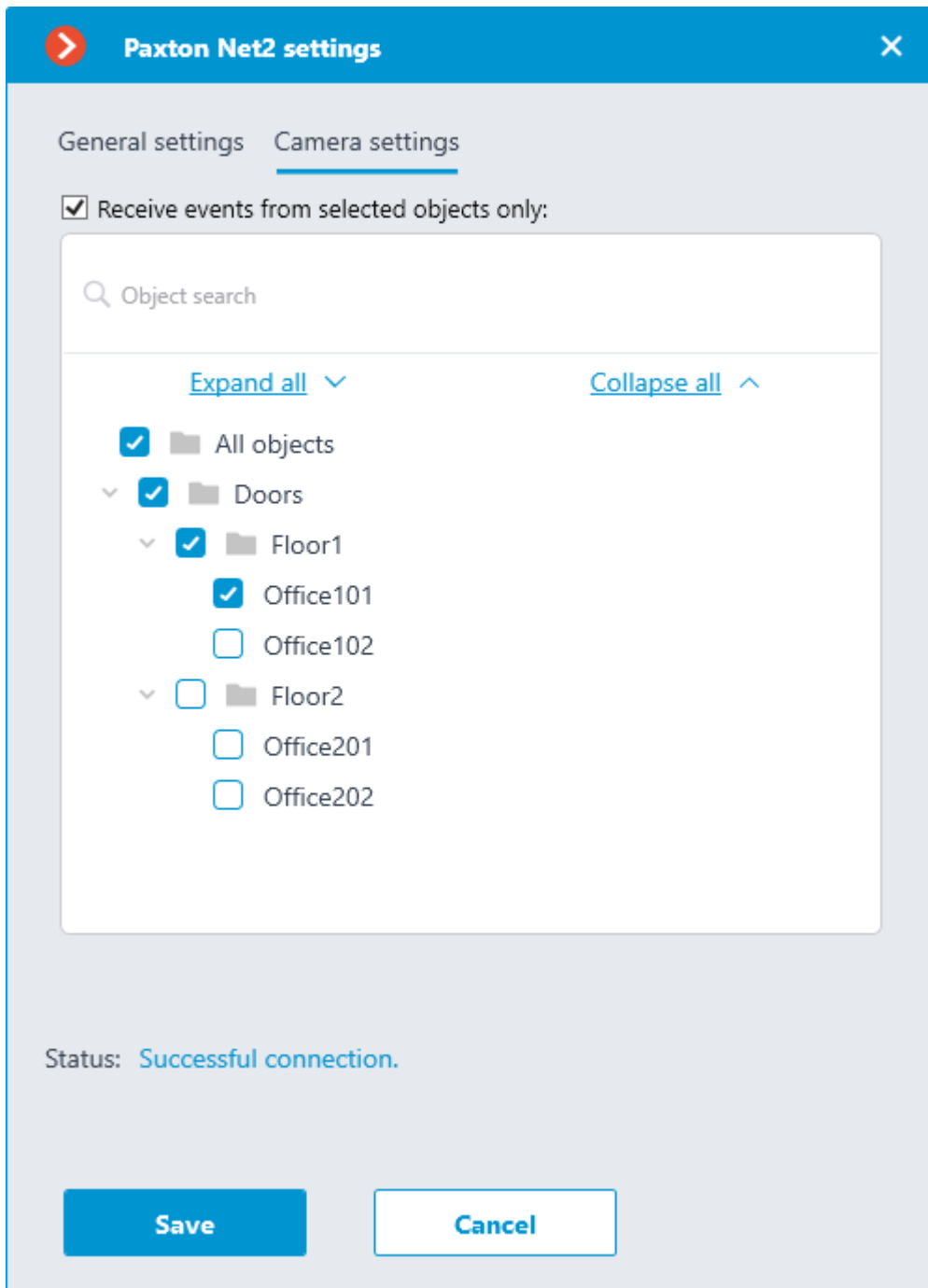

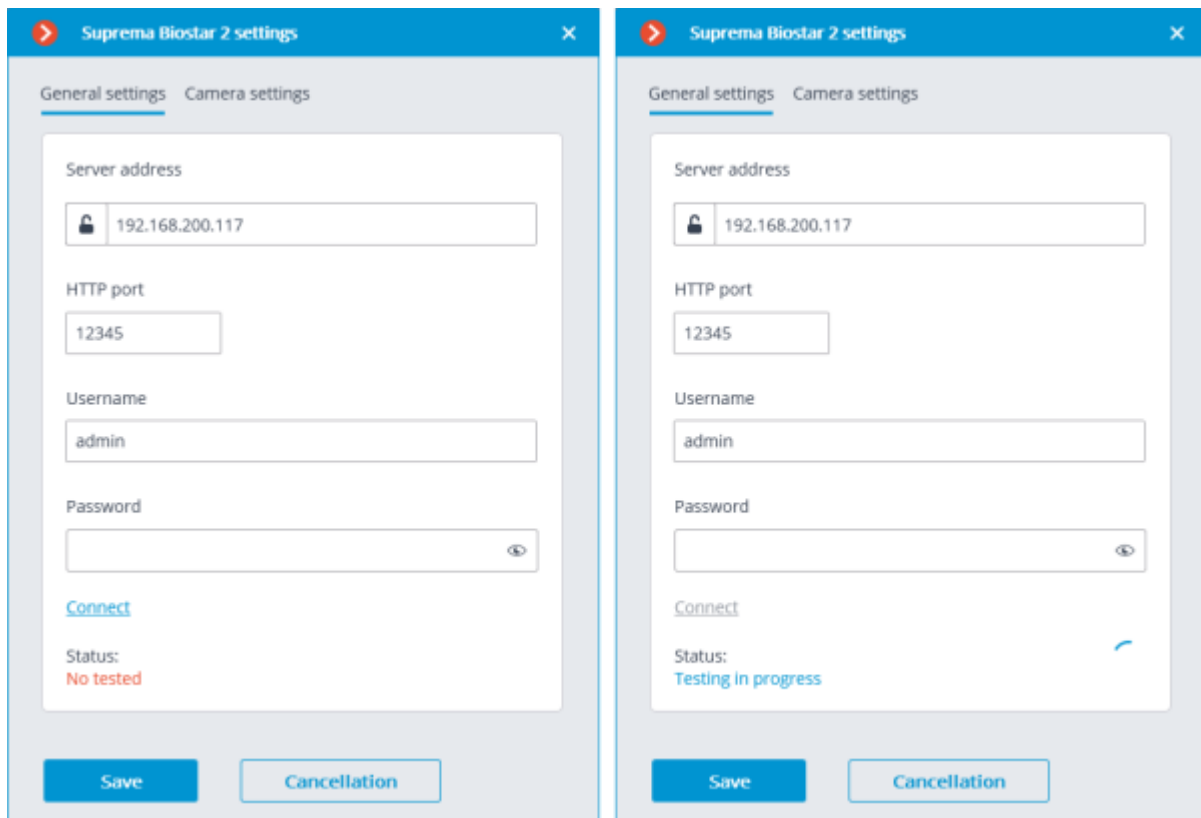

Doors. A high-level object that is most often configured with rules in **Suprema BioStar 2**. Usually the door is connected to a relay and a sensor of other device. Receiving events from specific doors allows to configure the integration more precisely;



Devices. A lower-level **Suprema BioStar 2** object. Setting up to receive events from the device allows configuring the integration more flexibly. For example, if **Suprema BioStar 2** is in the deployment phase, the list of doors and their properties will continuously change. When configuring to receive events from the specific door, it will be necessary to change the integration settings each time when something has changed. But when configuring to receive events from a device, when new doors are connected to the device, the integration settings would not need to be changed.

Template variables

Template variables are declared in double curly braces like **{{ templateVariable }}**.

Requirements and recommendations

Double curly braces serve as the beginning and the end of the variable, their presence is mandatory.

Other combinations of braces, such as **{{{}}**, may cause errors or display the string without substituting the corresponding variable.

Combinations of **{%{}** and **}%}** braces serve as the start and end of a sequence within which the given template variables will be displayed as braced source text.

Spaces before and after double brackets are optional.

If there is no template variable in the event, the string will display it as source text in curly braces.

The case of a template variable does not matter. For example, the variable **{{ lastname }}** will find an event field named **{{ LastName }}**.

Use of variables

The set of available variables depends on the event for which the action is being configured.

The following variables are available for all events:

{{ cameraname }} — the name of the camera where the event happened.

{{ cameraip }} — camera IP address.

{{ description }} — localized description of basic information about the event.

{{ comment }} — event comment.

The list of event fields available as template variables can be viewed in the **Edit template** window or in the tooltip. This list includes event fields that are available as filters in **Runtime conditions** of action.

Custom insertions can also be used as template variables, if the module that generated the event supports them. The name of the attachment can also be specified in curly brackets. For example, when using **Eocortex** with the Face Recognition module and configured database synchronization with **Gate ACS**, Face recognized event contains a **Wiegand code** parameter, the value of which can be obtained using variable **{{ wiegand26 }}**.

Depending on the type of variable, the value may appear in the text as follows:


Strings are displayed as is.

Integral numeric types are displayed as numbers.


Nonintegral numeric types are displayed according to the server settings, depending on that the fractional part will be separated either by a comma or a dot.

Enumeration types are displayed as a string according to the server's language settings.

Date and Time types are displayed in as a string in the **dd.MM.yyyy HH:mm:ss.fff** format in the local time of the server, ignoring the camera time. For example, 29.09.2022 13:38:19.944.

To select a variable in the list, use the **Up** and **Down Arrow** keys on a keyboard to move through the list. Inserting a variable into the field can be done by pressing **Enter** or by clicking on the line. The variable will be inserted to the text at the current cursor position to the previous unclosed opening curly bracket or space, if the unclosed bracket is not found.

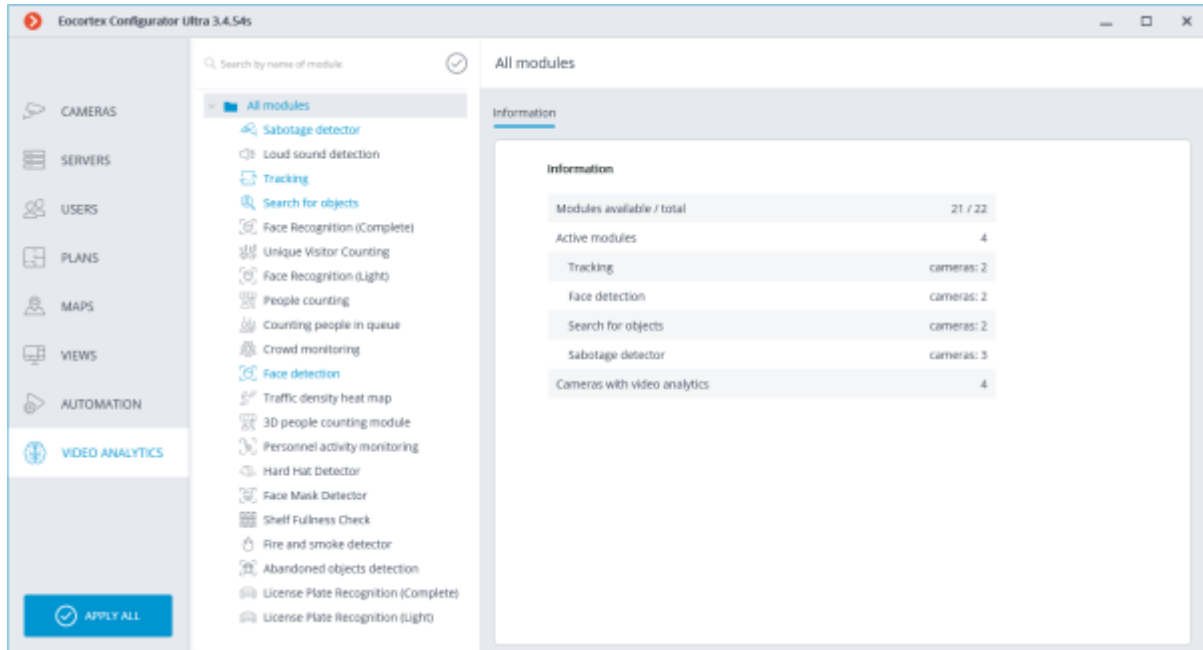

Video analytics

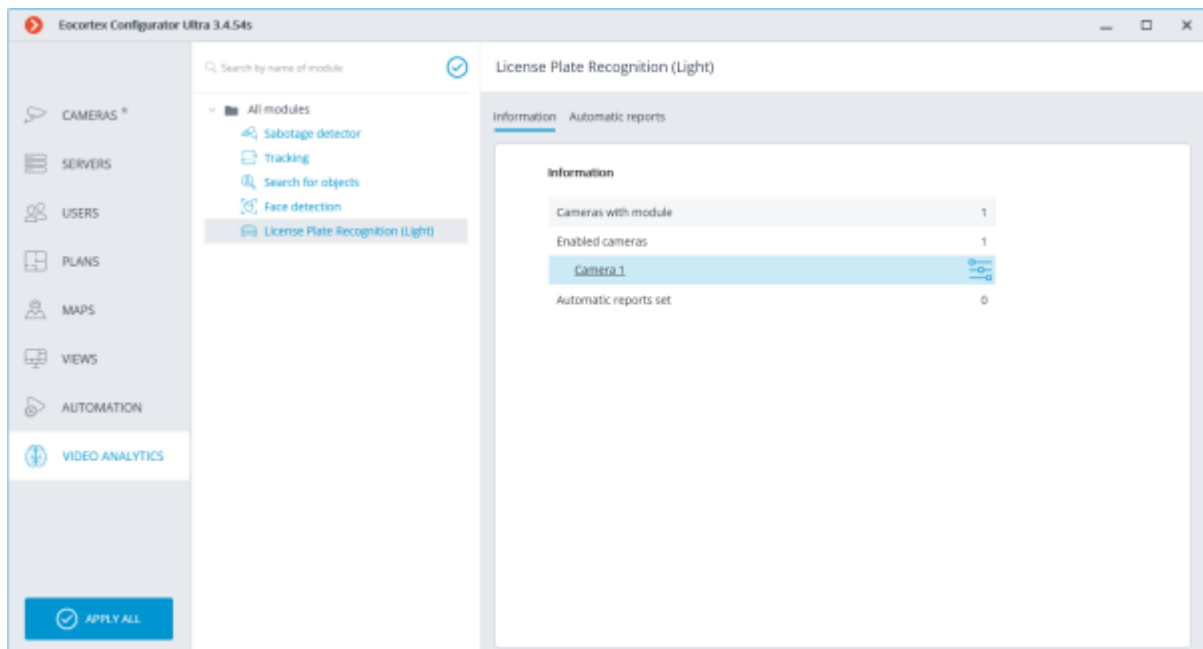
The information regarding the available and activated video analytics in the system is shown in the

Eocortex Configurator application, on the  **Video analytics** page. Also, it is possible to set up the video analysis modules already in use on the cameras as well as the automatic sending and saving of the reports for some of the modules.




The list of all the video analysis modules is shown on the left side of the page. Using the  button, it is possible to hide or display the unused modules.

The information regarding the use of the video analytics in the system is shown on the right side of the page, in the **Information** tab.



When a video analysis module is selected, the list of all cameras where this module is activated is displayed, among other things. When clicking on the line of a camera, the connection settings page of this camera appears.

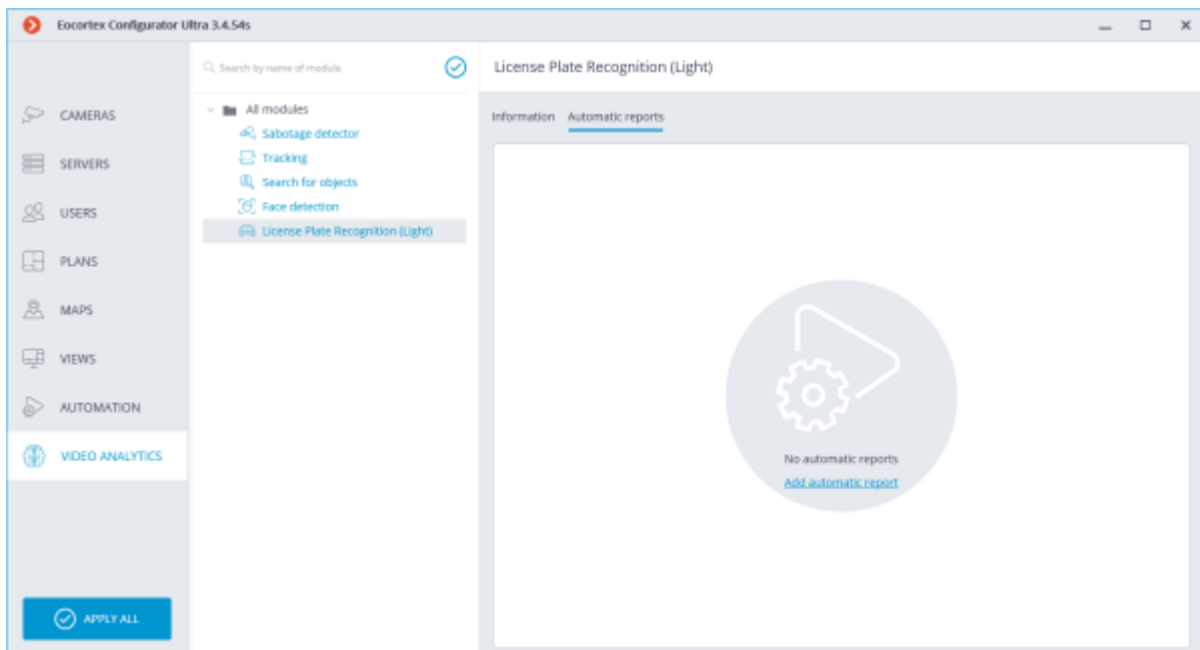
Hovering over the line of a camera in the right side of the line shows the  button. Pressing this button opens the pages of the module's settings for this camera.

For some video analysis modules, the **Automatic reports** tab is available. It allows to set up regular sending or saving the reports with the data generated by the module. Moreover, this tab displays the information about each report created.

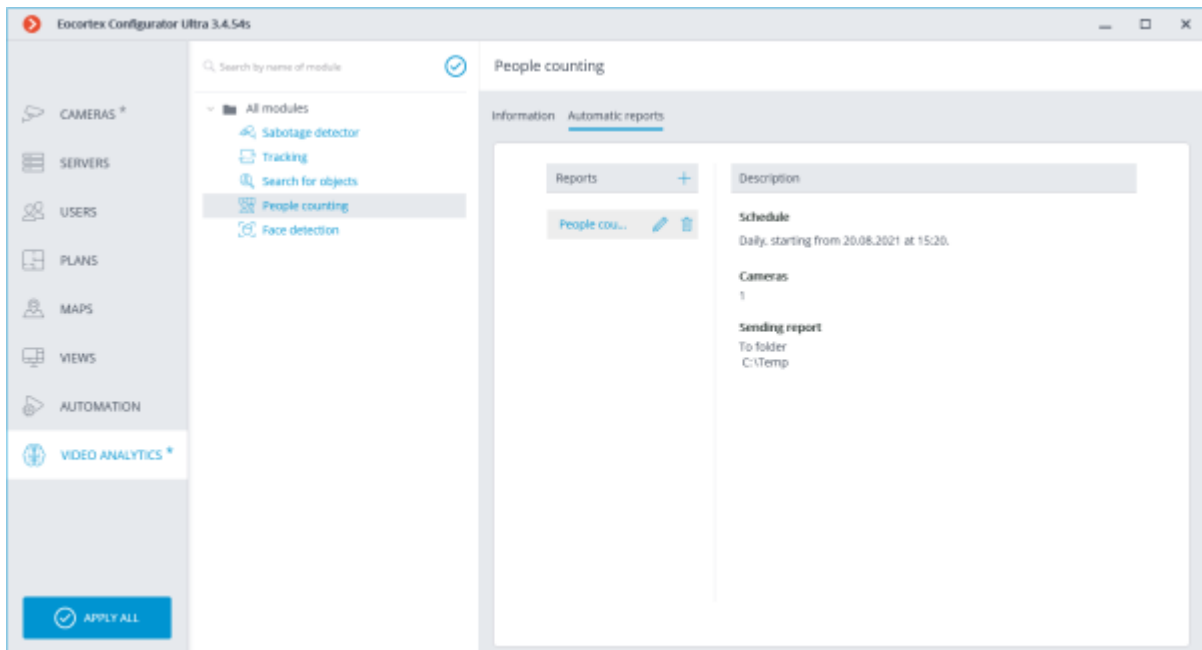
The automatic reports are available for the following video analysis modules:

- Personnel Activity Monitoring
- People Counting
- License Plate Recognition (Complete)
- License Plate Recognition (Light)
- Face Recognition (Complete)
- Face Recognition (Light)
- Object Classification and Counting

If no automatic report has been created, the tab will be empty. In such a case, it is required to use the **Add automatic report** link.

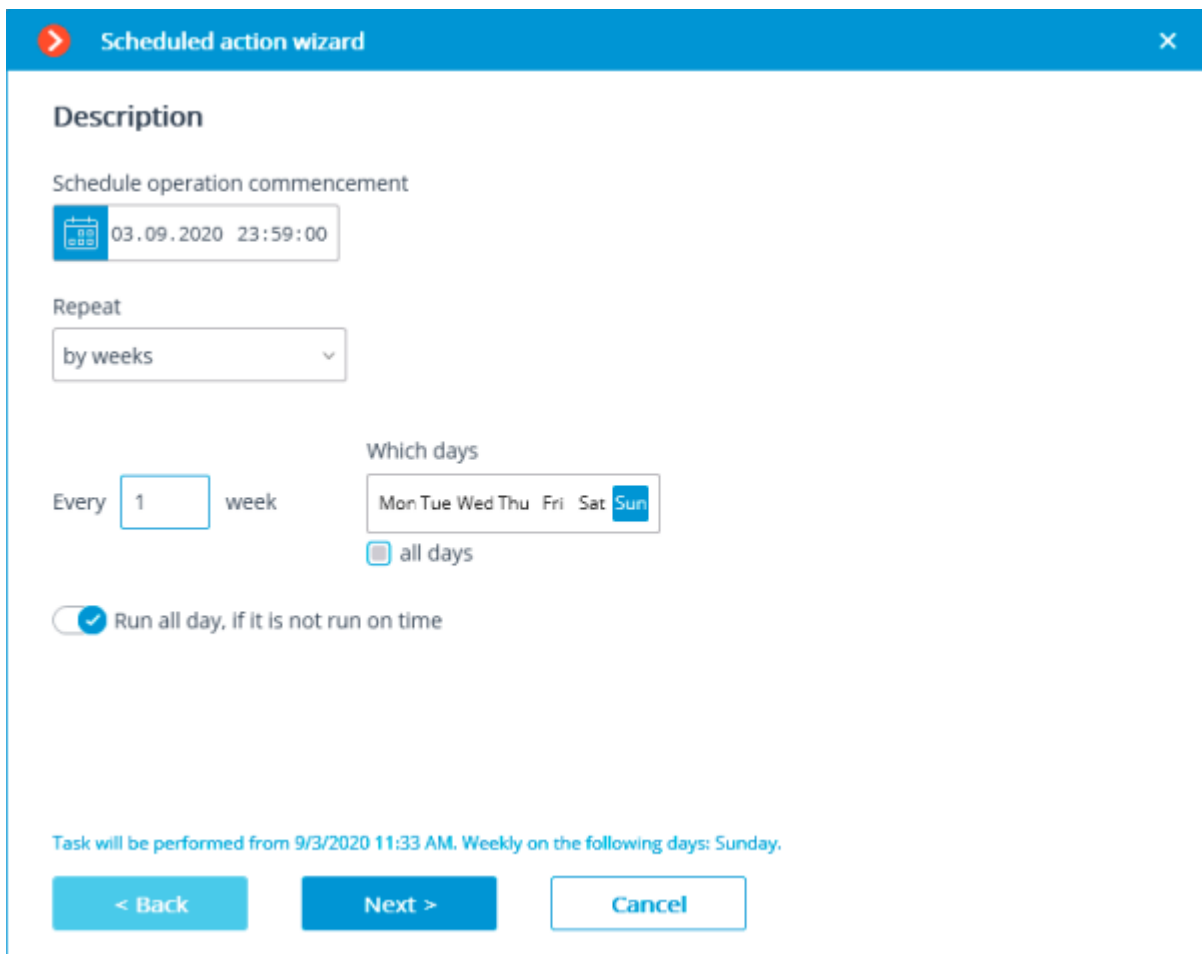


If at least one automatic report has been created, a list of all the automatic reports generated will be shown on the left side of the tab, and the right tab will contain the information regarding the report selected at the moment.

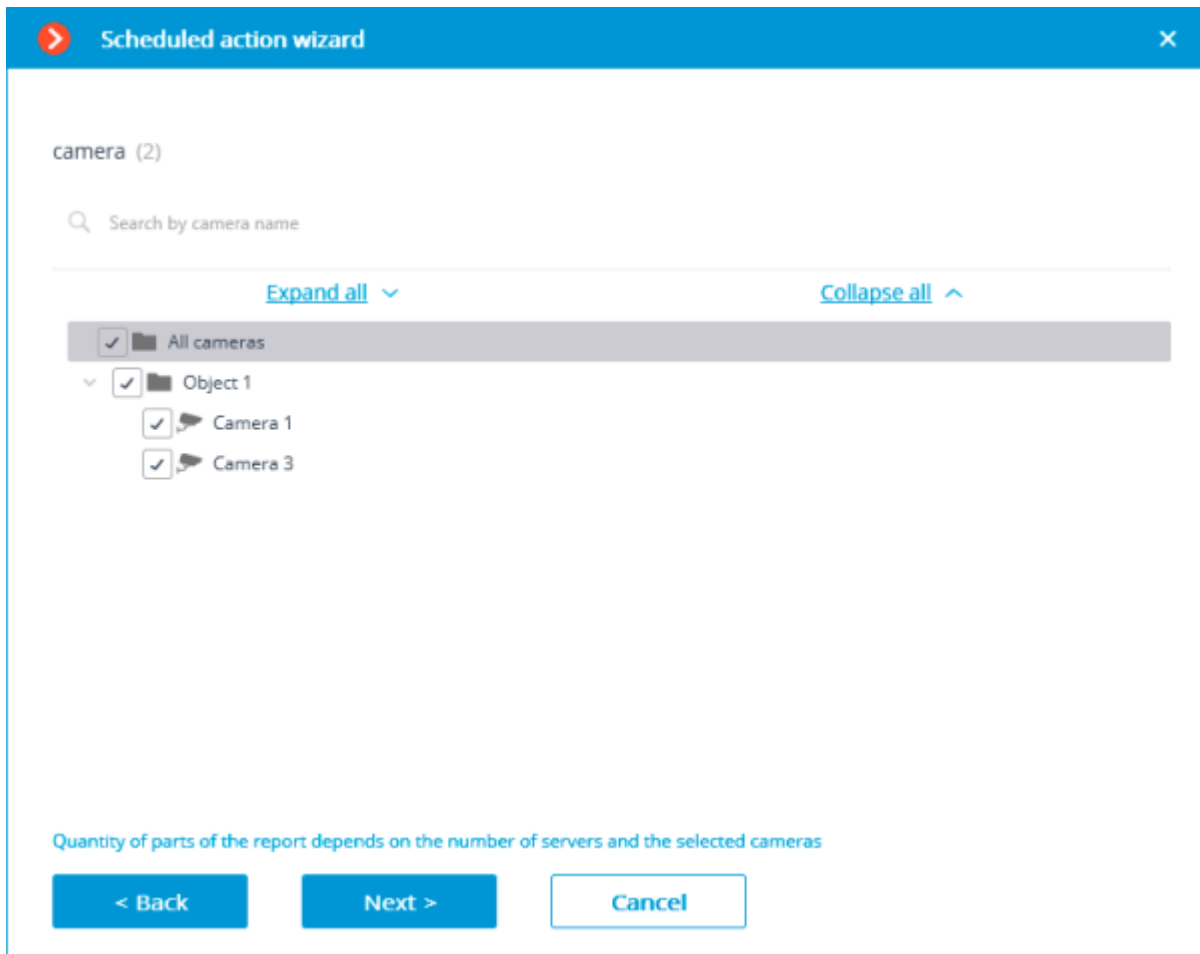


Renaming a report can be done by double clicking on its name in the list. Changing settings or deleting is performed by clicking a corresponding button to the right of the name of a report.

For adding a new automatic report, it is required to press the + button in the list header. It will open the first page of the task adding wizard where it is required to set the time and periodicity of the report's creation. This page is similar to the page of the wizard of adding the [scheduled tasks](#).



At the next step, it is required to choose the cameras for which the report will be generated.



At the final step, it is necessary to set the parameters of creating and sending the report. At that, some of the parameters are common for all the video analysis modules, and some are specific to each individual type of the modules.

General parameters:

For last: the period for which the report will be created.

Reporting interval: the intervals within a twenty-four-hour period whose data will be used for creating the report. The intervals can be added and deleted.

Report format: allows to choose one of the formats available for the report. In general, the reports can be generated in the following formats: a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet; a CSV file with tabular data; an image file containing a chart.

Send to email: the parameters for sending the report by email. The forms of adding a mail server and a sender's address are shown in the description of the [Send notification by email](#) action.

Save to folder: the path to a folder on the server where the report will be stored.

To report on the number of visitors:

Interval size: the size of the unit interval in the report.

To report on recognized license plates:

Group filter: groups for which data will be displayed in the report.

Filter by direction: the direction of movement of vehicles, according to which the data will be displayed in the report.

For Face Recognition reports:

Include only recognized faces in the report: when this option is enabled, the report will only include those faces that were identified using a database; when this option is off, all the faces detected by the module will be included into the report.

Group filter: groups whose data will be included into the report.

Deployment

Guidelines for choosing and configuring hardware platform

You can calculate the minimum hardware platform requirements online on ecortex.com, on the [Software for IP Cameras / Calculator](#) page.

While selecting the hardware platform consider, if necessary, the potential increase (near future expansion plan) in the number of channels.

The drive subsystem must comply with the design load. It is recommended to use RAID to increase system speed and reliability; take into account the performance in case of drive failure. The server drive subsystem must also provide a certain reserve bandwidth (read rate) to allow convenient archive search.

It is recommended to install two network interface controllers (NIC); configure one of them for camera subnet and another for **Ecortex Client** requests. Benefits: camera isolation, reduces network traffic in a public network.

If network storages (NAS, SAN) are used to store archives, we recommend installing an additional NIC for these purposes.

Provide reserve computer resources in the amount of 3% of CPU load per connected client for fast client request serving. The server drive subsystem must also provide a certain reserve bandwidth (read rate) to allow convenient archive search.

When using the hot backup function consider that in case of failure of one of the servers, its load is distributed on the others. For example, if there are only 2 servers, they work together and "backup" each other; each must have a capacity sufficient to handle all video streams from all cameras.

To achieve maximum performance disable processor power-saving technologies before installing the OS: Cool'n'Quiet for AMD and SpeedStep or EIST for Intel (configured in BIOS, usually in Advanced / CPU.) If you use SATA-drives, do not forget to set AHCI value for SATA Mode (configured in BIOS, usually in Advanced / SATA; only for controllers that support this mode.)

Windows-based applications

Guidelines for Windows settings

The computer must use one of **Microsoft Windows** operating systems provided in specification:

- Windows 8
- Windows 8.1
- Windows 10
- Windows Server 2012
- Windows Server 2012 R2
- Windows Server 2016
- Windows Server Windows Embedded for Intel x64 with the full functionality of abovementioned Windows versions

Since **Eocortex** version **4.0**, support for **Windows 7** and **Windows Server 2008** operating systems, as well as **32-bit versions** of other operating systems, is no longer available. This should be considered when installing or upgrading **Eocortex** to version **4.0** or higher.

Before installing **Eocortex** applications, you must configure the operating system:

Install all Windows updates and then turn off Auto-update.

Select the time zone corresponding to the server location, then either specify the exact time that corresponds to this time zone, or synchronize the time of the computer with one of the time servers in the local network or on the Internet, then disable time synchronization on this computer.

Switch the power settings to high performance mode: **Control Panel / Power options: High performance**. Also in the power supply settings disable automatic disconnection of disks and USB-devices because for round-the-clock systems they should be on all the time and switching off during operation can cause malfunction of the **Eocortex** video server.

Disable Users Accounts Control (UAC): **Control Panel / User Accounts / Change User Account Control settings: Never Notify**.

Disable the firewall. If the security policies do not permit disabling the firewall, the network ports that allow the surveillance server to communicate with the cameras, client computers and applications must be open.

Particularly for most systems, it is sufficient to white-list the following ports:

Incoming TCP connections:

- 8080 — HTTP (unsecured connection) port to communicate with client computers and other servers;
- 18080 — HTTPS (secured connection) port to communicate with client computers and other servers;
- 8089 — communication port for mobile and web clients with proxying disabled. Proxying is enabled by default, but can be switched in the Server settings section of the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

Outgoing TCP connections:

- 8080 — HTTP (unsecured connection) port to communicate with the main server of the multiserver system;
- 80 — connection port for communications with cameras via HTTP or ONVIF protocols;
- 554 — connection port for communications with cameras via RTSP;
- 443 — connection port for communications with cameras via HTTPS.

Also, depending on the settings of the cameras used and the **Eocortex** features enabled, it may be necessary to open other ports for incoming and outgoing connections.

Installed antivirus should not scan HTTP and RTSP traffic, including input video streams from IP cameras, as this significantly reduces the system performance. Add Eocortex module executable files to the list of trusted applications of antivirus and firewall, as video stream checking requires significant computing resources.

Some antivirus software (such as NOD32) blocks video streams even when disabled, since they "embedding" their own components at the system drivers level when installed. Thus, to ensure correct operation and performance we recommend removing antivirus software from Eocortex video servers, if possible.

It is not recommended to install **Eocortex** applications on the same computer as other surveillance or screen capture software, even if the specified software is not started while **Eocortex** applications are running. This may cause the **Eocortex** software to malfunction or completely fail.

Installing Eocortex software from a common installer

The most up-to-date version of **Eocortex** can be downloaded at eocortex.com: The distribution packages can be found at [Support / Software Installation Packages Supported](#).

Eocortex applications are installed from a common installer (**EocortexMainCommon Installer.exe**). This installer allows installation of the following applications:

- **Eocortex Server** is server software for a network video surveillance system used to receive, analyze, process and archive video data from IP cameras. It is installed on a single machine, where the data is processed and the archive is stored. **Eocortex Server** is a Windows service; it is launched at computer startup and runs in the background.
- **Eocortex Client** is network client of a video surveillance system that allows viewing video in real time and from the archive, controlling cameras, audio and intelligent modules by using Configurator. It is installed on the computers of operators, security chief and other surveillance system users. Eocortex Client does not require a USB-key and a license file for operation.
- **Eocortex Standalone** is software that combines the functions of a video surveillance system server and client. It is installed on a single machine, where the data is processed, the archive is stored and real-time video streams are viewed. **Eocortex Standalone** is not a Windows service — it is separately launched software with window interface.
- **Eocortex System Monitoring** is a subsystem that permits to monitor the status of the video surveillance system components.

Within one installation procedure, you can install both separate applications and all included in the installer. **Eocortex Server** and **Eocortex Standalone** are mutually exclusive (you can install either **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone**).

Before installing **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone**, it may be required to fully delete the video server installed earlier because in case of a standard uninstallation of **Eocortex** the setup files are left uninstalled. Their presence may cause conflicts or errors (see [Removing Eocortex software](#)).

The complete uninstallation of the video server installed earlier is not required if the server of the same bitness was installed on the PC earlier. In this case, the installation will be considered by the system as updating (see [Updating Eocortex software](#)).

During the installation use the account that has full access rights to the local computer on which **Eocortex Server** and **Eocortex Standalone** software is installed.

If you use an **Eocortex** USB-key, plug it into a server USB-port.



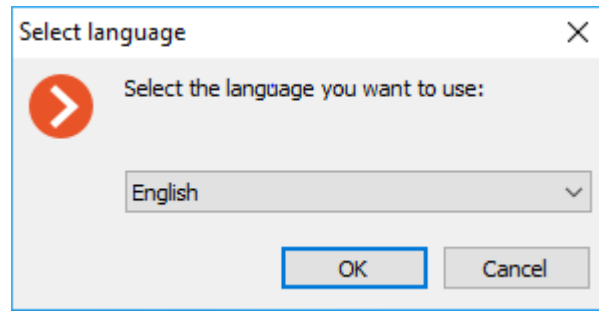
When using the multiserver configuration, the version numbers of merged servers must match.

The bitness of the applications being installed is determined automatically depending on the bitness of **Windows** OS. However, it is possible to choose the installation of 32-bit versions of **Eocortex** on a 64-bit version of **Windows**.

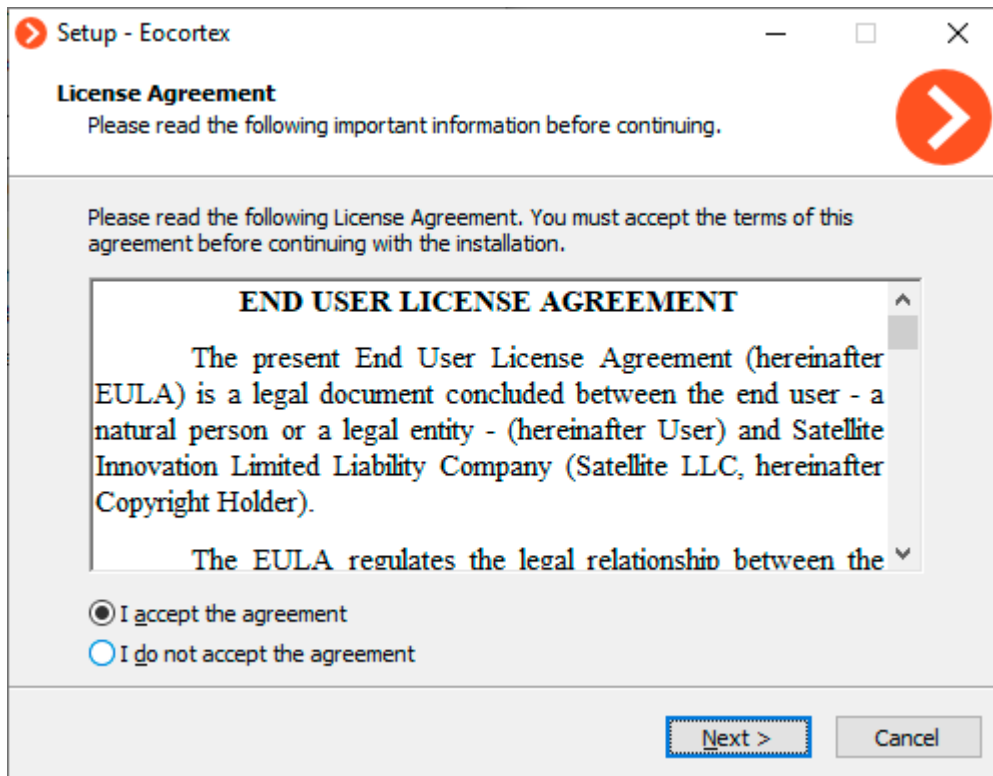

Updating Eocortex software

Updating **Eocortex** applications can be done by installing the latest version of the application "on top of" the older one (see [Installing Eocortex software from a common installer](#)). During installation, the program files of the previous version are deleted, but all settings as well as the archive and the license binding are retained. Thus, no additional settings are required after installing the new software version.

Starting from version 3.4 of **Eocortex**, certain components use PostgreSQL database management system of version 11 or later. In this respect, before installing version 3.4

and higher (as well as when upgrading from version 3.3 and lower to version 3.4 and higher), it is required to review the [PostgreSQL installation information](#).

When upgrading an application, the new version must be of the same bitness as the previously installed version. For example, if **Eocortex Server (32-bit)** was previously installed, then when updating it is necessary to select the same **Eocortex Server (32-bit)**. Please note that when installing with "default" values, the application bitness is determined automatically according to the digit capacity of the Windows operating system.

Since **Eocortex** version **4.0**, support for **Windows 7** and **Windows Server 2008** operating systems, as well as **32-bit versions** of other operating systems, is no longer available. This should be considered when installing or upgrading **Eocortex** to version **4.0** or higher.

It is recommended to enable [Eocortex Client automatic update in the server settings](#) to preserve compatibility between the server after the upgrade and the existing client computers. In addition, **Eocortex Client** can be installed from its own distribution package.

If there is a need to change the license without having to change the version or bitness of the server application, no update is required. Simply [update the license](#).

Versions of Eocortex

The version number of **Eocortex** applications consists of three parts: **M.N.R**, where **M** means a major version, **N** is for a minor version, and **R** is a release number.

The most up-to-date version of **Eocortex** can be downloaded at [eocortex.com](#): The distribution packages can be found at [Support / Software Installation Packages Supported](#).

When updating the **Eocortex** server application from an old version to the latest one, follow the recommendations below.

Depending on the version of the installed **Eocortex** server application:

- If the version of the currently installed server application differs from the recent one only by the release number, then you can update directly to the latest version.
- If the version of the currently installed server application differs from the recent one by the number of the major or minor version, then you need to successively update the server application.

Successive updating requires you to start the server at least once after upgrading to each subsequent version.

Successive update presumes keeping the system settings and the archive of cameras. However, there is a small chance of losing the settings or the archive.

Similarly, there is an upgrade from an older to a newer version that is not up to date.

Removing Eocortex software

Depending on the purpose, **Eocortex** software can be removed in one or two steps:

Step 1: Remove software and save the settings — only executable files and libraries are removed; all settings, the license and the archive are saved. This procedure is used only if it is planned to install **Eocortex** software with the same bit depth later (the same procedure is performed automatically when you update your **Eocortex** software.)

Step 2: Complete removal of Eocortex products — all settings and the license are removed. This procedure is used if it is planned to install **Eocortex** server software of another bit depth later or completely remove it from the computer.

Remove software and save the settings

Open the **Programs and Features** in **Control Panel** ( **Start** /  **Control Panel**.)

Select the **Eocortex** product to be removed and press **Uninstall** button.

Complete removal of Eocortex products

In order to permanently remove the **Eocortex** application, you should delete the installation folder from the disk, as well as all subfolders that start with **Eocortex**, in the **ProgramData** folder on the system disk.

In addition, **EocortexArchive** folders are created on archived disks. If you want to delete the archive, then these folders are deleted.

Installing, updating, and removing Episode archive

The **Episode archive** provides the possibility to keep individual archive fragments for an unlimited time. Using the **Episode archive**, you can be sure that important archive fragments will not be deleted due to loop recording or corruption of the main archive.

This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

Linux-based applications

Eocortex Server can work under Linux operating system. However, some features will be unavailable. The differences in the functionality of **Eocortex Server** applications based on Windows and Linux are listed in the specification of **Eocortex**.

Compatible Linux distributions:

- Ubuntu 20.04
- Debian 10
- CentOS 7



Operability on other Linux distributions is not guaranteed.

It is also possible to install **Eocortex** on Debian 11 and Ubuntu 22.04, but operability on these operating systems has not been tested.



In the **Eocortex Client** application, when simultaneously playing back the archive hosted on a Linux server, in some situations, the archive may not play back when selecting a playback speed higher than x1.

However, the archive will be kept on archive disks in accordance with the archive storage parameters set in the system settings.

The problem described above may be caused by the specifics of the hardware used, the limitations of the data transmission network, and the peculiarities of the system software used on the server.

In case of any issues with **Eocortex Server** stability, it is required to check that the installed versions correspond with those recommended:

In case of a significant discrepancy between the installed and the recommended versions, it is required to install the package dependency of the version indicated in the recommendations.

Technical features of Linux version

Location of server files

The essential files of the **Eocortex** server are located on the following paths:

Server folder: **/opt/EocortexServer**

Server logs: **/opt/EocortexServer/Eocortex/Logs_EocortexServer**

Server configuration: **/opt/EocortexServer/EocortexServerConfigs**

Automatic drive mounting when launching a server

At startup, the **Eocortex** server automatically mounts all suitable drive partitions to the **/mnt/{uuid}**, folder, where **uuid** is the universal unique identifier of the drive partition. This is

done to ensure that when the system is rebooted, the **Eocortex** server can still write the archive even if the partitions have not been mounted by the user beforehand. It is not recommended to mount drive partitions and configure recording of the archive to them independently and without a particular need.

Automatic drive mounting is not performed for system drives, software RAID drives, etc. (that is, drives marked with the **boot, esp, bios_grub, legacy_boot, msftres,irst, root, swap, raid** flags; the list of flags for a partition can be obtained using the command **parted -l**).

The following file systems are supported: "ext2", "ext3", "ext4", "btrfs", "reiserfs", "ntfs".

To find out the file system, you can use the command:

```
df -Th | grep "^\s*/dev"
```

Adding new drives to the system

When manually adding a new disk to the system, it is required to physically connect the disk, format it and create a partition on it. After that, the **Eocortex** server will automatically mount this disk at startup, as described above.

Disks can be added manually with the **fdisk** utility:

1. Check the information about the disk:

6. Once restarted, set up the archive in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

[Description](#) of working with drives using **gnome-disk**.

When adding a drive with an existing partition to the system, no additional settings are required.

The **Eocortex** server only works with drives that have been partitioned. On drives with no partitions but with a file system the correct operation of the application and the archive is not guaranteed. To use such a drive, follow the steps described above, as when adding a new drive to the system. Note that in this case the data on the drive will be erased.

Operating aspects of Firebird database

After installing the **Eocortex** server, a situation may arise when writing to the archive is being performed but the database is absent (that is, the events are not saved in the log). This can happen after the drive for writing the archive to has been mounted in the user's folder. To solve this issue, it is necessary for the operating system user under whose credentials the database is accessed (the user **firebird**) to provide read access at the mounting point of the drive to which the archive is written.

This can be achieved using two methods described below.

Remounting the drive for writing to the archive in the system folder rather than in the folder of the current user.

Checking the path from the root (/) to the mounting point of the drive. The user **firebird** must have read access for every directory. It is possible to view directory permissions using the command **sudo ls -l** (the user **firebird** belongs to other users). To give the user **firebird** a permission to read the current directory, use the command **sudo chmod o+r**.

The second method should be used only when it is required to mount the drive in the selected folder, or when it is not permitted to change the mounting point.

Saving frames to drive

Saving frames (according to schedule, in response to a system event, or by user command) is allowed to any drive except the system one. If the frames are not being saved, it is required to make sure that the drive selected for saving is not the system one.

Access to cameras by domain names

By default, **Linux** prioritizes IPv6 addresses when resolving a domain name. Some camera plugins in **Eocortex** may not work with IPv6 addresses.

To solve this issue, it is required to add the following entry to the file **/etc/gai.conf**:

```
precedence ::ffff:0:0/96 100
```

As a result, when resolving all domain names, preference will be given to the IPv4 addresses.

If it is required to set an IPv4 address for a specific name, it is possible to add a corresponding entry to the file **/etc/hosts**. E.g.:

```
192.168.100.1 cam-1.mycompany.com
```

Server shutdown and restart

The commands that control the state of the **Eocortex** server are shown below.

Server shutdown:

```
systemctl stop eocortex.service
```

Server launch:

```
systemctl start eocortex.service
```

Server restart:

```
systemctl restart eocortex.service
```

Server status check (active/inactive):

```
systemctl status eocortex.service
```

Installation of Eocortex Server under Linux

Starting from version 3.4 of **Eocortex**, certain components use PostgreSQL database management system of version 11 or later. In this respect, before installing version 3.4 and higher (as well as when upgrading from version 3.3 and lower to version 3.4 and higher), it is required to review the [PostgreSQL installation information](#).

After completion of the installation, it is required to connect to the server using the **Eocortex Configurator** application launched on the Windows computer, and activate the license on the server.

The **Eocortex Configurator** application is installed on the Windows computer in the process of installing any of the following applications on the same computer: **Eocortex Client**, **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone**.

Below are the sequences of commands used depending on the installation method and the Linux installation package used.

Installation of actual version via Internet

On **Ubuntu 20.04** and **Debian 10**

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install Eocortex:

Silent setup of Eocortex Server under Linux

This feature is available starting from **Eocortex** version 3.4 and only for Debian and Ubuntu installation packages.

To avoid appearance of redundant questions during the installation, it is required to set up **debconf**. The following command is used for this purpose:

```
dpkg-reconfigure debconf
```

First, it will be suggested to select the interface for interacting with **debconf**.

Then, it will be required to choose the lowest permissible priority of the questions to be displayed.

Later, during the installation process, the system will automatically substitute answers to the lower priority questions, taking these answers from the **debconf** database. The rest of the questions (with the selected and higher priority) the user will have to answer on their own, in an interactive mode.

To select the priority "critical", it is required to execute the following command:

```
echo debconf debconf/priority select critical | debconf-set-selections
```

If it is necessary to turn off duplicate questions, it is possible to clearly tell the system not to ask a question since it has already been seen before. To do this, it is required to manually add the flag "seen" for the desired question in the **/var/cache/debconf/config.dat** file.

```
Name: eocortex/license-agreed
Template: eocortex/license-agreed
Value: true
Owners: eocortex
Flags: seen
```

To install Firebird without questions, it is required to add a database access password for **debconf** by running the following command, substituting **password_value** with an actual password:

```

```

The existing templates and their values can be viewed in the **/var/cache/debconf/config.dat** file.

Eocortex Server upgrade under Linux

Starting from version 3.4 of **Eocortex**, certain components use PostgreSQL database management system of version 11 or later. In this respect, before installing version 3.4 and higher (as well as when upgrading from version 3.3 and lower to version 3.4 and higher), it is required to review the [PostgreSQL installation information](#).

Below are the sequences of commands (depending on the method of installation and the Linux installation package used) allowing to update **Eocortex Server** to the latest version.

Update via Internet

For Ubuntu and Debian

Update the repository, then update the Eocortex application to the latest version:

```
sudo rm /etc/apt/sources.list.d/eocortex.list
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
sudo apt-get install eocortex
```

For CentOS 7

Update the repository, then update the Eocortex application to the latest version:

```
sudo rm /etc/apt/sources.list.d/eocortex.list
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
sudo yum update eocortex
```

Upgrade to a specific package without Internet access

For Ubuntu and Debian

```
sudo dpkg -i path_to_eocortex_package
```

For CentOS 7

```
sudo yum install path_to_eocortex_package
```

Uninstalling Eocortex Server under Linux

Below are the commands (depending on the method of installation and the Linux installation package used), allowing to remove **Eocortex Server** from the computer.

For Ubuntu and Debian

```
sudo apt-get remove eocortex
```

For CentOS 7

```
sudo yum remove eocortex
```

Usage of PostgreSQL on Linux

Regardless of the **Eocortex** version being installed, the installation of PostgreSQL on Linux can be done only in manual mode.

When installing the DBMS, it is recommended to follow the instructions for the desired OS distribution from the PostgreSQL official website.

As part of the installation process, a DBMS user with the name **eocortex** and the password **masterkey** will be automatically created.

Installation and update of PostgreSQL for Eocortex 3.4-3.6

Eocortex versions 3.4-3.6 require PostgreSQL version 11 to store **Search for Objects** module events. All other events and modules use Firebird.

PostgreSQL will not be installed automatically during the installation of **Eocortex** components, so it is necessary to install the required DBMS version manually before installing the **Eocortex Server** application.

Below are several sample instructions on how to manually install PostgreSQL 11 on Linux.

Option 1. If the server has Internet access.

Debian/Ubuntu:

Add the PostgreSQL file repository to the OS configuration:

```
sudo sh -c 'echo "deb http://apt.postgresql.org/pub/repos/apt $(lsb_release -cs)-pgdg main" > /etc/apt/sources.list.d/pgdg.list'
```

Download the repository signature key:

```
wget --quiet -O - https://www.postgresql.org/media/keys/ACCC4CF8.asc | sudo apt-key add -
```

Update the package list:

```
sudo apt-get update
```

Install PostgreSQL of the required version:

```
sudo apt-get -y install postgresql-11
```

CentOS 7:

Add the PostgreSQL file repository to the OS configuration:

```
sudo yum install -y https://download.postgresql.org/pub/repos/yum/reporepms/EL-7-x86_64/pgdg-redhat-repo-latest.noarch.rpm
```

Install PostgreSQL of the required version:

```
sudo yum install -y postgresql11-server
```

Option 2. If the server has no Internet access.

Debian/Ubuntu:

Download the PostgreSQL installation package of the required version and its dependencies from the [official PostgreSQL repository](#), using a device with Internet access.

Transfer the downloaded packages to the server **Eocortex**.

Install packages using the dpkg command with the -i parameter.

CentOS 7:

Download the PostgreSQL installation package of the required version and its dependencies from the [official PostgreSQL repository](#), using a device with Internet access.

Transfer the downloaded packages to the server **Eocortex**.

Install packages using the rpm command with the -i parameter.

Installation and update of PostgreSQL for Eocortex 4.0

Eocortex versions 4.0 and higher require PostgreSQL version 12 to store all internal databases.

PostgreSQL will not be installed automatically during the installation of **Eocortex** components, so it is necessary to install the required DBMS version manually before installing the **Eocortex Server** application.

Below are several sample instructions on how to manually install PostgreSQL 12 on Linux.

Option 1. If the server has Internet access.

Debian/Ubuntu:

Add the PostgreSQL file repository to the OS configuration:

```
sudo sh -c 'echo "deb http://apt.postgresql.org/pub/repos/apt $(lsb_release -cs) -pgdg main" > /etc/apt/sources.list.d/pgdg.list'
```

Download the repository signature key:

```
wget --quiet -O - https://www.postgresql.org/media/keys/ACCC4CF8.asc | sudo apt-key add -
```

Update the package list:

```
sudo apt-get update
```

Install PostgreSQL of the required version:

```
sudo apt-get -y install postgresql-12
```

CentOS 7:

Add the PostgreSQL file repository to the OS configuration:

```
sudo yum install -y https://download.postgresql.org/pub/repos/yum/reporgms/EL-7-x86_64/pgdg-redhat-repo-latest.noarch.rpm
```

Install PostgreSQL of the required version:

```
sudo yum install -y postgresql12-server
```

Option 2. If the server has no Internet access.

Debian/Ubuntu:

Download the PostgreSQL installation package of the required version and its dependencies from the [official PostgreSQL repository](#), using a device with Internet access.

Transfer the downloaded packages to the server **Eocortex**.

Install packages using the dpkg command with the -i parameter.

CentOS 7:

Download the PostgreSQL installation package of the required version and its dependencies from the [official PostgreSQL repository](#), using a device with Internet access.

Transfer the downloaded packages to the server **Eocortex**.

Install packages using the rpm command with the -i parameter.

Database setup for event recording

Due to the fact that this improvement does not provide any new features for users in terms of using **Eocortex**, using the PostgreSQL database does not require any additional settings other than the already existing database event recording settings. To start writing events to the system database:

Run the Eocortex Configurator application and go to the [Servers](#) page.

Select a server in the list.

Select the **Information** tab on the right part of the window and click **Configure**.

In the window that opens, select the **Archive** tab and set for one of available drives the **Archive + database** or **Database only** role.

Apply settings.

[Additional PostgreSQL configuration](#) is required if the system uses remote databases for the **Face Recognition** or **License Plate Recognition** modules.

Change of default user password

If the default **eocortex** DBMS user created during installation is used, but it is necessary to use a custom password, follow these steps:

All the following steps must be made directly on the server for which the changes are being made.

Stop **Eocortex** operation. To do this, use the following command in Terminal:

```
systemctl stop eocortex.service
```

Use the **psql** utility to set new password for **postgres** user. Launch the utility by running the following command in the Terminal:

```
psql -U eocortex -h 127.0.0.1 -d postgres
```

Input the current password to confirm the login (Default: **masterkey**).

Change the password with the command:

```
ALTER USER CURRENT_USER PASSWORD 'newPassword';
```

where **newPassword** is a new password for **eocortex** user.

Open the **/opt/EocortexServer/EocortexServerConfigs/** directory and edit the **ArchiveSystem.xml** configuration file with any text editor.

Find the **PostgreSqlConfig** section and edit **User** and **Password** lines according to new DBMS user credentials.

The following is an example of such settings:

```
<PostgreSqlConfig>
  <Ip>127.0.0.1</Ip>
  <Port>5432</Port>
  <User>postgres</User>
  <Password>newPassword</Password>
</PostgreSqlConfig>
```

To allow the system making backups of database files, make sure that new credentials are added to the DBMS password file. To do this, go to the home directory of the OS user and edit the **.pgpass** file with any text editor. Check that the selected user has access to the **Eocortex** database files.

Restore **Eocortex** operation. To do this, use the following command in Terminal:

```
systemctl start eocortex.service
```

Analytics modules databases

If the **Face Recognition** or **License Plate Recognition** modules are used in the system, the DBMS user editing will affect their bases as well.

If the **Local** Database is used, **Eocortex** will use the name and password specified in the **ArchiveSystem.xml** file to access the database.

If the **Remote** Database is used, changing the PostgreSQL credentials on the server storing the database will require a new name and password to be entered in the settings of all cameras that use the database.

Use case:

Server 1 hosts the face database.

Server 2 hosts a number of cameras that use the face database from Server 1.

Modifying the DBMS user on Server 2 will not affect access to the face database hosted on Server 1.

Modifying the DBMS user on Server 1 will require new data to be specified for all cameras on Server 2 that use the face database hosted on Server 1.

Remote access to databases is not allowed by default in PostgreSQL and must be additionally configured if remote databases are used for analytics.

The steps below must be performed directly on the server hosting the database of the module.

Go to the directory with the PostgreSQL configuration files.

Default path for **Debian/Ubuntu**:

```
/etc/postgresql/12/main/
```

Default path for **CentOS 7**:

```
/var/lib/pgsql/12/data/
```

Edit the file **postgresql.conf** with any text editor and add a line like the following:

```
listen_addresses = '*'
```

The specified example allows receiving requests to databases from all available network adapters of the server. If it is necessary to limit the list of adapters allowed to receive requests, replace the ***** symbol with the exact address of the network adapter. More details about this setting can be found in the [PostgreSQL 12 documentation](#).

Edit the file **pg_hba.conf** with any text editor and add a line like the following:

```
host all all 192.168.0.0/24 md5
```

The specified example allows remote connections to all databases stored on the server for all users who are connecting from the 192.168.0.XXX network address range. If other addressing is used in the system network, it is necessary to specify the appropriate address range instead of displayed. It is allowed to enter several lines with different address ranges. More details about this setting can be found in the [PostgreSQL 12 documentation](#).

Restart the service by running the following command in the Terminal:

```
sudo systemctl restart postgresql-12.service
```

Removal of PostgreSQL

Although PostgreSQL is used by **Eocortex**, a simple removal of **Eocortex** does not automatically delete PostgreSQL. To delete the system together with the DBMS, execute the following command in Terminal:

Partial removal

If it is necessary to remove the installed version of PostgreSQL together with **Eocortex** and save the settings, do the following command:

Debian/Ubuntu:

```
sudo apt-get --purge remove postgresql postgresql-* sudo apt-get autoremove eocortex
```

CentOS 7:

```
sudo yum remove postgresql* autoremove eocortex
```

Removal of PostgreSQL by this method does not automatically remove its settings. When reinstalling the DBMS on the same computer, PostgreSQL will retain the settings from the previously created configuration files.

Complete removal

If it is necessary to completely remove the installed version of PostgreSQL, use the following sequence of commands:

Debian/Ubuntu:

```
sudo apt-get --purge remove postgresql\*
sudo apt-get purge postgresql
sudo apt-get autoremove postgresql
sudo rm -r /etc/postgresql/
sudo rm -r /etc/postgresql-common/
sudo rm -r /var/lib/postgresql/
sudo userdel -r postgres
sudo groupdel postgres
```

CentOS 7:

```
sudo yum --purge remove postgresql\*
sudo yum purge postgresql
sudo yum autoremove postgresql
sudo rm -r /etc/postgresql/
sudo rm -r /etc/postgresql-common/
sudo rm -r /var/lib/postgresql/
sudo userdel -r postgres
sudo groupdel postgres
```

Installing, updating, and removing Episode archive

The **Episode archive** provides the possibility to keep individual archive fragments for an unlimited time. Using the **Episode archive**, you can be sure that important archive fragments will not be deleted due to loop recording or corruption of the main archive.

This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

The Service can be installed using the following two options:

- [Online](#), if the device has Internet access.
- [Offline](#), if the device does not have Internet access.

Online installation

Debian 10

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo apt-get install eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/rpm/install/eocortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo yum install eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

Offline installation

For this installation method, you will need a computer with Internet access and the same operating system as the one on which you want to install the **Episode archive** Service.

Debian 10

Clear local repository:

```
sudo apt-get clean
```

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo apt-get install -d -y eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

Create the ArchiveEpisodesPackages directory and transfer all downloaded packages to it:

```
mkdir ~/ArchiveEpisodesPackages/ && cp -R /var/cache/apt/archives/*.deb  
~/ArchiveEpisodesPackages/
```

After that, copy the entire ArchiveEpisodesPackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Episode archive** Service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo dpkg -i /path_to_ArchiveEpisodesPackages/*.deb
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/rpm/install/eocortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install yum extensions:

```
sudo yum install -y yum-utils
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo yumdownloader --downloadonly --downloadaddir=~/.ArchiveEpisodesPackages eocortex-  
archive-episodes-service --resolve
```

After that, copy the entire ArchiveEpisodesPackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Episode archive** Service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo rpm -ivh /path_to_ArchiveEpisodesPackages/*.rpm
```

Dependencies

The following dependency packages must be installed in the operating system for the Service to work:

Debian 10

aspnetcore-runtime-6.0 (>= 6.0)

debconf (>= 0.5)

postgresql-12

CentOS 7

aspnetcore-runtime-6.0 >= 6.0

policycoreutils-python >= 2.5

postgresql12-server

During the [online installation](#) the dependency packages will be installed automatically, while during the [offline installation](#) they may require to be installed manually.

To check if a package is installed and its version, use the command **dpkg -s %package_name%** on Ubuntu/Debian or **sudo rpm -qa | grep %package_name%** on CentOS.

Update

To update the Service, run the following commands:

Debian 10

```
sudo apt-get update
sudo apt-get install eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

CentOS 7

```
sudo yum update eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

Or download a new version package from the repository and install it manually using the **dpkg/rpm** command.

Uninstallation

Debian 10

```
sudo apt-get remove eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

CentOS 7

```
sudo yum remove eocortex-archive-episodes-service
```

Network settings of the Service

These settings should be made on the device where the Service is installed.

As part of the installation process, a configuration file **appsettings.json** containing network settings will be created in the root directory of the Service.

Default path:

/opt/eocortexArchiveEpisodesService/appsettings.json

Below is an example of default settings:

```

Editing the configuration file allows to:

Change the HTTP port

To change the HTTP port, find the following section in the configuration file:

```
"Network": {  "Endpoints": {    "Http": {      "Url": "http://0.0.0.0:8899"    }  }  },
```

And set a custom port in the **Url** line instead of the default **8899**.

Enable HTTPS connection

To add an SSL certificate to the Service configuration and enable HTTPS connection, change the Network section by one of the following ways:

```
"Network": {  "Endpoints": {    "Http": {      "Url": "http://0.0.0.0:8899"    },    "Https": {      "Url": "https://0.0.0.0:18899",      "Certificate": {        "Path": ".pfx file",        "Password": "cert_password"      }    }  }  }
```

Where:

Path is the location of the PFX file of the certificate.

Password is the password of the certificate.

```
"Network": { "Endpoints": { "Http": { "Url": "http://0.0.0.0:8899" },
"HttpsInlineCertAndKeyFile": { "Url": "https://0.0.0.0:18899",
"Certificate": { "Path": ".pem/.crt file", "KeyPath": ".key file",
>Password": "cert_password" } } } }
```

Where:

Path is the location of the .pem/.crt file of the certificate.

KeyPath is the location of the .key file of the certificate.

Password is the password of the certificate.

```
"Network": { "Endpoints": { "Http": { "Url": "http://0.0.0.0:8899" },
"Https": { "Url": "https://0.0.0.0:18899", "Certificate": {
"Subject": "Subject", "Store": "Store", "Location": "Location",
"AllowInvalid": "true/false" } } } }
```

Where:

Subject is the name of the certificate subject.

Store is the name of the certificate storage.

Location is the location of the certificate storage. By default, CurrentUser.

AllowInvalid is the state of the policy of using invalid (e.g. self-signed) certificates. By default, it's false.

Changing the HTTPS port can be done similarly to the HTTP protocol, but for the relevant section.

To enable forced redirection of all requests to the Service to a secured connection, find and change the value from **false** to **true** for the following line:

```
"AlwaysRedirectToHttps": false,
```

After saving the settings, the Service must be restarted via the **Services** snap-in to take all changes into effect.

Changing other settings provided in the configuration file may cause the Service to malfunction or fail. It is not recommended to change settings that are not described in the present documentation.

Specifics of running the Service on CentOS

When hosting the Service on CentOS, specific problems may arise when the Service is trying to work with its database. To avoid them, change the PostgreSQL settings.

Open the file **pg_hba.conf** in any text editor.

Default path: `/var/lib/pgsql/12/data/pg_hba.conf`

Change the authentication method in the file from **ident** to **md5** for all types of connections.

Before:

```
# TYPE DATABASE USER ADDRESS METHOD # "local" is for Unix domain
socket connections only local all all ident # IPv4 local connections:
host all all 127.0.0.1/32 ident # IPv6 local connections: host
all all ::1/128 ident
```

After:

```
# TYPE DATABASE USER ADDRESS METHOD # "local" is for Unix domain
socket connections only local all all md5 # IPv4 local connections:
host all all 127.0.0.1/32 md5 # IPv6 local connections: host all
all ::1/128 md5
```

Installing, updating, and removing Long-term database

The **Long-term database** Service ensures storing of selected types of events and access to them regardless of the archive storage settings. With this Service there is no need to be concerned that event data will be erased if the archive is deleted.

This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

The Service can be installed using the following two options:

- [Online](#), if the device has Internet access.
- [Offline](#), if the device does not have Internet access.

Online installation

Ubuntu 20.04 and Debian 10

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo apt-get install eocortex-long-term-database-service
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/rpm/install/eocortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo yum install eocortex-long-term-database-service
```

Offline installation

For this installation method, you will need a computer with Internet access and the same operating system as the one on which you want to install the **Long-term database** Service.

Ubuntu 20.04 and Debian 10

Clear local repository:

```
sudo apt-get clean
```

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo apt-get install -d -y eocortex-long-term-database-service
```

Create the LongTermDatabasePackages directory and transfer all downloaded packages to it:

```
mkdir ~/LongTermDatabasePackages/ && cp -R /var/cache/apt/archives/*.deb  
~/LongTermDatabasePackages/
```

After that, copy the entire LongTermDatabasePackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Long-term database** Service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo dpkg -i /path_to_LongTermDatabasePackages/*.deb
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/rpm/install/eocortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install yum extensions:

```
sudo yum install -y yum-utils
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo yumdownloader --downloadonly --downloadaddir=~/.LongTermDatabasePackages eocortex-  
long-term-database-service --resolve
```

After that, copy the entire LongTermDatabasePackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Long-term database** service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo rpm -ivh /path_to_LongTermDatabasePackages/*.rpm
```

Dependencies

The following dependency packages must be installed in the operating system for the Service to work:

Ubuntu 20.04 and Debian 10

aspnetcore-runtime-6.0 (>= 6.0)
debconf (>= 0.5)
postgresql-12

CentOS 7

aspnetcore-runtime-6.0 >= 6.0
policycoreutils-python >= 2.5
postgresql12-server

During the [online installation](#) the dependency packages will be installed automatically, while during the [offline installation](#) they may require to be installed manually.

sudo apt-get remove eocortex-long-term-database-service
```

CentOS 7

```
sudo yum remove eocortex-long-term-database-service
```

Network settings of the Service

These settings should be made on the device where the Service is installed.

As part of the installation process, a configuration file **appsettings.json** containing network settings will be created in the root directory of the Service.

Default path:

/opt/EocortexLongTermDatabaseService/appsettings.json

Below is an example of default settings:

```

Change the HTTP port

To change the HTTP port, find the following section in the configuration file:

```
"Network": {  "Endpoints": {    "Http": {      "Url": "http://*:8999"    }  } },
```

And set a custom port in the **Url** line instead of the default **8999**.

Enable HTTPS connection

To add an SSL certificate to the Service configuration and enable HTTPS connection, change the Network section as follows:

```
"Network": {  "Endpoints": {    "Http": {      "Url": "http://*:8999"    },    "HttpsInlineCertFile": {      "Url": "https://*:18999",      "Certificate": {        "Path": "path_to_the_cert",        "Password": "cert_password"      }    }  } }
```

Where:

Path is the location of the PFX file of the certificate.

Password is the password of the certificate.

Changing the HTTPS port can be done similarly to the HTTP protocol, but for the **HttpsInlineCertFile** section.

To enable forced redirection of all requests to the Service to a secured connection, find and change the value from **false** to **true** for the following line:

```
"AlwaysRedirectToHttps": false,
```

After saving the settings, the Service must be restarted via the **Services** snap-in to take all changes into effect.

Changing other settings provided in the configuration file may cause the Service to malfunction or fail. It is not recommended to change settings that are not described in the present documentation.

Installing, updating, and removing Monitoring

The **Monitoring** Service allows controlling the status of the video surveillance system components and receiving immediate notifications about problems occurring with them.

This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

The Service can be installed using the following two options:

- [Online](#), if the device has Internet access.
- [Offline](#), if the device does not have Internet access.

Online installation

Debian 10

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/install/eocortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo apt-get install eocortex-monitoring-server
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.eocortex.com/rpm/install/eocortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install the Service.

```
sudo yum install eocortex-monitoring-server
```

Once installed, the **Service** will start automatically.

Service name: **ecortexmonitoring.service**

Offline installation

For this installation method, you will need a computer with Internet access and the same operating system as the one on which you want to install the **Monitoring** Service.

Debian 10

Clear local repository:

```
sudo apt-get clean
```

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.ecortex.com/deb/install/ecortex-deps-debian.sh | bash
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo apt-get install -d -y ecortex-monitoring-server
```

Create the MonitoringPackages directory and transfer all downloaded packages to it:

```
mkdir ~/MonitoringPackages/ && cp -R /var/cache/apt/archives/*.deb  
~/MonitoringPackages/
```

After that, copy the entire MonitoringPackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Monitoring** Service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo dpkg -i /path_to_MonitoringPackages/*.deb
```

CentOS 7

Add Eocortex repository:

```
wget -O - http://packages.ecortex.com/rpm/install/ecortex-deps-centos.sh | bash
```

Install yum extensions:

```
sudo yum install -y yum-utils
```

Install all required packages (dependencies):

```
sudo yumdownloader --downloadonly --downloadaddir=~/.MonitoringPackages ecortex-  
monitoring-server --resolve
```

After that, copy the entire LongTermDatabasePackages directory to a USB drive and transfer the data to the server. Install the **Monitoring** service and all dependencies using the following command:

```
sudo rpm -ivh /path_to_MonitoringPackages/*.rpm
```

Dependencies

The following dependency packages must be installed in the operating system for the Service to work:

Debian 10

aspnetcore-runtime-6.0 (>= 6.0)

debconf (>= 0.5)

During the [online installation](#) the dependency packages will be installed automatically, while during the [offline installation](#) they may require to be installed manually.

To check if a package is installed and its version, use the command **dpkg -s %package_name%** on Debian or **sudo rpm -qa | grep %package_name%** on CentOS.

Update

To update the Service, run the following commands:

The service is installed and updated at the same time as the **Eocortex Server** components are deployed, so there is no need to install the **Agent** individually.

Installing neural networks

Part of the **Eocortex** video analysis modules uses neural networks.

Neural networks are presented as an additional installation package.

Starting from version 3.6 of **Eocortex**, two different packages can be used:

- The **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package
- The **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package

[Comparison of neural networks packages](#)



Eocortex Neural Networks Standard and **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** packages support simultaneous use of multiple video cards for analyzing video streams. However, correct work of the analytics is possible only when using video cards that are identical to each other by their technical properties.

Installing Eocortex Neural Networks Standard package

If the **Face Recognition (Complete)** module is used, the face databases will be automatically updated at the first start after updating **Eocortex** and the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package from version 3.3 or lower to version 3.4 or higher. It will take some time.

Since version 4.0, **Eocortex** uses PostgreSQL for all internal databases. When upgrading from earlier versions, it is recommended also to read the [information about PostgreSQL installation](#).

Requirements and recommendations



Stable operation of the package is guaranteed only under the following operating systems:

- Windows 10
- Windows Server 2016
- Ubuntu 20.04
- Debian 10
- CentOS 7

Workability of the package, especially GPU analysis, is not guaranteed when using other operating systems.

Minimum hardware requirements:

- A processor with AVX instructions support;

- An **NVIDIA** video card (GPU) with the computation capacity index of at least 6.5 and with at least 4 Gb of memory; the parameters and performance of the video card must be similar or better than those of **NVIDIA GTX 1650 Super** model;

Eocortex must use video cards selected for running neural networks in monopoly mode. It is not allowed to use such card for other applications or tasks that consume GPU resources, including for displaying video. Simultaneous use of a video card for several tasks may lead to incorrect system operation: from analytics performance degradation to server instability.



As an example, Simultaneous execution of tasks of video displaying and analysis with the **Face Recognition (Complete)** or **Unique Visitor Counting** modules working on the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package can cause significant lags of Face Recognition processes when using graphics cards of **GTX 10XX** and **GTX 16XX** series with 4 GB of video memory or less. It is recommended to use dedicated graphics cards for these tasks.



The package must be installed only on the computer with the **Eocortex Server** application. Moreover, this server should be the main one for cameras using neural network modules.

Installation under Windows

Pre-install preparations

The **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package for Windows is not directly dependent on having the **Eocortex Server** application deployed on the computer at the installation moment. Applications can be installed in any order.

Eocortex Neural Networks Standard for Windows comes as a single installation package, containing neural networks for analysis both exclusively on the CPU and using the GPU. The choice of the analysis mode is made at the stage of the package installation.

If the analysis is to be performed only on the CPU, no additional preparation of the computer is required before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

If the analysis is to be performed using the GPU, the latest graphics card driver package must be installed from the [official NVIDIA website](#) before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

The graphics card drivers installed automatically with the OS have limited functionality and do not support GPU analysis.

The most up-to-date version of **Eocortex** can be downloaded at [Support / Software Installation Packages Supported](#).

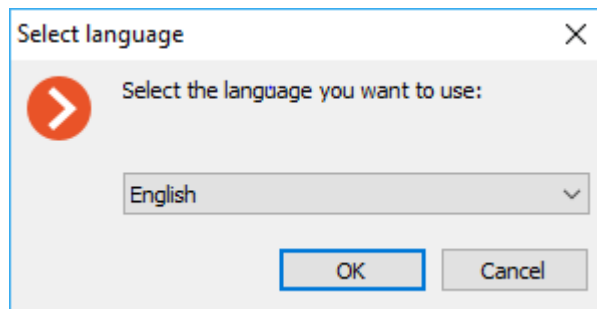
Regular installation of the package

The installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package shall be performed under the account of the same user who will operate the application. If the application is to be launched by multiple users with different accounts, the installation must be performed for each of these users under his/her account.

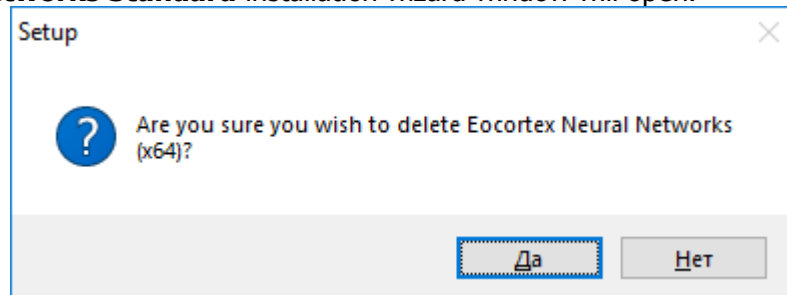
Before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package, close all **Eocortex** applications, including stopping the **Eocortex Server** application.

To install the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package, run the **EocortexNeuralNetworksCommon Installer.exe** file, located in the root folder of the package.

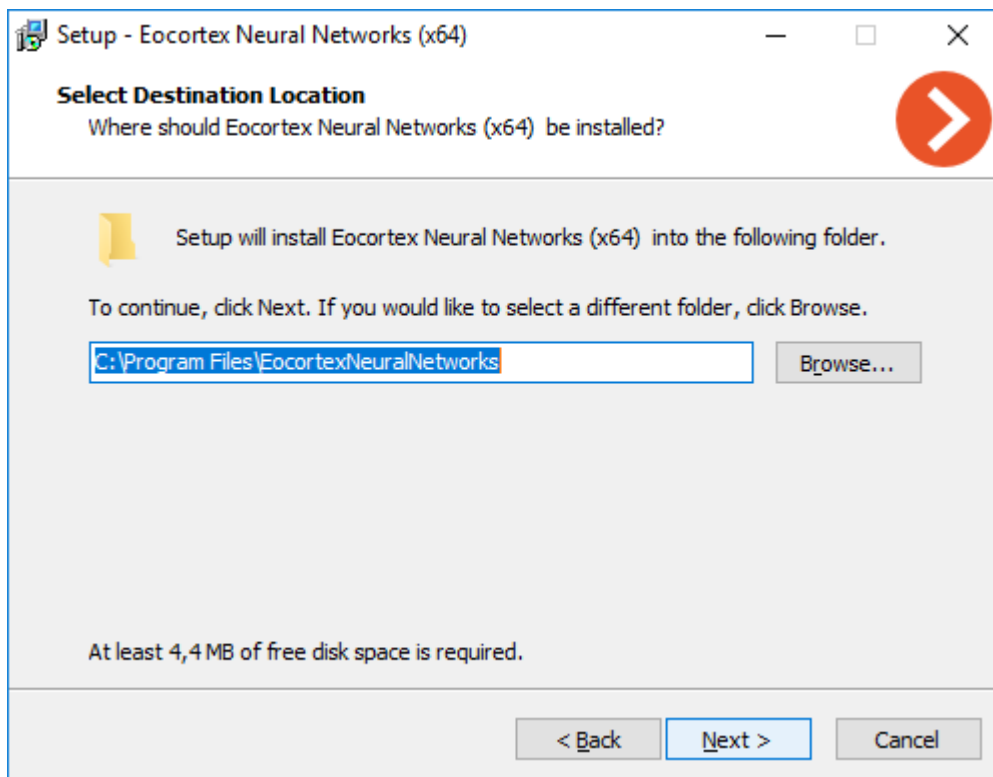
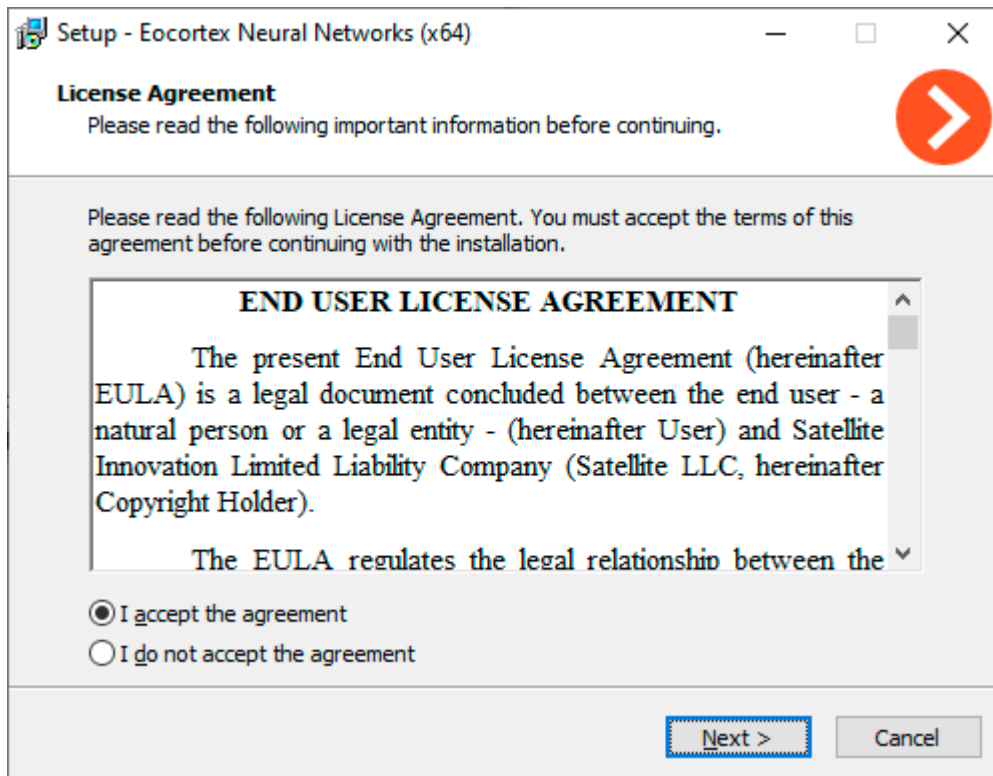

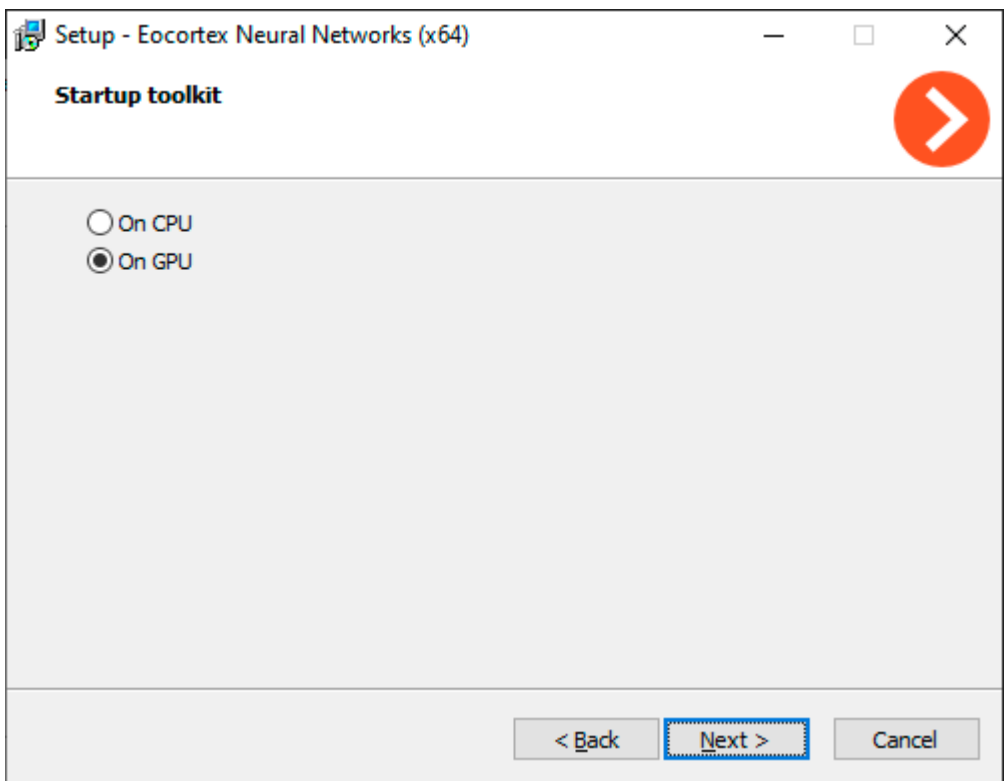
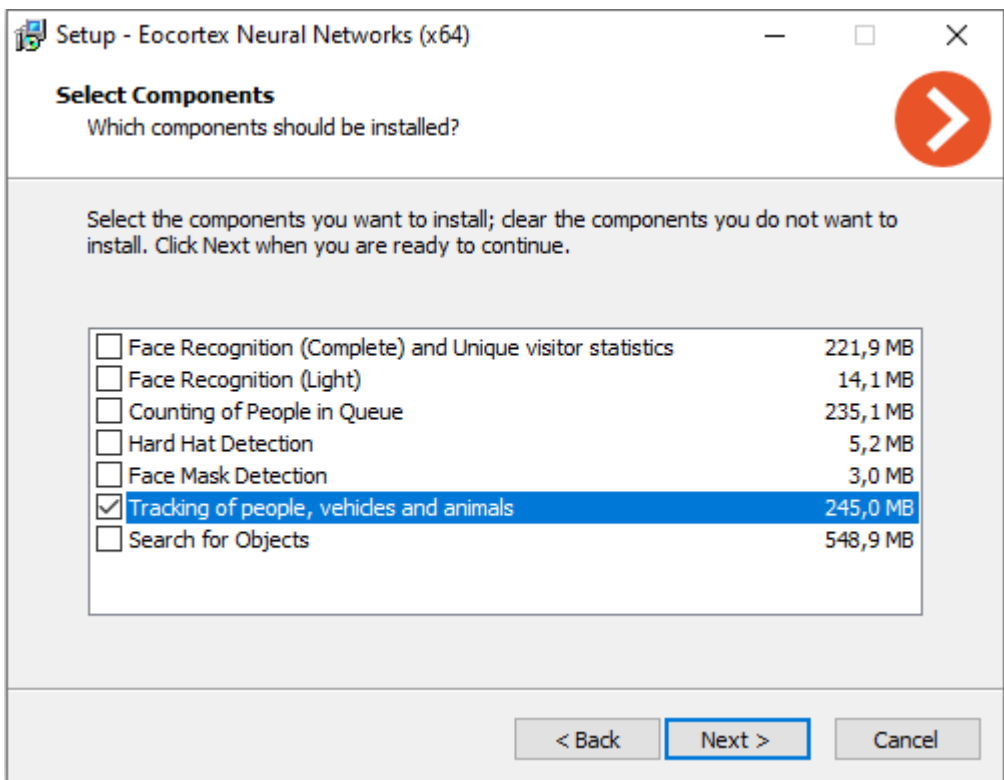


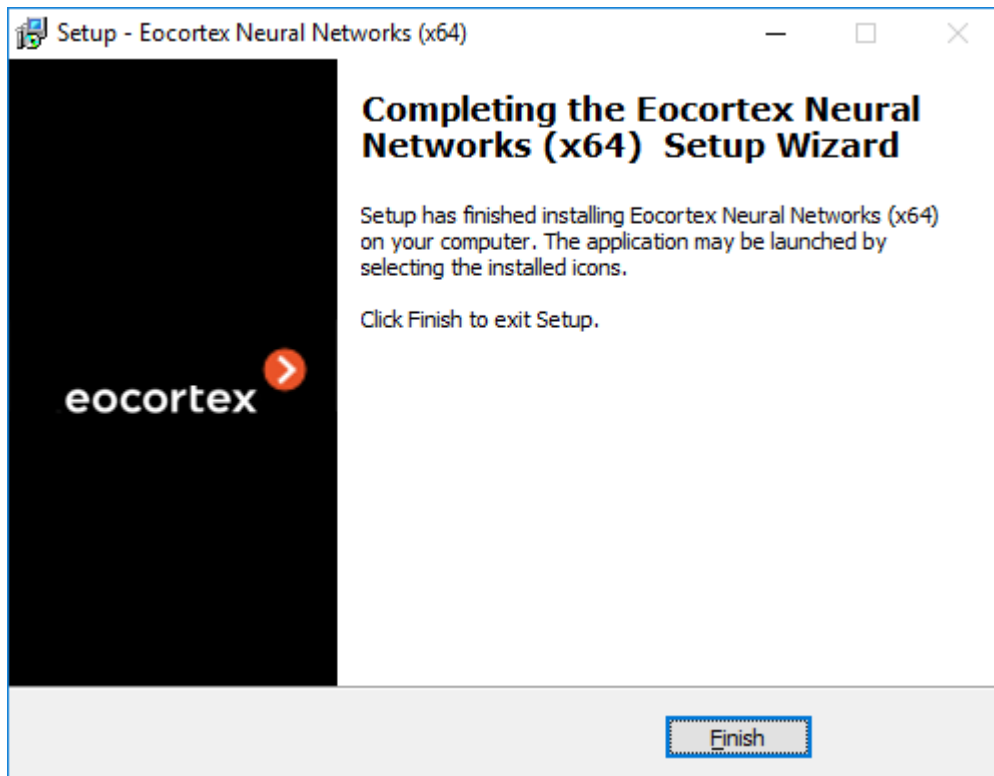
If the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package has already been installed on this computer, the user will be recommended to remove the previous copy of the software. In case **No** is clicked, the installation will be aborted, and the previous copy will remain. If **Yes** is clicked, the previous copy will be deleted, and the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** installation wizard window will open.



If the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** suite is being installed on the computer for the first time, the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** installation wizard will open without interruptions. Follow the wizard steps to proceed.







Silent installation of the package

Starting from version 3.5, a silent installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package is available.

The term *silent installation* refers to the installation of software in automatic mode that does not require active participation of the user.

The silent installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package should be performed under the administrator account.

The silent installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package is available only under Windows.

All the components of the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package will be installed during the silent installation.

Before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package, close all **Eocortex** applications, including stopping the **Eocortex Server** application.

To perform silent installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package, run the **EocortexNeuralNetworksCommon Installer.exe** file with the **/VERYSILENT** key.

Example:

```
EocortexNeuralNetworksCommon Installer.exe /VERYSILENT
```

When the **/LOG** key is specified, information about the installation progress will be written to the file **%User%\AppData\Local\Temp\Setup Log% Installation_Date% #% Random_number%.txt** (for example, **C:\Users\User\AppData\Local\Temp\Setup Log 2021-07-15 # 012.txt**).

The **/PostgreDbPath** key can be used to specify the path to the PostgreSQL database.

Example:

```
EocortexNeuralNetworksCommon Installer.exe /VERYSILENT /PostgreDbPath="e:\int search"
```

By default, PostgreSQL is installed to the **C:\ProgramData\postgredb** directory.

Example of installation path logging (when launching with the key /LOG):

If PostgreSQL is already installed, it will be used for the **Eocortex Neural Networks** package components as well.

Installation under Linux

Pre-install preparations

The **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package for Linux is directly dependent on the **Eocortex Server** application being deployed on the computer at the moment of the package installation. It is necessary to install **Eocortex Server** before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

Eocortex Neural Networks Standard for Linux comes in two separate installation packages, containing neural networks for the required analysis mode — only on CPU or using GPU. The choice of analysis mode is made at the stage of downloading the installation package.

If the analysis is to be performed only on the CPU, no additional preparation of the computer is required before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

If the analysis is to be performed using the GPU, the latest graphics card driver package must be installed from the [official NVIDIA website](#) before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

The Nouveau kernel module, which provides graphics support for Linux, is not suitable for GPU analysis.

Installation of graphics card driver

The following steps are necessary if the analysis is to be performed using the GPU. If it is planned to perform analysis only on the CPU, this step [can be skipped](#).

The driver installation process may vary depending on your operating system. The instructions below are provided as an example, alternative installation methods can be found in the documentation for the selected operating system.

All actions must be performed as a user with administrator privileges.

Ubuntu

Find the appropriate driver package in the repository by running the command in the Terminal:

```
sudo ubuntu-drivers devices
```

Install the selected driver package:

sudo apt install nvidia-driver-[version]

```
rd.driver.blacklist=nouveau nouveau.modeset=0
```

Put the Nouveau module into the blacklist. Edit (or create) the **/etc/modprobe.d/blacklist.conf** file with a text editor, and add the line below to the end of it:

Update the bootloader configuration by running the following command in the Terminal:

```
sudo update-grub

sudo systemctl isolate multi-user.target

Reboot the OS:

```
sudo reboot

Browse to the directory with the previously downloaded driver package.

Grant the execution privileges to the previously downloaded package:

```
chmod a+x NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package.

Install the driver package:

```
sudo ./NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package.

Reboot the OS again:

```
sudo reboot
```

CentOS 7

Download the appropriate driver package from the [NVIDIA official website](#).

Install kernel header files:

```
sudo yum -y install kernel-devel
```

Install the **Development Tools** metapackage:

```
sudo yum -y groupinstall "Development Tools"
```

Deactivate the Nouveau module. Open the **/etc/default/grub** file with a text editor and add the following to the **GRUB_CMDLINE_LINUX** line:

```
rd.driver.blacklist=nouveau nouveau.modeset=0
```

Put the Nouveau module into the blacklist. Edit (or create) the **/etc/modprobe.d/blacklist.conf** file with a text editor, and add the line below to the end of it:

```
blacklist nouveau
```

Update the bootloader configuration by running the following command in the Terminal:

```
sudo grub2-mkconfig -o /boot/grub2/grub.cfg
```

Update the file system image by running the following command in the Terminal:

```
sudo mv /boot/initramfs-$(uname -r).img /boot/initramfs-$(uname -r)-nouveau.img
sudo dracut /boot/initramfs-$(uname -r).img $(uname -r)

Browse to the directory with the previously downloaded driver package.

Grant the execution privileges to the previously downloaded package:

```
chmod a+x NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package.

Install the driver package:

```
sudo ./NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run -kernel-source-
path=/usr/src/kernels/{kernel_version}
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package and **{kernel_version}** is the actual OS kernel version.

Reboot the OS again:

```
sudo reboot
```

Installation of the package

Eocortex Neural Networks Standard for Linux comes in two separate installation packages:

- **eocortex-neural-networks-cpu** is a neural network package designed to perform analysis using only CPU.
- **eocortex-neural-networks-gpu** is a neural network package with the ability to use the GPU to perform analysis.

The **eocortex-neural-networks-gpu-optimized** package available in the repository belongs to the **Eocortex Neural Networks Special**. This is a separate neural network package, installation of which is not required when deploying the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package.

Installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package on Linux can be performed in two ways:

- **Online**, when the installation package is fetched from the **Eocortex** repository along with all dependency packages. Requires Internet access on the computer.

sudo apt-get install eocortex-neural-networks-gpu

CentOS 7, analysis only on CPU:

```
sudo yum install eocortex-neural-networks-cpu
```

CentOS 7, analysis using GPU:

```
sudo yum install eocortex-neural-networks-gpu
```

Wait until installation is complete.

Start the **Eocortex Server** application back:

```
sudo systemctl start eocortex
```

Offline installation

Download the selected neural network package from the repository.

Ubuntu/Debian, analysis only on CPU:

```
http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/public/pool/main/e/eocortex-neural-networks-cpu/
```

Ubuntu/Debian, analysis using GPU:

```
http://packages.eocortex.com/deb/public/pool/main/e/eocortex-neural-networks-gpuu/

CentOS 7:

The **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package does not have an analysis mode without using the GPU, so before installing the package, it is necessary to install the latest drivers for the graphics card from the [official NVIDIA website](#).

The Nouveau kernel module, which provides graphics support for Linux, is not suitable for GPU analysis.

Installation of graphics card driver

The driver installation process may vary depending on your operating system. The instructions below are provided as an example, alternative installation methods can be found in the documentation for the selected operating system.

All actions must be performed as a user with administrator privileges.

Ubuntu

Find the appropriate driver package in the repository by running the command in the Terminal:

```
sudo ubuntu-drivers devices
```

Install the selected driver package:

```
sudo apt install nvidia-driver-[version]
```

Where **nvidia-driver-[version]** is the actual name of the package.

Reboot the OS:

If X server is enabled, disable GUI startup after reboot:

```

Reboot the OS:

```
sudo reboot

Browse to the directory with the previously downloaded driver package.

Grant the execution privileges to the previously downloaded package:

```
chmod a+x NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package.

Install the driver package:

```
sudo ./NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version].run -kernel-source-
path=/usr/src/kernels/{kernel_version}
```

Where **NVIDIA-Linux-x86_64-[version]** is the actual name of the package and **{kernel_version}** is the actual OS kernel version.

Reboot the OS again:

```
sudo reboot
```

Installation of the package

Eocortex Neural Networks Special for Linux comes as a single installation package named **eocortex-neural-networks-gpu-optimized**.

The **eocortex-neural-networks-cpu** and **eocortex-neural-networks-gpu** packages available in the repository belong to the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard**. This is a separate neural network package, installation of which is not required when deploying the **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package.

If the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package was previously installed on the computer, the optimization of neural networks data will be performed during the installation process. This operation takes a significant amount of time and can take up to one hour.

If the **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package is updating or installing for the first time, the installation process will take up to 15 minutes.

Installation of the **Eocortex Neural Networks Standard** package on Linux can be performed in two ways:

- **Online**, when the installation package is fetched from the **Eocortex** repository along with all dependency packages. Requires Internet access on the computer.
- **Offline**, when the installation package must be pre-downloaded from the **Eocortex** repository, and all dependency packages must be installed manually. Does not require Internet access on the computer.

Before installing the **Eocortex Neural Networks Special** package, ensure that the **Eocortex Server** application is installed on the computer.

Online installation

Stop the **Eocortex Server** application:

```
sudo systemctl stop eocortex
```

Run the installation of the neural network package with the corresponding command:

Ubuntu/Debian:

```
sudo apt-get install eocortex-neural-networks-gpu-optimized
```

CentOS 7:

```

Wait until the installation process including neural network data optimization is complete.

Start the **Eocortex Server** application back:

```
sudo systemctl start eocortex
```

Installing and updating the license

To license an **Eocortex** server, it is required to activate a license bound to a software key or a USB key.

The license can be local or floating:

- A **local license** is bound to the local key installed directly on the computer with the licensed server application of **Eocortex**. The features specified in the license will be only available for the cameras bound to the given server.
- A **floating license** is bound to the network key installed on any of the servers accessible from the licensed computer in the local network. The network licenses provide [floating licensing](#).

To update the license of a previously activated key, activate the procedure for this key again.

When transferring USB key to another computer, install and activate the license on the new computer. For offline activation, use the existing license file for this key.

Several different types of keys may be installed on the server - both multiple hardware (USB) keys and one software key. Only one key can be activated. If you need to use a license for another key on the server, you should run the license installation procedure and activate that key.

When installing and upgrading the license, it's preferable to provide Internet connection to the server, as the most convenient way of key activation its automatic activation via the Internet. Generally, key installation and activation requires the performance of the sequence of steps, offered by the wizard, which are predefined by default.

The Sentinel (HASP) software key that is installed on a physical machine binds to the hard drive serial number, motherboard ID, and other hardware components, including processors and network cards. If the hard drive or motherboard fails, the license tied to this key will only be active if most of the other system components remain unchanged.

The Sentinel (HASP) software key that is installed on a virtual machine binds to the virtual MAC address, CPU properties, and UUID of the virtual machine. If any of specified components mismatches, the license bound to this key will become inactive.

The total number of cameras, modules and other licensed features are shown in the floating license. The administrator of a video surveillance system can distribute the cameras among servers at his/her discretion. However, it is not required to distribute the licenses among servers because the system core does it automatically. Whereby, upon binding the cameras to another server, the corresponding licenses will be moved accordingly.

Only one license can be activated on a single server, irrespective of whether this license is local or floating.

The network key must be installed on a computer where the **Eocortex** server is installed.

The network keys can only be used on the **Eocortex** servers of versions 3.1 and later. It is not possible to use the network keys on the earlier versions of the software, even as local keys.

In order to ensure access to a network key, it is required to allow the outgoing TCP and UDP traffic for the 1947 port both on the server where the key is installed and on the servers that use this key.

A single network key can be used in several **Eocortex** video surveillance systems. In such a case, the parameters of the key will not be shown correctly in the **Eocortex Configurator** application of each system because the systems have no information regarding the usage of licenses by other systems.

A network key is to be installed on any **Eocortex** server of the same local network or VPN where the servers using that key are located.

Several network and local keys can be installed in the same **Eocortex** video surveillance system. However, the number of local keys is limited by the quantity of **Eocortex** servers, but the number of network keys is unlimited.

The floating licenses can be used on any Sentinel (HASP) keys, be it software or USB ones.



Eocortex Union (Beta)

Eocortex Union is a platform that provides convenient access from the same point to several **Eocortex** video surveillance systems at the same time. The **Eocortex Union** includes client applications, configuration and system health monitoring tools.



This feature is available only for servers licensed with **ST**, **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

Eocortex Union infrastructure is shown below.

Administrator personal area is a web application that permits to configure **Eocortex Union** and monitor system status.

User area is a web application that provides access to client applications.

Eocortex system: Eocortex server or several interconnected **Eocortex** servers with IP cameras connected to them.

Only systems based on the version 3.5 or higher of **Eocortex** can be connected to **Eocortex Union**.

Connection server is a server through which the system connects to **Eocortex Union**. In a single-server system, the connection server is the only server in that system. In multiserver systems, any of the servers can act as a connection server.

The **Connection server** must be in the same network as **Eocortex Union**.

Access control

Eocortex Union implements multilevel access with local users of **Eocortex** systems and the users of **Eocortex Union**.

The **Eocortex Union** administrator adds new **Eocortex** systems. The rights of such users are limited to a group pre-configured by the administrator on each of the systems.

An **Eocortex Union** user can install several client applications to view cameras of each system simultaneously.

Advantages

Prior to version 3.5, creating large-scale distributed video surveillance systems based on **Eocortex** was associated with a number of limitations and inconveniences:

If video surveillance was provided by several **Eocortex** systems, each of them had to be administered separately.

To ensure access of one employee to several systems, it was necessary to add and configure a new user on each of the systems.

The user had to connect to each of the systems separately.

Multiserver systems required a stable connection between servers, which was often difficult to achieve in large-scale and geographically distributed systems.

If the connection between the servers was unstable, transferring the settings of each of the servers took a long time.

The user could not recover their password without the participation of the administrator.

Eocortex Union solves the above-mentioned issues, eliminating the need to combine all servers into one large-scale multiserver system.

Licensing

To license **Eocortex Union**, it is required to activate the license bound to the software key or the USB key.

Only local keys installed directly on the **Eocortex Union** server are used for licensing **Eocortex Union**. Network keys are not used for **Eocortex Union**.

The **Eocortex Union** licensing key cannot be used to license the **Eocortex** server and vice versa.

Requirements and recommendations

Eocortex Union (Server):

- Operating system: Ubuntu 18.04, 20.04; Debian 9, 10, 11
- Hard drive space: 1 GB
- Processor: 2 GHz
- RAM: 4 GB
- Internet access: required for installing and activating the license

Administrator personal area/User area::

- Browsers: Chrome, Firefox, Edge, Safari, Opera
- Internet: common network with the **Eocortex Union** server

Web client of Eocortex Union:

- Browsers: Chrome, Firefox, Edge, Safari, Opera
- Internet: common network with the **Eocortex Union** server and the servers of the connected **Eocortex** systems

It is recommended to use the latest browser versions.

Getting started

Installing, updating and removing Eocortex Union

Installation

To install **Eocortex Union**, download the archive [eocortex-union.tar.gz](https://www.eocortex.com/eocortex-union.tar.gz) from the website and execute the following commands in the console:

```
tar -xf eocortex-union.tar.gz
cd eocortex-union
chmod +x ./install.sh
sudo ./install.sh
```

During the installation process, it will be required to enter the IP address or fully qualified domain name that will be used to access **Eocortex Union**. (Examples: **123.4.56.78**, **union-server.mycompany.com**)

Go to the specified address can after successful completion of the installation.

Update

To update **Eocortex Union**, it is required to download the archive eocortex-union.tar.gz with the current version of **Eocortex Union** and repeat the installation steps. In this case, there will be no need to enter the server address.

Removal

To remove **Eocortex Union**, execute the following command:

```
/opt/eocortex-union/service/uninstall.sh
```

Installing a license

In order to install and activate a key, the user has to obtain an activation code, which looks like **XXXXXXXX-XXXX-XXXX-XXXX-XXXXXXXXXXXX**, where **X** can be hex digit (i.e., 0123456789abcdef). Here's an example of the activation code: **a46a6d3e-17f6-416c-9da2-10cb4b80574e**.

To relocate the software key to another computer, contact the **Eocortex** technical support.

It is prohibited to install more than one **Eocortex** software key on the server.

During the installation of a license, it is necessary to provide Internet access for the server on which **Eocortex Union** is deployed. In the future, after successful installation of the license, Internet access will not be required for the key to work.

To install the license, follow these steps:

Go to the address **address_union/admin** (e.g., **123.4.56.78/admin** or **union.mycompany.com/admin**).

Enter the administrator credentials in the authorization window.

If this is the first time the installation is being performed and the administrator credentials have not yet been configured, the default values should be used:

- Email or username: root
- Password: (blank)

Mandatory settings

When logging into the **Administrator personal area** for the first time, a wizard of initial settings will open. The initial settings must be specified before using **Eocortex Union**.

At the **Administrator personal area settings** step, it is required to specify an email and a password that will be used to enter the **Administrator personal area**.



During the initial deployment of the platform, one **Eocortex Union** administrator is created with the following credentials:

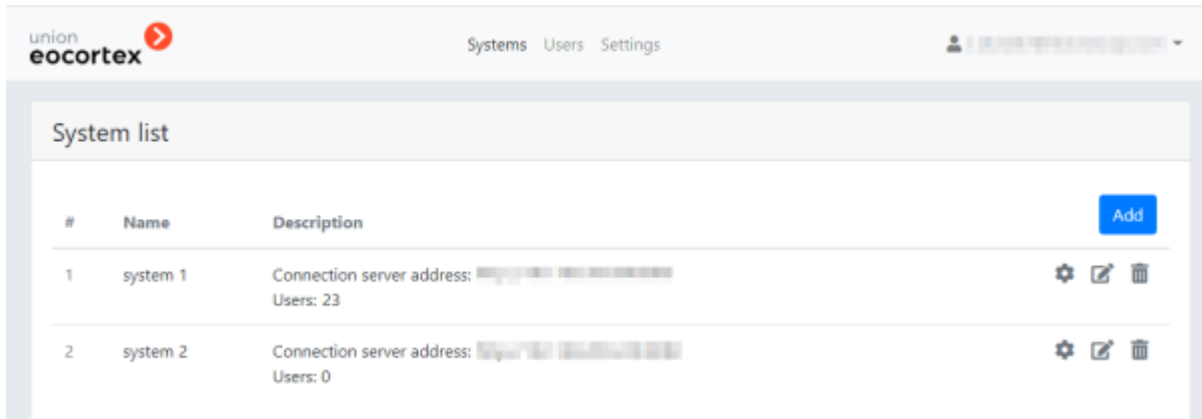

Systems

Eocortex systems can be connected and set up using **Eocortex Union**.

Only systems based on the version 3.5 or higher of **Eocortex** can be connected to **Eocortex Union**.

To work with the **Eocortex** systems, it is required to go to the Systems tab in the administrator personal area. The tab displays a list of systems connected to **Eocortex Union**.



Connecting a system

Before connecting a system, it is required to make sure that **Eocortex Union** and the connection server have Internet access or direct access to each other over the network.

To connect a new **Eocortex** system to **Eocortex Union**, it is required to click the **Add** button on the **Systems** tab in the administrator personal area.


In the **Add system** form that opens, it is required to specify the name of the system to be connected and the parameters for connecting to the connection server of this system. In the future, the name of the system will be displayed in the list of connected systems.

The name is assigned to the system when it is connected to **Eocortex Union** and will only be available to users, administrators and **Eocortex Union** applications.

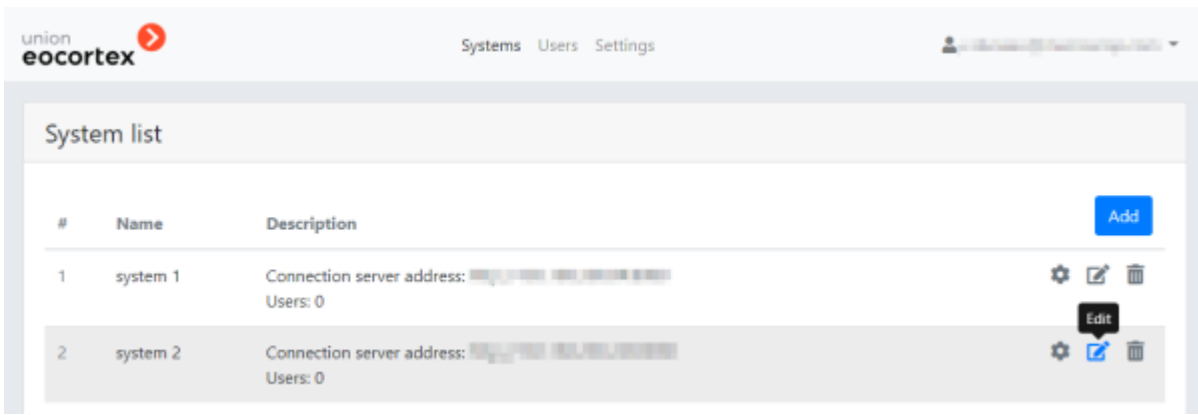
The username and password must match the credentials of the administrator of a system being connected.

The administrator must not be added to the system via ActiveDirectory, in which case the addition will fail.


For the systems with an **Enterprise** or an **Ultra** license, the username and password of a user who is a member of the Senior System Administrators group are to be specified.

System modifications

The name and parameters of the connection to the system can be modified anytime. To do this, it is required to click the **Modify**  button located to the right of the name of the corresponding system in the list of systems on the **Systems** tab.





The **System modification** form, similar to the system connection form, will be opened.

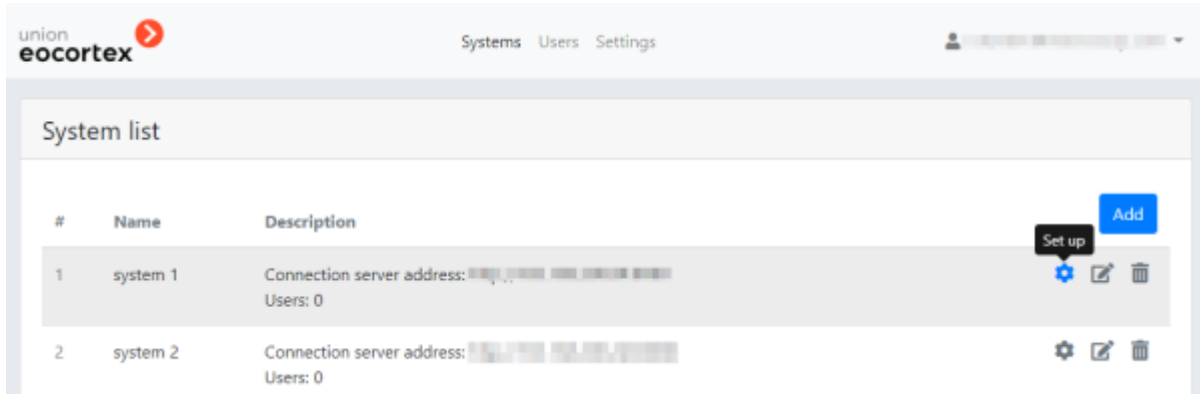


To change the system administrator password, it is required to click on the **Change password** button. After that, the **Administrator password** field will become available for editing.

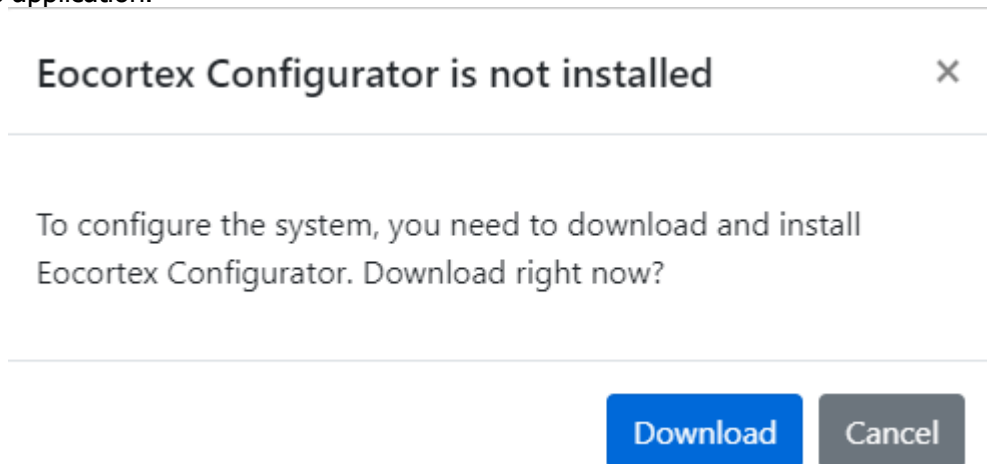
To configure the system, it is required to click on the **Setup**  button located to the right of the name of the system to be configured in the list of systems on the **Systems** tab.

The **Setup**  button is available only when logging into the administrator personal area from a computer with the Windows operating system.




This will launch the **Eocortex Configurator** application that will automatically connect to the selected system.

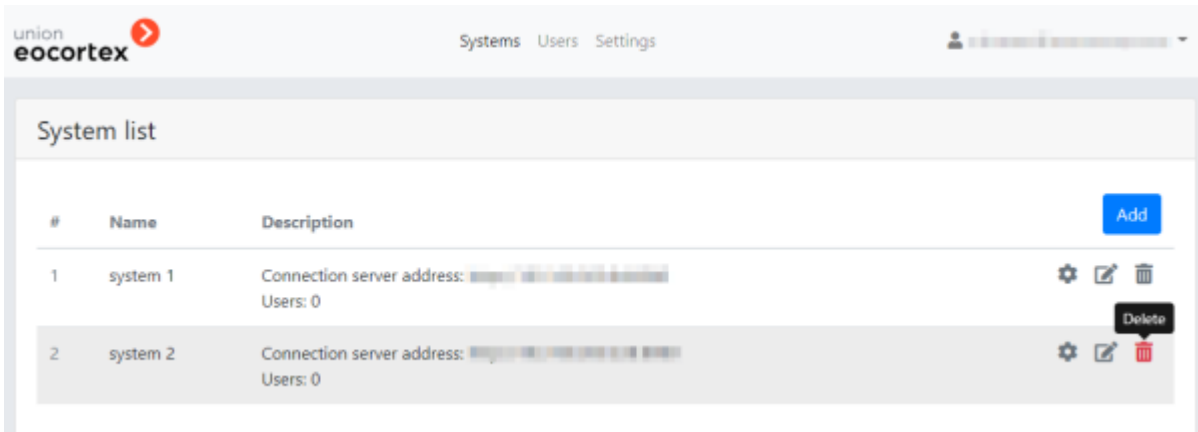
If the **Eocortex Configurator** is not installed on the computer that the administrator used to log into their personal area, a form will open offering to download and install this application.



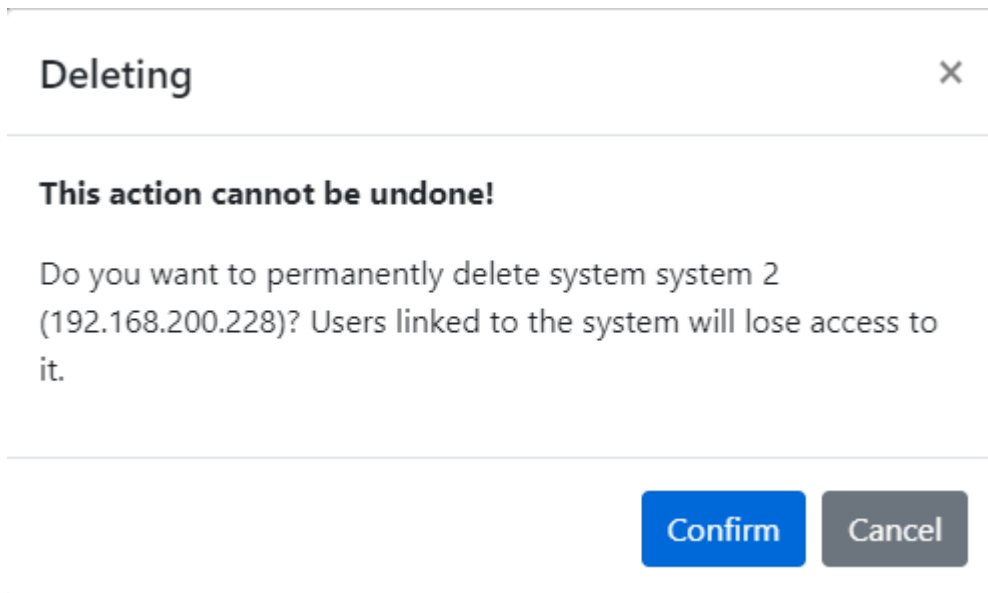
Removing a system

Removing a system from **Eocortex Union** does not stop this system's operation. After such removal, the system will become unavailable for **Eocortex Union** users and will continue to function as an autonomous **Eocortex** system.

To remove a system from **Eocortex Union**, it is required to go to the **Systems** tab and in the list of systems click on the **Remove**  button located to the right of the system to be removed.



The following warning window will open:



After clicking on the **Confirm** button, an attempt will be made to remove the system from **Eocortex Union**.

If, at the time of removal, the system connection server is available for **Eocortex Union**, this system will be safely removed from **Eocortex Union**. In this case, all users bound to the system will lose access to it.

If the system connection server is unavailable for **Eocortex Union** at the time of removal, the following window will open:

By clicking on the **Insecure Removal** button, the system will be removed from **Eocortex Union**, but the remote **Eocortex** system will not be informed of such removal. As a result, previously added **Eocortex Union** users may remain in the system configuration.

The unsafe removal may only be used in exceptional cases when it is impossible to restore access to the system. In other situations, it is recommended to restore access to the system connection server and try to remove the system again.

Restriction on unifying the connected system

It is recommended to avoid unifying two systems already connected to **Eocortex Union**, since the information about all **Eocortex Union** users will be removed from the configuration of the system being connected, but in the personal area of the **Eocortex Union** administrator each of these users will be considered bound to the old system.

To avoid this conflict, it is required to remove the system being connected from **Eocortex Union** before unifying.

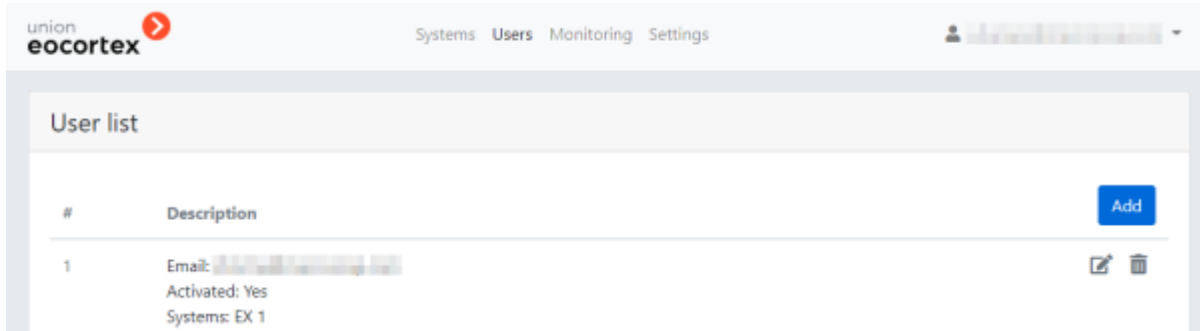
In a situation where two systems have been unified disregarding the recommendations, the old system should be removed from **Eocortex Union** using the unsafe removal.

Users

In **Eocortex Union**, only the **Administrator Personal Area** can be used to manage users in the systems.

Adding a user

To add a **Eocortex Union** user to the system, it is required to click on the **Add** button on the **Users** tab in the **Administrator Personal Area**.



The **Add User** page will open, where it will be required to set the following parameters:

1. An email address of the **Eocortex Union** user.
2. A group whose cameras are available to the user in the system connected to **Eocortex Union** (the system is unavailable or does not respond).
3. A group whose cameras are available to the user in the system connected to **Eocortex Union** (the system is unavailable).


When specifying a group in a system connected to **Eocortex Union**, the user is added to the specified group in the given system and obtains all the rights of this group.

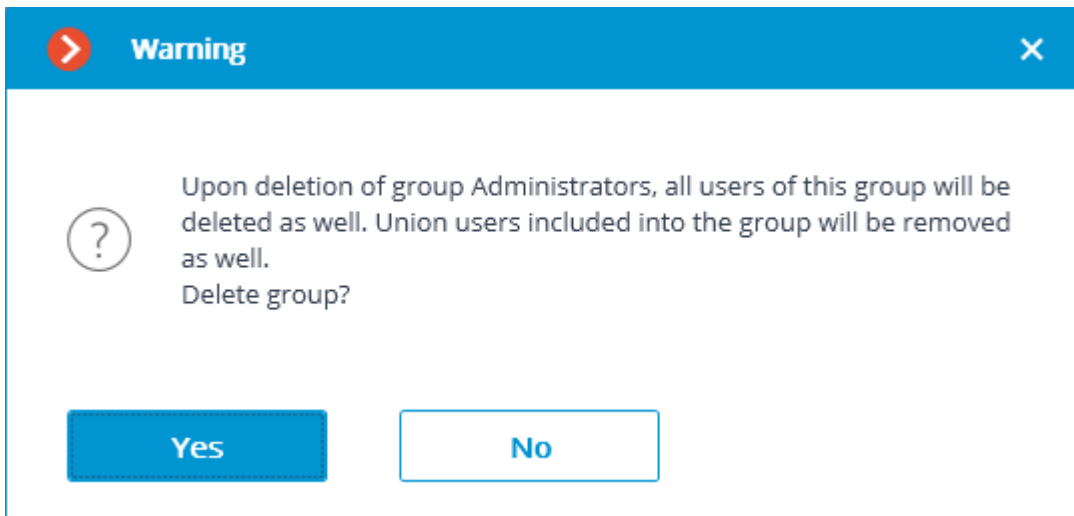

Client side of Eocortex Union

The **Eocortex Union client** side includes the Administrator Personal Area and User Area, as well as the **Eocortex Union Web Client** and **Eocortex Union Client**, available in the user area.

User area

The user area is located at the **Eocortex Union** address. To enter the user area, the user must log in.

In the **Eocortex Client** application, the video wall, internal chat, password modification, and the right to fetch the **Eocortex Configurator** application are not available for a **Eocortex Union** user.

When working with Face Recognition and license plate recognition modules, the user of **Eocortex Union** can choose the database to be used.

Event log

The **Event log** displays events from all available systems.

The filter Initiators allows to filter events depending on who initiated them - **Eocortex** users or **Eocortex Union** users.

Face Recognition and license plate recognition

When working with Face Recognition and license plate recognition modules, the **Eocortex Union** user has access to the databases of these modules in all systems. However, it is only possible to work with one of these databases at a time.

The user can select a database in the upper part of the window for working with the database, or in the filter panel on the reports page.

If the database is available for one of the systems only, the selection of the database will be unavailable.

In case one remote database is used for all systems, the choice of database will be available in the **Eocortex Client** application, but it will be the same database.

The rules for creating the database name are as follows:

{system_name}_{server_name}_{database_id (optional)}.

When a database is selected from the list, all data is updated, and all the filters on the reports page are reset.

Connection in proxy mode

Eocortex Union may have different connection servers for different systems.

When connecting to **Eocortex Union** for the first time, the option **Connection in proxy mode** is enabled by default.

Web Client of Eocortex Union

To launch the **Eocortex Union Web Client** application, it is required to click the button Go to viewing in the user area.

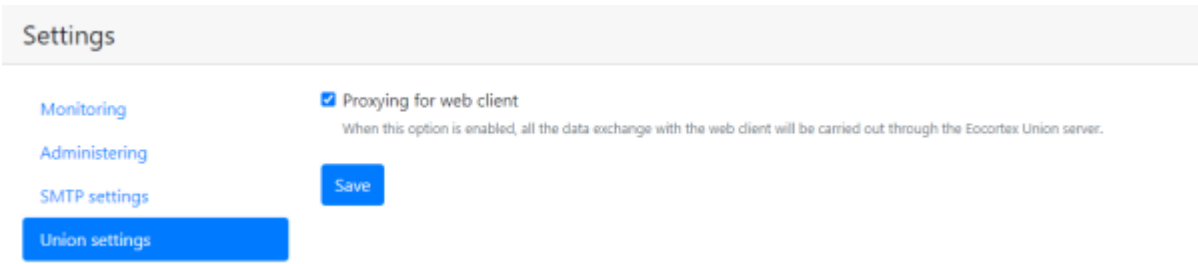

Configuring Eocortex Union services

The settings of **Eocortex Union** services can be found on the **Settings** page in the administrator personal area.

General Settings of Union

There is only one option in the **Settings** page on the **Union Settings** tab of the administrator personal area: **Proxying for web client**.



Since systems can be connected to **Eocortex Union** using different protocols (HTTP and HTTPS), and browser protection does not allow HTTP connections to systems using untrusted certificates and HTTPS, the user may encounter issues when working in the **Eocortex Union Web Client** application.

Such problems can be resolved using one of the following methods:

METHOD 1

Connecting all systems to **Eocortex Union** via HTTPS with trusted certificates and connecting using the web client via HTTPS. In this case, the option **Proxying for web client** must be disabled.

This is a safe option.

This solution does not put load on **Eocortex Union**.

METHOD 2

Enabling the option **Proxying for web client**. The way the systems are connected to **Eocortex Union** does not matter.

This is a safe option.

This solution does put load on **Eocortex Union**.

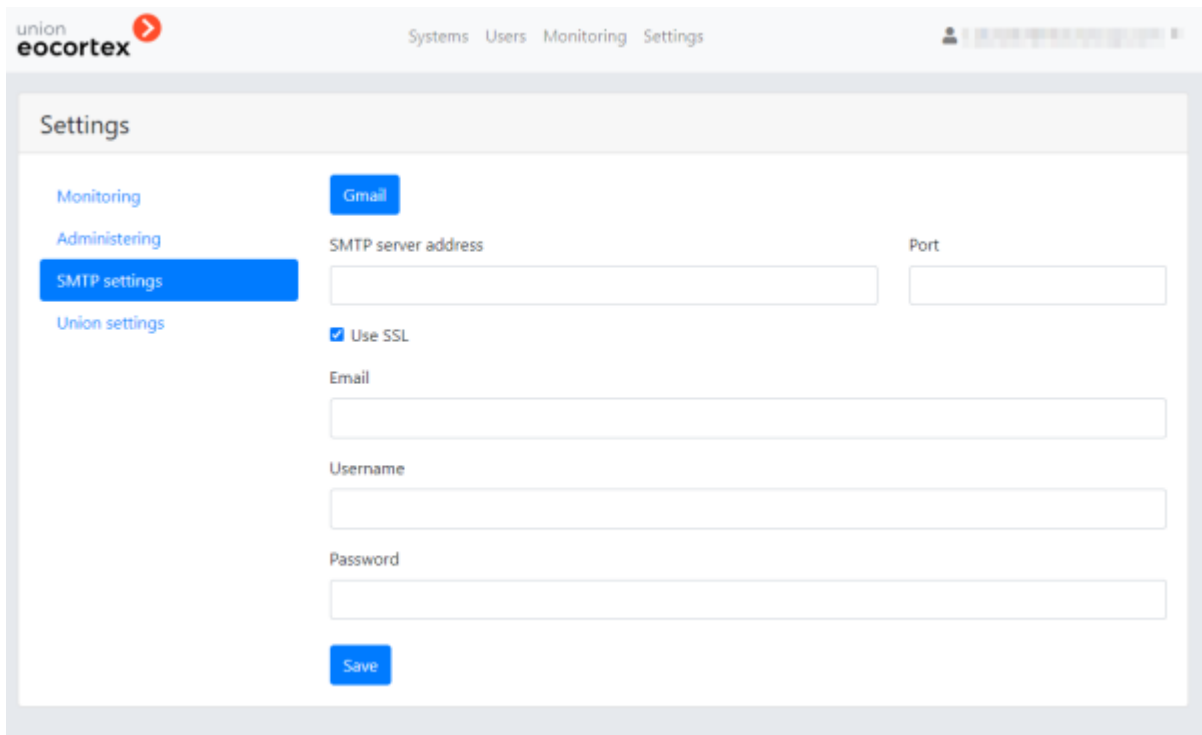
METHOD 3

Connecting all systems to **Eocortex Union** via HTTP and connecting using the web client via HTTP. It does not matter whether the option **Proxying for web client** is enabled or not, since it will not be used.

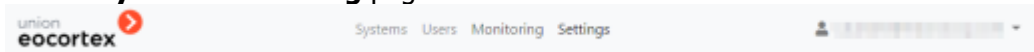

Eocortex System Monitoring is available from the administrator personal area on the **Eocortex System Monitoring** page.

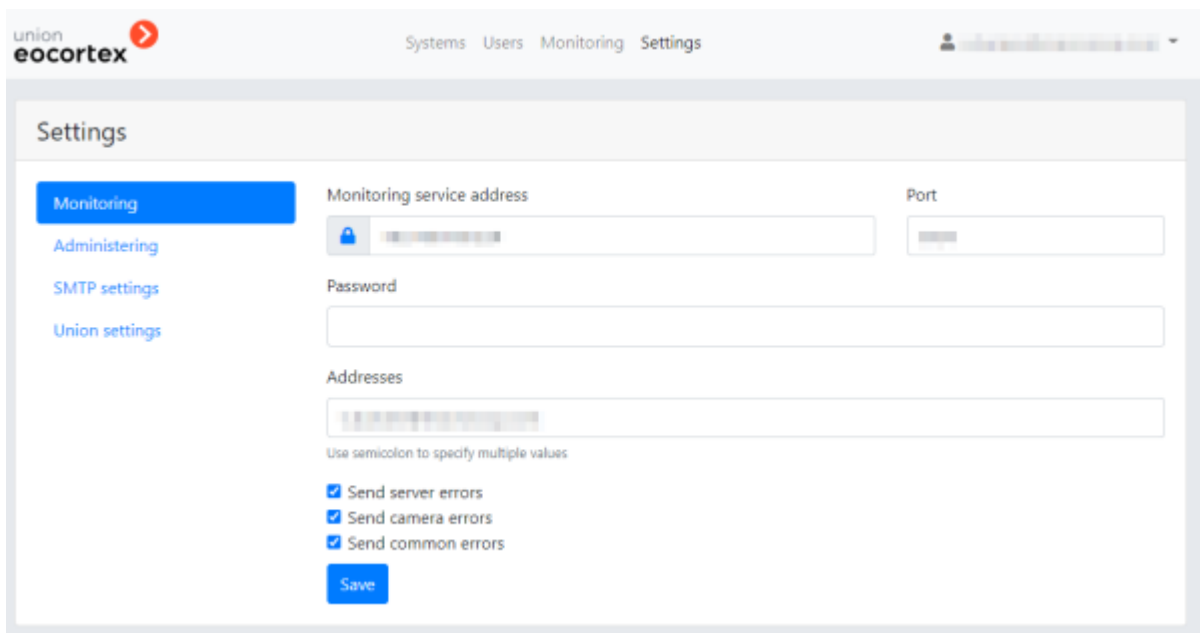


In systems connected to **Eocortex Union**, **Eocortex System Monitoring** is automatically enabled with **Eocortex Union** settings.

If the system being connected already has its own settings for **Eocortex System Monitoring**, then, when connected to **Eocortex Union**, a prompt to change them to the settings common for all the connected systems will appear. In case of failure, the Eocortex System Monitoring service of this system will not be connected to **Eocortex Union** and will remain with its own settings.

Connection and configuration of Eocortex System Monitoring

Configuring **Eocortex System Monitoring**, as well as connecting the **Eocortex System Monitoring** service to **Eocortex Union** deployed on another server, is carried out in the administrator personal area, on the **Settings** page of the **Eocortex System Monitoring** settings tab.



Settings:

- **Monitoring service address** (by default, **address_union**).
- **Port** (by default, 8891).

- **Password** (by default, blank).
- **List of recipients** to whom all monitoring notifications will be sent (by default, the notifications are sent to the **Eocortex Union**, administrator, if their email is indicated).
- **Error notifications:**
 - **Send server errors**
 - **Send camera errors**
 - **Send general errors**

Using own SMTP server

To use own SMTP server, in addition to changing the settings in the administrator personal area, it is possible to create or edit the file **MailSettings.json** in the folder **/opt/eocortex-union/service/Setting** folder of the **Eocortex Union** service.

The fields **Email** and **UserName** may or may not match, depending on the settings of the SMTP server.

Eocortex Union network settings

By default, **Eocortex Union** service has a number of following restrictions on interaction with other services connected to **Eocortex Union**, including **Eocortex** servers and **Eocortex System Monitoring** service:

- maximum request execution time (RequestTimeoutInSecodns): 3 seconds
- number of repeated attempts to execute requests (MaxRetryCount): 3
- waiting time between repeated execution of requests (RetryTimeoutInSeconds): 1 second.

To change these settings, it is required to modify the value of the parameter **HttpConnectionSettings** in the file **appsettings.json**.

Should the requests to the server connected to **Eocortex Union** take longer than the specified time, **Eocortex Union**, based on the current settings, will consider the system to be unavailable. To avoid this, it is required to modify the parameters; first of all, **RequestTimeoutInSeconds**, increasing the timeout of the response from the connected system.

Changing Eocortex Union port

By default, **Eocortex Union** uses the following ports:

- 80: http (nginx);
- 443: https (nginx);
- 5000: http (eocortex-union).

It is possible to change these ports

To change ports 80 and 443, it is required to do the following:

1. Open the service configuration file in nginx: **/etc/nginx/sites-available/eocortex-union.conf**
2. Change the ports in the following strings:

```
listen 80;
listen 443 ssl;
```

3. Restart nginx:

```
systemctl restart nginx
```

To change the port 5000, it is required to do the following:

1. Open the file of the service **/etc/systemd/system/eocortex-union.service**
2. Add the flag **--urls=http://0.0.0.0: 5001/**, where 5001 is the new port, to the key **ExecStart=** and to its value. The resulting string should look as follows:

```
ExecStart=/usr/bin/dotnet /opt/eocortex-
union/service/UnionService.dll --
--urls=http://0.0.0.0:5001/
```

3. Restart the service **systemctl daemon**

```
systemctl daemon-reload
```

4. Restart the service **eocortex-union**

```
systemctl restart eocortex-union
```

5. Open the configuration file of the service in **nginx/etc/nginx/sites-available/eocortex-union.conf**
6. Specify the desired port in the block **>location /api** in the string **proxy_pass http://localhost:5000;** The resulting string should look as follows:

```
location /api {
    proxy_pass http://localhost:5001;
```

7. Restart **nginx**

```
systemctl restart nginx
```

PostgreSQL password change

By default, when installing **Eocortex Union** for PostgreSQL, a password that can be viewed in the configuration file of the **eocortex-union** service **/opt/eocortex-union/service/appsettings.json** generated. The password is located in the **Password=** parameter in the following string:

```
"ConnectionStrings": {
  "DbConnection":
    "Host=127.0.0.1;Port=5432;Database=union_db;Username=union_user;Password=80b8eb0a-
cc2e-499c-a500-d695eb3a0b6b;"
}
```

To change the password, it is required to do the following:

1. Enter the console as the user **postgres**:

```
cd /
su postgres
```

2. Change the password, specifying a new password instead of newpassword

```
psql -c "ALTER USER union_user WITH PASSWORD 'newpassword';"
```

3. Change the password in the configuration file of the service **/opt/eocortex-union/service/appsettings.json**. Specify a new password in the value **Password=**:

```

```

}
```

4. Restart the service eocortex-union:

```
systemctl restart eocortex-union
```

Installing own SSL certificate

By default, a self-signed SSL certificate is generated when installing **Eocortex Union**. To replace it with own SSL certificate, it is required to proceed as follows:

1. Open the service configuration file in nginx `/etc/nginx/sites-available/eocortex-union.conf`;
2. Find the following lines and change the paths to the files of own SSL certificates and a private key:

```
ssl_certificate /etc/ssl/certs/eocortex-union.cert.pem;  
ssl_certificate_key /etc/ssl/private/eocortex-union.key.pem;
```

3. Restart nginx:

```
systemctl restart nginx
```

The certificate and the key must be changed in two places, for configuring the eocortex-union SSL service and for configuring the monitoring server located on port 8191 by default.

Domain name change

To change the address or domain of the server that were entered during installation, it is required to do the following:

1. Open the service configuration file `/opt/eocortex-union/service/appsettings.json`;
2. Find the key `HostUrl` and modify its value:

Episode archive

Keep important fragments of the archive without worrying that they will be deleted or overwritten using **Episode archive**.



This feature is available only for **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses.

Description

The system automatically deletes video fragments in the main archive without notification in the following cases:

If the free disk space is not enough to write new data. The oldest recordings in such case will be overwritten with new ones.

If the maximum fragment storage period set in settings is exceeded.

If certain archive fragments must be kept unchanged for longer than allowed by the system, transfer them from the main archive to the **Episode archive**.

Episode archive:

stores only video and sound without associated events.

allows storing data without time limits.

works as a separate application and requires a separate installation.

Requirements and limitations

The **Episode archive** Service is a standalone application and must be installed individually.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

The **Episode archive** Service can be used simultaneously with the **Long-term database** Service, but they do not communicate with each other.

Episodes are added to the **Episode archive** Service database by system users and can only be added manually.

Eocortex version 3.6 uses an additional service called **Episode Archive Agent** to connect servers to the Service. The Agent installs automatically during **Eocortex** Server deployment. In case of problems with saving episodes in the Service database, it is recommended to check the status of this service.

Name of the Agent depending on the operating system:

- Windows: EocortexArchiveEpisodesAgent
- Linux: eocortexarchiveepisodesagent.service

Starting with version 4.0, **Eocortex** servers connect to the Service directly without using the **Agent**.

Episodes stored in the Service database are bound to channels in the system configuration for access rights delimitation purposes. If a channel is deleted from the configuration or turned off in the **Eocortex Configurator** application, episodes associated with it will not be available for interactions. If it is necessary to delete a channel from the system, it is recommended to delete all episodes from the Service database beforehand.

Physical replacement of the camera within the existing channel, its transfer to another position or to another server within a multiserver system does not affect the availability of episodes.

If a channel has been turned off or deleted without prior deletion of saved episodes, they can be accessed by turning the channel on or restoring it from the settings backup.

Only one disk can be selected to store episodes in the Service database at a time.

The Service does not support network drives for storing episodes.

Episode archive is not available for the **Eocortex Client** application connected via **Eocortex Cloud** or **Eocortex Union**.

Storage disk settings

Configuration can be made in a separate window that opens by clicking the **Configure** link on the **Services** tab.

The **Hosting the episode archive** window contains settings for selecting a drive to store the content of the Service.

Disks are selected for the device on which the Service is installed.



Only one disk can be selected to store episodes in the Service database at a time. The minimum disk space allocated for the Service should be at least 1,000 MB. The Service does not support network drives for storing episodes.

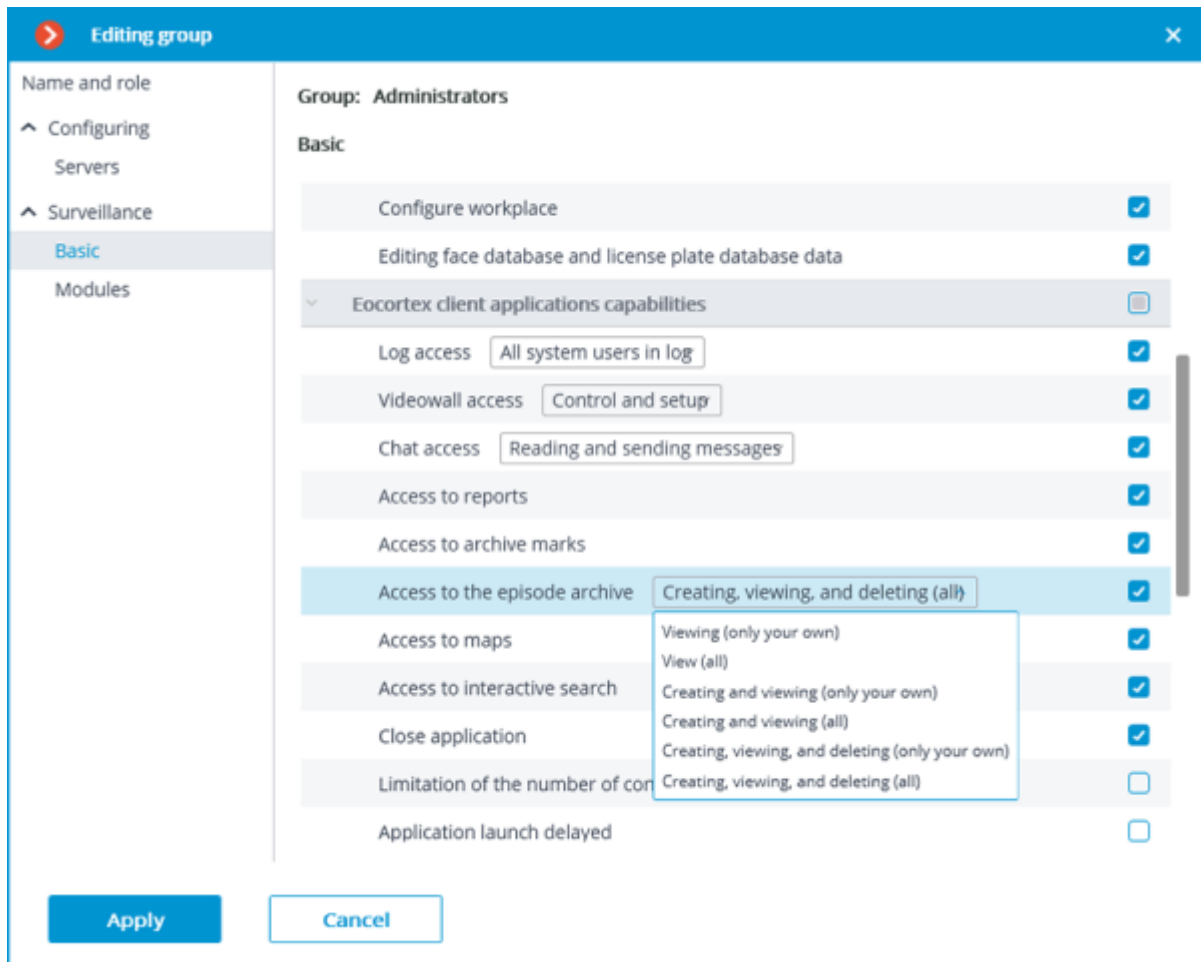

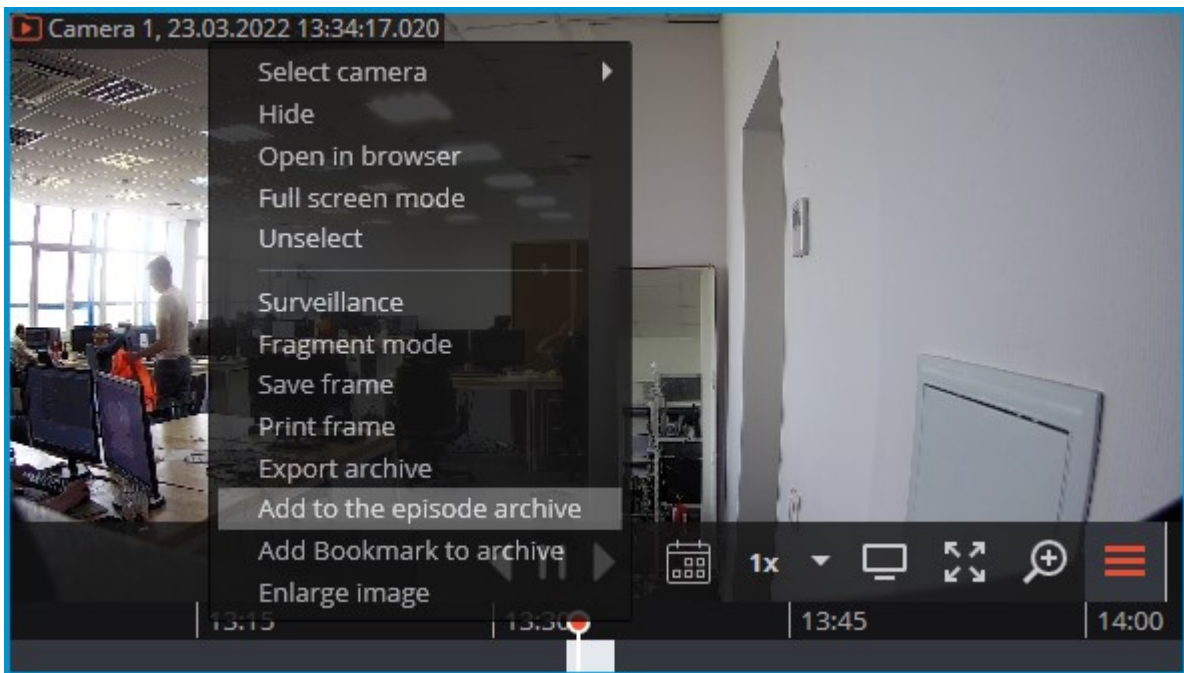

To create an archive episode, switch the camera cell to [the viewing the single camera archive mode](#) in the **Eocortex Client** application and select the **Add to the episode archive** item in the context menu.



In the window that opens, it is needed to:

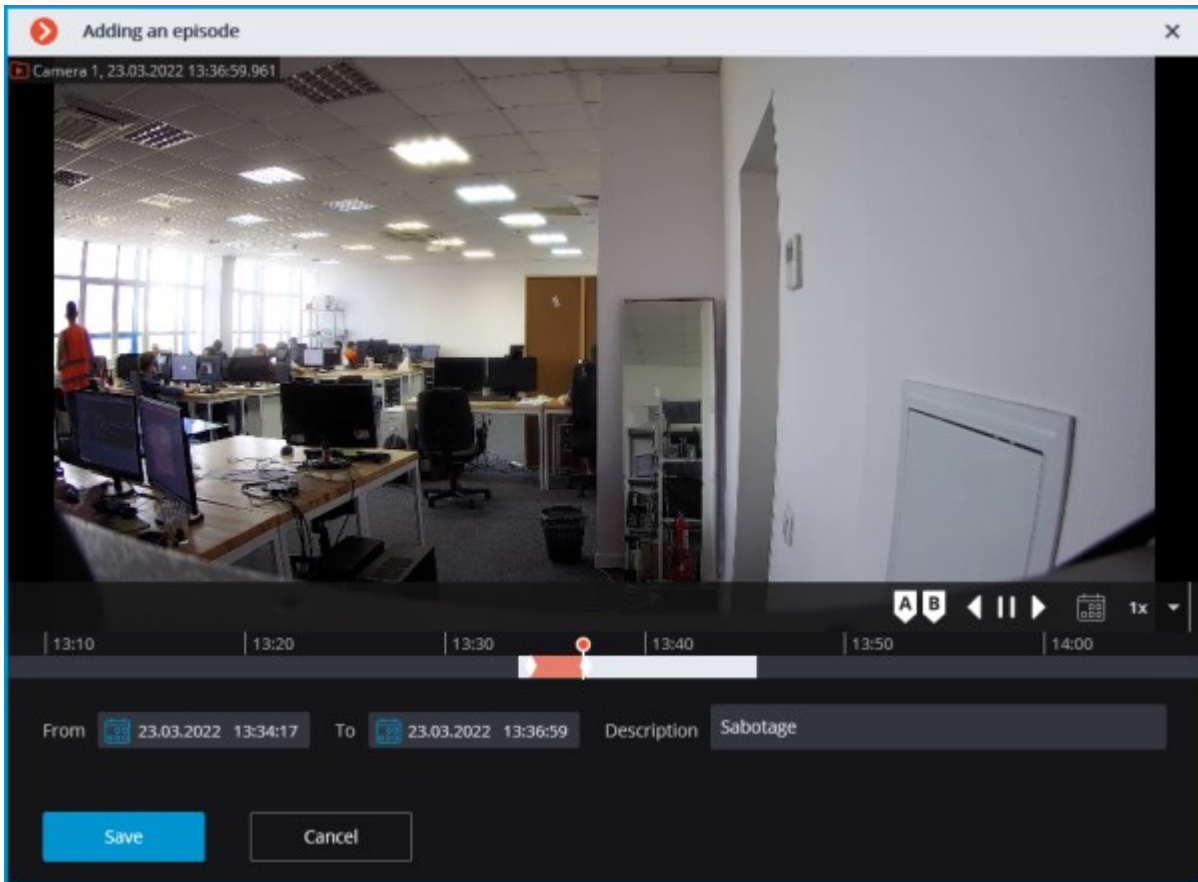
select the fragment of the main archive to create the archive episode with one of the following options:

- using markers on the timeline;

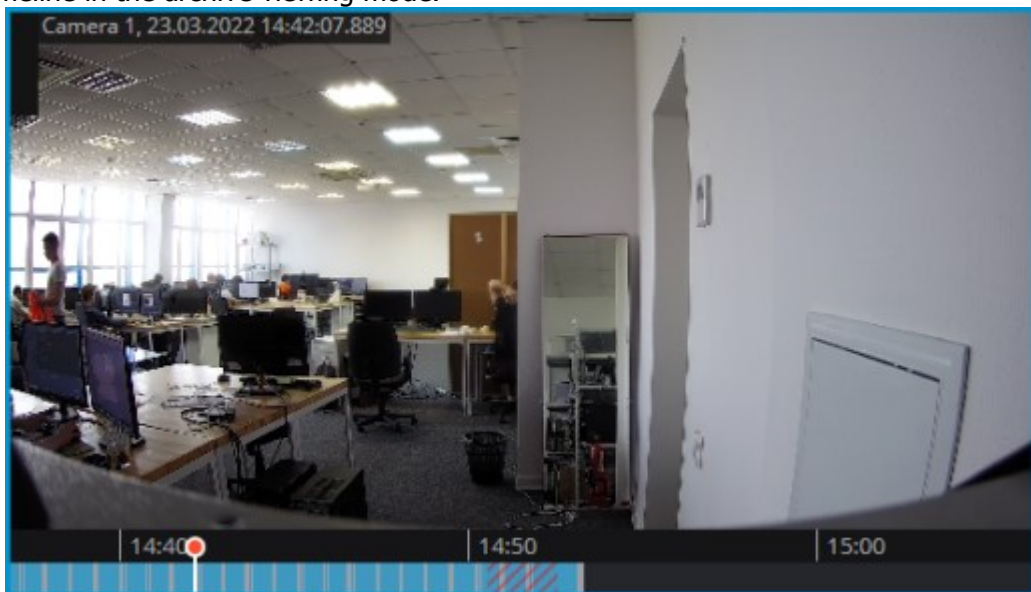

The description and period of a fragment cannot be changed after saving the episode from the archive.



Successfully added archive episodes for the selected camera are displayed on the timeline in the archive viewing mode.



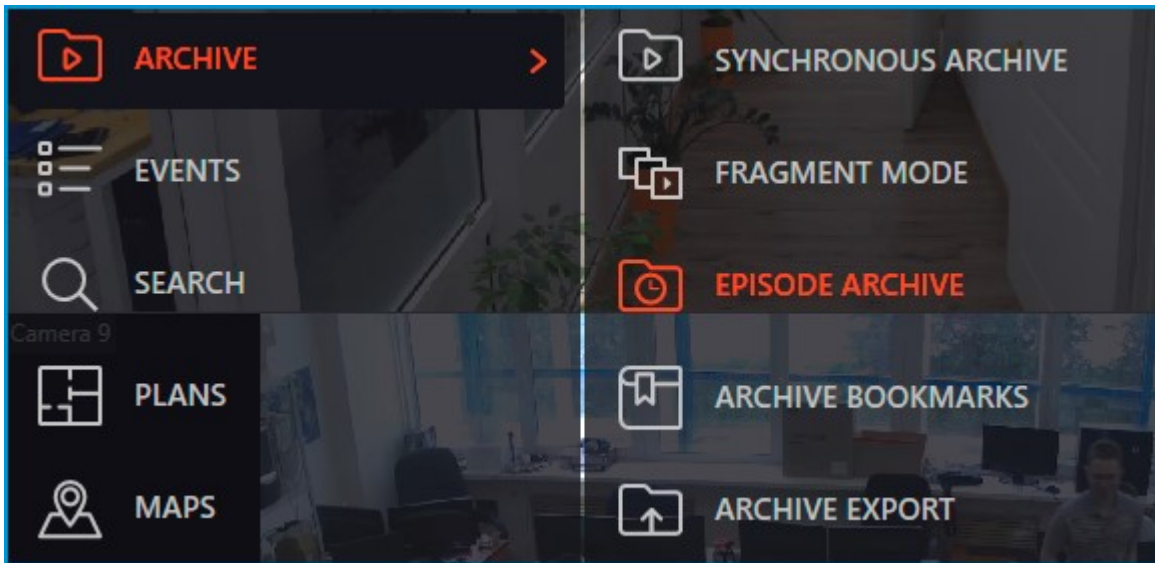

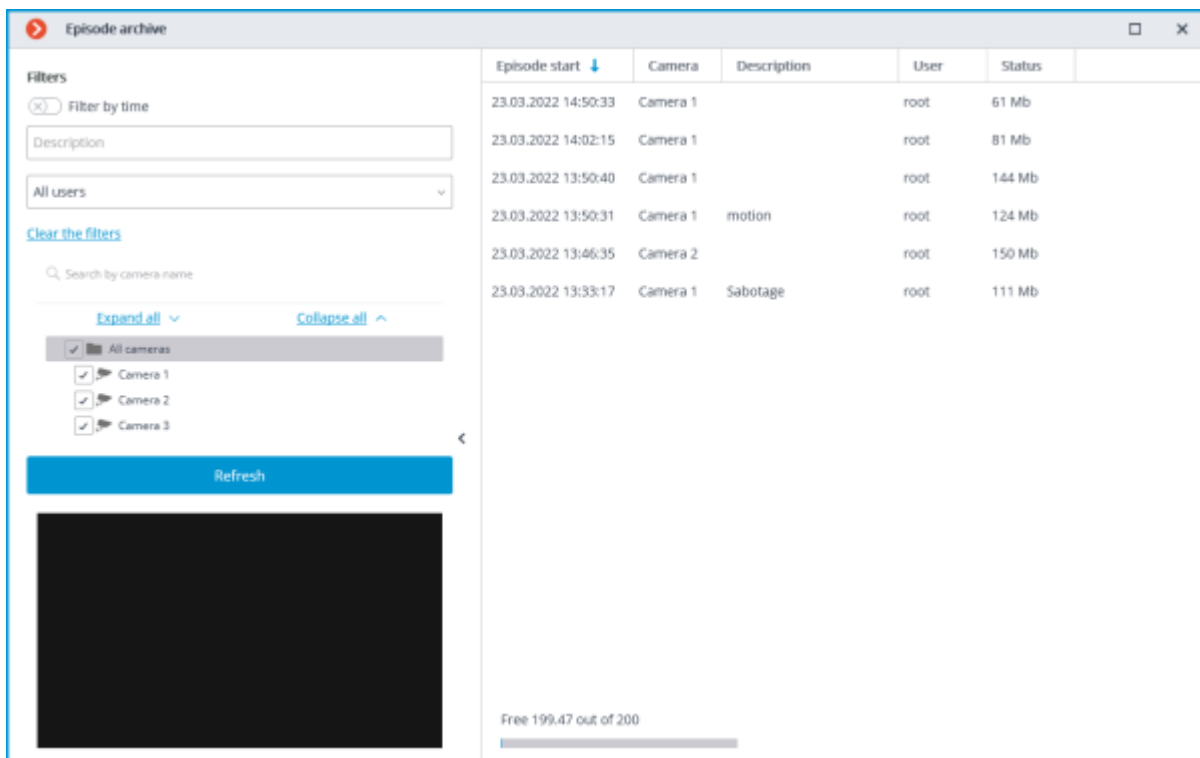

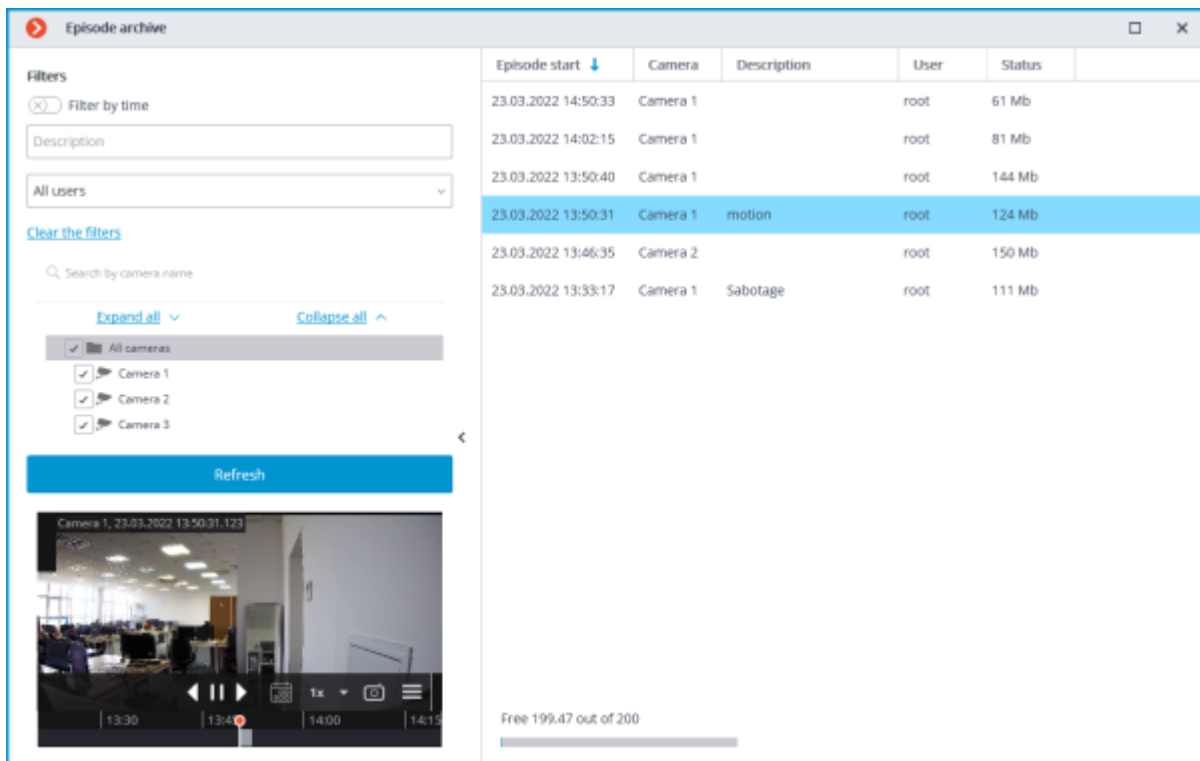

Long-term database

Store the events of selected categories in a dedicated **Long-term database** Service database without concern that they will be wiped out if the archive is deleted or overwritten.

Description

The events stored in the main database of the **Eocortex** server are limited by the archive records and exist as long as the archive for the time of the event exists. If the archive storage time has expired or the disk space for the archive recording has reached the limit, both the archive and the main database events associated with it will be deleted.

The **Long-term database** Service allows to:

Synchronize events of selected categories from the main databases and store them independently of the main database settings.

Set up an individual lifetime for each category of events.

Store full text information about the event in the same manner as in the main database.

For some event categories, store frames associated with the event.

Use events from the Service database when building most of the reports in the **Eocortex Client** application.

Main disk must be assigned in any case, duplicate and backup disks are assigned optionally. Events are recorded on the primary and backup disks all the time. The backup disk is to be used only when neither the primary nor the backup disk are available for recording. Events are being read simultaneously from all disks regardless of their role. Event duplicates are discarded from the display when reading disks. For example, if an event is detected on the Main disk, the same event from other disks will be discarded when displaying in the **Eocortex Client** application.

Events will not be synchronized between Service disks. For example, events recorded to the Backup disk while the Main disk was unavailable will not be transferred to it after recovery.

It is not recommended using for storage of the Service database disks that are already used for recording of the **Eocortex** archive. The archive can take up a large amount of disk memory and this may significantly reduce the number of events that can be saved to such disk. For correct Service work it is recommended to choose disks, which are not being used by other **Eocortex** applications for writing.

When applying the settings, the **Long-term database** Service checks the drives for the presence of archive records. If such records will be detected on the disk selected for storing the Service database, a window with the corresponding warning will open.



At this point it is possible to cancel applying the settings by clicking the **Cancel** button and return to the Service settings to select another disk, or start recording on the selected disks without changing the settings by clicking **Start recording**.

Event synchronization settings

Configuration can be made in a separate window that opens by clicking the **Configure** link on the **Services** tab.

The **Schedule** tab contains settings for event synchronization schedule between the databases of the Service and the **Eocortex** servers.

The synchronization schedule consists of the following settings:

Synchronization frequency, hours is how often the Service will synchronize events from the databases of servers.

Available intervals, hours: 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 12, 24.

Start time is the time of first data synchronization between the Service and servers.

Once the settings are applied, the server will perform the first synchronization with the **Long-term database** Service at the time specified in the **Start time** field, and then continue performing synchronization according to the specified interval.

First synchronization of events for each server happens according to its local time. If servers of the same system are located in different time zones, they will perform the first synchronization with the Service at the time corresponding to the specified hour in their time zone.

For example:

Server 1 is in UTC+3 and Server 2 is in UTC+10. The setting is made at 16:00 UTC+3. If the first synchronization time is set to 20:00, Server 1 will start synchronization on the same day when the setting was applied, when Server 2 will wait for the next day to start — for the UTC+10 time zone it will already be 23:00 at the moment of applying settings.

The **Eocortex** server synchronizes the settings with the **Long-term database** Service every 10 minutes. **Start time** should be at least 10 minutes later than the current time. If synchronization of the settings happens after the time specified as **Start time**, event synchronization will be postponed to the next day.

For example:

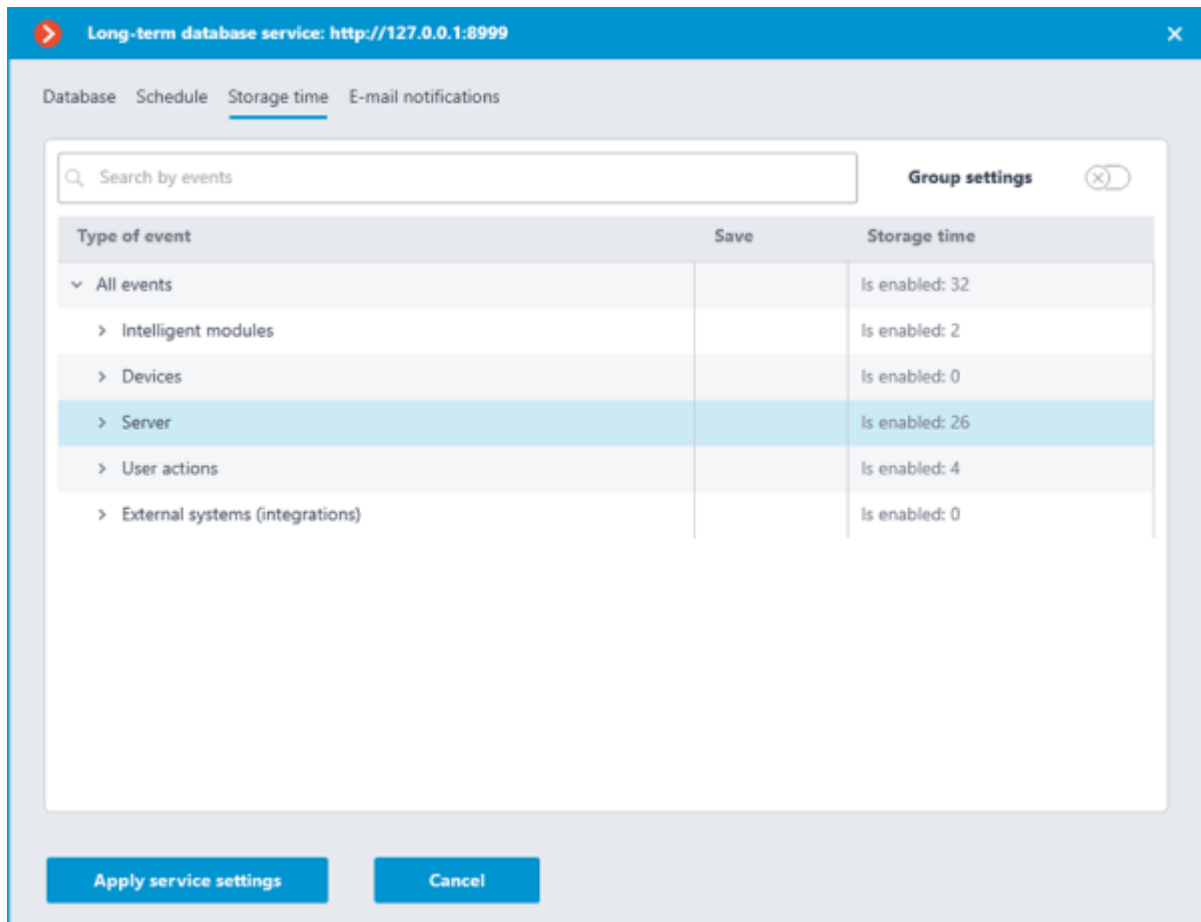
Service started at 14:40, the next synchronization of settings will be performed at 14:50. At 14:41 Service settings were changed, setting the first synchronization at 14:45. Synchronization will be performed at the specified time, but only on the next

day — the synchronization of settings occurred later than the specified time of event synchronization.

Event storage settings

Configuration can be made in a separate window that opens by clicking the **Configure** link on the **Services** tab.

The **Storage time** tab contains settings for selecting event types and time limits for storing them in the Service database.



This tab allows specifying the type of events to be stored in the **Long-term database** Service database, as well as the storage period for them.

Settings on the **Storage time** tab are represented as a table with the following columns:

Event type — the list of events available for synchronization with allocation by groups.

Whether an event group is collapsed or expanded in the **Event type** column determines the contents of the other columns.

Save — synchronization setting (enabled or disabled) for the selected event type.

The synchronization setting in the **Save** column is available only for individual event types. It is not possible to select in this column an entire group for saving — the space next to the group name will be empty.

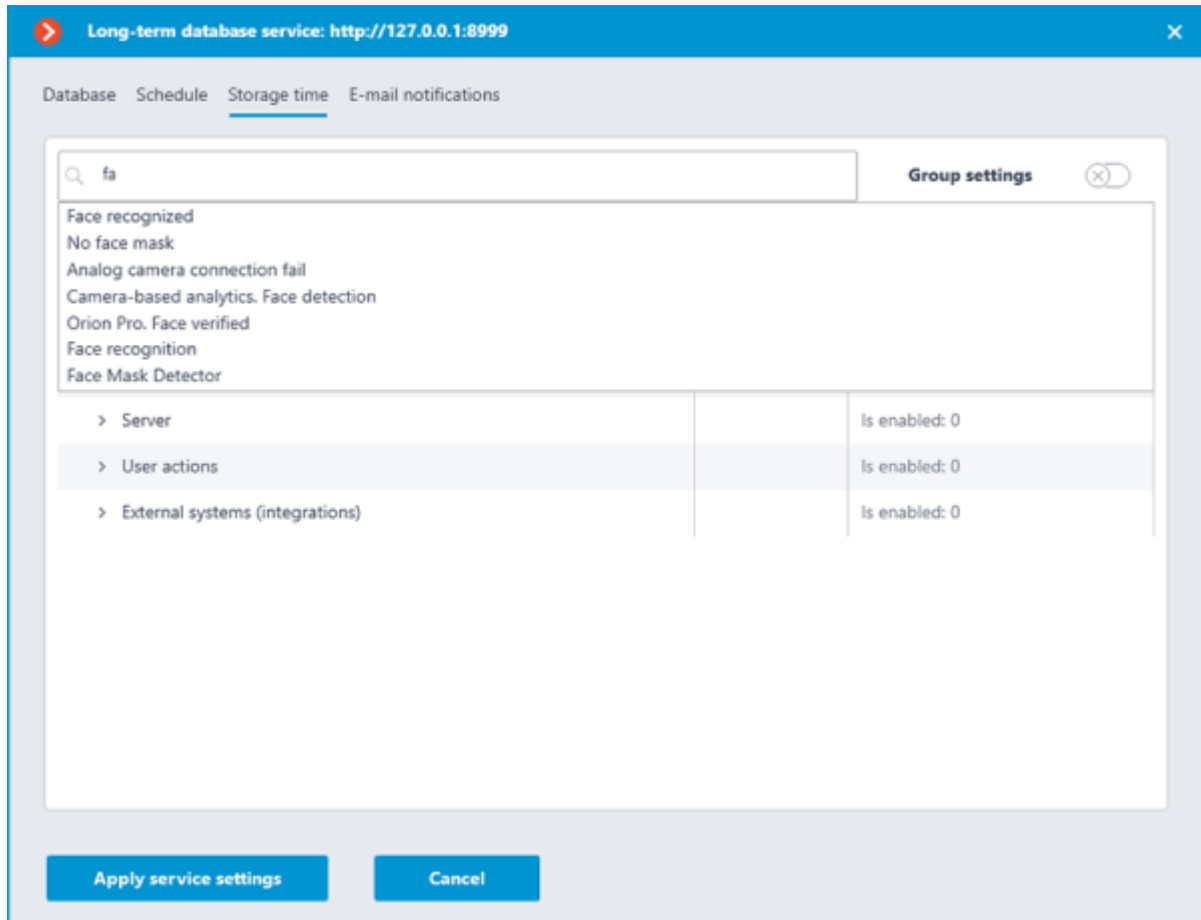
Storage time — the storage time of events of the selected type in the Service database.

The storage duration setting in this column is available only for individual event types. For a group of events, the number of event types enabled and configured for synchronization will be displayed at this position.

Storage time is set starting from the moment when the event was created in the **Eocortex** server database. So, for example, if the storage period is set as 1 week, the **Storage time** Service will delete the event from its database when it expires and will not synchronize it again even if the event will still exist in the **Eocortex** server database.

The maximum storage time of events in the **Storage time** Service database is 100 months.

For the convenience of configuration, there is the text search field available on the tab, allowing to quickly navigate to the needed type of events.



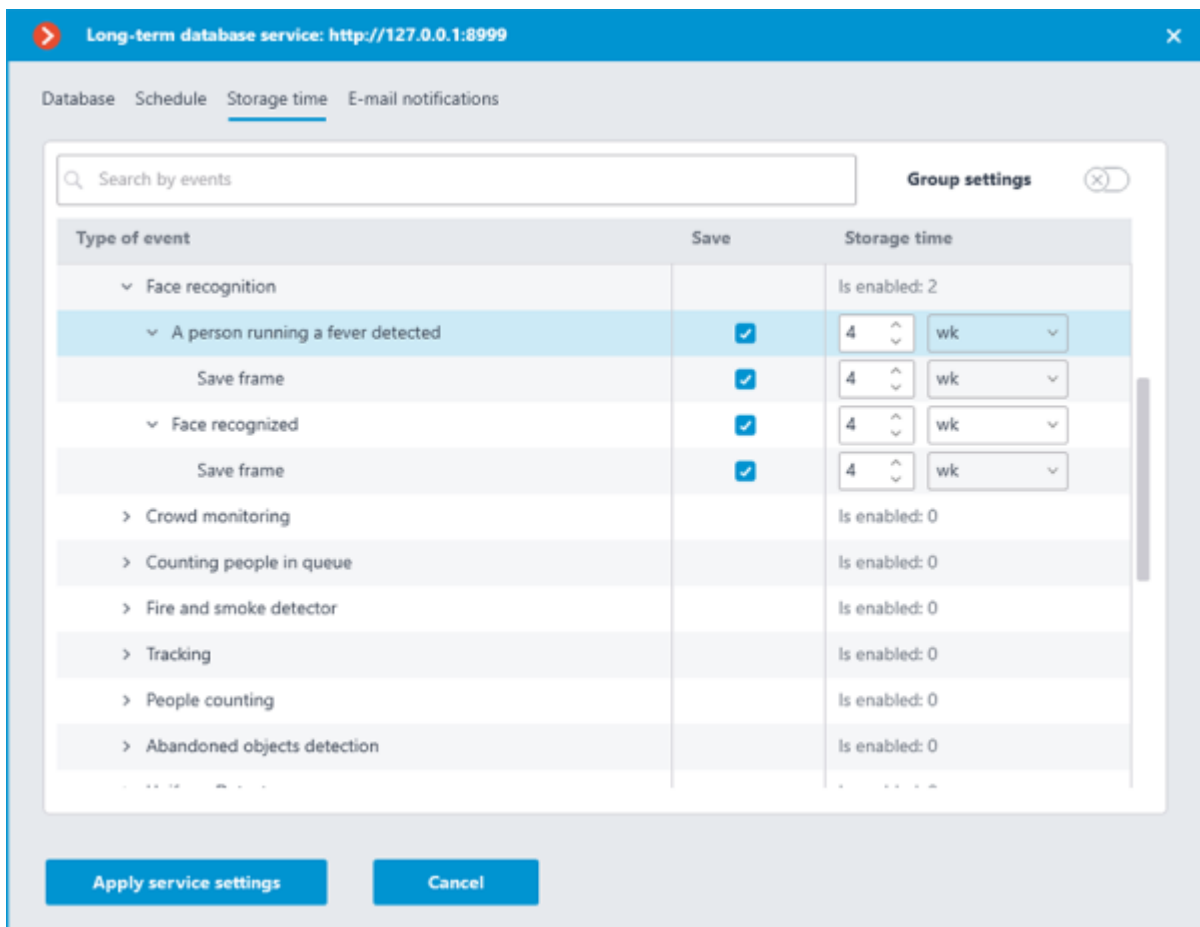
Storage time can be set in one of the two available modes:

Individual setting

The individual setting is the default mode, which allows selecting the wanted types of events to be stored and setting individual storage time for each of them.



To set up event storage in the individual setting mode, follow these steps:

Find the needed event type in the **Save** column by using the search field or manually, by expanding the event groups.

Enable storing events of the selected type in the **Save** column.

If the selected event type has the option of saving a frame associated with the event, this option will be automatically enabled when the event type is selected. It can be deactivated in the same **Save** column.

Frame storage relies on the event being stored, so it is not possible to choose to store a frame without storing the event.

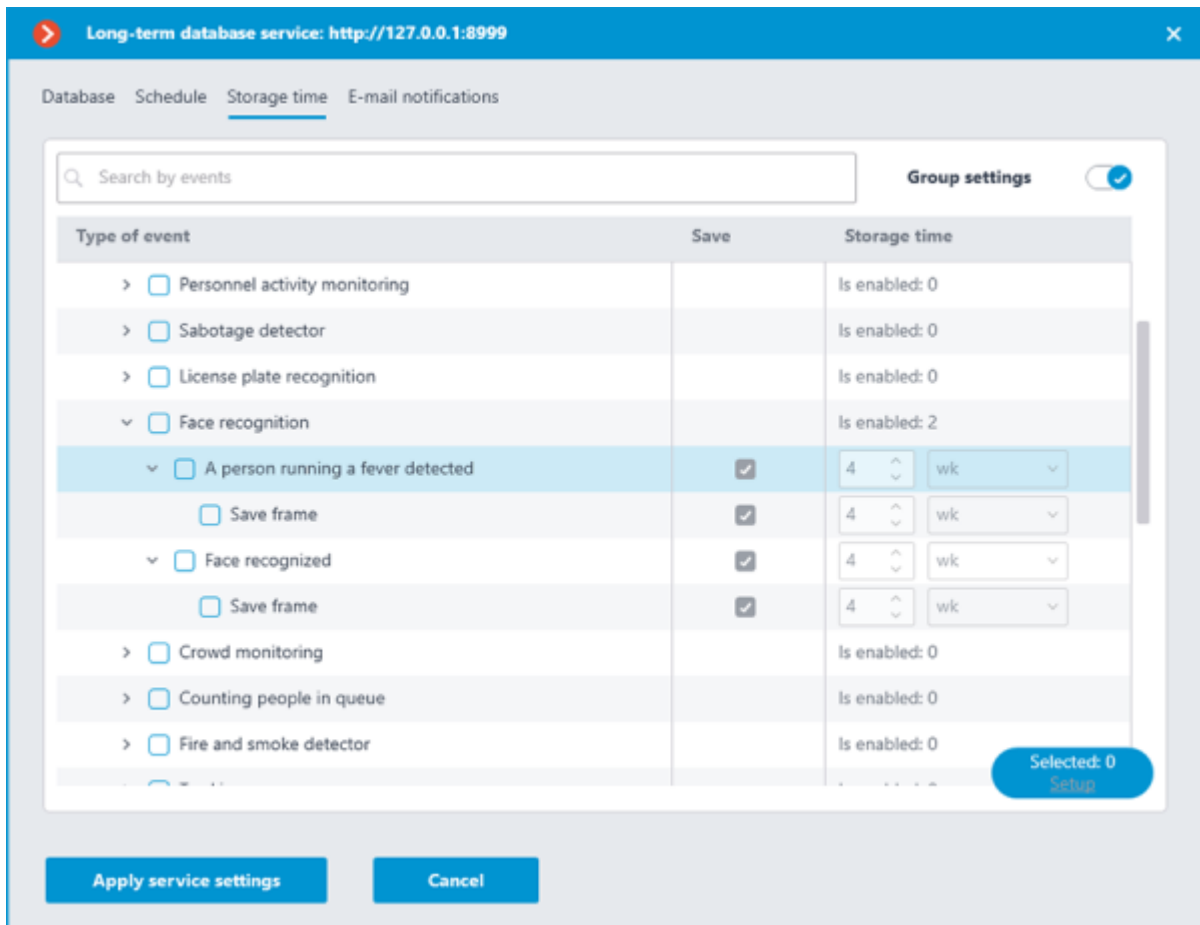
Specify the storage time for events of the selected type in the **Long-term database** Service database.

If the **Save frame** option is available and enabled for the event, it is also possible to set an individual storage time for the saved frames.

Storage time of a frame cannot exceed the storage time of the event to which it belongs.

Group settings

Group settings is an additional mode that allows setting the same storage time for multiple event types simultaneously.



This mode can be activated by clicking the  **Group settings** switch in the upper right corner of the tab.

When this setting mode is enabled, the configuration window changes: settings in the **Save** and **Storage time** columns are locked, in the **Event type** column checkboxes for selection of event types appear to the left of their names, and in the lower right corner the **Configure** button appears for configuring the selected event types.

To configure event storage in Group settings mode, follow these steps:

Enable the Group settings mode with the  switch in the upper right corner.

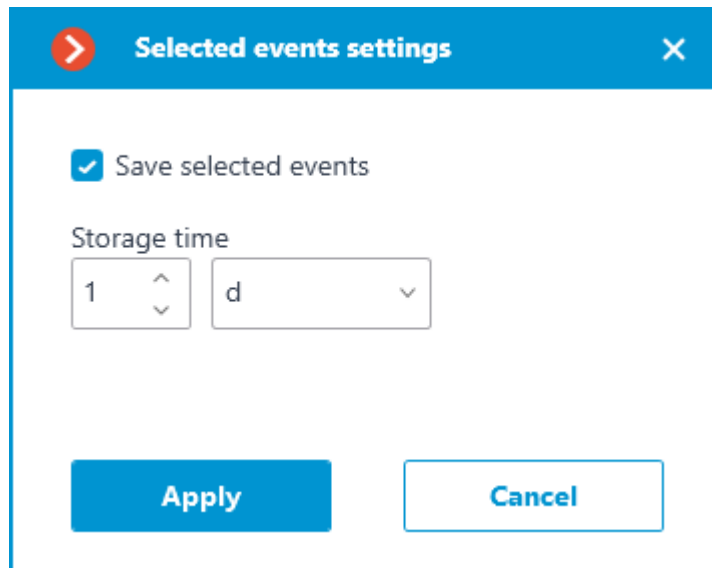
Use the checkboxes in the **Event type** column to select the needed event types.

It is possible to select not only individual event types, but also entire groups, including the **All events** root group.

If frame storage is available for the event, this option is also will be flagged as selected.

Click the **Configure** button in the lower right corner.

In the **Selected events settings** window, set the event storage time.



When configured as a group, the same storage time is set for all selected events.

The **Save selected events** option allows to quickly enable or disable storage of selected event types. This can be useful if it is necessary to override storage settings for multiple event types. This option is enabled by default.

Apply settings.

If it is necessary to customize any of the event types, the Group settings mode can be disabled with the same switch in the upper right corner.

Email notifications settings

Configuration can be made in a separate window that opens by clicking the **Configure** link on the **Services** tab.

The **Long-term database** service has the ability to notify a user about encountered problems using email.

The **E-mail of the recipient** section allows specifying one or more recipients of the notification by separating the addresses from each other with a comma, semicolon or adding a new line for each recipient.

The **Notification types** section allows specifying the types of notifications that the Service should send to the recipients. The following notification types are supported:

Free disk space limit is reached — will be sent when one or more disks used by the Service have a percentage of free space less than the specified.

Possible service malfunction — will be sent when the Service has failed to save events to disk. Possible causes of the error:

- The disk has run out of space to write.
- PostgreSQL failed to add a record to the database. The database file may be corrupted.
- Other recording problems have occurred.

Details about the error can be found in the Service logs. It is also recommended attaching them to the message in case of contacting [technical support](#).

Access settings

The **Long-term database** Service does not imply additional settings limiting user access to the stored content. If a user is allowed to access a camera, it will also have access to the events for that camera stored in the Service database.

Service usage



The **Long-term database** Service ensures storing of selected types of events and access to them regardless of the archive storage settings. With this Service there is no need to be concerned that event data will be erased if the archive is deleted.


Records stored in the **Long-term database** Service can be used to build reports of video analytics modules and view the Events Log. Such records:

- Do not require additional settings from the user to be displayed.
- Displayed seamlessly to records from the databases of **Eocortex** servers.
- Marked with the  icon to determine whether the event belongs to the Service base.

Events from the **Long-term database** Service database can be displayed in the Events Log of the **Eocortex Client** application.

Records retrieved from the database of the Service are additionally marked with the  icon next to the date and time the event was created, which allows to identify their source.

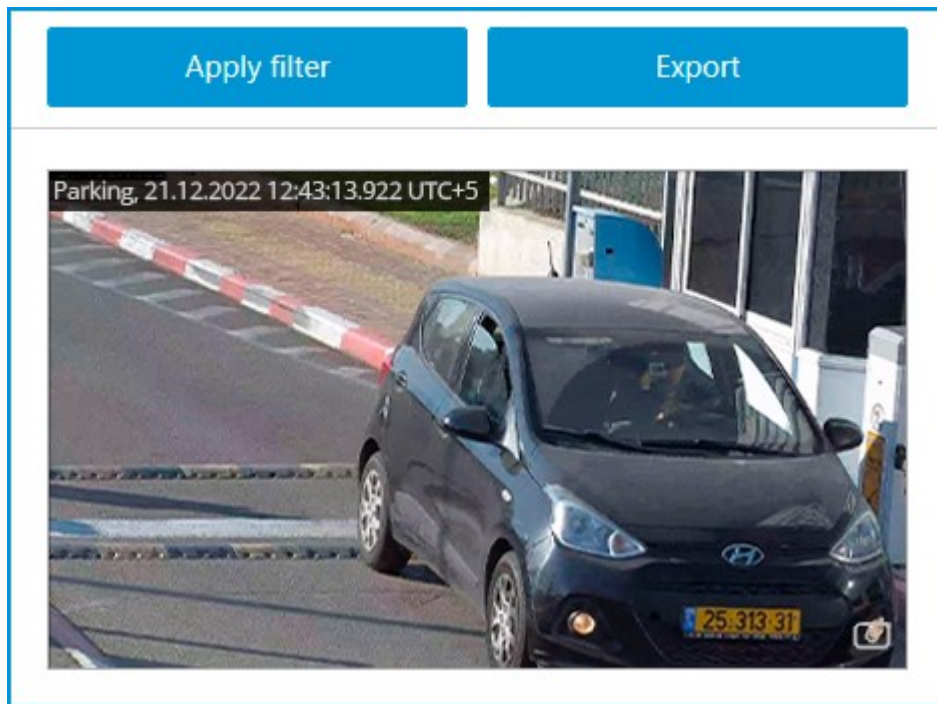
When displaying the Events Log, the **Eocortex Client** application gives priority to events from the servers' databases, loading records from the Service database only if the event does not exist in the own database of the **Eocortex** server.

The described logic prevents duplication of events when viewing the Events Log in the **Eocortex Client** application, at the same time allowing to view events outside the archive available on the server.

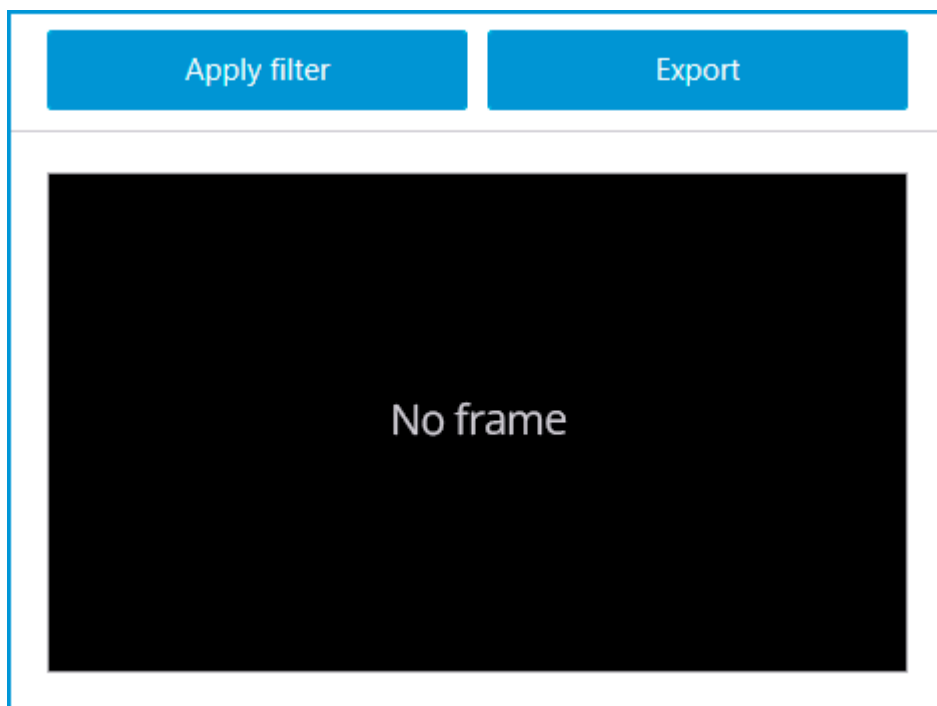
For certain types of events, the Service allows storing not only the events themselves, but also the frames associated with them.


At version 4.1, displaying of frames in the Events Log is available only for the **Recognized license plates** event type.

If an event has the option of saving an associated frame, it will be displayed in the preview window in the lower right corner when highlighting the event in the Events log.



Otherwise, the preview window will display the **No frame** message.



The retrieved frame can be displayed in full screen mode by double-clicking on it, or it can be saved to the device by clicking the  button in the lower right corner of the preview cell.








Events from the **Long-term database** Service database can be used to build reports in the **Eocortex Client** application.


When building reports of video analytics modules, the **Eocortex Client** application primarily uses records from the database of the server. Events are loaded from the Service database only if there are no events for the specified period in own databases of **Eocortex** servers.

The described logic prevents the possibility of multiple counting of the same event, while allowing to build reports for periods outside the existing archive.

For certain types of events the Service allows storing not only the events themselves, but also the frames associated with them. If this option is enabled and configured, the report will display not only the text data, but also the frames related to the events.

At version 4.1, displaying of frames in reports is available only for the **Recognized license plates** and **Face recognized** event types.

Records retrieved from the database of the Service are additionally marked with the  icon next to the date and time the event was created, which allows to identify their source.

Events from the Service database cannot be used to build a report for the **Search for Objects** module due to the fact that this module uses archive records in addition to the events when building a report.

The retrieved frame can be displayed in full screen mode by double-clicking on it.

Description

The **Eocortex Monitoring** Service allows to control:

Availability of **Eocortex** servers

Utilization rate of CPUs, RAM and network adapters of **Eocortex** servers

Availability of cameras connected to **Eocortex** servers

Status of **Eocortex** servers archive recording subsystem

Active client connections to **Eocortex** servers

All information collected by the Service from the servers is available for viewing in the [Web Client](#).

In addition to real-time monitoring, the Service is also able to send email notifications about problems that occur in the system, such as:

No connection with the server

Audio / video stream processing problem

Other server problems

- Issues with drives for writing the archive
- Errors when saving events of the log
- Errors when recording video to the archive
- Archive subsystem overload

Structure of the Service

The **Eocortex Monitoring** Service consists of the following components:

Eocortex Monitoring Server. The core of the Service. An OS service that processes and maintains received data about the state of the system, as well as sends out notifications when problems occur. Deployment performs as part of a [separate installation process](#).

Eocortex Monitoring Agent. Medium between the Eocortex Monitoring Server and Eocortex servers. Collects data about the system state and delivers it to the core of the Service. Deployment performs as part of the Eocortex Server installation process.

Eocortex Monitoring Web Client. User interface of the Service. Allows viewing real-time information about the current state of the system components. Being installed automatically together with the **Eocortex Monitoring** Server, it can be accessed at the address of the device where the server component of the Service is installed.

Requirements and limitations

The **Monitoring** Service is a standalone application and must be installed individually.

The **Service** can be installed on any computer without installing the **Eocortex Server** on it.

Only one **Service** instance can be configured for the entire system.

Only one system can be connected to the Service at a time.

The **Monitoring** service does not provide any options for transferring the received data to other monitoring systems.

Data transfer between the Servers and the Service is handled only by the **Eocortex Monitoring Agent** Service, which installs automatically together with the **Eocortex** Server from the full distribution package.

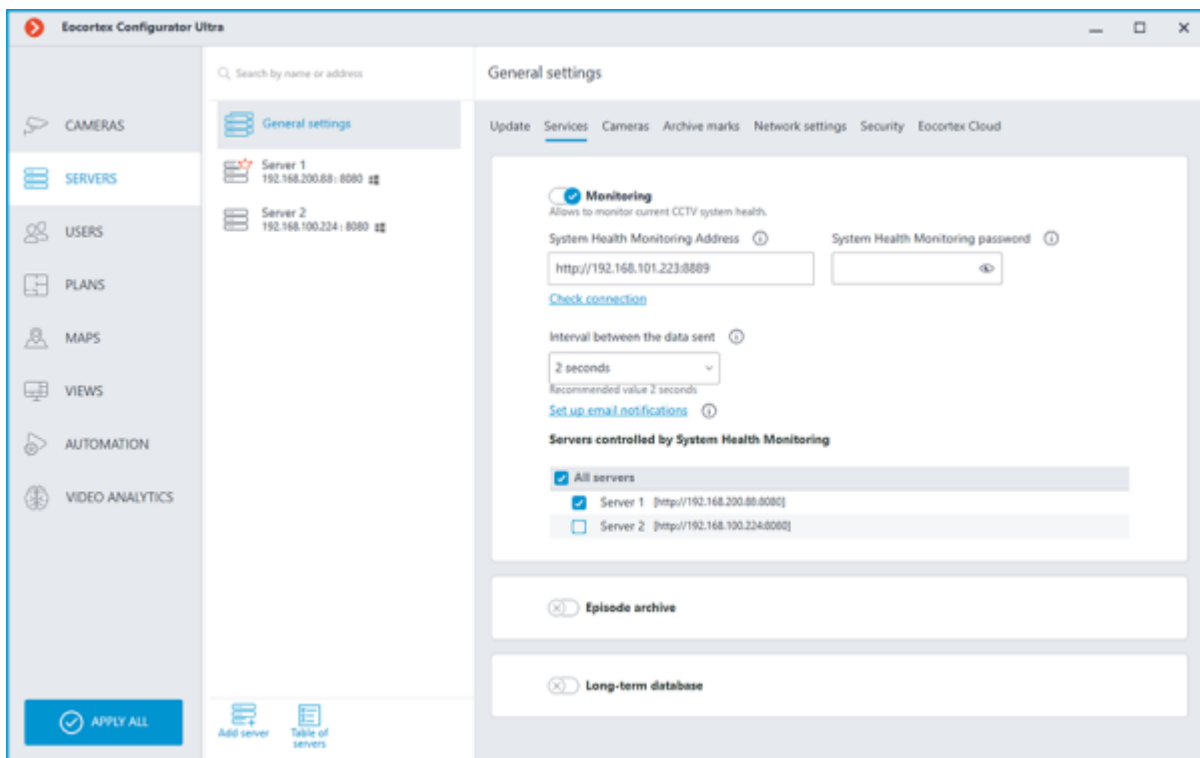

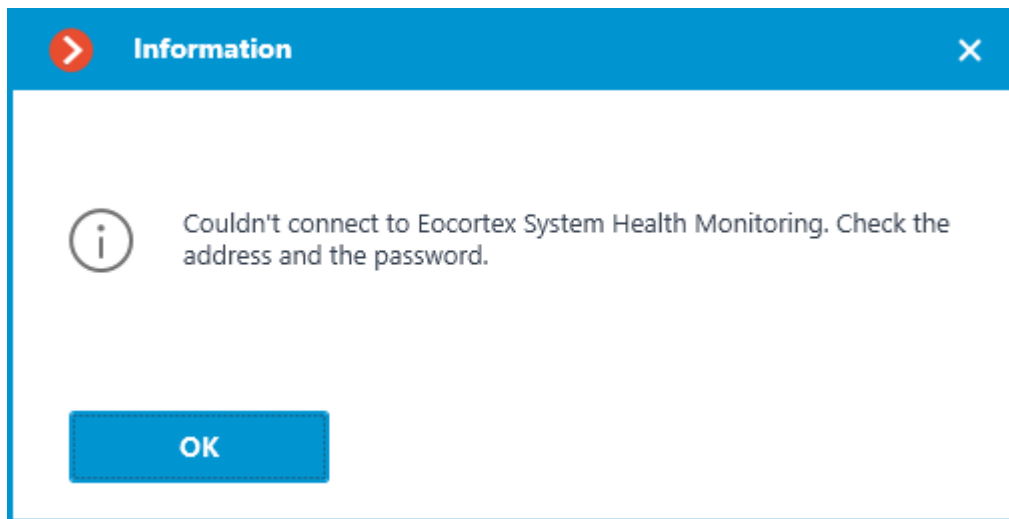

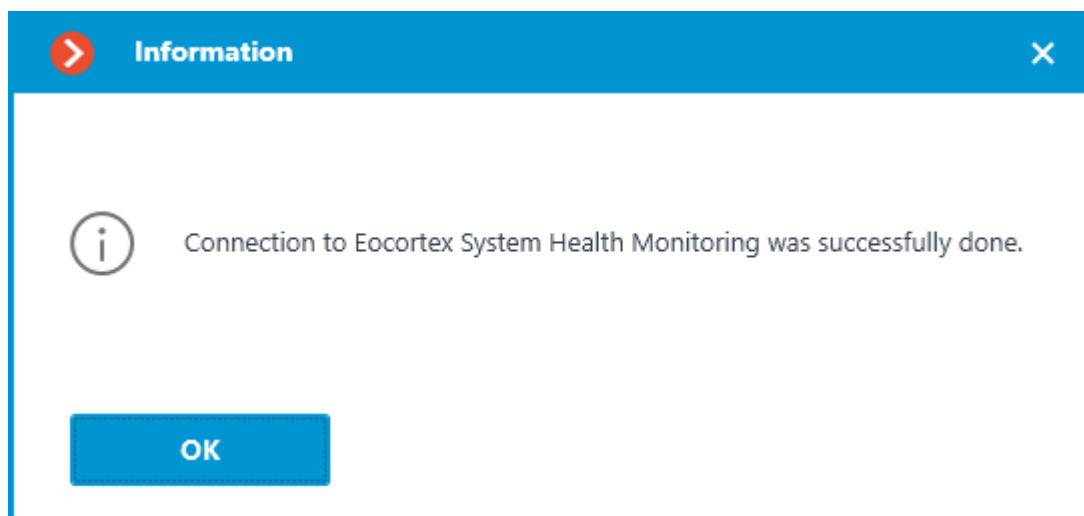

Check connection: Clicking this link starts the test connection to the **Monitoring** Service.

Once the **Address** and **Password** fields are filled in, it is recommended to test the connection to the Service by clicking the **Check connection** link. Depending on the validity of the settings and availability of the Service, the results may be as follows:



Failed to connect to the Service using specified parameters during the connection test. Check the validity of the specified data and the network availability of the Service for the server and try again.



Connection test is successful, it is possible to proceed with further setup of interaction with the Service.

Interval between the data sent

Configuration can be made on the **Services** tab, where the Service was enabled.

The interval of status information sending affects the speed of parameters check as well as the frequency of data update in Web-interface of Eocortex System Health Monitoring. It is advisable to have the interval equal to 2 seconds. The following options are available as the value of this setting:

- 2 seconds
- 5 seconds
- 10 seconds
- 30 seconds
- 45 seconds

The smaller the interval value, the more accurate will be the visualization of the status of servers and cameras in the Web Client and the faster will be the reaction of the Service to possible problems.

However, more frequent sending of data leads to a slight increase in the network load, which can have a negative impact in conditions of low bandwidth between the servers and the Service.

Configuration can be made in a separate window that opens by clicking the **Set up email notifications** link on the **Services** tab.

Clicking the **Set up email notifications** link opens the email notification settings window.

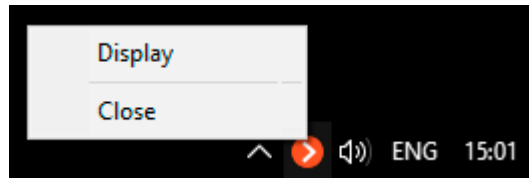
Eocortex Server Info

The **Eocortex Server Info** utility is used to manage and monitor the **Eocortex Server** service. The utility installs with the **Eocortex Server** and starts automatically at the startup of the operating system. Even if the utility window was minimized or closed, the utility can still be found in the notification area of the **Windows** taskbar.




To open the **Eocortex Server Info** window, click twice on its icon in the notification area by left mouse button or call the context menu by right mouse button and select the **Show** item.


Selecting the **Close** item in the context menu closes only the utility, while the **Eocortex Server** service will continue to work normally.

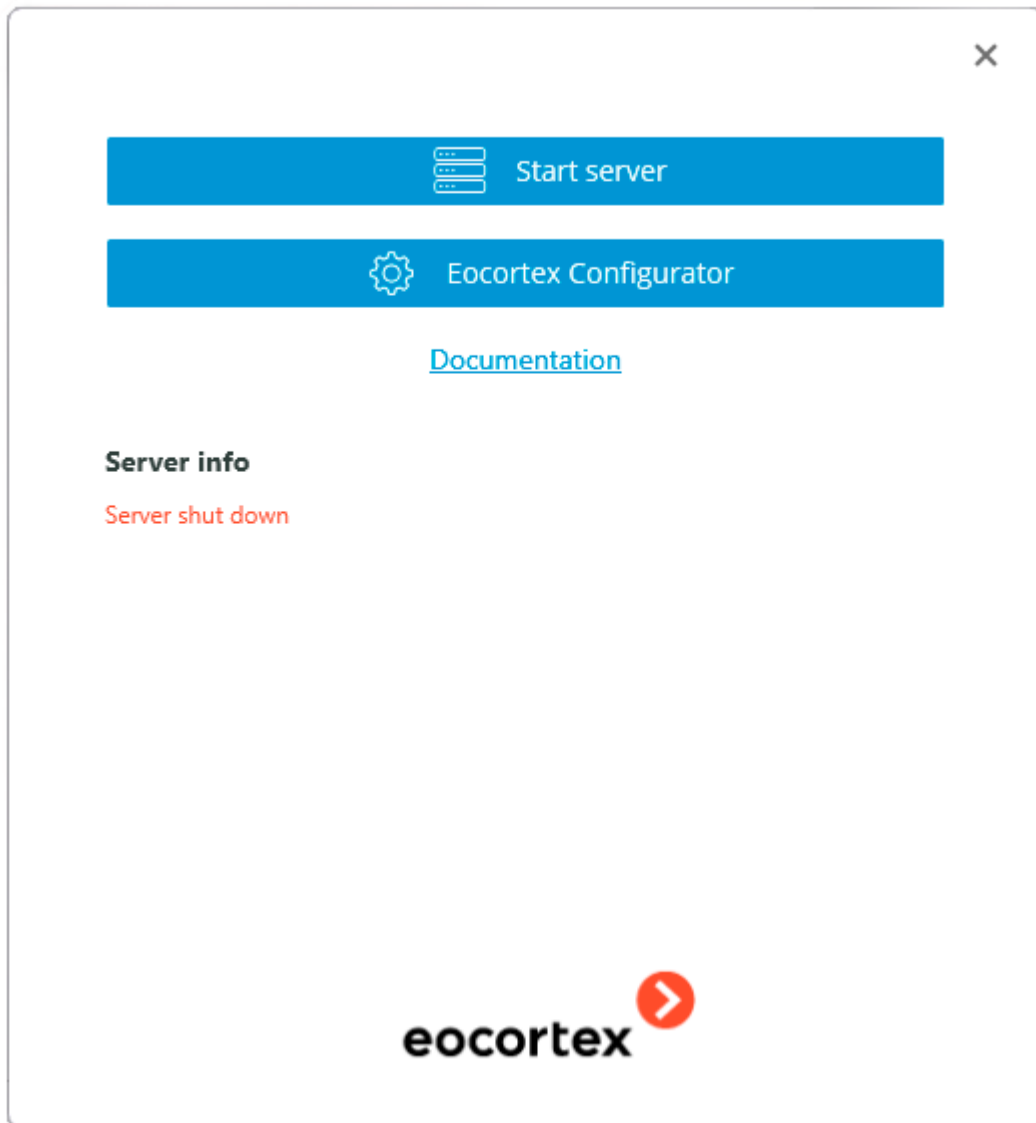

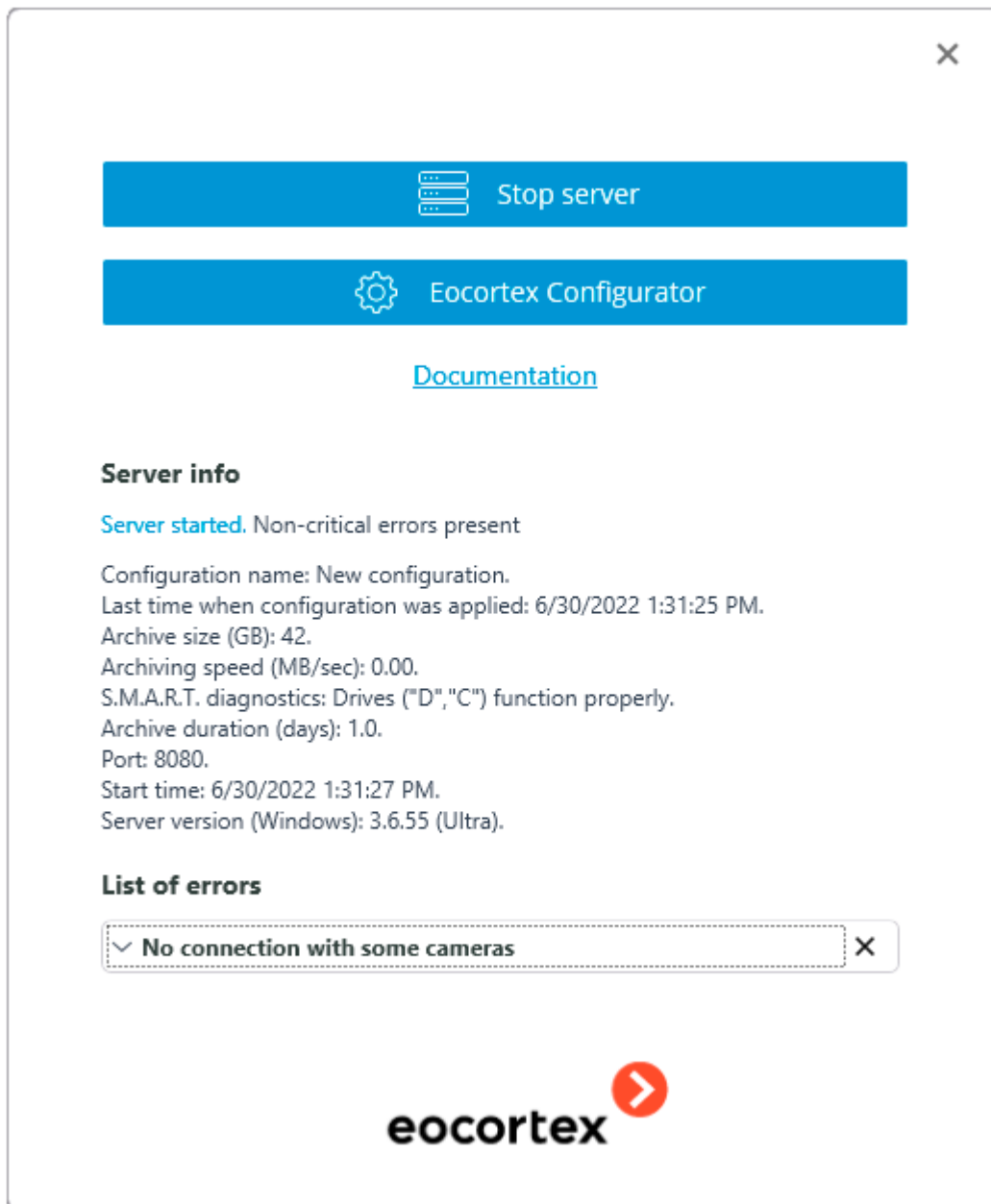
The **Stop server** button terminates the **Eocortex Server** service on the computer. This action requires confirmation by requesting the username and password of the user who has the right to stop the service.

The **Start server** button starts the **Eocortex Server** service on the computer.

The **Eocortex Configurator** starts the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

The **Documentation** link leads to the main page of this documentation.

The bottom part of the window displays the current server state. Notifications about server problems will be displayed there as well.

Eocortex Standalone

Unlike the **Eocortex Server**, the **Eocortex Standalone** is not a **Windows** service, but a stand-alone application with user interface.

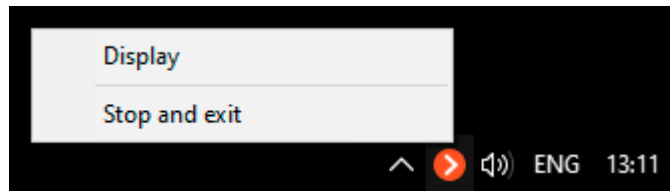
Eocortex can run on a computer in one of two forms - as a service or as an application. From the choice of installation type, either it will be **Eocortex Server** or **Eocortex Standalone**, the functionality of the **Eocortex** software will remain the same, while the **Windows** behavior will be different for each of the options selected. So, for example, when restarting the computer, **Eocortex Standalone** will wait for the user to log into the operating system before starting when **Eocortex Server** will run in the background without the need to log into the OS.

After launching the **Eocortex Standalone** application, the **Windows** notification area will display the application icon.

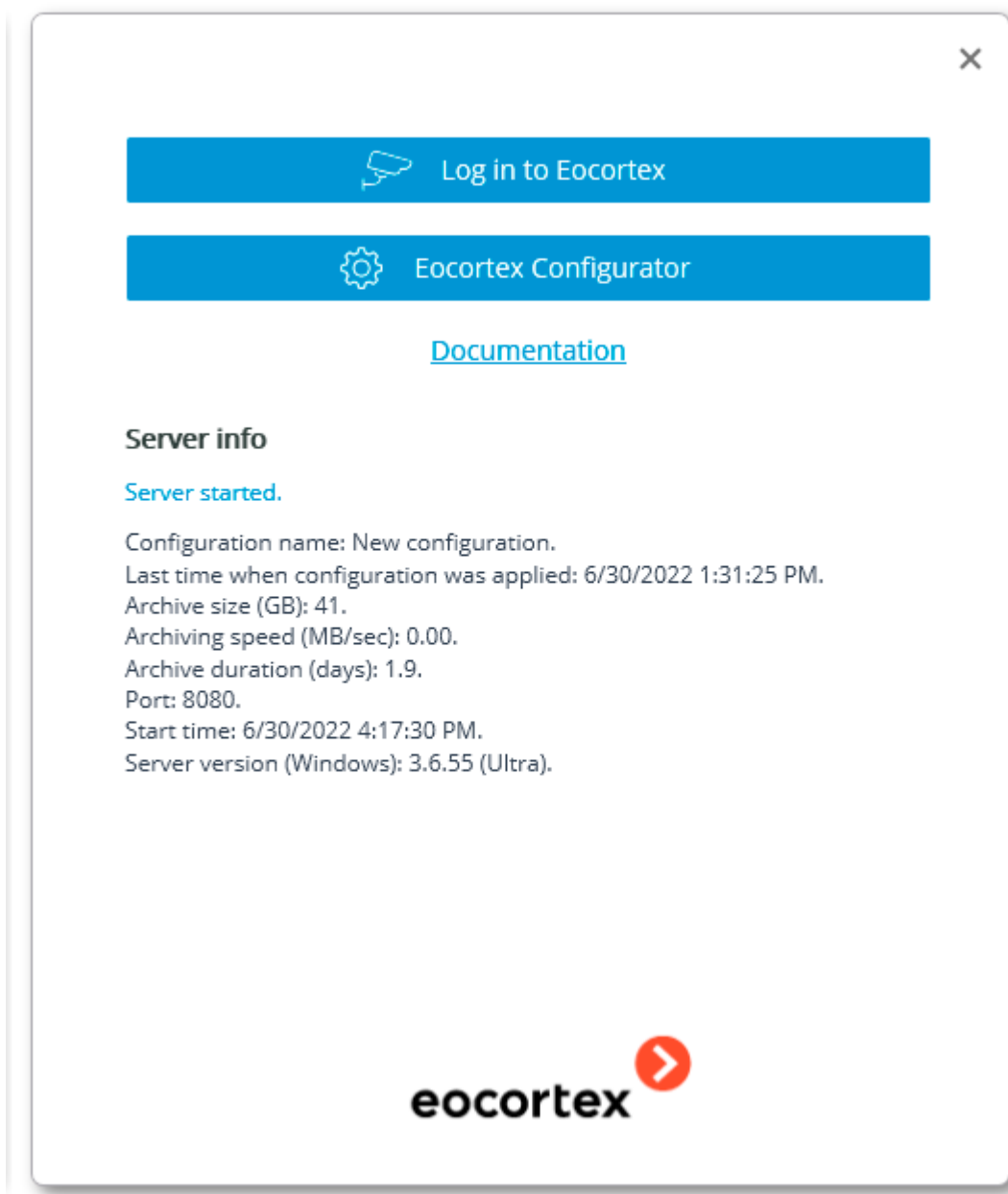


To open the **Eocortex Standalone** window, click twice on its icon in the notification area by left mouse button or call the context menu by right mouse button and select the **Show** item.

Selecting the **Stop and Close** item in the context menu closes the **Eocortex Standalone** application itself.



The **Eocortex Standalone** control window contains the following controls:

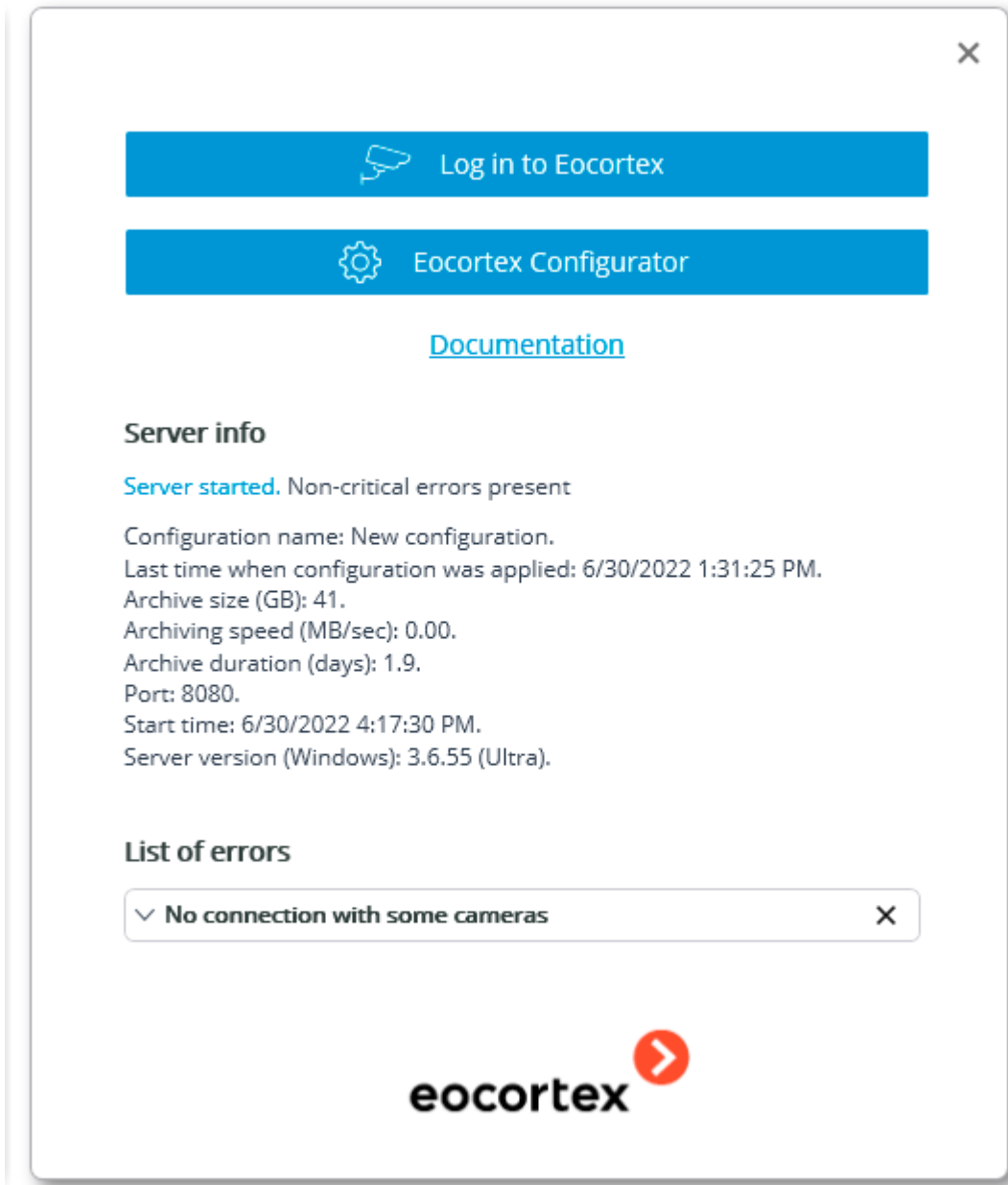


The **Enter the Eocortex** button starts the View window of the **Eocortex Standalone** application.

Autorun for Eocortex Client and Eocortex Standalone

To configure automatic login to the **Eocortex Client** application using a desktop shortcut, right-click the shortcut and select the **Properties** item from the context menu. In the window that opens, set to the **Object** field on the **Shortcut** tab the line as shown below:

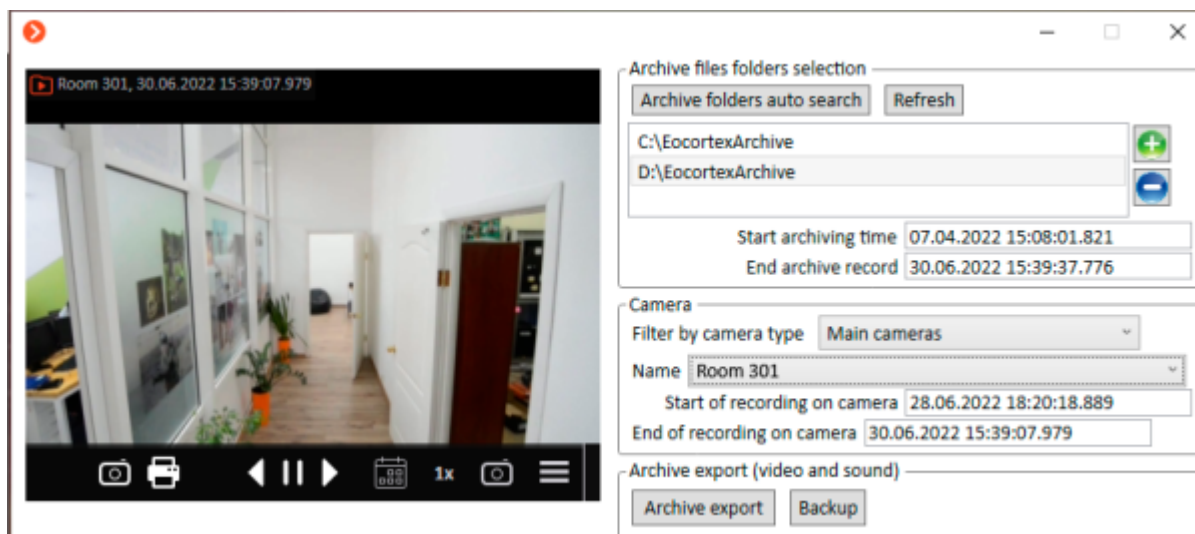
To establish a secure connection over HTTPS, use the **-sslport** parameter instead of the **-port**. The port number is mandatory even if the standard SSL port **18080** is not changed.

To disable validation of security certificates in use, add the **-disablesslcertificatesvalidation** parameter.

Local monitoring and backup archive utility

In order to view the archive recordings with the terminated **Eocortex** Server, as well as recordings that are not linked to the deployed server (for example, copied from the server to any external media), the **Local monitoring and backup archive** utility can be used.

To run the utility, use the shortcut by the path: **Start menu / All Applications / Eocortex Server (Client, Standalone) / Local monitoring and backup archive**.




The utility window contains the following controls:

The **Archive files folders selection** settings section contains a list of folders used by the utility for viewing and exporting archive recordings.

Clicking the **Archive folders auto search** button starts the operating system scan in order to automatically search for all folders in which the archive is stored. All found folders are included in the list.

Clicking the  button allows specifying the archive folder manually in the Explorer window that opens.

Clicking the  button with a folder selected removes this folder from the list. The folder will only be excluded from the list, but it will remain on the disk and can be added to the list again at any time if necessary.

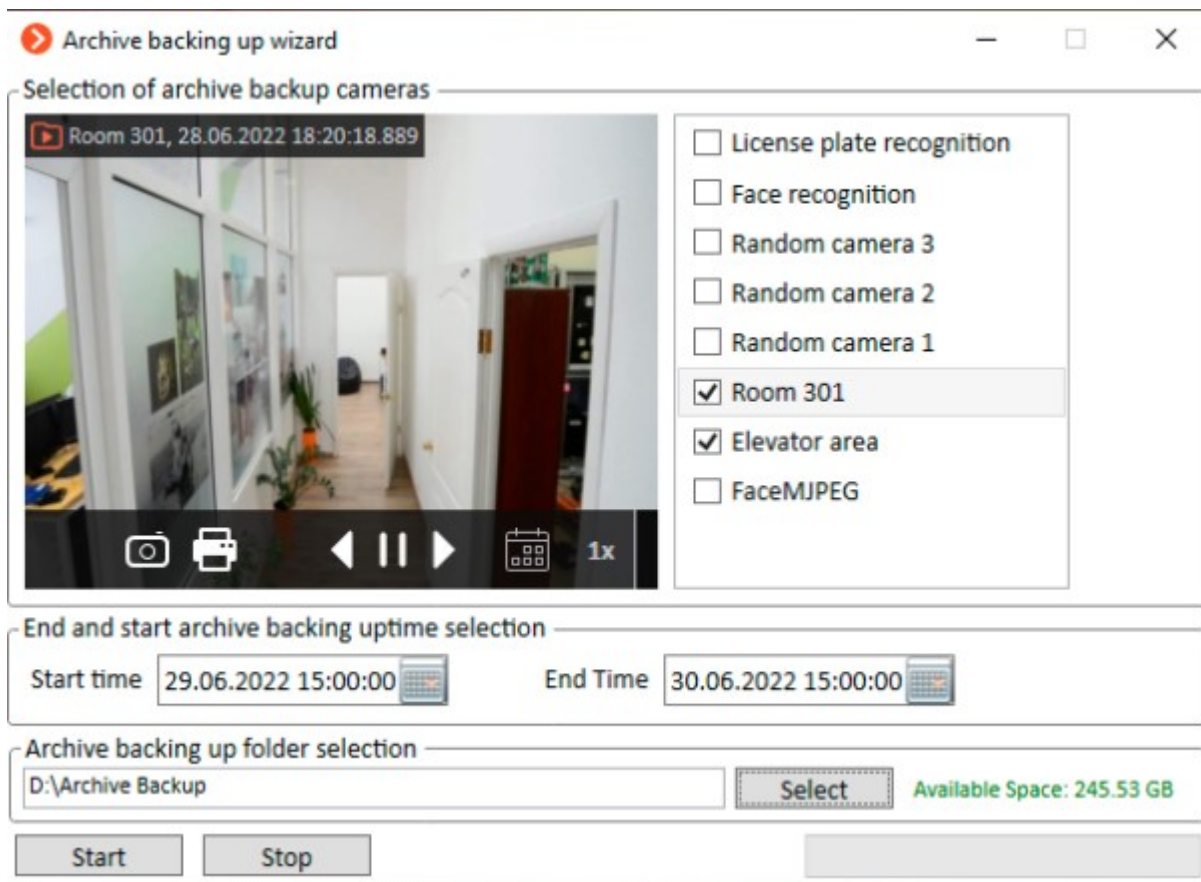
Below the list of folders, information is displayed about the date and time of the beginning and end of the records available for viewing, also known as the archive depth. This information covers all folders added to the list.

Clicking the **Refresh** button updates the information about available folders and cameras. For example, if after launching the utility one of the folders in the list was deleted in **Windows Explorer**, it still will be displayed in the utility as available until the **Refresh** button is clicked.

The **Camera** settings section allows getting information about cameras available in selected folders, as well as select a camera and view its recordings in the preview cell in the left part of the utility window.

The **Archive export** button allows exporting the recordings to AVI, MP4 and MCM files.

Clicking the **Backup** button opens the Archive backing up wizard window:



To create a backup of archive recordings, select the cameras for which a backup must be created, set the time interval for which the archive will be copied, and select a folder for storing the created copy. When all the settings are configured as needed, click the **Start** button.

The backup process will be displayed as a progress bar in the lower right part of the window:



Complementary Pack of Drivers for Cameras and Devices (DevicePack)

Along with new versions of **Eocortex** Server and Client software, an additional separately distributed pack of drivers for cameras and devices (**DevicePack**) is provided. This package is primarily intended to ensure backward compatibility with previous versions of the **Eocortex** Server software. Using the package to get support for new cameras and devices without updating the **Eocortex Server / Client / Standalone** applications is not recommended.

DevicePack is installed in a separate directory (default: **C:\Program Files\Eocortex IP Device Pack**), so it can always be uninstalled without affecting other **Eocortex** packages.

DevicePack must be installed on the computer with **Eocortex** Server. In case of installation on a multiserver system, the package should be installed on each server. If the **Connect via server** option is disabled for individual cameras in the **Configurator** application, then **DevicePack** must also be installed on all computers where these cameras are viewed using the **Eocortex Client**.

Eocortex Server / Client / Standalone interacts with the **DevicePack** as follows – it checks at startup whether the **DevicePack** is installed on this computer and then:

- **If installed:** drivers and native settings for cameras and devices from the **DevicePack** folder will be used to interact with cameras and devices.
- **If not installed:** drivers and native settings for cameras and devices from the **Eocortex Server / Client / Standalone** installation folder will be used.

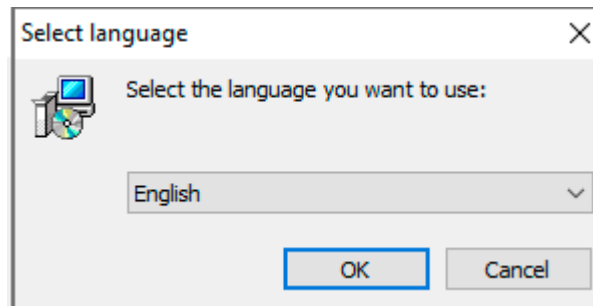

Uninstalling DevicePack

To uninstall **DevicePack**, run the Uninstaller via **Start Menu / All Applications / Eocortex IP Device Pack / Uninstall Device Pack** or use the standard **Applications and Features** snap-in from the **Windows Control Panel**.



Eocortex Virtual IP Camera

Among the additional tools, **Eocortex** provides the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility for creating RTSP streams based on frame sources not supported directly by **Eocortex** Server.

The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** is able to:

- Restream frames received from the webcam to the **Eocortex** Server.
- Create and transmit to the **Eocortex** virtual IP cameras based on previously created videos.

The utility can work in two modes - both active as an application and background as a **Windows** service.

The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility does not require the **Eocortex** license protection key to operate.

Installing and uninstalling Eocortex Virtual IP Camera

The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility is distributed as a separate application and has its own installer. The utility can be installed both on a computer with **Eocortex** components already installed, or on a separate computer without other **Eocortex** applications.

Installation and removal of the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility can be done without the need to stop or restart the **Eocortex** Server.

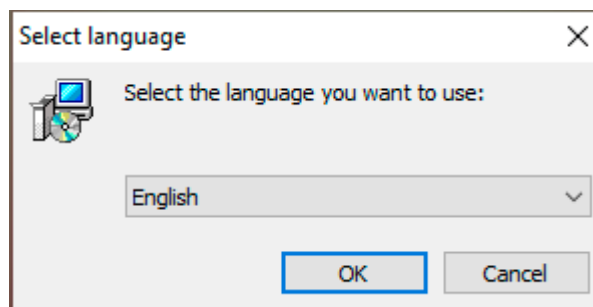
The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility is backward compatible with other **Eocortex** applications, so regular updating of the utility to newer versions is recommended, but not required.

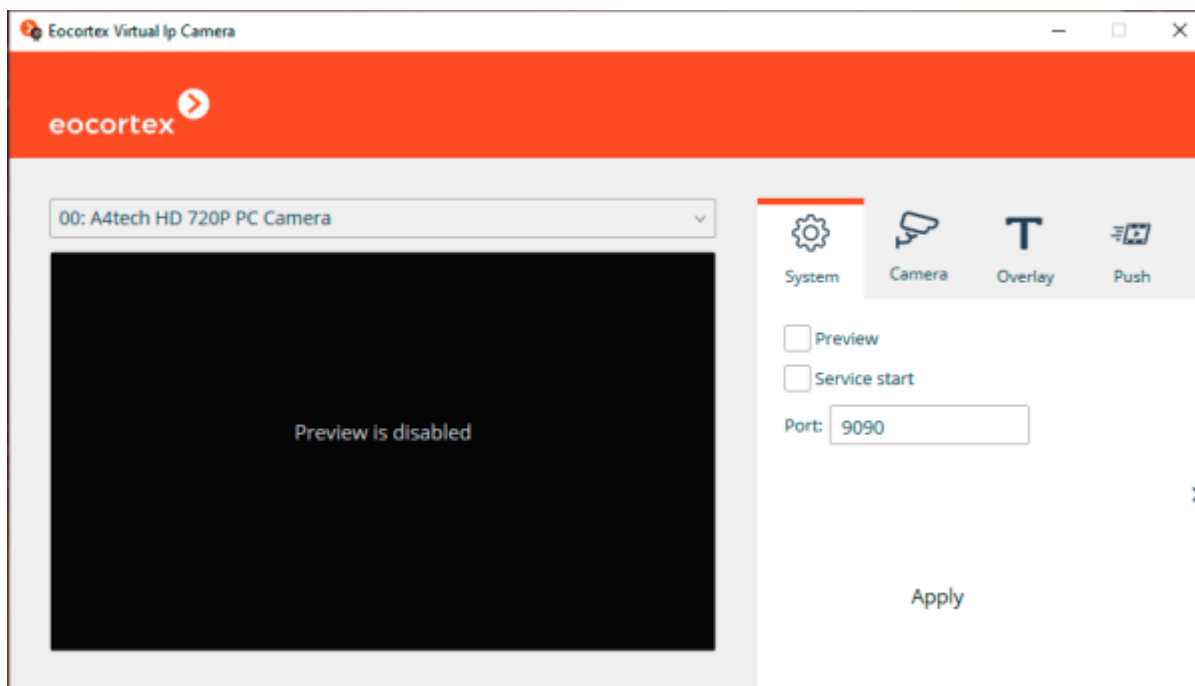
To uninstall **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera**, use the standard **Applications and Features** snap-in from the **Windows Control Panel** or run the uninstaller in the utility root folder.



When the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility is uninstalled from the computer, the Videos folder, which stores all [video clips added](#) for creating video streams, remains unchanged. Thus, removing or updating the utility allows to keep video clips unchanged without having to transfer or copy them.

Configuring the utility

Run the utility by clicking the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** on the desktop or via **Start / All Applications / Eocortex Virtual IP Camera / Eocortex Virtual IP Camera**. The utility window will open.



In the upper part of the window is a drop-down list for **selecting utility channels**. To configure a channel, select it in this list. The name of each channel is separated by a colon and consists of a numeric prefix before and the file or webcam name after the colon. The numeric index displays the number of each frame source in the utility in the order they were added and will be needed when configuring the channel in the **Eocortex Configurator** application.

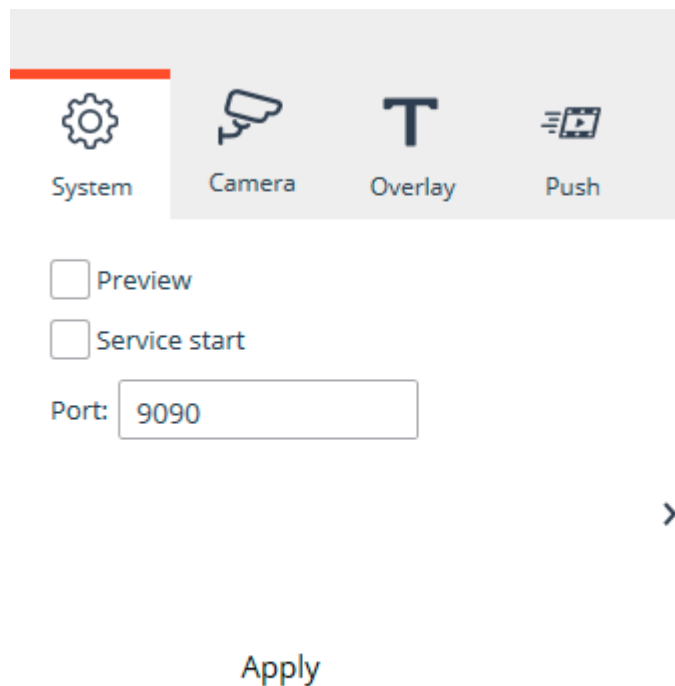
Under the channel selection menu is the **preview window** of the selected channel. If the image is not displayed, turn on the **Preview option** (see below).

In the right part of the window there is the **Settings** panel. If the panel is hidden, it can be opened by clicking the arrow at the right edge of the window.

Below are the setting options.

System

The **System** tab contains the general settings of the utility.



Preview: The utility will display the video of the selected channel in the preview window.

Service start: The utility will start as a **Windows** service. If this option is enabled, the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** service will be started after closing the utility window to keep the created channels running.

Port: The network port of the utility, which, along with the IP or URL of this computer, will be used when setting up channels in the **Eocortex Configurator** application. By default, the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility uses port **9090**.

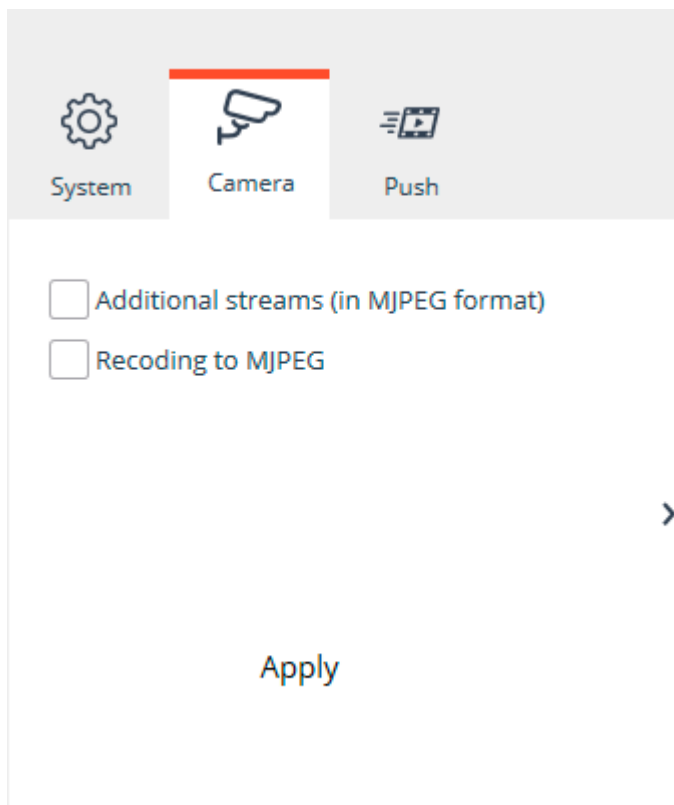

Creating a stream in Eocortex Virtual IP Camera

The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility is designed to create video streams and then transfer them to the server **Eocortex** for further processing. Stream virtualization in the utility is possible on the basis of pre-recorded videos or an image provided by a webcam.

Streaming video clips

Before using a video clip in the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility, make sure it meets certain file and video format requirements.

The **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility has the support of streaming to the **Eocortex** for the following file formats:

MCM: The **Eocortex** internal video file format.

MP4: Commonly used media container, also known as MPEG-4 Part 14.

In addition to the media container format, it's also important to follow the requirements for video compression methods. The utility supports the following video codecs:

H.264/MPEG-4 Part 10

H.265/HEVC

MJPEG

To successfully stream the video to the server using the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera**, both requirements must be met simultaneously for the uploaded video. So, for example, a file of AVI

format or with MPEG-4 Part 2 video codec will not be transmitted by the utility as it does not meet the minimum requirements.

In order to use a video in MCM or MP4 format in the utility, follow these steps:

[Install the Eocortex Virtual IP Camera](#) utility to a computer.

Place the video files to the **Videos** subfolder of the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** installation folder.

Run the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera**.

In the main window, find a channel with the video file name in the channel list menu to make sure that the video is detected and recognized by the utility.

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application and [configure the connection](#) of the desired **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility channel to the **Eocortex** server.

In case of need to add new clips to list while the utility is already running, repeat step 2 and restart the utility. If the utility works as **Windows** service, just open its main window. The numbering of channels created from new clips will continue taking into account the channels already available in the utility.

Streaming web camera

In order to use a webcam (built-in or external) connected to a computer, follow these steps:

[Install the Eocortex Virtual IP Camera](#) utility to a computer.

Make sure that the web camera is connected to the computer, configured and turned on. Check that the camera image is available using the operating system tools or proprietary software that came with the webcam.

Run the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera**.

In the main window, find a channel with the web camera name in the channel list menu to make sure that the camera is detected and recognized by the utility.

Run the **Eocortex Configurator** application and [configure the connection](#) of the desired **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility channel to the **Eocortex** server.

In case of need to add streams from new web cameras to list while the utility is already running, repeat step 2 and restart the utility. If the utility works as **Windows** service, just open its main window. The numbering of channels created from new clips will continue taking into account the channels already available in the utility.

To make checking the video in the main window of the utility more convenient, enable the **Preview** option to display the video in the preview window.


By default, the utility runs as an application, and therefore it is necessary to keep the main window open throughout the entire time it is used. If the utility is to be used for a long period of time, it is recommended to enable the **Start service** option to change the utility's operation mode. When this option is enabled, **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** will be launched as a **Windows** service, which will allow the main window of the utility to be closed after the settings are completed without shutting down the utility.

Receiving streams in Eocortex server

To receive the stream [transmitted by the Eocortex Virtual IP Camera](#) utility in the **Eocortex** Server, follow the steps below:

1. Run the [Eocortex Configurator](#) application and switch to the  [Cameras](#) section.

2. [Add a camera](#) and switch to the [Connection](#) tab.
3. In the **Address** field, set the IP address or domain name of the computer on which the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility is running.
4. In the **Brand** menu, select the **Virtual Camera** item.
5. In the **Device type** menu, select the **Video server** item.
6. In the **Model** menu, select the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** item.
7. In the **Channel number** field, set the number under which the selected channel exists in the **Eocortex Virtual IP Camera** utility.

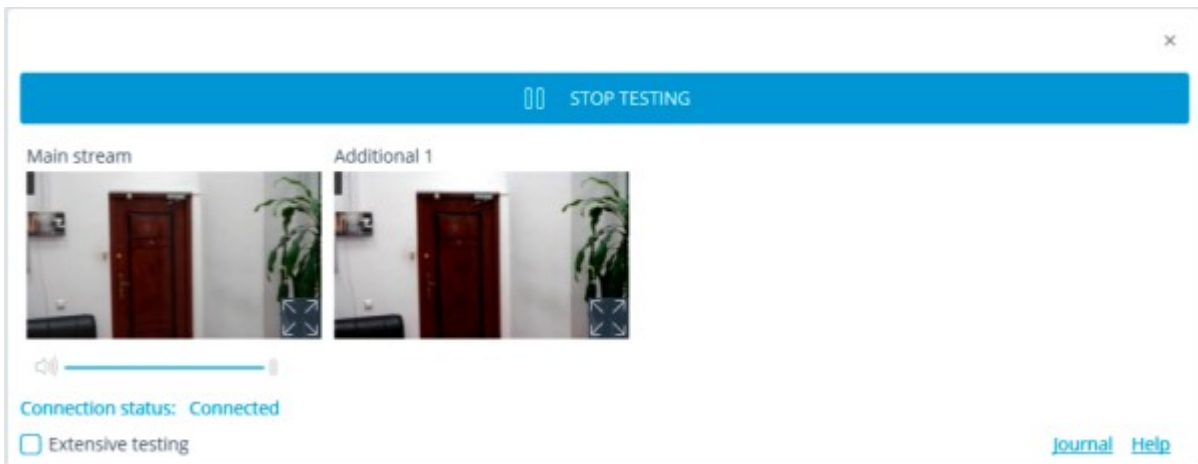

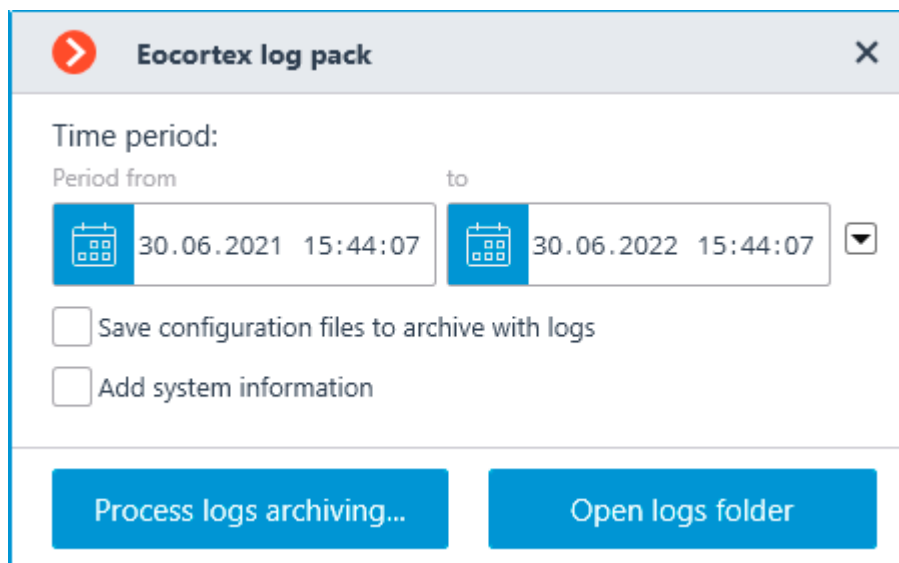

System log files

In order to speed up the solution of any issue, it is recommended to send requests to the technical support team along with the system log files. To collect and prepare the log files, use the **Pack logs** utility and follow the steps below.

Run the **Pack logs** shortcut in the Eocortex application folder of the **Start** menu.

In the window that opens, set the time interval for which the log files must be collected. To add system configuration files or basic system information to the archive with logs, enable the corresponding options.



Clicking the **Process logs archiving...** button will create a zip file with packed logs, configuration files and system information. But before that, a dialog box will open asking to specify the location where to save the generated file.

Clicking the **Open logs folder** will open the folder in **Windows Explorer** where **Eocortex** logs are stored.

In order to collect logs of a specific **Eocortex** application, the **Pack logs** tool must be run exactly on the computer where the application is installed.

Eocortex API, SDK and REST API

Eocortex provides open and free-to-use **API**, **SDK**, and **REST API**, which allows third-party developers to expand the functionality of **Eocortex**, as well as provide one-way or two-way communications between **Eocortex** applications and third-party software.

Eocortex API

Eocortex API is the basic set of application programming interfaces provided by **Eocortex** that allows to build one- or two-way interactions between **Eocortex** applications and third-party applications. **Eocortex API** supports and uses various types of requests and responses: HTTP, RTSP, XML, JSON. **Eocortex API** allows external applications to interact with the **Eocortex** Server or Client to perform the following tasks, such as:

Receiving live view and archive recordings of cameras connected to the system.

Receiving various information from the **Eocortex** Server, including system configuration and entries of Events log.

Sending various commands for execution by **Eocortex** Server or Client.

Eocortex SDK

Eocortex SDK is the set of materials useful in development of external plugins and modules for expanding the existing functionality of **Eocortex** applications. This development kit is intended for .NET developers and contains the list of core classes and interfaces, as well as several code samples that demonstrate the implementation of external plugins. All source files are written in C#. It is recommended to use **Microsoft Visual Studio** as a plugin development environment.

Eocortex REST API

Eocortex REST API is the set of advanced application programming interfaces provided by **Eocortex** that allows to build a deeper interaction with **Eocortex** than **Eocortex API**.

Eocortex REST API allows to:

Configure cameras, users, groups, views, automation scenarios and some intelligent modules.

View the information about statuses and current configuration of servers and cameras.

View the list of integrated cameras supported in the system.

Manage databases of intelligent modules: add, modify, delete groups and entries for faces and license plates.

Eocortex REST API can be used for system configuration without the need to use **Eocortex Configurator** and **Eocortex Client** applications.

The **configure/** set of commands is available only for **Eocortex** systems with **Enterprise** and **ULTRA** licenses. Only the user with the highest level of access rights, i.e., belonging to the Senior administrators group, can configure the system using **Eocortex REST API**.

The **api/** set of commands available for all users and for all types of **Eocortex** licenses.

Detailed descriptions for **Eocortex API, SDK and REST API** are available at the website eocortex.com, on the [Support / Documentation](#) page.

Eocortex Software Development Kit (plugin samples written in C#) can be downloaded at the [Download](#) page of the eocortex.com website. Specific plugin samples can be provided by request. **Eocortex SDK** is not required to use **Eocortex APIs** resources.

Typical use cases

Shelf Fullness Check: Example of usage

One of the reasons for lost profits in retail is the untimely display of goods on the shelves. According to a number of studies, the total loss from the lack of goods on the shelves can reach up to 4% of the store's turnover. The **Eocortex** company has developed the **Shelf Fullness Check** module to promptly notify shop assistants about empty shelves in stores. An example of using this module is described below.

Solution overview

There is a supermarket with a high turnover due to the high flow of visitors. The task is to reduce losses from untimely display of goods on the shelves in the sales area.

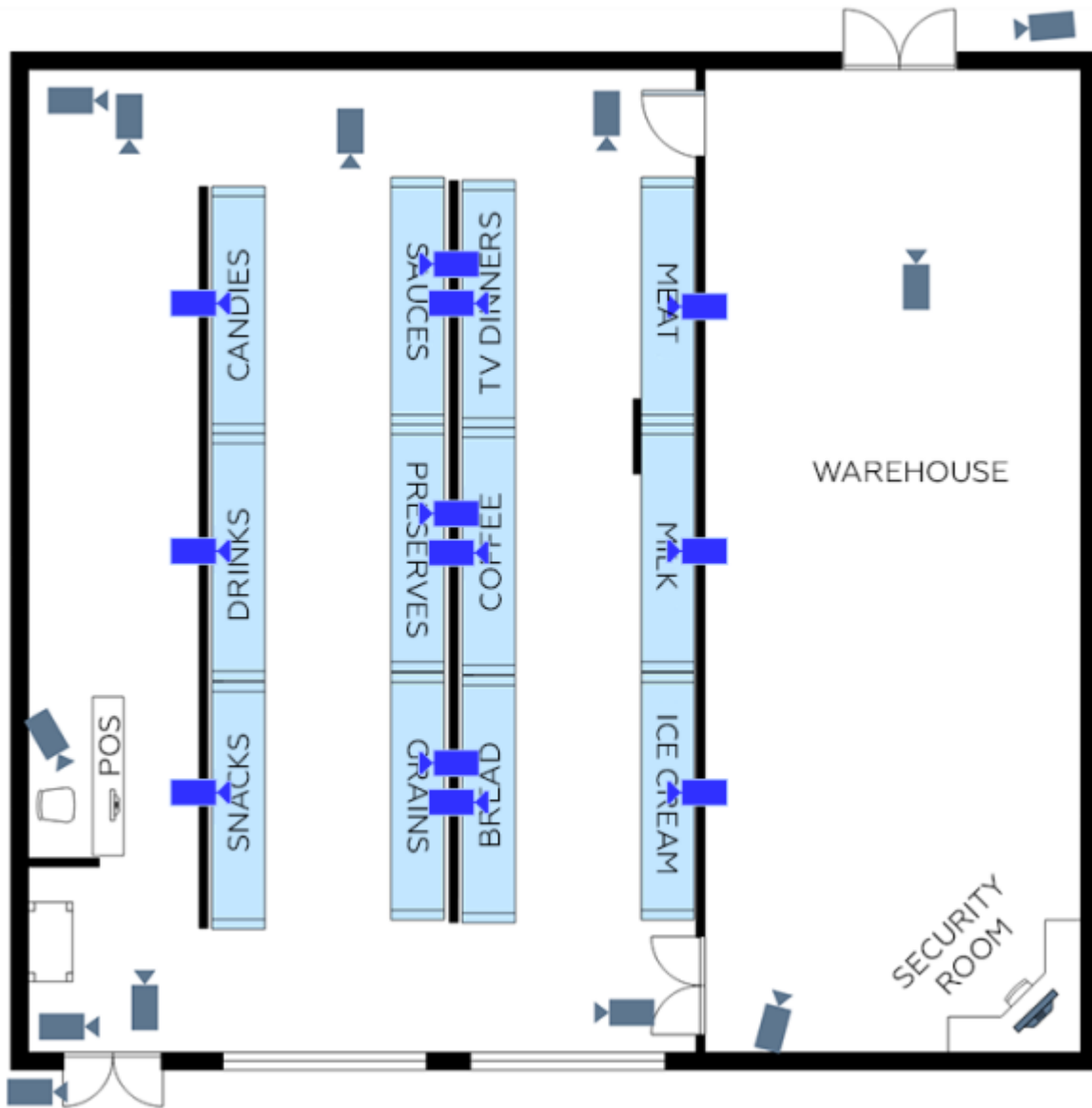
To solve this task, a video surveillance system built on IP cameras and **Eocortex** software will be used. Moreover, this system will also be used to ensure the security of the supermarket, prevent theft and suppress staff abuses.

Below is the map of the supermarket. The cameras that monitor the fullness of the shelves are highlighted in blue.

The number of cameras that monitor the fullness of the shelves is based on the number of controlled shelves and their positions, the room configuration, the expected parameters of the cameras, and also taking into account [restrictions, requirements and recommendations of the module](#). As a result, 10 cameras were obtained, each of which monitors the status of 10 shelves, for a total of 100 shelves.

To ensure the security of the supermarket and prevent theft, 11 more cameras will be used around the perimeter. Another camera with sound recording function will be placed above the point of sale.

Monitoring of the general situation at the facility is carried out by displaying streams from the cameras on the computer screen located at the guard post.



Shelf fullness control is organized as follows:

The merchandiser responsible for filling the shelves is equipped with a smartphone or tablet with the **Eocortex** mobile application installed.

The **Eocortex** server, having detected a shelf fullness level lower than the specified value, sends a push notification to the merchandiser's device indicating which shelf needs to be filled.

The merchandiser, having received a notification, picks up the corresponding goods in the warehouse and fills the shelf. In addition, he can first open the corresponding camera in the **Eocortex** mobile application to confirm the status of the shelf and take notes or check the plan for laying out goods on the shelves in a third-party application, if one is installed on the device.

Sales area administrators and other authorized supermarket staff can monitor the overall situation, the state of the shelves, and generate reports on empty shelves for various periods using the **Eocortex Client** application installed on their computers and laptops.

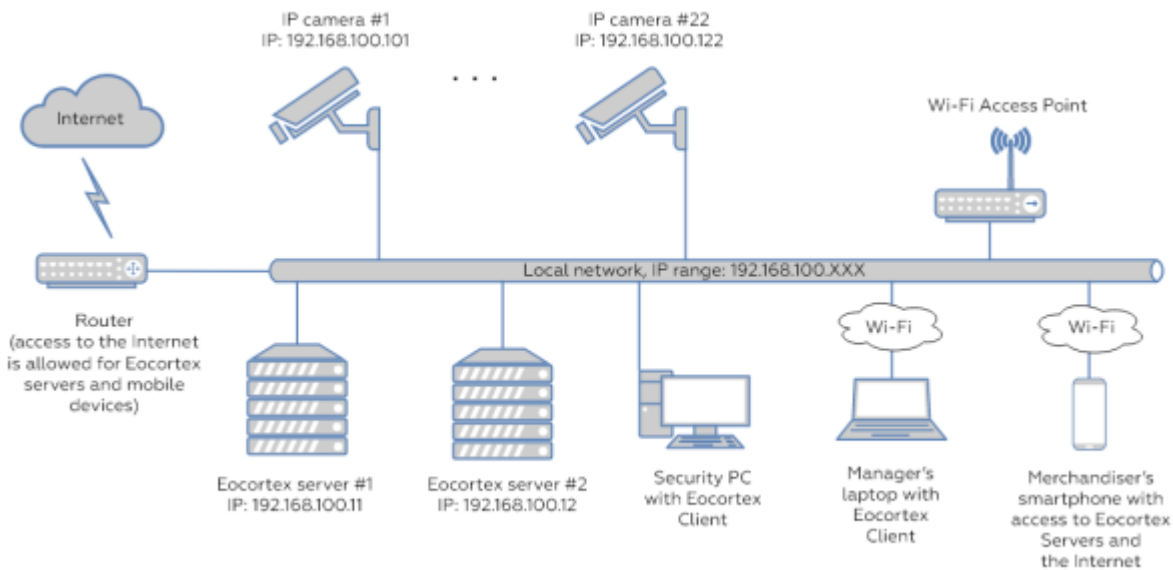
Deploying a video surveillance system

The [Software for IP Cameras / Calculator](#) was used to calculate servers and client computers, as well as to estimate the required network bandwidth. All calculations were performed with the following camera parameters: two H.264 streams with a resolution of 2 megapixels (Main) and 0.3 megapixels (Additional 1); for the Shelf Fullness Check module, the frame rate is 10 fps and analysis

on the Main stream; for other cameras, the frame rate is 25 fps and analysis on the Additional 1 stream.

Based on the calculations, a video surveillance system will be deployed with two **Eocortex** video servers, on which the **Eocortex LS** license is installed: on the first one will be 17 licenses to work with IP cameras, 1 license for sound reception feature and 5 licenses for **Shelf Fullness Check for 4-10 shelves** module; On the second one – 5 licenses for IP cameras and 5 licenses for **Shelf Fullness Check for 4-10 shelves** module.

Below is a map of the system network topology.



When installing and configuring cameras, follow the [module requirements and recommendations](#).

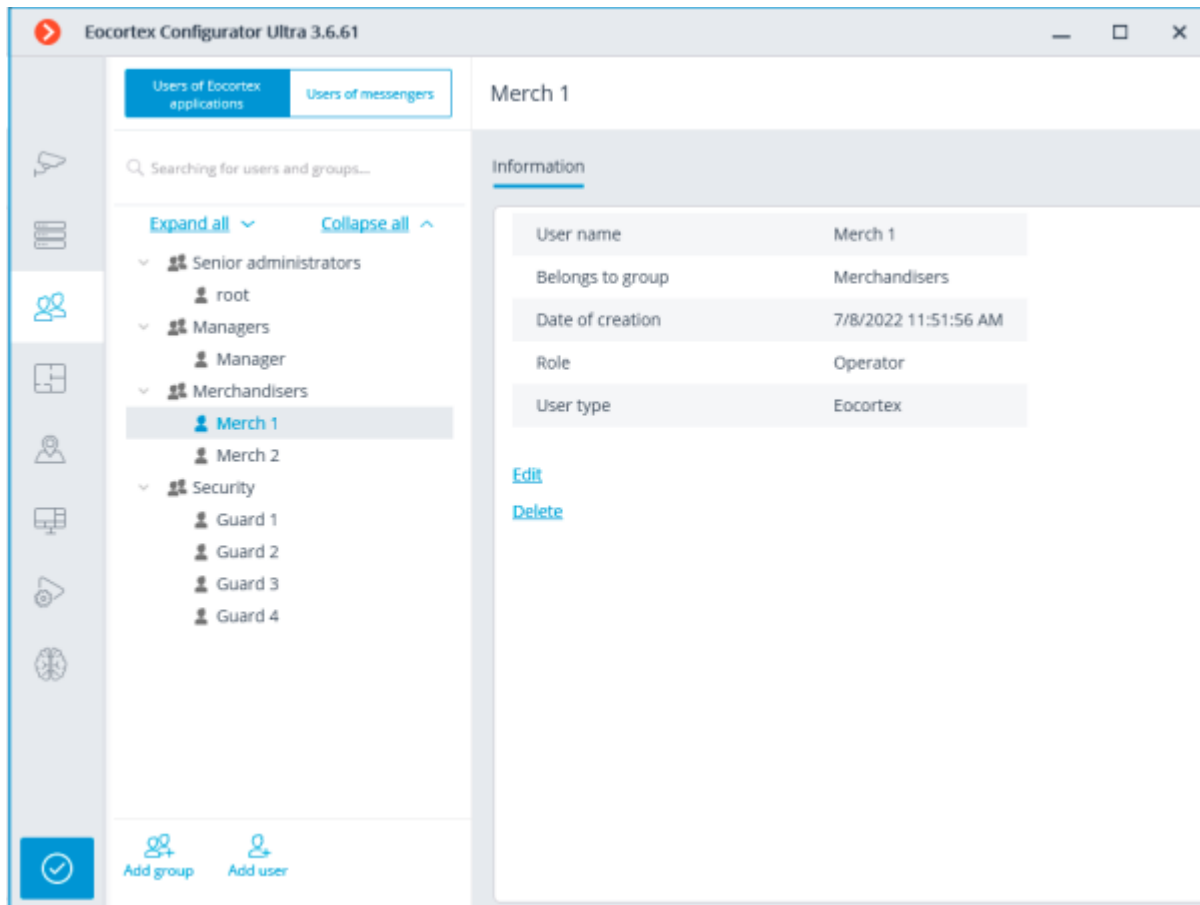
When deploying video surveillance servers, prepare the [hardware](#) and [operating system](#) first, then [install the Eocortex Server service, followed by license activation](#).

[Install the Eocortex Client application](#) on the computers of managers and security guards, and mobile applications (for [Android](#) or [iOS](#)) on smartphones and tablets.

Configuring a video surveillance system

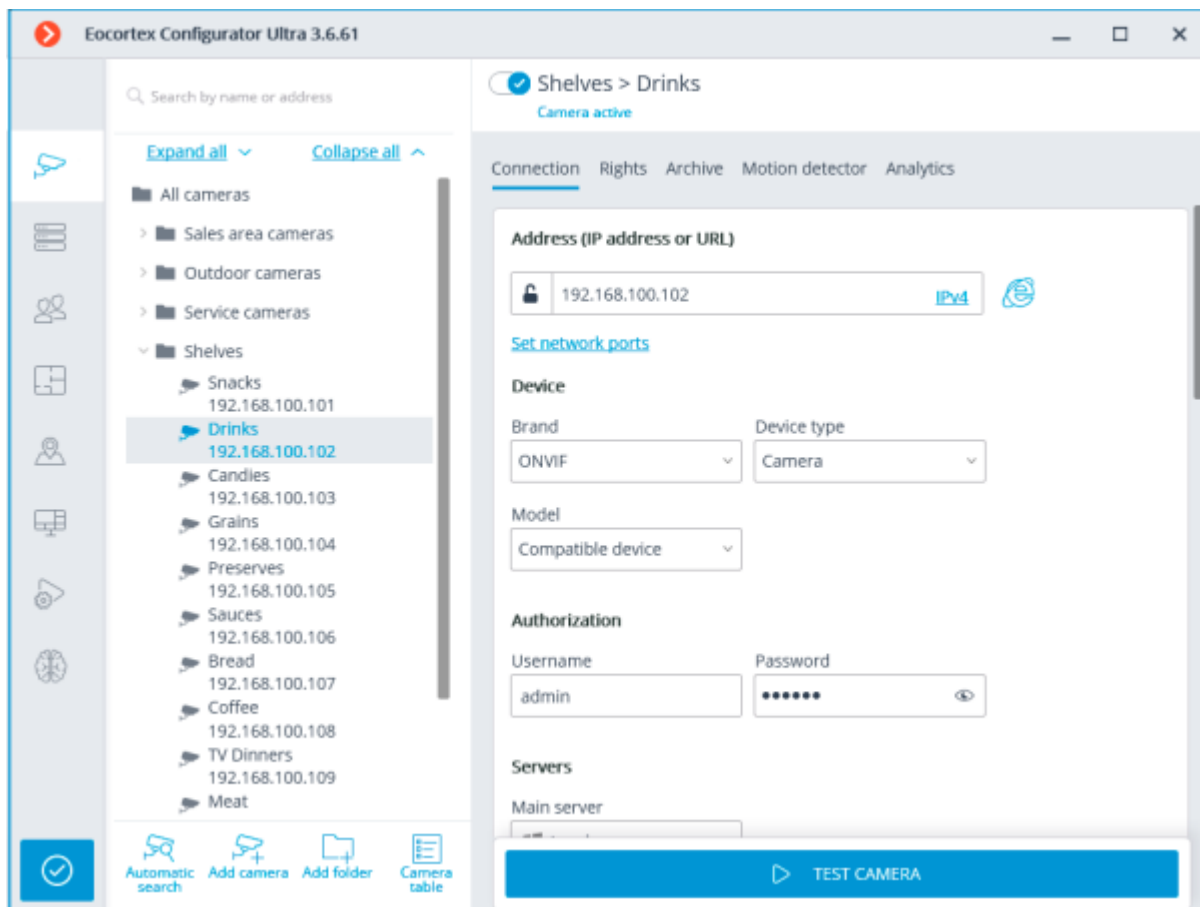
After deploying and activating the license of both servers, [combine them into a single system and configure them](#).

Next, [set up user rights](#) for system users: create the appropriate user groups (Administrators, Managers, Merchandisers, Guards, etc.), assign permissions to groups and add users.





Then [connect and configure the cameras](#), having previously created groups of cameras: Sales area, Outdoor, Service, Shelves.

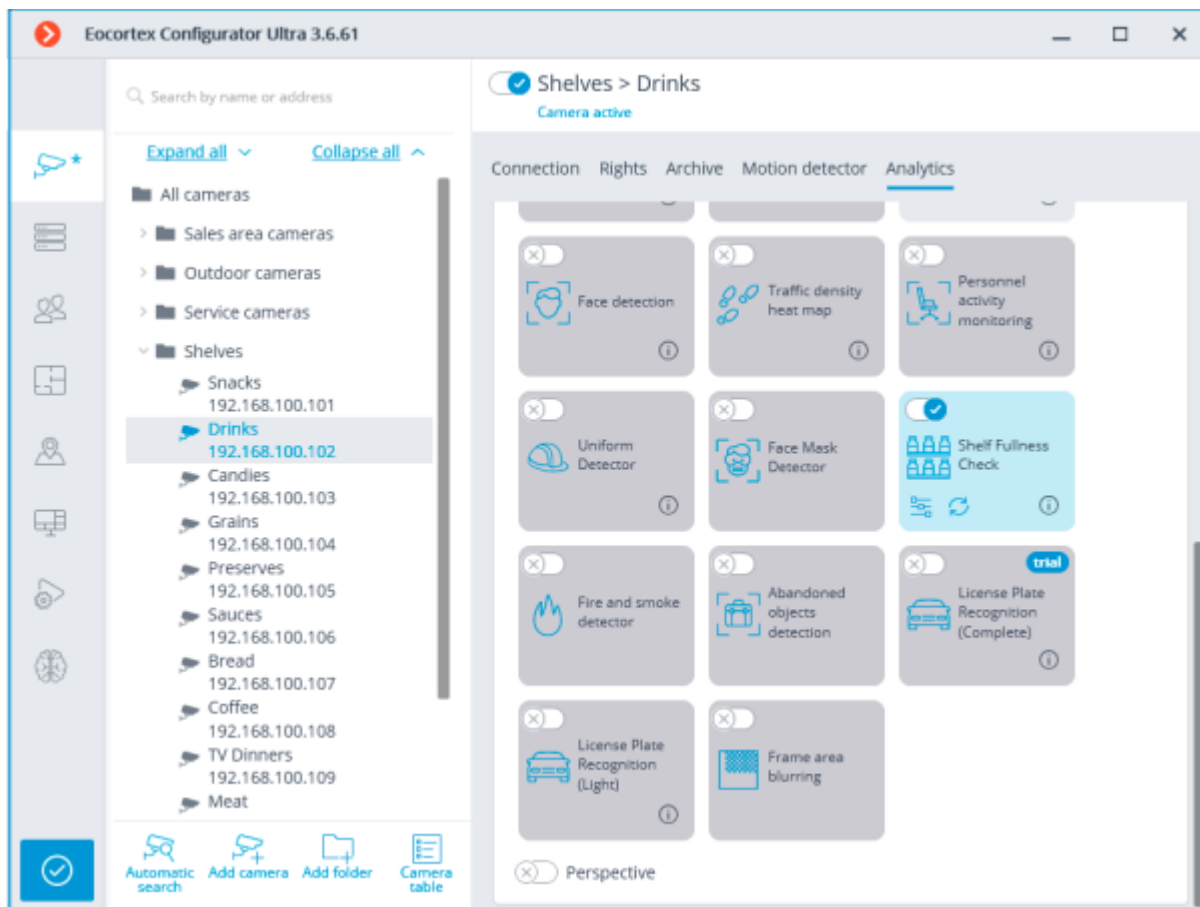
To make adding cameras with similar settings more convenient, it is recommended to add and configure one camera, then right-click it and in the context menu that opens, select **Create new camera based on the highlighted one** or **Create a group of cameras based on the selected one**: in this case, all settings of the original camera will be copied.



For cameras intended to monitor the fullness of the shelves, after completing all general camera settings (connection, archive, software motion detector), enable and configure the **Shelf Fullness Check** module. Below is an example of module configuration.

Configuring video analytics

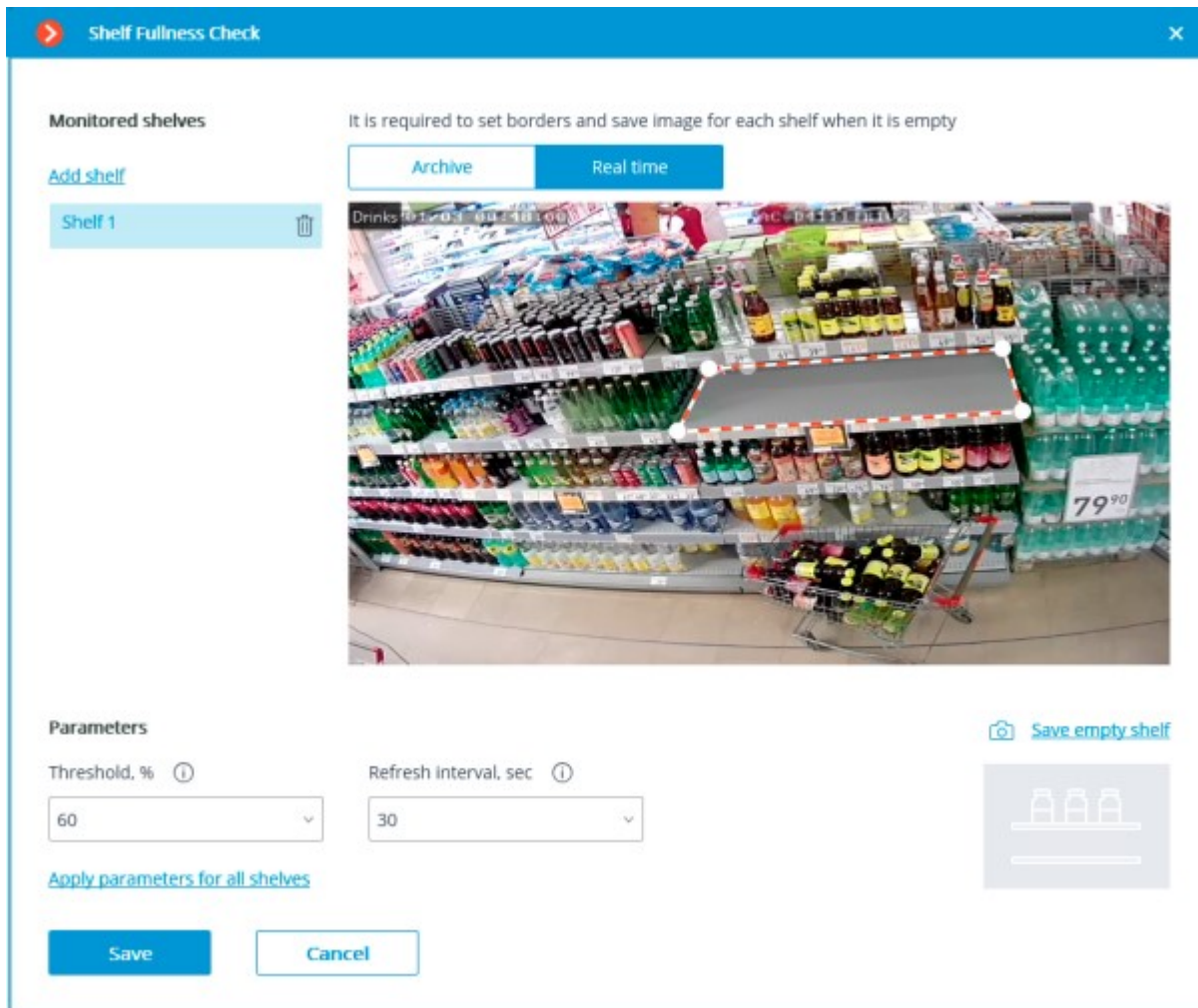
The settings of the **Shelf Fullness Check** module for the camera are carried out on the [Cameras](#) page of the **Eocortex Configurator** application. To configure the module, after adding a camera to the system, configuring its connection to the server and enabling software motion detector, switch to the **Analytics** tab, enable the module using the  switch and open the module settings window using the  button.



In the module settings window, add the shelves (no more than 10) and set their contours.

Nodal points of the shelf borders are dragged with the mouse. To add a new point, left-click on the borderline. To remove an existing point, right-click on it.

The contour of the shelf must be defined in such a way as to exactly cover the controlled area to be filled.



For each shelf, use the **Save empty shelf** button to specify an image of an empty shelf. For these purposes, it may be more convenient to switch to the **Archive** tab and select the moment when the currently configured shelf was empty.

Set the **Threshold, %** and **Refresh interval, sec** for each shelf. If the same settings are used for all shelves, it will be more convenient to set these parameters after adding all the shelves by clicking the **Apply parameters for all shelves** link.

After completing the module settings for the camera, click **Save**.

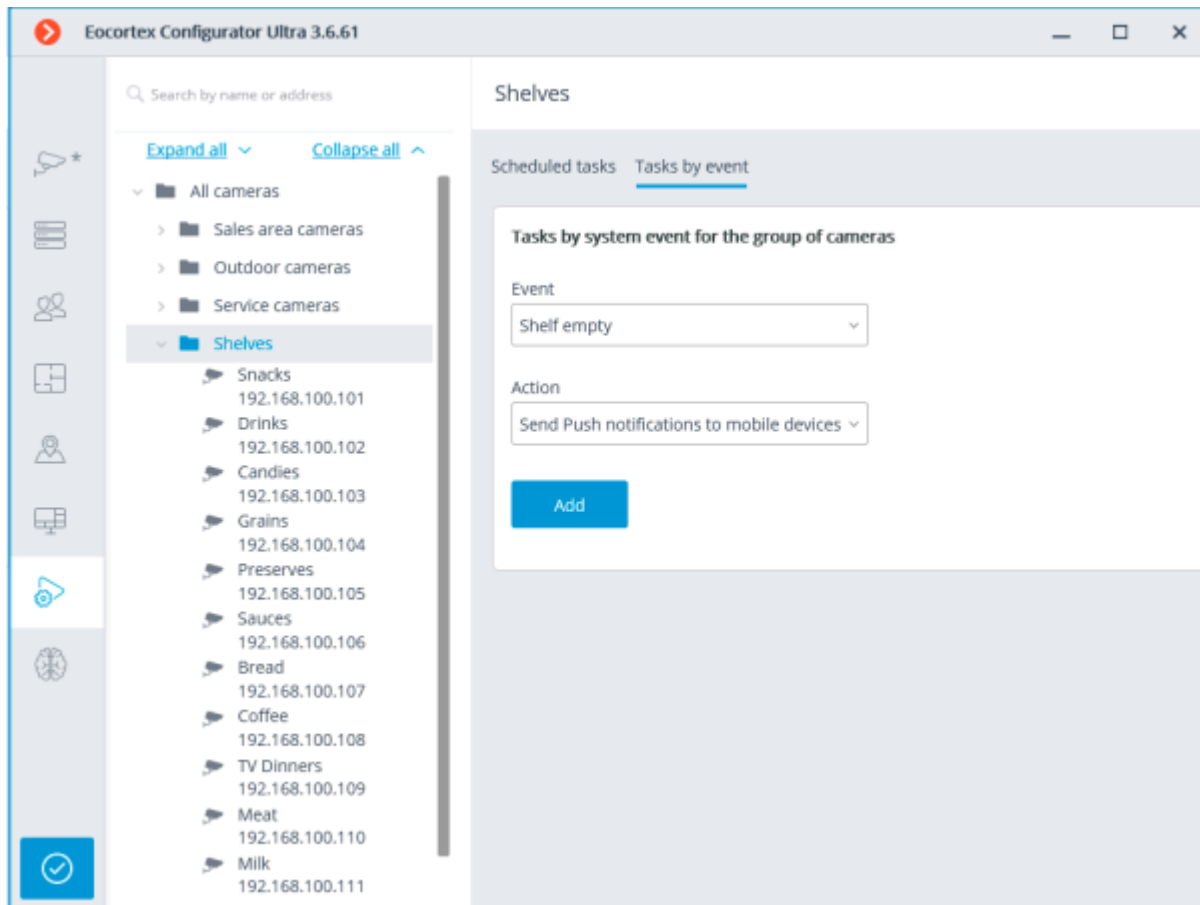

The next step, after adding and configuring cameras, is to set up scenarios for sending Push notifications to users of mobile applications when the shelf fullness falls below a specified level.

To do this, go to the **Automation** tab, select the **Shelves** folder in the cameras tree, and then, on the opened page, go to the **Tasks by event** tab.

In the **Event** drop-down list, select **Shelf empty**, in the **Action** drop-down list — **Send Push notifications to mobile devices**, then click the **Apply** button.




On the **Actions** tab of the window that opens, set the appropriate text in the **Message text** field, taking into account that the message will automatically contain the name of the camera. In the **Recipients** drop-down list, mark the users that will be used for authorization in mobile applications and should receive notifications. After clicking the **Apply** button, all cameras in the group will have the same scenario: sending a push notification when the fullness level of the shelves monitored by this camera is below the allowable level.

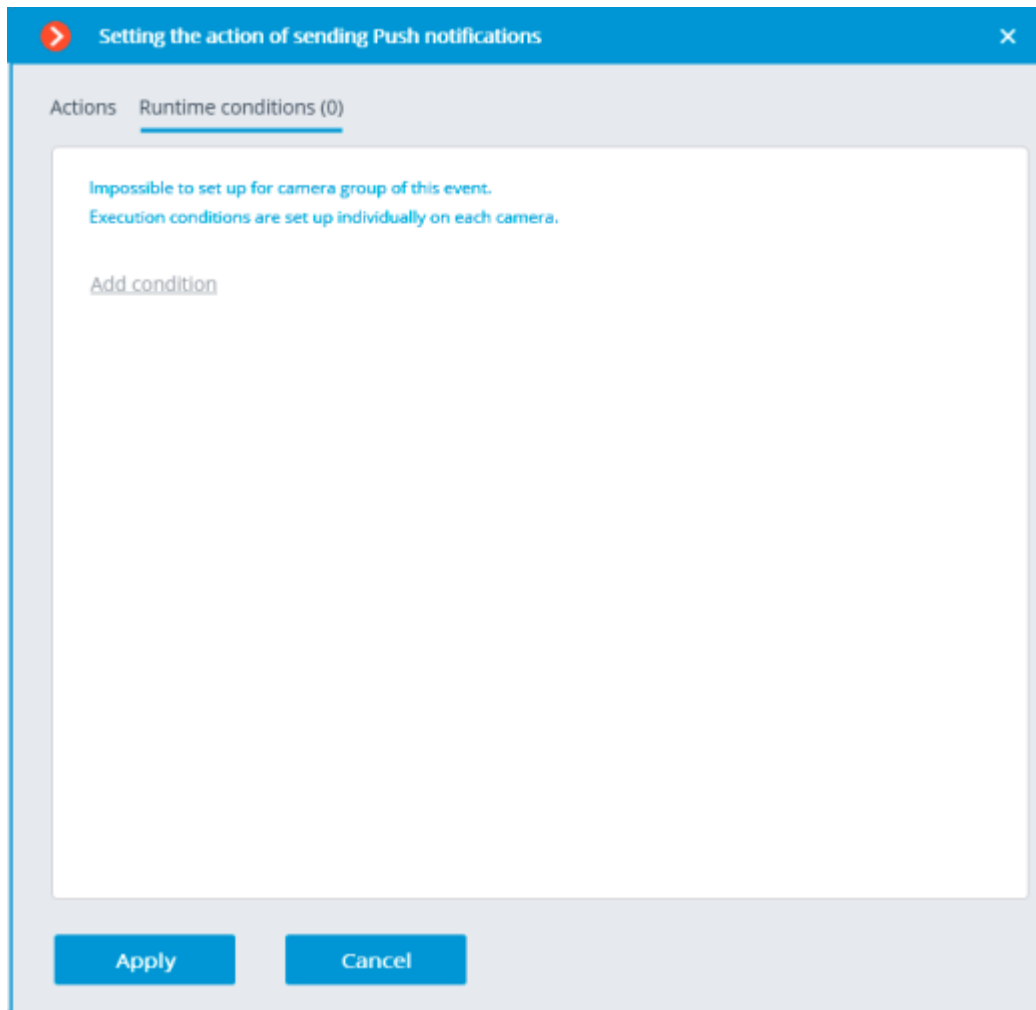

When adding an action to a group of cameras, the ability to specify additional conditions for sending notifications is not available.



If it is necessary to indicate the names of shelves in messages, then additional conditions must be added for each shelf in the automation settings of each camera separately.

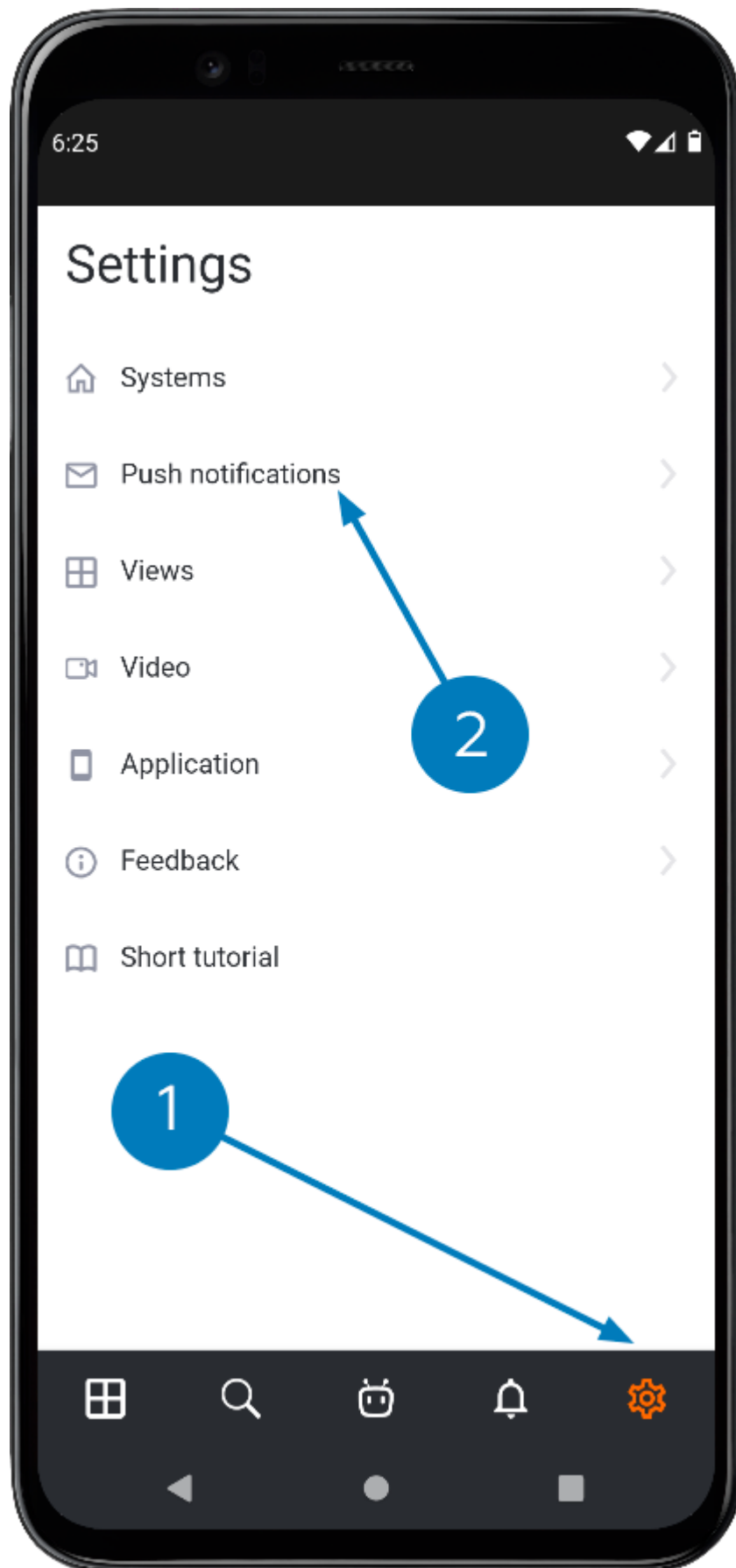
After installing the **Eocortex** mobile application on the device, connect it to the system with which it should work by tapping the **Connect to the video system**.



Specify the IP address of one of the servers in the system settings, enable the **Connect automatically** option, set the name and password of the user who should receive notifications about empty shelves. The System Name field may contain any name.

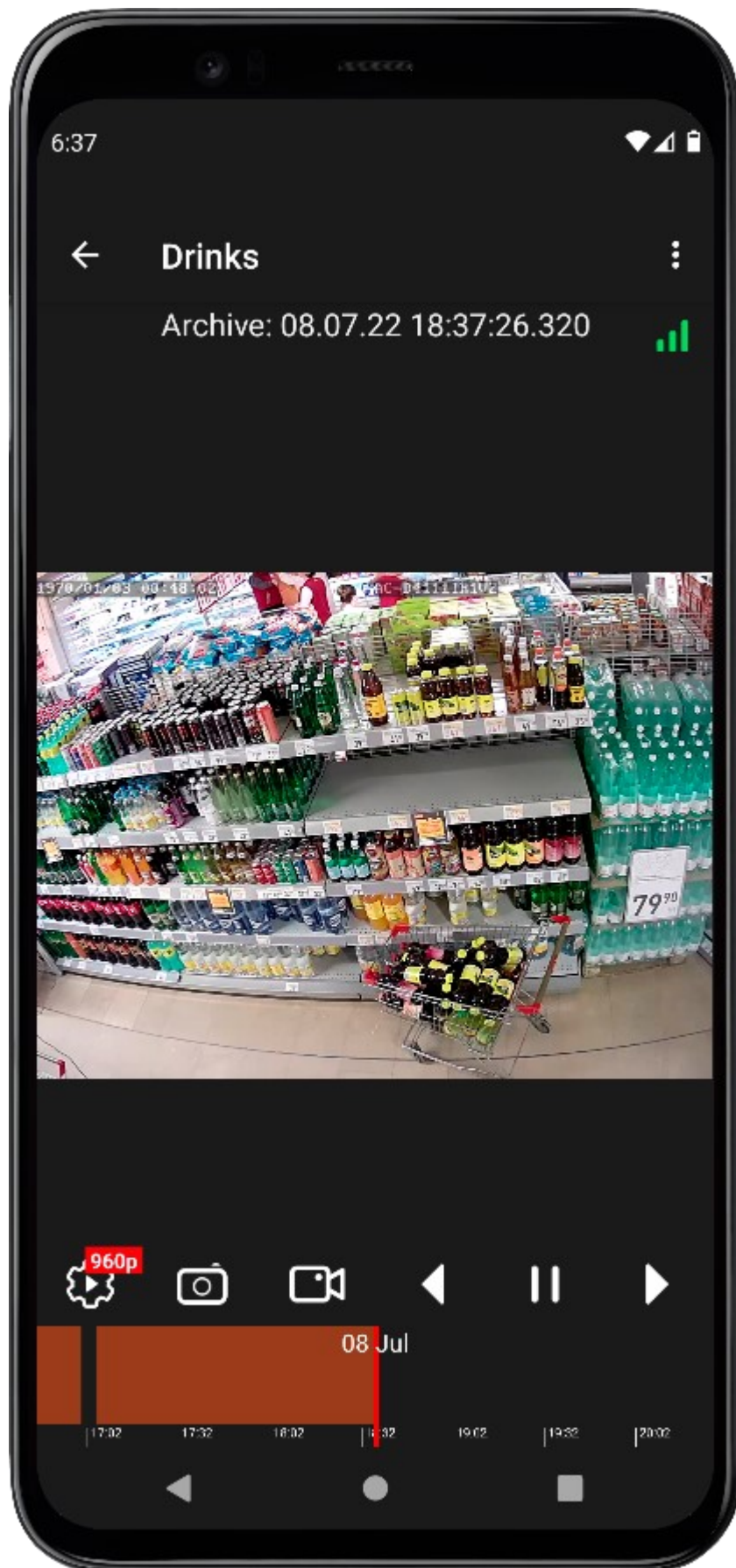


The function of receiving **Push notifications** is enabled by default, but you can check its status in the settings to be sure.

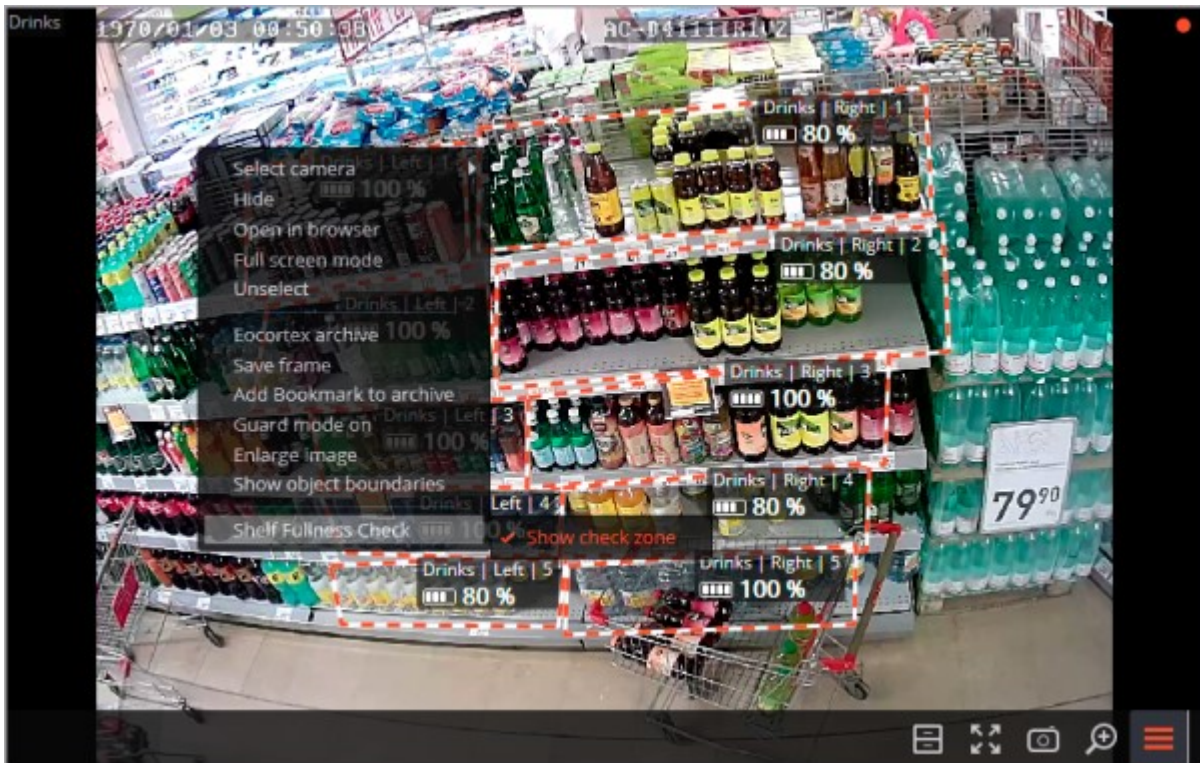


After connecting to the system for the first time, the device will be ready to receive notifications of empty shelves. Tapping the notification will open the camera with the related shelf on the screen.



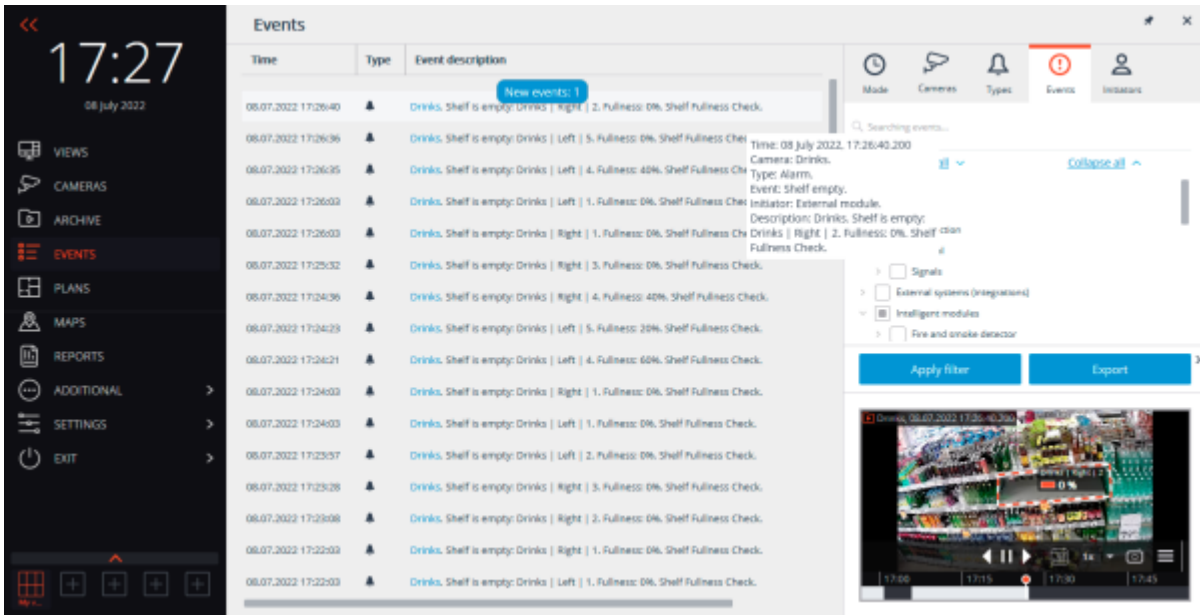


In the **Eocortex Client** application, displaying the contours of the shelves and their current fullness can be enabled. To do this, call the context menu in the camera cell and, in the **Shelf fullness** item, enable the **Display control zones** sub-item.

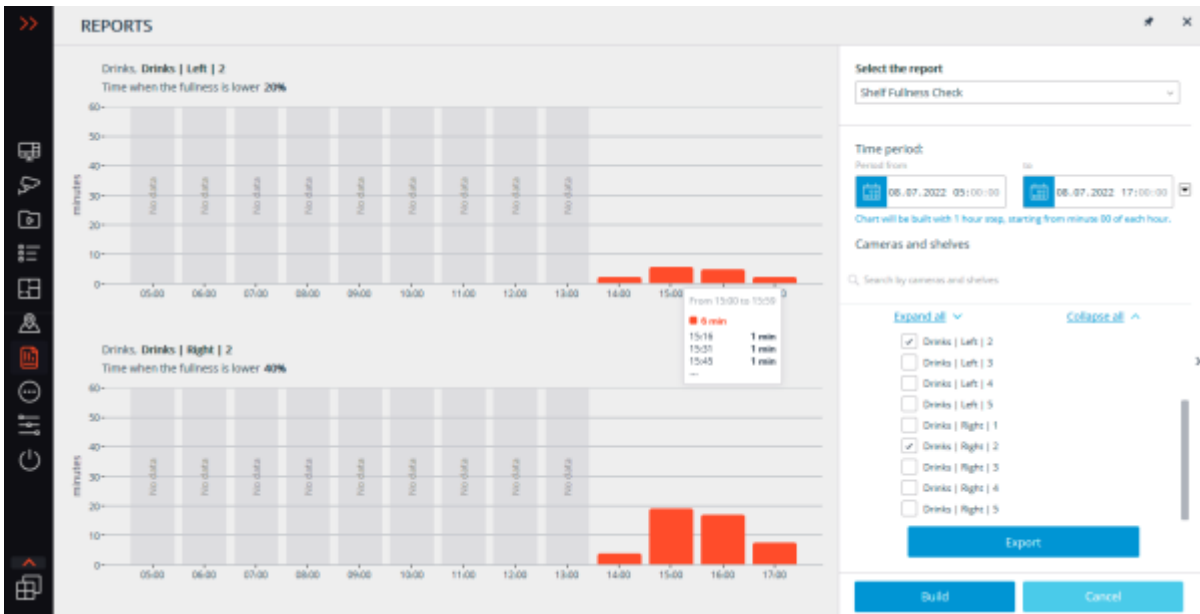

To do this, create a **bat file** with content similar to the one below:



Generating SSL Certificate for Episode archive

Self-signed SSL certificates for the **Episode archive service** can be created with the [OpenSSL](#) application.

Install the OpenSSL v1.1.1n Light distribution package, which corresponds to the bitness of the operating system used.

Generation on Windows OS

The steps below are a sequence of commands that should be executed on the command line.

Step 1. Add the OpenSSL folder to the PATH environment variable.
